
GALSTON CLUB GETS FACELIFT





You need only attend the vicinity of Glenorie Public School at drop off or pick up time or during an event to see the dangers posed to children and families due to a lack of parking and the width of Old Northern Road. Glenorie Park's gravel and narrow parking area is always full, cars are parked from the school for up to 100m past the school. In fact, the entirety of Glenorie's parking capacity is becoming more congested.

The solutions to the parking challenges in Glenorie are simple and cost effective and can be achieved rapidly with a cohesive plan that deals with parking in its entirety within the Glenorie and with the cooperation of local and state governments. Glenorie Progress Association has as part of it's wider Glenorie Draft Plan, outlined actions that can be taken by RMS, the Hills and Hornsby Shire Councils. These solutions include expanding the council car park at Glenorie Park, as well as providing Glenorie Preschool with additional space, widening Old Northern Road in the narrow and dangerous parts opposite the school, and improving the parking capability on Schwebel Lane.

Obviously if more children were to use the school bus, that would also help, but currently with so many working families and activities, that is not always the most practical option. Parking congestion will only increase as the population increases. Sub-divisions on Halcrow's Rd, Old Northern Rd are starting to come online and building in the vacant lots on other cluster sub-divisions are starting to finalise. It is likely (in my opinion) that Hornsby's review of rural lands will result in further development in the area. This will bring further pressure on the parking situation in Glenorie. Further to all of this, an application is with council for a 40 berth preschool at 18 Tecoma Drive. It includes 10 parking spaces, but 4 of those are for staff, leaving 1 disabled and 5 for patrons.

This will surely add more pressure to parking around the school. The GPA is also taking a long view on addressing issues like parking with the consideration of safe and healthy travel to school facilitated by cycleways as part of the overall plan.

The time to act is now, pre-empt and avoid dangerous situations. The GPA looks forward to working with the State Government, the Hills and Hornsby Shire Councils on this matter.

GPA was pleased to welcome the Labor and Liberal candidates for the state electorate of Hawkesbury to the meeting held 14 February at Glenorie RSL. It was a productive time of presenting our draft plan and seeking the support of each candidate if they were to win office. Both candidates, Peter Reynolds and Robyn Preston were complimentary of the evening. Robyn Preston (Liberal) said: "I applaud the initiative taken by GPA to put together a collective vision on future planning and amenities for the area that Hornsby and The Hills Councils can consider".

The cafe has a full licence to sell alcohol and allows BYO wine. There is excellent wheelchair access and toilets designed for the disabled. During March and April there will be greater numbers of cyclists on the Two Gorges Route, Old Northern Road, Wisemans, Cattai Ridge, Kenthurst, and Annangrove Roads. Apart from the usual weekend riders, many more people will come here from all over Sydney to train for the Bobbin Head and Blayney to Bathurst events and endurance mountain bike events like the Convict 100.



Here is some safety-related information for human powered vehicles, and petrol-powered vehicles.

YOU CAN: Overtake cyclists across double white lines in NSW when it is safe to do so. Legally, you must pass with a metre plus between your car and the cyclist(s) if on a 50-60km/h road, or 1.5m + if driving in an 80km/h+ speed zone. (Much easier than being unable to overtake a slow, erratic driver).

YOU CAN: Bunch ride and legally cycle two abreast on the road, providing there is no more than 1.5 metres shoulder to shoulder between cyclists. Bunch riding is a critical skill to master if you are a competitive cyclist and vast distances are covered very efficiently in a bunch. Cyclists feel safer, and are also more visible on the roads if riding together. A large bunch of road cyclists is just like encountering a bus full of people. Overtake them with the same level of caution.

YOU CAN'T: Ride any sanctioned mountain bicycle trails networks to connect and appreciate our amazing Sydney bushlands and national parks, because nothing much longer than 6km laps in official bike park areas have built for bicycles.

YOU CAN: Ride safe, fairly extensive cycle paths networks to transit hubs, major events and to connect centres of recreational interest throughout the Greater Sydney Metropolitan area. Look for opportunities to leave the car at home! (Hills Shire Council has been building our closest cycle paths network since 2009.)

YOU CAN'T: Overtake a cyclist who is approaching, or already cycling through a traffic circle. All local road users have several traffic circles they must daily negotiate in Kenthurst, Dural, Round Corner and Galston Village. Many of them have 'traffic calming kerbs,' which are extremely dangerous to bicycles as they force cyclists to merge into the middle of a narrowed traffic lane. Please don't overtake cyclists in or approaching a traffic circle!

YOU CAN'T: Overtake a cyclist and then immediately turn in front of them to park your car outside the shops or turn down a street. Cyclists can be traveling as fast as 30-40km/h on a level road and will collide with your vehicle if you suddenly cut them off.

YOU CAN'T: Legally cycle on a pavement in NSW if you are 16 and over.

YOU CAN: Legally cycle on a pavement if you are accompanying a minor under 16. Why add to traffic congestion and therefore your carbon footprint by driving short distances (<10km) to school or sports or shops and back every week if you can all cycle there safely out the traffic on a footpath?

YOU CAN: Ride your mountain bicycle for long endurance miles on the vast networks of remote firetrails all over Sydney. Unfortunately, most firetrails are unmarked for navigation via biking or walking, many of them are dead ends or they traverse mobile reception blackspot areas. In order to connect bushlands, Sydney mountain bikers soften have no choice but to ride on the roads. Arrange to ride offroad with friends, carry enough water and a charged up phone...or at least tell someone where you are going, if going solo!

In conclusion, don't adopt the de-humanising 'us and them' blame mindset, so beloved of the sensationalist media mix. We all have freedom of choice, but we don't have freedom from the consequences. Choose wisely.







Judith attended Miss Hale's Business College, where she learned shorthand, typing and business principles. On completing the course, her first job was at David Jones, where she worked in the office of Sir Charles Lloyd-Jones, "licking envelopes".

Her next job was in 'Uncle Max's Doll Shop and Doll Hospital'. Here, she not only performed clerical work but also served in the shop.

In 1937, Judith went to work in an office, where she was kissed against her will by her employer on her first day on the job. It was a time when women's rights were unheard-of in Australia. When reported to the police, Judith's boss denied forcibly kissing her. However, police officers noticed that he had "pink lipstick on his upper lip". He was fined 20 pounds and this sexual harassment case was a first in Australian legal history. Following this, she worked as a receptionist for a well-known Sydney photographer and then in Mark Foys, a large Sydney department store. In these roles, she was responsible for the photography department and also took photographs at weddings on weekends.

Having an entrepreneurial streak, Judith, at the age of 23, began to provide a full wedding planning service for brides. She organised invitations, booked hire cars, prepared bouquets and took care of other event requirements.

During World War II, Judith continued to work at Mark Foys while carrying out her weekend business. In addition, she began working in the "All Services Canteen" at Central station, where, from midnight to dawn, she

served pies, tea and coffee to service personnel.

Judith left work to raise her children: two daughters, Victoria, who finished school at Meriden in 1968 as Dux and Deputy Head Girl, and Rochelle, who graduated in 1971, and who was Captain of Sussex House and also Deputy Head Girl. It was not until 1962 that Judith began working again, selling library books to schools and public libraries, which she did until she retired in 2004, aged 85.

Judith now lives in an aged care home in Dural. She is proud to be Meriden's oldest Old Girl.



ALVATORE CALI, known to many as just Sam was born 28 July 1930 in Acireale Sicily Italy. He was the fourth child of five children for Salvatore and Maria Cali.

Salvatore had a happy childhood even though times were tough in Sicily between the wars. It was compulsory for all Italian young men to do Military Service and Salvatore was fortunate enough to be posted to Florence and Sienna in Tuscany Italy. While on leave Salvatore met the love of his life Rosaria (aka Sarina).

After his military service, Salvatore planned to follow his brother to Australia and make enough money to then return and marry Sarina. In 1953 Salvatore migrated to Australia, he arrived with one small suitcase and in debt to his family for his cost of his voyage. Salvatore spent his first years in

Innisfail Queensland, cutting sugar cane and even though it was hard work, he liked what saw and began to fall in love with Australia and all it had to offer.

In 1956 Salvatore married Sarina by proxy with Salvatore's father standing in for him at the church. In 1957 she travelled to Australia to be with her husband. Salvatore later sponsored his brother Mick to come to Australia and they all moved to Griffith and picked grapes. They were not afraid of hard work and really wanted to get ahead.

In 1962 Salvatore and Mick moved to Dural, purchasing a property and forming a farming partnership that lasted for decades. They never left the area they had fallen so much in love, it was now home. Salvatore raised his family there and after a lot of hard work, in the early 1980's they purchased the Galston shops. Cementing his ties to the community that he had grown to love.

Salvatore returned to Italy many times over his life to visit family and friends but every time he returned back to Galston, he would always say 'it is so good to be home'.

Salvatore's first language was always Italian, it was one thing he kept from his country of origin. His understanding of English was far greater than his spoken word and his favourite phrase when he was trying to make his point was, 'don't you speak English?' It would always lighten the moment.

After Sarina and his family, Salvatore's greatest love was food closely followed by soccer, playing cards and going fishing. He was happy to go fishing with anyone who asked and loved watching soccer live and on TV. If there was an international soccer match on TV you knew where to find Salvatore, anytime of the day or night.

Other than providing a secure financial future for his family and the birth of his 3 children, one of the greatest moments in Salvatore's life was the 50th Wedding anniversary party he organised for Sarina. For years leading up to 29th September 2006 this party took top priority. To be married for 50 years is a great achievement in anyone's life but for Salvatore it was something really special and a party was the way he wanted to celebrate, with his beautiful bride. The party was an enormous success. Salvatore and Sarina went on to be married for 62 years.

Salvatore Cali arrived in Australia with just the shirt on his back and has left an impression on everyone he met and everything he touched, his accomplishments have far exceeded his dreams. He leaves us with wonderful memories and the knowledge that anything is possible through hard work.

GWENYTH EVANS Lee Nona Gwenyth Evans was born on 7 May 1962, the second of four children and only daughter of Allan and Nona Evans. She attended Hillside Primary School, Galston High School and, after a gap year, Hawkesbury Agricultural College where she graduated with a Batchelor of Applied Science (Agriculture) in 1984.

Lee was the first member of our family to graduate from a tertiary institution and for a while it looked like she wouldn't stop! There was a Graduate Diploma of Applied Science (Information) in 1991, followed by a Master of Applied Science (Library and Information Management) in 1999.

Lee had three distinct phases to her working life. The first was in journalism. After graduating Lee joined Rural Press, quickly becoming editor of "Hobby Farmer" magazine. She left this position in 1988 in order to travel extensively in Europe.

On her return she was employed by Don Burke, who's star was rapidly rising with the launch of Burke's Backyard on Channel 9. Lee was a researcher for the television show and wrote and edited Don's annual Almanac for the lazy gardener.

Working for Don, although very rewarding, had a shelf life and Lee moved on in 1992, eventually entering the second phase of her working life as an academic librarian. She first worked at the Nepean Campus of the University of Western Sydney, before moving to the Ka-ring-gai Campus of the University of Technology Sydney, and then to Macquarie University in 2007.

At the same time Lee was developing and expanding her talents and interests in the creative arts and as a farmer and nurseryman. Her painting became focussed on exquisitely rendered images

from nature with plants, birds and insects - particularly butterflies - as recurring themes. For a while she kept a small flock of coloured sheep and spun their wool. She worked with our father in breeding a wide range of poultry and cultivating daphne.

In 2011 Lee's outside interests and her working life finally came into alignment. She took a voluntary redundancy from Macquarie University and plunged into the third phase of her working life as a self-employed entrepreneur. Lee launched her business "Feather Flower Brush" in order to market her poultry, daphne and artworks, hence the name.

Striking out on one's own has risks but Lee embraced the challenges and quietly revelled in the triumphs. She built her business on strong ethical and sustainable principles and the rewards were starting to show. In particular, Lee and our father had become known around Australia for reviving a range of colours in Silkies and Sussex, which had become their main poultry breeds.

Lee lived her entire life at the little farm "Abergeldie" near the settlement of Hillside on Cattai Ridge Road. It was not only her home but also became her place of business and the inspiration for much of her art. In later years Lee played an increasingly important role in our family as the loving companion and carer for our elderly parents.

Lee was diagnosed with cancer in May last year and soon learned that her condition was likely to be terminal. She endured the effects of this brutal disease with her customary grace, courage and dignity. Her determination to lead as normal a life as possible meant that, amongst other things, her family was able to celebrate together a number of important events last year, most significantly our father's 90th birthday on 23 December.

Lee was admitted to hospital for the last time on 29 January. Our mother's strict instruction was that she was not to die alone and her brothers, her niece Belle and her sister-in-law Maureen took it in turns to be with her every hour of every day, while another niece Rose and partner Jack kept our parents company at home. Lee died peacefully on 12 February in the company of her beloved brother Trevor. RIP Lee Evans

from the **Mayor's Desk**

Hornsby Shire Council recently published its half-yearly performance report, which reveals much about the hard work of our organisation and its staff. There are many impressive achievements noted, all of which are of benefit to the local community that we share. A stand-out was the clean-up effort in the aftermath of the storms that struck the Bushland Shire just before Christmas, with devastating winds and hail stones as big as tennis balls. Around 600 people called upon Council for assistance and we removed more than 4,500 cubic metres of chipped green waste.

Other achievements include the one-year anniversary of the Community Recycling Centre (which has collected half a million plastic bags and more than 100,000 kilograms of e-waste) and Council's campaign to remove shopping trolleys from the streets of Hornsby. I'm personally very proud of the fact that we have already planted 2,500 new trees, well on the way towards our ultimate goal of 25,000. This could not have been done without the support of the many volunteers who have chipped in to lend a hand.
















HORNSBY HOSPITAL **UPDATE**



DR AMELIA HYNEN ANOTHER HILLS ORIGINAL

he most recent inductee into the Hills Grammar Original Alumni Award collective is scientist, researcher and academic Dr Amelia Hynen (Class of 2008). Not yet 30 years of age, Amelia has achieved much in her ten years since graduating from Hills Grammar. "I wasn't the best student, or at the top of the class at school but from a young age I always knew I wanted to be a scientist...the inspiring teachers at Hills helped foster and drive my passion for science."

A passion for microbiology and infectious diseases saw Amelia pursue scientific research and undertake an Honours research project at the University of Technology, Sydney. The project in biomedical research characterised the Australian Epidemic Strain 1 of Pseudomonas aeruginosa, a chronic bacterial lung infection in cystic fibrosis. For this ground-breaking work, Amelia was awarded first class Honours and the Dean's Merit Award for Academic Excellence.

In 2018, Amelia was given the opportunity of a lifetime – an invitation to the World Health Organisation in Geneva Switzerland, as an intern for the Global Influenza Programme.

"I am proud to be standing here today accepting this award as a woman in science. In our modern technological age, STEM has become an integral part of our everyday lives, and I believe it is more important now than ever before that we come together as a community to encourage the development of our future scientists, technologists, engineers and mathematicians."

40 YEARS OF GOODNESS AND GRACE

ACIFIC HILLS CHRISTIAN SCHOOL AT DURAL is about to celebrate its 40 year anniversary, since it was started as a single teacher school with eight students.

A series of anniversary events are planned for April and May for current and past students, parents and staff, and the local community.

The O'Dell family and a group of friends pioneered the school as Pennant Hills Christian School and the first teacher was Mrs Lynn McCrindle. The McCrindle name has continued to be connected with the school with her children being educated there, and now her grandchildren. Her son Mark is Chairman of the Board.

In its second year the school grew to 41 students and two staff members. 1981 saw the commencement of secondary education and the first enrolments of students with disabilities into mainstream classes.

Dr Boyce commenced his role as Principal in 1985 and today he is Executive Principal over all seven schools which form the Pacific Group of Schools.

In 1986 the school moved to its current location in Quarry Road, Dural, and changed its name to Pacific Hills Christian School. This was also the first year to have a graduating Year 12 class.

The school continued to grow each year. By 1999 there were over 1,000 students and today there are more than 1300 and 150 staff.

A recent milestone was the launch of New Hope School on the same campus which is specifically developed for students with a moderate level of intellectual delay or who have an Autism Spectrum Disorder. A unique feature of this school is the daily collaboration that students have with those at Pacific Hills

The 40th anniversary will be celebrated with a Celebration Day on April 12th, an Afternoon Tea on May 18th, Celebration Service on May 19th, Thanksgiving Service on the exact start date of May 21st, and an Anniversary Dinner at a local restaurant on May 23rd.



Christ told him to do the one thing he couldn't do, get up and walk. But this man was looking into the eyes of the Son of God. These were the words of Christ and the man acted on them.



vervone likes to hear good news and that's been true for young and old in every generation.

"A cheerful look brings joy to the heart and good news (a good report) gives health to the bones." (Proverbs 15:30)

Most of us have a great interest in finding out the latest news - and it's so much easier these days, with access to social media as well as radio, newspapers and magazines. In fact, "News editor's Picks" comes



up on my phone every day, listing the latest newsworthy storiesaccording to the editor.

The earliest way of getting the news was by word of mouth, but we all know the game of "Chinese Whispers" - reminding us that word of mouth is notoriously unreliable!!

By the time Jesus Christ was living on earth, the Romans had published primitive newspapers, called the "Acta Publica." These papers would periodically be posted in public places, recording a variety of things of interest- much like our newspapers today.

With Roman domination at that time being so exacting and harsh, how refreshing and even exciting it would've been to hear the message of John the Baptist! Imagine walking down a street in Jerusalem and

hearing the words, "Repent and hear the good news." Wow- not just the latest news, but good news, proclaiming that the Kingdom of God was near! Soon after that, Jesus was telling the people "Repent for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." (Matthew 4:17).

Then hearing the words that had been spoken by a wellknown prophet hundreds of years before would've provided a lot of discussion on the way home. "Prepare the way of the Lord. Make His paths straight." (Isaiah 40:3)

DO IT NOV

nome years ago a church pastor in my home city of Belfast wrote a book entitled "Don't wait until they're dead". His book emphasised the fact that sometimes we are so sparing of words of appreciation and gratitude when people are still alive, and this is especially true in relation to those who are close to us. It is vital, therefore, that we do and say things when we have the opportunity.

Do it now - that is one of the important lessons that emerges from the story of Mary's anointing of Jesus (Mark 14:3-9). As we noted last month, Mary did what she could with what she had that evening, but she also did what she could when she had the opportunity to do something.


This point is particularly poignant when we realise the setting in which this incident took place. Mary's act of gratitude and devotion took place on the Saturday evening before Jesus was crucified on Good Friday. One week later Jesus was dead. After his death some women brought ointments and spices for his burial, but in a sense it was too late then. Jesus was dead, and he was not aware of the love and affection that motivated their actions. However, the memory of

Mary's deed gave him tremendous encouragement during the days leading up to his cruel death.

There are some things that you and I can do anytime, but there are other things that we can only do once. We only have one opportunity to do some deeds of kindness or speak some words of encouragement, and once the opportunity passes, it is gone. The circumstances, the setting, the time, the place, the person - they will change and the chance has gone. This can apply to such little things in themselves: making a phone call, paying a visit, expressing a word of gratitude, buying that little gift, saying that special word of encouragement. One of the tragedies of life is that we are often moved to do or say something that is kind and helpful, and we do not act on those impulses.

Mary followed through on her impulse, and her deed provides us with a great example to follow. Let us do and say what we can to help others when we have the chance, to do things now when we have the opportunity. Remember that the smallest deed is greater than the grandest intention.

arrah Society is proudly celebrating 50 years of supporting adults and children living with disability, and their families.

Warrah started on a beautiful bushland property, now 11 hectares in Dural. A small organic garden was started as a means to provide young adults with intellectual disability to learn skills and engage in purposeful work over the ensuing years. Cottages for accommodation were built and a school for children with disability established. This continues today, with two beautiful brand new purpose built homes completed just prior to Christmas.

Chief Executive Officer of Warrah, Georgina Michaelis said, "The vision of Warrah's founders continues to be strong and alive today in what we do to support individuals in home, work, school, social and community life."

Inspired by the philosophy of Rudolf Steiner, Warrah's core intent is to support individuals living

with disability to live their life with purpose and dignity.

Warrah parents, Marcelle and Ross King, are extremely thankful for the nearly 40 years that their daughter Jenni has spent in Warrah's school, residential cottages and day service activities. "Jenni has experienced the love, care and devotion of Warrah's staff and has made life-long friends with her peers. Warrah provides a space where Jenni belongs and where she can be herself," shared Ross King.

This includes Supported Independent Living across 12 houses across Sydney's North West, Community Support Services and Courses, and small Special School.

FARM SHOP



n a different note, we are all aware from recent media coverage that farmers across the country are struggling. Australian conditions - from extreme heat to bush fires, drought and wild storms - have heavily affected growing regions in South Australia, Victoria, NSW and Queensland. We are seeing the impact on the entire produce market, but especially in terms of availability of leafy greens. Now, more than ever farmers are grateful for your support.

We too are sorry to report that we have seen a few losses in the paddock and our nursery recently. Mainly affected is the salad mix and our next succession of cucumbers and zucchinis planted and then quickly wiped out in the heat of mid-January. We are fortunate in that plant growth is still rapid at this time of the year, and so we will recover before too long. We ask for your patience and hope that we can get everything back on track as quickly as possible.

Something positive from the garden has been the abundance of tomatoes from our new poly tunnels. The extra protection from the elements and fruit fly has seen us produce some outstandingly flavourful cherry and black Roma varieties this year. Our large heirlooms are now also being harvested and should be around for the next couple of months.

We are now sowing crops ready for the cooler months - coriander, leeks, cabbages, among others, ready for planting out in the not too distant future. We hope to see you around the farm soon.

Ou might be aware that for many months, Landcare has been running a free native plants programme for landowners who have cleared weeds, or want to plant a wildlife corridor, or join up bits of separated bush. Recently we visited some landowners who have received plants, to see the results. We were amazed by what we found. Where there were once weeds, these inspiring people proudly showed us trees to 3m high, beautiful shrubs in flower. They spoke like seasoned professionals about how they removed weeds and their plans for the future of their properties. It gave us a real lift to see their enthusiasm.

Why have they done so well? Firstly they got advice on what to plant and how to care for the plants. Secondly the plants were grown in nurseries from local seed, which means survival rates are higher. Thirdly they followed the advice.

This advice was provided by Still Creek Landcare and the plants by a generous local donor.

Residents who have been part of this project have had motivations such as: boosting numbers of natives on their property; creating a wildlife corridor; providing shade in open areas for horses; have native shrubs and grasses thriving. Interested in doing the same, see contact details above.

Firefighters deployed to Queensland fires

ur Galston 1 fire truck was sent to Queensland on a five-day deployment in a strike team tasked to fight the fire on the Tingha Plateau near Glen Innes. The composite crew was made up of firefighters from Galston, Cherrybrook, Ku-ringgai, and Cowan bush fire brigades.

The strike team was diverted to the large fire at Wallangarra, on the NSW-QLD border. This fire has burnt over 43,800 hectares. The strike team also

comprising trucks from Hornsby, Ku-ring-gai, The Hills and Cumberland were tasked with contacting the southern flank of the fire, which extended from Jennings, through Boonoo Boonoo to Basket Swamp National Park. We back burned around isolated properties to protect them from predicted wind changes, as well as locking in the southern and western flank to prevent the fire spreading as well as protecting the town of Jennings.



Dwellings in a bushfire prone area

Are you about to build in a bushfire prone area? Or maybe you're unsure of the risks attached to your current property.

To find out if you're in bush fire prone land go to the RFS website www.rfs.nsw.gov.au and use the 'Bush Fire Prone Land' tool in the Plan and Prepare section.

If your property is bush fire prone you should consider reviewing your household insurance to check you are covered for the cost of complying with the necessary bush fire protection measures.

You should also look at upgrading the protection of your property for bush fire, especially if the dwelling has not been constructed with bush fire protection measures incorporated into its design.

Additionally, there are FIVE simple things you can do around your home to prepare it for a bush fire.





Trim overhanging trees and shrubs. This can stop the fire spreading to vour home.



2. MOW

Mow grass and remove the cuttings. Have a cleared area around your home.



3. REMOVE

Remove material that can burn around your home (e.g. Door mats. wood piles, mulch, leaves, paint, outdoor furniture).



4. CLEAR

Clear and remove all the debris and leaves from the gutters surrounding vour home. Burning embers can set your home on fire.



5. PREPARE

Prepare a sturdy hose or hoses that will reach all around your home. Make sure you've got a reliable source of water.

ARCADIA RURAL FIRE BRIGADE By Peta Gormly

e've been quiet on the article front, but behind the scenes Arcadia had never slowed down.

We were kept busy with the big storm cleanup effort through December. Arcadia had multiple crews assist SES in the local and West Pennant Hills area. The trees that were uprooted were humongous, as was the effort given by all agencies involved. We understood how frustrating it was for residents, as our station also suffered from the blackouts, but your understanding and patience throughout that time was appreciated. We were back on storm clean up duties in early February with a few more trees down in

Galston, that brief storm kept the district busy over the weekend.

After the January rain we were hit with scorching temperatures. Crews were out checking the local trails for any damage caused by the storms, to ensure we still had access. This occurred over the Christmas and New Year break. Thankfully we had very few incident calls over this time. During this time the brigade welcomed a new member to the station. Arcadia 1 Charlie, a third Cat 1 tanker. Crew members have also jumped into their training courses this year, starting with the Careflight MediSim Trauma Care workshop, which is designed to teach first responders how to assist in all types of incidents. It is a great course that provided realistic simulated scenarios for first responders to interact with each other in. This course saw members from NSW RFS, NSW SES, and St Johns Ambulance working together.

At the end of January crews from Arcadia, Galston and Cherrybrook were called to a bushfire down Sunnyridge Rd, Arcadia. It was hot work and extinguished quickly, thanks to fast acting crews, and the residents that alerted triple zero to it promptly. This fire was due to power lines arcing. Throughout this fire season we have been asking our community to continuously revise their fire plan to ensure it takes into account their changing families, animals, and environments.

We would like to remind everyone to check the Fire Danger Index in their area, respect TOBAN (Total Fire Ban) rules, and if you've got a pile to burn to then have the appropriate permits. In the Hornsby/ Ku-Ring-Gai district during fire season, 1 October - 31 March, residents are required to have 2 permits, from Hornsby Council and from the Rural Fire Service, which local brigades can issue these, however please go through the

Hornsby Fire Control Centre. The requirements are different in the Hills District, however, residents are still required a permit. If we receive a triple zero call, we will be visiting.

We've welcomed some new members to our brigade recently, and we're excited to have them on board. If you've ever considered joining your local Rural Fire Brigade you can contact us at enquiries@arcadiarfs. org.au there are roles for everyone.

Pile Burns

We are still in the Bush Fire Danger Period which means if you are planning to have a pile burn, you will need a permit. Fire Permits help ensure fire is used safely during the Bush Fire Danger Period. A permit imposes conditions on the way a fire is lit and maintained, and can only be issued by authorised Permit Issuing Officers.

The permit system ensures agencies like the NSW RFS know when and where landholders intend to burn, to ensure adequate and appropriate measures are in place, and so that fires remain under


