





Friends of Fagan Park

Our Open day on ANZAC Day, **Wednesday, 25th April**, will be behind us when you read this. We are of course looking forward to a successful day, with plenty of traditional home made ANZAC biscuits consumed. As I write this, repairs to our McDonald diesel roller have been completed successfully, and the old girl is back in operation after 10 months of layup. It will be started on the day.

Netherby Homestead will be closed for some time after ANZAC Day to enable the pressed metal ceilings to be replaced. The old steel ceilings have suffered the ravages of time and have rusted through in places and become unsightly. Council has organised period patterned replacements, in aluminium, which should have a long service life, not that 117 years was too bad for the old ones. It will be quite a disruption, with all the contents having to be moved to storage.

One of our displays that has not been demonstrated for a number of years is the horse-works driven chaff cutter. Having no horse, we use a self-steering small Kubota tractor it its place. For the chaff cutter, we need a supply of oaten hay, so we have just ploughed a small plot of ground to sow some oats, which we will later cut and store for demonstrating chaff cutting (rabbits permitting!).

An exciting new project is being planned – the restoration of an International Model K truck of 1918. The vehicle was recently donated by one of the district's pioneering families, and we have obtained another donor chassis to provide some missing items. There is much information gathering under way before we actually start real work. It will take a couple of years at least, and is likely to present some real challenges. These are unique trucks, known as



coal-scuttle style, with the radiator behind rather than in front of the engine. I hope this is not being too technical for readers, but it is what makes them such unusual and iconic vehicles. The photo illustrates the style.

The Friends of Fagan Park maintain the artefacts on display in the museums, and are continuously restoring worthwhile objects of local significance. There are always new projects being undertaken, and we welcome enquiries from anyone interested in joining our group. A reminder that the museums are open every Tuesday, and on the second Sunday of each month (afternoon only).

Bakery Trying to Cement a Deal

Glenorie Bakery proprietor Rob Pirina has called in one of the big guns to help lock in a Queensland opponent to take on his team in this year's Pie of Origin charity challenge.

After being rejected by several Queensland bakeries, it was time to unleash his secret weapon in former Origin firebrand Mark Geyer, who became public enemy in Queensland in 1991 when he engaged in a volatile face-off with rugby league royalty – King Wally Lewis. Geyer was goaded by Lewis who was hoping to have the Blues enforcer sent off.

It was an incident that remains the most memorable in Origin history, between a man with god-like status whose illustrious career was coming to an end and a gifted young backrower with a short fuse.

Geyer, who uses his celebrity to raise funds for a host of different charities, said at the time that he "didn't know whether to punch Lewis or get his autograph".

Geyer's involvement with this year's Pie of Origin was brought about by his friendship with Dural First National agent Adrian Rovere, when they met for the first time at a charity event on board the Nepean Belle back in March of this year.

"It was the day I got shaved at Glenorie Bakery for the World's Greatest Shave," said Adrian, who had one forgettable season with the Dragons back in the 1980s.

"After getting shaved within an inch of my life by my daughter Courtney, I headed off to Penrith where MG was the star attraction for an event raising funds to support a local charity (Queen of Hearts Foundation) that assists victims of domestic violence in the Penrith region." "When we met there was an instant rapport. MG has been honoured for his amazing community and charity work. I'm not sure if its Sir MG or Lord MG but what I do know is that we need more selfless people like him," said Adrian.

Adrian said as soon as Geyer heard that money raised from the Pie of Origin challenge was going to the Children's Hospital at Westmead and the Lady Cilento Children's Hospital in South Brisbane, he was only too happy to throw his considerable weight behind the event.

By the time this goes to print, it is more than likely that an opponent was found especially after Glenorie Bakery was in the process of sending off to all Queensland-based bakeries, the recipe for a special variety of pie created by their in-house team of butchers and pastry chefs.

"Apparently one of the secret ingredients is a healthy nutritious 'cement-type' substance which will hopefully, after they make it and eat it, see one of the Queensland bakeries harden up and take up the challenge," Adrian said.

"To date all we are getting from the Queensland bakeries is a bunch of cream puffs. What we hope to do is unveil a bakery with the meatballs to take us on," said Rob who revealed last year they raised \$40,000 in total - \$20,000 for each hospital.

"In the end, it's not about who sells the most pies, it's about raising money for sick kids and having some fun along the way."

Rob said there will be a big State of Origin event at Glenorie Bakery just prior to Game One at which Mark Geyer will be the special guest. Plans are in place for it to be covered by Channel Seven.

Once the details are bedded down, they will be on various websites, all social media and the noticeboard at Glenorie Village Centre.

Boral Concrete Schwebel Lane Upgrade: The scale of the upgrade has surfaced as a contentious issue for many of the GPA members and **Glenorie** Village residents. Traffic during school hours and the proposed long operating hours (seven days a week from 6am to 10pm weekdays AND able to operate

on a Sunday) continue to be a worry! Dust emissions are a major health issue also and all these combine to create concern regarding the possible effect of children at the local schools.

Another problem now is Boral machinery operating out of current consent hours. Concerns are still about the height of the proposed 21m silos and Boral needs to provide an artist's impressions of likely sight effects from the north, east and west.

Boral distributed their newsletter to residents close to the Batching Plant. In this newsletter they state that the plant is operating close to capacity 20,000 tonnes per annum, however, information given at the GPA meeting was that the current output is 800tonnes pa. The proposal is for a staggering 52,000 tonnes per annum!

This letter and presentation is on our website at http:// glenorieprogress.org.au/ along with a disclaimer stating that the GPA does NOT support the upgrade. The Association is acting as a conduit to distribute the information to the residents of Glenorie so

you are armed with information to make a decision whether to accept or oppose the expansion of the current conditions.

Note that the DA is to be lodged soon with The Hills Shire Council. So we again urge all members to submit their concerns and spread the word to ALL who may be affected by the upgrade. You will have an opportunity to have input into the DA during the submission period, so don't waste the opportunity!

Glenorie bus bay gardens are to be completed soon and in April the tarmac was marked for repair.

90 year old swimmer attempts record at the Hills



You all would have seen the TV footage of masters swimmer George Corones (pictured) smashing the World record for the 50m freestyle at the Commonwealth Games trials. 99 year old George was then named an honorary member of the Commonwealth Games Swim team. George was hailed a superhero wearing a cap not a cape! We may witness another cap-wearing

hero in 90 year old James Short from southern Sydney when he visits Galston Aquatic Centre for the Hills AUSSI Masters Swim meet on 6 May. James turned 90 in March and is attempting to set a State Record swimming the 1500metre freestyle. Yes, you are reading this correctly – **1500 metres at 90 years** young. James is attempting to set this record in the Masters 90 – 94 age group. The fact that there is no current record for this age group is testament to the difficulty of a swimmer achieving this feat. It will be a first for a NSW Masters swimmer of this age.

Hills Masters is hosting an interclub long distance meet at Galston Aquatic Centre which will attract swimmers from all over the ACT/NSW Branch and possibly from other states. Cycling to School and Back?

Are you sick of the daily school drop off and pick up? There is an alternative option- the kids get themselves to school and back, you contribute one car less to traffic congestion, end up being fitter and you have more time to yourself. Students who ride or walk to school contribute to their minimum physical activity level of 60 minutes per day. They are also more focused and ready to learn compared to those who are driven.

So if eight out of ten kids rode bicycles or walked to primary school or high school three decades ago, why are there only one or two lonely bicycles parked at schools in 2018?

- 1)Helicopter parenting? Parents and grandparents are so afraid of 'Stranger Danger,' and what other parents think of their parenting that they will not allow their children any freedom to do anything on their own.
- 2) Obstructive NSW State govt cycle regulations? The \$395 fine for not wearing a helmet, the petty \$105 fine for not having a bell and many more...but a major systemic fail is that it is illegal for any person over the age of 12 to cycle on a pavement here. Seriously? The 'experts' shriek about 'the childhood obesity epidemic' but the State mandates that our teenagers- yes, your tender 13 year old- must cycle on the roads in heavy traffic while the pavements languish in pristine loveliness, mostly devoid of pedestrians. Genius !

- 3)Laziness? If you have primary school children, cycle to school and back with them yourself occasionally, setting a good example and mentoring them on the safest route to ride,. You'll be active and spend quality time together while educating your kids about their environment, community, health and safety along the route you choose.
- 4) Mental conditioning: everyone else uses a car- don't they? By the time you have found your keys, the bag containing your drivers' license, herded the kids to the car, opened the gate, strapped them all in, reversed out, closed the gate, strapped yourself in, waited to get into the traffic, sat in the drop-off que or looked for a nice parking away from 'Ranger Danger' at the school... you probably could have all cycled there faster.


Get back to basics, think about sustainability and your role in it, then look for opportunities to leave the family car (and your fears) at home. The efficiency of cycling as an alternative transport option and the personal freedom it offers can become a lifestyle choice that everyone in your household and local community will benefit from.





FROM THE MAYOR'S DESK

The release of this year's budget is not the happy event it should be. Usually it's an exciting time as Council trumpets all the great new projects that are coming to our community, but this year we're too preoccupied by thoughts of what we're not going to be able to offer. The NSW Government's redrawing of our southern boundary has ripped more than \$10 million out of our budget and placed us in deficit.

The news is not all bad, with a number of projects going ahead such as the redevelopment of Asquith's Storey Park Community Facility and a new playground for Waitara Park. We will also continue to provide existing services to our community, though the outlook for the future is not good. Next year the decisions are going to be even harder. As well as delaying and cancelling capital works projects we will also have to consider cutting services to the community.



The long-term consequences are even more troubling, with major projects such as the rehabilitation of Hornsby Quarry and the development of new sporting facilities at Westleigh under threat.

Despite the grim outlook, there is still reason to be optimistic. The NSW Government has promised that our community will not be worse off and the only way for them to keep that promise is to restore Hornsby Shire to its original size. We are still in discussions with the Government to achieve that objective and we are hoping they will soon take action. If the Government does not keep its promise we will need help from the entire community.

Holsworthy Fires

Middle Dural Fire Brigade News

Members of the Middle Dural Fire Brigade have helped to contain the bushfire between Menai and the Holsworthy army base which started on Saturday 14th April. Almost 2,500 hectares of bush burned before the blaze was brought under control, and as we go to press, huge plumes of angry smoke still reach skyward, RFS crews continue to broaden containment lines. Fire still rages in the remote centre and helicopters circle the sky dropping water. Remarkably, no lives have been lost, no houses destroyed. Undoubtedly local residents, some of whom live within metres of the bush, played a key role. Some were evacuated, some chose to stay; their fire plans activated. The essential element was that all of them seemed to be well prepared and had made sure their houses had clean gutters, gardens and lawns free of potential fuel, hoses at the ready. They patrolled, they extinguished spot fires and they worked together as a community watchful eye.



We were grateful to the Menai Club that provided meals, and to the beaut resident with her trailer ("Supplies for the Guys") offering delicious goody bags of muffins, chocolate, lollies, water and fruit to dirty firefighters on the side of the road.

We were reminded by this beautiful old fire fighting engine how much the Volunteer Fire Fighting organisation has come since those early days. Government and local ratepayer funding have combined with a sophisticated level of training, resulting in world class equipment and highly trained world class firefighters.



I went back home for the first time in 25 years to show my son where I grew up; to contribute something positive to Zimbabwe by sharing my creativity. But, in the end, it was me who was truly blessed by the people I met there.

Everybody loved the mosaic process; were excited, inspired by and proud of the artworks they made. Leaders of the area have invited Susie's Studio back to create more mosaics with rural communities in Mashonaland next year- including a new Dotito Welcome sign and planning a future mosaic garden for Dotito.

It was a week of early starts and late finishes, however the students of Northholm's Agricultural Show Teams took it all in their stride at the Royal Easter Show this year.

It is so important that students connect with the process of raising animals, while, in the process, developing an appreciation for where their food comes from. Being part of the Northholm's Agriculture Program gives students the opportunity to gain perspective into what it takes to grow, raise, select and prepare an animal for competition and there is no better competition than the Royal Easter Show. Students see animals from a variety of different breeds, and horticultural produce and district displays, highlighting the work of Australian farmers.

Northholm is a registered breeder of White Dorpers (sheep) and entered 15 rams and ewes in this year's Show. The Dorper Show Team consists of students from Years Seven to Nine who attend sessions after school when they train, wash, clip and learn how to present the sheep in the ring. They are also assisted by Year Eleven Primary Industries students who are completing their Certificate II in Agriculture. There was a large contingent of White Dorpers at the Show this year with large numbers in every class. The students were rewarded with the following results:


completion of the dam, the buildings in the town fell into despair.

I'm not sure if it's my age, a greater awareness, or a sign of the times ... but I see so much brokenness. People consigned to just living out their life, as if this is acceptable. That a life without love, joy and peace are almost to be expected.

There seems an overwhelming dissatisfaction across the world; a lack of joy, a lack of purpose, a lack of meaning.

I sense a such a deep longing for a better life, and it's not even restricted to age groups or socio economic situation.

Ever increasing levels of anxiety, depression, addiction, suicide ... all at a time when the world is largely at peace. Where, at least in our society, we live in affluence, with choice aplenty.

So why such longing? Why such dissatisfaction? Why a lack of joy? Peace? Patience?

My greatest frustration is I have the answers – but everyone is too busy to listen. Or too deeply grieved to believe there is hope.

Scepticism is so great that the light at the end of the tunnel is obviously a train, likely filled with explosives, and surely going to steam roll us as we continue to stagger through this darkness called life.

But there really is a way. There really is a light. There really is hope that leads to love, joy, and peace.

The heaviness of life can be cast off and replaced by a joyous walk. It's within reach and doesn't even have to be that far away.

4. The Holy Spirit will develop Christ in us.

The Holy Spirit comes to reproduce the character of Jesus Christ within us and to make the Lordship of Christ a reality in every area and experience of our lives.

The apostle Paul often spoke of this particular work of the Spirit. He told the Galatians of his great hope that Christ might be formed in them (Galatians 4:19). He told the Roman Christians that it is God's continuing purpose that we should be 'conformed to the likeness of His Son' (Romans 8: 29). He wrote to the Corinthians that the work of the Spirit is to change us day by day into the likeness of Christ. (2 Corinthians 3:18).

This is the distinct, unique work of the Holy Spirit. But you say "Doesn't Christ already live in our hearts?" Yes He does. Then how can He be 'formed within us'?

Let's illustrate it like this: You know how a chicken develops in an egg. At first it is only a tiny speck within the egg. But given the

Can you accept that? Can you believe that peace is truly available to you, even in the situation you are in? Can you see that there really is hope, that you can truly experience love and joy!

ARGGGHHHH, I just want to shout from the rooftops and get your attention.

Your life can be filled with a joy so inexpressible that you are moved to tears with the sunrise. That you are filled with laughter at the sounds of children running by. That the very air you breathe is suddenly sweeter as your hope ascends and you look up not down.

Can you receive it? Can you personally achieve it? Can this life that seems so far be yours?

YES!

All of us are broken, yet not all of us live in brokenness. You too can be healed and whole and living a life on purpose, with meaning, and a sense of satisfaction.

Why accept a life of so-so, when you can have extraordinary?

If you are interested, can I encourage you to pray a simple prayer ... ask the Father (aloud or quietly) to direct you to a local church, to find the right community and for that extraordinary journey to begin. I believe in the power of prayer and know that if you ask you will receive.

right conditions and provided these are constantly maintained, that speck will begin to develop into an embryo. Then as time passes the chicken is actually formed or developed within the shell until the whole of the inside of the egg is filled with a living chick. Then one day it breaks the shell and the chicken is revealed.

The word Paul uses, 'formed' (Galations 4:19), describes such remarkable development. So it is with the Holy Spirit. He forms within us the character of Christ, doing His work silently and faithfully as we allow Him. We could say He wants to maintain the conditions under which this work can be carried on, always with one aim in view: the reproduction of Jesus Christ in the shell of human flesh. That work will only be completed when we stand before Christ in glory.

The true evidence then, of the presence and work of the Holy Spirit in a human life, is how much of Christ may be seen in that life. Remember, the Holy Spirit is the Unseen One.

Christ said the Holy Spirit would not speak about Himself but about Christ. He will always hold the spotlight on Christ, not on Himself.

premise that mulching creates habitat for insects by promoting hummus and compost, to grouping grasses in clumps of threes, each 2 metres apart so that small birds can flee to safety. Then onto the different types of plants that encourages small birds (hint....choose natives with small flowers so that the larger birds don't compete for the nectar.) She encouraged us to think about the animals that already exist in your garden and how to encourage and keep them in your garden by providing natural food sources, homes/shelter from predators and the elements as well as water. While your garden may not be big, she suggested creating a small patch of native grasses and shrubs in large pots and hanging baskets if necessary. Everybody can hang up a Bee Hotel somewhere! She left us with three good gardening habits that will encourage wildlife into your garden.

1) Minimise chemical use by manual removal and observing your plants. If the plant is not looking good, address the problem early,

Utricularia Gibba - The Carnivore!

On a recent visit to a neighbour, my attention was drawn to a dainty, very pretty bright yellow flower. It measured only a centimeter across and sat on tiny fragile stem, blooming on mass in a small water feature.

On questioning what it was and where it came from, I was given detailed information.

'Well, it just appeared one day in the shallow water of the pond'. Its name is Yellow Bladderwort and while it flowers beautifully above the water, beneath there are black dots housed by a wild and fine tangle of roots. These black dots are tiny bladders to catch food. Each bladder has a small entrance, which is closed by a door with a trigger device. When the trap is set, the bladder is empty, flat and under negative pressure. If the trigger is touched by a microscopic creature, the bladder is triggered, sucking in water and the prey and becoming a full round shape. The door rapidly shuts and the catch is processed. High speed camera images show that the prey is swallowed in less than a millisecond.

After a couple of hours the bladder expels the liquid and flattens itself back into trap form, ready to assist the plant to survive in a nutrient poor water.



It's been reported that bowls of water plants that have Yellow Bladderwort keep the 👫 waters mosquito larvae free.

This locally native plant is a great example of a carnivorous plant with underwater leaves modified as specialized traps, operating at extraordinary high speed. Simply amazing.

Bromeliad Society of Australia



The Bromeliad Society of Australia will hold their next meeting at the Federation Pavilion, Castle Hill Showground on Saturday, 12 May with plant sales commencing at 11am prior to the meeting.

Discussion at

this meeting will include the different bromeliad species that have unique pupping habits. Most tank-forming bromeliads set new pups at the base of the mother plant, just below the lowest leaves and these are usually the easiest to propagate.

However, a few bromeliads have a tendency to produce what are known as grass pups. These are very small pups that rise from the base of the base of the plant, usually before flowering has occurred. They can be removed and grown on. Species that produce grass pups often do so in large numbers, for example Tillandsia viridiflora, Alcantarea imperialis and Vriesea glutinosa.

Included in this presentation will be the methods of separating nonstoloniferous bromeliads and a demonstration for the tricky bromeliads where the pups grow up between mum's leaves.






