RON BURTON

Friends and family gathered on Saturday (July 28) to remember Dural resident Ron Burton who died in a tragic boating accident.

The keen sailor had been on his sailing boat on Friday, June 20, and was heading to shore at Hunter's Hill in a dinghy when it overturned and he hit his head on rocks. He was unable to be revived.

His wife of 48 years, former Hills Shire councillor Barbara Burton, said her husband had loved boats all his life and had bought "the love of his life" Mistral II, a classic wooden two-masted schooner, in January 1969.

Mistrall II was built in 1922 in North Sydney by W Ford for the then Commodore of a Sydney Yacht Club and sailed in several early Sydney Hobart vacht races

"We sailed Mistral II in

Sydney Harbour, Pittwater and up the coast to Cairns and back," she said.

Ron was a builder who built the family's home in Dural in 1970. He started building at the age of 19 for his uncle and aunt and, at the age of 23, formed his own company, Shereline Homes.

It is believed he designed and built the first red brick veneer triple front house in Sydney in the 1950s and went on to build about 3000 more project homes in Sydney Newcastle, Wollongong and Blue Mountains

An avid reader and follower of current affairs, he joined the Australian Labor



Party in 1990s and was a committed supporter. He was a keen cross-country skier and was a member of Kosciusko Alpine Club for many years.

The Burtons have three children, eight grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

Barbra Burton said: "He was 84 and thought he was 16. He had boundless energy and enthusiasm."

"Ron adored his family and treasured every moment he could spend with his young grandchildren and great grandchildren," she said.

"He will be remembered by his family for his love and support and his desire to look after us all."

Madge Roughley was born at Inchneuk Private Hospital in Parramatta in 1925. Madge was the eldest daughter of Elizabeth (Lil) and Eric Carlson from Arcadia. Elizabeth Sidney Waddell Norquay had married Eric "Jack" Waldemar Carlson in 1923 and their first daughter, Madge, arrived two years later. At the time of Madge's birth, Elizabeth's occupation was listed as 'home duties' and Eric's as 'orchardist'. Madge and her younger sister Shirley Carlson were not given middle names as their mother disliked having too many middle names, and she did not want to burden her two girls with the same.

Throughout her life, at places she worked, in community groups and churches she attended, Madge made friends, cared for people, and was well loved. She had enjoyed large 80th and 90th birthday celebrations with family and friends in 2005 and 2015. Madge lived with Lesley, Paul and her granddaughters for 22 years, and kept good health until the final year of her life, moving to nursing home care in Mosman in mid 2017. Madge died peacefully surrounded by family on 31st July 2018, in her 93rd year.



SPRING RIDE (WITH A TOUCH OF DIRT)

Every now and then, I yearn for adventure. Indulging that impulse, I decided to investigate rumours that similar souls have cycled up and down the MacDonald River from Wisemans Ferry, via St. Albans... on a road bike!

I have ridden the hills and valleys of this pristine and remote riverine area on our doorstep for the last decade- but always on a bicycle with fat tyres, flat bars and a very generous granny gear. On the road, I ride a luscious red Trek Domane SL, which has an ISO Speed suspension tech OCLV frame to smooth road rumble transferred through the bicycle to your body. I wonder if I am going to make it to St. Albans without damage to my precious road bike, or perhaps get a puncture? As I exit the ferry left (onto Settlers' Road) and fly mostly downhill past residences scattered along the MacDonald River and the steep-sided ridgeline thumb of land extending out from Devine's Hill, anxiety fades and I am on mv wav!

Near the 7km mark, I hit the dirt and immediately have to slow right down to negotiate the next 9km of dirt safely. Patches of stutter bumps in the road are annoying, but my mountain bike skills have me choosing all the

smoothest lines by default. I encounter only four cars while

riding the entire 22km road. In the vicinity of the old Settlers' Cemetery, I am flying along the tar again, all the way into St. Albans.

Spare some time to admire the 1902 St. Albans Bridge,

an early example of a DeBurgh timber truss road bridge. Turn left onto Webbs Creek Road; it is here where you can truly relax as the road lazily unwinds beneath your wheels and you are completely surrounded by natural beauty. This road, in some parts, is literally right on the river's edge. You can pick up a really

good pace while admiring homesteads, paddocks, rock formations and verdant flora, because you have the entire road to yourself and there are only three very short pinch climbs to get over enroute. I had to stop several times- not only to savour lovely views-but to admire the occasional splash of boronia flowers in the dry bush and a few wild roadside peach trees just unfurling their pink buds in anticipation of spring.

It's all too soon that the valley opens up and I see the confluence of two rivers again. Reflecting on my ride while crossing the Hawkesbury again on the Webbs Creek Ferry, I feel elated and refreshed- my abilities reasserted. I saw 'new' features I have always missed, being inside a car. The Trek Domane performed faultlessly on both road and

The saying, 'No Risk, No Reward' is on repeat in my dreams that night...

SPRING RIDE FACT BOX

DIRT & TAR:

Settlers Road: 9km Dirt Road, 12km Tar (1hr 30, no stops)

Webbs Creek Road: 20km tar. (1hr, no stops)

Road bikes: Let a bit of air out your tyres for more cushioning and better bike handling on the dirt ie: I usually ride on the road inflated to 120psi. For this ride, my tyres were 100psi

Pre-Ride prep: Ensure your chain is well-lubed, or else dust and grit on Settlers' Road will quickly dry out your chain.

SAFETY:

Dirt Road: If you are riding on slick, skinny tyres, be aware that you cannot suddenly change lines to get out the way of motor vehicles like you can with knobbly tyres. Listen carefully for approaching vehicles and either pull over, or adjust the line you're cycling in advance.

Troubleshooting: Essential to carry a pump, spare tube, puncture repair items, a chain breaker tool. Next to no mobile reception around here!

Weekdays: Ride between 09H30 to 15H30 to avoid commuter traffic.

Weekends: Ride from 05H30 to 10H30 to avoid tourist traffic.

Weather & Access: Beware of extreme heat here in summer: carry sufficient water with hydration salts. Access to the MacDonald River Valley can be temporarily closed due to bushfires, flooding, or major Hawkesbury River

FACILITIES

Two free ferry transits across the Hawkesbury River.

St. Albans: Water and public toilets at St.Albans, Beer or coffee at historic Settlers' Inn or Fickle Wombat.

Wisemans: Water and public toilets at the East Bank Ferry Park. Ferry Artists' Gallery has beautiful work by local artists and Busby's Café next door has coffee, cake

and more.







THERE'S AN APP FOR THAT...

GETTING THE MESSAGE ACROSS



Being able to message people is one of the quickest and effective ways of communicating with family and friends. The problem is, which App to use. I used to really over think this dilemma but have now come to the conclusion that the most effective way is to use multiple Apps. Let's look at some of the different methods that I use:



Apple *iMessage* would probably be my most common go to method for sending messages. This is more because I use Apple devices and I can use it on my iPad as well as my iPhone, which also syncs with my computer. If I send a message to someone with an android device it will be sent as a traditional SMS (using cellular data and the message is green) instead of using iMessage (using your data allowance and is blue). I swim with a lovely bunch of ladies in Manly and we communicate regularly as a group called "Swimming Buddies" using iMessage.

As they are all Apple device uses, it works very well.



Facebook Messenger app is also one of my often used messenger Apps. My extended family has a shared group which includes family overseas, who are iPhone and Android uses. You don't have to have Facebook to download this App as your phone number can be used for identification.



WhatsApp is also a very popular messenger App. Like Facebook Messenger, it has over a billion users. It is also owned by Facebook which might surprise some of you. It has the facility for individual chatting or group chatting and with Facebook Messenger and WhatsAp you are also able to video call.



E FRIENDS OF FAGAN PARK

All the furnishings, curtains, paintings, lampshades and small items were returned to Netherby Homestead by late July, and it is once again open to the public. Thanks to all our volunteers who assisted - it was a big job washing and ironing all the bedding, tablecloths, and the large number of doilies. It certainly looks its sparkling best now.

Work has continued on the International truck project, and one of our members has almost completed a laminated timber rim for the steering wheel. We have found, however, that the steering wheel centre that we have (the metal part known as a 'spider'), is in fact from a Model T Ford. Although quite usable, we will try to find a correct one. We are also well

advanced in refurbishing the water pump that we were so lucky to obtain.

Did you know that the windmill in the heritage area has been standing there since the 1930's? It was delivered new to Sam Fagan C/O Hornsby Railway Station (you can still see this written in crayon on some steelwork from all those years ago), and erected over the well upon which it still stands (see photo). It is "Coo-ee" brand, made by John Danks & Sons, and was returned to full functionality by us about 10 years ago. The well itself is at least 8m deep - that was the length of the pipe we had to raise to replace the footvalve, about 3m diameter, and lined with stone. Just consider how much work it would have been digging

such a big hole by hand back then! It receives rainwater from adjacent roofs.

We will be hosting an "Open Day" on Sunday, September 30 – the Sunday of the long weekend. This will be an opportunity to bring out some of our stationary engines and run them, place the trucks and tractors on display, and take them for a run around the Park. All of the museums and the homestead will be open, with our members on hand to answer guestions. The Friends also offer light refreshments on the day. So make a picnic day of it and pay us a visit.

The Friends of Fagan Park are on deck every Tuesday, our volunteering day. Anyone is welcome to call in to check us out.

OF THE MONTH Truth to your own spirit. (Jim Morrison)

Superstitions are actually beliefs we hold without any true or rational basis; beliefs that may be exaggerated or quite simply false. Of course superstitions exist for all aspects of life – love, luck, weddings money, theatre, weather and particularly, death. They are passed on from person to person, generation or generation. Call them old wives tales, folklore or prophesy, superstitions foretell or fore sway future events.

Cemeteries, as we know, are the last resting places of the dead and the word cemetery actually derives from the Greek meaning "sleeping place". Because of their association with the dead, cemeteries are the subject of considerable superstition; notably in how to appease the dead and prevent them from returning.

The service road into and around the cemetery also carries superstition about it. These roads, usually wind in and around the cemetery leading to the chapel of rest, crematorium, crypts and columbarium. They were traditionally known as corpse roads and their initial

purpose was to confuse the spirits of the dead so they could not find their way back home.

Cemeteries follow a prescribed layout catering to traditional beliefs and well held superstitions. For example, Christian graves must face east as that is the direction from which Jesus will return as the rising sun, even though there is no specific biblical direction in this regard. This custom is still observed in cemetery planning today although this directional bias is being phased out as cemeteries become more crowded, making it now a question of catering for additional internments rather than observing tradition.

In Judaism, it is customary for Stones of Remembrance to be placed on gravestones by family and friends visiting the departed. This is done as a show of respect because, as a general rule, flowers are not placed at Jewish graves. Flowers are fleeting: the symbology inherent in the use of a stone is to show that the love. honour, memories and soul of the loved one are eternal.

A few other superstitions to ponder: never take flowers from a grave or point at a funeral procession as these actions are harbingers of bad luck. Do not leave the grave side before the casket is lowered as this portends

another death and rain on an open grave indicates bad luck will befall the deceased's family. Finally, never visit a cemetery at midnight as you might come across the guardian spirit, the Devil or the local youth contingent drinking red wine and reading either Edgar Allan Poe short stories or Stephen King novels.

Cemeteries are both fascinating monuments to social history and eerie cities of the silent populated by the dead where the superstitions surrounding them may be the best way to maintain cautionary commonsense practices to avoid one's own early grave.





"Possums or those wallabies that have been hanging around... maybe birds?"

"No...they would have left a few hanging as well as scraps on the ground."

There was only one species who would have have crept in and stolen every single orange from the trees. Far more than a family could eat.

Would they choke with every bite of the juicy fruit? I hope at least that they were in desperate need of them.

It left a horrid taste in our mouths.

Last week I caught up with an old friend in Forest Glen, and it is here that I am shocked to see the reality of how bad the drought is in NSW. Their enormous water tank is now empty. A feature lake near the house is a shrinking puddle. My friend is having to adjust an already tight budget to pay for water to be

Our acreage neighbours are doing it toughbut spare a thought and extend a helping hand to our farmers (and their animals) who are bearing the brunt of this drought.

THE JUNE ROUGHLEY MEMORIAL

LECTURE - UPDATE

On Saturday the 11th August our annual June Roughley Memorial Lecture was given by Darren Hopkins, in the Arcadia Community Hall.

ere was an excellent example of the work of the historical researcher. It is his or her function to study every document for relevant information on the chosen topic. It is exhausting and intense work. It involves endless hours in libraries, museums and like place. From this, hopefully, will come a body of work, similar to an encyclopaedia, on one subject. This becomes the material used

by historians to prepare family histories, local historical societies to assemble their references and to better understand where a community is placed in the overall story of a country. Such was what we heard from Darren after more than two years of research, triggered by the finding of the

Arcadia Still on the land once owned by William Fagan in Arcadia. This body of work, Irish Distillers in Colonial Times, will be used by the Society and others, to give long overdue recognition of the Hall Family in our district. It will give us a full Fagan Family story and it will give historians the material to better understand distilling in Australian history.

The market value of alcohol, in early Colonial times, was so high it forced the government to enact severe laws in an attempt to prevent its illegal distillation. Darren selected to give us the stories of how leading citizens could not resist the opportunity to make fortunes. They employed others to take the great risks. They protected their interests, when acting as magistrates or law officers, to remove the

opposition by sentencing them to far places of punishment. They protected their own illegal workers with light sentences or outlandish judgments or actions.

Some of the distillers were able to avoid discovery and they prospered. One such person was William Fagan. So successful was he that he was able to buy large landholdings. He was hard working and an astute businessman and he used his new wealth wisely. The Fagan Family story gave this district the fruit industry that became the largest in the British Empire. Their community contribution still benefits us and the family name is on our cenotaph.

All of Darren's research is now available at History Cottage and researchers are welcome.

and boatbuilder George Peat who had built early roads and established the first ferry service in 1844 operating between Mooney Mooney and Kangaroo Point on the Hawkesbury River.

Adrian started with the river and it's natural environment and it's importance to the Darkinjung people, the original custodians who were scattered brutally and effectively, not one of the NSW Government's finest accomplishment.

Please join us as we listen to Adrian speak about his recently published book Peat Island Dreaming and Desecration. In his talk, Adrian will discuss a history that outlines the prevailing attitudes to the treatment of mental illness throughout the 20th century, with the impact of the budgetary priorities of Government and how the island became a bureaucratic nightmare and a political football.

For just over 100 years, an institution for the mentally ill has stood on little Peat Island

on the lower Hawkesbury River. It was decommissioned in 2010; quite empty now, it remains a locked facility just as it had always been. And eerie. The island is still in the news as we await the Central Coast Council's plan for the

If the walls of the abandoned "lunatic asylum"

Libraries and book lending have always been a core part of Hornsby Shire Council's services and now we are taking it to the streets.

Council is in the process of adopting a new policy that extends public liability coverage for the placement of street libraries on public land. Our first preference is that they be placed on private property, but if that is not practical the policy will allow them to be placed on Council land.

am proud to have turned the first sod to mark the official start of the \$200 million Stage 2 redevelopment at Hornsby Hospital. I was pleased to share this occasion with the wonderful staff from the Hospital, who do an amazing job looking after our community.

The redevelopment is about providing a better experience for patients, carers, staff and visitors to Hornsby Ku-ring-gai in a purpose-built facility that meets the needs of the community well into the future.

The \$200 million redevelopment will deliver a refurbished and expanded Emergency Department. While the new Clinical Services Building will accommodate a wide variety of specialities including

This is in addition to the \$19.8 million multi-storey car park which is due to be completed at the end of this year and open to staff, visitors and the public in early 2019.

MORE THAN 100 LOCAL BEROWRA GROUPS UNITE FOR A 'SUICIDE SAFE' COMMUNITY

n 31 July, Julian Leeser MP, federal Member for Berowra, hosted a Lifeline training session for community leaders from across his electorate in Northern Sydney. More than 170 people participated, representing around 100 local community organisations. Participants included representatives from local sports clubs, churches, schools, Parents and Citizens groups, Rotary, Lions, Toastmasters, the Scouts and other civic groups in the area. The session was held at the Hornsby RSL.

"Since I was elected in 2016, I have placed suicide prevention at the front and centre of what I hope to achieve as a Parliamentarian," said Mr Leeser, who lost his own father to suicide.

"In the past decade, 109 people in Berowra have died by suicide. Building close-knit, resilient local communities is a critical response to this crisis. "

"My goal is to make Berowra a 'suicide-safe' community. My first step is to partner with local community groups and to build up the skills of recognising when people are in crisis and how we, as individuals, can help them."

Mr Leeser directly challenged participants to undertake Lifeline's Accidental

Counsellor Program within their organisations. More than 15 organisations took a pledge to do so on the night, with many more expressing an interest.

"I am immensely buoyed by our community's support for taking decisive action on suicide prevention," said Mr Leeser.

"Berowra is leading the country on suicide prevention. I intend to challenge my parliamentary colleagues to mobilise their electorates to undertake a similar program. Together, we can make a difference."

Ms Wendy Carver, CEO of Lifeline Hills to Hawkesbury, said that she was excited by the innovation of Mr Leeser's community forum.

"I am moved by the amazing groundswell of community support and interest in tackling the challenge of suicide that this forum has generated. Bringing together all these groups has never been done before. I want to thank Julian for this trailblazing initiative that we think will have important ramifications. We at Lifeline feel very fortunate to have his support and enthusiasm."

Mr Ted Nabung, Principal of Hornsby Ku-Ring-Gai Community College, said that he was struck by how

confronting asking friends and family about suicide could be.

"The program tonight really hit home with me," said Mr Nabung.

"When we dare to ask someone if he or she is contemplating suicide, we're faced with the problem of being awkward or even the question of compromising your friendship. This is a risk. but what I got out of the night is that this is a risk worth taking."

Ms Cutty Felton from Lifeline delivered Lifeline's Dare to Ask program. Participants learned:

- How to recognise potential signs that another might be thinking about taking his or
- How to ask about the question and respond to someone's answer using the skills of empathy
- That we are never responsible for the decisions that others might make, but we can make a significant difference by having the courage to start the conversation and the knowledge of where to access help
- The necessity to prioritise self-care as Daring to Ask another who is struggling can be highly confronting.



Are you BUSH FIRE READY?

Getting ready for a bush fire is easier than you think. By taking 20 minutes with your family to discuss what you'll do during a fire, you could save their lives, as well as your home.

FOUR SIMPLE STEPS to get ready for a bush fire:

STEP 1 - DISCUSS WHAT TO DO IF A BUSH FIRE THREATENS YOUR HOME

Many households find that having a discussion over dinner works best as everybody is together and focussed.

STEP 2 - PREPARE YOUR HOME AND GET IT READY FOR **BUSH FIRE SEASON**

There are simple things you can do around your home to prepare it for a bush fire, like keeping the grass low and having a cleared area around your home.

STEP 3 - KNOW THE BUSH FIRE ALERT LEVELS

If there is a fire in your area you will find its alert level on the NSW RFS website and in the 'Fires Near Me' app. You need to keep track of the alert level so you know what you should do.

STEP 4 - KEEP ALL THE BUSH FIRE INFORMATION NUMBERS, WEBSITES AND THE SMARTPHONE APP

In a bush fire, it's important that you stay up to date on conditions in your area.

Incidents

The Brigade has attended a number of incidents, including a fire on council land next to our station. With the current weather conditions, multiple Brigades are being dispatched to each call to ensure there are sufficient resources available to deal with the incident.

Have fire, will travel

Deputy Captain Craig Whiteman volunteered to join a Remote Area Firefighting Team (RAFT) deployment to the Bega area to assist with a fire burning in difficult terrain. While fires of this nature are not typical of this time of year, the snow that occurred at the end of the deployment was not.

Fire Danger Period and Fire Permits

Much of eastern NSW will have an early start for the Bush Fire Danger Period, now commencing on 1st September. During this period a Fire Permit is required for fires other than cooking fires that are in a permanently constructed fireplace; surrounded by ground that is cleared of

all combustible materials for a distance of at least two metres all around. All permits have standard conditions that the permit holder must remain on site until the fire is extinguished and adjoining neighbours and the RFS offices at Hornsby (9883-2000) or The Hills (9654-1244) must be notified at least 24 hours (unless specified otherwise) prior to the fire being lit. Do not ring the station. Permits may be varied, cancelled or suspended, depending on weather conditions.

Arcadia has been busy, planning away, to offer you an informative and inclusive event. Come for a BBQ, and have a chat to our friendly firies about the risks specific to the Arcadia area. If you've got a portable pump then bring that along too if you need a hand with it. We will have sessions on how to best protect your home, the past history of fires in our area, and what to do with your animals. Bring the kids too!

Station opens 11am, come grab some lunch at our BBQ!

12 pm – Preparing you home tips and tricks + local bushfire history

1 pm - Pumps session -When did you last test yours? 2 pm - Kitchen fire demonstration

Preparing your animals for incidents, kids activities, and registering your property for bush fire inspection will run from 11am - 3pm.

With the fire season nearly upon us and the unrelenting dry autumn

and winter we've experienced, we must push this message of preparing for survival. Our last major fires in this area was in 2002, we must not become complacent. Further to this message of planning and preparing, whilst undertaking pile burns to reduce your own bushfire hazards, please ensure that adequate water is at all times accessible, and that the pile burn is constantly monitored. Over the past month there have been numerous preventable fires that started as escaped pile burns. Don't be the risk to your neighbours and wider community.

In August Arcadia, alongside Galston and Dural RFB, Fire & Rescue Castle Hill. Police, and NSW Ambulance, we assisted an injured bushwalker from an arduous trail. We had a great outcome, and it was an excellent demonstration of interagency cooperation and cohesion. This work we do with other agencies is something we continuously work towards improving. Whilst we continue keeping up with Arcadia, just under 12 months ago the Arcadia brigade started a long-term plan to ensure that we were fully prepared when on the many and varied incidents we work



with our friends and colleagues at Fire & Rescue Castle Hill. This has involved joint exercises at both the Castle Hill and Arcadia stations, and orchestrating a large-scale training exercise at Vision Valley in Arcadia. This training event involved 6 RFS brigades, from the Hornsby/ Ku-Ring-Gai and Hills districts, and Fire & Rescue A Platoon. This multifaceted training scenario was focused on dealing with a very large structure fire with people reported being missing inside the building, while also testing the fireground management, breathing apparatus, communications and first aid.

From the fantastic feedback from all involved, it was agreed that we need to continue to do this joint training, which we did. Both Arcadia and Castle Hill's A Platoon developed the next steps of the training program, which was focussed on using Fire & Rescue's computer-based scenario training system. From the initial success of this we opened this up to other RFS brigades, Galston, Dural, and the Hills district. While we train we continue to build on the already great relationship we have with Fire Rescue, this ensures that we have a cohesive teamwork and approach while we are working together.

OFFICIAL START TO BUSH FIRE SEASON BROUGHT FORWARD

NSW Rural Fire Service (NSW RFS) advises the statutory Bush Fire Danger Period has been brought forward and will commence on 1st September 2018, one month ahead of the usual commencement date.

Inspector Rolf Poole, Acting District Manager said, "The early start to the Bush Fire Danger Period is a result of the current drought conditions and elevated fire risk being experienced across the state and in the local government areas."

"This action to bring forward the official Bush Fire Danger Period is being taken to better manage the fires being lit in the open, for legitimate reasons, and to mitigate

potential fire escapes."

The Bush Fire Danger Period will run from 1st September 2018 to 31st March 2019 and fire safety permits are required for open burning activities including pile burning, hazard reduction burning activities, during this period.

A Fire Safety Permit can be obtained free of charge by contacting the local Fire Brigade or Fire Control Centre and is an additional requirement to environmental approvals that are required all year round.

"Significant penalties apply to those who light fires in the open without a permit, without providing the mandatory notice or for allowing a fire to escape your property", Inspector Poole said.

Offenses under the Rural Fires Act 1997 include fines in excess of \$1,100 for failing to notify authorities prior to lighting, or lighting fires that are dangerous to buildings. Unlawfully leaving a fire unattended before being extinguished, attracts a fine of \$2,200.

"Whilst this is not the first time the Bush Fire Danger Period has been brought forward due to the current conditions, it is a bit of a wake-up call for authorities and the greater community to be cautious

and prepared during the bush fire

MIDDLE DURAL RURAL FIRE BRIGADE NEWS

We have had a run of glorious weather, but dry and very windy, so once again, the fire season is here. Our Brigade went to several fires in winter, one a pile burn that got away. We also finished off the Wyoming Road hazard reduction, next to Langford Road. Many thanks to members of other Brigades that took part in this burn: Annangrove, Glenhaven, Glenorie, Maroota, Round Corner and North Rocks. Thanks Guys, you're Legends! Many of the properties have fences going to the edge of the gully so access was sometimes challenging.

Fire has a nasty habit of getting into tree roots, under green grass,

or into peaty matter, in a silent and potentially devastating manner. Our picture shows the base of a beautiful, apparently healthy, Sydney red gum, ten days after a hazard reduction this year. There was no indication of fire anywhere in this tree until three days afterwards when smoke was sighted coming out the leaf canopy. Was it an ember, or fire travelling underground invisibly along a root? We don't know, but, importantly, you should be aware of the potential for this to happen when you light a fire.

From the day the fire season is declared, you must not burn any pile or any bush. If you have a compelling need to burn a pile, you must obtain a permit from your local fire brigade (Middle Dural Senior Deputy Ken Middleton 0417 203 088). You may have a barbecue if the fire is in a permanently constructed fireplace; at a site surrounded by ground that is cleared of all combustible materials for a

distance of at least two metres all around; and if the fire is completely extinguished before you leave it.

Check with The Hills District Office (9654 1244), if you have any doubts.

Training is ongoing. Some of our



members attended a Refresher course on the use of fire-fighting foam, which acts as a fire retardant and holds water where it's wanted.

Every step counts towards a healthy life

'his National Stroke Week (September 3-9) the Stroke Foundation is spreading the word that 80 percent of strokes can be prevented by living a healthy lifestyle.

Given there will be more than 56.000 strokes in 2018 alone, now is the perfect time for Australians of all ages to make small steps to improve their health and reduce their stroke risk.

Steps include increasing physical activity, eating a balanced diet, moderating alcohol consumption, avoiding smoking and managing blood pressure and cholesterol.

More than 2300 community activities will be held across the country during National Stroke Week. Activities range from free health checks, to morning teas, information stalls, talks from stroke survivors and personal or team fundraising challenges.

Why should you care?

- Stroke can impact anyone of any age.
- There is currently one stroke every nine minutes and that is on track to reach one every four minutes by 2050.

Ensure you know the FAST signs

- F Facial drooping
- A Arm weakness
- S Speech difficulties
- T Time. If you notice any of the above symptons, time is of the essense. Call the emergency services or go to the hospital.


The members from each club were organised into riding levels and it was wonderful to see the riders from the two different clubs having so much fun together.



NORTHHOLM STUDENTS SUPPORTING OUR FARMERS



WHAT IT IS TO BE A CHRISTIAN

Hillslife Church has been exploring what it is to be a Christian; as the word seems to have been diluted in its power, its weight.

Last month we looked at the clothing label Christians, those who lean in (put on more clothes) when times are tough, but when life is smooth - well who needs prayer, Church, God?

Another group wears its Christianity like make up. Unfortunately far too many people outside the church meet this type of Christian.

Make up is a concealer, it smoothes out the wrinkles, it enhances our better features and hides the parts we would rather not highlight.

How often as Christians are we quick to highlight another's weakness or sin, and yet happily conceal our own?

Far too often we in the Church are quick to judge a non believer's behaviour and yet ignore our own actions. Or we highlight a specific area while ignoring another.

Are you in danger of being a Christian like make up? Quick to jump on another's sin but not acknoweldging how broken we are?

Romans 3:23 reminds us, "for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God".

Our Christian faith is not about removing our blemishes, our weaknesses, rather we should highlight them!

2 Corinthians 12:9 says, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." Therefore I will boast all the more gladly about my weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on me."

As a Church, as a Christian, I encourage you to remove your make up. To stop concealing our true selves and acknowledge that we are made perfect through Christ.

By our own strength we too remain as broken, as hopeless, as wanting as everyone else in the world.

Yet when we embrace grace we inherit the freedom and perfection offered through Jesus' perfect life.

Let us not wear our faith like make up - a mask that shields our true selves.

Rather be a light of the love found in Jesus and the fruits of Holy Spirit shine through us most likely in our areas of weakness!



If you were to ask people what they wanted out of life, most would probably reply, "All I want is to be happy." Most people just want to be happy, and they work extremely hard to achieve that goal. They choose different avenues - self-help books, a change of occupation or lifestyle, for example – in an attempt to find that elusive quality of happiness.

However, the experience of many indicates that people do not become happy simply by pursuing happiness. The Irish playwright George Bernard Shaw put it this way, "The surest way to be miserable is to have the leisure to wonder whether or not you are happy."

How King Solomon would have agreed with that observation! He had all the resources that the world could offer and he was determined to get the most out of life, but he only encountered disappointment. The outcome of his search for happiness is recorded in Ecclesiastes 2:10-11: "I denied myself nothing my eyes desired; I refused my heart no pleasure. My heart took delight in all my work, and this was the

reward for all my labour. Yet when I surveyed all that my hands had done, and what I toiled to achieve, everything was meaningless, a chasing after the wind; nothing was gained under the sun."

Finally, after much reflection, he discovered some of the principles that make for a happy life, and I would like to share those observations with you over the next few months.

Solomon's first piece of advice is simple but profound: Enjoy the present. Because he was always looking for great answers and supreme meaning, Solomon missed out on the blessing and importance of the small actions and events of everyday life. He focussed so much on the destination that he forgot to enjoy the journey. It is an easy mistake to make, but a preoccupation with the future can rob us of present joy and contentment. We can concentrate so much on where we want to be that we fail to enjoy what we have now.

Life is a gift to be enjoyed in the present. Past memories and future goals enrich our lives, but we need to appreciate and enjoy life in the here and now. This is what Solomon discovered. "I know that there is nothing better for men than to be happy and do good while they live. That everyone may eat and drink, and find satisfaction in his toil this is the gift of God" (Ecclesiastes 3:12-13).



Have you ever read the transcript of a radio conversation between a U.S. naval ship and Canadian authorities off the coast of Newfoundland in October 1995? It goes like this:

" U.S. ship: Please divert your course 0.5 degrees to the south to avoid a collision.

CND reply: Recommend you divert your course 15 degrees to the south to avoid a collision.

U.S. ship: This is the captain of a U.S. navy ship. I say again, divert your course.

CND reply: No, I say again, you divert YOUR course.

U. S. ship: THIS IS THE AIRCRAFT CARRIER USS CORAL SEA. WE ARE A LARGE WARSHIP OF THE U.S. NAVY. DIVERT YOUR COURSE NOW.

CND reply: This is a lighthouse. Your call."

Although this joke has been told as if it was an event that really took place, it never actually happened. It truly is a joke!

However, a lighthouse is a very important structure, used for two main purposes- to serve as a navigational aid and to warn boats of dangerous areas. It is said to be "like a traffic sign on the sea."

A researcherl read about, explained the symbolic meaning of a



lighthouse: "Lighthouses symbolise the WAY forward and help in navigating our WAY through rough waters, whether they be financial, personal, business or spiritual in nature."

For thousands of years, the Bible has shown individuals, people groups and nations the WAY to live. Proverbs 3:5-6 says, "Trust in the Lord with all your heart& lean not on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge Him & He will direct your path."

Jesus Christ, God's Son, Lells us in John 14:1 & 6: "Do not let your hearts be troubled. Trust in God and trust also in Me...I AM the WAY, the Truth & the Life. No one can come to the Father except through Me."

Jesus IS the Way, the best lighthouse of all!

WHAT ABOUT GRIEVING THE HOLY SPIRIT?



Here is another command to each believer: 'Do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God'. (Ephesians 4:30). Do you know what this means? The word 'grieve' means to cause sorrow of heart. Dr G. Campbell Morgan said, 'There is no word in the New Testament which more clearly and beautifully reveals the tenderness of the heart of God'.

God uses this word to teach us that it is possible for a child of His, indwelt by the Holy Spirit, to cause sorrow to His heart. How? By preventing Him, or hindering Him, from doing the work He wants to do in our hearts.

We are often stubborn and unyielding. We are sinful and wilful. His heart is grieved as He sees us living on a spiritual level far below that which He has planned and to which He wants to lift us. He has planned for us a life of victory. We grieve Him when we live in defeat. He has planned a life of service and witnessing. We grieve Him when we turn aside. Anything short of the Spirit's plan is a grief to Him.

The Holy Spirit seeks to lead us on, but because the pathway of devotion and consecration is always the path of the Cross, we draw back. That would mean the giving up of our own will.

But while 'self' is on the throne of our heart, Christ is not! When Christ is on the throne,

'self' is on the Cross. This is what the Holy Spirit wants to make real to us every day!

How do we know that He is grieved? It will not be difficult.
Our whole life will be affected.
Our sense of fellowship and communion with the Lord will be lost.

The reason will not be hard to find. The Holy Spirit will have to stop His work of developing the character of Christ in us and go back to His first work again, that of convicting us of sin. As some one has said, 'He stops revealing Christ and instead concentrates on revealing sin to the heart until repentance is produced'.

When the Spirit is grieved the Bible will lose it's freamess and prayer will lose it's Joy. We are dependent on the Spirit for illumination in study, for inspiration in prayer. When we grieve Him, He is compelled to stop those ministries.

Victory over sin becomes less and less frequent. The reality of Christ fades. Assurance is replaced by doubt. Power in service is absent.

We will know when we grieve the Spirit, because He wants us to know it. He also wants us to know that through repentance His

fellowship can be

What shall we do?

If we have grieved Him, what then? 'If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness'(1 John1:9). Remember the Holy Spirit is never grieved AWAY. He remains in hope of the cloud being rolled away.

If we really want His fullness, here is where we must begin! First repentance, then the complete surrender and yielding of our wills to the Holy Spirit so that He can continue His mighty work in us and through us.

WARRAH SPRING FAIR

Saturday 8th September 2018

ith the last frost gone and the nursery full of spring sowings of basil. cucumber, zucchini, tomatoes and more, we look forward to a change in the rhythm and colour of the farm. We will be applying our biodynamic preparations prior to tilling the land and getting our first sector of beds ready to receive a good helping of compost prior to planting.

This is an exciting time of year for the

farm, coming out of a slumber as the soil begins to warm we are able to grow a much wider variety of crops and flowers. This year we will also have many more strawberries. We will avoid the temptation of picking our recently planted asparagus crowns and let them establish themselves for next year.

Recently we took part in a six-week work experience program for several of our clients with disabilities. The clients, supported by volunteers from overseas, spent two days per week involved with various aspects of the farm. Activities ranged from preparing ground, planting, weeding, propagation and general maintenance.

We are currently harvesting beetroot, carrot, chard, coriander, fennel, grapefruit, kale, leeks, lettuce, orange,

pak choi, parsley, radish, rocket and salad mix.

Do not forgot to come along to the farm tour at 11am on the day of the Spring Fair (8 September) for a wander around the garden and a chat about our ethos, growing methods and the tools we use. You will also be able to see our revamped farm shop with its extended range of organic and biodynamic produce and groceries.





NOW CARRS BUSH IS EVEN BETTER!

Carrs Bush is an area of glorious bushland in the bottom corner of Fagan Park. At least most is glorious - a small section near Bayfield Road is badly affected by nasty weeds like privet, blackberry and bridal creeper.

Three years ago Still Creek Landcare got a \$40,000 grant to attack some of these weeds. We hired contractors and did lots of voluntary work as well. We have now finished this project and the results are excellent - blackberries and bridal creeper are gone. At Council's request,

we left some privet as small bird habitat, but most is gone. There will be lots of follow-up maintenance because privet has an annoying habit of sending up new seedlings when the parent trees are removed

So take a stroll through this area and

admire our hard work, but be careful not tread on any of the new native plants that are coming up, like wattles, peas, ferns and native grasses. Some rain would help enormously!

Some Landcare members also work in the Bushcare group in this area. It gives us a real buzz when we see the improvements we have made over time. You

GALSTON GARDEN CLUB

On a crisp and chilly day a number of club members rugged up and readied themselves for a guided walk through the St Ives Native Flower Nursery and surrounding bushland. We started with a bracing hot cup of tea or coffee and homemade slice, and then we were off. At first we couldn't "see" the flowers that were all around us, only the bush, but as our guide pointed out the small and large flowering natives we soon became more aware of the variety of plants that were in flower. Natives, we were informed, are great winter flowering plants and everyone took the opportunity to purchase some in the nursery afterward.

Many of us have a very natural wariness when bees come buzzing around us, however what do you do when they are swarming in your backyard, on your car, in your letterbox or on a pot plant? You contact Norm Webb, our guest speaker for August an amateur apiarist with over 80 hives. Norm and many bee keepers are more than happy to come and remove a swarm and rehome them into hives. Norm explained the many reasons bees swarm and why, to us, they select some very inappropriate places, as far as we are concerned! They are looking to replicate a natural environment in which to make a hive and in the bush that would be a tree hollow, so it is natural they will look for somewhere there is an opening. The two things you do not do is spray them with insecticide (kills them) or a hose (drowns them), instead contact a local Bee Keeping Club who will safely remove the bees. Our bee numbers are reducing and without bees it is not just honey that we will lose it is our entire food supply. Bees play one of the most important roles in pollinating plants so that they will produce fruit, flowers and vegetables.

Preparations are well under way now for the October Open Gardens weekend with brochures being distributed by members. So come along now and take a peek at five of the nine gardens that will be open rain, hail or shine on 19th, 20th and 21st October. Starting at "Dural Gardens" 24 Sagars Rd Dural, this formal style garden features beautiful garden beds with 100's of roses and an Avenue of Chanticleer pears, come across now to "Palarang" in 7 Hunt Ave Dural, where this country style garden also features 100's of bush and

climbing roses, pergola, rose arbour and other garden structures. Not every garden is on acres and at "Burnt Rails" in 28 Glen St is an excellent example of what can be fitted into a small shaded garden, including small water features. Then pop around to the ever favourite "Elegans" at 21 Fishburns Rd Galston, a collector's garden based on coloured foliage effects as well as four ponds that incorporates many bridges and arches, a wonderful place to wander and lose yourself in the tranquillity and beauty of flowering camellias and many other specimen plants. Then you come to "Brackenridge" at 11 Ballandra Pl Dural. This steep block has magnificent rock outcrops, this older garden is being lovingly restored by the new owners and we're looking forward to seeing how this garden

reveals itself in coming years. There are still four more gardens that we will explore in the next issue, so hopefully we have whetted your appetite and look forward to seeing you on the weekend. 


RAINFALL CHART


