Community Koala Care

Koalas were heard regularly in the Maroota Forest region before the December 2002 bushfires. In fact, parts of Maroota Forest were once a koala protection area.

Since these terrible fires the only evidence of the survival of Koalas in the area has been very limited. A koala has been heard adjacent to the Broadwater Wetland and there is anecdotal evidence of a koala having been seen near the road in Maroota. If any readers have evidence of koalas from any other source it would be great if you could contact the Glenorie Environment Centre with your

Koalas in the wild are hard to see because they are usually in the tops of trees, in dappled light and surrounded by leaves. A good way to find out if koalas are about is to listen for them. They are most active during the breeding season which extends between September and November. During this time, the males make a very distinctive grunting noise and this call can be heard during the night and in the early hours of the morning.

It would be wonderful to have numerous koala families living in our forests once again and it would be great to know if their numbers are starting to build up. Koala calls can be heard by typing 'koala mating calls' in to google. If anyone hears any distinctive grunting noises that are similar



to these calls please contact Pat at Glenorie Environment Centre, email deblacko7@hotmail. com or call 0419 321 276. This way a record of where these calls are heard can be made and a data bank established.

A regular koala survey is being conducted every year by the Glenorie Environment Centre and any new information would be much appreciated.

Giant Anzac Chewy Biscuits- Section 11, Class B

12 years and under

Recipe must be used. Size also matters (8cms)

1 ½ teaspoons ground cinnamon 1 cup desiccated coconut

¹/₄ cup (firmly packed) brown sugar¹/₄ cup golden syrup

1 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda

1 ½ cup plain rolled oats ½ cup caster sugar 125g butter, cubed 2 tablespoons water

Method

Preheat oven to 150°C. Line baking tray with non-stick baking paper. In a medium sized bowl, sift together flour and cinnamon. Add rolled oats, caster sugar, brown sugar and coconut. Mix well.

Combine butter, golden syrup and water in a small saucepan and stir over low-medium heat until butter melts and the mixture is well combined. Remove from the heat and stir in the bicarbonate of soda.

Add immediately to the dry ingredients and use a wooden spoon to stir until well combined.

Roll 2 tablespoons portions of mixture into balls and place on the lined tray about 5 cm apart. Use your fingers to flatten each slightly (until they are about 1cm thick) and bake in the preheated oven for 16 minutes.

Remove from the oven and set aside for 5 minutes to cool slightly before transferring to a wire rack to cool completely.

Gift Cards and Gift Vouchers

Amendments to the Fair **Trading Act 1987** were passed by the NSW Parliament in October 2017 and are due to be implemented in 2018.

The amendments introduce a mandatory 3-year minimum



expiry date on gift cards and gift vouchers sold to consumers in NSW. Businesses will also be banned from applying post-purchase administrative fees, which have the effect of reducing the balance left on a card.

A review by the Commonwealth Consumer Affairs Advisory Council (CCAAC) in 2012 found that gift cards were expiring with money left on them at a rate of three to eight per cent (the 'breakage rate'). For NSW consumers, this loss could be as much as \$60 million a year.

NSW consumers are losing benefits because of their inability to redeem gift cards and gift vouchers that have expired. The amendments could help address this ongoing financial harm, better protect consumers and provide certainty of their rights.

Another Dumper Caught Red-handed


An astute Glenorie resident was instrumental in catching yet another company dumping fill materials in our locality.

The resident, who we understand had had some excavations works carried out at their property, placed an ad on gumtree advertising free fill. They were contacted by a company who offered to take the fill for \$350 per truck load. The resident agreed to sell the fill and the truck arrived to collect the first load. The resident then asked where the fill was being tipped, and the driver replied 'the Galston tip". This rang alarm bells with the resident, so when the truck returned to collect the final truckload, the resident followed the truck to see where it was dumping the fill.

The truck drove from Glenorie to Galston, then down Belbowrie Close. It stopped at the bottom, the truck driver got out, opened the fire trail gate with a key(!), drove down the fire trail and tipped the fill. The resident clearly realised this was being illegally dumped, so photos were taken as evidence of the truck, the driver and him using the key.

We can only assume the resident must have been aware of the Geelans Road dumping problems, as they alerted Ray Hadley of 2GB to the situation. Ray took the matter up with his usual enthusiasm, alerted the Police, the EPA, and aired the saga to his listeners. We understand the matter is now under a full investigation. Residents need to keep an eye out for illegal dumping. The more we see and report, the harder it will become for would-be dumpers.



The Quarry-Go-Round

HORNSBY MTB TRAILS UPDATE: Off-road cyclists throughout Sydney were devastated by the 2015 closure of the only professionally-built and marked mountain bicycle trails in Greater Sydney, namely OMV, due to the deal between Hornsby Council and Northconnex to fill the Quarry to facilitate new parklands for Hornsby by 2023. Elevated bridges to reconnect Lava Flow & Turkey Run mtb trails during construction have yet to materialise, leaving local riders with only 2.5km to ride on.

QUARRY TRAIL CLOSURE: A further blow has been dealt to cyclists, bush runners and walkers, with the official 2016 closure of the Quarry Road Firetrail, due to the determination of the powerful North Shore Regional Target Shooting Association to keep us all safe and sedentary. While it is important for legal gun owners to have a place to practise shooting skills, there has not been any



incident since the range was established in 1898. The Association holds the official license to use a large wedge of Crown Land intersected twice by the Quarry Trail.

Since 1995, land management authorities have been privy to 'The Audit for Public Safety,' conducted by Insearch, on the Hornsby Range. The Range Inspector of NSW Police Firearms Registry, upon reviewing this Safety Audit, the Firearms Act of 1996 and the 2006 NSW Firearms Regulations, decided to adopt a zero risk policy for the Hornsby Range. Consequently, we now have a bushland 'Sydney Lockout',



barring public access to a National Park, a key historical link between Hornsby and Dural and the only bridge, other than in Galston Gorge - across the extensive, sheer-sided Berowra Creek.

Just as Hornsby Council 'inherited' OMV & the Quarry, the exceptionally poor management of Quarry Trail access has been 'inherited' from the past by BVNP. Pogson Trig Trail has been newly signposted and upgraded by NPWS in a feeble attempt at an 'alternate route' to QRT, but this only serves to illustrate a redundant mindset that walking is the only active way visitors want to experience a national park. NPWS says they are "Continuing discussions with their land management partners to investigate more options for alternate routes to QRT." My, how proactive they are!

The fact that nothing has been done to facilitate or secure ongoing Quarry Road trail use for the local community in the 22 years following that fateful 1995 Audit for Public Safety, does not inspire confidence in much, if anything being built now for any trail user groups to appreciate and legally access this vast area of BVNP for the foreseeable future- with the notable exception of all those who own a gun.

A historical, extensive, challenging and beautiful route to ride, walk or run on. Dangerous Galston Gorge is now the only traverse.

What Might We Gain? As yet, no official announcements or updated information from any land management bodies (2023 is 6 long years away) BUT as part of the OMV Parklands development, Hornsby Council has been positive regarding improved and extended mountain bicycle trails, linking to H2O in Westleigh, and perhaps a new footbridge (or two?) crossing Berowra Creek to Cherrybrook and Pogson's Trig. Hornsby Council has also built an excellent new jump spot at OMV, with additional new trails to safely access it.

So Where Can You Still Ride a MTB in Hornsby? Practise your skills at Jubilee Park in Turramurra and at OMV: but both are basically BMX tracks for mountain bikes and only take 10-15 minutes to ride around. All other off-road cycling in Hornsby (except the unofficial MTB trails of H20 in

Westleigh) is confined to short (5-10km) dead-end firetrails when, in fact, we could have had an extensive, world-class network of linked mountain bicycle trails a decade ago- and all the associated economic, tourism and wellbeing benefits that would have come with it!

Other Attractions: Avoid Ranger Danger! Leave your car parked at OMV and ride up Quarry Road for a swim in Hornsby Pool. Or walk across Peats Ferry Road and grab a coffee or a bite to eat at either the Refinery or Bees Knees Cafés. Hornsby Station is right next door to the shops, so city slickers can leave the car at home and hop on and off the train with a bike to access OMV in Hornsby and H20 in Westleigh.

Letter to the editor

I attended The Hills Shire Council meeting on Tuesday 10 October, which in contrast to the vast majority of Councils and State Government protocol, still refuses to make an Acknowledgment of Country at the opening of the meeting. There is time found for prayer and singing of the national anthem however the Liberal Councillors, including the representatives of North Ward, have consistently voted against including this ancient custom. As Spring fades into what augers to be a hot summer, grasses thickly intersperse with self-sown wildlings and tangles of sticky paspalum heads.

A subdued hum spreads amongst the sweet domes of clover where bees forage steadily for

nectar. How delightful it is to wade ankle-deep through the cool soft grasses at day's end! The birds welcome our overgrown lawns at this time, for the sprawling meadows proffer a nourishing array of both plant and insect foods .



This is the time to breathe deeply and slowly. As one wanders through seasons lush yet lingering wilderness, try to embrace nature's irreverent sense of humour. Around them rise hosts of small, pastel-winged butterflies ... transient, winged visitors, who often frequent our herbal haven.

Glenorie Progress Association Local Speed Limits

Extract of letter to Transport NSW (copied to Dominic Perotett MP and Councils): The Authorities Officer of the Glenorie Progress Association has provided feedback to your department regarding the default speed limit in Whites Road, Glenorie through an Online RMS Feedback Submission. I am writing in support of this submission and draw your attention to the following:

Your department has advised that the default speed limit on Whites Road, classified as a rural road, is 100 km/h. This is not a safe speed limit for these roads. Whites Road (Glenorie) is an access road from Old Northern Road which connects to the intersection of Post Office Road and Boronia Road. Entry from Old Northern Road is 60 km/h. Exit off Whites Road into the intersection of Post Office is 60 km/h. There is only one sign - a 55km/h advisory sign on approach to the right angled bend!!!

Whites Road and other rural roads in Glenorie are not wide roads, the verges are gravelly and unsuitable for pedestrian activity. So, of necessity, pedestrians, dog walkers, bicycle and horse riders need to compete with the cars and trucks travelling at inappropriate speeds on the roads. Most parents will not allow their children to cycle or walk on these roads as it is too dangerous. Whites Road has in the past been signposted 50km/h but these signs were removed for no apparent reason. Whites Road has street lighting so cannot be considered a 'rural' road.

Boronia Road is not sign posted for any speed limit and is also by default limited to 100 km/h. Boronia Road is a heavily used access road with heavy vehicles travelling to/from Arborglen

Nursery, therefore this road is also not safe, particularly for pedestrians, horse riders and cyclists at dusk and dawn. Similarly Moores Lane and Cairnes Road no longer have speed limit signs. Cairnes Road has 15km/h advisory sign on two right angled bends. Other roads in Glenorie have varying speed limits: 60km/h -Schwebel Lane, 50km/h - Munros Lane plus Post Office Road and Tecoma Drive and adjoining roads. These roads are in exactly the same situation – in fact many are wider and straighter roads.

Note also an increase in resident use with cluster developments being approved in the Glenorie region and beyond. Many close proximity roads within Glenorie need to be forensically reviewed and the inconsistencies addressed. These roads are substandard in asphalt cover, are not wide enough for any vehicle, especially heavy haulage vehicles, to pass each other at speed. I/We propose that these rural roads be signposted at 50km/h or 60km/h as a matter of urgency, for the safety of our residents, particularly children, in the area.

In summary these Glenorie Village and access roads need speed limits to be reviewed urgently: Boronia Road and the adjoining roads, Melton Place; Cairnes Road, Harrisons Lane; Knock Farrell Road; Moores Road, Muscios Lane; Pinus Avenue; Sermelfi Drive, and particularly Whites Road.

Alternatively a sign could be erected at both entrances to Glenorie advising motorists that all roads in Glenorie Village are limited to 50km/h (preferably), or 60km/h, unless otherwise signposted. We look forward to a positive response,

Seniors Initiative to Reverse Rising Levels of Inactivity

- Recent study from the Australian and New Zealand Journal of Public Health has indicated 2.5 million over 65s are not meeting the national physical activity standards.
- Active Seniors founder is implementing a free initiative to combat these numbers and get seniors up and moving which is coming to Hornsby on Friday 10th November.



Outback Volunteering

I've recently returned from an outback adventure of a different kind. One I'd like to share and encourage others to try.

12 months ago my husband and I travelled to outback Queensland for a holiday. Visiting Charleville along the way, we visited the School of Distance Education (School of the Air) and were blown away by how much it had advanced since we last visited back in the 70s. Long gone are the 2 way radios, its now internet, tablets, computers and smart boards. They are connected! During our visit to the school we found out they were looking for volunteers to spend time on the properties of the students to lend a helping hand with the schoolroom activities. The classrooms generally being a room in the homestead.

In June I applied to volunteer and within no time I was signed up and allocated a family. By early August I packed up my little Mazda 3 and headed to south west Queensland for 6 weeks. After a day and half driving I arrived at the 400,000 acre property near Thargomindah.



School started at 7.30am each weekday morning and finished by 2.30pm. The program is very structured and intense and so a lot to get through. The 24 yr old governess had her work cut out for her with not only the 3 girls working at



different grade levels but also visited quite frequently by the 3 yr old preschooler. The children were on line for 1 to 2 hours of the day and the rest of the time it was book work and electronic media. The family, govie and I drove for 400 km to the sports muster - a 2 day sports carnival. That is in itself fascinating as families came from all over to compete but most importantly socialise..

I felt some of the joys and anguish of outback living, like when 3 of the 4 children were flown out by flying doctors after huge metal fencing fell on them - fortunately all ended well.

While in the beginning I kept to schoolroom assistance, within no time I was helping in all aspects of life on the farm. Feeding animals, driving for hours along red dust dirt roads with loads of hay and anything else I could help with.

While I was there to help with the education of the kids, it was I who learnt so much. It is one thing to drive through this

Arcadia and District Residents Group

Extract from ADRG's submision to Council meeting on 11th October 2017 regarding DA 1373/2014 ADRG



Geelans Road is a quiet peaceful dead end road, with its narrow sealed road surface and grassy verges. The area provides for lots of wooded areas and open spaces that will be a blessing for people to look at and drive through. One of the last great green

belts of Sydney's north. However, all this has been shattered by the Hornsby Council – "delegated authority" approving this abomination of a DA/1373/2014 at 22 Geelans Road ARCADIA. For the local and wider community, the approved DA, the resulting alleged quarry and works associated have ruined the air we have been all breathing with crushed and broken down bonded asbestos sheeting / fibres and who knows what else. According to the NATA accredited Lab, fibres can be released when asbestos is machined, drilled, sanded and broken, maybe even agitated as it was transported by trucks passing homes, was not wrapped nor protected in transit via schools and community. I understand that Asbestos is not naturally occurring in the soil in Geelans Road. As a result, there could be a possibility that residents could end up part of a health issue like a "cancer cluster" (mesothelioma- by

broken up bonded Asbestos or silicosis – sandstone grinding) due to council's poor process, inaction, monitoring.

The questions to be put to the Council in an attempt to rebuild trust with the community:

- Why did council not place accurate and measurable restrictions on the time frame or volumes of fill for the site, despite an engineers' estimate in the DA of 8-10 weeks.
- What correspondences were made between the applicant consultant expert reports and the council officers – it appears that estimates on the DA were wildly inaccurate to the scope of works and went to approval without question by officers.
- Why did Council officers ignore their own internal reviews by departments affected by the application?
- How could any reasonable person reviewing this application come to the conclusion that the scope of works was appropriate for the stated development? Even the truck delivery and machine costs on site for the amount of fill massively exceeded the applications cost estimates.
- Why did council approve amendments to the DA significantly increasing its size and scale (i.e. height of land fill and retaining walls) without notification to residents?
- So, on what basis were the council planners and certifiers/
 compliance officers assuring us the fill was clean? How could
 council officer's state continually that it was safe when testing had
 not been done? If it was done, then why was this not reported until
 the EPA visited the site? Was the certifier only relying transport
 documents being carried by trucks with no cross check?
- After multiple complaints to council from residents why did council not initiate some form of review and escalate the case



internally. Why did council not act on more than 9 formal complaints received by March 2017?

- What evidence is there that compliance officers ever visited and reviewed the site, to ensure the DA consent conditions were being met during the 14 months of works being carried out?
- What effort was placed by officers towards the environmental damage caused by tree removal?
- Why was there no dust, noise, vibration and silt controls enforced in over 14 months of works?
- Why did the project require the intervention of the main stream media to force a review of processes and procedures associated with this disaster?

To summarise:

On every approach to the EPA, residents were advised that this was a council controlled, monitored and managed site. As the EPA has since declared that the site contains asbestos material 10 out of 10 core samples, it is very clear that council has not exercised safe, rigorous and consistent controls over the site since approval of the DA.

Council displayed contempt to the residents and community in ALL aspects of this project from the approval stage to where we are now. The same can be said for the certifiers' attitude to the health and safety in the local and broader Arcadian community.

What a mess! No one is happy with this. The more than 70 plus concerned families and residents of Geelans Road, Smalls Road look forward to Council's OPEN briefing of the EPA's report and directive to sort out the site, and we look forward to discussing those options with council regarding this DA or not to DA.

countryside, it's a very different thing to live it. Lessons in low stress cattle handling, processes of feeding cattle mulga, management of bores and hot artesian water and so much more.



I learnt not only about the farm life but also the social life. 



Bush Fire Season Guidelines

The NSW Rural Fire Service (NSW RFS) is reminding Hornsby Ku-ring-gai District and surrounding residents that fire safety permits are required during the statutory Bush Fire Danger Period.

NSW RFS Inspector Rolf Poole said hotter and drier conditions mean fires are more likely to start and spread quickly during the Bush Fire Danger Period, which officially begun on 1st October.

"From now until the end of the Bush Fire Danger Period, people wishing to light a fire in the open will require a fire safety permit, which are free and can be obtained from your local fire station or Fire Control Centre," Inspector Poole said.

Residents are encouraged to maintain their properties and prepare for the bush fires by removing dead vegetation and combustible material from around the home. Some Councils allow for pile burning in designated rural areas and each Council may have differing requirements. The local Council may require landowners or occupiers wishing to conduct open burning to obtain an environmental approval to burn, before obtaining a fire safety permit from NSW RFS.


NSWRFS can provide advice to residents on the appropriate ways to conduct safe open burning and the Fire Safety Permit process is an additional measure during the Bush Fire Danger Period to help reduce the escape of fires.

"Residents should be aware and check the rules and regulations for conducting burning in the open, including contacting their Local Government Council regarding environmental approvals," Inspector Poole said.

"We urge all residents in the Hornsby Ku-ring-gai and surrounding areas to be vigilant and extremely careful with fire during the Bush Fire Danger Period," Inspector Poole said.

"Every resident should have a Bush Fire Survival Plan so they know what to do on days of increased fire danger and can immediately put their plan into action if their home is threatened by fire."

Galston Gorge Improvements on the Way for Motorists

In late October, work started in Galston Road, Hornsby Heights, to provide a U-turn bay for heavy vehicles on the eastern side of Galston Gorge between Ryan Trail and Evans Road.

Member for Hornsby Matt Kean MP said the NSW Government is funding the work to improve safety and maintain traffic efficiency on the state's road network.

This work is expected to reduce the number of over-length vehicles which become stuck in Galston Gorge and will provide a safe turning area to ensure these vehicles have an opportunity to turn around before they attempt to enter the Gorge. These changes are designed to reduce the number of road blockages caused by over-length heavy vehicles.

The work started on Monday 23 October and should be completed by Friday 22 December. Hours of work will be from 7am to 5pm, weather permitting. The work will involve improving and widening the road surface between Ryan Trail and Evans Road (in Hornsby Heights), installing signage at both ends of Galston Gorge to advise motorists of turning options, and trimming trees at the entrance of Ryans Trail to improve visibility of turning option from Galston Road. A guardrail will also be installed along Galston Road at the entrance of the eastern turning area at Ryan Trail and at the camera based detection system on the western side of the Gorge after Calderwood Road to further improve safety for motorists.

Mr Kean said the U-turn bay will complement the camera based detection system which was installed earlier this year to discourage overlength vehicles entering Galston Gorge.

Sensors in the road detect heavy vehicles longer than 7.5 metres and cameras record the plate and image of the offending heavy vehicle. For westbound motorists, the detection system has been installed just after Montview Parade at Hornsby Heights and at the exit of the roundabout at Calderwood Road at Galston for eastbound motorists.

Traffic control and lane closures will be in place for the safety of workers and motorists. Motorists are advised to drive to the conditions and follow the directions of signs and traffic control.

I was pleased to see Galston High School student Kianna Munro received the Minister's Award for Excellence in Student Achievement for 2017. The awards







Don't give fire a chance – prepare your home now

Burning embers can travel many kilometres ahead of a fire, so while you may think a bushfire isn't close to you, embers can still cause spot fires around your property - particularly if you haven't prepared your home to survive a bushfire.

A well-prepared home can also be easier for you or firefighters to defend and is less likely to put your neighbours' homes at risk. It will also give you more protection if there is a sudden fire threat and you cannot leave.

Here are some basic tips to prepare your property:

- · Clean your gutters of leaves and twigs
- · Install metal gutter guards
- · Repair damaged or missing tiles on the roof
- · Install fine metal mesh screens on windows and doors
- Fit seals around doors and windows to eliminate gaps
- · Enclose the areas under the house
- · Repair or cover gaps in external walls
- · Attach a fire sprinkler system to gutters
- · Keep lawns short and gardens well maintained
- · Cut back trees and shrubs overhanging buildings
- Clean up fallen leaves, twigs and debris around the property
- Have hoses long enough to reach around your house
- If you have a pool, tank or dam, put a Static Water Supply (SWS) sign on your property entrance, so firefighters know where they can get water
- Check and maintain adequate levels of home and contents insurance. Ensure it is up to date.

How long have you been a part of the Galston Rural Fire Brigade?

Member profile: Tomlin Poynton

I joined in January 2013 as a 17-year-old which would make my service four and a half years long, and four years since my first major call at the October Blue Mountains campaign. Since then I have received my Internal Structure Firefighting Qualification, Remote Area Qualification, and Crew Leader Qualification.



What is your role there?

At the brigade, I am one of eight Deputy Captains or crew leaders who help coordinate the efforts of the brigade as part of the executive, as well as commanding crews on fire calls. I will also begin to head up the brigades Juniors program to get some younger people into the RFS.

When you're not at the brigade, what do you do for a living?

Outside of the Brigade I coordinate a swim school at the Ian Thorpe Aquatic and Leisure Centre in Ultimo fulltime and study part-time online for a bachelor of international relations.

What made you join the RFS?

When I was younger I was interested in joining the Australian Army, and the RFS was an organisation that provided me with the life experience I needed and the team orientated environment that I liked. The RFS also provides a service to people that is extremely important and done voluntarily - it feels like helping out is the right thing to do.

Have you learnt skills in the RFS that you've used elsewhere?

The RFS is an emergency service and hence a registered training organisation, meaning any qualifications gained are legitimate. I have used First Aid qualifications for work and in real situations as well. I have also gained excellent management and command experience that can be transferred to the workplace. I even used my skills in navigation on my latest trip to Nepal whilst trekking – as well as my firefighter skills to advise the builders of a local school in Nepal where to put the smoke detectors.

What is a fond memory you have of your time at the brigade?

There is a collection of great memories from the Galston brigade, they are truly my second family and you can't not have a good time and a laugh when you're there. However, I would say my proudest moment would be accepting my rank slide from our Captain - officially becoming an officer of the brigade.

What would you say to someone who may be thinking about joining the RFS? The RFS is a large multifaceted organisation with many different roles - not just firefighting. I truly believe there is a role for anyone that wants to contribute to their community in the RFS. I would say to anyone interested in joining, it'll be the best decision you will make in a long time. You'll not only provide a service to the community but you'll also experience great adventures, amazing people and be able to do things most civilian jobs don't offer. All whilst receiving a better kind of payment than money. Plus, remember you don't have to volunteer your entire life – any amount helps!

Arcadia Rural Fire Brigade Fire Has A Plan. Do YOU?

The cool start to October has been a welcomed change from the heat of September. This can often be a time for the community to slow down and think that the bushfire threat is not there, however, we don't need a 40 degree day to have a bad bushfire. We are still experiencing warm & windy days and very low humidity, be prepared fire can happen when you least expect it.



We need to continue preparing our homes for the fire season as the fire risk for Eastern parts of Australia has been elevated. Hazard reduction preparations will still go ahead to reduce the flammable fuel in strategic areas. This includes mechanical clearing i.e. slashing of undergrowth, or moving fuel by hand. This is a great opportunity to continue to prepare your bush fire survival plan and have your property prepared.

Training and new members to the Arcadia team-

Congratulations to 9 new firefighters who have recently completed their bush firefighter course. We are very proud of their determination and dedication to the brigade, and we look forward to working with them out on the fire ground. Our latest recruitment has seen our female members continue to grow in number, a fantastic result. Within the brigade we regularly see all of our members continue to increase their knowledge and skills by completing courses such as Village Firefighting and Advanced Firefighting courses.

On the 14th of October, 4 members of Arcadia participated in the Firefighters Stair Climb for Motor Neuron Disease (MND). It was a grueling event that saw our team climb 98 floors, 1504 stairs, in full structural uniform. The event was to raise money for research, as there is currently no cure for MND or an effective long term treatment. This event was made more personal for us when dual members of the Hills and Hornsby/Ku-Ring-Gai districts reached out to Arcadia after losing a beloved family member recently to MND. Jenan was the embodiment of community spirit, not only being a NSW RFS volunteer for 31 years, but also volunteering in pony club and scouts to name a couple. Our team carried a photo of Jenan up Sydney Tower, and dedicated a level of the tower to her life. We have been humbled to have been asked to help honour Jenan's memory by her family. We would also like to thank the local businesses and residents for helping us fundraise for this event.

Canadian Fires- Grant Paisley has returned from Canada after 42 days. Grant said, "It was a hard but rewarding deployment. We worked up to 12 hours a day for 12 days straight in often very steep terrain. The challenges for Canadian firefighters is very different. The fire smoulders for days or even weeks in the up to 1m deep "Duff" (matted roots and plant material) and when there is a hot dry day, it can re-ignite the pine trees and take off. The good news is there is plenty of water, so basically you set up containment with kilometres of 38mm hose pulling water from a river or creek, then patrol each day literally digging up the fire. The professionalism and depth of training we get through the RFS prepared us well for our time in Canada. The fires have affected a large number of Canadians and they appreciated our help and were fantastic hosts.

Dural and District Historical Society Fragrance and Flavour

Before about the 1950's Australian cooking, in general, was very bland. If we ever used a herb to flavour a dish, it would have been parsley, and the curly one at that. But with the arrival of migrants from all parts of the world, our food became much more interesting.

The early Italian immigrants had established farms on the fertile area around Marsfield, but the New South Wales government bought them out to establish the Macquarie University in 1964. Many of these immigrants moved to Glenorie and bought land that had been citrus orchards, which had failed when the Murrumbidgee Irrigation Scheme came on line, and could grow all citrus with cleaner skins much more cheaply. These Italians have become an essential part of our community, and grow every sort of vegetables and flower you could imagine.

Rosemary and John Hemphill bought 5 acres of an old citrus orchard, just near Round Corner (745 Old Northern Rd. Dural) and started growing herbs, such as thyme, sage, and oregano in a traditional walled herb garden. Local Mother's Clubs were invited to come for Morning Tea, where Rosemary served Herbed scones and gave a short talk to the mothers on using herbs to flavour their cooking.


Rosemary wrote a book called "Fragrance and Flavour" in the late 1950's. It won a medal at the Frankfurt Book fair in 1959, and was reprinted 17 times. It is unavailable now . A copy of this book is probably stored away in many cook's collection.



It was all about the many herbs and spices that were available to flavour food, including the use of exotic of spices. Their son, Ian, later established a whole business selling exotic spices and herbs. Rosemary and John built a shop next to their home, with a very distinctive "A" frame roof and called it Somerset Cottage, as Rosemary grew up in Kent, and the memories of her grandfather's garden influenced her in the design of her own Australian herb garden.

Over the years the business has changed hands several times, but it good to see that all sorts of plants are still for sale there.






Farewell and Good Luck



We currently have twenty students enrolled at New Hope School, ranging from Year 3 to Year 12. The students are grouped into three classes - a senior class with students from Year 10 to Year 12, and two classes with students from Year 3 to Year 8.

From time to time, our students have the opportunity to participate in school-based vocational activities, which includes fundraising projects. These projects support our vision to provide both work experience and everyday life and learning skills to our students, whilst raising funds to support various mission and service focuses of the school community.

Most recently, we operated the H⊕PE Smoothies & Milkshakes store, directly from our classroom window. This project allowed our senior students (and middle school students at times), the opportunity to brainstorm ideas and strategies needed in operating a successful business venture. With support from their teachers, the students planned and prepared advertising posters and promotional videos, communicated information to staff and students and operated the store during lunchtime throughout

From order taking and money handling to preparing and serving drinks and even a door-to-door delivery service, the

students excelled in making the fundraiser a success. The store operated during six lunchtimes over a four-week period. Students prepared the pre-ordered drinks for staff ready for delivery at lunchtime, and then opened for the students of Pacific Hills and New Hope during lunchtime. Overall, we made more than 340 smoothies and milkshakes, and generated a profit of more than \$740.

With this exceptional result, we were able to sponsor a child living in poverty through Compassion

- Bryan, a 13-year-old boy from El Salvador. The staff and students of New Hope School helped celebrate his birthday on the 11th of September, enjoying cupcakes and some photo opportunities. If a stool has three legs and one is missing then balancing proves nigh on impossible.

So too, the trinity has three parts, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Yet, the Holy Spirit all too often is neglected or completely removed.

Acts 1:8: But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth."

The challenge this month, as we wrap up the fifth part of this series, is whether the Holy Spirit is active today.

Sure, for those who've read the bible and the book of Acts, the Apostles did some amazing stuff – but they had the Holy Spirit back then.

What about now? Do we have access to the Holy Spirit? In John 15:14-17 it captures Jesus' promise, that "I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Helper, to be with you forever".

Not just for a few days after Jesus rose, not a few years while the early church got sorted out, nor even a few centuries until Christianity became popular within the Roman empire. No, the Holy Spirit was promised to be with us forever.

Pretty sure forever includes now.

So, if the Holy Spirit is alive and well then why is He so ignored in our churches? Our teaching? Our lives? And, if the Holy Spirit is alive today, can He also work through me?

John 15:17 concludes "You know him, for he dwells with you and will be in you."

If you believe in God the creator, believe that Jesus lived, died and rose again, then the same power that worked through creation, the miracles, the resurrection, is available to each of us today. That's the promise!

So why are we living unpowered lives? Why do we accept enslavement to the limitations of this world? We have access to an authority that reigns over and above sickness, over and above relationship issues, financial issues, employment issues ... are we living in the Spirit? Or resigned to the limitations of the flesh?

Are we just acknowledging the teachings of the bible? Or are we experiencing them? We can be empowered, we can be filled with the Spirit and we can make an enormous difference.

Seek a relationship with the Holy Spirit, "ask and you will receive, seek and you will find, knock and the door will be opened to you." Matthew 7:7.

The Skill of Listening

When my wife Jenny was expecting our second child – we thought it would be Natalie, but instead we were blessed with Nathan - she was asked by a lady at church one morning how her pregnancy was progressing. To provide some background, Jenny enjoyed excellent health throughout her first pregnancy, but during the delivery the baby became distressed, and Luke had to be delivered by an emergency caesarean. With this in mind, Jenny responded, "I'm well, thank you. I have wonderful pregnancies but difficult deliveries." To which the lady replied, "Oh, that's wonderful. I am so pleased for you."

That lady failed to listen. She heard only what she wanted to hear. Had she listened to Jenny's full answer, she would have had to ask another question and continue the conversation. But she wasn't listening.

Her failing is a common fault. We have been blessed with the gift of hearing, but that does not mean we automatically listen. There is a tremendous difference between hearing and listening. When we hear, we understand what is said; when we listen, we feel what is being said.

Listening is not something that comes naturally. It is an art to be developed, a skill to be learned. Listening is a crucial skill in being an effective communicator, so what are some of the qualities of good listening?


Good listening involves the whole body. Obviously we listen with our ears, but our body language can convey a powerful message to others as to whether or not we are genuinely listening. A sure indication of interest is eye contact. Other meaningful gestures are an affirming nod of the head, a smile, and a comforting touch. All of these help to convey the message, "I'm with you. Tell me more."

But there is one part of the body that should be used sparingly when we listen: the tongue. Sometimes we can be thinking so much about what we are going to say that we do not listen to others. Often people are not seeking advice but rather they want a sympathetic listener.

When we listen to others, we shall soon go beyond small talk and touch upon deeper and more sensitive issues. In those circumstances the qualities of trust and confidentiality will be critical in effective listening.

In summary, a verse in the Bible puts it this way: "Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak." (James1:19) The world needs good listeners. Let us try to be better listeners to our families and friends.

His Convicting Work.

The Holy Spirit comes to the person concerned and says, You are a sinner in the sight of God and you need a Saviour. You need Jesus Christ'. But he not only speaks about sin, He always points to Jesus Christ who can save us from that sin and it's consequences.

Here is a remarkable principle: When we accept what He has said, then the Holy Spirit goes on with His Divine Work. In fact, until we do accept what He has said, He cannot go on. The principle remains the same all through our Christian life. He may reveal to us as a Christian a particular truth, which has an application to our lifestyle. The Spirit says to us, Will you accept the truth?' Until we say yes He cannot go on with His work of applying Christ to our lives.

So the first words we hear from the Holy Spirit are spoken as he comes to us convincing us of our sin and the need of a Saviour.

What kind of a reception is He given?

When the Holy Spirit knocks at our heart's door, He often

receives all kinds of excuses, just as you might if you were looking for a place to stay.

Some places you visit are full already and have no vacancy. At other places the people are to busy to talk to you. 'Come back some other time' they say. Or in still other places you find that there are certain conditions which would prevent you from living

So it is with the Holy Spirit. He finds many hearts already full and He discovers that they have no room at all for Jesus Christ. He goes to another heart and says,' Have you any room for Jesus?' They say, We are too busy just now. Come back some other time'. And so the excuses go on.

But here and there, now and again, a person says 'Yes I know I am a sinner. I know I need Jesus Christ'. He is what I need to save me. I take Him now. I invite Him into my life' The door is opened, Jesus Christ comes in and that person is born again. (to be continued)

The Importance of **Pollinating Insects**

Around 65% of flowering plants depend on insects for pollination but when you look at our dependence on plants for food production, medicines and textiles, our need for pollinators is a far greater. This makes it very important to protect and support pollinators wherever we can.

Plants have evolved to attract pollinators. They produce a food supply or an insect attracting scent, colour or flower shape to improve the chances of reproduction. Some plants have evolved to become dependent on specific species of insects. The Small Tongue Orchid (Cryptostylis leptochila) has a flower resembling parts of a female Orchid Dupe Wasp (Lissopimpla excelsa).

The importance of native Pollinators has been shown to increase fruit set between 500% - 800% when they have local native Pollinators. Without pollinating Insects in our area we couldn't support our market gardens, orchards, flowering gardens or native bushland as we know it. How we manage our grazing animals would also dramatically change.

To help counter the impact on insects from habitat loss and chemical use. Still Creek Landcare will be at the Arcadia Public School Market Day on the 18th November to give a workshop on creating your own Insect Hotels.

And while you're there, we can also help with information on Local Weeds and advice on many aspects of managing your property. See you on the 18th November at Arcadia Public School.


