THE BATTL'ES O'ER

In recognition of the signing of the Armistice which brought to a close World War One, bagpipers around the world will mark the centenary of that event on the 11th November by the playing of a tune composed to commemorate the end of the war titled "The Battle's O'er".

Composed a century ago by Pipe Major William Robb of the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders the tune honours all who have served and the more than 2000 Allied pipers who were killed in the war and many more who were wounded in that terrible conflict.

As mentioned in the report (left) the tune will be played at the Galston Cenotaph at 5pm to coincide with

pipers and bands across the United Kingdom and Europe at the time the Armistice was signed at 6am in Compiegne, France. The Armistice was timed to come into effect at 11am.

Bagpipes have been part of formal commemorative events for hundreds of years and as pipers and bands we are honoured to be part of local services and marches. This will also be a final act for us in remembrance for the Centenary of Anzac.

A period of reflection will follow the playing of the tune to be followed by a tune of dispersal as is the military tradition.





JOHN HAYES 1939 - 2018

t would be impossible to accurately portray the fullness of William John Hayes' life in the space available here. William John Hayes was born in Hornsby on the 9th December 1939. He was the second born child to the Galston Postmasters Dulcie and William Hayes. His siblings were an older brother Arthur and a younger sister Beverly.

William quickly became known as "Bill" and attended Middle Dural School then graduated to Hornsby Technical College.

He became a "Millwright" by trade but soon his passion for all things truck led Bill into starting his own carrying business in

He carted fruit from local orchardists and eggs from poultry producers to Sydney markets. Bill carted tyres, tractors and anything else that required moving from one place to another. He put in long arduous hours as did everyone working in agriculture and transportation in those times, but he always had time to assist those who needed a hand.

Bill met and married Helen. She became the love of his life and his soul mate.

In later years they became inseparable.

If Bill wasn't driving they would be found together, shopping, lunching or spending time with their family and grandchildren.

Bill and Helen raised three children. Two gorgeous, well behaved daughters Rebecca and Jennyfer and, as described by both of his sisters, a strong willed, extremely recalcitrant son David.

Their children grew up and went to school in Galston. They all married local partners and presented Bill and Helen with ten grandchildren.

Rebecca and her husband Richie had three children Isabella, Ethan and

Matthew. David and his wife Julia had four girls Stephanie, Karina, Olivia and Amelia. And just to even up the gender count in the Hayes Empire Jenny and her husband Scott contributed three boys William, Brayden and James.

Bill was extremely proud and quite outspoken about the fact that he had five granddaughters and five grandsons. Bill loved driving and when the opportunity arose to work with his good friend George Cromie he jumped at the opportunity. He enjoyed his time with George carting shale to the brickworks and using all of the earthmoving equipment required to mine the local shale.

During his time with George he "moonlighted", carting sodium, "salt" as it was locally known, during the night from Sydney's wharves to storage sheds in Camellia. After leaving George, Bill spent two years driving front end loaders for Hornsby Council then took a job with PF Formations, a supplier of construction material in Maroota where he operated loading equipment for many years.

While still associated with PFs he again became involved with "salt". This time Bill was using PFs loaders to pack it into storage warehouses then loading it onto trucks for distribution.

The foundation of young David's future obviously began here. Bill would "press gang" him into working on the loading machinery in the salt sheds after school and into the night. This presented no problems to David as it usually meant time off school the next day.

During the later years of his "retirement" Bill began driving the truck he became synonymous with and totally recognizable in "The Kenworth" helping son David with his earthmoving and excavation business.

Bill was always happy when he was driving and one job David had recently, involved Bill carting fifteen loads of material a week from Mona Vale, a northern beaches suburb, to Canoelands for a period of five weeks. They would start work at 5.30 in the morning and finish at 5.30 in the evening. Sixty hours a week on Sydney's roads. Pretty good for a young bloke let alone a bloody 78 year old geezer.

An ulterior motive behind Bill's love of driving was the fact that at the end of the day back at the yard, he could sit around with his mates, more often than not with a Carlton Dry in hand talking about, of course, trucks, loads, numbers of gear changes and exchanging many expletive descriptions about the idiots on our roads. Conversations would inevitably lead to exaggerated stories about old times, good times and families.

Even in the last week of his life Bill was doing what he loved, driving "The

Fathers day weekend this year saw Bill, David and Owen Hughes travel to Macksville where they met up with Bill's very close mate, John Nosworthy, and attended the "Rusty Irons Rally". An event for vintage machinery restorers and fanatics.

Bill had made this an annual pilgrimage for many years. He would meet up with John and they would catch up with old trucking mates and enjoy having a beer with some of Australia's 'TRUE' characters.

The Hayes family has lived in Galston for over 132 years and 'Hayes Park' at Galston was named in recognition of the service and local community involvement the Hayes family had in this area.

Bill carried on his family's involvement with community issues.

During his life he was involved with The Rural Fire Brigade, the local Chamber of Commerce, Galston Community Centre and Hornsby Council.

I'm sure anyone who has dealt with council regularly at any level would agree this involvement was the probable reason for Bill's black hair turning white.

Bill enjoyed going to meetings and being involved in local activities. He especially enjoyed raffle nights at the Galston Club, another place where he could catch up with old friends. Many of his club friends will fondly remember Bill particularly on the odd nights that he wore his wobbly boots home.

Bill loved his family events, birthdays, anniversaries, mothers day, fathers day it didn't really matter what it was as long as family was involved.

He treasured Christmas time. Going shopping to Castle Towers or anywhere else with Helen, Jenny and grandson James. Although I think that may have been in an attempt to control the expenditure, which apparently was not one of Bill's greatest successes.

Bill had many pseudonyms, Wild Bill, Young Bill, Billy Hayes, Papa Smurf and least flattering The Gnome!!!

His friendships were intergenerational. He was close to his children, his grandchildren, his children's friends, his old friends and was able to happily sit and talk and be comfortable with them. Have a beer with them. Listen to their problems. Enjoy their successes but most importantly, be there for them.

Bill was always there to help someone in distress. It didn't matter where you were or what time it was, if Bill could lend a hand, he was there. Nothing was a problem if he could help

My wife Judy and I were recipients of Bill's generosity. Sometime after Bill had left PFs, Sydney was experiencing a particularly bad drought and I had exhausted all of our dam's water storage. We were cactus until Bill came to our aid.

Bill carted water to our orchard every day for many weeks during the fruiting season in an old Bedford truck fitted with an old two thousand gallon petrol tank generously given to me by my boss at the time and my friend Harold Shore.

He would start early and generally finish late carting from Glenorie to our farm at Forest Glen. Mind you every time I went past the stand pipe Bill would be yacking to another driver, shopkeeper or just someone walking along the footpath. I'd take over from Bill when I got home from work and without fail the question would be asked "Where's Billy? How come you're driving his truck?" Bill's assistance during this time enabled us to irrigate our fruit and was instrumental in our orchard surviving the drought. It is impossible to express in words what Bill's generosity meant to our family.

There were several events Bill considered important in his life. One of these was the annual holiday he and Helen undertook to Hat Head Caravan Park on the mid north coast of NSW.

Here all of his children, grandchildren and lots of close friends would spend several weeks together swimming, fishing, eating copious quantities of delicious foods and partaking of the odd social drink or two. Another of Bill's special times was spending time with his family at their Lemon Tree Passage holiday house. Here he was able to enjoy many memorable hours with Helen, his daughters, his son and his grandchildren.

Then there was the annual family golf trip with the cousins. Bill didn't play golf but enjoyed driving the drinks cart and laughing at the frustrations being exhibited by his golfing cousins. What helped make this a memorable golf experience was the fact that the males went golfing while the ladies went shopping.

These special times with Bill will be sadly missed by all of his family and his friends.

Just before he was placed into an induced coma he said to Helen, "Don't forget the bins. I'll see you in the morning" which epitomized his positive attitude to life and how important it was to Bill to follow routine and something that was scheduled or organized to be done, had to be done.

Bill considered himself a lucky man. He had his soul mate and loving wife Helen, his children and grandchildren whom he unconditionally loved and was loved equally by them in return.

Bill's passing will create a huge void in the lives of all that knew him. He will be greatly missed.

his ride hugs the bushland contours of a steep-sided, rocky ridgeline of thickly settled Hills District suburbia. With John Purchase Road as its spine, the elevated heart of Cherrybrook is surrounded by Berowra Valley National Park with Pyes Creek and Berowra Creek creating natural boundaries.

From Greenway skatepark, cross Shepherds Drive to Cherrybrook RFS, and enjoy a fast pedal along the rocky rollercoaster Blackwattle fire trail to Patricia Place. (Note: this firetrail changes names from Blackwattle, to Daphne to Patricia Trail, and you will often encounter people walking here.) There is a wicked little pinch climb up to Patricia Place, but you can catch your breath for a few seconds as you turn right down the road through the dip and then right again onto the Trevors' Lane firetrail.

Turning right at the crest, Trevor's Lane trail transforms into a short loop of unsanctioned, community-created singletrack bliss which includes the Refuge Rocks Lookout. You can't get lost on this little loop; the centre is dominated by power pylons and there is only one fire trail in and out. Elite mountain bikers will be able to ride the whole loop, in either direction, in a few minutes. Mere mortals may want to dismount and practise or walk difficult sections as the tracks are badly eroded in some areas and the rock sheet roll ups and downs near the lookout are hectic.

Departing this area, you turn right and head down to Trevor's Lane and tedious tarmac. Keep following the ridge contours as you turn right into Purchase Road, Josephine Crescent and finally, Carmen Crescent. At Carmen Playground, ramp the kerb onto the short Carmen firetrail where some fascinating rock formations tower above you on the left. Turn right onto Josephine Crescent, and right again through the gate onto Kentia firetrail. This is an incredibly steep descent, so keep your weight back, the bike under control and make gravity your friend! It's fun to pump through the water crossings, while admiring the dense riverine ferns and rock features of Pyes Creek. On a hot summers' day, this veggie tunnel provides cool relief. To get the

full hour, ride until the trail terminates at Newline Road, carry the bike up the concrete stairs, and then crawl up Boldrewood Place to Hancock Drive...

Riders can choose to shorten or lengthen their ride at several points along Kentia Firetrail- but regardless of where, accept that there will be an uphill slog back to Greenway Park.

FACTBOX

TIME: 1 – 1.5 hours

DIRECTIONS: Follow the author on Strava, or point your browser to your favourite map app.

DIFFICULTY: High intensity ride. Refuge Rocks singletracks are not suitable for novice riders. Easy to shorten or lengthen this route at any point.

PARKING: Plenty of free parking at Greenway skate park.

BUILD NEW CYCLE TRAILS & LINKS THROUGH BVNP:

Refuge Rocks lookout is precisely opposite the Westleigh Waterworks trails (H2O) so existing, much-loved trails like Cherrybrook, Westleigh, **OMV** and Quarry Road should be improved, extended and officially linked together east/west across Berowra & Pyes Creek. This would create longer distances to ride thereby facilitating cycle commuting, better access to and greater appreciation of this vast National Park.

"As an artist I often collaborate with nature. feeling a connected and integral part of it. When I use plants to dye and contact print fabrics I witness a true alchemy. Wearing the textile creations later, having them close

to the body, it's like being hugged by nature, almost feeling her subtle breath.'

Returning this year is the much cherished community from Warrah. This local organization offers social therapy to adults with intellectual disabilities or autism, which has produced stunning results that rival many able-bodied artists.



We took many of them for a drive around the park, one of the few opportunities to give them a proper run. Thanks to all our volunteers for helping make the day the success it was. On this occasion, Hornsby Shire Council adopted our suggestion to donate all of the parking fees to the Drought Appeal.



One of the machines run on the day was our Rider-Ericsson hot air engine. This is one of the museum's prized possessions, and its operation baffles even engineering minded people. Its sole purpose is to pump water, utilising a wood fire to provide the heat required. It uses the expansion of air when heated and contraction when cooled, to impart power to a piston, with a large and heavy flywheel to maintain rotation through the cycle. For those interested, Google 'Stirling Cycle' for more information. These machines came into prominence in the mid to late 1800's until internal combustion engines became affordable as power sources for pumping. Very few of these machines survive today.

Work continues on the 1918 International truck. There are plenty of things to do, and recent activity has centred on cleaning up the precious radiator. It needs repairs, and we are confident it will come good. The major obstacle is financing the restoration of the wheels, with all options being explored.

The Fagan Park museums are open every Tuesday, our volunteering day, and we open the museums on the second Sunday each month during the afternoon. All visitors are welcome.

On Sunday 14th October 2018, a celebration of the arrival, on that day, 200 years ago in Australia of father and son Joseph and James Roughley was held. The day, which was planned, organised and conducted by members of the family, took place at historic Roughley House "The Pines" on Old Northern Road, Dural.

The guests who attended included The Hills Shire Mayor Dr. Michelle Byrne and Dural and District Historical Society President Michael Bell OAM.

There was approximately 120 descendants, family

and friends gathered from around Australia for this milestone in the history of Dural and surrounding areas as James and his wife Harriet (nee Kentwell) were one of the original settler families.

Father and son, Joseph and James, were convicted and transported for the minor crime of stealing five pence worth of linen and flannel.

Like many who were transported for a petty crime, through hard work and perseverance the Roughleys prospered and within two generations became wealthy

landowners and farmers and respected members of the community

Among other early families connected by marriage to the Roughleys and part of the Dural history are the Kentwells. Hunts. Bests, Blacks, Thompsons, Tuckwells, Mobbs, Fagans, Cusberts and others.

It is of interest to note that Old Northern Road, the original land link to Newcastle, was built through the Roughley's land. This resulted in historic St. Judes church, which was built on land donated by James and

Harriet, being on the other side of the road from the house

The day was enjoyed by all, with relatives and friends making contact, in many cases, after some years.

After the welcoming speech from Max Roughley and a song written and performed for the occasion by Mal Roughley and his sister Jeanette Parry, a tree planting took place.

This was followed by a steady procession of people inspecting Roughley House, taking photo opportunities, looking at old photos and memorabilia and catching up with relatives and friends under the 160 year old pine

This gathering was the latest of the committee events supporting the familys' heritage initiated originally by Ken and June Roughley with their fine book of the family "A Loftier Race".


This gathering was another example of a family appreciating its part in the history of a community.







This month we explore the symbiotic relationship between humans and animals in relation to tombstone art and in particular, the meanings of animal symbols and meanings.

Cemeteries are in often taken for granted as representing the final resting places of our

statues, particularly in older cemeteries, you will art forms defining an architectural and tranquil beauty and hidden meanings. Embedded in these memorials are symbols, often animal totems used to guard the dead from the living or the living from the dead depending your particular point of view. Symbols unite the dead with an ongoing cultural existence they once inhabited and as such may relate to something specific or interpretative within that society. These aspects define cultural norms, status, religious identification and association. Tombstone art

mystery of who the deceased person was in relation to their chosen animal or totem.

Animals represent explicit characteristics according to species which may be ascribed to the deceased to measure or mark their qualities as a person in life. Birds in particular are seen as winged souls being divine messengers, representing peace, purity and the soul.

Specific birds have recognised and assigned meanings for example eagles are symbolic of the power and strength, courage and valour while owls suggest diligence, wisdom and intelligence. Roosters signify awakening or resurrection.

Doves are messengers of peace and love.

Butterflies are our pysche or soul. The meaning is derived from the three stages of the life of the butterfly - the caterpillar, the chrysalis and the butterfly. The three stages are symbols of life, death and resurrection thus representing metamorphosis to the afterlife through resurrection.

Interestingly there are many other animals to which resurrection has been ascribed including dolphins and curiously snakes or serpents presumably because they cheat death and gain vigour and renewal by shedding their skins. They also represent eternity by forming the perfect circle or oroboros with its own tail in its mouth.

Dogs of course are man's best friend implying the owner is worth loyalty, fidelity, watchfulness and vigilance.

The use of animals in tombstone art makes us aware we are not alone in our existence but share it with other species in a state of mutual interdependence to find comfort and companionship. The animals we select to represent our departed loved ones not only offer solace in our initial grief and sadness but also consolation in future remembrance. These totems are how we choose to remember a loved one in a commemoration of their being.





Pete you are my everyday hero, thank you for your enduring love and support.


Dural Toastmasters

He arrived with over 1000 other soldiers on the Orita, and was met by the Parramatta welcome committee and "borne home by car triumphantly."

Later that month his parents arranged a welcome home attended by some 200 friends and family at the Galston School of Arts when he was given a gold Albert chain and sovereign purse, a gold ring with

his battalion colours gifted from his sister, and a gold ring from his Glenorie friends.



He was discharged from the army in September 1919 and confirmation was then received he was entitled to a gratuity of £20 for his DCM.

In August 1920 he married Margaret (nee Scot) at Dural Methodist Church.

Thirteen months later Newland was involved in a shunting accident at Hornsby railway yards, and died of his injuries at North Shore hospital on 17 September 1922 aged 28.

He was buried at the Uniting Church cemetery, Derriwong Road, Dural and is remembered by the inscription "...beloved husband of Margaret Newland and father of Wee Peggy... in his 28th year..."

Margaret placed a notice in the local paper thanking the railway men of Hornsby, and the Returned Soldiers and Citizens of Hornsby and Galston, for their monetary assistance informing them she planned to leave in February 1923 to return to Scotland to be with her parents.

from the Mayor's Desk

It was a big moment for Hornsby Shire last week when the final breakthrough occurred for NorthConnex. There are now two tunnels deep beneath our feet that link the freeways at either end of Hornsby Shire. When the work is completed they will allow many vehicles to bypass Pennant Hills Road altogether. At long last our community will cease to be the bottleneck in our nation's freeway network.

This milestone in the project is cause enough for celebration. However, the residents of Hornsby Shire have far more reason to be pleased, as there is a double benefit to the NorthConnex project. The material excavated from the tunnels is being used to partially fill Hornsby Quarry, helping us turn it into a spectacular new 50-hectare park. Now the main tunnels have been excavated the movement of trucks to Hornsby Quarry will be scaled back and will cease altogether within a few months. Council will again take control of the quarry site in early 2019 to continue the rehabilitation works.

Council will soon be seeking community input to allow us to refine the vision for the park and identify the specific recreational activities that should be included. We want your involvement because we are determined to ensure that this is a park that is designed by the community.

A YEAR IN REVIEW RURAL ROUND

It has been a year since the current Council term began, a good chance to reflect on what has been achieved so far. Here are some of the headline items....

After almost two and a half years of uncertainty, (caused by the quagmire of the failed amalgamation process), Council was finally able to fill the position of General Manager. We are pleased to have appointed Steven Head, who brings a wealth of experience to the role from his previous positions in private enterprise, local government, and the Roads and Maritime Service.

One of our major challenges was the budget shortfall that resulted from the loss of territory to

the City of Parramatta. This Council successfully lobbied and secured \$90 million in tied compensation and continues to negotiate with the State Government for the balance of our claim.

Waste collection is the one aspect of Council's operations that every single resident of Hornsby Shire has a direct stake in. A comprehensive review of our waste strategy is almost complete. A key goal is to see more than 70 per cent of waste diverted from landfill, up from the current figure of 44 per cent.

Council is currently undertaking an accelerated review of our Local Environment Plan

with help of NSW Government funding. It will include a full review of zoning provisions as they apply to our rural area.

I am pleased to confirm that Council will prepare a Galston Village public domain improvement plan. The implementation of this plan will only have to follow the Asquith to Mt Colah public domain strategy that is currently in the pipeline.

These initiatives are only scratching the surface of what has been happening overall. Stay tuned for more details as Council's term continues.

RAIN. REMINDER. RECOGNITION.

n past couple of weeks, we have welcomed some much-needed rain. Whilst it is in stark contrast to the dry conditions we've been experiencing for some time, we'd like to remind you all to keep up with your safe fire practices.

Towards the end of September crews from Arcadia, Galston, Dural, and Westleigh were called to bush alight down Peebles Rd. This was a bush fire that had been smouldering for many hours, and this fire was efficiently rounded up and controlled by these crews. Luckily no persons, livestock, or properties were threatened. This fire highlighted the need to remind the community that they should always call triple zero (000) as the station is unmanned. Furthermore, if you see a fire that is unattended,

call triple zero immediately. The area was patrolled multiple times to ensure no flare ups occurred. It is unsafe to enter a fireground due to smouldering remains and the threat of trees falling.


Ring-Gai district conducted a small Creek. This was a strategic burn to reduce the fuel load on the ground. It was controlled well and remained within its boundaries. We've also reignited due to weather conditions. It is important to monitor any pile burns you conduct both during the burn, and afterwards. Did you know that the Hornsby district has made the permit application process even easier! You can now apply for a council permit online via the

Hornsby Council website. During the fire season, Hornsby/ Ku-Ring-Gai residents require a council permit and an NSW RFS issued permit. You can acquire these RFS permits from the Hornsby/Ku-Ring-Gai Fire Control Centre 9883 2000.

Arcadia has had reason to celebrate! At the district's annual award's night, 5 members from Arcadia were presented with long service awards. Alex Parkinson, Jessica Byrnes, Ian Furness and Dave Byrne received their 10year service award, and Michael Elvidge, who is currently sitting on 24 years of service, received his

Can we fit?

During a bush fire our Category 1 (Cat 1) tankers are often used for property protection and to navigate more difficult terrain.

They also hold considerably more water than the smaller category

For this reason, it is important to consider whether a Cat 1 tanker can access your property in case of a bush fire.

A Cat 1 tanker is 2.4metres wide, 7.8 metres long and 3.1 metres high + aerials.

In order to fit through your gates and under your trees we prefer a clearance of 4 metres high and 3.5 metres wide.

The Cat 1 tanker also has a 22 metre turning circle, making it difficult to negotiate around sharp corners or perform U-turns.

Another thing to consider is if we will be able to get to the rear of your property. If there are any bridges or grids will they handle the 13.7 tonne load, and if not are they marked accordingly?

How fireproof is your plan?

While seven in ten people in bush fire prone areas believe they have a plan for what to do during a fire, it is still hard to know whether it will actually work if a bush fire

A major concern related to this is 51% of people have done nothing to prepare their property for a bush

MIDDLE DURAL BRIGADE NEWS

hat wonderful rain deluged Middle Dural in October! Most of us received more than 100mL of good soaking rain, which may push back the threat of major bushfires by a month, maybe more. And haven't we got an amazing crop of weeds already?! However, even with the rain, NSW law states that it's still illegal under NSW legislation, to burn bush or piles without a permit. Burning building materials at any time of year is illegal. Several illegal piles containing building materials have been reported in the last month in our area. If you are detected, the penalty can be severe, not only in the form of a hefty fine but also your name is recorded on the police fire offenders register.

You may have seen the powerful RFS campaign on most TV channels, in the lead up to peak bush fire season. It asks NSW residents 'How Fireproof is Your Plan?', using powerful human stories that contrast the destructive power of fire with the dangers of insufficient planning and preparation. The campaign dramatizes a series of situations where bush fire plans have not reduced risk to people or livestock. This is because the key questions of when they will leave, where they would go and what will they take, were not considered carefully in advance. If you haven't seen it, we recommend that you take a look (https:\\www.facebook.com\213250965551\ posts\10156446200475552\)

It shows that you really have to think through what you and your family will do to keep safe when the next fire danger comes.







THE GIFT OF PLEASURE

By Pastor David McKibben Galston Seventh-day Adventist Church

Over the last couple of months we have looked at two simple but significant principles that wise and wealthy King Solomon discovered were important in enjoying a satisfying and meaningful life: (1) Enjoy the present, and (2) Enjoy people. The third principle he discovered is equally simple yet profound: Enjoy pleasure.

he word pleasure can have negative connotations, especially if we think of a life devoted to the selfish and reckless pursuit of pleasure as an end in itself. But pleasure can also be viewed from a positive perspective as well. How is pleasure a gift?

First of all, enjoying pleasure satisfies a basic human need. "All work and no play makes Jack a dull boy," goes the proverb. Not only does it make him a dull boy, but it also makes him an unnatural boy. Ultimately it may harm his health. Pleasure relaxes the mind and refreshes the body, enabling us to enjoy a full and balanced life.

Secondly, the enjoyment of true pleasure can enable us to savour the beauty that is part of our daily lives. Pleasure can be experienced and enjoyed in the simple, ordinary and innocent things of everyday life. A delicious meal, a child's smile, a beautiful sunset - and the list could go on and on – the appreciation of these gifts from God can be a source of real pleasure. After sampling all that the world had to offer materially, Solomon declared, "So I commend the enjoyment of life, because nothing is better for a man under the sun than to eat and drink and be glad" (Ecclesiastes 8:15).

Thirdly, the experience of pleasure can extend to our work as well, whatever the vocation or setting might be. Solomon reflected, "So I saw that there is nothing better for a man than to enjoy his work (Ecclesiastes 3:22), and he shared this observation on a number of occasions. His words remind me of a powerful quotation from a speech by the American civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr:

"Not all men are called to specialised or professional jobs; even fewer rise to the heights of genius in the arts and sciences; many are called to be labourers in factories, fields and streets. But no work is insignificant. All labour that uplifts humanity has dignity and importance and should be undertaken with painstaking excellence. If a man is called to be a street sweeper, he should sweep as Michelangelo painted, or Beethoven composed music, or Shakespeare wrote poetry. He should sweep streets so well that all the host of heaven and earth will pause to say, "Here lived a great street sweeper who did his job well."

Receiving pleasure from one's work is one of the precious gifts of life.

In conclusion, Solomon encourages us to enjoy the gift of life and live it to the full as God intended, and may that be the experience of each one of us.


Remember this -Jesus came and lived in our world because he loved us. He came to save us. He came to die for us. Why not thank him again just now for all this?

SUPERMARKET CHRISTIANITY

Many of us are used to having to do the weekly shop. Some are prepared with their shopping list, others (like me) tend to walk in and see what takes our fancy.

Supermarkets love my type of shopper ... offering all sorts of specials, bundles, eye line height promotions encouraging me to

As I walk through with my trolley, I'll pick some of this, but I don't like that! In fact, I've never been a fan of peanut butter, but do enjoy a good marmalade.

As Hillslife Church has explored what it is to be a Christian we talked about shopping trolley Christianity. Those believers who accept some parts of the bible, but happily ignore others. Bit like my aversion to peanut butter, there are some teachings that just don't sit as well as others.

As if we are planning a meal, we are happy to take this list of ingredients, but don't want anything that could sour our recipe.

Does Jesus really teach we should go to church? Or that we should tithe? That we should pray? Spend time meditating on the word? Did Jesus make the Old Testament teaching irrelevant? Or did He amplify it?

The point is Christianity is not a shopping list, or a menu where we get to pick and choose our preferred flavours. There are clear guidelines, responsibilities and expectations laid out ... and yet most Christians have never read the entire bible.

Little like the shoppers who walk in and wander around and can be swayed in our purchasing behaviours ... there is a danger to not knowing the whole story.

Imagine watching just the middle 45 minutes of a movie - not knowing the start or the finish. Doesn't make sense does it.

"The mind of the prudent acquires knowledge, And the ear of the wise seeks knowledge." Proverbs 18:15

The encouragement this month is to make sure you don't fall into shopping trolley Christianity. Take up the challenge and read the whole bible ... sure some bits are less exciting than others, but God can reveal new understanding across all Scripture.

If you are willing, as you begin, and progress through the journey, I encourage you to pray to Our Holy Spirit and ask for His guidance and revelation. For as John 14:26 says, "But the Helper, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in My name, He will teach you all things, and bring to your remembrance all that I said to you."

CHRISTIAN LIKE NANNA'S SECRET RECIPE

We've been exploring what is a Christian, using the art of parable. Last couple of months we have spoken of a Christian as a shopping trolley, one that picks and chooses what aspects of faith they will accept, and those they'd prefer not to acknowledge.

We spoke of clothing label Christians, try this one on for size. Or of Christians who wear faith more like makeup ... it's a concealer of their true selves, rather than a transformer into new selves.

This month we look at Christians whose faith is more like nanna's secret recipe, you know the one handed down from generation to generation.

Surely in your family there is that traditional dish that is passed down, maybe it's a Christmas pudding made a certain way, or the Sunday roast with just the right type of crunch in the potatoes. Maybe I'm just making myself hungry and it's getting close to a traditional Christmas meal!


We have an odd family tradition, come through my wife's side, honey on tacos. Hey, it's delicious!

While all these traditions are wonderful, it shouldn't be that way in your faith. That you are Christian because your mum was, and her mum, and her mum before her.

If your faith is just a hand me down then it's not faith, it's tradition. Faith is personal, a true relationship with the Father direct. Not just at church on a Sunday, but a daily walk with God, the Father, standing right by you, communing with you, supporting, guiding, empowering.

1 Thessalonians 2:13 says "And we also thank God continually because, when you received the Word of God, which you heard from us, you accepted it not as a human word, but as it actually is, the word of God, which is indeed at work in you who believe."

If your walk in faith has been more like a generational gift like an heirloom... something handed down, this is a true blessing you have received. But, it is so much more than just a secret recipe or family treasure, you can have a deep personal relationship each and every moment.

You've heard it said that if you want something done, ask a busy person. At the end of a full day, that busy person might say- 'I've been busier than a thousand bees!'

Out of interest, I read a couple of articles about the honey bee hive. The bees must be hard workers- after all, the phrase busy as a bee' has to come from somewhere!

"Like many natural phenomena hive of honey bees is incredibly complex...within the colony, worker bees have plenty to keep themselves occupied. Jobs include cleaning the nest, building comb, nursing bee larvae, heating and cooling the nest, caring for the queen, guarding against intruders, handling and storing food and foraging for food and water." (Keri Collins Lewis)

How busy are bees- really??

"They're pretty industrious, but not as busy as some other animals. A honeybee might work anywhere

from just a few hours a day to about twelve depending on its role in the beehive. Worker bees tasked with daily foraging of nectar or pollen generally spend every hour of daylight outside, but as soon as it gets dark, they head back to the nest and relax. They also take frequent breaks. Queens are also busy, laying more than 1000 eggs each day. Drones by contrast are quite lazy. They don't leave the hive till early afternoon, carousing around in packs and when they get home, just a few hours later, they rely on the worker bees to feed them!" (Forrest Wickham, researcher.)

On our church noticeboard this month, the words "Be still and know that I am God" come from Psalm 46:10 in the Bible. Almighty God is exhorting us to choose to have balance in our lives like the honey bee does - He created them.

So, if you find yourself 'as busy as a bee', when life gets overwhelming

and busyness takes precedence, remember that there IS a God of the Bible who is not too busy for you!

Verse 1 in the same Psalm says, "God is our refuge and strength; an ever present help in trouble."

- 1. Acknowledge that He IS God; that He is exalted in the earth.
- 2. Reach out to Him; ask for His help in the Name of His Son Jesus Christ.

3. Then:

Be still and know that I AM God.

STILL CREEK LANDCARE

How healthy is your creek water? Want your creek water tested?

By Chris Noon





Still Creek Landcare group checks the quality of the water in our local waterways. We do a variety of physical. chemical and biological testing every month in three creek places. This is part of the Streamwatch program, involving a couple of hundred people at 50 sites across the Sydney area. It has been going for 28 years and we have been doing it here for almost 10 years. You can see how our local water quality has been going on our website:

Come and visit us at our stall at the Arcadia Markets on Saturday 17 November and you can see what we do and how we do it. Bring some of your creek water with you and we can do some tests on the spot for you.

Streamwatch volunteer citizen scientists have been successful in detecting pollution early in Thornleigh, helping biosecurity by detecting the first European black slug in NSW and by providing environmental planning data over decades.

Streamwatch has been funded by Sydney Water and run by the Australian Museum, but the Museum will stop managing it after June 2019 and there is some doubt about funding. All councillors in Hornsby Council have agreed to write to the NSW Government and we have spoken to Hornsby MP Matt Kean to get his help in continueing this work.

After an opportunity to explore this beautiful garden, afternoon tea was served by members of the local garden club, fully fortified it was time to return back to Galston.

Our second ramble was much closer to home at the "Boongala" Native Gardens at Pitt Town Rd Kenthurst. After a walk through the rainforest, Malcolm gave a talk on native bees, local birds and native

orchids. As always when plants can be purchased, gardeners are in heaven. As "Boongala" is only open a couple of times of the year members were able to talk with an expert on planting and growing native plants.

Our October guest speaker was Adele Stephenson from Rocky Point Mulching. Adele was a bright and informative speaker who gave us an interesting insight into this family run company that was born out of adversity. Rocky Point started as a sugar cane farm, but a particularly hard drought in the early 1900's saw them selling what was left after harvesting (called "cane waste) to cattle farmers to feed their stock, when the rains finally came and the cane waste was no longer needed, the idea was born to use it as mulch. Today Matt Keith, a 3rd generation farmer and grandson runs a multi-million dollar business that has 80 employees. Over the last 20 years Rocky Point has expanded into Potting Mixes, Orchid mix, Cow

manure, Native Mix, Garden Soil, Active 8 soil improver and Organic Life pellets. They are the only company to be organically certified and as they look to the future they are looking at generating their own power as well as being true to the environment by expanding into recycling of green waste from councils. Adele and Rocky Point kindly donated products for our meeting raffle as well as the Mega raffle for the Open Gardens weekend, as well there were products for sale.

We look forward to seeing you at our next club meeting, which will be our last formal meeting for the year when we will be holding a Q & A evening.
