The Galston Club started in the premises of the Galston Uniting Church Hall. The Union Church Hall was established in 1894 in Arcadia Road. The hall gradually fell into disuse until November 1952 when Hills District Sub Branch approached Hornsby Shire Council to obtain use of the hall. The new clubhouse was built on and around the foundations of the old Unity Hall by local volunteers. In October 1956, the building was ready for use. By the middle of the 1950s, the Executive formed a licenced club and a recruiting drive took place for

Regenerating OMV is a sound investment in ratepayers' quality of life and the local regional economy. It's not just off-road cyclists who are benefitting either. OMV is a perfect example of how authorities and communities can work together to transform an environmental eyesore into a valuable asset. With Sydney MTB trails development and land access looking rather grim back in 2017, it is absolutely marvellous to share this very good news in 2018!

Glenore Progress Association News

Issue number one being dealt with is the *Boral Concrete Upgrade:* We extensively advertised the Information Meeting on 13 March and 38 members and residents attended to hear the response from Boral to date.

Boral Concrete representatives engaged with the residents of Glenorie in a positive way and presented these documents for everyone's consideration. In these presentations Boral has responded to the submissions from the Glenorie Progress Association, the Glenorie Pony Club and only two other residents of Glenorie.

They have given their perspective of the key concerns of traffic; noise; safety; visual appearance; operational hours; scale of the proposed upgrade and effects on the character of Glenorie Village.

The only significant alteration to the original proposal is the enclosure of the new slumping stand for noise mitigation.

Other concerns yet to be addressed are:

Dust and associated problems; machinery commencing out of current operating hours, height of the communication tower (in comparison with the proposed 21m silos) and provision of artists impressions of likely sight effects from the north, east and west.

Boral has addressed another issue raised of their trucks using the water stand at the bus bay and have issued instructions that NO BORAL TRUCK is to use this facility for filling or washing trucks.

The next step for Boral is the compilation of a newsletter for distribution around the previously identified footprint of residents close to the Batching Plant.

This presentation is on our website so have a look at http:// glenorieprogress.org.au/

Note that the Boral DA is to be lodged to The Hills Shire Council in the coming month so I again urge all members to submit their concerns and spread the word to ALL who may be affected by the upgrade. You still have an opportunity to have input into a DA PRIOR to its submission!

Issue number two is road safety on Glenorie roads: Your letters about speed limits were sent to the RMS, The Hills and Hornsby Councils, thanks to Authorities Officer Vince. We are awaiting a response.

An event to look forward to is the Solar Information Day on 22 April as part of the series of Lifestyle workshops at the *Glenorie Hall.* A short presentation will be made at 1:30pm and you can bring your power bill along so our experts can help you "Make sense of Solar. Details are in a report for this event in this magazine on page .



The Environment Centre group has reported on Streamwatch testing highlighting issues with the Glenorie Creek salination and Council is on board checking the conductivity. Also note the intended removal of rubbish including mattresses and furniture from the creek by Council. Sydney Water Reference Group is investigating diverse source nutrient pollution in the Hawkesbury Nepean catchment.

As far as other environmental issues are concerned, our residents, particularly new residents in the area are urged to think about bush care. New residents are attracted to the district for the peace and quiet, native animals, birds and vegetation. Care of the bush is part of living here. Please be aware of Council rules on removing vegetation. We all work towards retaining the ambiance of Glenorie and surrounds while still going forward with developments and the additional infrastructure need to support them.

We hope to have a dedicated 'Associations' noticeboard next to the RFS board for our Glenorie community associations to post information to. This will NOT be a community board for all to use but dedicated to the GPA, Glenorie Hall, Maroota Bioregional Forum, Eastbend etc. Here we hope to keep all residents of the district informed of issues relevant to them. To this end, Woolworth's management is looking into the matter of a completely new set up of all notices on the wall of Woolworths.

This is a list of items being discussed with Hornsby Councillor Michael Hutchence and Ward A Councillor Warren Waddell:-

Bus bay - Photos of Illegal dumping were forwarded to HSC Waste Management team and cleaned up. If it becomes an ongoing issue Council can set up portable CCTV units.

Bus bay gardens are to be completed in the near future. The Waste Manager is currently looking for a contractor.

We are advised that signs at the Post Office Road and ONR intersection should relate only to the property in front of which they are placed. *However Council is lenient with sport registration signs which can be left only until the season starts.*

Very shortly we will have the facility to join the GPA and to renew your membership online and even better news is that if you join or rejoin now it will be included in the 2018/19 year.



Morris Geoffrey Higson Eulogy

Dad was born in Hornsby on 16th August 1943, the second son to Topsy and Geoff Higson. He was taken home to Chilcott Road, Berrilee where he joined his older brother Linsday, and seven years later a younger sister Frances joined the family. This address happily stayed with him for the next 60 years, first living in his family home as a child and adolescent, and later in his early married life in a small fibro dwelling before building a three bedroom brick veneer for his own family, and then on to the adjoining property at the end of the road to again build, this time a larger house and many sheds as the need arose.

Dad started his school life at Berrilee Public School where he was to make many lifelong friends, some of whom are in attendance today. While in primary school dad spent many hours exploring the bush and creeks surrounding Berrilee with his friends and siblings, and also ventured to nearby Berowra Waters to swim in summer. Work on the family farm also started in these early years.

He then went to Hornsby Boys Technical College and from there Normanhurst Boys. Dad didn't particularly enjoy his days at high school and was pleased to be able to leave school and explore more practical pursuits.

His first job was poultry farming, first with Mr Keighran and then with Uncle Bob Bradley in Arcadia. His love of farm machinery became evident early. In his late teens he worked for Chamberlain and then David Brown Tractors. With this job he enjoyed travelling throughout country NSW.

Dad met Mum at a local dance at Dural, in the early 1960's. They married in 1965 when they were both 21 and settled in Berrilee. He returned to the family citrus orchard to work. He soon after became the milkman for Berrilee, Arcadia and Galston, home delivering seven days a week. During this time, he became a father, Carolyn being born in 1966 and myself in 1968. Mum had the unenviable job of keeping two young children quiet all morning until dad got up and started work again in the afternoon cutting sandstone from the property.

In the early 1970's dad started his first business with trucks, carting shale. He moved to earthmoving soon after, purchasing a backhoe which he worked for many years, forming firm friendships with the teams he worked with.

By the 1980's dad had started working for Glenorie Bus Company performing many roles, including driving and later as an inspector. He again made many friends during this time, and again, many of them are here today. He worked there on and off until his forced retirement in 2002 due to his first stroke.

Sunday 27th May During the late 1980's, dad returned to tractor sales, this time working for Harold Shore at Glenorie. By the 1990's dad returned to the delivery business, distributing smallgoods to deli's across the Blue Mountains.

Dad had the great pleasure of watching his four grandchildren; Cameron, Courtney, Dale and Annabelle grow to adulthood, and of enjoying his first great grandchild, Destiny. Dad's hobby of working with timber grew from making toys for all his grandchildren. He gained great pleasure watching them all play with his creations.

Dad's other leisure activities included gardening, bushwalking, reading, playing cards, doing puzzles, caravanning and spending time with friends and family. The one thing that dad never stopped enjoying was his love of driving and anything mechanical. He drove professionally in a number of capacities, owned a variety of vehicles and the loss of his licence was the one thing he never really accepted. As many local people here today are well aware, he continued to drive his motor scooter around Galston until only a few weeks ago, allowing him independence, possible at the expense of several near accidents of others, of which he was blissfully unaware.

Beer with mates on upturned milk crates in sheds, more recently became breakfast on a scooter at the local shops, but the constant of good friends, mateship, enjoyment of food and drinks remained continuous throughout dad's life. In addition to this, a pet dog was never far away, and he enjoyed feeding all the local dogs in Galston, along with the children who owned them, until just last month.

Dad had been a member of Galston Club for 50 years and was a director there for 3. He had been looking forward to celebrating the 50th anniversary of the club tomorrow evening, and will definitely be there in spirit.

Carolyn and I are deeply grateful for the influence dad had on us, both of us enjoying many of the pursuits introduced to us by him, such as travelling in Australia, bushwalking, gardening, reading and the love of dogs. Dad taught us both to drive by providing us with many paddock bashers, but this may have been a more successful strategy for myself than Carolyn.



Wisemans Ferry Park upgrades

Wisemans Ferry Park is a much-loved community facility enjoyed by residents and visitors alike to The Hills district.

Towards the end of 2017 Hills Shire Council completed foreshore improvement works within Wisemans Ferry Park. The river banks were collapsing and the ageing rock filled baskets along the river edge were in poor condition.

Council has installed two new sandstone rock walls providing stability and access to the river edge, and other sections of collapsing river bank were filled with soil and stabilised with sandstone boulders and new plants.

Stainless steel barbecues have been installed adjacent to the playground. Paths have been upgraded. Three large all-weather park shelters will be built at the site to provide shade to those using the barbecue facilities and existing furniture. Picnic settings have been replaced with newer and more modern versions and additional seating upgrades are also planned."

Most recently, new play equipment, including additional swings, a play unit nest swing and native planting was completed at the park. A nature play area with balance beams, stepping stones and a sandstone rock with a poem about Wisemans was designed to create symmetry with the region's convict past and our modern vibrant community. Additional playground equipment is scheduled to be installed next month including a flying fox cable ride, giant climbing rope and slide.

Old Northern Road and Glenhaven Road Upgrade

Works at the intersection of Old Northern Road and Glenhaven Road will soon commence after Council awarded a tender to Clearly Bros on Tuesday, February 27.

The construction management company will now be tasked with upgrading the busy intersection, ultimately improving safety for all road users. "It is a big win for residents who have campaigned for years for upgrades to be made at this busy stretch of road. Road safety is very important to our community and improving the Old Northern Road and Glenhaven Road intersection has been a top priority for Council", said Mayor Bryne.

"After the relocation of services, the next step of the project includes reconstruction and widening of Old Northern Road and Glenhaven Road, and the installation of traffic signals at the Glenhaven Road intersection. These upgrades wouldn't have been made possible without the support of the Minister for Disability Services and Multiculturalism and the local member for Castle Hill, Ray Williams MP, who has continued to work with Council and the Roads and Maritime Services to finalise designs.

"This is a great outcome for residents and I am so happy we can deliver this important project, while improving connectivity, reliability and performance of one of The Hills' major arterial roads. I thank the residents for their patience in what has been a very long process to get to this point," Mayor Byrne added.

Deputy Mayor, Councillor Robyn Preston said she was pleased to see work finally underway.

"Residents have been crying out for more than a decade to have this stretch of road upgraded," Deputy Mayor Preston said.

"It's fantastic news that we are finally moving along with this important project," she added.

State Member for Castle Hill, Ray Williams MP, said the upgrade has been a long time coming.

"There were many obstacles in our way and no one could have foreseen them when the upgrade was initially announced," Mr Williams said.

"I want to commend the Council, the Roads and Maritime Services (RMS) and the NSW Government for funding this very important project, which will improve road and traffic conditions.

"I want to also take the opportunity to apologise to the community who had to wait so long for this road project to begin. But regardless of the outcome, we would have had to go through this same process to achieve the results we need to improve this important intersection."

The RMS and Council have jointly funded the \$9 million road improvement project.

Thursday morning saw breakfast at the race course, then off to The Cox's farm, owned by Robert and Muriel. This was one of

the first farms visited when this Galston High School Year 9 Ag Class trip commenced 34 years ago under the instigation of former charter member George Cromie.

Due to the rain on Wednesday night, bailing of the prepared Lucerne hay was not possible, however the wrapping of a bale of silage was demonstrated along with the machinery



Convict Road Gang Site Guided Tour

The Dharug and Lower Hawkesbury Historical Society in conjunction with the Convict Trail Project would like to extend the invitation to the general public to join us in our walk along the Convict Road Gang Site.

Visit the old convict road camp site and learn about the life of a convict on the Great North Road. This site is one of the best surviving material records of housing the road gangs known today.

This site is managed by NPWS and due to the nature of the site the group numbers will be limited for this walk. The main site is up a smaller hill with an uneven surface but not a hard walk. The second site is a little less accessible but can be visited by those who are up to the walk.



BELOW IS HISTORY COTTAGE.



It was built by Hornsby Council in about 1945, on crown land, as a residence for the caretaker of the adjoining showground and the sports ground. The first caretaker was Alan Blaxland and his wife, Gertrude. They had 3 children, and lived there from about 1945 to 1952. Mrs Blaxland ran a Tea Room there and was famous for her scones. Later other people rented the Cottage as a restaurant, until August 1997 when the Dural Historical Society leased the building, and were able to renovate it, under the leadership of June Roughley, our founding President.

At our next meeting on Saturday, April 14th at 2pm, the guest speaker will be from the Sydney Harbour Federation Trust. The topic will be the History of North Head, All welcome.

Did you recognise the mystery item photographed in last month's magazine? It is a metal wedge used to align steel plates during the construction of the Sydney Harbour Bridge. It was found buried at the northern end of the Bridge, and can now be seen at History Cottage, which is open on Sundays from 10am to 4 pm. But the cottage will be closed on Easter Sunday.

These walks are suitable for all ages. They require participants to be able to walk for two hours and negotiate uneven bush tracks. There are no toilet facilities on this walk.

Wear suitable walking attire – closed shoes, a hat,


sunglasses and sunscreen. Bring your camera and a drink. Bookings are essential for this walk as numbers are limited to 30, first in best dressed.

ANZAC Day our national day of remembrance causes us to pause and reflect on those who made the ultimate sacrifice for God, King and country in the Great War but there is another side to the day to consider: other victims of war – those left behind to mourn both victor and vanquished. It is Mothers who have a greater understanding and therefore compassion in dealing with the death of loved ones and one particular epitaph comes to mind which has special tenderness. It reads: 'Tread softly o'er my darling son's grave for a Mother's love lies here' This poignant message is indicative of remembrance of not only a son who did not return home from the war but is the lament of all Mothers whose sons who did not return either.

If this is victory, then let God stop all wars.

Each of these crosses is a memorial to a soldier killed in the Great War 1914-1918, some known only unto God. Allies and enemies alike gave their lives for a cause to become united in death, mourned with love, always

remembered.



Middle Dural Rural Fire Brigade News



We came to the end of the fire season at the end of March. From April, conditions for lighting fires differ depending on whether you live in The Hills Shire, or Hornsby, so check with your local fire captain (Middle Dural, Len Best 0408220705). The coming months are ideal for clearing hazardous vegetation prior to burning or mulching, rather than delaying it till next fire season!

Our Annual General Meeting will be on **Monday 9 April**, **starting at 6.30pm** with dinner, followed by the meeting. All our residents are welcome to attend this meeting.

Now that summer is over, Middle Dural Brigade will be undertaking hazard reductions in our own area and joining other brigades for larger-scale burns elsewhere in The Hills. These team efforts, where many crews work together, enable us to truly prepare for emergencies, as we get to know and trust each other. This was the start of multi-brigade Annangrove burn last year.

In Middle Dural Brigade, two new recruits are undergoing their first course, Basic Firefighter. They have had some months familiarisation around the station, getting to know the ropes. Once they have the Basic Firefighter qualification, they will be welcomed as full members of the Brigade and encouraged to take part in those upcoming hazard reductions.

Our new recruits can take further training, such as Village Firefighting, Advanced Firefighting and Crew Leader, with many other courses available depending on where their interests lie. These include chainsaw operation and heavy vehicle driving, on and off road. However, if you think you might be interested in becoming a volunteer firefighter, there is no obligation to commit to any courses, until you're sure that it is what you want to do. All fire-prone areas in New South Wales depend on their volunteers, and all interested people are welcomed, but you need to spend some time with us and at the station, before you decide you want to commit to training. We encourage you to check us out!

Arcadia Rural Fire Brigade



March has come and gone in a flash, and our brigade is getting busier and busier for 2018. We welcomed those storms that rumbled over Sydney, in which the rain relieved those drought like

conditions and aided the many firefighters around the state. It was important that we continued to remind the community that it was still fire season and two permits were required for piles. Now that fire season is over for another year, residents are required to obtain their council permit and abide by those instructions.

Arcadia has been starting their Hazard Reduction preparations for those that are planned for the area. These HRs are large tasks to undertake and brigade members have been starting the process by talking to residents and obtaining consent from them. This first step is then followed with preparation of containment lines around the prescribed burn area. At this stage there are no dates available for these HRs, but once we acquire further information we will be informing the community.

The Hornsby/Ku-Ring-Gai district conducted their Crew Leader assessment in Fiddletown in March. It saw a number of candidates being put through their paces on varying scenarios, including grass and bush fires, property protection, coordinating trucks to attend other incidents, and leading multiple crews. One of our own Arcadians, Mike, represented the brigade well and passed his assessment. Congratulations Mike, your dedication was evident during that grueling assessment.

One of our other continuous training requirements Breathing Apparatus (BA), used in areas that the air is dangerous to breath without clean air, such as structure and car fires. These yearly exercises are designed to keep the crews qualifications up-to-date. Arcadia is a BA brigade, which means our Bravo truck carries breathing apparatus and oxygen cylinders on it.



The end of March is the official end the Bush Fire season. You are no longer required to apply for a permit to light fires however regulations still apply, so before you light a fire please contact your local District Office to confirm regulations and give notification of intention to burn. NB: you are required to give notice of intension to burn.

Fuel Management Burns

Autumn is the time brigades plan to do Fuel Management burns. If your property backs onto a proposed burn you may notice brigade members in the bush preparing for the burn (members will always be in fire brigade uniform if on your property for this purpose). Stop by the brigade stand at Glenorie Markets to check on the progress of proposed burns.

Trapping and Tracking to Tackle Tabbies

Hornsby Shire Council will expand its feral cat trapping efforts and join the Cat Tracker Australia program, in an attempt to reduce the impact of cats on our local native wildlife.

Only feral cats will be targeted by the traps, which have been carefully designed to cause no harm to the animals.

"If a domestic cat is captured by one of the traps it will be immediately returned to its owner. It is important that domestic cats are microchipped and registered so we take them back to their home." Hornsby Shire Mayor Philip Ruddock said

When feral cats are captured they will be humanely euthanased

by a veterinarian. Council unanimously voted for the measures at this week's meeting.

Cats inflict a very heavy toll on our wildlife and it's estimated they kill as many as 377 million birds in Australia each year.

The other feline-

focussed initiative from the meeting was for Hornsby Shire Council to join the Cat Tracker Australia program. This allows cat owners to place a GPS tracker on their cat to find out exactly how far they roam. It is a valuable educational exercise for cat owners, one that is already undertaken by a number of

councils in our region,. The ultimate goal is to raise awareness of the harm their cat might be doing and encourage behaviour change among pet owners."

Both proposals were suggested by Councillor Nathan Tilbury, whose cat Luna permanently stays inside his house. "I'm clearly not a cat hater – I love my cat – but I am also aware of the damage cats can do to our fragile native ecosystem," Cr Tilbury said. "These are two small but important steps towards reducing the extent of that damage."

In six months there will be a report to Council on the effectiveness of the increased trapping and the Cat Tracker program.




School Captains and Vice Captains, Chase, Charli, Sam and Annabelle are setting an excellent standard by demonstrating responsible leadership with all their respective duties.

Congratulations to Hills Grammar Year 12 students! Exceeding their \$20,000 goal by a huge \$14,000 for the Leukaemia Foundation. This is the 15th year that Year 12 has been raising funds for cancer research and this year all records were broken as they became the 2nd highest fundraising school in NSW and 5th in the nation. School Captain Will Sampson commented, "The atmosphere around Hills Grammar in the days leading up to the event was fantastic and the ability of our grade to generate awareness and drive for the cause was crucial to our success. We finished with a strong result that exceeded all our expectations."

An extra impetus to do the very best they could for blood cancer research, was the sad loss of their classmate, Adam Sheen, to leukaemia eight years ago when they were in Year 4. His mum, Danielle, was there to thank and support Adam's cohort as their locks dropped for the World's Greatest Shave. Over 60 students and staff lined up for L'Yvonne's hairdressers to shave heads and lop ponytails.

The girls had been growing their hair for years for this moment. "Our hair can be used for wigs (which I was able to donate enough (35cm) to make a child's wig) and to create oil 'booms' to protect places like the Great Barrier Reef from oil spills". Major Year 12 fundraiser, Talja Coleman explained, "The morning of the shave was full of excitement and having the Today Show there live was an amazing experience and made our contribution feel more noticed by society, hopefully gaining more awareness for this terrible disease which claims more people than breast cancer does per year."

The gauntlet has well and truly been cast for the Class of 2019 as we raise those much needed research funds.



Cherrybrook: Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow

Way back in colonial times, Cherrybrook was part of the Castle Hill Government farm, an area renowned for having soil of 'best and most productive kind'.

It was there in 1838 that pioneers Joseph and Mary Ann Harrison settled on a 65 acre block of land inherited from Mary's mother, Hannah Russell. The couple built a small timber cottage, raised thirteen children and set about planting orchards of peach, apricot, pear, plum and citrus fruit trees. Their fondness for cherry trees, which were established by the creek at one corner of their land, prompted the couple to name the area, 'Cherrybrook'.

With the Harrison farm surrounded by bushland, timber-cutting became the first industry in the area. Gradually the land was cleared and during the 1850's, more and more orchards were established. By 1915 all ratepayers bar one, were listed as fruit growers. After World War I, they also began farming poultry in conjunction with their fruit trees. The settlers, most of whom were Wesleyans or Methodist, quickly attended to their social and spiritual needs. In 1845, they established a chapel and burial ground

on New Line Road. The Harrisons were amongst the regular churchgoers and for thirty years, Joseph Harrison was the chapel's Sunday school teacher. All was well. However, the nature of Cherrybrook's idyllic rural landscape, was about to change.

In the Sydney Region Outline Plan of 1968, Cherrybrook was targeted for urban development. Within ten years of the 1978 land release, twenty four thousand houses had been built. Developer L.J. Hooker called the first subdivision the Greenway Estate. He named its streets after architect Francis Greenway, other prominent colonial architects and pioneers. The streets in the ensuing land release, were given names of native and exotic flora.

Long gone is the Cherrybrook of 1838 but one landmark remains: the Uniting Church Hall and burial ground on New Line Road. Apart from regular maintenance to its painted brickwork, the Victorian Gothic style building's original features, including stucco slate and stained glass, have endured. The social significance of this charming primrose yellow church is not forgotten. Moreover, it is inextricably woven into Cherrybrook's history - yesterday, today and tomorrow.

Every believer is sealed by the Spirit. Ephesians 4 :30 states: 'Do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God with whom you have been sealed for the day of redemption'. By this action we are stamped with the sign of God's ownership, a mark which remains until we are taken home to Heaven. The very presence of the Spirit in our heart is God's distinguishing seal that we are His.

What is his continuing work?

After His initial or crisis work, what does the Holy Spirit do in a life which belongs to Christ?

In what way does He continue His ministry?

1. The Holy Spirit will help us grow.

The Holy Spirit wants to create and maintain those conditions under which our new life in Christ can grow. 'He will bring glory to me...' said Jesus Christ (John 16:14).

He is the Spirit of holiness' so He will teach us Holy living. He is the Spirit of power, so He will teach us what the resurrection life of Christ within us can mean in daily living. See Romans 8:2. 'Through Christ Jesus the law of the Spirit of life set me free from the law of sin and death'. This means that the demands and standards of our new life can be fulfilled in us and by us with His enabling. The measure of our power and of our spiritual growth will be according to the measure of our surrender to the indwelling Spirit.

2. The Holy Spirit prays for us. (Romans 8: 26,27)

Here is one of the most encouraging aspects of the Spirit's present ministry. Often we do not know how to pray. Or it may be that physical or emotional weakness makes it difficult for us to pray. But the Holy Spirit not only knows our condition, He knows the will of God. Therefore he intercedes for us.

The explanation of much that happens for good in our lives is that same intercession on our behalf.

3. The Holy Spirit witnesses with our spirit. (Romans 8:15-17)

Again this is part of His continuing ministry. He works to produce assurance in our hearts that we are God's child. The Bible itself is the ground of our assurance, but those who know Jesus Christ as Saviour also know the quiet peace which comes as the Spirit of God witnesses with our spirit. That witness may be hard to describe, but the true believer knows the truth of it.

The Training Ground of Life

In a few days' time the Commonwealth Games will get under way on the Gold Coast. Thousands of contestants from over 70 countries around the world will compete in a range of disciplines for the prize of a Commonwealth Games gold medal. That medal represents victory. It stands for excellence. It is also a testimony to faithful training – prolonged, extensive and diligent training.

By its very nature, however, training is invariably mundane and routine. There are few people, if any, to witness the early morning run on the track or the lap of the swimming pool. There are no shouts of support or rounds of applause to encourage these efforts. Yet training is vital if the goal is to be achieved. If a competitor's training regime has been deficient, it will show in his or her performance.

What is true of sporting achievements often applies to life

itself. Great accomplishments result from faithfulness in everyday efforts, usually away from the glare of publicity.

An example is Professor Ian Frazer, who was the 2006 Australian of the Year. He was honoured and recognised for his work in developing vaccines to prevent and to treat cervical cancer. However, behind this public recognition was 20 years of pain-staking research, diligence, and perseverance. No doubt there were long hours of routine, possibly boring, work in the laboratory conducting hundreds of experiments, keeping records and noting outcomes.

The great inventor Thomas Edison once said that genius was 1% inspiration and 99% perspiration. The wise man Solomon put it this way:

"Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with all your might." (Ecclesiastes 9:10)

Testing Our Local Creek Water

We, at Still Creek Landcare, have been testing the quality of some of our Galston, Arcadia and Berrilee creek waters for the last 9 years. We test for pollution and ability



to bear life, salts, phosphorous, oxygen, acidity, turbidity and E.coli. More recently, we have been measuring the presence of biological indicator species such as stoneflies, mayflies and caddis flies.

In general, our creeks are in fairly good condition, but the closer



to people's houses, the worse they are. We can help keep our creeks clean and encourage life in them by:

- Using nil or low phosphorus detergents
- Maintaining our septic systems in good condition and pump them out when required
- Keeping grazing animals away from waterways to prevent erosion and
- Using fertilisers sparingly and collecting livestock manure


