## **Local High School Teacher named Australia's Local Hero for 2018.**

In 2012, Mr Woo started posting videos online for a student who was sick with cancer and missing a lot of school. Before long, his videos found an audience across the country and beyond. Wootube now boasts more than 100,000 subscribers and has attracted more than nine million views worldwide - and counting. Mr Woo's unique and caring approach to teaching is breaking the misconception that mathematics is an inaccessible and difficult subject.


Outside his high school classroom, Mr Woo is a proud father of three and a volunteer facilitator with the University of Sydney's Widening Participation and Outreach program, where he has personally guided and motivated more than 1,400 students from disadvantaged backgrounds.

Mr Woo gave a passionate thank you speech at the Awards. This can be read in full online, but below is his reference to education:

"Let's learn to truly value our schools and our teachers. Education has been one of Australia's greatest assets, but things won't stay that way unless we give educators the cultural and capital support that they need to do their jobs. For instance, that shortage of mathematics


teachers I was telling you about has only become more severe since my university days. As a field, education struggles to attract the students with a lifelong passion to change the world for good - and it's even



We were told of the new activities, new sensory gardens, treasure trails and




also the ability to photograph the property with dams, water lilies and resident pets.







The FAST test involves asking these questions.

**FACE** – Check their face. Has their mouth drooped?

Do they understand you?

**TIME** – Time is critical. If you see any of these signs, call 000 straight away

A person is likely to show at least one of these signs when having a stroke, although symptoms may only appear for a short time.

The GPA is a part of RIPA the Residents Infrastructure Planning Alliance and we have attended meetings and had conversations about


- formation of a Sydney wide alliance to fight over-development and Priority Precincts



## The Greenway/Macquarie Wharf, Windsor

Did you know that next to the present bridge (downstream side), beneath the noxious weeds proscribed by the DPI and gabions placed there by the Council in the 1990s, are the remains of what is probably the **oldest existing wharf in Australia?** Further, that wharf was commissioned by **Lachlan Macquarie**, **designed by Francis Greenway, built by John Howe** (Howe's house) and **James McGrath** (McGrath's Hill). Did you know that it **predates** Port Arthur (a gazetted heritage site) by 30 years and was built in the same year as the oldest surviving house in Sydney, Cadman's Cottage? How would you feel if other Greenway designed structures were to be destroyed without attempts at salvation or preservation??

The Windsor Bridge Replacement Project will see much of the construction infrastructure located exactly where the surviving archaeological remains currently exist. The remains are probably of the oldest surviving evidence of the importance of the maritime trade in European Australia in general, and more specifically, evidence of the importance of the river trade in the Hawkesbury District, supplying food stuffs to the starving colony until passable roads could be constructed.

As late as the 1920s the Fruit growers Association petitioned Council to improve the wharf so that their produce could be transported to Sydney more quickly. They were prepared to pay wharfage fess or support some of the costs. The Council voted against the motion.

#### **The Early History**

In the earliest days of the Green Hills settlement, there was a sandy beach near the present bridge, onto which boats from Sydney were pulled ashore. Soon a wharf was built (1795) to allow boats to tie up and unload their cargo without the inconvenience of having to be beached. The construction of this first allowed for supplies to be unloaded safely at the early store and military garrison, while allowing for farm crops to be exported out. This was known as the Green Hills Wharf. However, this early wharf was ultimately washed away by floods (1799). The presence of a wharf at Windsor was an important infrastructure development that was part of the early settlement and development of the township.

Governor Macquarie instigated tenders for a Government contract to construct a better wharf on the exact same site. The wharf ran parallel to the bank, rather than a pier (which would have extended finger- like into the river). It was designed to allow large cargo vessels (up to 100 tons) to pull alongside, from which drays would take their cargo up the Punt road to Thompson Square and beyond or in reverse, goods could be loaded from the Hawkesbury farmers to take to the Sydney settlement. The construction this more substantial wharf in ca.1814-1820 was part of the formalisation and development of the Macquarie town. The early wharves evidence the importance of river transport and trade both to the Green Hills settlement's survival and the survival of the settlement at Farm Cove, both from the time before viable roads provided land links and later, up until the time of the 1867-1870s floods, when the river silted up to the extent that large draught ships were no longer viable.

The wharf was an integral part of the Windsor township until the expansion of rail to Windsor and larger maritime infrastructure at Brooklyn on the Hawkesbury River meant the use of the wharf was likely limited to public recreational uses. However, the wharf remained of local significance until the 1950s. Windsor prospered

as a busy port for small river craft. Goods were unloaded at the wharf where most of the produce was to be transported by rail from Windsor to Sydney. Cargoes included maize, poultry, watermelons, fruit, eggs, bark and gourds. Windsor also developed a boatbuilding industry, as did Richmond and Pitt Town. The Hawkesbury boats were smaller craft than those being built in Sydney, most being less than 50 tons, but they were suited to the river trade.

#### **Early References**

Returns of the Public Works undertaken in Windsor state that: "A wharf was constructed there in 1815 for the sum of one thousand, one hundred and seventy nine pounds and 10 shillings." Construction for this new wharf began in 1814 and was nearly completed by 1815. The fact that the first government contract from 1814 survives, is a very significant fact in itself.



**Governor Lachlan** Macquarie described this new structure as: "a large substantial wooden wharf or quay constructed in the centre of town on the right bank of the Hawkesbury River for the convenience of vessels and boats, trading to Windsor, at

which quay vessels of 100 ton burthen can load their cargoes. A very convenient ferry has been established from the same wharf to the north bank of the river by a large punt".

The contract was undertaken by John Howe and James McGrath, both local residents who were involved in a number of other construction works. They were able to purchase 5,000 five inch iron spikes from the stores.



The original construction of the design of the wharf from the contract states: "The front of the Square to be piled with sound piles from 16 to 18 inchesthick to be from three to four feet apart in the (illegible) to be three feet above the

Water Mark at Spring Tides (but in a line with it). Well capped and Secured by Land Ties to extend from side line to side line of the Square to be planked on the Inside of the Piles and then filled up to the top. "The Wharf to Commence from the Upper Side Line of

Square to Extend Eighteen feet from the above row of Piles which will be in deep water to extend fifty feet in length to be planked on the inside and filled up unless it should be thought best to

plank the top and in that Case the same is to be planked and not filled up, the whole to be Capped and well secured by Land Ties as also to the Row of Piles in the Front of the Square"

On 14th November 1816, Macquarie wrote that a good part of the partially constructed wharf was carried away by a June flood (again!) So he commissioned the govt. civil architect, Francis Greenway: "to draw up a new plan for the contractors to follow and allowing them iron and spike nails as can be spared from the stores, plus the assistance of some carpenters". Howe and McGrath were paid an additional sum of 220 pounds sterling to assist them to pay for additional iron spikes and nails as could be spared from the stores, plus an extra carpenter and 2 sawyers to enable the wharf to be completed in 8 months. They were somewhat disgruntled that the new structure was more grand than the original contract, yet they were not given an extension of funds to meet their additional costs!

The wharf was completed by 1820, if not before.

The archaeologist Higginbotham (1986) concluded about the remains evident today: "the timbers are secured by hand made bolts and spikes which definitely date to 19th century and probably to the wharf built by Howe and McGrath to the Greenway plan between 1816-1820".

#### The Importance

The remains provide a rare example of early methods of wharf construction still evident. There may be quite significant construction evidence further into the river bank behind the wharf, currently hidden from view by the gabions installed in the 1990s. There may also be archaeological remnants from the 1795; evidencing even earlier construction methods within 7 years of settlement, when tools, resources, skilled people were very rare. Archaeological potential relating to the construction and use of both the 1795 and ca. 1814-1820 wharf probably exist on site. Physical evidence that has survived in the archaeological record has the potential to provide new information relating to construction techniques and material that were used, specifically in relation to types of wood used, fastenings, bracing and pile information as well as quality of workmanship and materials. Information relating to repair work to the wharf can also be determined from the remains in the archaeological record on wharf sites, such as from the driving in of repair "sister" piles or the addition of extra bracing or fastenings. Artefacts discarded, accidentally or deliberately, from the wharf and vessels moored alongside can contribute towards knowledge of the variety of traffic and goods that passed between Windsor and Sydney over time and has the potential to contribute to a greater understanding of settlement before and during the Macquarie era.

At low tide, some of the timbers can be seen from the opposite river bank. They should not fall victim to the infrastructure planned for the construction site of "Option One".

The Windsor Macquarie/Greenway Wharf should not be yet another victim of heritage vandalism.

It is important you regularly check the connection point at the gas bottle. If you find a leak or smell gas, immediately turn off the gas at the bottle and discontinue use. Fittings and hoses should be checked frequently for wear and tear, and replaced as needed.

It is also important never to use a gas bottle that is more than 10 years old and, avoid using barbecues indoors or in any confined space as they present a fire and health hazard.

A good way to ensure your gas products are safe is to make sure they have safety compliance stickers. These stickers are mandatory on all gas appliances and show the item has been approved for use, and meets all safety requirements. If a gas bottle doesn't have a sticker, it can't legally be filled in NSW.

# Mobile Black Spot Breakthrough For Sackville North

Federal Member for Berowra Julian Leeser MP has welcomed the launch of a new Telstra mobile tower in Sackville North as part of the Turnbull Government's Mobile Black Spot Program.

The Federal Government's Mobile Black Spot Program is one of the largest ever expansions of mobile coverage in previously underserviced areas in Australia.

The new tower came online in late December 2017, providing comprehensive mobile phone coverage for residents in Sackville North, South Maroota, Maraylya and Forest Glen.

Mr Leeser says the better mobile reception will significantly improve residents' lives in the area.

"Residents in towns including Sackville North, South Maroota, Maraylya and Forest Glen live in one of the most beautiful parts of Berowra, but the topography of the area presents telecommunications challenges. Now their businesses and ability to stay in touch with family and friends will benefit," he said

"Addressing their mobile black spot issues was one of my key election commitments, and I'm proud to we've delivered the project as promised." Mr Leeser heard first-hand about the need for emergency communications in the event of a bushfire during his visits to Sackville North Rural Fire Brigade. "I know how important mobile phones are, particularly in the more rural parts of the electorate. This Black Spot breakthrough will help both residents and the Rural Fire Brigade better communicate in the event of a bushfire."

Sackville North Rural Fire Brigade Captain John Turnbull reported the tower had already had an immediate impact.

"Residents are already receiving better mobile coverage, allowing them to better communicate with each other and emergency services should they need to," Mr Turnbull said.

Crosslands Reserve, Brooklyn and Dangar Island have been identified as the next priority locations in the electorate of Berowra that will see coverage improvements thanks to the Mobile Black Spot Program.

The Federal Government has committed \$220 million to its Black Spot Program, with more than 312 new or improved mobile base stations already being delivered.



## The Centre Celebrates Government Grant

Federal Member for Berowra Julian Leeser MP has presented The Centre, Dural with a \$14,000 Stronger Communities grant for the renovation of their kitchen.

Mr Leeser said the money would benefit many in the Hills community who use The Centre's facilities every week.

"The Centre is a fantastic community asset, welcoming thousands each week to their futsal pitch, netball court, church, Men's Shed, playgroup and youth group," Mr Leeser said.

"I'm thrilled to provide The Centre with \$14,000 in funding so they can upgrade their kitchen and better cater for the community."

General Manager of The Centre Craig Glasby thanked Mr Leeser for his contribution, explaining how the kitchen renovations will allow them to respond to the upsurge in demand for their facilities.

"We've got a very old hot plate coming up to almost 50 years old, so we're going to replace that. We're also replacing the oven, fridge, freezer and dishwasher," Mr Glasby said.

"More and more people in the community are using The Centre as Dural grows, so we're very grateful to Julian for the \$14,000. It will go a long way."

The Centre is currently in the process of procuring new appliances and Mr Leeser said that he looks forward to returning for a sausage sizzle once the kitchen renovations are complete.

The \$14,000 grant was provided by Mr Leeser as part of the Federal Government's Stronger Communities Program, which allocates \$150,000 to each electorate for projects that create vibrant and viable communities.



## **Galston Rural Fire Brigade News**

#### **Boat Fire**



Lucky Galston Firies keep in shipshape! We were called to a boat fire at Dural recently. A resident was working on their boat using a grinder when the vessel caught alight. Galston assisted Middle Dural RFB with Breathing Apparatus Operators and a thermal imaging camera. They discovered several hot spots and promptly extinguished them. A great team effort from everyone involved!

#### Dob in a cigarette tosser



Throwing a lit cigarette butt from a vehicle at any time of year is not only littering and bad for the environment, but it is completely irresponsible.

Furthermore, in the summer fire season, it is incredibly dangerous as it can start grass and bush fires, placing people's lives and property at risk.

There are heavy penalties for people caught throwing lit cigarette butts from vehicles, especially during the Bush Fire Danger Period and days of Total Fire Ban.

Do your bit by reporting people who throw lit cigarette butts from vehicles.

Some of the information we will need includes location, date and time, vehicle registration plate details and description of the vehicle. We will also need your contact details as anonymous reports are not accepted.

## **Middle Dural Fire Brigade News**

Middle Dural Fire Brigade wishes all local residents a very prosperous and peaceful New Year. Thanks to your good sense in observing summer fire restrictions, we volunteer fire fighters have had a fairly peaceful time ourselves. Remember that you require a permit from your fire captain if you wish to burn during the fire season (Middle Dural: Len Best 0408 220 705). Heavy fines apply otherwise!

The Middle Dural Christmas party at our fire station in Mid Dural Road was a very special event this year. Several of our members received long service awards, in particular, our longest serving member, John Mutch, who joined in 1954. John was presented with a sixth bar to his long service medal, marking 60 years of ongoing service to this Brigade. John's skills and expertise in the electrical industry benefitted Middle Dural Brigade initially but were then taken up state-wide. One such was the invention of a charging system in the station such that the batteries in the fire vehicles never run flat; also his ingenious array for charging batteries of the handheld radios. Such devices, now essential elements of state-wide RFS station equipment were John's brain children.

As acknowledged, Hills and Hornsby residents are contributing to our fire safety in no small part by obeying current fire restrictions.

However, all power tools should be used with extreme caution since many can produce sparks that cause fires. This recently burnt boat was destroyed while the resident was using an angle grinder on it.



## **Arcadia Rural Fire Brigade**

#### **High Fire Danger and Storms**

With a brief, but appreciated quiet period over Christmas and New Year's, the brigade got a chance to relax and recharge, however, we were still quietly working away in the background. Members were up at the station ensuring our equipment and trucks were in good working order, general maintenance of the station and grounds, inspecting surrounding bushland, and even some new driver training!



We've had a number of fire calls in the local area, including power lines arcing on a Total Fire Ban day in Galston Village, which set fire to the nature strip. Arcadia and Galston responded swiftly and had promptly extinguished the fire before it got any bigger. We also had a call to an over-turned light rigid truck in Arcadia, which saw Arcadia, Galston, and Dural attend to manage any fire risk, manage traffic and clean up the diesel spill. The occupants of the vehicle were uninjured, and the cleanup was minimal.

In December we experienced a number of dry lightning storms, this resulted in the brigade being called to four different lightning strike fires. These storms have come back again in January, and as Arcadia backs onto Marramarra National Park, you may see us out patrolling the area after lightning has come through, to check for any smoke. If we see any fires started by lightening during our patrols, it gives us the opportunity to act quickly rather, than waiting for the fire to grow, and become a fire that will threaten our community on the hot windy days.

During these hot windy Total Fire Ban Days, the brigade has crews on standby, usually within 20 minutes of the station. These crews will be rapidly activated if a large fire was to start anywhere within 2 hours of Sydney to help other communities with their **Bushfire Emergencies.** 

Rest assured we always have enough resources here back in our own brigade areas to support any incident that may arise.

With the high temperatures and minimal, inconsistent rainfall we have experienced, the bushland, but also the grass in our backyards has been exceptionally dry. Along with these hot days we've seen many Total Fire Ban (TOBAN) days that continue to raise the Fire Danger Index (FDI).

#### **Understanding the Fire Danger Ratings**

You will have heard many of the terminology used by the RFS and media, but what does this mean for you?

You will have seen the Fire Danger Index (FDI) signs in our area, usually near fire stations, as we have to change these every time the rating changes. These signs give the community an indication as to the consequences of what would happen if a fire started. There are a number of factors that are considered when determining the FDI, which include the temperature, humidity, wind, and overall dryness of the landscape. This is why the FDI can vary from day to day, and some days are TOBAN's, others have suspended permits, and the next day is mild. It is important to understand what each of the ratings mean.

Low moderate to high indicates that conditions should be monitored, and you stay informed and ready to act if required. VERY HIGH??? It is a perfect time to review your plans and continue to prepare your property. Severe indicates that homes that are well prepared and are actively defended can provide

safety, however, leaving early is the safest option for your survival. Following that is extreme, properties are required to have high level of preparation and has been designed to withstand fire. Again, the safest option is to leave early for survival. The highest FDI rating is catastrophic, a rating we don't want to see. Leaving early is the ONLY OPTION as no property can withstand these conditions. Whilst the risk of bush fire is a real threat in our rural areas, understanding the FDI ratings, alongside reviewing and improving your bush fire survival plan, you will be better equipped if such a time requires you to actively defend or leave early.

They were given a tour of the RFS Aviation Section and were lucky enough to get up very close with the VLAT (Very Large Air Tanker), "Nancy Bird". They also got to see how the retardant is made up and how it is delivered to the Air Tanker. Nancy Bird can hold up to 44,000 litres of water and is filled in fewer than 10 and a half minutes. Our members then went to the RAAF Base Fire Station for a tour of the Station and Vehicles. The vehicles are very large and can hold 8,000 Litres of water which can be emptied in less than 1 and a half minutes. We had a great day. Thank you to all the staff at the RAAF Base for showing us around, a great day was had by all.

Once again, it was great to get out and see all the smiling faces as we chauffeured Santa around Glenorie Village. ### **Waddell Cottage**

in later years, caught the bus.

In our December story about Horse Troughs, a stray photo was ,by mistake, sent to the Galston Paper. The Dooral Round-up got the right picture, the one of the trough, which is now in the grounds of Galston High School. The "stray" photo is of Denise Rogers with a very rough sign which is hard to decipher. It says "KEEP OUT" and was attached to the fence around what we now call "Waddell Cottage". The photo was taken at least 50 years ago.

As Shakespeare said, "THEREBY HANGS A TALE"

Old Jim Waddell had lived all his long life in the Cottage, which his father had built in about 1866. He never married. Irene Rogers wrote "The cottage was built in the typical colonial style, with two rooms up and two down, a dormer window in the roof and the kitchen separate from the main structure. Old Jim still collected his fresh water from a well behind the Cottage. He could be seen at least once a week, neatly and correctly dressed with hat, walking stick and suitcase, on his way to Hornsby to shop. Many times I picked him in my car and if he didn't get a lift, he would plod on to do his shopping. Once I picked him up on Christmas day, and I had great difficulty in explaining to him that

He was plagued at times by vandals when he was absent from his home so he devised a quaint sign in an endeavour to protect his property. In later years he would climb the stairs to the upper part of his cottage, where he would sit at the open window playing a tin whistle for hours".

No Council rates had been paid on the property since 1936, so when Old Jim died in 1969, the NSW Government resumed the 20 acre (9 hectares) property). It was then decided that this was an ideal site to build Galston High School. The old Cottage was in a deplorable state and was due for demolition. But a local identity, Betty Archdale, formed a Committee to raise funds for its restoration. The shingle roof had to be replaced and lots of other repairs made. So now it is a great resource for the school, particularly the History Department, and for our wider


### **Working Equitation with SWEQ**

Have you tried Working Equitation yet? Working Equitation is the fastest growing equine sport in Australia and is a fun way to train your horse and build communication and confidence with your horse. This sport is open to any breed of horse and any style of riding (English, Stock or Western). The best way to train is to start slow and introduce your horse to the obstacles and then build up speed between the obstacles. The final aim is to reach advanced level and do the obstacle course one handed in collected canter.

Sydney Working Equitation Club (SWEO) is now in its fourth year. We meet every fourth Sunday at the beautiful "Evans Park" located at 56 Godalla Rd, Freemans Reach. Our days start at 8:30am with everyone helping to set up the obstacle course and then we start training. Depending on numbers we divide into small groups with dressage training in the indoor arena and obstacle training on the grass arena. Training is taken at each individual rider's pace depending on their level of riding experience and confidence. 





### **Another Hills Grammar Original**

There was a buzz of excitement and anticipation at the School's Annual Presentation of Awards last December. Who was going to be this year's recipient of the Hills Grammar Original Alumni Award?

The award was introduced in 2015 to recognise the achievements of a Hills Grammar graduate and celebrate the individual's sustained excellence in her or his field of endeavour.

The inaugural award was presented to Mr Joel Edgerton (Class of 1989) for his work in the film and television industries and in 2016 the award went to Mr Robert Ovadia (Class of 1990), a dual Walkley award winning journalist.

In 2017 Hills Grammar honoured singer, songwriter, actor and TV personality Ms Delta Goodrem (Class of 2002). The awardee's identity is kept a secret until the ceremony and in this case, it was probable that she would not be in the country so a video was prepared. Only days before the event the school heard the good news that Ms Goodrem would be there in person to collect the award.

Delta has achieved world acclaim and made recording history in Australia; her first album 'Innocent Eyes' was one of the highest-selling debut albums in Australian history. It spent a record-breaking 29 weeks at #1 in Australia, and topped the Australian Albums Charts and reached 15x platinum in sales.



She became the first-ever artist to have five #1 singles on the Australian charts from a debut album and was awarded the ARIA Albums Artist of the Decade in 2010.

Since then, Delta has recorded 17 Top-10 hits, four #1 albums, and over 8 million records sold worldwide. Her latest album Wings of the Wild debuted at #1 and her tour broke records as Delta became the highest-selling Australian touring artist in 2016.

It was a huge surprise for students, staff and parents that Delta could collect her award in person and Year 8 students Melanie Dobson and Brayden Sim were incredibly excited to introduce and award her on the day.

Delta was very humbled by the award and addressed the 2000 strong audience with much joy and emotion, "I'm a very proud Hills Grammar girl. When I think of my time at Hills Grammar, I loved school so much. I loved the mix, surrounded by nature, being inspired in the arts and loving sport. I made wonderful friends who continue to be my very best friends today." Delta continued to encourage the students to be kind to one another and support each other to find their passion. "I was given the space to find that light in me - to develop my passion while still being a part of the Hills community."

A long list could be made of all that takes place when Christ is invited into a heart.

In John 3:3-8, the Lord Jesus was speaking concerning being born again or born from above.

When we turn to Jesus Christ, the Holy Spirit comes down upon us as well as into our hearts and we are born again, regenerated, or born from above. We are also accepted into the family of God and are given new life in Christ. All that is the work of the Holy Spirit. In that instant, as we have said, He takes up His permanent abode in our hearts.

This is the beginning of His indwelling and He remains in our hearts until He takes us home to Heaven. Even though we may grieve Him or disobey Him, the Holy Spirit never leaves a heart once He has entered.

Jesus Christ said that 'The Holy Spirit is the Spirit of Truth ... to abide with you forever'. This truth is repeatedly taught throughout the New Testament, yet we are slow to understand it.

The Holy Spirit lives in every heart that has accepted Jesus Christ as Saviour, 1 John 4:13 reads: 'we know that we live in Him and He in us, because he has given us His Spirit.'

There are many other aspects of the Holy Spirit's work which can be included as part of His initial 'crisis' ministry.

Every newly born believer is baptisted by the Spirit into the


Body of Christ, 1 Chorinthians 12:13 says: 'For we were all baptised by one Spirit into one body'. The Holy Spirit takes every new convert and puts each one into the Body of Christ in such a deep and eternal way that the only term which can be used to describe such action is the word 'baptise' or 'immerse'. To put it simply, the Holy Spirit entered my body at the time of my conversion and I entered the Body of Christ. This latter action is clearly shown from 1 Chorinthians 12;13 to be the baptism of or by the Spirit.

While I won't bore you with the many hours of holiday stories, I would like to reflect on the last day before I returned to work.

It was my daughter's birthday, and we finished off the day by going to the movies to watch The Greatest Showman. What a movie. So thoroughly entertaining, absorbing, mesmerising. Highly recommended.

Though, I took something away from that movie that I found quite challenging.

As P.T. Barnum achieves success, he constantly hungers for more. Never quite receiving what he deeply desires, the approval of the upper class that always eluded him. He was born in the working class ... and so eagerly desired what he cannot have.

His journey takes him full circle, discovering that his true happiness, his real hunger is satisfied in what he already has available -the love of family and friends.

How often do we chase after worldly success only to find it empty? Or lose sight of what is truly important chasing after a mirage? Whether that mirage is wealth, possessions, status or position ... only to find that when we arrive we've lost all we hold dear.

So as we walk through 2018 the encouragement is to learn from Ecclesiastes, a book written by Solomon - the man who had it all, overflowing in wealth, power, position and status and yet wrote in Ecclesiastes 3:12-13:

"I know that there is nothing better for people than to be happy and to do good while they live. That each of them may eat and drink, and find satisfaction in all their toil - this is the gift of God."

May we too find peace and contentment in what is in our hands, with the friends and family that surround us and let go of the belief that happiness can be so much greater if only we were able to attain the illusory mirage.

May we embrace the wisdom of Ecclesiastes and seek happiness in the gifts God has already given us.



### **Every Day is New Year's Day**

One of the deepest longings in the human heart is the desire to start again, to make a fresh beginning. Such longings are particularly strong as one year gives way to another, but such desires can be experienced at any time.

In our human frailty, we look back on missed opportunities and things left unsaid and undone. We reflect on projects half completed or never even attempted, and we wish that it could be different. We long to make a fresh start, but often people and circumstances can make it difficult to forget the failings of the past and to start again.

In 1810 Governor Lachlan Macquarie of the fledgling colony in New South Wales invited four men to dinner at Government House in Sydney. The four guests were the principal surgeon, D'Arcy Wentworth, and his assistant, William Redfern, Andrew Thompson, a prosperous farmer, and Simeon Lord, a wealthy merchant. The invitation of these men to the Governor's residence was significant because they had all been transported to Australia as convicts, but they had subsequently been granted a full pardon. In extending this invitation, Governor Macquarie wanted to show that these men were not only pardoned, but that they also enjoyed full rights as citizens.

But not everyone supported the Governor's policy. One of his most vocal opponents was the Rev. Samuel Marsden, who is known in Australian history as 'The Flogging Parson'. He believed that the convict stain could never be wiped away and that convicts should never be allowed full civil rights.

The story of Macquarie's invitation is a beautiful illustration of what God has done for us. His grace not only offers us forgiveness but also the freedom and privileges of being sons and daughters of God. He offers us the potential of a fresh start every day.


The Christian life is a series of new beginnings because God is the God of new beginnings; with Him there is always the chance to start again. That is true because of his character of forgiveness and longsuffering (Micah 7:18-19). It is true also because of his provision and promises, thoughts which are expressed powerfully in a well-known hymn:

"Pardon for sin and a peace that endureth, Thy own dear presence to cheer and to guide; Strength for today and bright hope for tomorrow, Blessings all mine, with ten thousand beside."

With God no failure is permanent nor is any mistake beyond remedy. We can start again at any time. Because of God's grace every day can be New Year's Day.

The Australian Plants Society -North Shore Group is part of a nation wide organisation which promotes the appreciation and growing of Australian native plants.

The local group meets on the second Friday of the month at 8 pm in the Willow Park Community Centre, 25 Edgeworth David Avenue, Hornsby. We have speakers on a wide variety of native plant related topics. The dates of meetings and other information can be found at www.blandfordia.org.au The meeting ends with a friendly chat over supper.

The group also runs a Monday Walks and Talks programme at the Ku-ring-gai Wildflower Garden at 420 Mona Vale Rd, St Ives. The programme is divided into four terms commencing on February 28th. 


