### TREES HAVE MANY BENEFITS LETS PLANT MORE

Planting trees is one of the easiest and cheapest ways of taking carbon dioxide out of the atmosphere. A recent US study identified there is 1.7billion hectares of treeless land in the world, this excludes areas used to grow crops and urban centres. If native tree saplings were planted on this land, scientists estimated that twothirds of carbon emissions from human activities could be removed from the atmosphere.

Trees are also nature's air conditioners reducing the urban heat island effect in our town centres and suburbs. During periods of hot weather, hard dark asphalt and brick surfaces absorb the suns heat and radiate it back. Street trees reduce this by capturing radiation from the sun before it reaches the ground and using the energy for evapotranspiration. It is no surprise that Hornsby CBD

was found to be the hottest place in the Shire while areas with greater tree cover were significantly cooler.

If you still need convincing about the benefits of street trees, living in green leafy suburbs increases the property values. According to Dr Lyndal Plant from the University of Queensland "Home buyers were prepared to pay a significant premium to live in a leafy street and that premium was up to 3%".

The benefits are clear, trees make our suburbs cleaner, cooler and more valuable so let's plant more. Hornsby Shire Climate Action are having our first tree planting for the year on Sunday 8 March at Thornleigh Oval. # GLENORIE PROGRESS ASSOCIATION

#### A FITTING MEMORIAL

Planning is underway to upgrade the Wal Buckingham Memorial Park to include a Hostile Vehicle Barrier Fence. The fence will allow the ANZAC Dawn memorial services to continue at the Cenotaph without the need for traffic diversions on Old Northern Road. This year the ANZAC Dawn Memorial Service will proceed as the Glenorie RSL Subbranch has submitted traffic management plans to divert traffic on Old Northern Rd via Tecoma Drive. If this were to continue every year it would be cumulatively expensive with traffic management costing in the order of \$1500. If anyone has a traffic management capability and is willing to help out, please let Graham Bruce of the Glenorie RSL Subbranch know. While the title "Hostile Vehicle Barrier Fence" conjures up an eyesore, the planners are working hard to ensure that the fence will be complimentary and fitting for the park. The fence will also include a memorial to Ray Whiteman. It was Ray Whiteman who among countless other good deeds, kept the spirit of ANZAC by running the dawn services year after year. We think it would be most fitting therefore that the fence that allows the services to continue is dedicated to Ray. The Hornsby Shire Council, Glenorie RSL Subbranch, Glenorie Memorial Hall Committee and the Glenorie Progress Association are all working on the project together. Please reach out to any

of these organisations to give your input. We will be keeping you updated on the design via this publication as we progress.

#### **CO-WORKING SPACE FOR GLENORIE**

I recently floated the idea of a Co-Working space for Glenorie on Facebook. The response was enormous. It is apparent that many residents of Glenorie would value and utilise a coworking space where they could rent a desk for a few hours or a day, and/or use a meeting room from time to time. Key themes emerged from the feedback. There are many people working from home in the area. Some are professionals, others are doing the books and admin for their partner's business. Some people find working from home full of distraction i.e. they have the urge to clean up, put the washing on or mow lawns when they need to focus on their job. Others mentioned that it can be lonely working from home. Others struggle with slow internet speeds. The Glenorie Memorial Hall has significant amount of unused land behind the hall which could accommodate a co-working space. #### TREE ASSESSMENT

Recent storms have brought down many trees on private and public land in the area. We are grateful that there have not been any reported injuries or deaths from falling trees. One particular tree has been noticed by the community (pictured right). It hangs precariously over Old Northern Rd. While the tree may stand for another 100 years, if it were to fall the consequences could be disastrous, particularly given the near blind summit south of the tree and the fact that cars are travelling at 80km/hr in that area. We have been informed by the public that there are many cases of potentially dangerous trees along Old Northern Rd. Hornsby councillor Warren Waddell has undertaken to organise a risk assessment of trees on major roads on the Hornsby side of Old Northern

Rd. Thank you Warren. How the assessment translates into action remains to be seen, as there are multiple parties involved.

#### PEDESTRIAN SAFETY AT MIDDLE DURAL PUBLIC **SCHOOL**

The Middle Dural Public School P&C have been campaigning pedestrian safety islands on Old Northern Road between bus shelters and Middle Dural Road. The pedestrian safety islands are absolutely warranted. Traffic has increased and the intersection contributes to the danger. The GPA supports the P&C. Robyn Preston member for Hawkesbury and Hills Shire Councilor was recently alerted to the issue and immediately raised it in the Hills Shire Council meeting where it was agreed to inspect the site with the view to making a recommendation to the RMS

A map was also produced showing where koalas have been sighted in the Hills/ Hornsby area since 2018. Great news. As I write this, we have experienced "unprecedented" rain! What a turn around from the horror stretch the east coast has been through recently.

Our Open Day on Australia Day was rather poorly attended, with very few members of the public visiting the park. We are not sure whether it was the fairly warm day, or competing events or activities, or even fear of the Corona virus. Nevertheless, we had a great day with our exhibits, and enjoyed being able to drive the vehicles for a lap around the park. The donors of the Pyramid auto-truck came up to see it and were impressed with our restoration. Our next Open day is ANZAC Day.

The new lathe is starting to prove its worth, with a number of jobs done on it. There is a bit of a learning curve for us 'oldies' mastering the new technology of digital readouts etc.

Good progress is being made on the International truck.

We travelled down to Bywong in late January and brought back the newly made wheels, a major milestone. They will look great when fully painted and stained. We have been working on springs and other items, and some of these have been assembled to the chassis, so it will not be too long before we have a rolling chassis. We have also overcome some of the obstacles encountered on the engine, giving us a confidence boost. We can expect progress on this important item now. Mind you, the project still a loooong way from completion!

## WARRAH

This new decade has certainly gotten off to a rather dramatic start! We have gone from extreme drought, to unfathomable threats of fire and now up to 160mm of rain on a single day. As a result, this season has proved extremely interesting and educational for Warrah's young farming team.

The harvest continued all through the holiday heat with eggplant, tomatoes, cucumbers, capsicum, zucchinis, parsley, kale, salad mix, strawberries and silver beet. And even now with all the rain, we continue to maintain the usual supply of vegetables to our Shop, box schemes and residential houses without too many issues from pests and diseases.

This is because the dry conditions were unfavourable for the usual troublesome insects. We have even had such an abundance of eggplant that we have been able to sell it on to one of the distributors we usually buy from for the Farm Shop. In early February we began harvesting fennel, beetroot and heirloom tomatoes. Pumpkins and watermelon were planted in September, and once the vines die back they will be ready to harvest. We will be planting the last of the summer crops soon and the first of the cold season varieties.

The cows are also thankful for the rain now that the pasture is suddenly plentiful again. We




were pleased to have no storm damage on the Farm itself. The Farm Shop was briefly 'flushed out' with rain water and we lost power along with the rest of the street. We managed to bounce back quickly and, with the help of a generator our regular routine of shop sales, packing house boxes and deliveries to collection hubs around Sydney

and to Billabong Retreat continued uninterrupted. In between it all, we were extremely excited to launch our new website - www. warrahfarmshop.org. au. We especially love the aerial views of the farm and the images showing the exciting opportunities for participants in Warrah Society programs.




# BUSHFIRE **HISTORY**

# ACCINATE PET RABBITS NOW By Nikki McGrath

Hornsby rabbit owners are being urged to vaccinate domestic rabbits prior to the roll out of a feral rabbit baiting program on 18 March 2020.

Led by Greater Sydney Local Land Services with the support of major landholders, local councils and environmental agencies, the program will see the release of the Rabbit Haemorrhagic Disease Virus known as RHDV1-K5.

The virus will be released throughout the Greater Sydney region including Galston and Dural in the Hornsby Shire.

**Greater Sydney Biosecurity** Officer Jacob French said the program adopted an integrated approach to the reduction and management of feral rabbits in known problem areas throughout the region.

"This is the fourth release after the initial national program roll out in March 2017 which has led to a 47 per cent reduction in feral rabbit numbers across NSW. This follow up program ensures we can target new areas and support more landholders and local governments to reduce the impact of these pests," he said.

Mr French said it was important domestic rabbit owners went to their local vets to vaccinate their pets prior to the release.

"The virus is spread mainly by contact between rabbits or via insects such as mosquitos and flies. Importantly, RHDV is only effective in rabbits and if pets are vaccinated they become immune."

"This program is designed to complement ongoing control efforts on private and public land," he said. "We encourage landholders experiencing issues with feral rabbits to continue working with us to roll out coordinated control campaigns in partnership with their neighbours wherever possible," he said.

Feral rabbits are a declared pest in NSW due to the significant amount of agricultural and environmental damage they cause.

They are believed to have contributed to the decline or



extinction of a number of NSW native species including the greater bilby and the yellow footed rock-wallaby and their overgrazing is estimated to cost Australian agriculture more than \$200 million every year.






### 2020 CASTLE HILL SHOW



# THE PERIMETER TRAIL 23KM MOUNTAIN BIKE RIDE: TERREY HILLS

Situated in Terrey Hills, Perimeter is a very popular out and back ride, and you'll encounter both equestrians and walkers along this shared trail. It is situated inside Ku-Ring-Gai National Park. All recreational activity in this specific area is along existing firetrails, but there are two sections of unsanctioned single track that loop on and off these firetrails for the eagle-eyed rider to find and ride enroute.

Plenty of free parking is available at Terrey Hills Community Centre. From here, cycle through the Oval, turning left down Cowrang Road. At the T junction with Nerang Ave, turn right and



head straight down to the trail head and N.Parks gate. You are now on the Perimeter firetrail at the hem of suburbia, and it's a fast rollercoaster which heads mostly downhill. The track is often badly eroded with loose rocks and sketchy gravel in some sections, so unless you have ridden it before, exercise some caution because the downhills are steep and you will send it! There are some fun water crossings to blaze through too. After 3km you'll know where you have to bear right off Perimeter Trail onto Long Track, because there is a truly nasty pinch climb to get up to this intersection.

(you may have to walk up). It lies just below the acreages of Duffy's Forest. Turn right to continue along the firetrail, turn left for some sneaky singletrack. At the 7km mark, Long Track is actually signposted and is an absolute pleasure to ride. The

main reason is because of its terrain and spectacular scenery. Long track winds its way along an elevated ridgeline which reveals the deep topographical crease that contains Smith Creek and beyond that, Cottage Point. It is not long before you reach a rock sheet on the left with a spectacular view of Cowan Creek- Bobbin Head is hidden just over a ridge to the south. It is here where one can enjoy viewing a Sydney sunset in the most immaculate surroundings. (10km) The more intrepid can continue along an increasingly technical and difficult Long Track for another 1km until it unfortunately terminates at yet another spectacular lookout over Cowan Creek. Personally, I hate the disconnected, out and back tedium of Sydney firetrails so I usually enjoy just relaxing at the first lookout while waiting for everyone to return...

On the ride back, everything you rode down, you will have to ride up- and this will add at least 30 minutes to your return ride. Please beware of riders coming down all the hills you are now riding up, and slower walkers and horse riders on the hills you



are now riding down. If Kuringgai National Park had a looping trails network, catering for the volume and diversity of people who enjoy recreating outdoors and love doing their activities in this particular area, the return ride experience would be nowhere near as stressful.

But if you'd like these trails all to yourself, why not consider doing this ride with some friends at night? Leave the shops at 6PM to enjoy the sunset at the first lookout, then turn around and switch on your bike lights to navigate back up to Terrey Hills in complete darkness and perfect solitude.

Disaster assistance is now available to communities heavily impacted by recent storms and flooding.

The Federal Government has today announced this assistance is available for Hornsby and The Hills local government areas.

"The savage storms that ripped through our community at the weekend have had a huge impact on many people and businesses. This funding will assist our community with the recovery effort," said Julian Leeser MP.

Assistance available under the DRFA may include:

- Support for affected local councils to help with the costs of cleaning up and restoring damaged essential public assets
- · Concessional interest rate loans for small businesses, primary producers and nonprofit organisations

## RURAL ROUND UP

Council meetings resumed in February, marking the official start of this term's final year. There is still a great deal of work before us. Council endorsed the Local Strategic Planning Statement, our vision statement for the next 20 years, which is the culmination of 18 months of hard work and intensive community engagement. Our new waste management strategy was also adopted, giving us the best possible outcome considering the many constraints to be negotiated. The transition to new collection days within the rural area

appears to have gone smoothly and residents have become used to the changes.

The real test for Council has been the unusually high number of weather events that have challenged our area. First came the bushfires, then the flooding and more recently high winds. The February events alone have created 305 service requests to date, requiring the engagement of 10 tree crews and the establishment of a direct contact point with Ausgrid to coordinate safe tree removal and to restore power.

As many of you will be aware, the conditions have been very testing for rural residents. Lack of electricity, reduced access to property and safety concerns have extended beyond what many have previously experienced.

However, as testimony to the resourcefulness and resilience of our rural community, I have received minimal complaints. Everybody just got on with it assisting neighbours, engaging generators, pulling out the camping equipment and simply riding it out. It has been a true representation of our community spirit.

Moving forward, Council officers will make a presentation at the AGRA meeting on 3 March. This presentation will highlight the first draft of the Galston Village Public Domain plan and seek input from the community. In keeping with our endorsed strategy for the village, RMS contractors will soon begin work at the Mid Dural Road roundabout to install safe crossing arrangements and complete links with our existing footpaths.

## OFFICIAL OPENING OF HORNSBY HOSPITAL MEDICAL IMAGING DEPARTMENT

The Hon Matt Kean MP Member for Hornsby was joined by his colleague Alister Henskens SC MP in officially opening the Medical Imaging Department at Hornsby Kuring-gai Hospital.

Mr Kean said, "As part of the much needed upgrade we now have the best diagnostic tools for local patients. This upgrade basically doubles the size of the old department and ensures our hospital can provide quality care for our community long into the future. I am thrilled to officially open the Hornsby Hospital Medical Imaging Department!"

For the first time patients can now have a MRI without needing to be transferred outside the hospital. Other new facilities include: a Fluoroscopy Unit and an

Orthopantomogram (OPG). In addition to existing equipment, there is now a new CT scanner, two more X-Ray rooms, and three new Mobile X-Ray units.

"The people of Hornsby can take pride in knowing that we are home to a truly state of the art hospital"

The Fluoroscopy Unit is a new addition which is crucial in monitoring speech and swallowing for stroke patients. This state of the art equipment allows physicians to see the functioning of internal structures both real time and on recordings.

The new Orthopantomogram allows for dental X-Rays and scans, enabling Hornsby Hospital to broaden its operations and eliminate the need for patient transfers.







# MATT KEAN INTERVIEW

Matt Kean, the NSW **Environment and Energy** Minister, very kindly agreed to an interview on January 29. He was very open and passionate in his answers to the following questions.

#### What advice can you give a teenager who would like to take up a career in politics?

Join Young Liberal or Young Labor to get the relationships and learn the skills needed for politics. Try to make a change and don't just be a spectator."

#### Do you believe a career in politics is worthwhile? If so, why?

"Absolutely. There aren't many other jobs that allow you to change the country. It gives you the opportunity to meet amazing people that ordinarily you wouldn't meet, do different things which others don't experience, and travel to so many different

places. Recently I was in a conference in the Netherlands and had the opportunity to visit a nuclear power plant. It was under maintenance at the time! Politics gives you the opportunity to change people's lives in a beneficial way."

#### Do you believe that the voting age should be lowered?

"I'm not against it in principle and would need to think it through first. But there is a need for young people to be given more of a voice. The Liberal party and politics in general need more diversity in age, background and culture."

#### Can you give examples of policies that you have initiated in the electorate that have a direct impact on people my

"I have fought for and delivered the rebuild of Hornsby Hospital, the conversion of a quarry into a Centennial park style park for

the North, saving the Galston Gorge bushland and of course encouraging the Liberal Party to take action on Climate Change."

#### What have you done/is planned in future to save the Wollemi pine forest?

"I personally pushed to protect the forest, which I consider a living fossil, from the bushfires. I had difficult decisions to make, and decided the forest wouldn't be lost on my watch. In the future there will be consideration of enhanced controlled burning and more security for the forest."

#### What is the one initiative that you are most proud of in your career?

"I Stood up for my view on climate change and took a lot of attacks for my stance. I don't always get everything right, but in this instance I have studied the science and understand that we must be

doing more for the future. The Commonwealth/State deal on climate and energy to be announced tomorrow will show consensus about climate change for the first time in the coalition's history."

Roy & Primrose will take us on a stroll through history as we hear the narrative of the planes on display. The logbooks provide the history of the planes on display. In addition there are some amazing anecdotes for some of the planes gathered over time.

After our hosts have answered our many questions we will then proceed over to the Hawkesbury River's edge and gaze at where the remains of a "small wooden ferry that had been on a slipway near the mouth of the Macdonald being repaired had sunk on

20th March 1978". This small wooden ferry had been part of a big adventure the day the Webbs Creek ferry had joined the two ferries at Wisemans Ferry and had come loose and floated off down the Hawkesbury River towards the Hawkesbury bridge. The four ferries latched together by the vegetation pouring downstream and came off their cables and set off along the Hawkesbury during the floods of mid-March 1978.

The small ferry was under repair and had a plank out of the bottom. Whilst the ferry was attached to the other three ferries it was able to remain afloat but as all four ferries came around the bend below Wisemans Ferry they went in a wide circle and the small ferry came loose and ended up in front of the Missions. And there this ferry remains to this day.

## THERE'S AN APP FOR THAT... **AIRDROP**

Have you ever been travelling with friends and would really like to share some of the photos you have taken during the day. You could text them or even email them but the problem is you have no internet service. This is quite common if you are in a foreign country or on a ship in the middle of the ocean.

For those of you who have Apple devices you can use Airdrop to send the photos to your friends. To enable this to happen you need to make sure your Wifi and Bluetooth are on. Note the Wifi doesn't have to be connected to any service. If you are unsure if your Airdrop is on open up your Control Centre and press and hold on the Wifi button. Tap on either Contact only or everyone to turn Airdrop on.

Then go to your photos and select the ones you wish to send. Instead of tapping on messages or email, tap onto the Airdrop symbol. Your friends will need to be nearby and

their iPhone or iPad name should show up on your device. A peer to peer connection is created between the devices.

Your friends then get the choice to accept the picture(s) which are then automatically put into their Photos

The real benefit of Airdrop is that you only have to take one picture of the group instead of multiples on different devices. (Of course, this only works if everyone has an iPhone or iPad). Enjoy sharing!

## NORTHHOLM GRAMMAR SCHOOL THE POWER OF STUDENT-TEACHER RELATIONSHIPS By Chris Bradbury



A month in to the new School year and the early relationship and connection a student has with their teacher is starting to take shape. In some cases, the immediate impact a new teacher has made on their students is already clear to parents and carers. In conversation with parents and carers, positive first impressions typically reference high expectations, a caring and nurturing environment,

high energy or a strong command of curriculum. In other cases, parents comment that their child is still trying to 'work the teacher out'. In our experience at Northholm this is a positive perspective. Teacher-Student relationships can take time to develop. Quite often a demanding approach to excellence can be initially met with some apprehension. However, we know that great learning should

be uncomfortable and challenge is critical to scholarship.

Our best teachers are more likely to facilitate motivation and engage high achieving students if they frame their practice in relational terms. and how to plant them. Local species will be recommended because they survive better

Fires have been more intense since the indigenous mosaic burning practices ceased. But now with climate change, they will likely become more intense in future years. For long-lived trees, some consideration will be given to more resilient species.

If you have not participated, call us to find out more. If you have previously had native plants from us and some have died from drought or washed away in storms, contact us again to top up.

# GOD IS LIGHT AND THERE IS NO **DARKNESS IN HIM** - NONE

Have you ever spent time in your back garden, gazing at the sky? On a cloudy day, maybe you've seen pictures in the clouds or on a starry night vou've looked for constellations like 'The Southern Cross'? When the sun shines brightly in a cloudless sky, the blue of the sky is a beautiful shade! Our sun 'is a star in the centre of our solar system which gives off energy as light.' (Wikipedia)

At the beginning of time, on the first day of Creation in Genesis, God created light to dispel the darkness that was all over the world

(Genesis 1:1-5). Then He created the lights in the skysun, moon and stars. (Genesis 1:14-16).

When the bible tells us in 1John 1:5 that 'God IS Light', it means that light is the nature and character of God. He doesn't CONTAIN light or HAVE light. He is not simply one kind of light - He IS light.

God is the Creator of physical light as well as the Giver of spiritual light, by which we can see Truth. There is no darkness at all in Him.

A way to understand more about who God is, would be by understanding what light is. What light does, God does and how light helps us in our daily lives, God can accomplish in our lives as well.

One of the main properties of light is that it illuminates what is already there. For example, in the middle of the night when it is pitch black and we need a drink of water from the kitchen, we switch on a light to show us the way. The kitchen and our furniture has been there all the time, but we can't see it till the light is on.

The Cambridge dictionary defines the word 'illuminate': ' to explain and show more clearly something that is difficult to understand.'

God may seem difficult to understand, but He illuminated His character of light (pure love, holiness and goodness), through the person of Jesus Christ, His Son, who said, 'I am the light of the world. He that follows Me shall not walk in darkness but shall have the light of life.' (John 8:12).



So, let's put some light on this subject!

#### From Fires to Floods







#### **New Lights Donated**



## ARCADIA RURAL FIRE BRIGADE FROM FIRES TO FLOODS By Peta Gormly



From fires to flooding rains, Arcadian crews have been busy since November 2019.

Our members have been assisting with the firefighting effort throughout all areas of NSW since August, but it ramped up from November, starting with fires in the Mid-North Coast. Arcadia brigade assisted with the protection of property at many locations, including Rainbow Flats. The Gospers Mountain Fire then had our attention, we had crews out on strike teams day and night shifts for many weeks, the brigade was also engaging with the community and making property assessments. One of our night crew's set up property protection unbeknownst to them, at the family home of one of Arcadia's cherished former members. It sent goosebumps through the crew.

The response to this fire within the Arcadia community was astounding. Residents were vigilant with their fire plans, revising them and even running through them with all their family members. This response

and understanding of the area in which we live in, made us confident that the community was listening and reading the information and warnings coming from NSW RFS. We are thankful that these fire plans did not need to be activated. The brigade also had strike teams on standby at the FRNSW training facility in Orchid Hills with crews being responded to the Green Wattle, Bilpin, Mt Tomah and Mt Wilson fires. Christmas and Boxing Day Arcadia members were out in the Blue Mountains strengthening containment lines one day and providing property protection the next. As we entered the New Year Arcadia continued to provide support, this time further south being deployed to Nowra, Goulburn and Cooma.

During these trying times our community rallied around and supported us. We have been overwhelmed with the generosity and kindness of our neighbors, who donated water and snack packs to the brigade, which were very welcome as

many times they were used for meals during the long days. We experienced the Arcadian community spirit on multiple occasions, and it was wonderful to see how people were finding ways to help. We also received very generous donations from local businesses and individuals, these we promptly used on updating some of our equipment, with immediate use on our deployments.

An important aspect in our training is first aid assistance. On multiple occasions during these deployments our crews have been required to perform CPR, utilize the Oxy Viva, and use the AED. We would like to draw focus on how important these skills are, and that they are very effective. First aid training is readily available to everyone in the public and you never know when you might need it, but there may be times where having those skills will change the

outcome for someone in need. We can report back happily that the people we were able to assist recovered fully.

In February we received a lot of rain, which saw crews turning from firefighting duties to storm damage assistance. Crews assisted NSW SES with several trees down in the local Arcadia area and out towards the Eastern Suburbs. Again, we saw the community come together and act safely in these dangerous conditions. When the members weren't out on strike teams or deployments it was training as usual at the fire station.

This article is dedicated to the selfless firefighters and aviators that tragically lost their lives whilst protecting communities throughout the 2019/2020 NSW fire season. Their dedication, passion and skills have helped countless people and won't be forgotten.

The long running fire season of 2019-2020 has finally eased and has seen Glenorie Brigade move from being continuously operational fighting fires throughout NSW and southern Old, to storm damage control and mitigation in the local area. The prayed-for rains have brought massive relief with all fires in NSW now classified as being out or under control.

This break in fire protection has allowed the brigade to move forward with postponed training, activities and planning for the future.

Currently, we have ten new trainees participating in preparation for bush fire fighting assessments. Volunteers are the backbone of the Rural Fire Service and it is members of the community from whom we build our brigade. If you have been considering joining the Rural Fire Service, come along and see what it is we do and how you can be a part of it, new volunteers are always welcome.

Regular training is important to ensure members' skills are ready for an emergency. Recent training with Hillside brigade involved pumping exercises, practicing drafting from static water sources and transferring between trucks, a skill set often needed on the fire ground.

To you, the community, we thank you for the support and contributions that have kept us going; the water, food and financial assistance that is essential to keep the brigade up and running. Careful planning is now under way as to how to best utilise the resources going

The rains may have brought some relief from the severe fire warnings, but it is important to remember that the fire season continues until March 31st and any pile burns until that time will still require a permit.
