Hornsby Council has submitted the following Development Application (DA/1041/2019) for the re-roofing of Galston Aquatic Centre.

Galston Aquatic Centre was built and opened in 1969. In 1998 the gymnasium was added, then the smaller Learn to Swim pool in 2014.

When the refurbishment

was completed in 2017, it was noted that the roof also needed major repairs. This is now being addressed with this application. Below are artists impressions of the proposed new structure.

I consulted the White Pages, rang the Glenorie Vet's number, and a gentle male voice said he would meet me and the cat at the hospital in 15 minutes.



GPA has stated a commitment to advancing public green access for the community.

We were recently alerted to a proposed closure of public access in the famous Broadwater. This area is an environmental sanctuary with the picturesque Little Cattai Creek home to amazing wetland and bird life. It is currently accessed from Spur Place in Forest Glen, and Smallwood Road and Halcrows Road in Hillside. For decades the public have been able to complete a mountain bike ride or walk from Halcrows Road to Smallwood Road via the Fern Gully / Creek Fire Trail. It is a beautiful circuit. perfect for a mountain bike or trail cycling. This is despite some landholders on the trail placing gates and locks on the crown road which you can simply walk your bike around.

The landholder in this case is probably seeking privacy and does not want the general public traversing his land. Anyone can accept that having random people passing through your

There is also a surprise visit from Santa which will excite all the children (and maybe some adults!).









ESME WOOD 1930 - 2019 A LIFE WELL LIVED

Esme Wood was a dynamic person\ who was creative, artistic and passionate about the protection of heritage and the natural environment.

Esme grew up in Beecroft. Aged 21, she married Bill Wood and they purchased 3 acres with an old weatherboard cottage on Shepherds Lane, West Pennant Hills (now Cherrybrook). Residential subdivision caught up with them and preferring a rural lifestyle, they moved to Galston, where they purchased 5 acres of long grass and bush on Fishburns Road in about 1970. The road then was a dirt track with boggy sections when it rained. They built a house and Esme lived there for nearly 50 years, content to stay in her familiar and beautiful surroundings.

As a child, Esme developed a love

Esme at her front gate during the Voluntary Conservation Agreement celebration for literature, poetry, classical music and art. After leaving Meriden school, she studied art at Julian Ashton's Art School and East Sydney Technical College and worked in the Mitchell Library. The love of art and all things creative continued throughout her life. She studied art and sculpture at Hornsby TAFE in the 1980s. She was a theatre set designer at the Castle Hill Players for about 18 years. She was involved in over 30 plays and was awarded the Shelagh O'Hanlon Award in 1987 for long-term service. Esme was very active in the community. For several years in the 1980s and 1990s she was actively involved as a volunteer at the Dural & District Historical Society History Cottage and involved with the Hornsby Conservation Society. She also volunteered for the

Mastertouch Piano Roll Company (Petersham) when it was trying to establish a museum in the heritagelisted Stanmore Fire Station. In the early 1990s, Esme assisted with the assessment of roadside verges for conservation significance for Hornsby Shire Council's Rural Lands Study. She also carried out water monitoring in about six creeks at Galston including in Galston Gorge. She wrote numerous letters to politicians about a host of topics, trying to improve conservation outcomes for heritage and bushland areas.

From the 1990s to 2015, Esme also volunteered as a bush regenerator at four Bushcare sites: Carrs Bush (Fagan Park), Tim Brownscombe Reserve (Fishburns Rd), Berowra Creek and Rosemead Rd Hornsby. She assisted writing

and distributing pamphlets about Bushcare. In 2004, she made the commitment to protect the *Sydney Turpentine Ironbark Forest*, a Critically Endangered Ecological Community, on her own property on Fishburns Road by organising that it be subject to a Voluntary Conservation Agreement to protect it in perpetuity. Esme was a remarkable person, dedicated to conservation and trying to make the world a better place.

Esme was much loved by her family and will be greatly missed. Family and friends are warmly invited to a Celebration of Esme's Life to be held at Carrs Bush, Carrs Rd, Galston at 10.30am on Friday 6th December 2019. 



BONE DRY DROUGHT A PERSONAL ACCOUNT OF THE WATER RUN TO BREWARRINA


I am a new member of the Bone Dry Hay Run fundraising group and on Friday 15th November I drove out of Natures' Best Water in Penrith, behind a semi-trailer of drinking water, headed to Brewarrina in far northdriven by my brother, Dave, truck was provided by his company, Freight Specialists, free of charge. They covered the cost of the truck and the fuel and we are so very grateful for this as it will make our funds stretch further.

We left the greenness of the

Blue Mountains behind us and watched the landscape dry and crack. Fields of brown. Fields of grey. The highway littered with roadkill where animals had tempted fate to nibble tiny morsels of green grass along the roadside.

driving in NSW, QLD and NT. In the past I have seen paddocks full of stock - cattle and sheep – all fat and healthy. This time, the landscape was bare. No stock, no feed - just Sloping hills of dust.

At midnight we pulled into Redmond Transport in Brewarrina and parked our precious load. We were surprised to see Trevor from the River View Motel there





to meet us. He had estimated our travel time and wanted to make sure we got to the motel safely. On the way into town we passed a large active group of indigenous youth in the park. I was pleased to have an escort.

With the high gates securely locked and after a quick cup of tea and Vegemite toast, we headed to our rooms. As I opened the bathroom door, the smell of the water assaulted my nostrils. It was rank. Not fit for drinking and even when boiled the taste tainted everything. The next day I was told that tea, coffee and even boiled vegetables carried the flavour.

On Saturday morning I met up with the other members of the Bone Dry group who had made the trip out to Bree for the weekend. We headed to the transport depot to unload 22 pallets (over 22,000 litres) of bottled drinking water. We were also meant to be unloading 2 B-Double trucks (70 tonnes) of hay, but bushfire road closures down south had turned our trucks around for now. Most of our water was transferred to smaller trucks and taken for storage, waiting for the hay which would arrive in the coming week. The water was primarily for the out of town farmers who did not have access to town water. They would take their allocation when they picked up the stockfeed. We did assign a few pallets for distribution that morning and ute after ute arrived to take their share. The gratitude was evident, we were thanked, and thanked again. The locals told us that they were heartened by our acts and the fact that city folk cared enough to raise the money and then take the time to personally deliver such necessities to them. Tears in some eyes, "Thank you so much for what you are doing". But in essence, they were thanking each of you, the generous people in our local community back home. It is true that the Bone Dry Hay Run group takes the time and makes the effort to organise events, but the money comes from all of us and each of you. Every ticket purchased to an event, a raffle ticket, participation in our money games. Every

It is the time of year when we are all full of excitement for fresh summer farm produce. The growth of all plants has amplified with the warmer weather. We have watched the cucumbers, tomatoes, eggplants and zucchini all become big and strong. The strawberries have also been ripening and growing bigger, with a lot of the picking being done by the Warrah Special School team. Harvesting is the most rewarding and satisfying activity for growers!

The first of the tomatoes that we planted are starting to fruit, and the capsicum and eggplant have shown a positive response to the hotter temperatures. The warmth also caused all our flower varieties of paper daisies, lavender, Queen Anne's lace, dianthus, cosmos, chimchimeree and calendula to burst with pinks, purples, reds, white and blues.

The oranges, grapefruit,

lemons and limes along with figs and asparagus have all gone through their seasonal transformation, from the eruption of flowers with an incredible aroma filling the air, to beginning to set fruit. This summer we are growing our usual array of salad mix, lettuce, rocket, rainbow chard, silver beet, kale, pak choi, beetroot, rainbow carrots, along with fruiting crops of beans, zucchini, cucumber, tomato, capsicum, eggplant and strawberries. We also have basil and parsley growing.

The nursery is one of the more active areas for the clients of our disability services. Tasks include cleaning seedling trays, making seed raising mix and filling trays, thinning seedlings, and then planting the crops they helped raise.

The chicken run project, undertaken as part of a TAFE life skills course, is nearing finalisation. The sections of chicken wire fencing have



been erected, and the final painting is being done. Soon we will be graced with the sites and sounds of lovely hens outside our Farm Shop.

The Farm Shop continues to sell the fruits of our farming labours, along with a full range of Australian certified organic and biodynamic produce. We have the first of the peaches, nectarines and mangos available at the time of writing this. Soon there will also be grapes - always worth the wait. Spare a thought for just how hard Australian farmers work to feed us. Faced with floods, droughts and bushfires, Australian farmers need our support now more than ever.



NAUGHTY OR NICE? WHY AN E-BIKE IS ON MY CHRISTMAS WISH LIST

Neither a bicycle nor a motorcycle, an 'E-Bike' is any bicycle with an electric motor integrated or attached to it.

'Throttle' electric bikes operate by the twist of a handlebar or push of a button which surges power to the back wheel, like a motorbike.

'Pedal assist' electric bike technology only contributes power when the rider is pedalling. There are different levels of assistance (either automatic or manual) for situations like riding up hills.

Sales of E-Bikes are exploding worldwide, due to affluent aging populations, Climate Change policies and the global popularity of mountain biking. Cycling offroad conventionally is fun if going downhill, or if you're slender and fit enough to pedal up the short, but steep gradients of Sydney bush trails. Regardless of where your body is at, mountain biking is always hard due to the sheer intensity of skill and effort required to ride technical terrain. Surely you didn't expect a sport and recreation with the word 'mountain' in it, to be easy, did you? E-Bikes however, have taken the mountain out of mountain biking, so now everyone from portly gentlemen to grande dames like me can relax and quietly enjoy cycling deep into the bush with friends and family. Everyone gets fitter, stronger and happier because they are not utterly shattered after every ride. And you can keep up. And you

feel like a 21 year old again. Nice! But, there's a big Naughty List out on the roads, where e-bikes that are legally supposed to be limited to 200 or 250 watts have been known to be tampered with to produce much higher power, or the speed limiter that restricts power assistance to speeds under 25km/h gets 'modified.' Consequently, throttle- controlled E-Bikes with questionable power output are springing up everywhere, particularly in the food delivery sector. Consequently we have motorcycles, which require registration and a licensed rider, masquerading as bicycles. Pepperoni Pizza with that, anyone?

Across Australia, state authorities haven't quite caught up or

caught on yet... so trendy users of powered bikes, scooters or self-balancing devices have been left in e-limbo. These personal conveyances can't be registered, technically making them illegal if used on public roads or footpaths or inside Parks.

Whether you are for or against E-Bikes, the fact remains that choosing to get from A to B without using a private car helps to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, traffic congestion and our reliance on oil. Additional benefits include dollops of fun outdoors, improved mental and physical health, and reduction of wider environmental impacts from fossil fueled transportation. Just say "EEEE !" and remain Merry and Bright, all year round.



and often set it going". I have heard removing their mounds repeatedly can disturb them so they'll shift elsewhere.



RURAL ROUNDUP

During November community consultation continued on the Rural Lands Review. Two workshops were held at The Galston Club and two were held at Glenorie Club. The primary purpose of the workshops was to determine if the consultants had accurately determined the base line "landscape area maps" required for future planning.

It was extremely heartening to see all of the sessions oversubscribed and that the range of community input was so varied. In particular, it was terrific to see the collaborative approach demonstrated by staff, consultants, councillors and – above all – members of the community. It was clear that, despite the diversity in opinion surrounding rural land use, a level of respect for the varying opinions was extended to all that participated. The process of collating this large contribution from the community has begun and a draft report should come back to councillors in December.

The Galston Village Public Domain concept plan has been introduced to property owners within the village. With further refinement, a more developed plan should emerge soon that will be introduced to both village tenants and the broader community. The next step is to get the initial concept formally endorsed so that detailed design work may begin and budgets developed.

The Glenorie Village bus area upgrade was endorsed at the last Council meeting so more detailed design work will begin on that important gateway project.

Finally, a special thanks to all of our Rural Fire Service

divisions and their volunteers for the high level of education and preparation that has been provided to our communities. It has been a particularly vulnerable time and we are most grateful for the peace of mind their service provides.












RAMBLINGS FROM ROUGHLEY HOUSE

The day will provide an opportunity to bring along your problem weeds and have them identified by a specialist weed agronomist. Herbicides are rarely successful when used alone, and are often not the cheapest long-term option. And if you are organic, synthetic herbicides are not an option. So what is the best approach for managing weeds? It's called integrated weed management. Integrated weed management involves using a variety of methods to prevent weed entry and spread, make your farm environment stronger and specifically target the destruction of weeds. Integrated weed management is not only more effective but can be more profitable. The field day will demonstrate practical tools that you can use to monitor the health of your soil. You will be shown how to correctly take soil samples for nutrient testing plus a range of straightforward visual tests.

The day will also look at why weeds are so successful, and what they may indicate about your soils and management. For example, high numbers of Fireweed or Paterson's Curse are indicators of poor ground cover; especially in autumn. Once established they produce large soil seed banks (up to 130 million per hectare) which can survive for up to 5 years. Knowing what makes weeds abundant gives you the tools to keep them under control. In addition, the Field Day will look at: • characteristics of weeds which make an integrated management approach essential • costs of weed control and how it changes with time since invasion • different methods available for control • examples of integrated weed management for specific weeds such as serrated tussock, lantana and fireweed · where to find information on the management of different weeds.

LEVEL 2 WATER **RESTRICTIONS**

From 10th December, new Level 2 water restrictions will apply:

- gardens can only be watered before 10am or after 4pm with a watering can or bucket
- smart and drip irrigation systems may only be used for 15 minutes before 10am or after 4pm
- the use of unattended hoses is no longer permitted
- hosing of hard surfaces is not permitted, unless in an emergency
- cars can only be washed with a bucket or at a commercial car wash
- a permit is required before filling a pool of any size.
- Fines of \$220 will apply for residents and \$550 for businesses who don't follow the restrictions.

STILL CREEK LANDCARE WHAT'S BIOSECURITY GOT TO DO WITH ME?

Australia is free of many of the pests, weeds and diseases found in other parts of the world. The government wants us all to help keep it that way to keep food supply and native animals and plants safe.

In this area, we are away from the main container terminals and airports, but pests can travel in many ways. Some have been here a long time like foxes, others are moving towards us like Red Imported Fire Ants, which are causing \$ billions of damage in the US.

Most people in this area don't like the foxes which kill the native animals and our poultry unless we lock them up at night. But some people here have been feeding foxes, how cute. There are websites and apps for reporting not only foxes, but a large range of other pests as well. Anyone seen any feral camels here? See: www.feralscan.org.au

We can all contribute to periurban biosecurity by:

- Taking steps to prevent pests, diseases and weeds from coming in and spreading
- Not bringing things back from interstate or overseas that might create a risk
- · Keeping an eye out for pests, weeds and signs of disease
- · Protecting your own and your neighbour's properties
- Reporting anything unusual, if possible with a photo

Obviously the hard part is identifying the pests, who would recognise the Brown Marmorated Stink Bug or the Yellow Crazy Ant? These and others may be seen and reported on the NSW website: https:// www.dpi.nsw.gov.au/biosecurity





return to God, that your sins may be erased (wiped clean) and times of refreshing may


2. FAITH: "Without faith it is impossible to please God, exists and that He rewards those who earnestly seek Him." Hebrews 11:6

MIDDLE DURAL NEWS By Jo Cameron

November was a very active start to the fire season with an unprecedented number of fires out of control and an emergency declared over most of the state. Many volunteer crews from The Hills took part in strike teams to the far north coast and then to the Gosper's Mountain Fire in Wollemi National Park.

We saved many assets, and lost some, which is inevitable in such awful circumstances. In the left hand window of this building, the dark area of flame is known as a flashover, where the built-up gases from burning materials in the room ignite almost explosively, compared with the pale flame below.

You often hear volunteer firefighters described as brave. I'd like to say that we are not brave. We do what we are trained to do. and we do it in as safe a manner as we can. There is a fine line between brave and foolhardy. In our basic firefighter course, we are taught not to be a hero, because that's foolhardy, and another firefighter may have to risk their life to save you. We may be community minded, or have joined up to be able to save our own homes. Some people do join for the challenge or excitement,

but that's not what the RFS wants. We need careful, hard-working, sensible volunteers!

In O'Hara's Creek Road on Monday 18th November, there was an extraordinary incident as a consequence of the RFS app, Fires Near Me showing a fire at no 12. This was a highly unusual system error, unlikely to be repeated, but it resulted in a chaotic log jam of traffic, as local residents flocked to the road to check the fire situation. There was no fire, but if there had been, a fire tanker would have been unable to access the fire and residents would have been unable to evacuate. Please do not react in this way by driving towards a potential bushfire. If there is a fire in your area, and it requires you to exercise caution or watchfulness, you will receive an SMS on your mobile phone, informing you of the possible level of emergency. This SMS is generated by the RFS via the communications tower, to every mobile phone in the affected area.

If you are concerned, and want further info information, please ring the RFS bushfire General Enquiry line: 1800 679 737. Of course, if you see flame or a plume of smoke, ring 000. While current fires are blanketing Sydney in smoke haze, it's difficult to ascertain the cause, and we would rather have false alarms than not. As always, the Middle Dural Captain, Len Best (0408 220 705) and Senior Deputy, Ken Middleton (0417 203 088), are happy to assist. If you have not already done so, we recommend that you download the free RFS app, Fires Near Me. It contains valuable information that will better prepare you, and also reassure you, in the coming months.

MEDIA RELEASE PERMITS FOR OPEN BURNING ACTIVITIES SUSPENDED

20th November 2019

NSW Rural Fire Service is suspending all current fire safety permits for open burning activities, in the Hornsby / Ku-ring-gai and The Hills Rural Fire Districts.

Inspector Rolf Poole from Hornsby / Ku-ring-gai District said, "This step has be taken to reduce the potential of fire escapes at a time when drought conditions have meant there is an increased risk."

"With the current ongoing fire operations impacting on New South Wales communities, we need to ensure we are minimising the potential for new ignitions in our local area" Inspector Poole said.

The current local drought indexes issued by the Bureau of Meteorology are in the serious to extreme range. Residents who normally conducted open burning operations such as pile burns or agricultural burns are unable to conduct burning activities until conditions ease.

"Once drought indexes return to an average level, the issuing of fire safety permits will be reviewed. In the meantime residents who have vegetation for burning can either remove it mechanically or store it away from assets."

Inspector Poole said, "We are urging bush fire prone communities to share the responsibility of fire prevention by preparing around their properties, removing the potential fire hazards and eliminating potential ignition sources".







SYDNEY PROPERTY MARKET FORECAST 2020

A s 2019 draws to a close, it's important to reflect on the property to market and look at where it's headed next. We've all read the headlines of the past 12 months where Sydney's property market hasn't flourish in previous years, however there is mild optimism amongst investors and analysts regarding the future. This is due to Sydney experiencing growth for the first time since its peak in mid 2017. This growth of 0.1% although slight, gives us a good indication that the worst is behind us and we have started to bottom out. Understandably due to the recent property market turbulence, there will still be hesitation amongst both buyers and sellers – Do I buy now before the market peaks again? Do I sell now before we hit tough times again or the market become saturated with competition?

Although no one has a crystal ball, here is a wrap up of what the leading economists expect 2020 to look like:

DOMAIN'S ECONOMIST TRENT WILTSHIRE:

We can expect property prices in Sydney not to fall any further - in fact, we may even experience a small period of growth. According to Wiltshire, modest growth can also be expected in 2020 with a 3-5% increase for houses and a 2-4% increase for units. Wiltshire believes Sydney properties will expect subdued growth for the foreseeable future.

CORELOGIC MOODY'S ANALYTICS:

Moody hasn't quite given such an optimistic view, stating that although apartments are tipped to slide less than houses in the short term, they may actually keep declining in some areas for years to come. Overall Moody's expects 3.6% growth in house values and 4.2% growth in unit values

▶ BIS OXFORD ECONOMIC'S DIRECTOR ANGIE ZIGOMANIS

Zigomanis' forecast has predicted a slower rebound, citing a recent home building surge. This extra supply of dwellings is touted to cap the market's bounce back. Going on to state that she predicts a 6% growth in house prices and 1% growth in unit prices between 2019-2022.

After comparing the experts notes, it's clear that most analysts seem optimist that the interest rate cuts and lending measures will do more to solidify an already growing consumer confidence. 2020 is tipped for slow growth and by 2021 the recover will be in full swing.
