Galston has been named as one of the Town Centres to receive a significant make-over through the public domain plans that Hornsby Council is going to create.





The primary goal of these plans is to create attractive meeting places where people can gather and socialise. The public domain plans will set out design principles, which will then be implemented either through capital works by Council or through agreements with developers.


"We're not just talking about putting in a few park benches, this is refurbishing the public areas of the town centres from top to bottom," Mayor Ruddock said. "The plans will include a range of improvements such as upgraded paving, consistent street lighting and expanded public areas with greater opportunities outdoor dining."

The areas identified as being in most need of public domain plans include Hornsby (both west and east side), Pennant Hills, Beecroft, Asquith, Galston and Cherrybrook.





\$2.5M from the State Government to Hornsby Shire for planning. Circa \$150,000 to be spent on developing an accelerated Rural Lands Vision for the Hornsby Shire. By Callum Hoogesteger

inally, Hornsby Shire has the funding to undertake a truly evidence-based plan for Glenorie and the wider rural surrounds. Our community appears to be at a juncture where in the coming months decisions will be made that will determine how we in Glenorie will live. To date a lack of funding and action by Hornsby Council (the last plan was done 20 years ago) has meant very little development in the Hornsby Shire area of Glenorie which

has had its own pros and cons. This is despite various action groups and parties with vested interests pushing very hard for smaller lots, even down to 1 acre.

What is your vision for your community and how do you want to live in the area? The Government has 2 plans for Glenorie. One for the west side (https://www.greater.sydney/central-city-district-plan/) and one for the east side (https://www.greater.sydney/north-district-plan). Again,

Glenorie is split by Shire, by State and Federal Electorates and by Greater Sydney plans. The opportunity may exist however during the planning, for dialogue between Hills and Hornsby to get some cohesive outcomes for Glenorie. This is one of the goals of Glenorie Progress Association.

Rather than simply continue the urban sprawl and squeeze in more houses on smaller lot sizes, the opportunity exists to increase the various villages to create a mix of housing

whilst preserving the green surrounds of our villages that we all enjoy. At the same time the few local stone fruit growers left are struggling to make ends meet. Many are in the process of or have already simply shut up shop and are now sitting on significant land holdings unable to earn an income from the land. Others would love to sell a portion of their land to reinvest into more intense operations requiring more infrastructure. This is the difficult position Hornsby Shire Council will find themselves in when looking at the evidence and finding the balance between

a farmer who wants to get a return from their property and maintaining lot sizes that preserve the rural setting if the district.

The district has the unique advantage of being a "playground" for Sydney within 1 hour of the CBD. Surely, we can capitalise on this advantage. The unique features include the Hawkesbury River, endless national parks and forest, farming and agricultural experiences and produce, dining, camps and youth activities, equine and small businesses of every sort. Some entrepreneurs have

worked really hard to capitalise on these features such as Canoelands Orchard http:// www.canoelandsorchard. com/, who continue to evolve their business to meet the market. However, regulations and red tape prevent some businesses from evolving to meet the local needs. For example, there is hardly a quest house in the area and when a larger function is run locally friends and relatives are forced to stay in Castle Hill. This is where council needs a plan.

If larger lot sizes are to continue and if the residents are relying on running a business from the land, then the business needs to be viable. Otherwise the push

will continue for more sub division as it is an obvious path to a return on investment. Council needs to support a wide range of businesses that return viability to the land.

At the Glenorie Progress Association the consensus from a widely canvased review was that we are keen to see a thriving village with a housing mix that supports different people and families at different stages in life, local retail and services, transport and the critical mass of population to make those shops and services viable. This may mean that the village needs to expand, but that should be done to a plan that is widely accepted by the community. We are also

keen to see the natural and rural surrounds of Glenorie and the district preserved. This means that it should be easy for hard working locals to run their business from their properties. There should be council support rather than red tape, and local enterprise should be encouraged. Every home business means one less person commuting to the city for work, it can also mean more local employment for residents.

Hornsby Council are committed to accelerating their Rural Lands Vision, why not make your voice heard and contribute to that plan via the GPA. It's easy to join and all residents are welcome.

GALSTON SHOPPING PRECINCT UPGRADES 2020-21

At our meeting held on the 25th October at the Galston club we invited members and guests to listen and participate in discussions about the Galston shopping precinct.

UR FIRST SPEAKER was Fiona Robbe, local resident and landscape architect, who presented past design ideas with traffic and pedestrian solutions with unique ideas to make Galston a rural village with atmosphere. Hornsby Council General Manager, Steve Head, presented the need to improve Galston with pedestrian safety and traffic management, which is imperative in the new plans. Hornsby Shire Councillor Warren Waddell, spoke about the need to ignite discussions and the need to engage the community and make public and private space work together for a better Galston Village.

The meeting was opened to the floor with ideas of how the community wants to see Galston:

- Traffic management plan including slow traffic and make it safer to cross the road, angled parking and slip road.
- Access to public toilets
- · Pedestrian safety
- A hitching rail for horses
- Bike racks and cycleways
- Improved Library to include IT hub and better services
- Coach parking
- Local shops = local employment
- Green spaces and community gardens
- · Improved disabled parking and easier access to the shops

- Playground and youth activities
- Collaboration between precinct owners
- Cohesive approach and encouraging employment with improved public transport.

There were many more thoughts on the night but everyone at the meeting was in agreement in wanting to see improvements for this community space. The council has received four tenders and the process continues through 2019 with further community consultation and collaboration. The designs will be produced by mid-2019 and construction during 2020-2021. An exciting time for the Galston Village, so keep up to date on further meetings.



IT'S NOT ALL PIE IN THE **SKY WHEN YOU DIE...** By Susanna Mills

Looking ahead to 2019, I decided to try 'upping my miles' for this issue's cycling article. I've set my sights on the few roads left in our area that I know are less travelled before sunrise, reasoning that a suitable alternative to the busy Two Gorges route would be to cycle to the famous 'Pie in the Sky' and back. This route has all the features of the Two Gorges route, namely: Two Gorges! An extra 10km in distance! Exquisite bushland scenery! & At the turn around point you can relax and enjoy a pie and a coffee! Well, yes and no...

arly morning cycling along Arcadia Road towards ■Berowra Waters is always blissful, as you can watch the sun rise from behind your handlebars. It's an easy roll, mostly downhill with a little pinch climb up past Charlton's Creek Road. At Chilcott Road I spot two other early risers out on their bikes. I quickly catch up and, being a mountain biker, simply can't resist overtaking them. The air is scything through my wheels as I descend at over 50km/h to the ferry. I am exhilarated and so glad that I have never stopped cycling.

After introducing myself on the ferry, I watch my two new acquaintances extract their revenge and vanish up the switchbacks way ahead of me. Still, the climb to the suburb of Berowra, is one of my local favourites. It's got a gentle gradient, smooth surface, is lined with ferns and moss and threads of mist in all the valleys;

and if you know where to look, you can spot the pylons that festoon Crosslands Road.

An excellent cycle lane along Berowra Waters Road dispatches me efficiently onto the Pacific Highway. Here, I turn left past the railway station for the final 8km up to Pie in the Sky. This is a beautiful stretch of road to cycle on, with snaking downhills and forever views into mysterious valleys. An interesting spin through the charming village of Cowan takes me across the very narrow railway bridge and then I am right into the final slog up to Pie. There is a bunch of other riders also catching their breath there, but I'm disappointed to see that the restaurant is closed- we are all too early, it seems!

The return ride starts off well, but the descent back down to the ferry now involves a bit more traffic, so I have to slow down. While on the water, I have the sense to consume

a Gu for the hectic climb back up to Chilcott, which I call the Berowra B***h... It lures you in with the sweet sounds of rushing water, lyrebird sightings, picturesque rocks and Salmon Gums. All that is quickly forgotten where the road takes a savage turn into a steeper gradient and by the time I get to the first driveways of Berrilee, I'm going so slow I can hardly keep my bike upright. A tiny reprieve past Mulawa Stud, then it's relentlessly up to Chilcott, and gradually up again to Calabash Road. By the time I get to Arcadia School my knee is hurting and I feel like I'm going to die. I am very glad that I took that Gu earlier!

Ten minutes later I've dragged myself back into Galston. I'm very relieved to be sitting at the Steamyard Café, commiserating with owner Michael Gobran whilst savouring a very well-earned, large cappuchino!

DIFFICULTY: 54.2km. 2.5 to 3 hours. Lots of hill climbing, don't be fooled by the distance. This is a hard ride.

BE PREPARED: To avoid injury, put some consistent 30km+ rides in before you try this one! (I've certainly learnt my lesson).

TAKE: Two drink bottles, some solid food and definitely consume an energy gel when waiting for the ferry to get you up that wicked hill on the return ride.

GO EARLY: It may mean you miss Pie in the Sky being open, but do this ride early. Although quiet during weekdays, on weekends it is a highly popular route for motorcyclists, fishermen towing boats and large bunches of cyclists-who ride here from all over Sydneyare getting so numerous that soon not everyone will fit onto the ferry!







GEELANDS ROAD DUMPER PLEADS NOT GUILTY

Paul Mouawad, the owner of Aussie Earthovers, attended the Land and Environment Court on Friday 23rd November. The charges were bought by the NSW EPA following the dumping of asbestos contaminated fill at 22 Geelans Road, Arcadia. He pleaded not guilty to most charges.

In March the EPA took soil samples at 22 Geelans Rd, Arcadia, and found it to be contaminated with asbestos. They also discovered anomalies in the paperwork relating to the fill that was delivered to the

If found guilty, the Court can impose a fine of up to \$240,000 or imprisonment for 18 months, or both for supplying false or misleading information.

We understand the NSW Government passed new laws recently creating a new offence for asbestos dumping, attracting the highest level of penalties including infringements of \$5 million for a company and \$500,000 for an individual.

We will report further once the outcome of the court case is known.








THERE'S AN APP FOR THAT...

MANAGING APP SUBSCRIPTIONS



Have you ever found, that you have taken out a Subscription on an App, or even signed up for an App Trial, and then before you know it you have paid for another year, or started paying after the trial when you really meant to cancel? Here are some tips on how to manage Subscriptions.

App Trials

This is a great way to find out whether you like an App. Feel free to sign up for the App, remembering that they will often start charging you after the Trial period has finished. A good suggestion is, once you take out a Trial you then go to Subscriptions and cancel the Subscription. You will still be able to use the App whilst the Trial period is running but will not then be charged. If you decide to go ahead with the App, sign up again and although you will not be able to do the Trial again, you can then start paying and continuing to enjoy the App.

Subscriptions

So you have paid for a Subscription for an App for a year and are concerned that you will be charged again without having made a decision as to whether you want it again for another year. Just like the Trial. go into Subscription settings and cancel the Subscription. You will still be eligible to use the App until the paid period has finished.

How to control **Subscriptions**

On an **Apple Device** go to Settings>iTunes & App Stores>Apple ID>View Apple **ID>Subscriptions**

Not really easy to find but when you do you will see all the Apps that you have subscribed to. You can then manage them.

On Google Play go to the menu bar in the top left hand corner then tap on



Subscriptions. Like the App Store, you will see a list of Apps that you have subscribed to and you are now able to manage them.

If you are planning to purchase an iPhone, iPad or Mac computer as a gift for a family member or friend, you might like to consider purchasing a One on One voucher(s) to add to the gift. One on One classes are about personal service to make sure that the individual gets the best use out of their Apple device.



emeteries are unique places within our cultural heritage being part of the everyday scene but not usually part of everyday life. Thus a cemetery is a place where tranquillity and guiet are the desired

norm and the activities of the everyday

suspended in quiet reflection.

I have looked at our behaviour in these places which is defined not so much by how we grieve or mourn a loved one but more about how we have been taught to remember by locating ourselves in a specific place to do so and observing appropriate decorum by employing symbols,

meanings and rituals as a ways and means of remembrance.

The act of remembrance commemorates through recollection the essence of the departed: it is giving them life again if only briefly in recalled memories of who they were and what they meant to us. Remembrance can take many shapes and forms: the use of epitaphs provides a brief précis of the life and times of the departed. Who they were, their achievements and how we will recall them are inscribed on a memorial stone in a prescribed manner as a reminder to ourselves

and others. But sometimes a memory can be stirred be a certain perfume, a musical air, guitar riff or song, an attitude or pose of a stranger that strikes as familiar. It can be a collective memory shared with others or a private reflection of another space and time which connects with the loved one.

So there you have it. We will all travel the Corpse Road one day to our final resting place to be marked by a memorial gravestone or plague with some pithy description of who we were and what we did in life. These serve as reminders of our existence and also act as an aide memoir of the time honoured tradition called remembrance.

The desire to be remembered lives within our genetic and cultural




makeup. It is the age-old reason why we carve our initials in trees, place our hands in cement and chalk our names on rocks. We want to leave our mark: to be remembered. But for the living, the real marks our departed loved ones leave are the ones they've left on us: a hug, a smile, a timely word of advice. We want to remember those we've loved and lost, not only for them but also more importantly for ourselves: to mend, to heal, to live and never to forget. That is the true art of remembrance.



Members of the Natural Resources team are less visible than those who collect your bins or repair your roads, but their work is equally valuable. It is they who have responsibility for the 25,000 new trees Council has committed to plant before the end of 2020, just part of their significant contribution to our community.

It is because of the Natural Resources team that Hornsby Shire Council recently received a Green Globe Award from the Office of Environment and Heritage, an important recognition of our efforts to integrate environmental management and sustainable practices into our operations. Council won because of our Hawkesbury Watch program, which uses remote monitoring buoys to provide continuous updates on a range of water quality

This is the first initiative of its kind in Australia. It not only gives valuable information for local residents about fishing and swimming conditions, it also allows for timely action to help maintain the highest standards of water quality.

I was delighted to join the members of the Arcadia Galston Residents Association (AGRA) for their recent meeting at Galston Club. High on the agenda was the landmark Galston village Public Domain Strategy. Our first speaker was Fiona Robbe, local resident and landscape architect, who presented past design ideas with traffic and pedestrian solutions with unique ideas to make Galston a rural village with atmosphere. Hornsby Council General Manager, Steve Head, presented the need to improve Galston with pedestrian safety and traffic management, which is imperative in the new plans.

Glenorie Progress Association has expanded its membership and sphere of influence, taking on the challenging task of addressing issues occurring in two council jurisdictions. Investigations into gateway improvement options around the bus stop precinct, as well as options for restoration work for the Memorial site, are underway.

I am particularly pleased that the Galston Swim Club has successfully launched their fundraising project to replace the starting blocks at Galston pool. An initial \$10,000 grant has been generously donated by Hornsby MP Matt Kean through the Community Building Partnership Project. This accounts for more than half the necessary funding.

This week Council began a communications review, looking to develop as many options

as possible to ensure that residents are kept informed. This is a particular challenge in rural areas and we are determined to develop a more effective strategy.

Although it is exciting to engage in new areas of Council business, it is equally important that our core business does not get left behind. Footpaths, stormwater, vegetation, road maintenance and waste services are all examples of essential areas of Council responsibility. Effectively funding these services and meeting community expectations is a continuing priority that will not only ensure practical outcomes but reinforce our sense of civic pride.

MIDDLE DURAL FIRE BRIGADE NEWS

ecently all the volunteer fire brigades in The Hills Shire went through an exercise known as The Readiness Check. One Saturday every year at the start of the fire season, our District Office in Annangrove Road organises an inspection of almost every single piece of equipment that could possibly be used in a bush fire. This involves good will and organisation of military precision from a large number of paid staff and volunteers. Space is limited at District Office so each Brigade has an allotted time for its vehicles to arrive.

Radios. First Aid kits, automatic defibrillators, chain saws and all manner of fire-fighting gear are rigorously scrutinised. Our ability to identify and use key pieces of firefighting equipment is also checked. Our photo shows a Middle Dural firefighter demonstrating use of a 'Y breaching piece', or waterdelivery valve that provides water to two separate hose lines, from the back of our Category 1 fire truck.


Our large appliances are fitted with a water spray for covering the whole vehicle when at imminent risk of fire attack. This tanker protection

system is activated from inside the cab. Our system is more powerful than most - it sprays a lot of water over a wide area. Quite a few people in range discovered how well our tanker protection works, to the amusement of those dry volunteers in the cab. Our thanks go to all those people who gave up their Saturday to ensure that we as safe and effective as possible on the fire ground.

Over the last few weeks, columns of smoke indicate residents burning piles. Even though it has been raining, you still need a permit because NSW can't legislate for

every individual who thinks it's OK to burn; and you still need to notify your neighbours and District RFS Office. Volunteers are called out to a great many unauthorised pile burns. We sympathise with you - yes, it may well be safe - but it's still illegal without a permit. Volunteers' time is valuable, particularly since many are small business owners and are losing income by attending your illegal pile.

Please ring your local captain, if you want to burn. He or she (Middle Dural, Len Best 0408220705, or Ken Middleton 0417203088) can issue you with a permit.

fire training. We have run a number of

scenarios at the station putting our Breathing Apparatus Operators through their paces with other firefighters gaining more knowledge of how they can help at a structure fire scenario. On top of this we also recently ran an Advanced Resuscitation Techniques course at the station which a number of firefighters from the district attended.

Motor Vehicle Accidents

We have attended a large number of motor vehicle accidents over the last few months - many more than usual. As a matter-offact we have attended a total of 8 in the last two months. Just to name a few we attended a 3 car pileup, 3 separate incidents of cars rolling in different locations and another of a truck rolling. We urge everyone to drive sensibly and to the conditions. "We don't want to meet you by accident" is not a joke. Please remember to responsibilities

THE FORGOTTEN MAN OF CHRISTMAS

oseph is the forgotten man of Christmas. Other characters In the Christmas story such as the shepherds and the wise men tend to get more attention; in fact, there are probably more songs or carols about the donkey than there are about Joseph! Yet his part in the Christmas story was vital, and he provides us with a tremendous example of obedience to God's will.

The first striking quality of Joseph's character is his compassion. He must have felt bewildered and betrayed when he learnt that Mary was pregnant. He knew that he was not responsible, so he inevitably jumped to the conclusion that Mary had been unfaithful. He could have subjected her to public disgrace and

humiliation, but his compassion ruled out such a course of action. Instead he decided to divorce Mary privately to protect her as much as possible (Matthew 1:19). Even then, he agonised over this decision and its implications for Mary.

In the midst of this crisis God spoke to Joseph in a dream and instructed him to marry Mary because she was bearing the longawaited Saviour. Joseph showed great courage in responding obediently to the divine command. He had no idea where this decision would lead him. He was exposed to the wrath of Herod and had to flee to Egypt to save the life of the baby Jesus. Possibly he was subjected to gossip and ridicule back in Nazareth because people believed that he had acted inappropriately during his betrothal to Mary. Whether faced with uncertainty, the jealous anger of a tyrant, or the hostility and suspicion of the inhabitants of a country town, Joseph displayed outstanding courage.

The courage of Joseph was also closely allied to commitment. When Joseph obeyed God's command to marry Mary, he probably sensed this decision would change the direction of his life. And so it proved. By naming Jesus, Joseph became his legal father (Matthew 1:21), and he took those responsibilities seriously. He provided for the material welfare and religious instruction of Jesus,

and it was Joseph who taught Jesus his skills as a tradesman.

Joseph played a humble but crucial role in the early years of Jesus. His compassion, courage and commitment took the sting out of hostile public opinion and made it possible for Jesus to grow up in a stable, loving and nurturing environment.

So as we celebrate another Christmas season, spare a thought for Joseph. Let us not forget his part in the story, and may his example inspire us beyond this Christmas season into the year ahead.

God bless you all with His peace and presence this Christmas time and in the coming year.





Dragon Flies

ith the weather warming up and the recent rains that filled our empty dam and my frog pond, I have noticed that the dragonflies are back.

Dragonflies and Damselflies are large, conspicuous insects generally found near freshwater habitats. They are an ancient and successful group that was around long before the dinosaurs

They have fantastic flying abilities and well-developed eyes. This makes them excellent hunters of other flying insects

and they can hover, move in zigzags, and even fly backwards. Some people find their size, speed and large eyes intimidating but, despite their powerful jaws, they are harmless. In fact, they do us a favour by eating many insects that bite us.

Both adults and larvae are predatory, with the larvae hunting under water and the adults above water. Just sitting back and watching the adults flying missions to protect their territory and hunting prey at high speed and capturing them in mid-flight is amazing.

According to the Australian Museum, there are 320 species known to Australia and about 100 occur around Sydney. Our dam and frog pond might support only a few but they are pleasure to watch in action. The

variety of colours is wide: Reds, Blues and even a large dull Black. All have extremely thin transparent wing, some with colour patches, supported by a delicate vein pattern that are just out of this

In updating the community on the goings on at our Biodynamic Farm and Farm Shop it would be remiss not to mention the Spring weather! Many people have asked if we were happy with the October rain and of course, it was quite novel and a great benefit, but it does have its problems when falling in such large doses over a short period. Thankfully, things have settled into something more balanced in November!

Our tomato crop is looking good. This year we are growing them indoors in our new poly tunnels. We have just installed a fruit fly insect mesh around the entire lower structure and we will prune them to allow plenty of

airflow. This reduces the amount of humidity within the tunnel, which will hopefully also reduce the likelihood of fungal problems. We are growing indigo, red and yellow cherries tomatoes along with a grafted Grosse Lisse. Sharing the space are Lebanese eggplant and a more traditional market variety, and a couple of beds of capsicum. The new tunnels have been a great addition to the farm, allowing for protected cropping, season extension and a place to work when the ground outside is

In terms of the produce that we source from other growers, it has been a bit challenging (but not impossible) to keep the Farm Shop

stocked with everyone's favourites. New spring crops are starting to come in. We are selling peaches and nectarines now, and the mangoes are great!


