Greater Sydney Commission names our Rural Areas as Significant

The North District draft report has just been released. It states: There is an agricultural cluster in the North District – a multi-use horticulture cluster, with vegetables and fruit trees – around Middle Dural, Galston and Arcadia. This cluster extends into the Hills Shire in the West Central District. Nurseries – both outdoor and undercover – are the most economically productive form of agriculture in the North District, while cut-flower and stone fruit production are the other main agricultural activities.

There are also a number of extractive industry operations in the North District, around Maroota, producing construction materials such as sand. These industries are vital as part of the overall supply of construction materials to support growth and urban development across Greater Sydney.

It further states in the Sustainability

Priority 8 section:

Urban development in the Metropolitan Rural Area is not consistent with the protection of the Area's existing values. Conversion of land to urban residential development is not necessary in the short to medium term given the supply of land for housing in other parts of Greater Sydney, and conversion of rural land to suburban development does not form part of the housing targets that have been defined for the District or individual local government areas.

The Galston Gala on 20 November was a triumph. The audience was abuzz about the musical pleasures from the lineup of international performers - piano, organ, strings - many of whom just happen to be Hornsby and Hills residents!



From 'The Arrival of the Queen of Sheba' overture to an 'Adios Muchachos' encore music included Bach, Vivaldi, Chopin, Liszt - all Classical greats. Folky contrasts included Hungarian, Spanish and Argentinian Piazzolla tangos.

Violist and Artistic Director, Robert, thinks the formula succeeds for many reasons. "The crowd likes the mix of instruments and sounds, the mix of composers and styles, the mix of hearing music they know but also other music they've not heard before". "The relaxed, chatty approach from the performers, easy parking, the great acoustic in the Church and a very tempting afternoon tea all seem to impress the audience."

Concerts scheduled for 2017 will offer similar variety. Concert pianist Bernard Walz, known to many as Director of the Good Old Days Concerts at Sydney Town Hall, will present 'One Man and a Baby Grand' on 19 February. Pacific Opera Young Artists will perform 30 April, a return to the Hills after their Opera by the Lake spectaculars at Fagan Park in years past. Organ and brass will feature on 30 July followed by the acclaimed Lurline Chamber Orchestra on 17 September.

The series will close with another end-of-year Gala 22 October - piano, organ, strings, voice, guitar - to preview 2018.

Have you got a bush fire survival plan?

The summer fire season is well and truly upon us. This month the Galston crew were kept busy assisting numerous local brigades with fires in Cessnock, while multiple other fires raged along the NSW north coast.

It serves as an important reminder to get ready for a bush fire near you. By taking 20

minutes with your family to discuss what you'll do during a fire, you could save their lives, as well as your home.

There are four simple steps to get ready for a bush fire:

Step 1: Discuss what to do if a bush fire threatens your home

Many households find that having a discussion over dinner works best as everybody is together and focussed.

Step 2: Prepare your home and get it ready for bush fire season

There are simple things you can do around your home to prepare it for a bush fire, like keeping the grass low and having a cleared area around your home.

Step 3: Know the bush fire alert levels

If there is a fire in your area you will find its alert level on the NSW RFS website and in the 'Fires Near Me' app. You need to keep track of the alert level so you know what you should do.

Step 4: Keep all the bush fire information numbers, websites and the smartphone app

In a bush fire, it's important that you stay up to date on conditions in your area.

It was great to be able to assist Hillside Brigade with their Firewise for Kids program. The students and staff visited the Hillside Fire Station for a fun and informative program. The answers to some of the questions showed just how well the students were listening and how highly they rate the importance of the risk of bush fire is in this area.

Operation Readiness - WE ARE PREPARED, ARE YOU?

It's that time of year again when all our vehicles and equipment are checked and serviced, ready for the fire season. And it's time too for you to check your fire safety equipment is all in good working order and your home and property are prepared.

It's also time to check your Fire Survival Plan and know your triggers for leaving early. However, as we have seen in other areas in recent weeks, fire can spread very quickly and there may not be time to leave. The first message you may get is: "Seek shelter as the fire arrives". A well-prepared property may be your safest option.

Stay Aware and Stay Safe!

Watch the FDI (Fire Danger Indicator) sign and be ready to put your plan into action. Use the Fires Near Me app to keep track of

fire activity near you. Know what the

Dural and District Historical Society Galston Gorge Road

Margaret McKinley, with reference to Les Geelan's "Memories of Value, 1819-1986"

Recently a visitor to History Cottage came in to enquire "Why did they ever build the Galston Gorge Road?" The answer requires some understanding of the times a hundred and twenty five years ago.

The railway to Hornsby Junction from Strathfield was opened in 1886. When the rail service commenced many Galston people going to Sydney would walk via a well defined track which was created through the gorge using a couple of logs put in place to cross the creeks. The Dural- Galston area had become the largest producer of citrus in Australia, and the orchardists wanted the easiest way to get their produce to market. So a cart road to rail seemed to be the answer.

The Government authorised £3,000 to construct two Macdonald Truss bridges to cross Tunk's and Berowra Creeks. These bridges were built before the road was made by manhandling the huge timber beams over

the edge of the gorge with ropes and pullies. The bridge over Berowra Creek was severely damaged by a flood and replaced by a concrete bridge in 1937. Road construction was carried out by the Department of Works with unemployed men during the economic downturn of the 1890's. Some sections of the road

were undertaken by private individuals and were known by their names such as Murphy and Dillon. Imagine building that road with just pick and shovel and horse and cart. No bulldozers, diggers and trucks then! Initially the road was not fenced but that was done several years later. The Armguard fence was installed only a few years ago, and the road was sealed within the memory of some local residents. The road was officially opened by Hon. Jacob Garrard M.L.A.on 18th March, 1893, at a ceremony presided over by George Hudson. All this was 13 years before Hornsby Shire was established in 1906.

Sam Fagan was very proud of an unbroken fruit processing and marketing record he established and also his

introduction of Emperor mandarins to the lucrative New Zealand market. In order to meet deadlines, on more than one occasion he had fruit pulled early in the morning, packed into export cases, transported by horse team lorry to Hornsby Station, railed to Darling Harbour, loaded onto a ship which passed through the Sydney Heads before midnight en route to Auckland, an eighteen hour exercise. Another record was set in 1894 by Will McFayden when he rode his pushbike from Sydney to Galston, via the Gorge, in 2 ¼ hours

Drinking troughs for the horses were another important feature of this road. Four of these were spring fed and always full of cool water. Several of these are still there, if you know where to look.

The History Cottage will be closed from 4pm on Wed. 14th December until 1pm on 18th January, 2017. All the members of the Dural Historical Society wish you a very happy

Christmas, and invite you to come to the Cottage (402 Galston Rd, next to the Cenotaph) and find out more about the history of our district.

Over the intervening years the audiences totalled more than ten thousand. Generally, patrons were from surrounding suburbs but some dedicated enthusiasts travelled from the Hunter, the lower Blue Mountains and inner Sydney suburbs. Often patrons brought their overseas visitors, who expressed their surprise and admiration.

A wide variety of music has been performed by national and international singers and players. Local schools were sponsored to send some of their students to experience and talk to talented performers.

During all this time the concerts, run as a co-operative, were able to maintain their financial viability without any grants or sponsorship.

Margaret and Michael tapped into a community desire for quality music. For many, no longer able to travel into the City, the local performances were a much enjoyed afternoon. It was therefore with a heavy heart that Margaret and Michael made the decision they did.

Crash Card Spreading throughout the State

The roll-out of the motorcycle CRASH Card has been highly successful, with the first 10,000 already being distributed.

The small card is carried in the helmet of riders, providing vital information to emergency services at the scene of a motorcycle accident.

It has been produced by Hornsby Shire Council, inspired by a similar initiative in the United Kingdom, and is supported by NSW Ambulance, NSW Police Force and Fire and Rescue NSW.

"Council's staff are always on the lookout for new initiatives that will help our community and they don't get much better than this," Hornsby Shire Mayor Steve Russell said.

"Of course, this doesn't just benefit local residents but offers great value for motorcycle riders throughout New South Wales."

Another 39,000 cards have now been printed, with significant improvements based on feedback from riders and medical professionals.

The updated card is now smaller in size, with a plastic sleeve to protect it from moisture, while riders are asked if they are a registered organ donor.

"Perhaps the greatest signal of the initiative's success has been the number of motorcycle clubs that have contacted Council looking for cards to share among their members," Mayor Russell said.

"Meanwhile, Tasmania's Government contacted us and is keen to roll a similar card out across their state, so we've shared all our files and artwork with them."

Dear Santa.... from Hornsby Ku ring gai Hospital

Around 1200 babies are born each year at your local hospital, and they're asking for donations to help ensure safe deliveries for the years ahead

Hornsby Ku ring gai Hospital has launched its Christmas appeal and needs community and local businesses support to make its Yuletide wish list a reality.

Hospital fundraiser Liesl McGrath said: "We run a community appeal every Christmas and have always found our local community to be a strong supporter of the hospital.

"We're asking people to think about whether they're able to make a donation to our Christmas Appeal which helps us buy extra equipment for our hospital. Last year we raised

around \$30,000 which was spent on extra paediatric equipment for operating theatres, a wonderful community effort.

"The hospital has developed this wish list for 2016 and we hope the community appeal will go some way to helping with these purchases."

Top of the list for this year's appeal is a foetal heart monitor for the maternity ward, costing \$40,000, to assist in the safe delivery of the 1,200 babies coming into the world at Hornsby every year.

"This monitor allows data to be transmitted wirelessly, so mums can move around all they want during labour while knowing their baby's heart rate is being accurately monitored. It also provides comprehensive information about mum – the level of oxygen in her blood, her blood pressure and heart rate.

"And if we raise more than we need for the foetal heart rate monitor, there are also other items we'd also like to purchase," says McGrath.

These include a specialised stretcher for the emergency department. "This trolley is ideal for patients requiring imaging as the patient doesn't need to move from the trolley, which means less manual handling for nursing staff." Cost: \$7,000.

Next on the Hospital's wish list is a standup patient lifter, which makes it physically easier for nursing and physio staff to help patients, and also increases patient mobility. "The lifter enables stepping and walking exercises, and it mobilises

patients during everyday transfers such as for a shower and toileting." Cost: \$12,500.

And finally, an ECG machine for cardiac rehabilitation - it monitors and assists in diagnosing cardiac heart function by identifying rhythm problems that can lead to clotting problems. Cost: \$9,500.

The highly-specialised foetal heart monitor the hospital is aiming to purchase is like the one which helped Turramurra mum Cymbeline Johnson through her double delivery of twins Xavier and Sierra in the maternity unit in October.

"Having twins makes labour riskier so it was comforting to have this monitor," Cymbeline said. "It gave feedback to my husband and me, not just the medical staff. I know the importance of this monitor and I hope the appeal raises enough money to buy a new one."

Bio Banking - Arcadia Park and Galston Park

Hornsby Council is proposing to create Bio Banking sites at Arcadia and Galston Park sites.

The purpose of creating a Biobanking agreement is to provide funding to manage the land for biodiversity conservation and allow for public enjoyment. This is done through registering a Biobanking agreement on the property title to ensure biodiversity is protected and managed forever. The ongoing funding for management would be provided from the sale of biodiversity credits generated on the land. Biodiversity credits are a way of putting a value on our native flora and fauna. These credits are placed on the market and purchased to offset the loss of vegetation through development.

Galston Park Bushland forms part of an important green corridor linking private land to the west and Berowra Valley National Park, to the east.

The public notice period is from 1-28 November 2016. Late submissions maybe accepted.

Biobanking Agreement site: The proposal is to establish an approximately 96 hectare biobank site in Galston Park Bushland. Figure 1 shows a map of the proposed Biobank site, including Council owned and managed lands and an aerial photo of the surrounding local area. The land is made up of Council owned community land.

The reserves are comprised of the following lots and addresses shown in **Figure 1**:

Lot and DP: Lot 2 DP 202545, Lot 1 DP 568238, Lot 1 DP 567189, Lot 204 DP 854878 and Lot 7 DP 240287 and Arcadia Park

Approximately 14 hectare biobank site in Arcadia Park Bushland. **Figure 2** shows a map of the proposed Biobank site, including Council owned and managed lands and an aerial photo of the surrounding local area. The land is made up of Council owned community land (Lot 761) and Operational land (Lot 3).

The reserves are comprised of the following lots and addresses shown in **Figure 2**:

Lot and DP: Part Lot 761 D.P. 1121447 and Part Lot 3 D.P. 618142

It is proposed that the Biobank site be limited to the natural area and will exclude the transmission line easements, other easements or services and access trails traversing the land.



Figure 3 - How to establish Biobank site

Biobanking within the reserves will not impact on this area but will improve the site's amenity through increased biodiversity (weed) management.

Landowners can create biobank sites (Figure 3 - how to establish Bio Bank site). The proposed Biobank site will be established through the placing of a Biobanking Agreement (under Part 7A of the Threatened Species Conservation Act 1995), over the two reserves. Biobanking Agreements are a type of permanent conservation covenant in which landowners are paid to protect and manage bushland and:

- limit what a landholder may or may not do on a Biobank site
- are registered on the land's title and bind future landholders, and
- create a right in favour of the Minister to enforce the agreement and hold the landholder to the obligations contained in it.

Greater Sydney Commission Draft Plan North District: (West Central covers Hills Shire Areas)

Sustainability Priority 8:

Discourage urban development in the Metropolitan Rural Area

Urban development in the Metropolitan Rural Area is not consistent with the protection of the Area's existing values. Conversion of land to urban residential development is not necessary in the short to medium term given the supply of land for housing in other parts of Greater Sydney, and conversion of rural land to suburban development does not form part of the housing targets that have been defined for the District or individual local government areas.

In general, urban development in the Metropolitan Rural Area will not be supported unless the relevant planning authority has undertaken strategic planning in accordance with Sustainability Priorities 9 and 10.

Relevant planning authorities should not support planning proposals affecting land currently within a RU (rural) or E (environmental) zone unless:

- these are in areas identified in a regional plan or a district plan as urban investigation areas
- these also form part of, or are identified as a result of, strategic planning in accordance with Sustainability Priorities 9 and 10.

Sustainability Priority 9

Consider environmental, social and economic values when planning for the Metropolitan Rural Area

Agriculture and primary industries are essential to Greater Sydney and to the North District's economy. They need to be planned and protected to avoid their transition to higher and better uses (in financial terms) such as suburban residential development.

In planning for the Metropolitan Rural Area, the relevant planning authority should undertake their own review of land use activities in the context of environmental, economic and social values, and consider our research regarding the multiple values and activities in their District to better understand how they are operating, the range of uses operating within them, their interdependencies, key constraints and opportunities to their effective operation and evolution.

On this basis, when planning for the Metropolitan Rural Area in the North District, relevant planning authorities should consider how to:

• provide greater certainty with regards to built form outcomes in and around villages

- articulate the different landscape and heritage values and character of rural areas, with different planning and development controls
- clarify the what the future should be for rural lands to prevent speculation and protect against encroachment conserve Aboriginal cultural heritage

Sustainability Priority 10:

Provide for rural residential development while protecting the values of the Metropolitan Rural Area Rural landscapes provide opportunities for housing in rural towns and villages, as well as rural residential living that is already dispersed throughout the Metropolitan Rural Area.

Any plans to expand rural towns and villages must first consider how these places fit in the landscape and how their valued characteristics can be protected and extended sympathetically in order to optimise their cultural and economic potential. This will involve analysis of the key characteristics of these towns and villages as part of a designled approach.

Consideration of further subdivision for rural residential development should be approached in a similar way, with careful consideration of siting, impacts and potential to improve and ensure ongoing maintenance of biodiversity, ecological, scenic and productive values. Relevant planning authorities should adopt a design-led approach to planning for localities that:

- considers siting and design principles for rural residential development that conserves the values identified in the report on considerations for district planning in the Metropolitan Rural Area
- considers restrictions on additional rural residential development that may be affected by existing or future rural and agricultural activity
- considers setbacks and defines appropriate buffers for rural activities
- investigates and develops innovative approaches to conserve and manage biodiversity, habitat and scenic landscapes.

Councils should liaise with the Commission to develop design-led approaches for the Metropolitan Rural Area and in the first instance utilise the design approaches outlined in the NSW Government's draft Architecture and Urban Design Policy, *Better Placed* (October 2016). How these matters have been taken into account is to be demonstrated in any relevant planning proposal.



South Dural Development - Community Meeting Cherrybrook

On 26th November, a community meeting was held at the Cherrybrook Community Centre to allow residents to learn more about the proposed development and to hear speakers from the Cherrybrook Residents Association and representatives from RIPA (Residents Infrastructure and Planning Alliance). The meeting was MC'd by Greens representative, Emma Heyde.

Over 580 residents attended, which filled the hall and overflowed into the entrance area of the Centre. Also in the audience were Federal MP Julian Leeser, State MP's Matt Kean and Damien Tudehope, Councillors Robert Browne and Deputy Mayor Michael Hutchence from Hornsby Shire Council.

A slide show of graphs and facts were presented. These included some interesting points:

- 1. A plan showing landholders who had allowed Fauna and Flora Reports to be conducted on their properties and those who had not. There was a much greater proportion of landholders who had allowed these reports. An assumption was made, therefore, that the landholders who had refused access to their properties for the Fauna and Flora Peports were prodevelopment, those who had not, were happy with the current zoning. The plan clearly showed a majority who appeared to be happy with the current zoning.
- 2. Although the development was in the Hornsby Shire Council area, the speakers advised that when a Hills Shire Councillor reviewed the proposed re-zoning, they were of the opinion that although the current DA was for 2,900 houses, the re-zoning could allow up to 20,000 homes. This fact met with gasps from the audience.

- **3.** The South Dural rural area is not in a designated growth area in the NSW Government's Plan for Growing Sydney.
- 4. The recent release of the Greater Sydney Commission plans for North District notes that "there is an agricultural cluster in the North District - a multi-use horticultural cluster with vegetables and fruit trees around Middle Dural, Dural, Galston and Arcadia. This cluster extends into the Hills Shire in the West Central District. Nurseries, both outdoor and undercover, are the most economically productive form of agriculture in the North District, while cut-flower and stone fruit production are the other main agricultural activities. The report goes on to point out that these areas need to be supported and protected. Again, the speakers noted that the South Dural development was not in line with the proposed draft plans from these recently released reports.
- **5.** Environmental Reports noted the presence of a number of protected and endangered fauna and tree species.
- 6. Traffic the lack of an integrated road network to support the increase in vehicle movements. This point raised claps and cheers from the audience who clearly were very concerned about how all the extra cars were going to fit into an already congested road system. Suggested proposals to upgrade roads caused laughter in the audience due to previously 'promised' upgrades.
- 7. What benefit is there to our community in this development other than delivering a large profit to the developers?

Ultimately the community were advised 'if you do not want this development, then you need to voice your concerns by 2nd December to Hornsby Council'.

Think of the elderly these holidays

Christmas and the summer holidays are a special time to spend together as a family, especially for grandparents, parents, neighbours or friends who live alone. According to the latest figures, one quarter of older people live alone – 69% are women and 31% men.

When you get together for the fun of the holiday season it's a good opportunity to observe if grandma or grandpa or other elderly family are managing well. Look for any changes that might mean they need some help around the house or to get out and about. It's a great time to have those critical conversations - many older people are reluctant to plan or get advice for their possible future care needs. This leaves many families in the dark about their elderly relative's preferences, and adds significant stress if a crisis happens and decisions need to be made quickly.

Getting care at home when the first signs appear gives everyone peace of mind and often helps older

family members to remain happy and independent in their own home for much longer.

To work out if loved ones need a little helping hand, check these five keys areas and talk to them about the best solution:

Home safety

Any stairs, slippery tiles, high shelves and cupboards, cluttered walkways, slopes, loose carpet and rugs and uneven surfaces can become trip or fall hazards. A professional assessment by an occupational therapist can advise the appropriate safety measures and recommend the right assistive equipment and accessibility solutions – including handrails, chair-lifts to navigate stairs and walking aides.

• Early signs of Alzheimer's

The signs include cognitive changes such as difficulty processing information, remembering simple items or tasks, and concentrating. There are also emotional and physical signs too, including changes to their personal care and mood. Early intervention can help reduce the symptoms.

Decreasing hygiene or personality changes

While physical and emotional changes can be an early symptom of dementia, they are also linked to depression. Social isolation is one of the biggest concerns for older

Health concerns

Many health conditions can be easily managed at home, provided that the person takes prescribed medication correctly, gets exercise and eats well. Fresh food and healthy meals can be delivered or prepared at home by an in-home carer.

• Loss of driving confidence

Many things can affect driving confidence, which is not easily restored. Without transport, simple things like shopping, getting to appointments or social engagements become very difficult. Find out what transport is available in the community or ask your local home-care provider about its mobility services.

Older family members who want to remain independent and healthy at home can take advantage of in-home care to assist with everyday living, jobs around the house and outings to the shops, appointments or social visits. Keep pesky bugs at bay with Insect repellent plants

Mosquitoes, flies and other insects irritate us at the best of times, but during Sydney's hot and humid summers when we spend so much time outside, these critters seem hell-bent on spoiling our fun - their sole mission is to drive us to distraction! There are of course various products on the market to keep them at bay but we must remember that these invariably contain toxic chemicals that poison our soils, our water, our wildlife, our plants and ourselves, so I'd like to encourage you to use natural methods of pest control.

Those plants most commonly used for their repellent properties are ones that contain "volatile

oils", which usually means that when the foliage or flowers are crushed or brushed against, they release strong odours, some pleasant, some not so pleasant. Volatile oils work more effectively in warmer weather and in humid weather even more so – great new for us Sydneysiders!

The oils of these plants are extracted to make essences that can be used for many different purposes including natural insect repellents. If your growing space for plants is limited, try this easy homemade natural spray: put 2 tablespoons of white wine vinegar in a half a litre of water then add Citronella, Peppermint and Eucalyptus Oils (about 8 drops of each). Spray around the areas you'll be using the most – the barbeque and dining areas and the places the kids play in. If using oil extracts



such as these, do buy good quality oils and essences from a reputable health food store and ask questions about the safety of the product for human use and also around your pets.

Using insect repellent plants is about keeping a better balance in your garden. By using the natural properties of certain plants we create a more natural ecosystem for the plants, soil, good bugs and bacteria that make for a healthier environment.

Insect repellent plants work by using odours to confuse and deter insects. Simple factors like breezes, proximity

and quantities of certain plants will be influential in their success to repel. Sometimes it is simply brushing past a plant or watering it at a certain time of the day that will cause the odours to be released. Here are just a few common plants available right now that I recommend you use to keep you sane in the garden this summer: Lavender, Rosemary, Geraniums, Nasturtiums, Marigolds, Chrysanthemums, Catnip, Basil, Lemon Thyme, Garlic, Coriander, Oregano, Mint - all are lovely to look at or great to eat – some you can do both with!

So, not only can you look forward to a more relaxing summer, you can enjoy the delicious scents and colourful flowers that these hardworking plants produce naturally!

KU Galston Preschool News...

Wow, who can believe that it is almost Christmas! This term saw us celebrating Children's Week and holding our first coffee morning where families were invited to spend the morning engaged in activities with their children whilst sharing a coffee. We encouraged families to draw a picture with their children showing something that they valued about our preschool program and our commitment to



providing high quality care and education. We have finalised the drawings and are organising to have our book printed. It was very well attended and we look forward hosting another morning soon.

Recently the NSW Government announced an additional \$85 million in funding to community preschools across NSW who are meeting the 600 hours per annum National Partnership Agreement. This funding will be available to 4 and 5 year olds, plus any 3 year olds from low income and/ or Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander families. The good news is that fees are set to drop by up to 30% for eligible families and we will be increasing our operating hours in 2017 to 8.00-3.30pm. This means that high quality education and care will be more affordable for families in the local community.

We are excited to announce that we have been successful in receiving a \$5000 grant from The Bendigo Bank in Galston. We will be using these funds to replace the softfall in our outdoor environment. We would like to thank the Bendigo Bank for their kind and generous donation and their commitment to supporting local not for profit organisations such as KU Galston Preschool.

Over the years the Canteen and Uniform Shop facility at Galston Public School had aged. The P&C were aware of its ailing condition and had started to make plans for a refurbishment. This need became a necessity earlier this year when the Council inspector could no longer ignore some elements of disrepair.

This was always going to be a big job, but one we really wanted to complete as a single project, rather than several smaller ones which would cause ongoing disruption to the school. But one single project meant lots of cupcake dollars, and we simply couldn't manage that on our own. We needed to source funding from outside organisations.

We worked on this over several months and in July this year all services were suspended as the complete refurbishment of our facility went ahead. In the end, the project cost in excess of \$66,000. The school P&C Association were able to finance over half of this and we thank the parents and families at the

To help meet the challenges of the 21st century, Galston High School is always striving to ensure we deliver outstanding education through best teaching practice. We know we need to equip our students for the world of tomorrow where they will require research, problemsolving and critical thinking skills. They will need to work independently and as part of a team. One of the key requirements of the new library design was the need for



flexible learning spaces with the integration of new technology. This is now flowing through to our classrooms where we have been redesigning a number of spaces to be more conducive to collaboration. Technology classes in Year 7 have been exploring different ways to use the cloud to share and exchange ideas and class sets of chromebooks and the reintroduction of the BYOD (Bring Your Own Device) program has seen the increased use of cloud based tools such as google apps for education and O365. Project based learning through our 20% Project is currently being trialed in 8X where students are highly engaged and excited to explore their own choice of topic in-depth and with reference to the key learning areas. Grant Carver of Year 8 at Galston High School continues to strive for his goals in the sport of Taekwondo and is well on his

My Favourite Place

There is a section of Fagan Park called Carrs Bush. As the name implies,

it is near Carrs Road. I think it is just beautiful. You will find delicate maiden hair fern and another fern called Doodia, and soft native grasses covering the ground. In the right season, native ground orchids fight for space. Vines climb skyward on massive trees. The grand-daddy tree is a huge turpentine, probably 200 years old. Enormous red gums (Angophora) look human-like, with their smooth pink skin and arms twisting in all directions. They even have creases in their armpits! There are not many tall shrubs, so you can see further through this bush than in other places, adding to the sense of calm.

This is a community of plants that fit the description of 'Sydney turpentine ironbark forest' and because there is hardly any of that community left, it has been classified as 'endangered'. Being aware of this makes it even more precious. Carrs Bush is one of the best remaining examples.

I volunteer in the Bushcare group there. We rummage around on the ground like chooks, pulling out weeds while nattering about all sorts of things. We can solve all the world's problems, if only they would listen to us! Over time, I have learnt to identify most of the plants. As the seasons change, we are often surprised by what comes up. My favourites, of course, are the orchids. One called Cryptostylis leptochila has totally weird looking flowers in February. It is propagated by a single



species of male wasp, when the flower sends out the scent of a female wasp - even weirder! I have not seen this orchid anywhere else.

I'm in Landcare as well, and we won a grant to help restore the bottom corner of Carrs Bush. We are using contractors and our own labour. Council also employs contractors to help in a different area. As we remove privet, honeysuckle and other weeds, there is more light and space for natives to come up. We are starting to see what it might look like one day.
