Asbestos Found at Geelans Road

Following on from our front page story last month about the dumping of tons of fill/ waste at Geelans Road, Arcadia, the EPA has now concluded their soil testing of the site. Ten core samples were taken and all ten revealed the presence of asbestos in the fill material (also found were bricks, ceramics, metal and other builders' waste).

It is reported that the EPA have issued the owners of the property with a 'draft clean up notice'. Once the EPA has reviewed the owners response to the 'draft clean up notice' a final clean up notice will be issued. The EPA does have powers to issue fines to the owners of the property, but we have no further information on this.

The residents of Geelans Road are extremely disappointed and angry at the outcome of this matter. They had been advising Council for many months that the development appeared to be far more substantial than the approved DA and that they felt contaminated waste was being bought to site. Following their continual complaints, they had been advised by letter from the Council in July that their concerns about contaminated waste were unwarranted. This was following a visit by Council officers to the site. They finally got traction on their concerns by inviting Ray Hadley to review what was happening.

Newly elected Mayor Philip Ruddock has now referred the matter to the ICAC for a full investigation of Council processes and procedures. Follow more of this story on our facebook page. www.facebook.com/ galstonnews

rain. This leads to a higher potential for bushfires. It is important that you prepare your property for bushfire and understand the risk of the area in which you are living.

Glenorie Hall will be open between 10am and 4pm with a comprehensive presentation how to 'GET READY for bushfire season' by The Rural Fire Service at 11am. Members of the Glenorie, Hillside, Maroota, South Maroota and Arcadia brigades will be in attendance to answer your questions after the presentation.

A general fire risk map of The Hills and Hornsby area will be available, and a topographic map of each brigade area will be provided. Each brigade attending will be able to discuss hazard reductions recently carried out in their area. Bush Fire Survival Plans (including animals) in the case of a fire can be discussed with you and your family on an individual basis.

An important part of the day will be an extensive photographic display of the devastating 2002 bushfires. This display will be open until 4pm. Seeing the visual evidence of what happened in 2002 and understanding how quickly the fire spread will hopefully inform community members about the need to be well prepared. On hot windy days fires can spread very quickly so it is important to have plans in place and getting ready for bushfire is easier than you think. You will learn about the top five things to do to make your home safer and protect yourself and your family.

We extend an invitation to all residents from both rural and

Marriage equality is not just about love – it's also about illIness and death

All of the arguments for marriage equality being made by the 'Yes' campaigners are hugely valid, but for me, the biggest issue is the difference it will make during situations of illness and death – that's crunch time.

We know that in Australia, there are few differences between the legal rights of de facto partners and married partners – however, there is one big difference and that is related to who is 'next of kin'. There is no clear definition and it differs from state to state.

While de facto partners are recognised by law, they are not airtight. Should a person in a de facto relationship be placed in hospital for whatever reason, and their significant other is not recognised as an emergency contact, the hospital may not consider the non-injured partner as next of kin and possibly not allow them to even visit the hospital bed, let alone make essential decisions. This is not the case for married couples.

It is up to the non-injured de facto partner to prove their relationship. At such times of emotional stress, this is clearly not practical, and absolutely totally unfair.

Take my relationship for example. My partner, Fiona, and I have been together for 12 years. Our children, who are mine from a previous relationship (a marriage, also of 12 years), live with us permanently and have done so for many years. Fiona, for all intents and purposes, has co-parented these children for 12 years – both financially and emotionally. We have a shared mortgage, investment property, bank accounts, etc. We are both university educated, work full-time in professional jobs, pay taxes, donate to charity and generally do our bit to contribute to our society.

Our children, now 19 and 16, have been co-parented by Fiona for the majority of their lives, they refer to her as 'Mum' and choose to live with us 100% of the time – a choice they make because of the love, the support and the care they receive in our household.

However, should I be injured in a car accident, for example, and be placed on life-support, my mother and my siblings (who are mostly conservative in their views) would have more say over what happens to me than my partner of 12 years. Their 'next of kin' status would be assumed, whereas my partner would have to prove hers. This wouldn't be the case if we were married.

Further, should I die, again my mother and my siblings, as well as my childrens' father, would have a greater say over my daughter's living arrangements (because she is under 18) than my partner. Again, my partner would have to provide evidence and put up a fight; an argument she would not have to enter into if we were married.

When it comes to superannuation, every three years I have to complete a new 'binding death nomination', to ensure that Fiona receives her fair share of my superannuation and life insurance in the event of my death. She has to do the same for me. If we were married, it would be assumed.

Voting 'YES' to marriage equality is not a vote for political correctness, it won't put us on a slippery slope to bestiality or polygamy, as many of the 'No' campaigners would have you believe. You won't be forced to marry us in your churches (indeed, we wouldn't want to anyway!) and you won't have to change the definition of marriage as it stands as a religious sacrament.

Voting 'YES' is not going to change Your marriage, or Your

Additionally, the television ad produced by the same organisation that made the print ad was discredited within the first 24 hours after being released, creating concern about the validity and relevance of the print ad.

Solar Powering Your Business

Did you know that a good quality 10kW solar system can be on your business' roof for around \$13,000-\$15000 ?

Five years ago a similar system would have cost around \$50k.

Solar panel prices in Australia are dropping more gradually than in previous years which means that now is a great time to purchase a system. Many business owners that I've spoken to don't seem to realise how easily they can drastically reduce

If cash-flow is tight in your business (and honestly, whose isn't?), many solar companies are now offering five-year finance terms that can make hire-purchasing a solar power system a cash-flow positive experience from day one.

By this point, you're probably wondering where I'm pulling these crazy-sounding figures from. In actual fact, they're from a pretty



reliable (and usually conservative) source: Information is provided by SunWiz for Green Energy Market's advice to the government's Clean Energy Regulator .The ROI naturally increases as electricity prices rise, and it's already ahead of schedule due to the faster-than-expected reductions in the price of solar systems over the last few years.

As you can imagine, solar system profitability varies state-by-state due to the different electricity tariffs in

each state. Profitability is also based on a reasonably-performing solar system operating for 25 years and assumes a 5% annual increase in electricity prices - higher performing systems and further electricity price hikes only increase the financial incomes even more.

So, why haven't more businesses bought a solar power system?

Typically it is because they don't own their business premises, which can make it difficult. Although if you can get a payback of 5 years and have a progressive landlord, solar on a rented property can make a lot of sense for the tenant and the landlord.

Honestly, though? I suspect it's primarily due to a lack of understanding about the opportunity presented by solar – which is what I'm hoping to address by writing this !

Frederick Percy Kean - A Man of His District

Honouring an amazing life. Our mothers were sisters. Phyllis Cadman and Hilda Kean.

Born in Parramatta 14th January 1926. Percy started school at Arcadia Public School. He was the first student at the newly opened Berrilee Public School.

Percy went to high school at Hornsby, then to Hurlstone Agricultural College - a selective high school. He return to the farm at age 15. This was 100 acres mostly under cultivation, being the leading citrus orchard and poultry farm of the district.



Percy was an extremely hard worker morning to night. Even on Christmas Day. As a child I remember, shortly after a massive Christmas lunch at the Kean's, Percy was off collecting eggs, and we did not see him for the rest of the day. The girls tell stories of sitting in the old Dodge truck on Sunday nights, keeping their dad awake whilst taking a huge load of fruit to the Haymarkets. Capable, creative, dynamic are the words I would use to describe Percy Kean at work.

In the community, he was a leader, and followed the leadership of his father Fred Kean. President of the P&C at the Berrilee School, committee member of the Arcadia School of Arts, and trustee of the Arcadia Methodist Church. The Kean family are natural leaders and the farm's situation towards the end of Calabash Road made it almost automatic that Percy should become Captain of the Arcadia Fire Brigade for 20 Years and Group Captain Hornsby Shire. I am told that he went to his first fire as a youngster so he knew every dangerous fire condition, wind shift gully, ridge and fire trail.

Later on he became a volunteer bus driver and maintenance officer for the Community Aid and Information Service and Disaster Welfare Officer. It does not surprise me that a number of significant Hornsby identities wanted him to stand as a Councillor for Hornsby Shire. Percy did not see that as

he is role.

He loved sport. He was a fast bowler for Arcadia Cricket Club and the Kean's tennis court was always, day and night, a favourite spot for locals and Percy in particular.

What about family? They all say he was always fun. As an example, he told his younger sister, Frida that the name of the new local teacher was Harry Idiot not Harry Elliott. Mr Elliott was quite surprised to be given that new name by the unsuspecting Frida but suggested Frida compromise by calling him just Harry.

Percy loved his family intensely, with his wife Betty at his side. Betty grew up in Canowindra. They met on 20th April, 1947 and were engaged on 28th May 1947. Love at first sight!

The Two Gorges

This ride has been published in this specific issue, because readers will notice a marked increase of cyclists along this route throughout October. Most are training for either the Bowral Classic, or the MS Sydney to Gong charity fundraiser ride, where 9500 cyclists raised Au\$2.2 million last year.

The safest, and most enjoyable way to ride the 42km circuit is anticlockwise: Galston > Hornsby > Pacific Highway > Berowra Waters > Arcadia > Galston (via Blacks, Bayfield, Knights, Bevan and

Crosslands Roads) An average cyclist on a good road bike, stopping only for the ferry, will manage this in 2- 2.5hours. The pros do it in just 1.5 hours!

Both Gorges, and sections of the Pacific Highway have exquisite scenery and all the road surfaces are excellent, except for the potholes along Bay Road between Chilcott and Arcadia Roads. If you are lucky and early, you may even encounter a Lyrebird on the climb up to Chilcott from the ferry, or enjoy some friendly banter with the RMS ferrymen on duty. The ferry actually moderates the traffic, so it is not uncommon to reach the horse paddocks without any cars squeezing past you.

Ascending or descending the Gorges to Berowra Waters or the historic Tunks Bridge truly tests one's skills, focus and fitness. But once out of Galston Gorge, there are bicycle lanes along Galston



Road where one can relax and socialise, then intermittent bike lanes and good road shoulder all along the Pacific Highway, and excellent new bike lanes along the suburban parts of Berowra Waters Road.

Two Gorges is challenging in many ways, attracting Lycra-clad weekend warriors in their hundreds from all over Sydney. During the week, professional cyclists who represent our country, or visiting athletes from overseas, use this route for event training and race

season preparation and a few hardy, brave souls actually cycle commute to work and back via the Gorges !

POINTS OF INTEREST

DID YOU KNOW? If Strava is to be believed, the fastest male and female times to cycle up Galston Gorge switchbacks from Tunks Creek to Montview Road, Hornsby Heights, are around 6 minutes !

DIFFICULTY and DISTANCE: 42km: Because of motor vehicular traffic and gradients of the roads, this route is unsuitable for inexperienced or casual road cyclists. 3 GORGES: Add Bobbin Head (+22km) after riding Galston Gorge, by taking Edgeworth David and Burns Road from Hornsby CBD and turning left into Bobbin Head Road.

NOTES: Despite hundreds of cyclists using this circuit, with no alternative route to Galston Gorge, RMS has put up NO bicycle warning signs. Roads are narrow, so ride single file up the gorges. Avoid cycling through Galston Gorge during peak traffic hoursparticularly up to Galston village. Cessnock Bushfire Strike Team

Last month we saw the first Total Fire Ban of the season with all of the Greater Sydney area faced with a severe fire danger rating, windy weather, and dry conditions. That same week firefighters also faced about 90 blazes across NSW; with Galston firies forming part of a Strike Team sent in to fight bushfires in the Cessnock region throughout the day and night. We were also kept very busy closer to home with several local call-outs - including a service-station diesel-spill.

Hazard Reduction Season

With the official start to the fire season commencing in October you may see continued Hazard Reductions (HRs) taking place across Sydney when conditions allow. Galston RFB is regularly active in assisting with many local and Greater Sydney based HRs.

Member profile: David Stockman

How long have you been a part of the Galston Rural Fire Brigade?

I am now starting my 40th year in the Brigade.

What is your role there?



I am currently Station Officer, as well as being a Life Member of the brigade.

When you're not at the brigade, what do you do for a living? I am semi-retired but still conduct Guided History Tours for the Navy, after 48 years at Garden Island.

What made you join the RFS?

After seeing my first bushfire sweep through West Pennant Hills in 1965, I decided to do something for the community when I could.

What makes being part of the RFS so unique?

The R.F.S. is like a big family. You all look out for each other and you share the joys and sorrows of other firefighters.

What is a fond memory you have of your time at the brigade? The nights of the Chinese Banquets we used to hold with our families.

How has it changed over the years?

When I joined there was no basic training, it was on the job training. We paid half the cost of our boots, cloth nappies were used for smoke masks and there were only six pairs of goggles, and these were on the truck. Leather beaters were still commonly used to help put out fires and we wore white overalls - however we didn't wear ties to fires as some brigades did at the time.

Our callouts were signalled by a siren at the fire shed. There was also no toilet at the shed...this is what trees were used for. Many of us would also need to travel on the outside of the truck in all kinds of weather.

Glenorie Fire Fighters Deployed to Canada

Three Glenorie crew, Glynn Lloyd, Chloe Paton and Chris Compton along with another 37 fire fighters from organisations in NSW and ACT were deployed to Canada for six weeks of intensive, remote area fire-fighting. NSW RFS Commissioner Shane Fitzsimmons saw the crew off from the Airport. It is very different fire-fighting to Australia. They have met bears who have become more 'friendly' as the fire activity died down. They have also spotted cougars, a lynx, wolves and bobcats on their fire ground. And now they are fighting fires while it is snowing! Our Chloe should get special mention as she is the only female on the Australian team. They have been working hard but are all safe and enjoying their time there.

Hazard Reductions

As you have probably noticed, we have been very busy conducting several Hazard Reductions (HRs) in the area. The principle of a Hazard Reduction is to reduce the fuel loading and therefore reduce the intensity of a fire should one occur. This doesn't mean there will be no fires. It doesn't mean that if there is a fire it will not spread. It simply means it should slow a fire down. With this in mind, we urge all residents to be prepared for the fire season. Make sure your properties are prepared and most importantly that you are prepared. We hope that all residents have completed their Bush Fire Survival Plan. If you haven't yet, then make sure you do urgently. If you need assistance with your Bush Fire Survival Plan or would like to discuss how to be prepared for the Bush Fire Season

Arcadia RFS News - Preparations continue for upcoming Fire Season

We have seen an early start to the fire season with a drier than usual winter which has seen the fire season brought forward to September in many parts of the state. We have seen many fires throughout the state, and even as close as Lane Cove National Park. This serves as a stark reminder that we must be prepared as when disaster strikes, emergency services are spread far and thin, and land owners must be active in protecting their properties.

In response to the looming fire season, more hazard reductions



have been completed. Locally we have completed a strategic hazard reduction in the Fiddletown area, with more in the plan for favorable conditions. The Peebles road HR saw 37 vehicles, made up of trucks and command vehicles, and over 160 personnel on the fire ground to complete one of our larger burns. NSW RFS aircraft were also involved in aerial incendiary operations, and monitoring the burn so it did not cross control lines. Arcadia has not only managed ones in our area, we continue to supply crews to many within Hornsby and further afield at Kentlyn. The HR at Kentlyn had us working alongside numerous FRNSW teams, and SES crews. The brigade has also supplied members to be involved with the IMT – Incident Management Team across many of these hazard reductions.

A quick response to a structure fire in early September saw crews from Arcadia, Galston, Glenorie, Dural, Cherrybrook, and FRNSW Castle Hill attend which stopped the fire from spreading to other buildings. Luckily no persons injured, and the fire was contained to a small area of the property. As always, the crews from Hornsby/Ku-Ring-Gai and The Hills District worked together efficiently.

History

The Galston Uniting Church Our Story Concludes: Part 3

In previous instalments we discussed the origins of the Dural parish and a small number of the cultural and practical contributions that the church made to the local community. This brings us to the present time.

In 1977 we became The Uniting Church in Australia, when the Presbyterian, Congregational and Methodist churches entered into a formal union. Members of the congregations were given a vote on the union and this great fundamental change was achieved without conflict or friction.

Careful and prayerful consideration went into becoming the Uniting Church in Australia. By the mid -1970s Australian society was beginning to change. It was wise for the smaller protestant churches to unite and share the honour and privilege of joining together as Christ's people in Australia.

The Inauguration was celebrated at Dural Church on 26th June, 1977 with 200 people in attendance.

This union saw old organisational traditions replaced with new ways. The congregation now elects Church Councillors and Elders, and all members of the congregation have a much wider involvement. West Pennant Hills was no longer part of our parish but Kenthurst was still with us, together with churches at Arcadia, Glenorie and Dural.

It was decided at some point to move with changing times and consolidate into a single parish centre at Galston. The Dural property was sold in 1986, the Arcadia property in 1988 and the Glenorie property in 1995.

In September 1985, the former Dural congregation - with many members of Arcadia and Glenorie - began to worship as the Galston congregation in the Galston Seventh Day Adventist Church. A site



n Seventh Day Adventist Church. A site had been chosen for a new church building on School Road, and services were held at the Adventist site for three years while construction took place.

We were very grateful to the Seventh Day Adventist people for allowing us the use of their church on Sundays for a period of three years.

Galston Uniting Church was opened on 22nd October, 1988. The



building includes the church, auditorium, meeting rooms, office, kitchen, Sunday school accommodation, and a Long Day Care/ Early Learning Centre adjoining the church complex. (Our minister Rev Geoff Smith is Chairman of the Management Committee of the Galston Early Learning Centre.)

Outstanding features of our church are the Stained Glass Window designed by Terrence Plowright. This is a very modern and colourful concept and proves that stained glass windows do not have to be old.

What is old is our glorious 1887 Fosters and Andrews Organ built in Hull, England originally for the Congregational Church, Bourke Street, Darlinghurst. The organ was gifted to that church by three sisters, the Misses Baxter. The formal unveiling of the organ was on Sunday 10th June, 1888, in the Darlinghurst church, and served that congregation for eighty years - until the property was sold.

How did this heritage organ come to Galston? A small group from our congregation began to investigate the possibility of including this organ in our new building. Purchase of the organ by Galston congregation was concluded on 25th August 1986, and the organ was removed from Darlinghurst and stored for refurbishment.

This refurbishment, a long and laborious task, continued over the next six years with volunteers from the church, under the guidance of Mr. Ian Brown. Mr Brown was a member of our congregation and also happened to be a professional organ builder.

The organ was installed in its new home with the specifications unchanged from when it was built. On 6th June, 1993 the organ was rededicated at Galston Church.

Margaret McKinley

We had begun the Dural practice in mid 1957, when we were both working as Resident Medical officers at Parramatta District Hospital. The system we worked was that of running evening surgeries, from eight pm, and on Saturday mornings. If we were both off from the hospital, we both came home, but we worked the roster so one of us was at Dural each night. It was a fairly hectic life, but it was all new, and we enjoyed every minute of it

By August, the practice had built up to the extent that it was a viable source of income, so I gave in my notice and spent every day at Dural. Lynette came and went, keeping up her job at Parramatta, to ensure that we had an income at least.

We had bought an old chook farm at the junction of Galston and Old Northern roads, in the centre of old Dural. The old lady selling the property could not see it as anything but a producing poultry farm. "We don't want the chooks", we kept saying." Sell them, we are going to practice medicine." She was adamant.

Eventually we bought it- twenty three acres, a fibro two bedroom home with garage, and three thousand chooks with lots of chook sheds, for six thousand pounds. On the day we in, the chook man came, took all the chooks and gave us five hundred pounds.

We enclosed the front verandah, one end as a waiting room, the other as consulting room, and opened for business. It built up very rapidly.

The old home had an old pan system toilet in the back yard. There being no night soil service in the Dural District, I would dig a hole and bury this. Since I did not feel it was quite the thing to have the new local doctor seen carrying out this activity, it was always done at midnight.

Needless to say, the first money we earned was spent on installing a septic tank and inside toilet.

We have seriously been looking at our waste and what we can do to reduce our environmental footprint reducing things that go to landfill. News from Uniting Care Galston Early Learning Centre

Over the past month the children at Galston Early Learning Centre have been busy researching into different types of birds and nests. This project came about when the children noticed a smaller nest in a tree in our backyard. The nest has been there for the past few months now and we determined that it is no longer a used nest. With this in mind, we decided to take a closer look! The children were thrilled to discover that the little nest had remnants of a previously hatched egg inside. They were bursting with questions regarding the mummy bird, the baby bird, the egg and the different materials the nest was constructed from.



To extend upon our knowledge of birds we read both non-fiction and fiction books that had information relating to different types of birds. So we began to engage in discussions on how the baby birds hatch from their eggs and we also found out that the baby bird is not able to fly

straight away. We discovered that the mummy bird looks after the baby bird by feeding it and keeping it safe until it is big and strong enough to fly and care for itself.

Following up on our interest in birds, the children decided that

they would help the mummy bird feed her babies and wanted to purchase some bird seed. Once we received the seed the children turned this activity into a cooking experience as they mixed the seed in with some leaves from around

What is His work and when do we first meet Him?

The simplest way to describe the first work of the Holy Spirit in a life is to compare it to a person looking for a place to live. That is the concept given to us in 1 Corinthians 6:19:

'Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit, who is in you, whom you have received from God?'

When do we first meet the Holy Spirit? When He comes knocking at our heart's door. We may not know then that the voice we hear in our heart telling us of our need of a Saviour is the Holy Spirit. It is easier to look back later and recognise that He was the one speaking to us earlier in our experience.

It is like being in a crowd, perhaps in some one's home, where you began talking to the person along side you with out knowing who he was. Later your host or hostess said, "I'd like to introduce you to Mr So-and so. You replied, "Well, we haven't actually met, but we've been talking together". You felt you already knew that person although you did not know his name. After being introduced you could continue your conversation more intelligently.

When we first meet the Holy Spirit we may not know His name, and we certainly do not know the Saviour of whom He speaks. John 16:8 tells us, 'When He comes He will convict the world of guilt in regard to sin'....Why? He will convict of sin, because the world does not believe in Jesus Christ, the Saviour of the world.

Every year we see chocolate eggs appearing on the shopping aisles and for many children around the world they wake up on the Sunday morning and devour a copious amount of chocolate, a very sugary breakfast indeed!

While we could explore the history of the egg, the links to various festivals, rituals and celebrations, I would rather focus on the day, Easter Sunday.

Before there were Easter bunnies, chocolate eggs, or even debates about what the day represents and whether it should be celebrated, there was a Sunday, like many before it. The first day of the Jewish week. Until now, it was uneventful, just another day. Yet this one was different.

As we have walked through the revelations of grace, this fourth stage is possibly the most known, yet least understood.

Easter Sunday, the day of the resurrection. The day where Jesus emerged from the grave and once again walked the earth. The day, where Jesus overcame our greatest fear of all ... death.

What greater fear is there?

Going to the principal's office vs death.

contains a lengthy speech by a contemporary British politician who described Abraham Lincoln as one of the greatest men of all time!

Today most people recognise that Abraham Lincoln deserved that accolade. He was an outstanding personality and leader, but not many thought that at the time of his murder. During his lifetime, his critics were vicious and numerous. So there is something very touching about a great leader who needed to encourage himself by reading the good things that others had said or written about him.

Leaders or people in positions of authority need encouragement. By the very nature of their responsibilities, they often walk a lonely path.

But it is not only leaders who need encouragement – we all do! A timely word of appreciation has a powerful influence. There are few things more helpful than a word of encouragement. It gives us fresh strength and spirit to keep going when we are experiencing difficult times. The great car manufacturer Henry Ford regarded the ability to encourage others as one of the greatest talents that a person can possess.

And this is a work in which we can all be involved. One of most beautiful examples of encouragement in the Bible is the kindness Onesiphorous extended to Paul when the apostle was in prison

(2 Timothy 1:16-18). 'May the Lord show mercy to the household of Onesiphorous, because he often refreshed me and was not ashamed of my chains." (1:16) His frequent visits were like a breath of fresh air to Paul. They gave him fresh hope and courage when the apostle had felt like giving up. Paul was the great Christian leader and missionary; Onesiphorous was the ordinary church member, so to speak. But it was the latter who carried out the great work of encouragement, and it was a wonderful work that was truly Christ-like.

A book on the British constitution contains these words: "The Sovereign has, under a constitutional monarchy such as ours, three rights – the right to be consulted, the right to warn, (and) the right to encourage." I suggest that encouragement is not the preserve of a monarch, but a right open to all of us. Let us all be encouragers in our realm of influence.

Help Us Save the Gang-Gang Cockatoos

There are grave concerns about the future of Hornsby Shire's population of gang-gang cockatoos and we need the help of the local community.

Hornsby Shire Council has partnered with Ku-ring-gai Council and the NSW Office of Environment and Heritage to create a survey about the threatened population of cockatoos in the area.

"The gang-gang cockatoos were once widespread in Sydney, but that is no longer the case," Hornsby Council environmental scientist Mark Hood said.



"The Hornsby Ku-ring-gai area is thought to have the last breeding population in the Sydney metropolitan area, which makes it very important for us to learn more about them."



"We have created a short survey to help us figure out how many there are and learn more about their movement patterns."

Gang-gang cockatoos are usually found in pairs or small family groups. They forage on

eucalyptus trees and wattles in forest and woodland areas.

The birds can be identified from their distinctive call that sounds like a creaking rasp, they are generally grey in colour with the males having a bright red head.

Areas of interest include Malton Road, Copeland Road and Byles Creek where there have been previous sightings.

Geebungs

Geebungs or Persoonias are shrubs with small yellow flowers followed by edible fruit. There are various species, that can be found in the Sydney area, mostly on sandy soils, but a few also grow on clay and alluvial soils. From the 12

species described in the Sydney area, two are endangered; one is



poorly known and another one extinct.

The other species are more common and are an important part of the understory and shrub layer of woodlands. Once the fruit is ripe and turns purple in colour and can be difficult to find because native wildlife really enjoys the fruit.

Whether in flower or in fruit, Persoonias make a very attractive garden plant- but they are quite difficult to propagate.

Persoonia pinifolia is found growing in heath or sclerophyll forest in this area. It is commonly referred to as the Pine-leaved Geebung or The Australian Christmas Tree because it commences flowering around Christmas and has "pine-tree" like leaves.

With its fresh, green foliage it is attractive all year round and it bright yellow flowers never fail to attract attention. The species is hardy in most well drained soils in full sun or partial shade.
