

"A woman has been charged over alleged break-ins and stealings in Galston and Arcadia in early March."

Just after **7am** on **Thursday 21 March**, officers from Kuring-Gai Police Area Command executed a search warrant at a house on Dieffenbach Terrace, Bidwill, following inquiries into these crimes.

During a search of the house, officers seized items alleged to be stolen. A 34-year-old Bidwill woman was arrested and taken to Riverstone Police Station where she was charged with 19 offences

- Dishonestly obtain financial advantage etc by deception (13 counts)
- Break and Enter house steal
- Break and enter dwelling/house etc with intent (steal)
- Licence expired 2 years or more before
- Larceny
- Owner not disclose identity of driver/passenger (two counts)

The woman was granted bail to appear at Hornsby Local Court on Wednesday 17 April 2019. Inquiries continue.





-NOTICE TO ALL-IMPORTANT INFORMATION GLENORIE ANZAC DAY DAWN SERVICE 2019

Please be advised that the 2019 ANZAC Day Dawn Service has been cancelled. Over the last 99 years, the Glenorie and surrounding Districts have honoured our fallen from all wars, with a memorial service held at dawn on the 25th day of April, the time ANZAC troops began landing at Gallipoli.

For the last few years, the Glenorie Returned and Services League Sub-Branch have been unable to obtain authority from Ku-Ring-Gai Local Area Police Command to conduct the Dawn Service due to perceived safety issues relating to attendees crossing Old Northern Road and being exposed to vehicular weapons (as used by terrorists overseas) whilst attending the Service. State and Federal laws were introduced several years ago detailing measures required to ensure Public Safety at Community Events. Sadly, Walter Buckingham Gardens containing our War Memorial and Cenotaph fall well short of the minimum safety requirements.

The Glenorie RSL Sub-Branch are unanimous in wishing to continue to observe the dawn service at the dedicated War Memorial however we can't do this alone. We have the support of the board and management of the Glenorie RSL Club and the large number of local residents who attend the dawn service attest to the community support for this to continue. We all agree that it would pose too great a risk to allow the service to proceed on the 25th April without the active support of the police, traffic authorities and Hornsby and Hills Shire Councils. In order to protect the public this year's Dawn Service will not proceed.

Further meetings are being planned to establish a working paper to bring Walter Buckingham Gardens up to a safe standard so that Dawn Services can resume at the appropriate Glenorie War Memorial and Cenotaph.

The Community ANZAC Day Parade and Service, hosted by the Glenorie RSL Club in the afternoon of April 25th is not affected by the above and will continue as normal.

Residents may have noticed a significant increase in scam calls either porporting to be Telstra or the NBN. These calls normally take the form of a recorded message to begin with telling you that you fit in to one of the following:


- Your service will be disconnected
- You have an outstanding debt that is unpaid
- The nbn[™] is about to go live in your area. If you wish to keep your phone number, please press 1 now.

Generally you are asked to press 1 and you are directed to are person, who then tries to get your personal details, account and bank account details. This is then used to scam you of money or can be used in identity theft.

Whilst many residents realise this is a scam, many do not, particularly those who are older, not as technology savvy, and particular those who rely on their phone for contact with their family. If you have neighbours who, you think, could be vulnerable, please take five minutes to have a chat with them to ensure they understand that all these calls are scams and should be ignored. Advise them to just put the phone down.



I made mention of our Bave-U orchard sprayer recently. Whilst giving the engine a run, it came to a very abrupt stop with a big bang resulting in a pile of small pieces on the floor! Ah well, a bit of a setback. Lucky we had obtained a second one for spares.

We have received the donation of a little 3-wheel motorised "Pyramid" trolley, used in the 1950's delivering poultry feed to the chooks at a Berrilee property. The photo shows its arrival at Fagan Park with plenty of onlookers. We will restore it in due course.

The Fagan Park museums and Netherby Homestead are open every Tuesday, our volunteering day, and we open the museums on the second Sunday each month during the afternoon. All visitors are welcome.

Representatives included Councilors Warren Waddell, Nathan Tilbury, Mike Marr and Michael Hutchence, Kurt Henkel, Landscape Coordinator from Hornsby Council, Emma Paling from Oculus and Elissa from CoDesign.

Emma Paling asking the meeting a series of questions for community input: -

- Parking opposite Fagan Park on Arcadia Rd and Carrs Creek Rd to include no stopping signs opposite on the road way. Councilors mention that Residence parking stickers are available.
- Private water mains with Interested people to contact AGRA to carry this forwards.
- Local Crime (break and enter) Police LAC will be asked to attend the next meeting
- Kerbs side appearance (overgrown grass): Individuals can approach council if they have issues that need to be address.



This month's ride is a safe, easy out and back cruise. The whole ride follows the ridgelines of Hornsby Heights. Flat bicycle rides in the vicinity of Galston and Glenorie are rare !

If visting Hornsby, park and ride from Carrington Road or Clarinda Street. Turn left onto the bicycle lane along Galston Road and enjoy cruising past pretty suburban homes and gardens. These cycle lanes are popular. There are also quite a few local school children using the footpaths to cycle to school and back. Consequently, cycling or walking along Galston Road East is actually a very social experience!

After riding past Rofe Park (where you can refill your waterbottle) there is a small incline up past the Caltex Garage. In next to no time you will need to prepare to merge lanes to turn right at the traffic lights into Somerville Road. This wide, quiet suburban road in



Hornsby Heights is 4 – 6.5km one way, and a pleasure to ride. In about 15 minutes you will reach the bus turn around bay at Black Ash Trail. You'll also see the Berowra National Park gate to Crosslands Reserve. Many cyclists do several repeats of Somerville Road to get more distance and/or simply practise some (bike) mindfulness therapy!

If it is an intense, but scenic hill climb you need (where nobody can hear you scream) hurtle all the way down to Crosslands Reserve, and ride back up. You'll only be able to ride it all if your power to weight ratio is on point... mere mortals will have to get off and push their road bikes up the two extremely steep sections of this merciless 2.5km climb!

On the corner of Somerville and Galston Road is the Corner Café. This is a unique little suburban gem and they make excellent coffee and affordable breakfasts. Way better than having to ride in the busy traffic lanes of Peats Ferry Road, attempting to access the cafés around Hornsby town centre on a bicycle.

Somerville Road, Crosslands Reserve and Hornsby central have got a little something for every genre of road cyclist. Go ride it today!

OPTIONAL EXTRAS:

CROSSLANDS RESERVE: Toilets, kayaking, campsites, fishing, kiddies playground and cycle track, Great North Walk hiking trail and swimming in Berowra Creek. Why not cycle there and meet friends or family at Crosslands for a top notch, active picnic during school holidays ?

HORNSBY CENTRE: Weirdly- NO cycle lanes or safe shoulders on Peats Ferry Road! It's stressful and dangerous if you decide to leave the car at home to access the Hornsby Station transit hub and facilities like Hornsby pool, TAFE, OMV mtb trail, cafes etc on a bicycle. The 40km speed limit through the centre does improve cyclist and pedestrian safety, however.

WATCH FOR: A boat trailer permanently parked in the cycle lane on the downhill return approach to the Caltex Garage, forcing cyclists into the traffic lane.

Keeping your house number highly visible from the street can greatly assist emergency services find your home in an emergency response. Large house numbers, well-lit or reflective numbers and curb side numbers can assistance.

BARKING DOG: With over twenty-three years of experience in the security installation industry, I still believe the most effective security device

is a barking dog. A savage guard dog is great! but any dog that barks is fine as the barking can send a thief running as it attracts the attention of yourself or neighbours.

LOCK YOUR ELECTRICITY BOX: In recent years would-be home invaders have taken to turning off the mains power in order to gain easy access to your family home. Often, they might do this several times initially disappearing into the night. After a few times the home owners guard is down and that when they strike! Taking the homeowner by surprise and forcing their way in. Padlocks are available at a cost from your supply authority so that the homeowner and the supply authority can have access.

KEEP VALUABLES OUT OF SITE: Whilst money and jewellery are highly sort after by thieves all items of vale should be kept out of sight. Keep highly valuable small items and identity items in a home safe secured well to a concrete slab. Keep garden and power tools on a locked garage or shed. Ladders should always be stored away or locked up as a ladder can provide easy access through a tile roof.

HOLLIDAY SECURITY: Talk to your neighbours and have them keep an eye on your home whilst you are away, the time will come when you can return the favour. Make sure they have your contact details so they can communicate. Have someone empty your letterbox daily as a pile of mail can be an indicator of an empty home. 
survive the war, fighting in it for years. She was the strongest person Brandon knew, yet her frailty scared him. He couldn't lose her.







Atients on Sydney's North Shore will receive a major boost from a significant new investment in Hornsby Ku-ring-gai Hospital.

The NSW Liberals and Nationals will invest an extra \$65 million in the hospital, enabling it to deliver additional ambulatory care, including new renal dialysis, chemotherapy and oral health services, and a new community health centre.

It will mean more patients can be treated closer to home rather than travelling to other hospitals. The new funding brings the NSW Liberals and Nationals Government's total investment in the upgrade of Hornsby Ku-ring-gai Hospital to more than \$405 million.

Health Minister Brad Hazzard announced the extra funding for Stage 2 of the redevelopment today, with the Member for Hornsby, Matt Kean.

"The Liberals and Nationals Government is making record investments in hospitals and health services – we have spent almost \$10 billion since 2011 and will be investing more than \$8 billion in health infrastructure over the next four years," Mr Hazzard said.

Mr Kean said this significant \$65 million funding boost for Stage 2 of the upgrade – which is already delivering a new Emergency Department and medical inpatient units in a new clinical services

tower – will further improve the health care of patients in the growing Hornsby area.

"This further upgrade will enable the fantastic Hornsby Hospital staff to continue to deliver world-class health care in modern facilities," Mr Kean said.

"It will include a range of new ambulatory care services such as renal dialysis and chemotherapy, enabling people to be treated closer to home, as well as a range of other expanded services.

"Since 2011, more than \$405 million has been allocated for infrastructure development at Hornsby-Ku-ring-gai Hospital. This is a win for the community and a win for staff."

The additional \$65 million will provide:

- Fit-out of rehabilitation inpatient units being built in the Hornsby Ku-ring-gai Hospital Stage 2 Redevelopment
- Refurbishment and increased capacity of the Psychiatric Emergency Care Centre to allow for future needs
- Expansion of ambulatory care services including a new renal dialysis service, chemotherapy day services, and oral health services.

- Consolidation of community health services into a modern, integrated centre.
- New Helipad.

\$121 million was invested in Stage 1 of the Redevelopment of Hornsby Ku-ring-gai Hospital which saw the construction of a five-storey clinical services building, named the STAR building (surgical, theatres, anesthetics and recovery), completed in 2015 and a new \$19.8 million multi-storey car park with over 500 spaces opened in early 2019. The now \$265 million Stage 2 redevelopment is currently underway.

RURAL ROUND UP

fter complex and lengthy negotiations Hornsby Shire Council and NBN Australia have agreed to lease terms that will see the new NBN tower installed behind Arcadia Rural Fire Service shed. This will advance NBN's commitment to improve internet services in the broader Arcadia area and is a significant victory for the community.

The Galston Village Public Domain Strategy has moved into the next phase with consultants, Oculus, initiating their community engagement at the last Arcadia and Galston Residents Association (AGRA) meeting. Closely followed by a pop-up stall in the village designed to attract further community and user input. I encourage anyone interested in

this important village improvement initiative that has not yet commented to complete the online survey at hornsby.nsw.gov.au/publicdomain

The Glenorie Progress Association has released a draft discussion paper outlining their vision for the Glenorie Village precinct. A development application recently lodged by the Shore family for a new service station and commercial unit complex on the Hills side of Old Northern Rd is a welcome sign that much-needed amenities will soon be restored to the rural area. This further demonstrates the need to assess and integrate our village needs into a broader strategic initiative involving both Councils. The second stage of the communications workshop has now been completed. The consultants preparing our future communications policy have been made acutely aware of the challenges facing our community in terms of Council messaging. I look forward to a range of improvements that will assist in this area.

Council has endorsed the brief prepared for the accelerated rural land review and work will begin shortly on addressing the broader land use anomalies that need to be resolved.

For further input into these and many other issues please attend the A ward community forum at 6.30pm on the 11th April at The Galston Club and have your say.



The local Federal member for Berowra, Julian Leeser MP organised a morning tea on Friday, 1 March with the Minister for Agriculture and Water Resources, the Hon. David Littleproud MP at The Dural Country Club. Twenty local Horticultural business people were in attendance including representatives from the Nursery Industry, Cut Flowers and Orchardists.

TOPICS INCLUDED:

CAREERS

This was a hot topic! We see a declining number of students studying horticulture. This is a concern with career pathways not promoted at school. Ten years ago, over 3,000 people were studying Agribusiness courses, now it is down to 300. Discussions revolved around the fact that Horticulture requires a certain skills set needed in smaller businesses' and Apprentices it seems, are no longer supported by most TAFE's. Littleproud also discussed the re-introduction of agriculture into high schools which would see a benefit for industry. This should see a larger interest.

Also discussed was the employment of people on VISA, Littleproud said he will look at giving this area an exemption to allow VISA employment to occur.

EXPORT/IMPORTS

Many of those who import or export in horticulture see a barrier to industry with faceless people, you can no longer talk about export and import issues.

Littleproud said we need commonsense and enable us to open up trade making it easier for businesses to import/export. If growers have certain issues, they need to make Littleproud aware of these issues so they can be resolved.

ENVIRONMENT

Littleproud wants Agriculture to be encouraged to have biodiversity on farms. Property owners will need to plant trees which will become a part of their accreditation which will give them financial rewards for their investment. This will assist nurseries in supplying farms with trees to plant.

Littleproud would like to see the drought proofing Australia with legislation will be lifted for dams and tanks. The federal government money to spend in this area with the De-silting of dams during dry times has funding available for sheep/ cattle farmers. Littleproud wants to open this up for horticulture so funds are available for our businesses to do the same for future proofing.

Overall, the meeting attendees commented on the down to earth nature of the Minister for Agriculture and Water Resources and they enjoyed the opportunity to attend the meeting.

here was a meeting held on Wednesday 20th March at the Galston Club. Julian Leeser MP had called the meeting following the amount of complaints received by his office from residents in our area.

There were representatives from NBN, Telstra, Optus and Vodafone plus an audience of over 120 residents.

NBN gave an opening address of what to expect from NBN, when it is likely to become available in our area (approximately May 2020) followed by updates from Telstra, Optus and Vodafone.

When the floor was opened to guestions, Telstra took a real battering. Clearly the representative present had no idea of the amount of issues which our residents are experiencing.

Some of the points raised were:

- 1. Internet speed incredibly slow and in places non-existent (ie many black spots)
- 2. Deterioration in both landline and mobile services over the past 12 months.
- 3. Quality of contractors fixing problems was very poor. It was reported by a local electrician that the state of the telstra boxes were appauling. No correct labeling on wires, and no care taken in neatness so other

wires could be easily accessed and fixed. Contractors appeared to have little knowledge of how to fix issues. Some contractors (ie old Telstra employees) are the few that seem to know how to fix issues.

- 4. The quality of contrators is causing fault upon fault, ie residents getting their neighbours phone numbers, disconnecting lines in error,
- 5. Why has the NBN been rolled out into areas where their internet was fine, but not rolled out here where these is a need for a more reliable service (assuming NBN will actually work here).
- 6. Satellite NBN is being used by some residents, but its data allowance is too low for the technological world we live in today where so much is provided by the internet.
- 7. Residents said existing problems are not being fixed, as Telstra doesn't want to spend money prior to NBN being rolled out.
- 8. Why are we being charged full price when the service provided is so poor.

The Telstra representative was unable to answer many of the issues raised, however they had a number of employees ready to take residents questions back to the office for specific



investigation of those issues and they said they would get back to them as a matter of urgency.

Telstra stated that they didn't think this area was at capacity. However this was disputed by a number of residents in the audience who couldn't aet phones connected.

Telstra also stated that in the 'internet of things' their services were experiencing some network congestion (ie residents using Netflixs and other video) which takes up more bandwidth, and therefore causes slower speeds for all on the network at peak times.

Telstra also mentioned the option of its mobile Cell Technology' which might help alleviate problems in rural communities like ours. mobile but there is a higher cost involved for the customer to set up and install the system.

At the end of the presentation, residents stayed to log their issues with Telstra. Many said "we've attended other meetings with Telstra and not much changed" others were more optomistic and hoped as this Telstra representative was more senior, then something might be achieved.



t must have been about eight in the morning (see Matthew 27), when the crowd burst out of the gates of the city. Somewhere along the road, Christ stumbled and Simon was compelled to help carry his cross. Then about nine o'clock, they reached the hill called the "Place of the Skull"- Golgotha in Aramaic- Calvaria, in Latin and in English, Calvary. It is the most sacred place on earth.

Glenorie Mission Church THE DAY CHRIST DIED (a message by Rev Ed. Long)

Christ was six hours on the cross, three in sunlight and three in darkness. The first three were busy hours. He spoke three times, each time revealing his greatness and his love. He spoke words of forgiveness to his executioners. He spoke salvation to the thief and love to his mother and John. In those hours the soldiers played dice, while the priests scoffed at him.

Women nearby were weeping. Crucifixion did not bring about a quick death. If was possible for men to last several days in terrible agony and unbearable thirst. On this day the scene was suddenly blotted out right at noon and darkness lasted three hours. In that period Christ spoke again, this time on four occasions. One statement contains the most tragic words ever heard : 'My God where are you? Why have you left me?' We know the answer of course, because God had turned his back he was laying on him the sin of us all and God could not look on sin.

Then later he said those grand words which mean so much to us: 'it is finished'. What did he mean? The whole plan of salvation worked out in Eternity was completed. The work God gave him to do was done. The cup the Father gave him to drink had been drunk. He could go home to the Father with everything finalised. Then and then only, could he say: 'Father into your hands I commit my spirit'. He literally gave up his own life

He literally gave up his own life in simple yet wonderful faith that the Father would not leave him in the place of death, but would bring him back to life again. We know the rest of the story — then came Sunday!

Thank God for the love which drew salvation's plan !

uring the Second World War a church in central London was preparing for a harvest thanksgiving service. The central feature of the beautiful display of food and gifts was a golden sheaf of corn. However, the service never took place, because the church was destroyed in a savage air raid just hours before the planned celebration.

The months passed. The following spring someone noticed shoots of green appearing on the bomb site where the church had once stood. Summer came and the shoots flourished. That autumn, a year after the devastating bombing, an abundant patch of corn was growing amongst the rubble. Not even the destructive impact of a

bomb could destroy the life of the

corn and its seeds.


This simple story is a powerful illustration of the beauty and hope of the Easter message. Jesus healed the sick, treated the despised with dignity, gave hope to the despairing, and exposed injustice and hypocrisy. Yet he made many enemies who were finally successful in their attempts to kill him. If the death of Jesus were the end of the story, it would show that death could take the loveliest and best life that has ever been lived and crush it. But Good Friday was not the final word; then came the joy of Easter Sunday when Jesus rose from the dead. Evil did its worst to Him, but Jesus could not be destroyed. The death of Jesus at the hands of sinful

people and His victory over evil and the grave were constant themes in the preaching of the apostles in the early church (Acts 2:22-24; 3:13-16 and 4:9-12), and the power of the Risen Jesus was a critical factor in the growth and success of the Christian movement.

The Resurrection of Jesus is the final proof that truth is stronger than falsehood, good is stronger than evil, love is stronger than hatred, and that life is stronger than death. The message of Easter is one of hope and inspiration in a world where life is often unfair and sad. The death and resurrection of Jesus give us purpose for today and hope for tomorrow, and that is good news indeed as expressed in the chorus of a popular hymn: 'Because He lives I can face tomorrow, Because He lives all fear is gone; Because I know He holds the future And life is worth the living just because He lives.'

May you enjoy a blessed Easter, and may you experience the wonder of knowing the risen Jesus as your Saviour and Friend.

WHO IS YOUR SHEPHERD

"I love a sunburnt country A land of sweeping plains Of ragged mountain ranges Of droughts and flooding rains I love her far horizons I love her jewelled sea Her beauty and her terror The wide brown land for me."

In this very well- known Australian poem, with its six descriptive

stanzas, Dorothea Mackellar captures the essence of our Australian landscape and its effect on the life and culture of the people who live here. Her verses breathe her love of her country, Australia.

One of the key aspects of Australian life has always been our sheep and wool industry. The first sheep to arrive here came with the First Fleet in 1788. Sheep farmers were among the first free settlers arriving from Britain in the 1820's and since then, wool production has been our best known and

most successful rural industry. It has long been regarded as a mainstay of the national economy. In fact, in the past, it was often said that the Australian economy "rides on the sheep's back"!

Although today this adage may not be true, the Australian merino still remains the dominant sheep breed, accounting for about 75% of the Australian flock. Merino wool is widely recognised as the best quality in the world and our future still looks promising with this "miracle fibre" in high demand.

You might be like me, in that I've never met a shepherd but I've always liked Psalm 23 in the bible, with its opening line- " The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not be in want."

What are some of the qualities of a shepherd that will help us understand why Jesus is called 'the good shepherd."

Firstly, a shepherd protects his sheep. In John 10:27 Jesus says, "My sheep listen to My voice; I know them and they follow Me. I give them eternal life... no one can snatch them out of My Hand."

A shepherd nurtures the flock in his care. Isaiah 40:11 tells us, "He tends His flock like a shepherd: He gathers the lambs in His arms and carries them close to His heart; He gently leads those that have young."

Jesus provides exactly what we need. Psalm 23:3 describes the fact that a shepherd guides his sheep.

Most importantly, a true shepherd will risk or even give his life for his sheep. It was common practice in early Bible times for the shepherd to build a 'fence' of bramble bush scrub, to hem in his sheep at night and protect them. He would lie in the gateway- in the gap- so no enemy could reach his sheep without him knowing.

On the cruel Cross at Calvary, Jesus gave up His earthly life so that we can have forgiveness for our sins and a restored relationship with God for all eternity.

The Lord Jesus is my shepherd. Who is yours?

STILL CREEK LANDCARE OUR WATERWAYS ARE THEY HEALTHY?

he short answer is yes, but long time residents know the fish that used to be there are gone.

So how do we know that the creeks are relatively clean?

Because Still Creek Landcare is part of the Streamwatch organization. Streamwatch operates right across Sydney's waterways, providing testing equipment, training, techniques and expertise to support our physical, chemical and biological water quality testing.

Streamwatch "eyes on the water" has contributed to the early warning and quick action for:

- pollution at Thornleigh recently
- biosecurity at Lawson the first NSW place detecting the European Black Slug

You can find our local waterways results for the last 10 years at http:// www.stillcreeklandcare.com.au/ our-catchment/water-quality/.

We are fortunate in this country that none of our children is among the 1.4 million world-wide who die each year from diarrhoea, mainly due to poor water. To keep it that way, each of us can help preserve our local water quality by:

- using nil or low Phosphorus detergents
- using fertilisers and chemicals carefully and sparingly
- collecting livestock manure
- keeping grazing animals away from creeks

Unfortunately, Streamwatch is under threat. The NSW government

will stop funding Streamwatch from June this year, so it could cease very soon. A petition has been set up to continue funding Streamwatch and support the volunteers monitoring and collecting samples of our waterways. Please visit http://chng. it/MTfDL7QgVX to sign the petition to help Streamwatch continue its valuable work. Community water testing is important and a very cost effective way of keeping a pulse on the health of our waterways. Its importance only increases as water stress gets worse across the state and Australia.

If you have ever wondered why your native plants seem to die when you plant them in your garden, despite your best efforts and reading the instruction card, well our quest speaker Brian Roach gave us some insight as to why this happens. He was funny, entertaining and even started with a song but he quickly turned serious about his passion and love for native plants, as well as his desire for us to all plant our gardens with natives that will thrive in your garden. He explained that natives growing in the bush grow from seed, the seed germinates and puts down a tap root to seek the water, and this doesn't happen with potted native plants. He gave Waratahs as an example, we all assume that they don't need much water but because they are grown in pots and have not put down their tap root, they actually need to be kept well-watered. He also explained why WA natives don't do as well on the Eastern side and the strides that have been made with grafting and other experiments to change this.

However it was not all bad news Brian gave us an extensive list of plants that would thrive as well as produce pretty flowers and fruit as well; he answered a number of member's questions. For every plant he spoke about its care as well as position. He had brought as tube stock to sell to members as a special price. As usual there was quite a crowd around the table and around Brian at the end of the night. The most interesting plant he spoke about was the development of a Dwarf Christmas Bush "Johanna's Christmas" (named after Brian's daughter) that he has been involved in cultivating and while there are not many yet available, look out for this magnificent coloured bush in the future

s we celebrated 50 years since Warrah's foundation on 23 March 1969, it has been good to dig out some old photographs and reflect on the

past. Pictured above is Farmer Rose in the 1970s. Warrah's first house – Waratah Cottage (now known as the Banksia Community Centre) was opened that in 1969

to house and educate children with disabilities and staff. However, Warrah's earliest beginnings were actually in 1965 when a biodynamic vegetable garden was started by Karl Kaltenbach with a group of young men with disability from Inala. From those first efforts, Warrah Biodynamic Farm developed. This year we also celebrate 25 years since the Farm's first certification.

Given that we are currently transitioning into autumn, it is remarkable to see in the Farm Shop the great variety that Australian organic farmers are still producing. Thanks to this transition and some challenging weather conditions, a few items have been in short supply over the last month; most notably bananas, cauliflowers, avocados and beans. In addition, we are still lucky enough to be enjoying delicious nectarines and grapes!

The final flush of summer blessed the Farm with a few hot days in March, but we had to batten down the hatches and brace ourselves for torrential rain too.

We have been busy planting this past month with more of our usual leafy greens of curly kale, chard, pak choi and lettuce going in, along with parsley and coriander. We have rocket, salad mix, mustards and more brassicas ready to go in too, but will struggle to get them in if the forecast of more rain proves to be accurate. Let's hope! The leeks have taken off and are looking great, with two different varieties planted some weeks back, and more ready to go in.

operational theatres around the world, in defence of the Nation's interests. The Driveway has achieved the form and status its founders imagined. It is a living memorial of trees under the careful stewardship of the volunteers of the Remembrance Driveway Committee and will continue to grow as new opportunities present themselves.

Recent activity on the Driveway in partnership with RMS includes the 45,000 trees plantation near Campbelltown to honour the Australian Defence Force, and the three large depictions of the Victoria Cross at the M7/M5 interchange.

MIDDLE DURAL FIRE BRIGADE NEWS By JO Cameron

t's now the season for hazard reductions in The Hills Shire, and also the time when scheduled burns are cancelled due to rain. At the time of writing, we recorded 89mm in one 24 hour period, which will prevent the RFS from carrying out planned burns for some foreseeable time.

Some of our residents are frustrated with the time it takes for their local Brigade to burn their particular property. It is important that our residents do as much as they can to prepare their own properties for the oncoming fire season, because there are many reasons why volunteers cannot carry out a planned burn. Bad weather is but one of them. In addition, burns are carried out on a shire-wide, seven-year burn plan, with a broad strategic vision for rendering the whole Shire safe. Brigades work together to a predetermined plan, not by individual brigades choosing to burn in their own small patch. In Middle Dural, we have submitted two plans for potential hazard reductions in 2019, to our District Office, but these are on the back burner because we will be assisting other Brigades to burn areas of higher priority.

We assisted Maroota Brigade with a potentially severe bushfire a few months ago, with help from the aircraft stationed at Richmond Airbase.

At this time of year, Hills Shire Brigades hold their their Annual General Meetings, when all operational and executive positions are up for re-election. Middle Dural Brigade's AGM was held in earlyApril at our station in Mid Dural Road. All members of the public are entitled to attend, to see how their Brigade is organised for the oncoming year.

It has been a good year; four new members have completed their basic training and have been welcomed into the Brigade. Once again, please consider becoming a volunteer. You can join us at any time, with training courses several times each year.
