Local Breeders open their Alpaca Studs



The month of May has been designated as Australian Alpaca Month for the Australian Alpaca Association and its members. To celebrate, two local alpaca breeders will open their doors to the public and invite anyone interested in alpacas to come and learn about these fascinating creatures and how they are managed on small acreage. Gunnamatta Stud (open May 13 and 14) and Woolpaca Farm (open Sat May 13 only) are just a 10 minute drive from each other and close to the beautiful villages of Galston and Glenorie. Both studs are members of the Hawkesbury-Blue Mountains region of the Australian Alpaca Association.

Alpacas are recognised as all-round environmentally acceptable livestock. With their soft-padded feet, they are very kind to our fragile Australian soils as well as being adaptable to most conditions. Alpacas are easy to manage and, in addition, produce a soft-handling fleece in a range of colours, they are also extremely appealing animals to own. Most people who start out with a couple of alpacas, even as grass-eaters, are soon on the lookout for a few more to complement their herd. The fibre is in high demand overseas and is also very popular with hand spinners. The great range of natural colours means that dying is unnecessary, leaving the fibre with its original silky handle.

Anyone interested in visiting farms in the Hills and Hawkesbury areas during the month of May will receive more information during the Hawkesbury Show on the weekend of May 5-7, where alpaca judging will take place on Saturday May 6th. Alpaca displays and activities will also take place at the Hawkesbury Show on Sunday May 7th. You can also visit the Region's web site www.hbmalpaca. com.au for more details of the participating farms.

In addition to the open farm days in May, the Alpaca Association is conducting a "Getting Started with Alpacas" seminar on Sat May 20th. The topics cover a wide range of subjects and are presented by experienced farmers from the region and include "hands on" experience with alpacas. You will receive advice on how to choose your farm, what you need to farm alpacas, how to select alpacas, how to look after them, when to shear your alpacas, breeding assistance and what to do with the fleece. This seminar is always well-received and includes lots of practical information.

We cannot control what Nature does to us, but, if the recent downpours are any indication, the traditional winter rains which will shortly be upon us could present a few problems for some homes with Septic tanks and trenches.

What on is going on with interest rates lately?

Rates are on the rise, but not because The Reserve Bank has increased the cash rate which has been at a low of 1.5% since last August.

Some owner occupier loan rates have increased a little, but it is the investor who is really being targeted. At first the rates were increased by small amounts around 0.10% to 0.15% but the latest increases have been more like 0.22% to 0.25%.

The banks are claiming the cost of borrowing new funds has gone up to them, but then one would assume the increases would only apply to new loans. In fact, it seems that the new loans have the best rates and the loans already settled are the loans that are targeted with hefty increases.

The banks don't look after their existing customers!

We need to realize that their job is to increase profits, so they ratchet up the rates of their existing customers' loans over time and make a wind fall profit.

So what is happening. The Reserve Bank is leaving rates on hold, fearing a further drop in interest rates will further stimulate the Sydney and Melbourne markets. ASIC, the Australian Securities and Investments Commission, along with APRA, The Australian Prudential Regulatory Authority, are forcing lenders to limit investor lending. This applies Australia wide and not just to the inflated markets of Sydney and Melbourne,

Investors are targeted. At the end of 2014 lenders were instructed to limit the dollar increase of investor loans to a maximum of 10% over their previous year's investor loans. Some lenders stopped lending to investors for a time as they had already grown more than 10%. Others raised interest rates to limit the loans they would attract and approve. These measures have failed to curb investor interest in property, so APRA recently introduced a further



restriction on lenders, limiting the total dollar value of interest-only loans to 30% of total new residential mortgages.

Now different rates are offered for different loan types. There are different prices for Owner Occupied interest only, owner occupied principle and interest, investor interest only and investor principle and interest as well as rates based on loan amount and LVR (loan to value ratio).

It can be quite confusing to have so many different criteria determining what interest rate will be offered to a customer. For this reason, everyone who has one or more mortgages should develop a good working relationship with a finance broker who can navigate

this maze and make sure the best outcome is secured initially, and that ongoing scrutiny of rate changes ensures your interests are being protected over your borrowing life.

Putting your foot down on diabetes

The simple act of walking down stairs could help prevent diabetes, and the key could be something known as eccentric exercise.

With more than one million Australians currently living with diabetes and the number expected to rise to three million in 20 years, new research findings have the potential to significantly reduce the burden of this disease.

Pushing down the risk of diabetes

Researchers from Edith Cowan University's School of Medical and Health Sciences recruited 30 obese elderly women and put them on an exercise program, with half walking upstairs and the others walking downstairs.

Lead researcher Professor Ken Nosaka said that at the end of the 12-week program, the women who walked down the stairs showed improvements on several physiological measures.

"They had significantly lower levels of resting glucose, insulin and haemoglobin 1AC, improved oral glucose tolerance test, and decreased triglycerides and cholesterols together with an increase of good cholesterol (HDL cholesterol) in their blood," he said. "All of these changes will have lowered their risk of developing diabetes.

"While both groups recorded an improvement, it was significantly greater in the down stairs group,"

Eccentric exercise is key

The difference in group performance was attributed to what's called eccentric exercise "which doesn't mean going for a run in a silly costume" said Professor Nosaka.

"Eccentric exercise is where load is placed on the muscle while it's lengthening, rather than shortening. For example, walking



down stairs is eccentric exercise because your front thigh muscles are lengthening when they're placed under load, as opposed to walking up stairs in which the muscles are shortening, performing mainly concentric contractions."

Additional benefits

As well as protecting against metabolic syndrome and diabetes, the researchers also found that the down stairs group's physical function such as walking ability, balance, bone mineral density, resting heart rate and blood pressure all improved significantly more than the

up stairs group.

"This is yet more evidence that not all exercise is created equal in terms of its health benefits," Professor Nosaka said.

Anyone can be eccentric

There are lots of ways to incorporate eccentric exercise into your life to enjoy the health benefits. Here are Professor Nosaka's tips:

- 1. If you work in a tall building, try taking the lift up to work, but then walk down the stairs when you go home or head out for your lunch break.
- 2. Whether at work or home, every time you need the stairs, go down twice, for double the benefit.
- 3. If you're using weights at home or the gym, concentrate on the lowering the weights slowly, because the lowering action causes your muscles to perform eccentric exercise.
- 4. Even sitting down in your chair slowly, makes your leg muscles contract eccentrically so by sitting down slowly you can get a bit of eccentric exercise.

Who was Rowland?

Rowland Village is very much part of the history of the Galston/Dural area. About 200 people live there independently in the Village part, and in the Aged Care Facility, which is called Mark Donaldson V.C House. It is all owned by RSL Life Care.

But who was Rowland? Some research

image Wikipedia finds that James Anthony Rowland was born on a property near Armidale in northern NSW, the eldest of 4 boys, in November, 1922. His early education was by correspondence school, before attending Cranbrook School in Sydney. He studied Aeronautical Engineering at Sydney Uni, but his studies were interrupted in 1942 by the Second World War, when he joined the Air Force. He became a master bomber pilot over Germany, crashed near Frankfurt and was taken prisoner by the Gestapo in early 1945. After the war, he completed his University studies and re-joined the Air Force and became a Test Pilot.

In 1972, Rowland was promoted to Air Vice Marshall, and was knighted in 1977. He retired from the Air Force and was appointed the 33rd Governor of New South Wales in January 1981, which post he held till 1989 until he died.

The RSL had bought 15 Acres of land at Galston for a retirement village in 1988, and it seemed appropriate to call it "Rowland Village"

Mark Donaldson was born in April, 1979 at Waratah, near Newcastle., and then grew up at Dorrigo, where he attended Dorrigo High School. He enlisted in the Australian Army in 2002, and became very efficient in shooting and all physical fitness. He has served in Timor, Iran and Afghanistan , where, on 2nd September, 2008 while patrolling , they were ambushed by the Taliban. There were many casualties. Donaldson realised there was a wounded Afghani interpreter that had been wounded, and he deliberately exposed himself to rescue the interpreter and carried him 80 metres to safety and gave him first aid.

Donaldson was awarded the Victoria Cross, which is the highest honour for gallantry. He was presented with it by the Governor General in January 2009.

At the next meeting of the Dural Historical Society on Saturday, 14th May, the guest speaker will be Murray Radcliffe. The title of his talk will be "The French are Coming". All welcome

Keep an eye out for tossers

Seen someone throwing a cigarette butt or sweet wrapper from their car? Now you can do something about other people's antisocial habits.

The Environmental Protection Authority's 'Hey Tosser' campaign which is on at the moment, is encouraging the public to report litter thrown from vehicles onto local streets. "We want to inspire everyone to put their rubbish in a bin or take it with them," said a spokesman.

As part of the Hey Tosser Campaign, Ku-ring-gai Council is encouraging local residents to use the Report to EPA system to report littering from vehicles, such as cigarette ends.

Over 26,000 people across NSW have used the EPA reporting system to report incidents of littering from vehicles in the last two years. And, says the EPA, having local residents notify them about litterbugs "sends a strong message that littering isn't tolerated and if you litter, you'll get caught."

To report littering from a vehicle you need to:

- have actually seen the litter being thrown from the vehicle
- be able to provide the vehicle registration details and the location where the littering happened
- report the incident within 14 days
- make your report on the EPA website
- be willing to attend court as a witness if required.
- If you see a rubbish tosser, report the a littering incident at: www. epa.nsw.gov.au/reporttoepa.

Does domestic violence only happen to women?

Social awareness around domestic and family violence, and action to counter it, is thankfully starting to progress. The Federal Government has committed \$100,000,000 to combat the issue and programs have been developed in order to help male perpetrators, and several private shelters have started to open, in order to house women and children escaping a violent home life. Did you know, however, that men also suffer domestic violence? Did you know that one female is killed each week in a domestic violence situation, and one male is killed every 10 days? To date, there are virtually no support pathways for men and fathers to escape abuse and violence, nor are there any male-specific emergency or transitional housing.

Domestic violence occurs when someone with whom you are in a close personal relationship makes you feel afraid, unsafe or powerless. Domestic violence comes in seven different forms:

- Physical threat, such as harm to you or a pet;
- emotional and psychological, such as manipulation or crazymaking;
- verbal, such as humiliation or put-downs (either publicly and/or privately);
- financial constraints and control tactics;
- social (isolating from family and friends or controlling where you go);
- technological (such as stalking by GPS tracking on a smart device);
- sexual abuse and rape.

Any of these forms of violence are unacceptable; everyone has a human right to live freely without fear. The effects of domestic violence can be debilitating, far-reaching and long-lasting for both victims, and their children.

Local MP rings changes to racial discrimination laws

The tricky balancing act of the right to freedom of speech and preventing racial abuse through inflammatory language, has been a personal crusade for Berowra MP Julian Leeser.

In what has been an intractable political issue for six years, the MP and member of the Parliamentary Joint Committee on Human Rights has described the Committee's recently completed Report and resultant changes to the Racial Discrimination Act as "an historic breakthrough".

Mr Leeser was a driving force behind the recommendations to fix the complaints handling process relating to Section 18C of the Act.

Under existing legislation, interpretation of the Act enabled the Australian Human Right Commission (HRC) to interpret laws too broadly, the bipartisan Committee felt. The recent cases of the students at Queensland University of Technology, and the complaint against the late cartoonist Bill Leak, brought the issue to prominence.

Recommended changes to 18C of the Act proposed a tightening up of the way racial abuse complaints are handled, as well as assessing if a complaint is lawful or not - a weeding out process of sorts.

In late March the Senate and House of Representatives passed the Bill in an amended form, though the proposals for RDA language changes were not included.

Blitz on illegal 'no refund' signs

The local shop that says 'no' to your request for a refund is breaking the law, according to Hornsby MP and Minister for Innovation and Better Regulation Matt Kean.

Yet 20% of businesses across the state visited by inspectors are doing just that, a recent blitz on illegal 'no refund' signs found, when 12 consumer protection officers visited 561 retailers at 52 locations across NSW.

Retailers aren't allowed to put up 'no refund' signs in their shops or print similar messages on receipts or invoices under consumer laws, as the signs imply a refund isn't possible even when a product is defective.

"Consumers aren't always entitled to a refund," said Mr Kean, "such as if they have just changed their mind. However, they certainly do have the right to a refund if there's a problem with a product, and to suggest otherwise is illegal," Mr Kean said.

In the swoop 120 businesses - or about one in five - had illegal

These new RDA changes include lawyers being fined for taking on racial abuse cases with little chance of success, and giving the HRC more power to terminate a complaint in the complaints assessing process, saving everyone concerned time and money.

Leeser, who sat on the inquiry into Freedom of Speech,

said: "I was disgusted by Julian Leeser played a significant role in changes the treatment of the OUT to the Racial Discrimination Act

"We heard from them at the inquiry and it was impossible not to be moved by their ordeal.

"This legislation will return section 18C to its intended function as an important but limited protection against the worst kind of racial abuse. It will also make it more difficult to bring spurious complaints."

messaging about refunds on signs, invoices or receipts. The area with the highest rate of non-compliance was Fairfield, where all 15 traders visited had illegal information about refunds. Clothes shops were the worst offenders, with non-compliance detected in more than half the premises visited.



Offending traders were educated about the law, had the unlawful signs removed and provided with alternate signs with legal wording.

"Most of the offending retailers visited during Operation Refund claimed to be unaware of the law, or the fact that they could be penalised up to \$11,000 if prosecuted."

These businesses will get repeat inspections to ensure they're complying with legislation.

Ways to recycle at work

Over 75% of businesses believe that reducing waste is part of being a sustainable and ethical business, new Planet Ark and Environmental Protection Agency research reveals.

But there's also the perception that they're doing all they can to manage their waste, that there may be little benefit in doing more, or that they don't have the knowledge to improve their waste and recycling practices.

Not true! Here are some simple tips on how to get business recycling sorted in your workplace, and what can be recycled responsibly.

Start small and easy

Change can be challenging, but research shows if people are willing to commit to a small, easy change, they're more likely to come on board with bigger changes later.

Try simple things like encouraging colleagues to switch off their computer at night, collect cardboard for recycling, or bring reusable coffee cups to work.

2 Use the group

Humans are social creatures so our behaviour is influenced by our friends, family, and co-workers. So when encouraging colleagues to adopt new recycling practices, highlight that the desired behaviour (e.g. reading from the screen rather than printing) is a common one that everyone else is doing.

Positive reinforcement helps, so a message like 'Thanks to everyone for recycling' will be more effective than 'Everyone keeps putting the wrong things in the recycling bin.'

3 Hit 'em where it hurts

In business nobody likes losing money, and research shows the human brain feels the pain of current loss more than the joy of future change, so loss aversion can be a good strategy.

Telling a CEO: "We're wasting \$300 a week on skip bin collections," is much more powerful than 'We could save \$300 a week by changing our bin collection', because it emphasises a cost the organisation could avoid.

4 Send the right signs

Clear communication is crucial when introducing any new recycling process to a workplace. Workers need to understand what's changing, how it affects them, and what's expected of them. Concise and informative signage is one of the strongest tools you have to encourage appropriate recycling behaviour.

More help is at hand

The Business Case for Less Waste is a new Planet Ark resource which explains the savings to be made from improved recycling practices at work, and provides step-bystep tips for introducing a business recycling strategy to a workplace.

BusinessRecycling.com.au provides online and phone information and service listings to help businesses reduce waste, and includes details on where specific material types can be recycled across Australia.

Bin Trim is a free Excel tool developed by the NSW EPA for SMEs to measure their waste and provides tailored information to help reduce, reuse and recycle materials.

Businesses can find out about eligibility for various environmental grants at: www.business.gov.au/assistance.



lt's just gotta go!

Paper: paper in landfill creates the greenhouse gas methane. Some local councils provide paper recycling services for local business, and if not available in your area, commercial recyclers also provide this service. Also purchase paper that has high recycled content, such as Planet Ark's 100% recycled paper, which is Forest Stewardship Council-certified and carbon neutral.

Cardboard: some businesses may find investing in a cardboard baler an effective way to reduce waste collections whilst creating more space at work, with the added bonus of saving money with fewer pick-ups.

Printer cartridges: if your workplace uses more than three inkjet, toner cartridges or toner bottles in a month you may be eligible for a free 'Cartridges 4 Planet Ark' collection box, which can be collected. For fewer than three items in a month, take your used cartridges and bottles to participating Officeworks, Australia Post, The Good Guys, JB Hi-Fi, Harvey Norman, Office National and Office Products Depot outlets. Visit www. Cartridges.PlanetArk.org for more.

Mobile phones: over 95% of the materials in mobile phones can be recycled. MobileMuster is the official recycling program of the mobile phone industry in Australia. It's a not-for-profit program, funded by members who pay a levy on every handset imported into Australia. Workplaces can register for a collection bin through www.MobileMuster.com.au

Redundant electronic equipment like the old fridge in the office

kitchen: electronic goods such as TVs, computers, printers, and accessories can be recycled by TechCollect www.TechCollection.com.au or search www. BusinessRecycling.com.au for more recyclers in your local area. A number of commercial recyclers and scrap metal yards will accept white goods for recycling, and there are organisations and second-hand dealers who will accept white goods for refurbishing.

Bottles, plastic containers from lunches and plastic milk cartons from tea making: while some councils provide a business recycling service, most commercial recyclers also provide co-mingled recycling bins for plastic, paper, glass, aluminium and cartons. Visit BusinessRecycling.com.au to find out about services in your area.

Green waste like apple cores and salad scraps: consider keeping a workplace worm farm, compost bin, or a Bokashi bucket. Or what about a food dehydrator to reduce the volume or weight of food scraps needing to be processed? Also some recycling companies will collect coffee grounds, cooking oil, food scraps, and donations of food. Visit www.BusinessRecycling. com.au for find your nearest recycling service.

Wild Walks



Flint and Steel track 1hr, 2.1 km return, grade 3

(moderate) walk Do you like quiet, secluded beaches nestled in beautiful bushland? This walk follows a scenic track down to the gorgeous Flint and Steel Beach, which provides views across the Hawkesbury River to landmarks such as Lion Island, Patonga and Box Head.

The walk passes through palm, acacia and grass tree forests. There is a great diversity of flora and some fantastic sandstone rock formations along the way, and you may even see a goanna or echidna

beside the track. The track is well marked and ends on the beautiful sandy beach.

The walks starts from the signposted 'Flint and Steel track walk' car park about 2km before the end of West Head Rd. Start from the carpark by following the signposted track for just shy of 350m to come to a three-way intersection. Here you veer right to follow the 'Flint and Steel Beach 700m' sign down to the beach. It is always a good idea to turn around when you find a beach to make a mental note as to where the track enters the beach, to make it easier to spot on your way out.

When you finish enjoying the beach, retrace your steps back up.





Whilst you're in the area, there's an optional side trip to the smaller White Horse Beach. Also make sure you check out the lookout at the end of West Head Rd, and enjoy the nearby picnic area. There's a National Park fee to drive to the start of this walk and the gates are locked overnight. If you have not explored West Head you really should, and even just the drive is special.

Wallpaper revival

Just about anything goes when it comes to embracing the current trends for papering your walls!

Wallpaper is enjoying something of a renaissance at the moment, in line with the current home design trend to mix it up, keep it eclectic and not too matchy matchy in your look.

So that means you're not committing a design crime if you put flowers with stripes, or spots with geometrics. It's about what works for you and makes you love your home.

That said there are a few rules when using wallpaper. Often, less is more, so start with just one or two walls in a room, painting the remaining walls in a colour that works in with the tones in your wallpaper.

In the larger open plan spaces so typical of many Australian homes where kitchen and living areas are one giant space, define one area of the space with paper and keep the rest of the walls plain. It's even OK to stop the wallpaper half way along the wall if that's all the space you want to define.

And, says Porter's Paint's Sarah Geha, it's important to determine which mood you want to set when selecting a wallpaper. Cosy and warm, or bright and light? And how much lighting does the room have? These factors will steer you in the direction of colour and style. Take into account the room's size - horizontal stripes will widen a room whilst vertical stripes and shapes will add volume to a room.

"There currently is a strong movement of texture and depth in interiors and this lends itself beautifully to the use of wallpaper," Sarah said. "Porter's Paints has a beautiful range of Grasscloth Wallpaper and also many designs which will give an extra dimension to a space."

Remember though, that the palm trees or pale blue cloud paper you fell in love with on a hot Sydney day also needs to work on cold wintery mornings so ensure your choice works all year round, on both bright and dull days. Sample books brought home from the shop or posted to you from the supplier, and stuck to walls for a few weeks prior to buying, will prove invaluable in this decision making process.

Functionality will also determine if wallpaper is suitable and if so which colour - wallpaper in a busy hallway won't cope with schoolbags, muddy wellies and greasy fingers being slung at it, whereas a bedroom won't see all that wear and tear.

Some people are put off by worries wallpaper is high maintenance - but the care is relatively simple. Most wallpapers are finished with a clear low lustre varnish to give a general form of protection, but when marks appear, use a clean, lint-free cloth slightly dampened with warm, slightly soapy water and lightly wipe - no scrubbing.

It's always advisable too, to keep a roll or two back after the papering is done, for accidents when the paper will need to be replaced.

With our recent Easter break I have been reflecting on the narrative of the final week of Jesus. Known as the passion, these tumultuous few days changed the world.

There are two accounts of betrayal during the week of Easter. Both widely known, yet with wildly different outcomes.

The first is a story of betrayal. Judas Isacariot, one of the twelve disciples, who had spent virtually the entire three year ministry with Jesus increasingly became incensed with his ways to the point of betraying his trust to the leaders who were intent on killing him. Judas was chosen by Jesus, was known to Jesus, and Jesus was more than aware of his impending betrayal. Yet Jesus treated him equally when washing each of the disciples feet.

The second story is a story of denial. Simon Peter, the leader of the twelve disciples, the first to acknowledge Jesus as the Messiah, refuted the claim that he would ever deny him. While in Gethsemane, Peter was the first to draw a sword to protect Jesus – and yet Jesus did not wish that sort of protection. Confused, bewildered, shocked, Peter followed Jesus into the courtyard to be as close as possible and there three times denied ever knowing Jesus ... and then the cock crowed.

Judas the betrayer – betrayed Jesus once. Though upon arrest had a revelation of what he had done. Judas filled with remorse recognised his sin and was so overwhelmed he took his own life (Mt 27:3-4). His act of betrayal went on to define his life course, his life choice.

Peter the denier – denied Jesus not once, but three times. He too was filled with remorse for denying Jesus, worse Jesus looked him direct in the eye while the prophesied cock crowed. Peter went out and wept bitterly.

Judas saw no option but to take his own life. Peter lived long enough to be forgiven and elevated to the head of the new gathering.

Judas was defined by his action, but Peter was refined.

How have past regrets, actions, decisions played out in your life? Do they define you? Are have they refined you?

We all fall short of God's glory, we all fail and sin ... but how we deal with these is key to how we live the rest of our lives.

Don't be defined by your past. Don't let it rule you out of a magnificent future. Don't allow the joy to be stolen due to your history.

Make the decision to be refined. To be transformed. To take your weaknesses, errors, regrets, worries, woes and all that has shaped you to date and allow God to shape that into something glorious, something joyful, something that you can stand proud of.

You have probably noticed that we don't have to teach children to do wrong. They do it because it is natural for them to do so and need to be taught to do right. This is because our human nature has that twist to it, a sinful twist.

Have you ever driven a car with faulty steering? It keeps pulling to the left or to the right instead of going straight. Some shopping trolleys do the same thing and seem to have a mind of their own; they want to go in any direction but the right one.

That is an illustration of what sin does in the human heart. Our natural tendency is to turn away from God instead of towards Him. We choose to run our life the way we want to, leaving God out of it . We may do many good things in life, but if we don't include God in our life and have a relationship with Him, we will be separated from God for ever.

This means separation from God, both in this life and after we die.

Facing Hard Facts

We ourselves can't remove the barrier of inherited sin between us and God. The first thing to do towards becoming a real Christian is to recognize and acknowledge this, then we are in a position to accept what God has done for us. The Bible shows us that this involves admitting that we are sinners , not the perfect people we may like to think we are, It may be easy for us to classify people involved in criminal or immoral activity as sinners.

How often have you heard good living people say," I'm a good person, don't call me a Sinner, I've never done anything really bad."

But God looks at our heart, our inner life, our tendency to turn away from Him instead of towards Him, and this is what sin really is. *(by Rev E.C. Long.) to be continued.*

Carrs bush restoration

Carrs Bush is a valuable 6 Hectares of native bushland within Fagan Park, along Carrs Rd. It contains one of the best remaining examples of the endangered Sydney Turpentine Ironbark Forest.

About 4 Ha is in good condition and 1 Ha in reasonable condition, maintained by bush contractors paid by Hornsby Shire Council

and by a volunteer Bushcare group. The remaining 1.2Ha was in poor condition; invaded by weeds such as privet, blackberry, honeysuckle and ochna. In July 2015 the local Landcare group was successful in obtaining \$40k of support to restore 0.8Ha over three years through Greater Sydney Local Land Services via funding from the Australian Government's National Landcare Programme.

We are now half way through the work which is being done by contractors and Landcare volunteers. This has already made a huge difference with many large privet trees removed. See the photo of the conquerors with their pile of dead privet. However years of dropping seeds results in needing to continually pull out the new privets coming up. The good news is that other native plants are also coming up in some areas from seeds waiting in the soil, so we won't need to do as much replanting.

There is still a big task ahead of us. Would you like to help make a difference to Carrs Bush by beating the privet? If so you could volunteer with Bushcare to work in the better areas, or Landcare for



the rougher areas. You will make new friends and learn a lot about the bush. If you are not sure, you could come for a trial to see what it's like. For more information, please go to

There were plants galore on our trading table this month. One of the benefits of being a garden club member is being able to purchase, at a greatly reduced price, plants from our Trading Table. The plants are either donated by generous club members or potted surplus from garden owners. There is always such a variety & it is a great way to inexpensively expand your garden. There are plant varieties that are not often found in nurseries any more as well as old favourites. With bulb planting time just around the corner, there is always a good supply as owners thin out their own patch.

Our guest speaker this month was Tony Matson from Cut Above at Seven Hills who spoke to us about the importance of caring for your existing gardening tools and selecting the right tool for the right job.

We all had a different answer when Tony posed the question "What is the most important tool you have in your Garden"? Some cited their shears whilst others mentioned their wheelbarrow or secateurs, when In fact it is the gardener themselves. Each person is different and needs tools to suit their hand size and ability to lift weight. We all gained an insight in how to make our tasks easier and more enjoyable. Various tools were circulated to make a comparison and note the difference. It is much more comfortable to hold the right size secateurs for your hand and the difference between loppers that weighed 1kg and another 2kg was apparent. Finding the one that suits you best would certainly decrease the time it takes to get a



job done and increase pleasure in the task.

Tony spoke about the variety of materials that tools come in and the differences in materials such as steel, stainless steel and Teflon coated. Each one has different features and benefits.

On the topic of tool maintenance Tony shared his advice on how



to easily sharpen tools, make a simple cleaning mix and oil our tools to extend their life.

Many of us will be going home to evaluate our tools and give them some additional care.

Next month we are having a garden clinic where a panel consisting of Elizabeth Swane, Judy Horton and Sue Montgomery will be available to answer your questions about plants, flowers and pesky bugs. Each of them has their own specialty and they bring a wealth of knowledge to the club. Come and get that unidentified plant's name, find out how to rid your garden of those bugs and especially fungal diseases after all the rain and humidity. That flowering plant not flowering? Then ask one of our panel, it will be an interesting night.
