



## **REV BILL ROSIER OAM**

If you ask Rev Bill Rosier what the greatest achievement of his life has been and he will tell you that being married to his wife of 60 years, Marilyn.

On Sunday, Australia Day, the Galston resident was named as an Order of Australia recipient for service to the Uniting Church of Australia and to the community.

He became a minister nearly 60 years ago and during a fiveyear spell as a Minister in the Canberra Methodist Circuit he also attended Royal Military College Duntroon as a chaplain.

He served as chaplain and Principal Chaplain in the Royal Australian Navy for 22 years before taking on the role of chaplain at Royal North Shore Hospital.

He was NSW State chaplain between 2006 and 2011.

He is a member of the Hills District RSL Sub-branch and president and has co-ordinated both the ANZAC Service and Remembrance Day services at Galston Cenotaph for many vears.

The 87-year-old said he was quite shocked when he received the initial letter saying he had been nominated.

"I thank my wife. One year I was away for eight months at sea."

The couple, who celebrated their 60thwedding anniversary last month have four children, 11, grandchildren, 10 great grandchildren and "three on the way".

Australia Day was spent at Wesley Uniting Church, Castle Hill in the morning followed by lunch and dinner with family members with a visit to Bella Vista Farm in between where one of his grandchildren, Austin Rosier, was named Hills Young Citizen of the Year.

Rev Rosier said the "warmth' of people's reactions to the award had been very special.

We are looking forward to our next Open Day on Sunday, January 26, Australia Day. Our district has come through the recent bushfire emergencies unscathed, but our thoughts are with those who have been directly impacted. It is hard to imagine what it would be like to find one's lifetime possessions all gone, as has happened to so many. Fagan Park is affected like everywhere else by the hot, dry conditions and the staff have been trying to maintain the gardens from the dams on the property.

A recent project has been the restoration of the Pyramid Auto Truck donated to us last year by a local family. It had been used to transport bags of poultry feed on a farm at Berrilee. Shown is our member, Chris Stevens, looking a little nervous during its first run in early January. There are a few small jobs remaining, but it has come up a treat, wouldn't you agree?

Work on the International truck continues. Focus is on refitting the springs and axles back onto the chassis in readiness for the wheels which we expect to be ready soon. We had a recent breakthrough when we discovered the rear axle assembly we had obtained from Bonegilla (near Albury) right at the beginning of the project, had a number of better brake components than we had been wrestling with. So, these were raided and have saved considerable work.

Our new lathe finally arrived just before Christmas, and the first job was to get it properly levelled and set up. There is a backlog of work for it, as the old one had failed some time ago.

The Fagan Park museums and Netherby Homestead are open every Tuesday, our volunteering day, and we open the museums on the second Sunday each month during the afternoon. All visitors are welcome.



## ACTION ON HOMELESSNESS

The number of older homeless women in Australia increased by over 30% between 2011 and 2016 to nearly 7,000 according to the Australian Human Rights Commission.

Age Discrimination Commissioner Dr Kay Patterson said without innovative solutions the problem will increase.

To answer the call to push for solutions there will be forum in Baulkham Hills on **Tuesday**, **March 3.** 

Action on Homelessness Older Women in Crisis, will feature a panel of speakers including the CEO of Women's Community Shelters (WCS) Annabelle Daniel; Bev Barker, Chair of the Older Women's Network and Alison O'Neil from Link Housing.

A collaboration between WCS and Link Housing saw the transformation, last year of an unused aged care facility at Beecroft into accommodation for 20 older women.

The forum has been organised by members of the Hills and the Hornsby branches of the women's organisation, Soroptimist International.

## VALE BEN SWANE

written by NGINA Nursery & Garden Industry NSW & ACT.

It is with sadness we advise that Ben Swane OAM passed away on Wednesday, 15 January, 2020.

Ben Swane worked in the nursery industry for over 50 years. He was renowned as an industry leader. Not only did he introduce new technology and develop best practice growing facilities; he also worked to advance the professionalism of the industry as a whole and have it recognised in the wider community. He gladly assisted less experienced industry members and supported community organisations for many years.

Ben was born on 17 November, 1927. Like his four siblings,Valerie, Josie, Elwyn and Geoff, he was born at Willowmere, the family home in Ermington, where they were surrounded by nurseries and orchards.

He was educated at Newington and began work at Swanes, the family nursery on 27 November,

1944. Being a nurseryman was all Ben ever wanted to do. At the time of his

commencement in the family business, the nursery was operating at two locations, Ermington and Rydalmere. Ben studied at Sydney Technical College and received the horticulture certificate in 1947. Whilst he was studying three nights a week, he was also working six days a week in the nursery, as well as some nights.

The introduction of Swane's Golden Pencil Pine, which he discovered on a technical college field trip to Canberra in 1947, was a highlight of Ben's career. It was the first Australian raised plant to be awarded a gold medal by the Federation of Australian Nurseryman's Association and the first Australian-raised plant to be patented in the USA.

In 1958, Ben and his siblings became shareholders of Swane Bros. Pty Ltd with their father, Ted Swane, who continued to manage the business for some time. In 1965, Ben was responsible for planning and constructing a new nursery at Dural. Here in co-operation with Valerie, Ben established Swanes as a leading Australian nursery, well known in world horticulture and respected for high quality plants produced in nursery growing facilities utilising the best technology of the time.

Ben shared his practical skills with hundreds of staff many of whom have become industry leaders owning their own businesses in the nursery industry or the wider horticultural sphere.


Ben served on both the state and national Nursery Associations and was a founding member of the International Plant Propagator's Society in Australia. He held numerous other positions in key industry organisations and committees.



He was a Life Member of the NGINA.

"Ben is a great of the nursery industry, a true plantsman, honoured family member and sharer of his knowledge and experience, a willing worker for community and the industry needs, a true friend to many and a no nonsense but caring person and a leader without equal." 
It promises to be a fun day for the whole family with a jumping castle, magnetic fishing, colouring competitions and face painting for the kids.



## FUNNEL WEB SEASON IS HERE

The Australian Reptile Park have issued a message of warning to the public as recent wet weather conditions followed by hot days have created perfect conditions for funnel-web spiders to thrive. They are asking for any collected spiders to be brought to the park to contribute to their lifesaving antivenom program.

The more information you know about funnel web spiders, the better you can understand where they might be and how to avoid being bitten. Here are a few helpful facts from the Australian Museum:

**Book Lungs** - Funnel web spiders have primitive book lungs, which means they have to breathe moist air. They die quickly if they are out in the open in hot dry conditions. This means they generally move around at night (ie when its cooler and there is dew on the ground) or after rain.

Mating - Female funnel web spiders dig a burrow, generally in soft damp sheltered places. This could be under some stacked wood, under some moist mulch or near sheltered edges of places which remain damp. They build a web which looks like a funnel. Males on the other hand are solitary. After they mature, the males leave the buttow and become wanders, especially during the Summer / Autumn months (November to April) looking for females. If the male is out wandering and it starts to become hot and dry, he will head for the nearest sheltered spot. This could be a shoe outside your front door, a cool house if you have left your door open, a toy which one of your children has left outside (especially if it has become damp), or inside a bag or other item. Please be mindful of what you leave outside.

**Venom** - Males venom contains a unique component called Robustoxin (dAtracotoxin-Ar1) which affects the nervous systems of humans and monkeys (so dogs, cats, chickens etc are safe from funnel web bites - their bodies neutralise the toxins). The absence of this chemical from female funnel web spiders could explain why bites from females have not caused any deaths. However not all funnel-web species show such a large gender based difference in venom-toxicity.

Venom First Aid - The Sydney funnel web's fangs are fixed, so in order to envenomate, it has to rear up, and strike downwards. This means bites normally take place on a limb. The recommended first aid (as for a snake bite too) is pressure and immobilisation. A pressure bandage should be applied as soon as possible after the bite has occurred, this compresses surfaces tissues and reduces muscle movements, greatly slowing the lympatic flow. The patient should be keps quiet and still and medical attention sought. If possible, keep the spider for positive identification.

**Positive identification** - In this area we get several types of spiders that, to the untrained eye, could be mistaken for Sydney Funnel web spiders. There are the Sydney brown trap-door spider and the Mouse Spider. The most obvious difference between the Sydney funnel web and the others is the four spinnerets on the end of the abdomen amd an obvious conical projection (or spur) on the lower side of the middle segment of the second leg.

**Venom Collection** - Sydney Reptile Park would like you to catch any funnel webs you find. If you



are brave they can be caught by placing a glass jar on the ground on its side and coaxing the spider to move into it with a stick. Once its inside, tip upright. Funnel web spiders can't jump or crawl up glass so you should be safe to pop on the lid. Then find some cotton wall, soak it in water and put inside and seal the jar. There should now be enough moisture and air to organise to drop off at the closest drop point which is Hornsby Hospital, Palmerston Rd, Hornsby. Spiders can be dropped at Reception or Emergency, 24 hours per day, 7 days per week. Other drop points are Windsor - Hawkesbury City Council Offices, George Street Windsor, Monday - Friday 9-5pm or Westmead Hosptial Entomology Dept, Monday-Friday 9-5pm. Or you can drop directly at the Australian Reptile Park in Somersby. Just a final note, if you

Just a final note, if you see a funnel web in your swimming pool, don't assume its dead. They can live for hours under water as they take a bubble of air with them when the fall in.

## Is it Tinnitus ringing in your ears?

Tinnitus is a chronic condition of hearing sounds when there is no external noise present. Unlike hearing loss, there is no way to objectively test for tinnitus. Its existence is only known to the person experiencing the symptoms.

While one-third of the population will have tinnitus at some time in their life, every person describes differing levels of sound, duration and severity.

Anna developed tinnitus after menopause. She describes the sound like cicadas permanently in her head. While she notices the noise during the day, she says her symptoms are more distracting at night when she is trying to sleep.

David has had tinnitus since his mid 30's. He was exposed to loud noise as a young adult when he went shooting on his uncle's farm. David says his symptoms sound like a roar in his ears. But it comes and goes and differs day to day.

If you have tinnitus, it is important to get your hearing checked. 80% of people with tinnitus have a hearing loss. We know that tinnitus is a function of your brain "creating" noise to fill a perceived gap in sound processing. This is often associated with gaps in hearing ability.

A study by the University of Illinois in 2017, found that tinnitus changes the networks in the brain and causes the brain to pay attention more often. This can mean it is less able to rest, making you feel tired.



Recent studies suggest that wearing hearing aids can help to retrain the brain and reduce the impact of the tinnitus. The process takes time, around 8 weeks and gets results for the majority of our clients. This is an exciting development that gives hope to many tinnitus sufferers.



## WHAT AFFECTS OUR WEATHER?

Weather forecasters at the Australian Bureau of Meteorology investigate different climate drivers to forecast the weather. Here are some of the climate drivers they look at.


These forecasts are based on the positive Indian Ocean Dipole (IOD) which is weakening and will likely end in early January while the negative Southern Annular Mode (SAM) is likely to persist until the end of December then rapidly decay.

#### Sea Surface Temperatures

Indian Ocean sea surface temperatures impact rainfall and temperature patterns over Australia. Warmer than average sea surface temperatures can provide more moisture for frontal systems and lows crossing Australia.

#### **Indian Ocean Dipole**

Sustained changes in the difference between sea surface temperatures of the tropical western and eastern Indian Ocean are known as the Indian Ocean Dipole or IOD. The IOD is one of the key drivers of Australia's climate and can have a significant impact on agriculture. This is because events generally coincide with the winter crop growing season. The IOD has three phases: neutral, positive and negative. Events usually start



around May or June, peak between August and October and then rapidly decay when the monsoon arrives in the southern hemisphere around the end of spring

#### Southern Annular Mode (SAM)

The Southern Annular Mode, or SAM, is a climate driver that can influence rainfall and temperature in Australia. The SAM refers to the (non-seasonal) north-south movement of the strong westerly winds that blow almost continuously in the midto high-latitudes of the southern hemisphere. This belt of westerly winds is also associated with storms and cold fronts that move from west to east, bringing rainfall to southern Australia.

The SAM has three phases: neutral, positive and negative. Each positive or negative SAM event tends to last for around one to two weeks, though longer periods may also occur. The time frame between positive and negative events is quite random, but typically in the range of a week to a few months. The effect that the SAM has on rainfall varies greatly depending on season and region.





Their current predictions are January to March 2020 daytime temperatures are likely to be above average. Nights are likely to be warmer than average, except parts of southeast Australia.

Mostly neutral rainfall outlook for January to March. Drier than average rainfall for NSW.

The El Nino or La Nina system is currently 'inactive, which means there is little or no sign of either developing in the coming months.

## NEIGHBOURHOOD SAFER PLACES

Neighbourhood Safer Places are a place of last resort during a bush fire emergency.

They are to be used when all other options in your bush fire survival plan can't be put into action safely.

You should be aware of any Neighbourhood Safer Places in your area, and note them in your bush fire survival plan before a bush fire occurs. You should also know how to get there, as well as alternate routes in case the road is blocked or too dangerous to drive on.

Not all areas will have a Neighbourhood Safer Place. If there is no Neighbourhood Safer Place in your area, you should identify other safer locations you can go to as a last resort. This might include a nearby home which is well prepared, a shopping centre or oval which is well away from the bush.

A Neighbourhood Safer Place is designed as a Place of Last Resort in bush fire emergencies only. Please note that travelling to or sheltering at a Neighbourhood Safer Place does not guarantee your safety.

#### **Remember:**

Your safest option will always be to leave early.

People with special needs, such as the elderly and people with a disability, should always leave before the threat of bush fire.

If it is unsafe to leave the area or stay and defend your property, and the path is clear, you should move to your pre-identified Neighbourhood Safer Place, or other safer location, prior to the impact of a bush fire. Be aware that when you are travelling to your Neighbourhood Safer Place there may be heavy smoke and poor visibility.

It is important that you are familiar with the area. Gather at the Neighbourhood Safer Place location and remain there until the bush fire threat has passed.

The conditions at the Neighbourhood Safer Place may be uncomfortable and you may be affected by heat, smoke and embers.

Water, toilets and food may not be available at the Neighbourhood Safer Place and emergency service personnel may not be present.

Neighbourhood Safer Places are not intended for pets and livestock. The table below shows locations of Neighbourhood Safer Places.

Large animal evacuations centres will open in the event of a bushfire crisis in this area. The centres will be notified, but in the past have included:

Hawkesbury Showground

Castle Hill Showground

Penrith Paceway

Central Coast Show Jumping Club at Mangrove Mountain

Owners are minded that the care of animals including provision of adequate food and water supply as well as full time supervision, remains their responsibility once they arrive at the evacuation centre.

## NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTION RIDE THE ENTIRE M7 BIKE PATH

The M7 Shared Path is the longest separated shared path in Sydney. It zigs and zags alongside, over and under the M7 freeway and is just on 40km long, one way. And, unlike the Toll Road, using it is completely free.

Here are a few more reasons why everyone in Sydney should experience this path :

- One can cycle from Baulkham Hills to Prestons and back (80km!) without having to worry about any motor vehicle traffic whatsoever.
- Not big on scenic beauty or peace and quiet, the path's huge popularity is primarily due to personal safety.
- 3) There are no major hills,\* it is mostly flat or undulating. Now that is a rare find in hilly Sydney! This makes it great for kids, the elderly, family/social groups and novices- in fact anyone who simply wants to enjoy a nice cruise on a bicycle. \* There is a climb, however, which takes you

over and above Elizabeth Road at Western Sydney Parklands. At the crest, the yet-to-beconnected cycle bridge (Exit 41) is where a lot of riders like to stop to admire some panoramic scenery, recover and socialise.

- 4) Now privately managed by Westlink M7, this path was designed to integrate with other cycle/shared path networks on either side of the toll road to facilitate free active transport options, ie: Prospect Reservoir paths from Parramatta, or Richmond Road paths from Marsden Park, or Sunnyholt Road paths via Glenwood and more. Actually, there are 61 entries or exits to the M7 path, so for local residents, (or for people who work at nearby business parks) there is easy, safe access to and from almost anywhere! The 'hop on, hop off' aspect of the M7 path, is one of its major drawcards and makes it possible to ride any distance you feel like; 5km? 50km? 100km?
- 5) This path is totally unique as it is also well-lit, to facilitate using it at night and for general safety and security.

Really, the only criticism I have heard from the cycling community is that there are no drinking water stations along this path's 40km trajectory, other than at the Linkt M7 Control Centre which, according to their map, is at entry/ exit 34, just before Wallgrove Road.

On weekdays you'll have the whole 4m wide path mostly to yourself, but it gets busy on the weekends. Start riding at sunrise if you don't like crowds and bunch riders ! Do be cautious when taking some of the blind bends under or over the Toll Road, because there could be oncoming riders or the occasional pedestrian. Slow down, keep your bike under control and no centre line violations, please!

START & FINISH: I recommend parking or meeting up at Fairmount Crescent, Glenwood. (Just off Norwest Boulevard via Greenhill Drive) Ensure you park in the right place, as Ranger Danger has been known to lurk here.

In February 2016, RMS cycle counters recorded up to 400 cyclists per weekday using the M7 bike path. This number doubles on the weekends. People out cycling have increased since this count.

Ensure your bicycle complies to NSW regulations, as Traffic Police officers do patrol the M7 path on their bicycles occasionally.

From Marsden Park Road, cycling east back to Norwest Boulevard, you will always encounter an annoying headwind, so do pace yourself for the return ride.

Take sufficient fluids and snacks for the path distance you intend to cover.





#### RURAL ROUN By Councilor Warren Waddell

I hope that everyone enjoyed the Christmas break and are now ready for a prosperous 2020. The continuing pressure of bushfire events has no doubt made it difficult for our volunteers, service providers and their families to spend time together, but with any luck, relief is now in sight.

Council arrangements have ensured a prompt response to any issues emerging out of the increased threat to our residents, property or services throughout this period. Council also resolved to make a one off direct contribution of \$10 000 to the RFS.

The December meeting saw Council formally support the draft proposal for the Galston Village Public Domain project allowing us to move forward with further consultation and planning.

The results of the broad consultation with the community as part of the Rural Land Review have gone on public exhibition. Although summary in nature, the

results have provided clearer direction to Council in terms of the next step and drafting of recommendations.

The DA for Galston Aquatic Centre's new roof has come off public exhibition and will now move to the final stages of DA assessment. Once approved the first stage will go out to tender for construction. At that point it will become clearer what level of disruption will occur to the Centre's overall operation.

In the mean time, Councillors will meet in February with

a view to develop strategies for our Shire's future and to advance our priorities for 2020. I will be pushing for results in areas of better communication for rural residents, economic development and tourism strategies, overcoming planning anomalies and best practice in terms of environmental and sustainability policy.

Groundwork has been done in all of these areas but it is time for implementation.

For those of you who are unaware of streaming, it is when content is able to be delivered to computer, mobile devices and/or TV's over the internet. You are able to watch this content when you wish and aren't limited to a specific time. Charges are applied, usually monthly or yearly for these services.

Netflix is probably the best known of the streaming services and offers a comprehensive library of movies and TV shows. Netflix also now produces a lot of its own content which you are unable to watch elsewhere. The Crown, a show about the British monarchy, is a Netflix production. Netflix offers three pricing tiers starting at \$9.99 a month with the most expensive being \$19.99 a month. You are able to get a 30 day free trial if you wish to try before you subscribe.

Disney+ streaming service was launched in November 2019 and includes shows from all the major entertainment franchises it owns. It also offers its own original content. If you are a Star Wars tragic then you might enjoy "The Mandalorian". There is only one pricing for Disney+ at \$8.99 a month or a yearly subscription of \$89.99 per year. They also have a 7 day trial period.

Apple has also released a streaming service called Apple TV+ with a monthly pricing of \$7.99 a month and a 7 day free trial for all new users. Apple is also producing it's own content as well as streaming exclusive TV series and movies. I really enjoyed watching "For All Mankind". If you're into the first walk on the moon this series will really do your head in. But I'm not giving anything away. This is really only the tip of the iceberg when it comes to what's available. There is also Prime Video from Amazon, Stan which is a joint venture of Channel 9 and Fairfax Media. Then you also have Foxtel, Youtube on demand and let's not forget all the catch up TV options like ABC iView, SBS on Demand and others.

To be honest, if you can't find anything to watch it certainly wouldn't be from a lack of content availability. Probably more from overload which probably means you need to go and find a good book to read.







# **PROPOSED NEW TELSTRA TOWER**

The first meeting for the year will be on the 8th February at 2.00pm in History Cottage beside the Honour Roll in Galston Park. Visitors are most welcome.



### DHARUG AND LOWER HAWKESBURY **HISTORICAL SOCIETY**

The Dharug and Lower Hawkesbury Historical Society would like to extend the invitation to the general public to join us as we catch the ferry from Woy Woy wharf to Lintern Channel between Rileys Island and the Saratoga-Davistown peninsula, where we alight from the Lintern Street wharf to begin the Illoura Reserve Walk. Illoura is an Aboriginal word meaning 'a pleasant place' or 'a good camping ground with plenty of food'.

This area of the Illoura Reserve was the location of the largest Aboriginal camp in the district during the days of early white settlement. It was home to a coastal Aboriginal people, whose country stretched from the north side of Sydney Harbour, through Pittwater and Brisbane Waters to the southern end of Lake Macquarie.

Signs of habitation in the Davistown area include a rock shelter and shellfish middens. Evidence of the middens can still be seen on the ground today. The middens were so large that in the years after European settlement, they were excavated to support a lime burning industry supplying the lime for building works in Sydney. This is an easy walk along the foreshore taking in the 9 historic points to Pine Avenue wharf. The walk encompasses remains of indigenous middens, views of Rileys Island, site of the old horse racing track, site of Burramun which became Brisbane Water shipbuilding,

the Cockle Channel and Fienberg's General store from the 1920s. We will then walk up Davistown Road to the Davistown RSL for lunch.

Saturday, 22nd February 2020 10.15am to catch the 10.45am ferry.

Location:- To meet at the Fisherman's Wharf at Woy Woy (a short walk from the train station) to catch the Central Coast Ferry MV Saratoga.

Cost: Ferry fare is \$4.10 senior each way. Must be cash. Plus \$5.00 donation to the Society for maps etc.

Lunch: We suggest the Davistown RSL where we will enjoy a delicious lunch (own expense).

Bookings are essential as the Central Coast Ferry M.V. Saratoga needs to be informed and contact details in case of rain to 0405 321 478 (leave a message) by Tuesday, 18th February 2020.

After lunch we will then catch a courtesy bus back down to the wharf in order to catch the 2.30pm ferry back to Woy Woy. An added bonus at Woy Woy should be the feeding of the pelicans at the end of the day. Bring along snacks, water, sunhat and sunscreen. Sturdy shoes are suggested.

# AUSTRALIAN PLANTS SOCIETY

The first meeting of the Australian Plants Society-North Shore Group for 2020 will be held on Friday,

14 February 2020 at 7-45 pm at the Willow Park Community Centre, 25 Edgeworth David Avenue, Hornsby.

Our guest speaker is Simon Leake.

His topic is: The soils and vegetation of Barangaroo Headland Park

Simon will describe how plantings and thriving vegetation have been successfully established in the public spaces at Barangaroo.

For this project, commonly available recycled inorganic resources (crushed sandstone and recycled sand from building excavation) were combined with composted wood mulch screened from green garden waste collections and used to recreate a three-tiered replacement soil landscape for Barangaroo. The mulch layer or "O" (for organic) horizon would be analogous to the forest litter layer; the topsoil or A horizon, a welldrained sandy soil containing nutrients, organic matter and biological life and the Subsoil or B horizon, a well-drained water holding layer for root anchorage and moisture reserve. https://sesl.com. au/projects/barangarooheadland-park/

Simon is a soil scientist extraordinaire who leads a team with extensive achievements in rehabilitation, reconstruction and renewal of diverse urban projects and mine sites.

### BROMELIAD SOCIETY OF AUSTRALIA FEBRUARY MEETING

The Bromeliad Society of Australia will hold their next meeting at the George Bell Pavilion, Castle Hill Showground on Saturday, 8 February with plant sales commencing at 11am followed by the meeting at 12noon. Access is via the Showground entrance off Showground Road into Doran Drive, Castle Hill, with plenty of parking on site. At this meeting Alcantarea growers will discuss the show ponies of the bromeliad world.

The Alcantarea imperialis are one of the largerst bromeliads and they have a base growing up to 1.5m wide and originated from Brazil.

The plant can take from 8-20 years to flower and it produces a 3m tall flower spike that may last 12 months.

There are many varieties such as - Alcantarea imperialis Rubra, Alcantarea imperialis Purpurea and Alcantarea imperialis Peter Tristram

These giant Bromeliad definitely make a statement and are suitable for pots, the garden, patios and pool areas. They also cope in full sun, cold, wind and are drought tolerant.


In my opinion, one of the greatest achievements of the Landcare movement is in Community building, working with your neighbours on a common goal and pulling together to achieve it. So please, call on your

### **QUESTIONS** By Corrie Bryne Hillslife Church

A Muslim, a Hindu, a Buddhist, an atheist, an agnostic and a Christian walk into a bar ... sounds like the beginning of a joke

But not this time ... in fact I'd like to start this as a reflection.

What if these were the opening lines of a screenplay.

To add authenticity rather than a bar it's a restaurant. A vegetarian restaurant. Maybe set somewhere iconic and cosmopolitan like New York. Try to visualise the scene, a table set for six. Six very different world views. Six very different people. Can you see it?

What do they look like? Are they old or young? Male or female? What is their ethnicity?

When it comes to a screenplay casting is crucial.

Who would be cast as the intellectual? The judgmental one? Peaceful? Compassionate?

What conversations would be had? Would they be hostile or cordial? Would each try to push their own worldview or would they listen to each other?

Would they find common ground?

Focusing on the Christian, who do you have in mind? What character traits? What sort of personality?

Typically Hollywood would cast an older Catholic priest of Irish descent. Maybe an Afro American gospel preacher? Or a college type kid who is a bit boring and avoids all the parties.

Before you read further, I would really like to encourage you to visualise what a Christian is to you. What he or she looks like, talks like, what stands out.

What denomination are they from? What is their theology?

Using the same scene, but with one alteration ... a Muslim, a Hindu, a Buddhist, an atheist, an agnostic and a Christian walk into a vegetarian restaurant and take their seats.

But this time the Christian is the only one speaking. "Hello, my name is Jesus."

Not a Christian from a specific church or denomination, nor a set of theological beliefs shaped over 2000 years ... but the son of God, the Word who became flesh.

How would this change the scene? The conversations ... certainly the atheist would be gob smacked. Agnostic, their questions answered. Even the Muslim would be in shock. The fascinating point in this thought process is the gap between the Christian who first walked in and the arrival of Jesus.

We are all called to accept Jesus as our Saviour, and to increasingly become more Christlike.

Where is your gap?

The gap between you and Jesus?

Is it division in denomination? Theology? Religious? Judgmental? All of us are certainly sinful.

Jesus would have felt right at home in that setting, would not have argued but peacefully chatted.

In fact the only real change that would need to be made is that it is unlikely Jesus would be sat at the table, rather he would more likely have been the waiter!



# EVERY DAY IS NEW YEAR'S DAY

One of the deepest longings in the human heart is the desire to start again, to make a fresh beginning. Such longings are particularly strong as one year gives way to another, but such desires can be experienced at any time.

In our human frailty, we look back on missed opportunities and things left unsaid and undone. We reflect on projects half completed or never even attempted, and we wish that it could be different. We long to make a fresh start, but often people and circumstances can make it difficult to forget the failings of the past and to start again.

In 1810 Governor Lachlan Macquarie of the fledgling colony in New South Wales invited four men to dinner at Government House in Sydney. The four guests were the principal surgeon, D'Arcy Wentworth, and his assistant, William Redfern, Andrew Thompson, a prosperous farmer, and Simeon Lord, a wealthy merchant. The invitation of these men to the Governor's residence was significant because they had all been transported to Australia as convicts, but they had subsequently been granted a full pardon. In extending this invitation, Governor Macquarie wanted to show that these men were not only pardoned, but that they also enjoyed full rights as citizens.

But not everyone supported the Governor's policy. One of his most vocal opponents was the Rev. Samuel Marsden, who is known in Australian history as 'The Flogging Parson'. He believed that the convict stain could never be wiped away and that convicts should never be allowed full civil rights.

The story of Macquarie's

invitation is a beautiful illustration of what God has done for us. His grace not only offers us forgiveness but also the freedom and privileges of being sons and daughters of God. He offers us the potential of a fresh start every day.

The Christian life is a series of new beginnings because God is the God of new beginnings; with Him there is always the chance to start again. That is true because of his character of forgiveness and longsuffering (Micah 7:18-19). It is true also because of his provision and promises, thoughts which are expressed powerfully in a wellknown hymn:

"Pardon for sin and a peace that endureth, Thy own dear presence to cheer

and to guide; Strength for today and bright hope for tomorrow, Blessings all mine, with ten thousand beside."

With God no failure is permanent nor is any mistake beyond remedy. We can start again at any time. Because of God's grace every day can be New Year's Day.

# THIS YEAR - 20/20 VISION Through Jesus Christ

During the last few months, quite a few of our friends have had cataract operations and were so pleased that it made such a huge difference to their eyesight.

One friend explained: "On yearly visits to my eye specialist for a check up after laser treatment, I was told that I had the beginning of cataracts growing in both eyes. I didn't want to know! In my opinion, I could see perfectly!

Each year, my specialist explained that the cataracts had grown - and I continued to push his diagnosis aside, until he said. "It's time!"

I had both eyes done, six weeks apart. I then realised that I could SEE. Everything was clearer, sharper and the colours were vivid.

My eye specialist was right. I should have listened!"

Just as a successful cataract operation helps us see more clearly, having 20/20 vision is a term used to describe clarity or sharpness of vision from a distance of 20 feet. I remember this term being used in conversations. For example: "There's the street we're looking for", one would say- and another person would reply, "You must have 20/20 vision" - meaning that he or she had very good distance eyesight.

Seeing clearly is a vital life skill which affects our decision making, our outlook and quality of life.

Having spiritual vision is also necessary.


Jesus tells us in the Bible that "The eye is the lamp of the body. So if your eye is healthy, your whole body is filled with light." (Matthew 6:22)

With the worst fire season in history unfolding, not just on the East Coast, farmers and homeowners are suddenly realising that preparation is vital.






### Marketing and open homes




