ocal year 10 Galston High School student, Tahlia Grace, is studying Agriculture. She had heard about the drought and the strife some farming families were in and she wanted to



do something to help. With support from her mum, Simone from Chicken Fish Takeaway in Glenorie, she started putting together some plans as to what she could do. Following some research on the best area to target, she made contact with the CWA at Marthaguy, a farming area about 70kms from Warren (2hrs out of Dubbo). With a list of what was needed, she set about putting up some posts on facebook, and Simone helped by putting donation tins in the shop.

Offers started to flood in quickly. Locals donated hay, dog and animal feed, toiletries, 5 litre water boxes, plus money donations. In fact in just 10 days they raised over \$12,000 in goods and money donations. It was an amazing response from our very generous community.

With help from another local family, the Marsdens, they loaded everything into two trucks and headed out. At Warren (the closest town) they stopped to buy petrol vouchers, IGA food vouchers and meat vouchers from the butcher for the local families. Monthly on a Sunday, all the local families attend church, and their visit coincided with the Church service, so here they

gave out the vouchers, and also drove back to some of the farms to drop off the hay and animal feed.

On their journey they saw empty dams, dusty paddocks and very thin, scrawny animals and families that were really doing it tough.

So on their return, they have set up a charity 'Our Plate to their Paddock'. Please follow them on facebook. A 'Go Fundme' page is also planned. Donations can be made either by dropping into Chicken Fish Takeaway in Glenorie, following them on facebook or donating directly to the Charity's account at Bendigo Bank Galston BSB 062313 acc 10189855. Other donations of hay, animal feed and animal milk powder would also be appreciated.

They plan another trip before Christmas. Well done Tahlia. Great work.







Written submissions on any aspect of the Financial Reports or Auditor's Reports must be received at Council by 20 November 2019 and will be referred to the Auditor.





from The Ponds was issued a Field Court Attendance Notice and will appear at court later in the month.

Another couple of Trucks got stuck in Galston Gorge this month and the last one was given a \$2,306 fine and 3 months rego suspension. This truck caused significant damage to a guard rail and retaining blocks.

An empty property in Harrison Lane, Glenorie, was broken into with vandals causing about \$1000 in damage. Sometime between 11am on Wednesday, September 4, and 2pm Wednesday on September 18, someone gained entry to the property and ransacked the premises, stealing six tap faucets and stripping copper pipes from the bedroom, kitchen and laundry. The victim had only recently purchased the property and was planning to demolish it and build a new home in its place.

Police were called to Cattai Ridge Rd in the early hours of the morning (late September) after calls from witnesses who saw a white Nissan rip an electrical substation from the ground. A Hills Police spokesman said the incident caused a large explosion, which woke several neighbours. "Police were making their way to the scene when the white ute passed officers in the other direction, still dragging the sparking electrical substation down the street." "Police engaged in a pursuit, which went through several back roads in Glenorie ending in a dirt road." The spokesman said the officer lost the ute during the chase but the Nissan and substation were found alight in an Arcadia nursery.

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

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

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he special thing about dining at Bivianos Dural is the excellent taste of the meals which match the team that creates them. As Christmas, the New Year and summer

holidays approach, new tastes and food as art are topics on the mind of head chef, San, at Bivianos.

With a wealth of experience, he is often creating new recipes as different iconic days pass throughout the year. As Bivianos use seasonal vegetables and produces, he enjoys applying fresh ideas to the menu.

The Bivianos team source products from top quality local produce suppliers and farmers markets as well as from around Australia.

"Ideas usually come from flavours that make me imagine other meals that

somehow spin off from what I'm cooking at the moment," he said.

Every month the kitchen staff conduct an itinerary of the food and research local produce suppliers and other areas that supply the products they're looking for.

"It's deeply satisfying, producing traditional cooking tastes with so many different ingredients that we fall in love with over again because of how they can be refined on the plate," he said.

He strives to produce top quality meals that reflect the products he uses including back angus tenderloins and lamb backstraps, the latter which is hailed as being among the tastiest parts of the lamb: the eye of the loin.

"That's the part of the lamb that has a bit of fat, it doesn't leave the meat dry. It's very juicy. If it's slowly cooked it won't be left dry, tasting great and very juicy."

The chefs make their own seasoning and marinades.

Two examples of their new creations are from this year's Melbourne Cup menu.

I had a herb-crusted rack of lamb and enjoyed the softness of the pea mash and the beetroot puree.

The chocolate brownie on vanilla anglaise was delicious.

HORNSBY LEISURE POOL CLOSED FOR REPAIR


"However, safety must always be our absolute top priority and we need to fix this without delay. "We are currently investigating what work will be required and how long it will take. "We guarantee we are moving as quickly as possible to get the pool re-opened."

Hornsby Shire Council have partnered with the National Desexing Network to offer a subsidised cat desexing program.

Eligible residents will be able to have their cats desexed significantly cheaper than would otherwise be available.

"There are many benefits to cat desexing, which go beyond the obvious importance of controlling feral cat numbers," Hornsby Shire Mayor Philip Ruddock said.

"Desexed pets generally live longer and healthier lives, thanks in part to the reduced risk of cancer and other diseases

"The ideal time for desexing is between two and four months, before they can get pregnant."

The fee is \$55 for male cats and \$65 for female cats.

Clearways proposed for

NEW LINE ROAD AND BOUNDARY ROAD

otorists will be able to enjoy a smoother journey along New Line Road and Boundary Road with clearways proposed for the busy section of road between Dural and Pennant Hills.

Member for Hornsby Matt Kean MP said new clearways are proposed to improve traffic flow and reduce delays for motorists who travel along the key corridor. These proposed changes are going to ensure all lanes are available to traffic during clearway hours which help reduce congestion.

Mr Kean said clearways are already in place along Pennant Hills Road and Castle Hill Road to help ensure reliable traffic flow along the busy corridors.

We are also proposing to introduce some new No Stopping restrictions to operate along sections of Boundary Road and New Line Roads, mainly at intersections, to improve safety." The new clearways would operate in both directions from 6am to 7pm on weekdays and from 9am to 6pm on weekends and public holidays. Transport for NSW has investigated business parking along New Line Road and Boundary Road and observed customer parking is available within business premises. There is also parking available in side streets near community facilities.

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



he past month has seen us busy planting our summer crops into the soil here at Warrah Biodynamic Farm tomatoes, zucchini, cucumbers and eggplants, among others. Everyone has been enjoying the lovely spring weather and customers of our Farm Shop have been eagerly purchasing seedlings for their veggie patches, along with their regular organic produce and grocery shopping.

Biodynamic farmers view the farm as a living entity in its own right. Healthy soil is teaming with microorganisms. So rather than applying artificial chemical fertilisers to the soil, we endeavour to truly enliven the soil with the application of natural fertilisers and biodynamic preparations. In addition to a focus on the earth, we also optimise the potential for growth by paying heed to the natural rhythms of the cosmos. Everyone has probably heard experienced veggie gardeners talk about growing according to the phases of the moon. Below is an adapted extract from Grasping the Nettle written by Peter Proctor, which explains this concept from the biodynamic farming and gardening perspective:

"We see the moon moving in an arc from east to west. When we see these arcs getting higher every day, the moon is ascending and when we see them getting lower every day the moon is descending. So as the moon takes 27.3 days to complete this cycle, each ascending and descending period lasts about two weeks. [During an ascending period] growth forces and saps flow upwards more strongly and fill the plant with vitality." Seed germination is also part of this upward striving, and so this is a good time to sow. During the descending period the earth "draws growth forces back down below the soil surface. The lower parts of the plants, especially the roots, are activated." This is a good time for composting, applying biodynamic 500 cow horn preparation and for transplanting seedlings.

If you have not done this before. why not experiment with managing your plantings in your own veggie patch on the basis of these cycles and track the results? Warrah Farm Shop sells a large range of organic seeds and also regularly has veggie and herb seedlings available for purchase.



MY HEARING'S ALREADY CACTUS, SO WHAT'S THE POINT?

19 November is International Men's Day. So we've been talking to men about the health of their hearing. THOMAS AND MARY **BEST'S BICENTENARY IN MIDDLE DURAL**

celebration of the bicentennial of settlement at Middle Dural by Thomas Best, his wife Mary Becket Best and little daughter Esther, was held at Glenroy Cottage, Middle Dural, during History Week, on Sunday 8 September.

Around 80 Bests attended, from interstate and country NSW, as well as those sending their best wishes from the UK. Most were relations of Thomas Samuel, the eldest son of Thomas, however we also welcomed representatives of Thomas' siblings Peter (Gunning), and Robert Holt (Wagga Wagga) and Sarah Best Hancock. Mayor Dr Michelle Byrne, Pam Wilson from the Hills District Historical Society and Michael Bell President of the Dural and Districts Historical Society were special quests.

Liz Pellinkhof welcomed us to Glenroy Cottage, named in memory of the original house of James Frederick (Glenroy) on the corner of Cranstons Rd and Old Northern Rd which burnt down in mysterious circumstances following its sale (after the death of the last family member, Roy Spencer Best).

Michael Bell spoke of the joys and difficulties of defending and maintaining heritage buildings in the Hills District; nearby photographic displays of the last remaining Best houses, St Elmo and Springhill, on the Old Northern Rd ridge (between Cranston's rd. and Middle Dural Rds) illustrated his point.

Jo Hambrett spoke on the recent restoration of three of the Best graves in St Jude's cemetery.

Sisters, Shirley Best Clark and Barbara Best Churchill, daughters of Fred and Ness Best sponsored the restoration project. Thomas Best and his brother John rest in Gunning Church of England cemetery in a family vault.

Rod Best, a family historian on the Best Family gave a very colourful and highly entertaining talk on the changing of social attitudes in the years between convicts George and Martha and the future generations.

The formalities ended and the Best clan was free to enjoy the displays and partake of afternoon tea. The generosity of the descendants of Thomas Samuel was staggering - displays of a sword gifted to Thomas Samuel by the Governor and a branding iron, wonderful photographs, a

suitcase of letters and a family Bible to mention a few.

Dr Byrne, Mayor of Hills Shire Council reflected on the celebrations "We are fortunate in the Hills to have a rich history full of amazing people who have contributed to making the Hills what it is today.

"It was wonderful to be part of the 200 years celebrations of the Best Family Dural and to learn more about our wonderful history right here in the Hills. It was incredible to see the cottage and the barn and to meet family members who gave me a real insight into what life would have been like in Dural 200 years ago!"

"It is important that we remember and celebrate our history and ensure future generations have an appreciation of where we have come from as a community and the people who have shaped our community over the past couple of hundred years"

To hold such a significant event in the home built by Fred (great grandson of Thomas), and Ness Best, now owned by Liz and Eric Pellinkhof, added an extra meaningful dimension to the significance of Middle Dural's first settlers.

CASTLE HILL CRIME WAVE

Over 3 days our staff were subjected to a wide range of frauds resulting in the theft of \$140,000 worth of tradesmen's high-pressure drain cleaning equipment.

The first case was a simple credit card fraud when a stolen card was used to purchase a \$15,000 item which was then picked up from Gladstone Road by courier.

The second item only 2 days later was carried out using fake order numbers from a major Australian public company. The order forms appeared to be okay but again, \$110,000 of goods were picked up in two separate incidents by couriers.

Castle Hill Police have been on the case for over one month and the incidents have been widely publicised by Australian Pumps Industries who were the victims of the theft. Numerous leads have been handed to police and we understand investigations are ongoing.

THE HILLS SHIRE COUNCIL SURFACING ROADS

The Hills Shire Council has been busy surfacing smaller neglected roads in the Glenorie area including a full re-surface of Pinus Ave and Smallwood Road off Halcrow's Road, which is home of Sandstone Sales. Thank you to the council for investing in these necessary improvements. Since the tragic fatal accident on Cattai Ridge Road, The Hills Shire Council has also reviewed the safety of the entire road. Council engaged an independent consultant who recommended improved signage, road markings and road improvement. In correspondence with Council, Michael Lathlean, Manager - Asset Management, Traffic & Parks, said: "It would appear that the intersection of Halcrows Rd and Cattai Ridge Rd is far from satisfactory so I will include an amount of funding for a redesign of the intersection in next year's Works Program." While we are talking investment, Les Shore Reserve: The Hills Shire Council is on track to complete the upgrade of the amenities building at Les Shore Reserve by end of November. The refurbishment of the old store rooms into 3 larger store rooms with roller door access will benefit the local community and sports teams including Hills Pumas FC. We look forward to Council's continued investment in the area and thank them for their attention.



Over the past several years we have heard stories from local business owners who have had a tough time with council red tape. At Glenorie Progress Association we want to encourage local business. Local business means more local employment. Local business means



less people commuting in cars to congested centres for their work. Local business means local services. We have noted several well run, well known and viable businesses who have had to make other arrangements or move their business due to council. 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NO PARKING THE POLITICS OF ACTIVE TRANSPORT

"75 Million trips per day are taken by private car in Australia, with an average of 1.1 persons per car. More than 50% of those trips are for distances of 5km or less."

ne way to alleviate traffic congestion and create more parking spaces is a critical mass of individual decisions to take less, or no short trips by private car. The paucity of car parking at some NW Metro rail transit hubs might be a subtle push toward such changes in commuter behaviour.

'Active transport' isn't just about biology or an anti-car conspiracy theory- it has grown into a global social movement, benefitting leading cities and the environment the world over. Anyone who is privileged enough to travel overseas, would agree that you don't see enormous parking lots along, say, the Paris Metro, or the busy Hammersmith transit hub in London. But what you do see are highly efficient public transport services, orderly bike share scheme docks and extensive networks of dedicated or shared bicycle lanes or footpaths; all radiating out for 20km or more to and from every transit hub. Cyclists and pedestrians have priority over motor vehicles-particularly at busy traffic intersections, while obstructive regulations and petty police 'crackdowns' on bicycle or pedestrian 'offenders' are conspicuously absent.

NSW State, however, currently has over 100 draconian demerit fines, custom crafted and updated in 2016, which obstruct bicycling in NSW, starting at \$112 right up to a shameful \$448. Pedestrians only have a modest 41 demerit fines to worry about and pay \$75 for each 'offence.' This

criminalisation of ordinary citizens just trying to do something very positive is depressing if you try to engage with your external environment and live an active, healthy lifestyle. It also completely undermines and contradicts the State's own commitments to active transport and health.

Every beautifully designed and landscaped new station on the NW Metro rail link is a model example of how to use public and active transport to get from A to B. But around two of them, namely Castle Hill and Cherrybrook, the good work is only within a small radius. Further infrastructure for cycling and walking is still to be retrofitted around these stations because they are both perched upon confined, steep-sided ridgelines traversed by Castle Hill Road and Old Northern Road. These busy arterial roads currently accommodate no other personal transport option, except a fossil fuel assisted one. Fortunately, the other NW Metro Stations are not on ridgelines and have been 'future-proofed.' Surrounding geography is fairly flat and they are quite easy and safe to access on foot, or with a bicycle because this has been included with previous and existing infrastructure developments in areas surrounding Showgrounds, NW, Bella Vista, Kellyville, Rouse Hill and Tallawong rail stations.

But for those residing west of Galston Gorge in the vicinity of Arcadia, Galston, Glenorie, Forest Glen or Kenthurst and beyond- we are all just a bit too 'far' away (more than 10km, but 'far' is a state of mind!) to regularly benefit from the nearest rail stations. So we've developed a culture of driving everywhere by default, as we have had to be self-sufficient 'out here' for decades. We decided to live far away from city crowds and consistent metro services. Besides, nothing beats the convenience and luxury of having a personal car to use whenever you like. However, change is here now and it's irrevocable. How we manage that change to benefit the environment- and us as a community- is key. Ensuring we all have access to cheap, efficient and safe alternatives to private car use will become a critical quality of life factor in the not too distant future.

South-bound commuters, no matter what bridging transport they choose, still face several obstacles to access the NW Metro, and it appears we have not been considered in transport plans doing the 'have your say' rounds of 2019.

*Old Northern, Newline and Castle Hill Roads all have frustrating bottlenecks and some rather lethal intersections. Road upgrades are way overdue and not scheduled for anytime soon.



There are seven schools along this ridgeline alone and thousands of scholars go to and from school every day in convoys of private cars. 'School Traffic' and parking woes in the vicinity of these schools are just accepted as part of the daily ritual while perpetuating a cycle of dangerous traffic conditions around schools- but what other alternatives are there currently? Primary and high school kids (and their parents) should have the choice of safe, active transport routes to schools and work, because statistically, they certainly are not safe in their cars. There were 140 driver/passenger deaths in motor vehicles as opposed to 8 cyclist and 34 pedestrian deaths in the first half of 2019 in NSW.

*Local bus services are still too infrequent and many don't go direct- enormous, mostly empty buses are not very appealing and will not coax us out of our cars either.

* It would take a very average cyclist just 45minutes to cycle commute from Galston to Castle Hill (12km) or Cherrybrook (11km) via Old Northern Road. If you own an E-bike to assist you up the hills, your NW Metro cycle commute will take under 30minutes! A bicycle uses a fraction of the road space that a car does, so one can bypass any traffic bottlenecks. Cycle commuting south to NW Metro and back may be quicker than driving there in peak hours, but is the mental stress and threat of road rage, injury or an untimely death, worth it? Due to our inadequate access roads, no cycle path networks and steep off-ridgeline gradients- this is a difficult and dangerous route to ride.

A safer bet, if commuting in by car from the semi-rural north, might be to compromise and park a good 2 to 5km away from the cars and associated Ranger Danger circling train stations. Research and plan your route, choosing a suitable station. Extract your bicycle from the car and enjoy cycling through quiet suburbs, business parks or along any cycle paths you might find, while safely and efficiently bridging that proverbial 'last mile' to and from your rail station of choice. But do remember, we are one of only three countries in the world that mandates wearing a bicycle helmet. (aka 'foam hat') The penalty is an incommensurate \$337 fine if you don't wear one or perhaps forgot to fasten the strap!

All new stations have adequate bicycle parking, but some of it is still being rolled out. Cyclists have a choice of exterior racks, free bike sheds or hire lockers for that hero \$10,000 Colnago! Station lifts can take up to five bikes at a time if you need to take yours with on the train, but rail network travel conditions apply.

"Teamwork, making new friends and having a go is what has pushed me to keep playing netball over the past five years. This is also what inspired me to start umpiring last year. Seven years ago, when I was in year three, I was watching some older kids in my school play netball. They looked like they were having so much fun and so something inside my little head decided, that this was the sport for me. Since then I have made so many lovely friends whom I have shared some great experiences with, including going to Gala days, getting in semi-finals and winning the grand final three years in a row. We had some very successful games and some not so much, but we couldn't have achieved any of this without our amazing coaches and managers. They come to training every week with more tips and tricks to beat the team that is always one place ahead of you on the ladder...

Last year I thought I would give umpiring a go and honestly, at the time this was one of

the scariest things I thought I would ever do. First, I studied the whole netball rules booklet in preparation for a test, which I had to get 75% or more on, and I thought that was the scariest bit, but I was wrong. Next, we had to go to Pennant Hills Park and do the practical section. This was the first time I had ever actually physically umpired a game... the scary meter just moved up to nine. Of course, I was freaking out for no reason. The mentors helping us were amazing, they gave us lots of compliments and lots of feedback on how to improve. All the other girls were so nice, I kept thinking they were judging me, but how could they really, we were all going through the same thing. When the time came for me to umpire my first game, I was really nervous, but it was fine because we all had mentors for the first year.

That year went by so quickly and at the end of it I was loving it. When it was time to start umpiring again for the second year everything was smooth sailing, thanks to all the help I received the year before. One extra bonus was that this year I would get paid! Starting umpiring, helped my confidence grow, not just on the court but also as a person. Overall, I have loved playing netball and umpiring with Galston netball club, and I really would like to



encourage lots of other girls to get involved with the best sport in the world".

Dural Public School Memories

I attended Dural Public School from Kindergarten to Year 6 in the years 1962-1968. I lived close, so walked to school. I loved school, but preferred "playtime" to the class work, until 6th class, when I started to enjoy both.

About 7 years ago, a couple from our 6th class arranged a reunion for us. We now have about 10 girls , who often connect and if able, come to our 6 monthly or yearly luncheons. It's wonderful to reminisce and hear of others' journeys.

As the school is this year celebrating it's 150th Anniversary, I asked the girls to write a good memory they each had of school "back then". Here's some thoughts from 6 of us.

Fran: In those days, many families in Dural were small business owners, usually primary producers. Some were well off, others did it tough. Each day we queued for milk and when the new oral sabine against polio came in, we queued for that too. Not much was expected of us and we didn't see the need to compete. Not much testing and No Naplan. Competent marching was a valued skill. In 1966, we stopped struggling with pounds, shillings and pence; the new Decuimal Currency was much easier.

Debbie: I loved the intimacy of a small school, where

relationships prioritized and sport and learning were fun. I also remember the milk was sometimes warm, as it wasn't refrigerated at school.

Suzy: I remember standing as a 4 1/2 year old watching Dad cut up watermelon and handing it over the fence to the school kids, who loved it. I met a girl called Diane one day, who became a friend. I was happy to go to school the next year.

Lyn: I recall the Tuckshop which operated out of one of the weathersheds- the bread rolls with peanut butter were "pure Bliss".Also ,all the girls did sowing classes with Mrs Dalton,where we made aprons and placemats.

Ida: Folk Dancing was on Fridays on the Quadrangle. The watermelon from Suzy's Dad,next door, was delicious! And I recall the new Sport names: Aquila, Dorado, Lepus and Columba.

I also thought of the Sport houses and recall these names were adopted in our 6th class. I was in Aquila.

We had a box pleats sports uniform with a tassle for around our waist.

Dural Public School was and is still a great school!



boost to grassroots sports development or upgrades to local sporting facilities in Hornsby are just some of the projects eligible for funding, in the latest round of the NSW Government's Local Sport Grant Program.

n 19 September Hornsby Shire Council held the Youth Future Forum. Young people from across the Shire were encouraged to attend an event held in Hornsby Park and to participate in the formation of a strategic vision for the future of Hornsby Shire. Attendees were asked to provide their perspective on subjects such as housing, work opportunities, the environment and technology. The event was a huge success and provided a model for similar events in the future.

Of critical importance to the current Rural Lands Review process is the release of our

Landscape Area maps. These Areas have been defined by what features are common to various segments of our rural neighbourhood and will form the basis for our future land use planning.

It is important that residents identify with the Landscape Area that best relates to individual properties and comment accordingly. The Landscape Area mapping will be exhibited on Council's website until 8 November. If you have any difficulties interpreting the exhibited material, you can call 9847 6726 and have it explained by one of our planning team.

Galston Village public domain planning advanced another step this month with a further workshop session including village property owners. Draft concepts related to parking, traffic flow, public toilets and play space were discussed and comments noted by management.

Finally, funding has been secured in the September budget review that will see the long awaited Glenorie bus terminus and gateway improvement plan move into design stage. It is anticipated that this will mark the beginning of an overall strategy to improve the condition and functionality of the entire Memorial precinct.



hey don't have their P's yet but they are racing an F1 car at up to 80 kilometres per hour on a track.

A group of Year 11 students from Pacific Hills Christian School, at Dural, have joined the global F1 in Schools STEM Challenge and are using this experience to advance their understanding of Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths.

Their car is only a model, and the dual lane computer-timed track is just 22 metres long, however, their futuristic car is capable of reaching those speeds in one second. That's guicker than a real Formula One car!

The students call themselves Frontier Racing and they had to learn advanced software that does three-dimensional computer design,

virtual reality aerodynamics and computational fluid dynamics. Then, they made the bewinged racer using a 3Dprinter and a three-axis machine centre. This is the same type of work as that carried out by professional engineers with university qualifications.

Despite only coming together as a team a few months ago, Frontier Racing went to its first competition against other Hills-based schools and surprised everyone by winning awards for the best engineering, innovation, manufacturing, industry collaboration and verbal presentation. As a result, they gained a place at the NSW State Finals which are being held this month.

The winner of that event will represent New South Wales at the National Finals, and the



eventual winner goes on to the World Finals. Australian schools have won the World Finals more times than any other nation (six). Both the 2017 and 2018 World Champions are Australians.

A STEADFAST HOPE

BY PASTOR DAVID MCKIBBEN - GALSTON SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTIST CHURCH



Over the last couple of months we have been considering the last words of the apostle Paul as recorded in the letter we know as 2 Timothy. As he faced death, Paul pointed his young colleague to a person to believe in, specifically the person of Jesus. He also urged him to live his life by the principles of the Bible, the book for all seasons. Furthermore, the apostle also encouraged Timothy to hold onto the steadfast hope of the Gospel.

Ithough Paul awaited certain death, his final letter breathes life. He repeatedly encouraged Timothy to live the life that counts, and he used a number of examples referred to in 2 Timothy 2:3-6 to drive home his message. The apostle points to the bravery, determination and obedience of the soldier (verses 3-4), the discipline and self-denial of the athlete (verse 5), and the perseverance and hard work of the farmer (verse

6). All of these attributes are important when it comes to living a life with purpose and meaning.

But the common link in all of these occupations is the element of hope. The soldier is sustained in times of hardship by the hope of victory: the athlete undergoes an intense training schedule because of the prospect of a gold medal; the farmer toils for long hours because of the hope of an abundant harvest. A steadfast hope and a clear purpose encourage an attitude of perseverance; they encourage people to keep going when they feel like giving up.

Viktor Frankl, an Austrian neurologist and psychiatrist, was a survivor of the Holocaust who endured the horrors of four Nazi concentration camps. After the end of the Second World War he reflected on his experiences, particularly why some people survived whilst others did not. In his book Man's Search for Meaning he shared these insights. "The loss of hope and courage can have a

deadly effect on man.... Any attempt to restore a man's inner strength in camp had first to succeed in showing him some future goal. They died less from lack of food or medicine than from lack of hope, lack of something to live for."

The sure hope of the Gospel, specifically the blessed hope of the return of Jesus, enabled Paul to remain strong and optimistic in the face of a violent death, hence these immortal words: "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith." (2 Timothy 4:7)

May this same steadfast hope found in Jesus enable you to live the life that counts and strengthen, comfort and encourage you daily.



rews at Arcadia have been busy behind the scenes, doing trail inspections and familiarization with our newer members. We frequently do trail inspections so we know if trails need maintenance or if any of the landscape has changed. We've also welcomed the rain we have received, however we must not become complacent when it comes to bush fire preparation. Many members from the Hornsby District have been away on strike team deployment in Northern NSW. We wish them all a safe return home.

At the beginning of October, Vision Valley in Arcadia played host to the 2019 Australian Fire Cadet Championships. 160 cadets from all around Australia came for the event, which saw them work in teams and compete in events that tested their skills but also demonstrated their comradeship. The events consisted of operations fire fighters regularly practice

and use at incidents, including deploying hoses and setting up the portable pump. The winning team was the South West Slopes cadet team from NSW.

From the 26th of September there has been a change in road rules around emergency vehicles. Are you familiar with this change? On roads with speed limits of 90km/h or more, motorists are required to slow down safely to a speed that is reasonable for the situation, whilst providing sufficient space between their vehicle and the emergency vehicle that displays their lights, a tow truck or break down assistance. n Saturday the 14th of September, I attended an open day for the Rural Fire Service of Middle Dural. I helped set up, read some of the advice they were giving out, and got to ask some questions to the volunteers.

There was an extremely wide variety of information available for all sorts of people: there were general strategies in the form of clear and simple actions, and there were also more specific pieces of advice for hikers, pet owners (including horses!), landowners and more.

There were many volunteers there that had been working for a very long time, and they told me that there is a position for everyone: those unfit to fight fires can help out in many other ways. And they need more people too. With the changing climate, there is a need for more volunteers

I also came to appreciate just how advanced the fire-fighting system is. They have several categories of vehicles, each specialised in a job, from the great fire trucks that can transport large amounts of water to the smaller cars designed to transport people. Water is also a very complex issue, as well as how it gets to the fire with enough pressure. But of all the fires that happen, you don't hear of many. And there are a lot. My mother, a volunteer in the RFS, gets a buzz on her phone for every fire in the area. There is no shortage of jobs, but they still manage to get them done.

A TRAGIC START TO THE SUMMER FIRE SEASON

With more hot and windy weather expected, the RFS is on high alert. One of Galston's fire trucks has been in heavy use in the region since the start of the fires. It has worked alongside other RFS fire trucks from all over the state as they formed part of strike teams attacking the fires wreaking havoc in the region. Thank you to the endless rotation of Galston firies who have volunteered weeks of their time to head up north and battle these blazes.

DON'T BE COMPLACENT – PREPARE YOUR HOME NOW

Burning embers can travel many kilometres ahead of a fire, so while you may think a bushfire isn't close to you, embers can still cause spot fires around your property - particularly if you haven't prepared your home to survive a bushfire.

A well prepared home can also be easier for you or firefighters to defend, and is less likely to put your neighbours' homes at risk. It will also give you more protection if there is a sudden fire threat and you cannot leave.







HERE ARE SOME BASIC TIPS TO PREPARE YOUR PROPERTY:

- Clean your gutters of leaves and twigs
- Install metal gutter guards
- Repair damaged or missing tiles on the roof
- Install fine metal mesh screens on windows and doors
- Fit seals around doors and windows to eliminate gaps
- Enclose the areas under the house
- Repair or cover gaps in external walls
- Attach a fire sprinkler system to gutters
- Keep lawns short and gardens well maintained
- Cut back trees and shrubs overhanging buildings
- Clean up fallen leaves, twigs and debris around the property
- Have hoses long enough to reach around your house
- If you have a pool, tank or dam, put a Static Water Supply (SWS) sign on your property entrance, so firefighters know where they can get water
- Check and maintain adequate levels of home and contents insurance. Ensure it is up to date.

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
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

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WHAT LENDERS WANT YOU TO **KNOW BEFORE YOU BORROW**

Carolyn Wheatley, Belle Property's Rural Area Specialist walks us through applying for a home loan. Are you employed and do you earn enough?

Your currently salary and employment details will be reviewed, and lenders will carefully consider whether your salary can support your lifestyle, and you mortgage repayments. Ideally, you want to be employed in your current position for at least 6 months. If you're a contractor, even longer.

Do you have savings; but more importantly can you save?

Of course saving for a house deposit is a major part of approval, but lenders are now also asking for you capacity to save - consistently.

So, how can you best prepare for these conversations with your lender before you have them?



"Put yourself in the best position to secure your loan by having your paperwork in order before you speak with a lender" says Carolyn. According to NAB, you should come prepared with as much documentation as possible, including personal IDs, bank statements, credit card statements, payslips, tax returns and any other documentation relating to owned assets or investments. "While every lender will ask you about what you can earn and owe, it's best practice to be prepared for the curly questions that might come your way. Get your documentation in order and be as transparent as possible, and you'll be in the best position to secure the loan, and the home, you're after."

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
