Have Your Say! Before 31st March

Residents in Sydney have been given a 'once in a lifetime' opportunity to have a say in planning their future. Without feedback, how can the Sydney Greater Commission know what we want? Don't be complacent now, then complain later. Start the process by reading the Draft Plans and making a submission.

Unfortunately, the areas of Galston, Arcadia, Glenorie, Canoelands, Fiddletown, Berrilee, Dural, Middle Dural, Kenthurst, Annangrove, Maroota and Wisemans Ferry are split between the North District Draft Plan (Hornsby Shire Council residents) and the West Central District Plan (Hills Shire Council residents). This is probably not a good outcome for our area. Surely it would be better if all our rural areas were planned together. The rural areas are mentioned in the North District Draft Plan on page 143, and in slightly more detail in the West Central District Plan on page 157, even the Sustainability Priorities appear to be slightly different.

If you feel that our rural areas need to be considered in one District Plan, not split between two, then we urge you to make a submission, even if it's just to make this point. We would suggest that all rural areas and villages be covered by the West Central District Plan, as this is where the majority of land lies. Do we really want different planning outcomes on each side of Old Northern Road like we have now?





Celebrating the Life of William John Hammond



Bluey born 16th August 1941 in Royal North Shore hospital, and was better known to most as Blue. Blue attended Lane Cove Public School and went on to high school at Crows Nest Boys.

Along with collecting scrap from about the age of 12, Blue's entrepreneurship began with buying and selling horses from the saleyard, as well as collecting the milk bottles from the back step of the milk bar, and cashing them back in around the front. He then

went on to be a street sweeper with horse and cart for the Lane Cove Council, where he met a young girl, Neridah, in her school uniform at the bus stop.

Blue and Neridah were married in 1963, with the arrival of their first child, Billy, in 1964, and a second child, Robert, in 1966. The new family then moved to Dundas in 1968, purchasing their first home with scrap money. Following this was the arrival of their daughter, Barbara in 1969 and finally John in 1971.

In 1972 at the age of 31, Blue became an owner-driver for Tooheys with his first beer truck, although this never kept him from continuously doing the scrap. Soon after, Blue and Neridah decided to follow their dream and buy a block of land in Galston in 1976, and moved into the log cabin in 1981. Anyone who has visited will remember the waterhole, barbeque, motorbikes and horses creating a constant buzz around the place, along with all the people coming and going. As if not already busy enough, Blue then embarked on the journey of the water truck in 1979, running both trucks simultaneously. After running the beer truck for about 15 years, Blue decided it was time to wind down, but he still always managed to do the scrap.

In the following 10 years, Blue celebrated the arrival of his 4 grandchildren, Kristie, Chevonne, Joel and Geri, later extended with 2 great grandchildren, Ted and Allie. The time had then come for Blue to relax and enjoy his palace, while supporting 'one or two' venues with active club memberships throughout the community across his life.

Blue was always the type to help someone out in need, and has been remembered through the days of beer strikes, where he might re-arrange the stock on his truck to ensure his favourite venues didn't go without.

So next time you visit the Galston or Glenorie club, or hear a story around a table about Bluey Hammond, remember to raise an Old, tell a good story - and You know the Rules.

Plan and prepare advice:

Prepare your home - a well prepared home is more likely to survive a bush fire or ember attack.

Here are some basic maintenance tips to prepare your property:

- Clean your gutters of leaves and twigs
- Install metal gutter guards
- Repair damaged or missing tiles on the roof
- Install fine metal mesh screens on windows and doors
- Fit seals around doors and windows to eliminate gaps
- Enclose the areas under the house
- Keep lawns short and gardens well maintained
- Cut back trees and shrubs overhanging buildings
- Clean up fallen leaves, twigs and debris around the property
- Have hoses long enough to reach around your house
- If you have a pool, tank or dam, put a Static Water Supply (SWS) sign on your property entrance, so firefighters know where they can get water


March member profile: James Madry

When you're not at the brigade, what do you do for a living?

I work as a project manager, specialising in language data solutions for a company in Chatswood. In my spare time, I also work as a video producer.

What made you join the RFS?

When I first moved to Galston 7 years ago and found out there was an RFS brigade, I went up to the station and knocked on the door, not realising there isn't someone there 24/7. I took down the details but it dropped off my radar and I never got in contact. When I started working full time, I was looking for an activity/hobby to break up the working week, and that same day there was a flyer in my mailbox from Galston RFB, looking for recruits, so I went down on the weekend and signed up.

What would you say are some of the benefits to being part of the RFS?

What is a fond memory you have of your time at the brigade?

It took about five minutes in the truck before we were all roaring with laughter and joking around, which continued



for the next three days as we worked. It was pretty amazing to spend time with these guys who came from all different walks of life and took time off work to lend a hand.

What advice would you give someone thinking of joining?

If you're thinking of joining, get in contact with us and come down for a Saturday training session to see what it's all about. Everyone's really friendly and welcoming, and we'll all be happy to meet you and show you around!

Dural and Districts Historical Society Elena Knight's Stall

Margaret McKinley, with reference to Margaret Blackwood's interview of 1997


At the end of January this year a small hand printed notice appeared on the closed gate of Elena Knight's vegetable stall in Galston Road, opposite the entrance to Rowland Village.

It said "Dear Customers, Just to say thank you all for your friendship, loyalty and patronage over so many years. I have enjoyed my life trying to be of help to you all, and lots of enduring friendships in that time. Love and thanks. Elena "

This is absolutely the end of an era for Galston. Elena, one of the seven children of Jim and Bessie Knight, was born in Hornsby in 1936. The family lived in a rather charming timber home and grew all sorts of fruit and vegetables, which were displayed and sold from the front veranda. People came from all parts of the district and beyond to buy their fruit, vegetables and eggs, jams, chutneys, and honey. All sorts of plants were also for sale. In about 1987 this house was demolished as it had no electricity, a leaking roof and termites made it unsafe. The modern brick home was built in its place and this is where Elena lives now. In 1973 the ABC produced a segment of 'A Big Country' (that was before colour TV) featuring Elena and her father out on the farm picking acres of beans. This film is in the Dural Historical Society archives.

As a child Elena attended Galston Primary School and later the Hornsby Domestic Home Science School (now Hornsby TAFE?). She left school when she was 15 and worked in the Galston General Store for a while. But her services were required on the Farm, where she has worked ever since. Her father, Jim, sold off all but one and a half acres of the farm in





1970. Jim, died in 1986. Elena cared for her mother for the next ten years until her passing in 1995 Elena has always helped others, and now her many nieces and nephews are able to help her. The people of Galston will miss seeing her around and wish her well in retirement.

At the next meeting of the Dural Historical Society on Saturday, 11th March at 2pm, the guest speaker will be Judy Horton who will be speaking about the artist J.P. Russell.




Dural Bowlers

Memory of Vic Jarrett's life

Vic's early life began at Lismore where his father had a dairy farm. Early in his life, the family moved to Galston where Vic began his education at Galston Public School. He continued his education at Hornsby Tech then furthered his studies at Crows Nest Technical High.

After completing his trade certificate and declining a position as a Tech teacher, he set up a small metal work factory repairing farm machinery for local farmers. Answering the challenge from locals, he began designing his own farm machinery, often simply sketched on the floor with chalk. Pretty soon he was manufacturing under his own name and steadily grew the business until he was able to buy land and build a larger factory on the same site that the company still operates from today (Jarrett Implements).

Around the late '40s he started courting the love of his life, Marjorie. They met in their late teens at Church fellowship and were constant companions from the start. When Vic was 23 he asked Marj to marry him. They just celebrated their 65th wedding anniversary last December.

Vic was a hands on man. He did not like the limelight. He was just as happy sweeping the floors and loading trucks as writing the cheques. He ran an efficient factory and many people commented that they could have eaten their lunch off his factory floor. Often he was spoken to by the truck drivers as one of the workers and was more than once asked 'hey mate, what's the boss like here? Do you ever see him?'

As most people know, Vic never retired. When asked why, he simply said with a cheeky grin – "I was away that day so I

have to go around again".

Vic's other passion was his love of vehicles. They had to be beautiful and fast! In his early days, this took the form of a motor bike, then he progressed to passenger cars, some of them luxurious for the time, but he was just as comfortable on his tractor. So much so that he would often be seen driving the tractor up the factory's driveway to collect the mail. His

daredevil nature would then take over and he would stick the tractor into neutral, and hang on tight for the steep decline achieving speeds that would normally involve a traffic violation!

Even in later years, his heavy right foot was well known. Some of his Probus associates would comment that he might be one of the last to get into his car, but he was certainly always first out of the driveway. 'Pa Bic' was often seen by his grandsons driving menacingly around the hills district at speeds that were not considered suited to his demographic.

His vehicle "piece de resistance" would have to be his Alvis which was lovingly restored during the 90s

and Anthony had it presented to him in all its glory as a surprise on his 70th birthday. It was a very proud moment for Vic.

Anyone that knows Vic would describe him as a humble, quiet man. He was also known as an extremely honest and diligent businessman and employer. He was always respected by family, colleagues and employees. His generous nature in helping many causes was kept to himself. Only he and his recipients knew and that's the way he wanted it.

Whilst Vic was out working hard, Marj was at home rearing the two children, Cheryl and Anthony. At home, Vic could be found in the kitchen on washing up duty, but he never

mastered any cooking skills. He would happily help with homework, as long as it was maths. For leisure time, Vic would go to his friend's home for some table tennis on Friday nights or watch some sport on the TV.

Vic was a great Dad, and family memories revolve around summer holidays with family friends, especially the Newhalls. Vic's hidden talent came in handy as he was able to fit 30% more in the car boot than anyone else. They holidayed regularly at The Entrance then Forster, and later at Terrigal where they eventually built a family holiday house.

Life was simple and he worked hard. In later years, once the children had

left home, just when others might be planning to take it easy, Marj and Vic embarked on a new project. They built their new home at Cherrybrook. The two of them made a formidable team. Vic, the ever hardworking man and Marj

Galston Girl Guide hall – A Community Hall Available to Hire


Galston Girl Guide hall is hidden away at 414 Galston Road, Galston.

Glenorie Rural Fire Brigade News

What a Summer!

With NSW summer weather smashing records (or should we say burning records?) the Rural Fire Service has been on high alert. The weekend of February 10-12 saw the unprecedented call to place a TOTAL FIRE BAN across the entire state with 3 fire districts classified as CATASTROPHIC. By the end of the weekend there were 97 fires burning with 38 not yet contained. The property loss has still not been calculated.

The Hills Brigades on Standby

Fortunately, there were no fires in The Hills Shire, however crews, including 17 members from Glenorie, were on standby at the station, ready to provide assistance to other shires or respond quickly to anything local. A Hills Strike Team (5 brigade tankers with a Group Officer) was activated to the Hunter Region to assist if needed.

Member fighting fires near Wauchope.

Fires in Lower Pappinbarra, near Wauchope, burnt over 800 hectares with several properties lost. One Glenorie brigade member Brian Rheinberger recently moved to a property in that area. He joined the local brigade which was very excited with the expertise and experience he brought with him. Brian was very busy with his new brigade actively fighting these fires, helping save many properties faced with a 20km firefront.

Our thoughts go out to all who have lost their homes, stock and property during these NSW fires. Thankfully, the residents followed the instructions of the NSW Rural Fire Service and evacuated when requested, so no lives were lost. It is a stark




reminder of how quickly fire can take hold and turn into an uncontrollable furnace. A reminder too of how important YOUR FIRE PLAN is. It is never too early to make a plan but sadly it can so quickly become too late.

In the words of our NSW RFS Commissioner, Shane Fitzsimmons "A well prepared and engaged community is one of our greatest assets" and we hope that The Hills/Hornsby residents are as best prepared as you can be.

Fire Calls

In the last month we have had no calls to fires but have attended motor vehicle accidents (MVAs) and trees down. The extreme heat took its toll on trees falling and blocking Old Northern and Cairnes Roads. In 40 plus degrees it can be very hot and sometimes difficult work. Special thanks to the crane driver who offered his machine to remove the large stump of one tree off the road making that job a little easier.



The brigade works hard and as quickly as safety will allow to clear the road and get traffic moving. Thank you to all the drivers who are patient and helpful when we need to close a road (with police permission).

Autumn has arrived.

By the time this article goes to print Autumn will be here. Hopefully we can all breathe a sigh of relief and can get back to preparation for Fuel Management burns which will once again be a high priority for the brigade.

Autumn Recruitment

It is also time for the Autumn intake of new recruits. If you have considered joining the brigade, now is the time. If you join now it may be possible for you to complete Bush Fire training in time for the next fire season.

Temporary lane closures will be in place for the geotechnical investigation work which includes surveying and drilling to establish ground conditions and locating underground utilities to improve the road for motorists.



Summer Haze

I dream of frosty winter in this summer of heat waves.

The herb gardens sprawl beneath the summer's heat, and the long driveway is marked by bowed lines of long-stemmed, blue and white flowering agapanthus. Perennial, purple basil crowns a large pot nearby with its fragrant, spice-filled leaves and



flowers. Nearby, rosemary bushes are flushed with fragrant, pale-blue blossoms which tempt my palate. I cannot resist slipping three, translucent rosemary blossoms, onto my tongue ... and inhale their fragrance. Rosemary blossoms are well-reputed to stimulate one's memory, so I smile and nibble a

couple of extra blossoms in passing.

Summer will soon be coming to a close, but today, our old farmhouse merely overlooks the quiet and subdued sprawl of the herb gardens. The day is hushed and there is time to savour. Perky, blue Anise Hyssop blossoms provide a nose-high fragrance, and are a gentle reminder that Christmas has quite recently passed. On the old verandah, there is Rose-petal jam on orangeflecked scones, crisp apple tartlets, lavender cookies, and a little conversation ... all go so well together, as we sip tea and allow the gardens to work their magic.


The dogs, Myrtle and Boof, haunt the shaded verandahs with us, seeking relief from the summer's heat and enjoying the cool

of wild clovers, self-sown in the shade, beneath the garden swing. I wondered wistfully if the migrating Caper White butterflies would return this summer, to lay their eggs. Last year was their fourth visit to our gardens and I long to welcome them again.

Joyce Beatrice Featherston nee Blaxland

Sue Tapping

As we juggle our hi-tech modern lives of driving here and there, the constant tweeting of mobile phones and having the world at our fingertips, my mum's life seems almost impossible to comprehend - walking to school and thinking nothing of riding a bicycle to one of her many jobs and at times living without power or the telephone and always constantly working.

Her lifespan was marked by huge technological changes but she continued sewing, baking and making do until the very end of her life.

She was well known in the Glenorie community where she lived and worked for more than 60 years and has left behind countless family stories and memories that bring that past to life and keep her in our minds and hearts.

Early days and school days

Born in 1931, the

Depression and World War II formed a background to her childhood. She was the eldest child of Alan and Gertrude (Gert) Blaxland of Dural and came into the world on March 28 at 'Inchneuk', a hospital in Parramatta.

Alan was a carpenter who later became a house painter. The family moved around a lot but always in the Dural-Galston area. When Joyce was a newborn they lived at 'Brenalan' Joyce 6 with sister Judith in Kenthurst Road, Dural but



later that year they moved to a small fibro house on five acres in Gilligans Road, off Carters Road at Dural.

Her sister Judith was born six years after Joyce in 1937. Baby brother Graeme didn't join the family until 1941 when Joyce was 10.

Her Dad must have cut a fine figure on his sleek 1927 Indian Scout motorbike with sidecar. Joyce proudly traveled with him riding on the back while her mum Gert and little sister Judith sat in the sidecar. Alan had a passion for bikes and had owned a Norton before the Indian.

She started school at age five at the primary school at Galston. By 1943 (and possibly as early as 1938) the family had moved to 'Somerset' in School Road, which was another modest house on five acres. It was right beside the primary school. Gert cleaned the school for many years and was always on hand for lunch with Joyce or to rush over with a coat if the weather turned cold.

The house had no electricity or telephone. Joyce told us of going with her father each Saturday morning to collect wood for the fireplace and to fuel the copper in the laundry. They'd milk the cow they kept, collect firewood, load it into an old wheelbarrow then push it back home. Joyce carefully carried the milk.

One of the stories mum loved to relate was how, as a member of the Galston Branch of the Red Cross, she raised money for the war effort. In 1942 dressed as a Red Cross nurse she collected 30 shillings by singing patriotic songs. The coins were collected in a flag. Joyce always had a lovely voice.

High school was at the more distant Hornsby High, which Joyce went to in 1943, taking the Gorge bus through the Galston Gorge to Hornsby. As it was during the war and there was petrol rationing the bus ran on charcoal and says Mum it often broke down.

Life however suddenly and abruptly changed when she fell from a horse. After the accident her weight plummeted and she was no longer able to get to school. The doctors suspected nerve damage. She completed her intermediate certificate by correspondence from home.

Working life

She gradually regained her strength and in 1947, when she was about 16, enrolled at North Sydney Technical College to study dressmaking and drafting. Back then North Sydney was a long way from Galston, so Mum lodged with the Peel family and worked as a nanny/house cleaner by day so she could study at night. She excelled at the course (but hated working for the Peels) and from 1948 to 1949 worked with Madame Ellis Dressmakers at Hornsby. Her work included drafting and cutting paper patterns.

Although she enjoyed dressmaking, she jumped at the opportunity to work at Yaffa, a newspaper business, where she ws a junior in the advertising section and also compiled statistics. She kept her feet firmly in the rural life though picking peas for Lou Heather at Galston during 1950 and also working with her parents at 'The Kiosk' at Galston Park where they now lived.

Marriage and family

On March 10, 1951 she married my Dad, Norman (always Norm) Featherston, at the lovely old sandstone St Jude's Anglican Church at Dural - the same church where she had been baptized. They had met at a dance at Dural and when they married she was a few weeks short of her 20th birthday.

On that March day, Joyce looked beautiful in an A-line wedding dress of satin with a lace bodice that she created her herself. It was a work of art with

a sweetheart neckline and long sleeves that reached over the wrist and thumb. She carried a large trailing bouquet of orchids and wore a long veil.

Norm was a farmer and the newly weds lived at Kenthurst on the corner of Porters and Pitt Town Roads in a caravan. Over the next five years Robyn (1951), Wendy (1952), Susan (1954) and finally a son, Darryl, arrived in 1956 meaning Joyce had four children under five. It was a hectic time and there was still the farm work to do.

Her dressmaking skills came to the fore. Not only did she make clothes for her growing family she also took in dressmaking work to earn extra money. She was very good at making us clothes from dresses and jumpers that she would deftly recycle into something new. She once made one large jumper into three small jumpers for her girls.

With the family growing they moved to 'Oak Hill' on Galston Road in 1953. The house was just near where Galston Road meets Old Northern Road now busy with traffic and shoppers.

The next move was to Cairnes Road, Glenorie to a house owned by Norm's brother-in-law. This house was close to a tennis court where Mum and Dad loved to play tennis with local friends while the local kids amused themselves with ball games and riding bikes in the quiet streets.

It was while they were in the house that Joyce worked again in her parents' shop at Galston. She left the girls with Norm and rode her pushbike across to The Kiosk in Galston Park. (It is now History Cottage.)

This was before Darryl was born as, by the time he arrived, they had their own property, 'Pine Ridge Orchard' at Glenorie, which they bought in 1955.

Life at Glenorie

At Pine Ridge they were able to spread their wings and really settle down and embrace family life. The 1930s fibro house set on 32 acres and had three bedrooms and a huge 'modern' kitchen where Mum loved to cook – her passion for cooking lasted all her life.

There was even room for a sewing room and as we children headed off to school she had time to resume sewing, making school and sports uniforms and taking on other work too.

She worked hard - she always had - but

her days were filled with packing fruit and vegetables (Dad grew stone fruit, citrus and a huge range of vegetables). In the evenings she'd settle down behind the sewing machine.

At times she also took on part-time work but somehow kept us all well fed and cared for. She even managed to find time to play the occasional game of tennis and go out to dances. At this time Mum and Dad didn't have a car so relied on friends. We were often taken to church picnics at the beach in a borrowed car – Dad and Mum didn't want us to miss out!

Some of the part-time jobs she had during the 1960s that I can remember were in the supermarket at Glenorie Co-op, at Pine Valley Flowers packing orchids for Norm Loader, picking and packing for local orchardists and a stint as a machinist at the Speedo factory at Windsor sewing swimming costumes.

When Mrs Hart opened a milk bar in Glenorie in around 1965, Mum went to work there, staying on when Terry Fatseas bought the business. In among all this work, she also served as secretary for the P&C at Glenorie Primary.

In 1972 Ivan White asked her to work with him as an assistant at the Glenorie Post Office. I don't think she realised how long she'd be there. She worked with Ivan for 10 years and then became Post Mistress when he retired. She was there for another $11^{1/2}$ years until she too retired in 1994 after 22 years work.

As all this work went on, so did working on the family farm, sewing, cooking and of course looking after her four children.

She recorded the Glenorie rainfall for the local area for many years and contributed a regular weather report to the local paper known as *The Glenorian*. After the column in the paper stopped, she continued recording the rainfall until she

became too unwell in late 2015. She also contributed to *The Living Heritage* magazine.

Her volunteer work never ceased, and for the last 16 years of her life she was an active member of the View Club, collecting raffle money as well as baking to raise funds. She also sold relishes, jams and pickles along with Norm's vegies from a roadside stall outside their house.

Children, grandchildren and great grandchildren

During the 1970s family life changed as one by one the children

married and started their own families. Robyn married Paul Rogers, Wendy married Russell Pringle, Susan married Wayne Tapping and Darryl married Camille Nott. Joyce made all the bride gowns and the bridesmaid dresses as well.

She made them on her Italian-made Necchi Super Ultra, which was the machine of her dreams and that she bought for herself in the 1960s. She soon found herself 'Nana'

to nine grandchildren. Those grandchildren too have grown and delighted Joyce with 24 great grandchildren. She loved each and every one of them, was proud of their number, and often boasted that she was known as 'Favourite Nana'. It was a role she filled well and I can say that all the great grandchildren, as did the grandchildren, adored her.

It is sad that she has missed the births of two more great grandchildren. We know she would have been delighted to meet Alexander and Emma Rose, who were born during 2016 after her death.

She was diagnosed with lung cancer at the end of January 2015. The diagnosis took us all by surprise as neither she nor anyone in the family had ever smoked. The disease progressed rapidly and she died on March 6 just a few weeks short of her 85th birthday and a few days short of her wedding anniversary. Joyce and Norm would have celebrated 65 years of marriage on



March 10. They had lived in and around Glenorie for more than 60 years and Dad Norm continues to live there in the house they once shared.



What happens at a rally day at Arcadia Pony Club?

Arcadia Pony Club meets on the first, third and fifth Sunday of the month at the wonderful grounds at the Rural Sports Facility in Galston. Throughout the year we have our regular 'rally days', along with both Club and Zone level competitions, along with our annual pony club camp. Rally days are our regular training days for club members.

At this time of the year we always have new members joining our Club and they always ask the question – "What happens at a normal rally day?"

On Rally Days, a variety of activities are organised by the Club Senior Instructor and delivered by qualified NCAS Pony Club Instructors or qualified external Instructors or specialists. The activities and lessons include Dressage, Jumping, Sporting Games, Polo-cross, Troop Drill, and Pony Club Australia Certificate work. The aim of these is to provide fun and interesting ways to learn about riding and the different facets of horsemanship. Riders are placed into groups according to age and riding ability. These groups then rotate through

the various activities set for the rally day. Rally Day plans are sent out by the Friday before the rally day to all members.

At Arcadia Pony Club, we are very focused on learning all about the care of horses, not just riding them so a normal rally day for members of Arcadia Pony Club includes what is known as 'Certificate work'. Certificate work includes some 'nonridden' work where riders learn the theoretical and practical information related to the care and training of horses.

Certificate work also has a ridden component to it to assess riding competence. Typically, each riding group at each rally day spends one session on certificate work with an instructor. And – when the weather is too wet for riding, members will often still come to pony club to complete a few hours of certificate work and enjoy the delicious canteen lunches as well!

Under the NSW Pony Club framework, riders are encouraged to undertake various efficiency tests aligned to each certificate according to their age and ability. These commence with the E certificate for our youngest riders who are under 7 years. The E certificate requires riders to be able to have reasonable control of their ponies at work and trot and have basic knowledge of handling a horse and looking after it.

The Certificates go from E through to A which is the highest certificate available. Each certificate has a minimum age associated with it. There are books associated with all Certificates (apart from E) that riders can work through at their own pace.

These certificates aim to encourage the interest and improvement in knowledge of our members. They are viewed as a measure of a rider's progress in their overall efficiency. In working to achieve each certificate level, members acquire valuable knowledge and skills,

Leanne Davies, Senior Instructor at Arcadia Pony Club noted "Certificate work is an excellent way for riders to understand a lot more about horses and horsemanship. This additional knowledge

can provide greater rider safety and ultimately enhance their riding experience.

Pony Club NSW encourages horsemanship amongst its members, along with providing appropriate coaching and competition, and to raise awareness of sportsmanship and citizenship of its members. Certificate work is a foundation of building the knowledge to support this."

Do you love horses, enjoy teaching children and think you may have an interest in becoming a pony club instructor? We would love to hear from you. We provide a safe and structured learning program in line with Pony Club NSW guidelines.

News from Uniting Care Galston Early Learning Centre

We have had a positive start to the year, welcoming back our previous families as well as getting to know our new families that started in January. Due to the extreme weather conditions over the past couple of weeks, the children have spent many days inside engaging in interest based group projects.

Currently the children are showing great interest in the introduction of our pet Siamese Fighter Fish. Within the first few days of having our fish the children spent a lot of their time trying to decide on a name for our fish. After sharing their diverse ideas and opinions the children eventually decided upon calling our fish "Alan".

The children were interested in extending upon their knowledge relating to different fish. They used a variety of tools like books, magazines, internet research and the use of their own knowledge which they were able to draw upon to make their own discoveries.



Throughout these discussions we have learnt a number of facts about Alan's different body parts like his gills, scales, fins and his tail that are able to help him swim through water. leadership skills throughout the year. We have two House Captains and two Vice-Captains per House. Congratulations to all House Captains.



What is a real Christian?

A young man is standing at my front door, holding a clipboard and pen. He inquires as to whether he can ask me a few questions about my attitude to the role of the church in today's world and in my community. "Yes," I respond and he proceeds." Am I involved in a church?" He asks. "What activities/programs does my church provide?" "Is church only for Christians?"

Towards the end of the conversation he says: "Can I ask you what do you think a Christian is?"

How would you answer?

There can be a lot of confusion about this subject and there is a variety of opinions about what the word 'Christian' really means. If you were asked this question how might you respond? Would you say: "Well I suppose a Christian is one who goes to church regularly," or "It's a person who lives a good life, tries to live honestly and helps others."

But none of these things on their own makes a real Christian. Christians should go to church, live honestly and help others, but that doesn't make them real Christians. It's not something we can inherit from our parents like the way we get our family name. As someone has said, "God has no grandchildren".

What is a real Christian?

Becoming a real Christian involves changing your relationship to God. It means you enter into a personal relationship – a right relationship with God the Father and his son Jesus Christ. You become members of God's family and can call him "Father". Can you do that?

You might ask," But isn't everyone a child of God?"

The answer to this question is "Yes" in the same sense that God created the human race, so we are all children of God, but "NO" because our first parents, Adam and Eve, disobeyed God and the human race has had a broken relationship with God ever since (and there are a variety of opinions). *To be continued*.



This is from an old survey (Nielsen, 2009), but it is estimated 2 in 3 Australians believe in God or a higher power.

The majority of us are comfortable with an all knowing, omniscient, omnipotent power but that is where for many the thought stops.

The same survey found only around 1 in 5 attended church, some even went weekly!

This is a sobering thought for a pastor. What is it about church that, rather than attract the masses, appears to repel them.

When you read through the Book of Acts it paints the early church growth, mind you not in buildings with stained glass windows, or with preachers lording it over the congregation, rather out in the courtyards, the streets, and travelling around houses.

The early church was attractive, especially to the broken, or outcasts, the people least embraced by the wider Jewish community.

"When the crowds learned it, they followed him, and he welcomed them and spoke to them of the kingdom of God and cured those who had need of healing." Luke 9:11

In many ways, this doesn't represent the outside view of church today. Regardless of the reality of individual churches (some are doing amazing things within their community), the truth is there are plenty of spare seats on a Sunday morning.

Jesus' final encouragement to the church (or gathered believers) was to reach the lost, the broken, the lonely, the depressed, the anxious, the fearful, the weary, the ill, the frail, the unloved, the abused, the unwanted, in fact everyone and welcome them into a loving family ... of equally lost and broken people, yet now belonging to a community of believers embracing this mission to welcome and help each other.

"Therefore welcome one another as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God." Romans 15:7

So my self pointing rant at the local pastor (me) is ... do we deliver? Are we welcoming? If you, a non church attender, found yourself in need or desperate, requiring support ... would you turn to church? If not ... why not? Please tell me.

My prayer for all the churches in our district is that we increasingly embrace our mission and with it the revelation, that while we have found meaning, belonging, a purpose and faith, we don't lose sight of the brokenness and lack of hope we once experienced. Rather we stand ready to welcome, with open arms those in the community looking for help, or company, or support.


