THSC as soon as the DA is lodged. (Keep an eye on our facebook page.) However, some residents have advised Council of breaches of the current consents of operating hours plus Boral concrete trucks over the weight limit using Post Office Road. The GPA is taking a stronger stand against this upgrade so as to prevent the batching plant being a thorn in the side of any future vision we may have for our semi-rural village. Letterbox drops are being carried out with a "Say NO to Boral" message outlining the contentious issues of dust emissions, increased truck traffic

affecting not only our and our children's health and lifestyle, but also our livelihood. Rural businesses near the Schwebel Lane plant are concerned at the devastating effect the upgrade could have on their plants, crops and resulting in their businesses being non-operational. The environmental effect could also be felt further away, with run off into our creeks and resulting in the Hawkesbury system being affected.



Friends of Fagan Park

ANZAC Day was a perfect day weatherwise, drawing large crowds to Fagan Park and many of them visiting the Museum precinct. We took our vehicles for a parade through the park, including the newly completed Farmall F14 tractor. A couple of small issues arose as you might expect on its maiden run, and these will not be difficult to fix. Our tea and coffee was popular and we actually sold out of the homemade ANZAC biscuits.

Mention was made previously of
the recent resurrection of our McDonald
diesel roller, and this was started a couple
of times and even driven a short distance up and
down to show off the rumbling behemoth that it is. After
ANZAC Day we were able to put it back in its shed after nearly 12
months.

Netherby Homestead will be closed for all of May for ceiling replacement and a complete repaint.

One of our members is close to completing the restoration of a Ba-vu pumping unit. These comprise an integrated 2-stroke engine and high pressure pump all of their own design, and were used for orchard spraying, sheep delousing (an alternative to dipping) and so on. They were manufactured in Victoria and are quite uncommon in NSW. As donated, ours was missing a few items, but we were able to acquire another to complete it.

We have just commenced work on the 1918 International Model K truck, at this stage dismantling the donor chassis.

The wheels will be a particular challenge, being solid rubber on wooden-spoked wheels (known as artillery wheels). There are few remaining people capable of re-spoking and re-rubbering these types of wheels, even though they were once common. See the attached photo of one of the rear wheels – it certainly needs some work! We really expect challenges at every turn, which is what makes a project such as this so interesting and rewarding. One notable feature however – it is 100 years old and

has been stored in the open for goodness knows how long, yet there is minimal rust, and every nut and bolt has loosened with little difficulty, a testament to the quality of materials used back then. The climate out West would also have helped of course.

The Friends of Fagan Park are on deck every Tuesday, which is our volunteering day. The museums are open to all on these days, and on the second Sunday of each month (afternoon only). We encourage visitors to ask about our projects, as well as about any of the artefacts on display. Who knows – you may become interested in joining us!

The Convict Trails Rock! (and roll)... By Susanna Mills

It is a privilege to experience the historic Convict
Trail on a bicycle. The range of distances and
terrain that a mountain bicycle can cover
extremely efficiently, means that you get
to see much more of this fascinating
trail than on foot.

Wisemans Ferry is easily accessible from any suburb North West of Galston Gorge- either via Old Northern Road, or the slow, narrow and winding River Road which hugs the course of the Hawkesbury River. Either route is a lovely drive.

On negotiating the very steep descent

into the village, drive down to the river past the golf course and get ready to ride from the park next to the ferries. In 1826, Soloman Wiseman was granted the rights to operate a punt for travellers and goods travelling via Castle Hill to St. Albans, Hunter Valley and Newcastle. In 2018 it is no different- the need is the same, but the conveyances have morphed into to a weekend parade of shiny motorcars, fabulous motor bikes, and marvellous mountain bikes! So an integral part of walking or cycling this trail, is the journey to arrive the trail head, namely the foot of Devine's Hill. You turn left along Settler's Road, and it's just 600m away, on the right.

DEVINES HILL: (1.8km) Cycling visitors have not been considered in the design of this gate, so you have to dismount, hoist

the bike up above your head and wrangle your way through the pedestrian access point walls. Devine's Hill is a 1.8km 'warm up' climb, on a wide, hardpack dirt road with exquisite views over the MacDonald River. You are now cycling on the actual road that the Convicts built from 1826-36. All along this road there are remnants of their endeavours, with modern sculptures and information plaques to take one's attention away from burning legs and lungs. A temporary reprieve at the top of the hill (where Shepherd's Gully merges with Devine's Hill) comes with yet another cycle unfriendly National Parks Gate to hoist your bicycle over.

SHEPHERD'S GULLY TO FERRY: (11km) If you are new to offroad cycling, or riding here with children of 12 and under, at the top of Devine's Hill turn left down the 2km Shepherd's Gully descent. Take time to admire the verdant, fern-lined gulley and some little-known Convict era-culverts and a small bridge. At Settlers' Road, turn sharp left and ride the 9km dirt and tarred road, back to the ferry.

DEVINES HILL TO W. COMMISSION TRACK: (10km) If you are an experienced mountain biker, you are in for 10km of rocky, very technical riding, when you turn right at the top of Devine's Hill. Bear left past the Finch's Line turn off. This section of the trail is notorious amongst all those who brave the annual Convict 100 Mtb Marathon, but riding it recreationally is an absolute pleasure! Expect to ride up and down a series of rock steps, with intermittent sections of ridgeline singletrack. 5% of this trail is so technical, that you will have to carry your bike up or down it. 95% is rideable-particularly if you have a dual suspension bike with 27.5" or 29" wheels attached and, of course, mtb skills and fitness that are on

point! Just when you are starting to wonder how long this hammering will go on for, the trail mercifully levels out and intersects with Western Commission Trail.

WESTERN COMMISSION TRACK TO FERRY:

(16km) The intersection is a good point to stop and recover. Commissioners' may be a nice dirt road, but it packs a mean punch to tired legs with six pinch climbs that you must ride before the final downhill to Wiseman's Ferry Road. It's not difficult to reach speeds of up to 70km/h, but please remember there is the occasional car coming up to the Buddhist Retreat near Ten Mile Hollow! Watch out for the third, and final bike-unfriendly gate. It is difficult to see, being at the end of a long, steep and shady section of downhill, making it a formidable hazard to the gung-ho. Rather take your time and savour the panoramic views of the Hawkesbury River Valley stretching out into blue horizons on either side of your handlebars.

FACT BOX

THUMBS DOWN: Squadrons of mosquitoes at the parking area! NP gates make cycle access difficult.

It is a shared trail, so after riding 20, 40, 70km-cyclists returning via the Convict Trail are mandated to walk their bikes 2km DOWN Devine's Hill. There is no alternative descending bike trail to the ferry, other than the circuitous 11km loop via Shepherd's Gully, or the extreme Finches Line trail. Route directions as described in the article are recommended.

THUMBS UP: Clean, well-maintained public toilets at the East Bank Park.

Excellent community support for the annual Convict 100 MTB Marathon, with its unique canoe bridge over the MacDonald River and friendly local volunteers manning the 44, 68 & 100km marathon routes.

HINTS & TIPS: Do not start your ride after 10am during summer. It gets extremely hot here.

Carry at least 2-3 litres of water, plus food if you think your ride here may be more than 2.5hours (30km)

Do not ride down to Ten Mile Hollow and beyond alone, without tools, pump, a GPS (or an unerring sense of direction). There is no mobile reception, no water and no residences. These are very remote bushland trails and if you get into difficulties you will be at serious risk.

Roads, ferries and trails in this area may be closed due to maintenance, flooding or bushfire activity, so research your trip to cycle from Wisemans Ferry accordingly.



Gravely Speaking May – Which Way?

The following verse is a very common epitaph reminding the living that death is the ultimate and inevitable end awaiting us all.

However on a gravestone in a Maryland's, USA cemetery some wag has added:

To follow you I am not content, How do I know which way you went.

The additional verse asks for directional advice of some sort from the dead. How often when we go to visit our loved ones in the cemetery do we engage in a one-sided conversation with them? To seek advice from the dead or information from past events and histories is a kind of haunting, which according to Freud, society is founded on "the voice of the dead father". In other words we are seeking fulfilment of a specific cultural moment or experience from a source which


no longer exists but which we are content in believing can provide answers to the questions we ask. French phenomenologist and philosopher Jacques Derrida called this phenomenon 'hauntology' when he argued Marxism would haunt Western society from beyond the grave in his 1993 critique Spectres of Marx. In contemporary times this concept of advice from the beyond the grave has been expanded into many forms and may be evident on gravestones where a question is posed or a comment is made which makes you think.

It becomes a priority of being and presence where the ghost is neither present nor absent, dead nor alive. This concept cannot really be explained: it just is - a 'haunting' in other

Haunting gives voice to the departed as a way of maintaining contact we innately seek to satisfy

our inner insecurities. But is it the ghost drifting about or our deep inner psyche looking for answers? Perhaps it is a disembodied manifestation of what we really want to know and hear.

Who was Betty Archdale?

Betty Archdale was quite an influence on many aspects of our local community. She first came to Australia as the Captain of the English Women's Cricket team in 1932. The team beat the Aussies in every match! After returning home to England and gaining degrees at University, she came back to Australia and was appointed headmistress of Abbotsleigh School. Later she and her brother Alex, built a mud brick house in Crosslands Rd. It took a long time but they eventually lived there.

Betty was always involved in community activities. She called a meeting to create our own local Neighbour Aid in February 1971. Over a hundred people, mostly woman, turned up to volunteer to help people in our community with transport to appointments and shopping, and to do housework etc. It took quite a while to find a "home" for our organisation. Eventually a house was acquired in the "Glade" at Galston. After alterations and additions it has now become the Community Health and Resource Centre, including a Playgroup area

When Galston High School was being built, the old Waddell Cottage was in a deplorable state and was to be demolished. Betty saw the building as a valuable historical resource, and formed a committee to raise money for its restoration, including a new timber shingled roof. Betty will always be remembered as a dynamic person who made a significant contribution to the establishment of the local Neighbour Aid and the preservation of Waddell Cottage. She died in January 2000.

Play equipment for **New Hope School**

Member for Hornsby Matt Kean MP was pleased to provide New Hope School with the funds for new play equipment thanks to a Community Building Partnership grant of \$30,000.

The program assists community groups to make upgrades to their facilities, purchase equipment or provide essential repairs. New Hope School is one of 15 community groups who will benefit from Community Building Partnership grants from Mr Kean.

"It is with great pride that I am able to assist New Hope School to build new play equipment for the students," Mr Kean said.

"The NSW State Government is committed to providing funds to community groups for large scale projects like this upgrade at the school," he said.

New Hope School is within Pacific Hills Christian School and caters for students with a moderate level of Intellectual delay or who have an Autism Spectrum Disorder.

The new play equipment will replace the veggie and herb garden which will be moved to another location within the school.

Mr Kean recently visited New Hope with Principal Dr Boyce to speak to the students about the new equipment.

"I met with Finlay and she is happy to hear there will be new play equipment for her and her friends to enjoy every lunchtime," Mr Kean said.

Parents Urged to Get Active With Kids For Better Family Health

Parents are being called on to get active to set an example and help turn around the poor health outcomes of the nation's children by leading researcher, Dr Natasha Schranz, of the University of SA.



Less than one in five Australian children is meeting the national recommendation of 60 minutes of huff and puff activity every day, despite an increase in the numbers playing sport.

Dr Schranz is the co-chair of Active Healthy Kids Australia which produces a biennial Report Card on children's physical activity levels and has twice assigned a D- rating. Their next report is due later this year.

She said children needed daily activity to reduce the risk of health conditions such as obesity and Type II diabetes.

Dr Schranz is among a national group of experts, led by the Australian Health Policy Collaboration, behind a new report, Active Travel: Pathways to a Healthy Future, which recommends "active travel" for school children as an urgent priority.

The report calls for government action to help communities, schools and parents support their children in active travel such as walking or riding a bike or scooter to school.

Harold Scruby, chairman and CEO of the Pedestrian Council of Australia, said: "Physical inactivity is a major risk factor for so many chronic diseases that can affect our kids at different stages of their life, including mental illness, cardiovascular disease and cancer. You have to invest in regular physical activity in order to get a dividend. It's never free."

"We really need teachers, parents, carers and the community at large to get behind this event and its objectives. The best exercise for all of us is regular walking, because you can build it into your daily routine."





Pile burns



If you are planning a pile burn soon and are unsure over the rules, as a reminder permits for pile burns are required ALL year-round.

Please make sure you contact your appropriate council for advice on a permit. NSW RFS Fire Control and your neighbours must also be notified, and piles must adhere to the approved standards.

Also, note that during the 'Bush fire Danger Period' your local Rural Fire Brigade may also need to inspect the pile before a permit is issued.

Hills residents need to contact The Hills District Rural Fire Service directly on 9654 1244 for information on how to obtain a fire permit. Hornsby residents can contact Hornsby Council on 9847 6853 for information, advice, and to apply for a permit. The council will help guide you through the process of approval and liaise with the Rural Fire Service on your behalf.

Hazard Reduction Season

The cooler weather provides better conditions to perform hazard reductions. A hazard reduction may use a controlled burn as one way of preparing for future bush fires.

While hazard reduction burning is strategically planned to minimise the potential impact of smoke on public health, some members of the community may need to take action to mitigate the risks of smoke from hazard reduction burning by planning ahead.

You can get updated information on where and when hazard reduction burns will be taking place by going towww.rfs.nsw.gov.au and selecting the 'Fire Information' tab.



Members of our Brigade are currently busy almost every weekend with hazard reductions. Although the smokey air is unpleasant, burning the bush to reduce the fuel load is the most efficient way of reducing the risk of future bushfires. The RFS employs strategies to minimise harm, opting to carry out low, medium or high intensity burns by modulating flame heights. Sometimes we aim to only burn the dead ground level material. In addition, hazard reductions are carried out in a mosaic pattern so that wild life can move to unburnt areas for food and shelter. This smoke was from our Wildthorn Avenue HR on Wednesday 16th.

GEC held our second Horsemanship Practice Day for 2018 on Tuesday 17h April. The day was well attended and members and visitors had an opportunity to have some fun with their horses. The planned activities included horses squeezing through, over and around obstacles while 'online' or 'in hand'. Members had the opportunity to develop their horse human communication utilising the Seven Games developed and taught by Pat Parelli. (parelli.com) The games and activities helped build confidence in the horses to be around man-made obstacles that are not in a horse's natural environment. Safety is the number one priority for a horse! Our horsemanship activities are designed to help horses feel safer in a human environment.

The Reiki information evening with Linda McGregor at the Galston Club on 19 April was most interesting, and the attendees found it fascinating to learn about the Japanese technique for stress reduction and relaxation that also promotes healing. It is administered by "laying on hands" and is based on the idea that an unseen "life force energy" flows through us and is what causes us to be alive.

On Saturday 21 April, popular local 4* eventer, show jumper and coach, Keira Byrnes, ran another very successful show jumping clinic for the Club. Twenty-five participants booked in for small group lessons at heights ranging from X-rails to 1m. 



5.The fruit of the Spirit's work in developing the character of Christ in lives is to produce fruit which actually are the characteristics of Christ Himself. Paul calls these the 'fruit of the Spirit'. They are not natural for us. Only the Spirit of God can produce them in our lives.

In nature some fruits take a long time to form and ripen. Others may grow quickly. That may be true spiritually also, depending on our allowing the Spirit to do His work.

Each of the nine characteristics listed in Galations 5 deserves our careful study. The first three refer to our inner life. The second three are linked to our outward conduct. The final three refer to our continuing attitude.

These characteristics of Christ will grow in our lives as we allow the Holy Spirit to produce them. It may take time, but growth is an essential part of Christian experience.

The clear command of God: Be filled with the Spirit.

Every believer is indwelt by the Holy Spirit (1 Corinthians 12:13). Every believer is sealed by the Holy Spirit (Ephesians 4:30). But what is most needed is that every believer should be filled by the Holy Spirit (Ephesians 5:18).

This is not only the personal need of our heart (if we are honest), but is the command of God. **Ephesians 5:18** contains two commands: 'Do not get drunk on wine, ...Instead be filled with Spirit'. We are horrified by the possibility of the first part- that we should ever become drunk. Are we as horrified by the possibility of our not fulfilling the second part?

Make The Power Source

As our homes are increasingly becoming smart homes, we have phones that control our lights, our power, can turn on alarms, tv's or the oven. We can play music through speakers throughout our house. We can open and close doors and gates. We can even walk into our temperature controlled environment as we get home from work.

Wow. Isn't it incredible. Are you not blown away by the advances of technology.

Yet, with all this incredible futuristic living it still relies on one source to drive it all - power.

Without power what use is a mobile phone? Or a television? Even a fridge becomes no more than a cupboard.

Without power many of our smart appliances are rendered useless or unfit to fulfill their purpose.

Isn't that also true of us?

Smart people walking around with gifts, talents and capabilities but rendered virtually useless because we are not plugged in.

"But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." - Acts 1:8

All of us are given special gifts and talents, yet not all of us have plugged in to use them.

Do we charge up in the Holy Spirit? Do we plug into the Word? Do we connect in prayer, worship and fellowship?

"For I know the plans I have for you, declares the Lord, plans to prosper you, to give you hope and a future".

- Jeremiah 29:11

Yet we can't operate on no power, or even efficiently on half

A torch almost out of battery is of little use when suddenly found in the dark. The purpose of a torch only comes to the fore when it's called upon in the dark.

So if during it's hour of need it offers at best a slight glimmer it hasn't fulfilled its purpose. It should shine bright!

When a Christian is called on the hour of need, will you be ready? Will you shine bright or be a mere reflection of what could be?

"You are the light of the world". Yet how can we fulfill that light if we are not plugged in. If we are not connected.

Recharge in the Word, in prayer, in the Spirit, recharge in worship and fellowship. Connect into the Father and you will receive power enabling you to fulfill the plans and purpose God has for you.

A Realistic Hope

Last month I talked about hope being an essential ingredient of a meaningful life, and over the next few months I want to look at three vital questions relating to the nature of hope.

The first important question is this: Is our hope realistic?

This month the biggest sporting event of the year will begin in Russia. The 2018 World Cup soccer tournament will feature 32 international soccer teams representing all the continents of the world. Each country including Australia will enter this competition with high hopes of glory and success. For some countries, there will be the expectation to win the World Cup trophy; for others, there will be the hope that they produce respectable performances.

In 1978 Scotland qualified for the World Cup in Argentina. At the time the Scots had a skilful and talented team, and they were expected to do well. However, expectations were whipped up to such an extent that many supporters believed that they could actually win the trophy.

What happened? The record books show that Scotland were knocked out in the first round and finished bottom of their group. If that wasn't bad enough, the team went home in disgrace because one of the players failed a drugs test. The Scottish hopes of national glory turned into a bitter disappointment.

Why did things go so badly wrong? There were many factors at work, but with hindsight we can see that Scotland's hopes were unrealistic. They were a good team, but not as gifted as they thought.

When it comes to hope, we need to ask whether our hopes are realistic. We need to dream, but our hopes need to be grounded in reality if they are to be fulfilled. If not, we are going to experience many disappointments. In life, limitless expectations will usually lead to endless frustrations.

The hope of Christianity is realistic because it depends on Jesus, not us. The hope of life beyond death is realistic because Jesus is the Resurrection and the Life (John 11:25, 26). He defeated death and has power over the grave (Revelation 1:17, 18). The hope of heaven and a brand new world is realistic because Jesus has promised to return and establish a new heavens and a new earth, and He wants us to be there with Him (John 14:1-3; Revelation 21:1-5).

The Christian hope is realistic because it depends upon the person, power and promises of Jesus.

From there we went to the Secret Garden Nursery at the Richmond WS University, where many plants were purchased and we wandered around the markets that were there fundraising for Norwest Disability Services, who also benefit from money raised at out Open Garden Weekend. Despite the showers of rain, it was a great turn out and a great day - especially the Devonshire tea -Yum!

There is a definite chill in the air now, and it has started to feel like autumn at last. Although it was quite a cold night for our May meeting, it was good to see so many members come along and almost fill the community hall room. Begonias – we see them everywhere in gardens, a little bedding plant that we don't really think about much, but know they are there and give a great display of colour. But like many plants that have been around for what seems forever, there is more to this humble plant than we could imagine. Ross Bolwell from Bloomin' Greenery Nursery on Annangrove Rd showed us the many varieties of begonias that are available, many that have been developed here in Australia. There seems to be a begonia for every climate and they range in size from the small bedding

begonia to the taller varieties, as well as trailing ones that do well in pots to even smaller ground covers. Their uses range from being a beautiful feature plant, great fill

in plants among trees and shrubs. The
"Undulata" varieties make a good
hedge, they will take being planted
around pools, the sheltered
areas around the house and of
course in pots. Begonias hate

the frost and wet roots, being a more tropical plant they do well when the temperature Is around a constant 12-30 degrees Celsius, and can be planted in full shade to full sun (as long as they are in afternoon ade).

Biodynamic Farm at Warrah Society

Warrah Biodynamic Farm recently hosted Warrah's annual Harvest Festival. About 80 guests, including Warrah's clients, School students, staff and visitors, gathered in the autumn sun for musical performances and hearty organic soup.

On the Farm we welcome the cooler weather and a decent drop of rain, finally! Crops in the ground include beetroot, broad beans, cabbage, carrot, chard, coriander, fennel, kale, leeks, lettuce, pak choi, peas, radish, rocket and snow peas. Our winter green manure of vetch, oats, peas, lupins and rye will be going in soon too. Those visiting may notice the netting on our leafy greens. This keeps the ducks, eager for a biodynamic feast, at bay.

We recently planted 20 citrus trees - late navels, mandarins, limes and lemons. Unfortunately our existing orange trees are very low on fruit this year. In fact, they have now flowered 3 times - most recently just last month - so everything has been thrown out by the long hot summer.

Our farm shop stocks our produce grown here in Dural, but we supplement it with Australian grown biodynamic and organic fruit and veg. The sweet potatoes, kiwi fruit, pumpkins, cucumbers we have on our shelves currently are from within NSW, while the best broccoli, cauliflower and cabbage are coming to us from Queensland.

Mondays and Thursdays are abuzz as we harvest produce, receive deliveries and pack orders for various destinations – co-ops, box scheme customers, restaurants, and our own Warrah client houses, both on and off site.

Our range of groceries is increasing as we commence a shop expansion. The hottest trend in organic and natural right now has to be hemp – flour and seeds are making their way into all manner of items.

Rainfall recorded period 17/04/18 to 15/05/18 is 22mm.




