A FOND FAREWELL

It is with great sadness that we report the passing of Irene Rogers at the age of 95.

Irene was one of the original members of the Progress Association of Galston which was formed in 1967. She created the first local community newsletter called the Galston Gazette which was only 4-5 pages each month, keeping locals informed of what was happening in the community.

By 1971, with the formation of the Galston Chamber of Commerce, a new updated Chamber paper was produced called The Galston & District News, with Irene as its first editor and honorary member. Irene was instrumental in ensuring the success of the paper. She helped sell advertising, collected

and researched all the news stories.


Irene remained as Editor of the paper until 1979 when she handed over the reigns to Edith Robinson. Irene remained involved in the paper and many other local committees.

Irene realised the important local historical record that was created each month in the paper. She undertook a project with the Dural Historical Society to ensure copies of each edition was preserved for future generations to read what life was like during the years since 1971. Thanks to Irene all copies of the original Galston & District News right through to today's copies (under our current name) can be found at History Cottage.



A report penned by Irene, which was published in the June 1996 edition, can be read on page 38 of this edition. It recounts some fascinating stories of this area.









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






Our eagerly anticipated mid year Fashion Parade is being planned for June 22nd. Mark the date on your calendar, and watch out for more information in the June issue.



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
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4-DAY HIKE IN JINDABYNE

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JULIAN LEESER PAYS TRIBUTE TO SERVICEMEN AND WOMEN PAST AND PRESENT

HILLS DISTRICT RSL ANZAC DAY SERVICE — GALSTON CENOTAPH

ederal Member for Berowra, Julian Leeser MP, joined the Galston community to honour the sacrifice and service of the brave men and women who have served and are currently serving in our Armed Forces around the world.

"Today, we bear witness to the sacrifices of our community in defending our nation. We remember the brave sons and daughters of our community who have fought and died during conflicts over the last century, many who were taken long before their time. This year we mark the 80th anniversary of the commencement of World War Two.

"World War Two was unlike any war that Australia had experienced before. The Australian mainland came under direct attack for the first time, with Japanese aircraft bombing towns in

North-West Australia, and Japanese midst submarines attacking Sydney Harbour.

"Men and women everywhere were in uniform. Many were sent overseas on active service and the newspapers on a daily basis printed lists of casualties. There was no part of Australia unaffected

"The Berowra electorate itself became no stranger to the harsh reality of war.

"Blackouts were practised





throughout Berowra and brown-out shields were placed on all street lights, remaining on lights that could be seen from sea until the close of the war. The names were removed from railway stations so that they could not be used to help enemy navigation.

"There were air raid sirens in communities and defensive trenches were a feature of every school. Fears of the Japanese fire-bombing the local bushland led to the formation of the Hornsby Shire Volunteer Bush Fire Brigade and Hornsby Shire acted as a training ground for Australian troops.

"In 2019, the ranks of those who served and survived the Second World War are now thinning. So, we must take this opportunity, on ANZAC day,

to pause, and remember their legacy.

"They were our age, perhaps even younger. They helped shape our communities into the wonderful places they are in the present day.

"In a constantly changing world, it is more important than ever that we take these opportunities, however fleeting, to pause and reflect on the contributions of the past and to look ahead and find ways we each can contribute through our volunteer service efforts to making our nation stronger and enriching our Australian spirit," said Julian Leeser.

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MARJ GII

arj Gillis, one of the oldest and longest residents of Arcadia and Galston area passed away on 28 March 2019, aged 95. She came to live in Arcadia in 1933.

Joseph Gillis and Elsie Codling were married in Cambridge New Zealand on 9th December 1914. Joseph, who called himself 'a seedless raisin' found that he could not have children, so when Elsie's best friend, Bell Turner knew of a young girl of 19 that was having a baby, she arranged for Elsie and Joseph to adopt the baby and they named her Marjorie Shirley Gillis.

Miss Ruby Sarah Caroline Eastwell gave birth to Marjorie on 6 August 1923 at Frankton Junction, the main railway junction at Hamilton New Zealand. Marj never met or had contact with her birth mother who passed away in 1983.

When Marj was 10 years old the family moved from New Zealand to Australia, arriving on 20 April 1933. At first they lived at Grandfather Gillis' property at 37 Cobah Road Arcadia that consisted of 10 acres. There was the original slab constructed house and another little old house on the property. Several Gillis families lived there - Edward Moore Gillis, Edward & Anne Gillis family, Joseph, Elsie & Marj and some others. They heated water in a large round metal tub over the fire on Friday afternoon for their weekly bath. There was no electricity or running water. Once a week they would go to the creek behind their property and do the washing of their clothes in the creek that was about half a kilometer from the

After some time, Arthur Geelan moved one of the houses to an isolated spot near the end of Bloodwood Road, Arcadia for Joe, Elsie and Marj to live in. Here Joe grew passion fruit, pumpkins and other vegetables for a living.

Marj attended the local primary school at Arcadia for 2 years where she completed her formal education. Her father Joseph and his brothers and sisters had been a founding members of the Arcadia primary School in 1898

Marj learnt to play the piano and organ and studied at the Sydney Conservatorium Of Music, gaining her A mus A. This allowed her to teach music in the local community. She became the organist at the Arcadia Adventist Church when she was a teenager, pushing the pedals and tickling the ivories on the old pedal organ and then later

the electronic organ, for 66 years until she was 80

Ronald Gillis took a liking to his adopted first cousin and would often ride his pushbike along the sandy bush track from his home in Peebles Road Arcadia to visit Marj. The moonlit nights must have got the better of them, as they were married in the Arcadia Adventist Church on 5 January 1944.

About this time Joe purchased a 5 acre property and they moved the little house again from Bloodwood Road to the new property at 17 Cobah Road where they lived for the rest of their lives. Ron and Marj purchased the adjoining rear 5 acre property, built a shed and lived in that for a while. Then with the help again of Arthur Geelan they built a two bedroom fibro house and filled it with all the modern conveniences such as a cold water tap that supplied water from the tank, a wood fuel stove, a chip heater to warm water for the bath, a copper to boil water in to wash the clothes, a scrubbing board to help get the dirt out of the clothes, twin concrete laundry tubs and a wringer to get most of the water out of the clothes, and a bucket dunney about 25 metres away from the house. Here they established a poultry farm with sheds constructed with bush poles and flattened 44 gallon tar drums and an orchard. They had Sam, the draft horse, to cultivate the ground. Marj worked with Ron on the farm when she could and played some social tennis.

Eighteen months after their marriage, a baby girl appeared and they named her Lornabelle and





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then another 18 months later a son, Glenn.

Looking after the two children and her invalid mother took much of Marj's time, but she still had a large vegetable garden, worked on the farm and had an egg run, delivering eggs to all the shops in

When Lornabelle and Glenn had grown up, Marj took a real job and worked at 'The San' as receptionist in the Nurses Residence, where she brought home a pay packet for the first time in her life


Being brought up in hard times and living through the great economic depression gave Marj a hard work ethic. Even in retirement she took in ironing and usually had 8-12 families that brought their clothes to her to be ironed. This gave her good contact with people and she continued to iron for them until she broke her hip at 88.

Marj was a resident in the Arcadia and Galston district for almost 80 of her 95 years and it is unlikely that there is anyone living that has been part of this community for this long. This was home for her and where she loved to be.

She was always happy and positive, often set in her ways, particularly when older. She was contented with the simple things in life and her faith in God

She outlived all the friends and relatives of her generation and was blessed with health and a long life of 95 and a half years

Thank you to all who have been part of Marj's life and been called her friend.

ur Open day on ANZAC Day, Wednesday, 25th April, will be behind us when you read this. We are of course looking forward to a successful day, with plenty of traditional home made ANZAC biscuits consumed. As I write this, repairs to our McDonald diesel roller have been completed successfully, and the old girl is back in operation after 10 months of layup. It will be started on the day.

Netherby Homestead will be closed for some time after ANZAC Day to enable the pressed metal ceilings to be replaced. The old steel ceilings have suffered the ravages of time and


have rusted through in places and become unsightly. Council has organised period patterned replacements, in aluminium, which should have a long service life, not that 117 years was too bad for the old ones. It will be guite a disruption, with all the contents having to be moved to storage.

One of our displays that has not been demonstrated for a number of years is the horse-works driven chaff cutter. Having no horse, we use a self-steering small Kubota tractor it its place. For the chaff cutter, we need a supply of oaten hay, so we have just ploughed a small plot of ground to sow some oats, which we will later cut and store for demonstrating chaff cutting (rabbits permitting!).

An exciting new project is being planned – the restoration of an International Model K truck of 1918. The vehicle was recently donated by one of the district's pioneering families, and we have obtained another donor chassis to provide some missing items. There is much information gathering under way before we actually start real work. It will take a couple of years at least, and is likely to present some real challenges. These are unique trucks, known as coal-scuttle style, with the radiator behind rather than in front of the engine. I hope this is not being too technical for readers, but it is what makes them such unusual and iconic vehicles. The photo illustrates the style.

The Friends of Fagan Park maintain the artefacts on display in the museums, and are continuously restoring worthwhile objects of local significance. There are always new projects being undertaken, and we welcome enquiries from anyone interested in joining our group. A reminder that the museums are open every Tuesday, and on the second Sunday of each month (afternoon only).



DURAL LIBRARY TO CLOSE

ural Library is an important social and educational hub, where residents can learn, grow and continue to feel inspired. That is why The Hills Shire Council is undertaking renovations to ensure it



meets the current and future needs of the community.

On completion, the renovated library will have updated spaces for reading and learning, with new carpets, shelving and a paint lift, as well as contemporary blinds and ergonomic furniture.

The library renovation has been made possible thanks to a \$93,000 grant from the NSW Government and The Library Council of NSW. Council also made a \$160,000 investment into the much-loved community facility.

During renovations, Dural Library will be closed from Monday 29th April and will reopen on Tuesday 11th June. Library members will be able to borrow items from the Pop-up Library, which is temporarily operating out of The Dural Recreation Centre - located next door to Dural Library.

want information, that's fine. If people want a photograph for FaceBook, that's fine. If people just want a relaxing day out, that's also fine."



oalas had a wonderful home in the Forests of Maroota and Glenorie before the great and terrible fire in 2002. For a long time, they were not seen or heard but in the recent years there have been reports that Koalas are back. A mother Koala with two babies was seen at Forest Glen and there have been reports of sightings from other parts of the Forest.

This is such exciting news that Western Sydney University is working with the Cattai Hills Environment Network (CHEN) on finding evidence of the re-establishment of the Koala Colony in the area. The first stage of this project involves collecting evidence that the Koala population has re-established in the areas surrounding Maroota Forest. The project will begin with setting up of sound recorders and wildlife cameras at locations where Koalas have recently been heard or seen. Looking for Koala scats

and scratches will also be part of the project. The University will be seeking help from community members to report any sightings of Koalas, their scats or if you hear their bellowing to the Project Lead, Dr Michelle Ryan, via email to m.ryan@ westernsydney.edu.au



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

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
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WARRAH'S 50TH GARDEN PARTY CELEBRATION

Meanwhile, dark clouds roll in and the threatening odour of foreboding rain stings my nostrils. My fear rises with the humidity. The boat's beaten body takes in each drop of rain while screaming in agony. Its frail hull groaning against the harshness of the tide. As the rain keeps falling, the grass turns olive-green and the flowers droop in sadness as tears roll off their petals. The crabs scuttle furiously in the rain, trying to lodge themselves under the shells in a vain attempt to find protection from the deadly enormous rain drops. While the unmoveable shells try their best to escape, screeching like owls, as the barrage of rain drowns them. I flee for cover in the boat's hull.



I clamber up the side of a colossal dune, barely able to stand on my two feet as the sand dissolves beneath them like fiery, sluggish, agonising molten lava. It was a great event and it was a delight to see so many local residents there to mark the occasion. It is an example of urban design at its best. Much of the work was funded by developer contributions, helping us get the balance right between the need for housing and the need for public amenity. Many of the people I spoke to came from the neighbouring apartment blocks and were thrilled to now have such a great backyard for their children to play in.

One of the best features of the new playground is its inclusive design, catering for a broad range of ages and abilities. The fact the playground is both shaded and fenced was greatly appreciated by the parents I spoke to, while everybody was pleased by the adjacent café. Environmental factors were also a prime consideration in the work carried out and we will be happy to count the 150 new trees towards the 25,000 we have committed to planting during this term of Council. By far the standout, though, were the murals painted by the Studio Artes members, many of whom were there. I was pleased to be able to pass on the community's gratitude for their excellent work.






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NEW WHEELS FOR ROWLAND



A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE By Irene Rogers **GALSTON AND DISTRICT NEWS**

In 1971 the newly-formed Galston Chamber of Commerce decided to publish a monthly paper. The Chamber asked me to take on the job. It was not easy as I had no experience in this field, but I received lots of help and advice from the late Ron Stettler who at that time published the Parramatta and Hills News at his printing works at Conie Avenue, Baulkham Hills.

Ron took on the printing of the paper and right up until this day, Ron Stettler Printing (now run by Ron's children) still prints the paper.

I had the task of creating an interest in the paper, canvassing for adverts and attending meetings to write copy. None of this was easy as there were few shops and businesses in the area at that time, but I did have the advantage of prior knowledge of council activities. Each month I had to think of a subject to write an editorial

A Paper Committee was formed and we met each month to discuss the paper before going to press. Committee members were Irene Rogers, Barry Allen, Jack Diacopoulos and Bill Hayes and any other Chamber of Commerce member who cared to attend. In 1973 Edith Robertson became a valued regular attendant at these meetings.

In 1971 the only shops in Galston were the ones fronting Galston Road. The other shops were opened in April,

Rogers Councillor allocation of \$1,000 to renovate the Cenotaph in Galston.

\$30,000 to be spent improvements to Galston Park.

\$176,000 allocated to the South Dural Pumping Station to improve the water supply to the Dural elevated reservoir for the outlying areas of Galston and Arcadia.

(It is doubtful if anyone living in the abovementioned areas noticed any improvement).

HIGH SCHOOL

Councillor Rogers had been agitating for a high school in the area since 1968. At a council meeting, he pointed out the worst scenario of the youth of the area being lost with an accident in Galston

(Local children in the main travelled by bus to Asquith Boys' and Girls' High

In 1971 an opportunity arose to speak to the Education Minister, Roden Cutler, face-to-face. His comment: "Find a suitable site and I'll give the matter serious consideration."

With the support of Hornsby Council, the site was found. The Galston site was approved, acquired by the Department and promptly gazetted. All that was needed was the allocation of funds and the start of stage one.

Unfortunately, delay experienced because Dural residents proceeded to lobby the Department for a high school in Dural. The reason? Because it would be a more central position (near the cemetery in Derriwong

The Minister for Education, Roden Cutler, stated in September, 1971: "Delays and increased costs and having regard to serious site difficulties at Dural and the fact that the Department had already acquired a suitable site at Galston. Therefore, approval has been given for the construction of a new high school at Galston which would allow tenders to be called in 1972, with stage one being ready by 1973.

"During the period from 1972 to the completion of stage one, students would be 'housed' at Baulkham Hills High School, with buses available to transport the children to Baulkham Hills."

A Parents and Citizens' Association had already been formed and the Galston High School uniform chose, which the children would wear to Baulkham Hills High School.

P. & C. members were: President, Ken Seale, of Dural: Vice-Presidents, Trevor Carter and Lyn Lawrence; Secretary, Alan Cadman; Treasurer, Phil Fullagar; Patrons, Bernie Deane, M.L.A., Hawkesbury and Councillor Charles Rogers.

WADDELL COTTAGE

Ken Seale called an emergency meeting when the clearing of the high school site began. To protect Jim Waddell's old cottage, he negotiated with the Education Department to stop the excavators demolishing the building.

An agreement was made that the P. & C. Association would restore the building and the Education Depart ment take over the responsibility of ownership and maintenance.

A fund-raising committee was formed:

Betty Archdale - Galston; Irene Rogers - Galston; Neville Brown - Dural.

\$3,000 was raised and with the help of voluntary workers, plus valuable help from Jack Blinkhorn, of Dural and a talented stonemason (whose name. sadly, escapes me) from Wise-mans Ferry, the work was completed. It was decided not to interfere with the gardens around the cottage as Alan Cadman said some of the old fruit trees were of a variety no longer grown.

Councillor Rogers arranged the removal of the old horse drinking trough from the nature strip outside St. Jude's Church in Galston Road and placed in the grounds of Waddell Cottage.

On completion of the restoration a dinner was arranged in honour of all the people involved. It was held in the cottage, with school pupils dressed in period costume waiting on the guests. The cottage had been furnished with suitable period items and memorabilia donated by local residents.

The menu was typical of the period,

including "Cockie's Joy" (Damper and Syrup). It was a nice touch, all arranged by history teacher, Tom Richmond, who had taken a very keen interest in the local

GALSTON AIRPORT

Who can forget August 29, 1973, when the Labor Party announced in Canberra that the new airport would be located at Galston?

Everyone went into shock at the stupidity of such a proposal. Not only would our pristine area be destroyed, but logistically be unsuitable.

The Galston News sprang into action, doubling the copies of the paper and saturating the area.

On September 5 a protest meeting was held in Galston Park. The turnout of protesters was amazing. Police had to be called in to control the traffic. They estimated that the turnout was between eight and ten thousand people. The protest made headlines on National TV and newspapers. No longer could people say: "Galston ... where's that?"

Another project that was abandoned through the use of people power was an application to build a mausoleum on a site on Old Northern Road, Glenorie.

Over the years a small group of people have given freely of their time to make the paper a success.

In August, 1978, the Chamber of Commerce won the coveted W.H. Matthew Award (under 50 member ¬ship). which is an award given each year for the most active and progressive chamber in the State.

The fact that such a small area could publish a monthly paper so successfully impressed the judges.

The Galston Chamber of Commerce, through their publication, the Galston and District News, has made an important contribution by keeping locals in touch for 25 years.

Advertisers have been benefitted on a considerable scale, some making continuous use of this medium from the first publication in June, 1971.

Let us hope for another 25 years of service to the readers of the district.

National Park and Wildlife Service

Wild Dog/Fox 1080 Baiting Program

The NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) will be undertaking a 1080 ground baiting program for wild dog and fox control in NPWS reserves commencing in May 2019:

1080 Baiting will be conducted in Yengo National Park and Parr State Conservation Area between 30 April 2019 and 30 October 2019.

Domestic pets are not permitted in National Parks or Reserves. Neighbours and park users are reminded that 1080 are lethal to domestic pets. All areas will have 1080 baiting signs erected at access points to where baiting is being undertaken. In the event of accidental poisoning seek immediate veterinary assistance.

We suggest that working dogs be restrained to ensure that they do not enter the baiting locations during poisoning operations. Alternatively, muzzle dogs if they are required to work near baiting locations during and after the 1080 baiting program.

COURAGE AMIDST CRITICISM

ver the last few months we have been looking at Mary's act of devotion to Jesus and the lessons we can learn from her example. It was

a beautiful, thoughtful and generous deed, yet just

about everybody who witnessed it was critical of what she had done. The disciples, particularly Judas, expressed their disapproval, and all the other guests joined in the chorus of condemnation: "What a waste of money!" But Jesus defended Mary and what she had done: "Leave her alone. Why are you bothering her? She has done a beautiful thing to me." (Mark 14:8) This brings us to the third lesson we can learn from Mary's deed: she did what she could despite


It is easy to criticise, and some people are particularly skilful at doing it. We can be sure that no matter how noble our deeds and how genuine our motives, there will always be people who will find fault. It has been said that to escape criticism we must do nothing, say nothing and be nothing. But that is not how God wants us to live. He wants us to try things and live life to the full. As the wise man puts it in Ecclesiastes 9:10: "Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with all your might". But doing what we can will almost certainly attract criticism.

The 18th century British literary figure Samuel Johnson was one of the greatest thinkers and writers of his times. However, he was continually dogged by a woman who always found fault with his work. After the publication of one of his greatest works, an English dictionary, she displayed her usual behaviour by criticising his work. On their first meeting after the publication of his dictionary, she said to him, "Dr. Johnson, I see that you included some rude words in your dictionary." To which he responded, "Yes, Madam, and I can see that you have been looking them up!"

Some people are like that. They are experts at complaining; they are skilled at finding fault. Such attitudes can stifle initiative and make people think twice about doing something. Some of the people who attacked Mary for what she did were like that, but the response of Jesus to their criticisms was that she had done what she could. Mary did what she could despite criticism.

Doing what we can is not easy. It requires commitment, wisdom, sensitivity to people and their circumstances, and sometimes guite a bit of courage. But doing what we can has the potential to make a tremendous impact on the lives of our families and our friends and upon the communities in which we live. Let us draw courage from Mary's simple yet inspiring example and do what we can.

I love being a part of a community and being able to meet people, spending time with them and helping as much as I'm able. It's an honour to be a minister in Galston and to participate in all of the variety of the Church's life.

Given my history in youth and children's work, I particularly enjoy our kids programs as well as the brilliant work done by Dani and the team in our Early Learning Centre.

The biggest challenge is always trying to fit everything in!

How is the message of Christ relevant to people in our day?

Love is always relevant to us all and I've always believed that Christ's message is love. Sometimes we forget that, but I hope that I remind people of the simple refrain, that "God is love".

THEN CAME SUNDAY

hree remarkable illustrations of the initial attitudes towards Christ's resurrection are found in the Gospel of John 20: 1-10, these verses — all connected with our English verb `to see'. Under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, John chose his words carefully. Even today men and women still cannot accept the resurrection or cannot understand how it happened. But those who put their faith and trust in Christ have no doubt, He is alive!

Mary seems to have been the first at the tomb, as she may have been the last at the cross. She came very early on the Sunday morning and in one glance took in the fact that the stone was rolled away. We are told she `saw that the stone had been removed'. The Greek word used here means a 'casual glance'. In the same way we might say: `I saw him but didn't see who he was with'. She took one look but did not stay to work out what had really happened.

John was the next one to reach the tomb (v,5). He looked in — with the same kind of casual glance Mary had given. Then Peter arrived, went into the tomb and stood there puzzled. He 'theorised'. The grave clothes were there but the body had gone. What had happened? It was almost as if the body had evaporated! He could not account for the empty tomb.

Now John went right into the tomb and 'he saw and believed'. The word used is the one from which we get our word 'horoscope' — to understand what you are seeing. John saw what the others had seen, but he saw the significance of it all. Was he the first person to believe in the resurrection? V.9 tells us that they still did not see it all clearly but they were on the road to believe in the risen Christ.

What a difference it must have made to the two men as they walked back to the city to tell their fellow disciples. We know what Christ's resurrection means to us today. He is present with us. He is interceding for us. He has sent the Holy Spirit to make real to us all that he, Christ, has made possible. Praise God to-day for Christ's resurrection.

2 Timothy 4:3 captures the essence of this thinking: For the time will come when people will not put up with sound doctrine. Instead, to suit their own desires, they will gather around them a great number of teachers to say what their itching ears want to hear.

Rather than confront the truth and recognise our desperate need and yearning for a relationship with our Creator; we veil this inner desire with well crafted words, rituals and routines forming our own version of religion, to suit our own

Each persons spirituality is aligned to their own desires, its foundations built on the latest fad or trend, guru or spiritual mentor.

Please don't misunderstand, Christianity suffers from the intrusion of this as well. Plenty of gurus or spiritual mentors offering the five keys to revival or prosperity!

Alas, I think what has been lost is relationship. A deep, personal, intimate relationship with our Creator. Who is the same from the beginning, to the present and through to the future.

Christianity is not outdated! Some churches might be. Some practices. But the Word is infallible, and so is the life, death and

resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Foundations are important for when the storms come (and they will) how will they fare? Can they stand the torrent of financial hardship? Relationship issues? Health scares?

Will they answer the deeper questions of purpose? Morality? Destiny? Meaning?

"I am the way, the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me". (John 14:6)

I challenge you to explore this bold claim, don't let go until you have made a clear, educated, informed decision - for it has eternal consequences.



ETERNITY

any of us remember the word'Eternity' when it was emblazoned in near perfect copperplate script on our Sydney Harbour Bridge at the close of the new millennium fireworks display - New Years Eve-heralding the year 2000.

This word - 'Eternity' - had been written on footpaths and walls all over Sydney more than 500 000 times in yellow waterproof crayon- by Arthur Stace. - over a 35 year period, from 1932

Arthur Stace was born in Balmain in 1885. He had a neglected childhood and a hopeless adolescence. By the age

of 14 he was an alcoholic and was in and out of gaol from the age of 15.

In World War 1 Arthur signed up to the 19th battalion as a drummer and stretcher bearer, but was sent home when a gas shell blast left him half blind. His life spiralled down till he said, "Every sixpenny handout went for another bottle of metho."

Outside the police station one day, a group was walking along Broadway when one of them said to Arthur,

"Come on.There's a cuppa tea and something to eat at the church hall." Arthur said that he wanted the power to change his life. He was 'saved' on that day- in other words, he

found out about God's love for him; he asked God for forgiveness for his sins in Jesus' Name and became a Christian.

A couple of months later he heard an evangelist, Rev. John Ridley say, "O that I could go out into the streets of Sydney and say to the people - Eternity, Eternity, Eternity". Arthur said that was a lightbulb moment for him and he began writing the word everywhere he could - but - the

amazing thing was that he could only write the word 'Eternity' in that beautiful copperplate script. He was illiterate and every other word he wrote was almost unreadable!!!

God was certainly working in his life through this single word and over the years, this same word has spoken to many hundreds of Sydney siders as well as to people all over the world.

A couple of quotes that I read recently made me think about the eternal future each one of us must face.

The first one: "We don't change God's message; His message changes us." That was the experience of Arthur Stace.

The second quote:

"Life is short;

Death is sure;

Sin is the cause:

Christ is the cure"

The bible says that "eternity is set in the heart of man."

NOW is the time for each of us to invest in eternity - through a relationship with Jesus Christ, God's Son."

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STILL CREEK LANDCARE **PLANTING NATIVE PLANTS IN AUTUMN**

lanting native plants on your property is rewarding and can be a lot of fun, particularly when done with friends or family.

In this area, autumn is generally the best time, as it gives the plant time to establish itself before the next summer. As we had recent rains, now is a great time to get started!

For great success and good environmental outcomes, choose locally native plants grown from local seed. These plants are best adapted to your soils, climate and aspect and much appreciated by the local wildlife.

Choose plants for your soil type, rather than import soils to suit the chosen plants and keep in mind, that plants needing full sun, rarely survive in shade.

Prepare your planting site by removing weeds. The use of mulches and groundcovers will help to reduce weeds in future and will keep the soil moist, cool and friable.

Most native plants will grow well without extra fertilisers, and high phosphate fertilisers or fresh manures can be harmful to them.

A well prepared planting hole with rim of soil to collect water when hand watering, will make follow up watering easier and more successful.

Surrounding the newly planted tree or shrub with a frost bag, can protect the young plants from frost, dry hot winds, rabbits, unintended wiper sniper, mower, and herbicide damage. In areas with wallabies, Kangeroos or deer, more substantial fencing is usually required.

As a tip, a light pruning of shrubs and groundcovers promotes compact growth and more flowers.

Still Creek Landcare has been running a free native plants programme for landowners who have cleared weeds, or want to plant a wildlife corridor, or join up bits of separated bush or simply add more habitat.

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

In April we had the opportunity to speak to

he 1st of April saw the end of the Bush Fire Danger period, after a long fire season for many parts of Australia. Due to the dry conditions, the season started a month early for Sydney. We had crews deployed to a number of fires, including interstate deployment in Queensland. Now that we have entered into those cooler months, it is just as important to continue with the same vigilance our community so excellently displayed throughout summer. The NSW Rural Fire Service reported that firefighters responded to over 10,517 bush and grass fires. Remember, there are still rules and quidelines residents must follow whilst planning and conducting any pile burns. If we receive a triple zero (000) call, we will be visiting! You can find your pile burn guidelines on your council's website.

Arcadia and Galston were called to another incident of powerlines down due to fallen branches towards the end of March. A small portion of Bayfield Rd was closed for a short period of time whilst the energy authority promptly attended the incident. Whenever you come across any powerlines down, please treat them as live. This means to stay away from them,

145 year 5 students from Waverly College at Vision Valley. This is a presentation we thoroughly enjoy giving. The students had a number of engaging questions in regards to fire behaviour, our role within the community, and our operational readiness. Our area is unique in comparison to where they reside, so the fire risks they may potentially experience can be very different to what the risks are in Arcadia. Members also attended the Empire Marina exercise held at Bobbin Head. It was a multiple emergency agency training exercise that saw NSW RFS, FRNSW, Police, and Ambulance participate in a scenario where fire spread from buildings to boats. More than 100 personnel were involved in the mock fire exercise.

April also saw the end of day light savings and with that we tell everyone to check their smoke detector. Have you checked your smoke detector and changed the batteries? It is important to be prepared for a house fire as it is to be prepared for a bush fire! Make sure you and your family know safe ways out of every room. It is helpful to also have a written escape plan that is revised continuously as your family grows and changes. It is vital to keep clothing at least 1 metre from heaters and fireplaces, and never leave unattended. If you have a fire place, ensure the

chimney is clean. Smoke will make you confused, and you cannot smell smoke whilst asleep! Crews responded to an electrical fire involving solar panels in mid April, it is vital for home owners to have these, and other battery systems

maintained and checked. For more home fire safety information refer to the NSW RFS website and the Fire ϑ Rescue website.

Hazard reduction preparations are still ongoing in the area. If you see us out and about, be sure to say g'day! If you've ever considered joining you can send us an email at enquiries@ arcadiarfs.org.au you'll have a great time, and be a part of a community centred team!

PILE BURNS

Being out of the Fire Season residents are permitted to carry out Pile Burns on their property without a Fire Safety Permit. If you are in Hornsby Council you will still need an approval to burn certificate which you can apply for online at the Hornsby Council Website. There are a number of rules around carrying out a Pile Burn and the rules differ between The Hills Shire Council and Hornsby Council. You can find the rules on the respective council website. If you are planning on carrying out a Pile Burn you

must give immediate neighbours and all other residents that could be affected by smoke or see the fire at least 24 hours' notice. You must also give your local fire control centre (Hornsby - 02 9883 2000, Hills - 02 9654 1244) at least 24 hours' notice. If you are in the Glenorie area and would like assistance with burning a pile you can contact us via the details below.

FIRE PLACE SAFETY

Now that the Fire Season is over and the cooler nights have settled in we remind everyone that has a Fire Place to get it checked and cleaned.

House Fires are often started due to a blocked or damaged chimney. Whilst checking the checking the chimney, we encourage you to make sure all smoke alarms are working also.

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


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

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AN ARCHITECTS WORTH

Ask the architect how they might approach your project and what kind of timeline they need for design, getting permits and construction. Be clear about how much involvement you




want from them. Do you want them to manage the contractors or just supply the plans?
