Most riders walk down this sectionbut you can ride down all of it if you have good skills !

This is a short, but most enjoyable out and back ridgeline ride on firetrail in the Marrramarra National Park. Turn into the park off Bloodwood Road and ride for 1km until you see the Smugglers Ridge sign on the left. Ride through the small quarry to the firetrail gate.

OUT & BACK

hour 12km

SMUGGLERS

This ride is suitable for novice mountain bikers on shiny new Christmas wheels and families with children and you may not be aware of it- but this specific trail is a mysterious part of our local heritage... There is a large aboriginal rock engraving of a kangaroo at the ridge lookout (which is sadly disappearing) and in the not too distant past, Murramurra Creek, (which originates off Old Northern Road at Forest Glen feeds into Berowra Creek, the Hawkesbury and finally open ocean)- has been used to smuggle an assortment of illicit things inland via the path winding up onto the ridge from the creek.

CLING SERIES /



Although the sign says '3km moderate' it's not! This firetrail is a steep, slippery dip ride down to the creek



Smugglers' Ridge firetrail has ample rock steps to keep experienced riders happy or novice riders and kids challenged, without terrifying them. The wild flowers along this trail are exceptionally beautiful, whatever season you ride it. Keep turning right when riding out (north) along this trail and at around 6km, you will encounter the rocky singletrack down to the lookout where the kangaroo is. I recommend that most riders walk down this section- but you can ride down all of it if you have good skills. There are lovely views across the creek to Canoelands Ridge- but lots of biting things come with the scenery and you may have to commence the return ride quicker than you'd like to!

FACTBOX:

WATCH FOR... If it's been dry, there are several long sections of thick sand which frequently interrupt the 'flow' of your ride. Some cyclists may be forced to dismount.

There are lots of ravenous mozzies and biting things at the lookout! Trail is shared with hikers- be considerate and polite. There is an old orange orchard to harvest, heading east down the creek.


PARKING: Turn left off Bloodwood Road at the National Park sign. Park in the bay on the right at the Waddy Firetrail entrance, or drive further down into the park, turn left at the Smugglers' Ridge sign and park in the small quarry at the trail head gate.

STATUS: Cycling on existing trails is permitted. No cyclingspecific trails exist to cover 90% of this enormous, 12,000 hectare National Park astride a bicycle. It's high time some were built, considering all its proximity to waterways and fabulous natural and historical features that could, and should be appreciated by locals and park visitors alike.

SMUGGLERS' LOOP 2.5 Hours 15km

For a much more challenging ride, descend the Marramarra track. From Bloodwood Road, follow the signs and powerlines (passing a small dam and homestead on the left) to arrive at the gate. Although the sign says '3km moderate' it's not! This firetrail is a steep, slippery dip ride down to the creek with a pinch climb or two thrown in for good measure. The slippery sections comprise of assorted death cookie and baby head rocks for onboard cycling entertainment!

Regroup, then turn left and head up the creek for 1km, keeping a sharp eye out for the footpath winding straight up the big hill on your left. If you reach the campsite, you have gone too far! Like a smuggler, you will have to carry your bike 1.5km up most of this steep, rocky walking track. However, there are a couple of very short sections enroute which you can pedal to give your arms a rest. (Just a teensy weensy bit of effort and investment by OEH could produce an excellent cycling trail right up to the top of Smugglers' Ridge) When you get to the rock sheets of the lookout, see if you can find the kangaroo. It's another five minute push up to the Smugglers Ridge firetrail and within 30 minutes you'll be back at Bloodwood Road.

Back in July 1979, a new type of program started at the new church hall of the Castle Hill Seventh-day Adventist church in Cecil Avenue. The Dharug and Lower Hawkesbury Historical Society would like to extend the invitation to the general public to attend an exciting day exploring Dangar Island, the only residential island on the Hawkesbury River and learn about the history of this fascinating place. Dangar Island is a charming, traffic free, natural hideaway on the Hawkesbury River (with a friendly population of almost 300 people), rich in European and Indigenous history.

Before white settlement, Dangar Island was known as a gathering place for Guringal Aborigines the custodians of this area for 30,000 years. Evidence of their habitation still remains in engravings and rock shelters on the island. Governor Phillip was the first European to visit the area in March 1788 and named it Mullet Island because of the quantity of mullet he caught there.

In 1864, the island was purchased and renamed by Henry Cary Dangar, a prominent politican who later became a member of the Upper House of New South Wales. Henry Cary Dangar leased the island to the New York based Union Bridge Company during the construction of the Hawkesbury River Rail Bridge between 1886 and 1889. A community of around 400 Americans lived on the island which then boasted a social hall, library and school. During the Second World War, Army and Navy personnel used Dangar Island as a base to protect the railway bridge from potential Japanese attack.

We will stroll around the island which is a fairly easy 3 klms walk (although there is some sand) following the signs to the major sites including the remaining parts of the Dangar home, site of the Tanks (the fresh water source and for fire fighting), Aboriginal middens, plaque commenorating Governor Phillip's landing, the General Store/Cafe, the Community Hall and park etc. After lunch we will catch the ferry then back over to Brooklyn and time permitting, have a wander around that fascinating area.

Bring along snacks, water, sunhat, sunscreen and repellent. Sturdy shoes are suggested.







The Hills Shire Council is currently working through a backlog of more than 1300 requests to clear fallen trees, branches and storm debris after damaging storms hit the area in late December.



astle Hill, Baulkham Hills, Kellyville and West Pennant Hills were hardest hit, followed by Rouse Hill, Dural, Annangrove, Box Hill, Maraylya and Wisemans Ferry.

General Manager of The Hills Shire Council, Michael Edgar said storm damage clean-up is continuing throughout The Hills to ensure Council owned facilities, including parks, recreational facilities, playgrounds, as well as roads and nature strips are clear of debris.

"Our maintenance teams and contractors are working as hard as they can to get through the massive backlog of requests," Mr Edgar said.

"It will take some time to reach all Council owned properties, parks and along roadways, but we have cleared all blocked roads and removed all high-risk safety related debris from roads and parks and are nearing storm clean-up completion for nature strips in the suburb of Baulkham Hills – west of Windsor Road – which is good news for residents.

"Our priority remains to collect vegetation from nature strips in the coming weeks, focussing on urban collections and highly populated areas. Once the nature strips are clear, we will turn our attention to clearing debris in our parks and public spaces that have been impacted.

"To help speed-up the cleaning process, we are asking residents to assist Council wherever possible, either by placing small amounts of storm debris in their green waste bins for collection, or by cutting and bundling green waste and booking a kerbside clean-up via Council's website at www.thehills.nsw. gov.au," Mr Edgar added.

Mr Edgar also expressed his appreciation to emergency services who have been working non-stop to secure homes, and remove fallen trees and branches.

"The Hills SES has been fully operational day and night since the beginning of December with more than 1160 requests for assistance. In addition, Council received more than 1600 calls for help," Mr Edgar said.

"It is never an easy task working in extreme weather conditions and during the Christmas and New Year break. Thank you to all our emergency service crews who gave up their time with family and friends, forewent Christmas celebrations and returned from their holidays to assist with the storm clean-up.

"Your work is truly appreciated," Mr Edgar added.

The Magnificence of Trees

Trees are such a giving life force. They provide shade and shelter, freshen our air, bring beauty in array of myriad forms, some bear fruit for our sustenance, provide us with the raw materials to improve our lives, provide habitats for wildlife, trees enhance and enrich our lives.

As a celebrant I take great joy from marrying couples under an ancient tree which has stood witness to so much and I do believe that the blessings from the wedding ceremony embed into the natural history of that tree.

Trees can become silent champions in our lives and when they are removed or destroyed unexpectedly it can have a profound effect on us.

During the recent devastating storms so many trees were destroyed, a new landscape appeared and spaces left to lament.

A 'Sudden End' to a more than 70 Year Old Tree

Whilst walking in our paddock today, I was shocked and saddened to see that last Saturday's storm (21/12/18) had

brought down our more than 70 year old China Pear Tree. That tree was so, so special to my older brother and I when we were young children. In summertime we loved going down to our back fence, climbing the tree, picking China Pears

and then selling them on the roadside. We sold them for 5 pence each and often had customers come back year after year to buy them. China Pears are rock hard fruit but when stewed are delicious. Mum always had extra in the freezer for us during summer.



Over the last 40 years we haven't picked the pears. The main tree trunk became more and more precariously tilted

over the back fence, so we couldn't climb the tree and it appeared it had stopped bearing fruit. It was such a HUGE TREE! For us it seemed that had been there forever as it was a big tree in 1950, when my parents bought the land.

What amazed me too, apart from it being 'downed' was that it had small fruit again. How lovely is that! - it's final parting gift to us and we'll be able to enjoy some stewed China Pears again , after all those years.



Our plan to support small and family business

Member for Hornsby Matt Kean MP is pleased to announce Transport for NSW and TAFE NSW have agreed to terms to transfer a parcel of land adjacent to Hornsby Train Station for a new commuter car park.

"This is a big win for the commuters who travel on the train from Hornsby station every day," Mr Kean said.

The proposed car park which will be located on Jersey Street will help reduce parking pressure at the station.

"I am proud to be able to deliver additional parking at Hornsby Station. This will make it quicker and easier for commuters to get to and from work each day," Mr Kean said.

Currently additional places are available for commuters at the Hornsby Westfield and will continue to be available to use free of charge.

The proposed project will help ensure that a commuter car park is available prior to the

expiration of the current Transport for NSW lease from Westfield in 2021.

"Hornsby station is a transport hub and it is vital we have enough parking to support those commuters travelling on the train from Hornsby," Mr Kean said.

"I have been able to secure funding to see the Asquith train station car park open last year and now this additional parking for Hornsby station. I will continue to fight for more commuter parking at all stations in the Shire."

There will be an opportunity for customers and the community to have their say on the proposed commuter parking during the planning process this year.

MORE PARKING For Hornsby

Parking has just become a whole lot easier at Hornsby Hospital with the opening of the new multi storey carpark. The \$19.8 million carpark will give patients, staff and visitors a place to park on site rather than clogging the streets and walking for miles to get to the Hospital.

I was also proud to announce there will be additional parking built at Hornsby Station with a parcel of land acquired by Transport for NSW on the TAFE site on Jersey Street. While plans are still in the early stages it is expected it will offer over 200 spaces and will be an easy walk to the station.

I am proud to be part of a Government who are easing the pressure on families with the Active Kids Rebate. This is \$100 per school aged child which can be used towards sporting registrations. In 2019 we have added the Creative Kids Rebate which can be used to contribute to registration, participation and tuition costs for performing arts, visual arts, coding, languages, literature, music and other creative and cultural activities. 

I hope everyone had a fabulous Christmas break and a positive start to the New Year.

The recent storms have had a serious impact on property throughout the ward and Council teams have been busy offering assistance. Over 600 service requests have been attended to, with more than 4,000 cubic metres of material collected, mulched and processed.

For those dealing with on-site tree debris it may be helpful to know that we have reviewed and improved our pile burn permit process to be significantly more efficient. Residents need only answer a few questions through Council's website and will receive a permit the same day. Some changes to approved times to burn have also occurred.

I am also pleased to announce that Oculus Landscape Architecture and Urban Design are the successful tenderer for the next steps in our public domain strategy for Galston village. Community engagement is expected to begin in March.

In keeping with the village improvement strategy, a cost analysis for gateway improvements to Glenorie village bus terminus area has been completed and should go before Council after some further consultation with the RMS.

The review of our Land and Environment Plan continues and has attracted correspondence from many members of the community. Please don't hesitate to contact us if you are aware of, or have concerns about, planning anomalies that exist within our current LEP. It is important that our planning instruments meet the needs of our local community, as well as providing support for business and our local amenity.



FERAL RABBIT REDUCTION PROGRAM **ROLL OUT**

REATER Sydney Local Land Services will roll out a feral rabbit reduction program throughout Hornsby from 21 February 2019.

Originally scheduled for release last October, the program was postponed due to ongoing wet conditions and the high number of young rabbits in the area.

Greater Sydney biosecurity team leader Lee Parker said the new date ensured the program would have maximum impact in reducing rabbit numbers.

"This program involves the release of the Rabbit Haemorrhagic Disease Virus, commonly known as RHDV1-K5, this virus doesn't spread as quickly in wet weather and baby rabbits are immune which is why the decision was made to hold off," he said.

"As always, we urge owners of pet rabbits to vaccinate their animals

as soon as possible to ensure they are not impacted by the virus. The virus is spread mainly by contact between rabbits or via insects such as mosquitos and flies. RHDV only affects rabbits and if pets are vaccinated they become immune."

Mr Parker said the release was the third of its kind following the initial national program roll out in March 2017 which led to a 42 per cent reduction in feral rabbit numbers across NSW.

"This program is designed to complement ongoing control efforts on private and public land," he said. "We encourage landholders experiencing issues with feral rabbits to continue working with us to roll out coordinated control campaigns in partnership with their neighbours wherever possible," he said.

Feral rabbits are a declared pest in NSW due to the significant amount of agricultural and



environmental damage they cause.

They are believed to have contributed to the decline or extinction of a number of NSW native species including the greater bilby and the yellow footed rock-wallaby and their overgrazing is estimated to

cost Australian agriculture more than \$200 million every year.

The virus will be released in the Hornsby, Arcadia, Dural and Galston areas.

LORIEN NOVALIS SCHOOL STUDENTS EXPERIENCING THE GREAT BARRIER REEF

ach year, a class of students from Lorien Novalis School in Dural has the opportunity to camp on North West Island, a coral cay on Queensland's Great Barrier Reef.

Their visit to the island is a unique and special experience. As the island is so protected, untouched by tourism and with minimal interferences by people, the environment is one where each child immerses themselves in nature, in the living entity of the birdlife, the immense labour of the great green turtles coming onto land to lay their eggs, the colour and form of the magnificent reef life.

In class lessons earlier in the year, students learn about the ecology of the reef and cays, conservation and the role of National Parks, and work through the knowledge of the 'Classification of Animals.' These studies are strongly supported by the observations of and immersion with wildlife on the island. Embedded into their outward activities are opportunities for the students to reflect, search deeply and make expressions of their experiences creatively, in the form of artwork, writing and sharing, to encourage fine-tuning of the sense observations.

Such an immersion in this natural environment for a period of several days and nights, away from the modern world of industrial and electronic technology, allows the children to have the experience of breathing to the harmony of pure nature.

IS THERE A GOD?"

ust a few decades ago if asked the question "is there a God?" the resounding answer would have been yes.

Whether you actively attended church or worshipped God was a different matter – but few would question whether God existed.

Now, there seems an ever growing number of those falling into the unsure category or, even more prevalent, the definitive "no".

As we have kicked off a new year it got me thinking ... what have we as a church done wrong to escalate this outcome?

After all, there is historical evidence of Jesus.

Beyond the early writings that now form the New Testament, the incredible accounts of the apostles, and the rapid explosion of the church throughout the known world ... there are also non-Christian writers as well. This includes a Jewish historian, Flavius Josephus who wrote a history of Judaism around 93CE. He acknowledged Jesus lived and even that he was referred to as Christ. Also had a brother, James, who is credited as written the book of James now in the New Testament.

Jesus' death by crucifiction is affirmed by Roman politicians, Pliny and Tacitus – neither of who were supporters of Christianity.

So Jesus' existence seems without question – he lived! Whether he died and rose again may be up for conjecture however few scholars would argue that Jesus walked the earth.

Yet, who wants to dig deep to find this out nowadays?

The issue is though ... the question IS THERE A GOD? should be something everyone deeply considers.

For if there is and Jesus is who He says He is then there are eternal consequences for disinterest.

If I were to warn you that the brakes in your car didn't work would you check before you drove it? Or if I were to say that there was a brown snake in the entrance to your house – would you walk in tentatively – looking? Or if I were to tell you that what you were about to eat was laced with arsenic, would you reconsider eating it?

Well I'm hoping ... if you are reading this ... to tell you that I believe there are significant risks in not at least exploring deeply, to really challenging yourself on whether or not there is a God.

In Luke 16:19-31 is a story that Jesus shared about a rich man and a beggar. Upon death the rich man is in torment but sees the beggar comforted and so asks to please



warn his family so that they too don't come to the place where the rich man finds himself. But receives the reply that his family have every opportunity to hear the outcome – if only they would pursue it.

Jeremiah 29:13 says if you seek me you will find me.

So as we launch into 2019 could I encourage you to genuinely ask your self the question "is there a God"? Explore it, dig into it, make an educated decision as your answer could truly impact your eternal existence.

A BEAUTIFUL DEED

ne of the most beautiful incidents in the life of Jesus took place just days before his death. The deed in guestion was a very simple act, the pouring of expensive ointment upon his body, but Jesus said that Mary and her action would always be remembered wherever the Gospel would be preached (Matthew 26:13; Mark 14:9). Right there and then, however, Jesus gave an assessment of her act of devotion - "She has done what she could." (Mark 14:8) - and over the next few months I would like to consider some lessons we can learn from this simple statement.

First of all, Mary did what she could with what she had. From a financial viewpoint, she gave a lot to Jesus that evening. She anointed his body with an expensive perfume extracted from an exotic plant grown on the slopes of the Himalayas in distant India. Usually this fragrance was reserved for the wealthy. It has been calculated that it would have cost a working-class person a year's wages to purchase this jar of perfume, and Mary came from this class in society. Her gift constituted a tremendous sacrifice, but she was glad to do what she could with what she had.

But you might ask the question: What if I don't have much to give? The answer to this concern is found in the story of another woman in the Bible. She was a desperately poor widow who wanted to give an offering to God's work. When she thought no one was looking, she threw two copper coins, the smallest in monetary value in circulation at that time, into the offering boxes in the Temple complex. But Jesus had seen her. Turning to his disciples, he told them that this poor widow had given more than all the other donors put together (Mark 12:41-44; Luke 21:1-4). Her gift was small, but

she did what she could with what she had.

It is not the amount we have to offer that matters, but rather the attitude that we display in using our resources. The value of the gifts offered by Mary and this widow differed greatly, but their motives were the same. They showed the same qualities of giving, commitment and service.

And that is the challenge for us as we use our material resources and personal talents. God asks us to do what we can with what we have, with what has been entrusted to us, and He is completely fair in his expectation.

alston Uniting's Creativity Service last November was both beautiful and uplifting. The Craft Group displayed 31 quilts, rugs, a wall hanging and even a skirt made from men's colourful ties. Five guilts were sold and five were donated to Westmead Children's Hospital. Ten rugs were sent to "Wrapt with Love" and one guilt went to a wonderful volunteer who supports the Craft Group and becomes a bus driver when they go shopping for craft supplies. The proceeds from the stalls on the day and sale of quilts went to the Cancer Council, Frontier Services, Parramatta Mission and to the Church.

Children at the Service decorated large butterfly cutouts, then pinned them randomly onto a sheet thereby creating a beautiful quilt highlighting that the butterflies were all the same except for their patterns and colours. The message portrayed was that although appearance also differs in people, we are fundamentally the same. This theme was evident in quilts hanging under the stained glass window which have the same pattern but are in different colours. Helen Knight affirmed that "God





has made everybody different, but they are the same inside". Rev Geoff Smith continued this theme saying that "God created all the complexity we see and one thing we know to be true, God loves us with all of our foibles, with our gifts, adequacies and inadequacies ... the simple truth is that God loves us just as we are." They were powerful messages both spiritually and visually at a beautiful and moving Service.

GLENORIE FAIRY FOREST By Kate Keary

Inspired by a visit to Bateau Bay Fairy Forest with my children, I turned to the local community Facebook page to float the idea of creating something similar in Glenorie. The overwhelming response triggered a beautifully collaborative effort, and Glenorie Fairy Forest was born.

Glenorie Creek runs through town and collects stormwater from most of the northern side of town. Although the creek is barely recognisable now, it runs adjacent to the playground between Wirra Place and Cairnes Road. One could almost overlook the weeds and rubbish filling the creek. The site is remarkably serene with a dense canopy and lots of old fallen logs. It provided the perfect site for a fairy forest. Connecting kids to nature and clearing the litter and Wandering Jew (Tradescantia fluminensis) at the same time seemed like a no-brainer.

Once we decided on the location, it was time to get busy...and busy we got! The vision of a local mum trudging across the bridge towards the forest with her son and a wheelbarrow full of creations and tools is one I won't forget in a hurry. Other families have been busy too, adding beautifully painted rocks and

various features to the forest. **Glenorie Fairy Forest is** there for everyone to enjoy. It's hidden behind the back corner of the park (at 25 Cairnes Road). We hope our community will take pride in adding to the garden and playing with what others have left there. We do expect that anything added to the garden is natural and will add to the environment. Glenorie Creek needs all the help it can get to survive.

Glenorie provided me with the most beautiful setting in which to grow up. The streams were clear and full of yabbies and tadpoles, with Darug grinding grooves everywhere you looked. This was nearly 30 years ago. We spent hours playing in the creeks, covered in mud and having a ball. We were completely enthralled by our discoveries, whether they were clay fairy houses, banksia men, koalas or beautiful flowers.

I would love for our kids to have the same experiences. As I sit surrounded by off-cuts of twigs, gum leaves, jute twine and paddlepop sticks, I remind myself of the children I hope will enjoy the fairy forest. I hope they can spend time outdoors, getting dirty, exploring and having fun in their local spaces together.

Keep an eye out for the fairies!

WHAT'S ON THE HORIZON For 2019?


