
- Buy a takeaway dinner at least once a week if you can afford it, more if you like. This will help the owners of the local cafes and restaurants pay their rent and feed their families.


There are a few COVID19 opportunities to take advantage of:

ANZAC DAY DAWN SERVICE

Message from RSL NSW State Acting President:

Following further discussions with the NSW Government, RSL NSW has made the decision to cancel all public ANZAC Day commemoration services across the State. The risk to vulnerable people during the current health situation is simply to high for these events to continue in their traditional format.

Given the significant concerns around the spread of COVID-19, it would be irresponsible to allow such large gatherings as we see each year on ANZAC Day to go ahead. This is not a decision we have taken lightly. The RSL has a responsibility to act in the best interests of veterans and the general public. In these uncertain times we must follow the advise of medical experts and do everything we can to protect the community.

ANZAC Day as a marker of our respect and admiration for ANZACs past and present will still be observed. Exactly what form this will take will be different from previous years, but as custodians of commemoration, the RSL will still honour the service and sacrifice of our brave servicemen and women. In these challenging times, we will remember them.

The issue of horse riding on roads was raised. Commuters need to be aware that horses are







COVID-19 SOLE TRADER UPDATE

Under temporary changes to social security rules, sole traders are being encouraged to keep their business operating and should their earnings take a significant downturn, to access income support.

The measures announced to assist sole traders are as follows:

- The ATO will credit any PAYGI Instalments paid as a result of the September 2019 and December 2019 Quarterly BAS and potentially refund these amounts.
- Centrelink Benefits:
 - If your income has reduced by 20% then you are eligible for Jobseeker Payments (\$550 per fortnight) and the new supplement of \$550 per fortnight.
 - If eligible for Job Seeker access to additional payments 2 x \$750 (April/July)
 - Not applicable if accessing employee entitlements or income protection insurance.
 - Asset testing has been waived.
 - Income testing remains the same.
 - Applies to employees if they have been stood down.
 - Waiting periods have been reduced.
- How to Claim Centrelink Benefits:
 - Users with myGov accounts now able to lodge intent to claim without a pre-existing CRN or having Centrelink accounts already linked to their myGov account.
 - All claims will be back paid to Monday, if that is when they were stood down.
 - Separation Certificates are no longer required.
 - Jobseekers will be required to sign a declaration

that they are stood down or experiencing loss of income.

- Access to Early Release Superannuation - \$10k before 30 June 2020 and \$10k after 1st July 2020
- Instant Asset write off up to \$150k per asset – only until 30 June 2020
- Working Capital Unsecured loans up to \$250k which are subject to reduced bank assessment requirements.

COVID-19 – Small Business Update

The Australian Government is supporting business to manage cashflow due to the COVID-19 crisis. The measures announced to assist small business are as follows:

Boosting Cash Flow for Employers

Boosting Cash Flow for Employers provides up to \$50,000 back to small and medium business who employ staff. The payment is calculated on the PAYG lodged by the business during the March and June quarters. It will be delivered by the ATO as a credit once the March and June BAS's have been lodged. In addition to this payment, businesses will receive a further payment of \$20,000 -\$100,000 based on the March and June quarters.

Enhancing the instant asset write-off

The instant asset write-off threshold is increasing from \$30,000 to \$150,000 for new or second-hand assets first used, or installed ready to use from 12th March 2020 until 30 June 2020. For purchases made prior to this date the \$30,000 limit applies.

Backing business incentive

To support short-term business investment and economic growth, for assets purchased from 12th March 2020 until the 30th June 2021 you will be able to take advantage of accelerated depreciation. A deduction of 50% of the cost of an eligible asset on installation will apply, with existing depreciation rules applying to the balance of the cost of the asset.

Supporting apprentices and trainees

For businesses that employ less than 20 full-time employees and retain apprentices or trainees, you can apply for a wage subsidy of 50% of the apprentices wage for the 9 months from 1st January 2020 until the 30th September 2020 up to \$21,000 per apprentice.

Unsecured Loans of \$250k

Government in a 50/50 cooperation with the banks to provide new unsecured loans up to \$250k to be used as working capital.

Government are guaranteeing repayment of 50% of the loan.

- 3 year loans
- Maximum amount of \$250k
- Unsecured loan ie no assets required to support it is a cashflow loan
- Still subject to the banks (or other lenders) credit assessment processes.
- Government prefers it be a drawdown facility ie used if needed
- Must be applied for by 30 September, 2020

Action Plan (Small Business + Sole Traders)

- Business and Family Enterprise Ombudsman)
- 1. Perform a Cashflow Budget
- 2. Talk to suppliers (Their intentions and their supply line)
- Talk to your lenders about finance repayments – seek deferrals
- 4. Talk to your Landlord and discuss rental commitments
- 5. Discuss with the ATO any deferral of lodgements required or additional payment plans
- 6. Speak with your staff can you keep them on and how to operate
- 7. Consider doing business differently

The information is changing rapidly as the government tries to assist the many Australian's that have been affected by COVID-19. It is important to remember if you are sole trader, any payments/ credit will only be made by the ATO once all BAS's have been lodged. 

Our very active small engine man has restored to working order another engine, a 2HP hit-and-miss Rosebery. The engine was donated to us by Bob Middleton, who was well known in the district, and the donor of a number of artefacts to our collection. These engines were made in Australia (at Rosebery, Sydney – where else!) from the 1920's right up to post war, and were common in old cement mixers and in many other applications, and were sold under many names – Buzacott, Champion, Britstand, to name a few. You will have to come to an Open Day to see and hear it running, and to get an explanation of what is meant by "hit-and-miss".

We recently hosted a tour of the museums by a group known as TOFS – you should look up what that means! They clearly enjoyed the visit and posed for the attached photo.

Last month I reported good progress on the International truck with the arrival of the wheels. However, preparation for painting and staining these is proving painstaking in the extreme, and it will be a while before they are finished. We are very conscious of the big investment they represent and want to ensure the end result is of a high standard. In the meantime, work proceeds on assembly of the chassis with steering components now in place, and on the engine, which is also being reassembled.



For those of you who already play Bridge this App helps you sharpen your skills at both declarer's play and defence before jumping in to play duplicate bridge against live opponents.



ROYAL COMMISSION SUSPENDS ALL PUBLIC EVENTS

The Royal Commission into Violence, Abuse, Neglect and Exploitation of People with Disability has suspended public hearings, due to concerns about the spread of COVID-19 coronavirus.

The Chair Ronald Sackville AO QC said after careful consideration, the Commission has postponed the following hearings:

- Education scheduled for next week in Brisbane, Queensland,
- Justice scheduled for April in Brisbane, Queensland
- First Nations People with disability scheduled for May in Alice Springs, Northern Territory.

'The Commission has suspended all other public events until further notice.

'We had already decided to postpone community forums that were to be held in Tasmania this week.

'Face to face private sessions have also been suspended for the time being.

"The Commission's over-riding responsibility is to protect, as far as possible, the health and safety of people with disability, members of staff (who include people with disability) and the community at large. 'The Commission has decided that these measures are necessary in view of the risks to health, especially to people with disability who are often particularly vulnerable to infections,' said the Chair.

The Royal Commission has been contacting all those directly affected, such as witnesses and people who have registered for community forums, to inform them of the decision.

The Commission is considering the implications of this situation for its timetable.

'There is a great deal of important work that can and will continue despite the postponement of some of the Royal Commission's activities. For example, Issues Papers will still be published and preparations for future hearings will progress.

'People can continue to tell the Royal Commission about their experiences of violence, abuse, neglect and exploitation. They can do this in any way they choose, by phone, in writing or by making an audio or video recording.

'We will continue to provide regular updates on our website, our newsletter and on our social media channels,' said the Chair.

54KM ROAD RIDE THE SACKVILLE LOOP **A RIVER RUNS THROUGH IT...**

By Susanna Mills

This month's road ride is a 54km loop, with the Hawkesbury River meandering through the centre. Starting in the historic town of Windsor, we cross the controversial bridge over the Hawkesbury River. We pick up the pace along Wilberforce Road, which is floodplain flat and bordered by grass farm quilts hemmed by the beautiful Blue Mountains to the west. Although this road is always busy, we are able to enjoy the manicured scenery by seeking refuge on the generous road shoulder, only really having to merge into the traffic lane once, at the bridge, just before entering Wilberforce Village. At the traffic lights we turn right onto King Road and face our first slog up through the last remnants of suburbia until we finally leave it all behind, enjoying a lovely fast roller coaster (mostly downhill) passing Ebenezer and Tractor Cafe in quick succession, until we encounter the Sackville Ferry. (14km)

The river isn't very wide here, so it is not long before we are setting up our drive trains for easy gears, disembarking with a wave and a nod to the ferrymen, to cycle up a 10km climb away from the river valley. If you pace yourself well, the Sackville Road

hill climb can actually be the best part of this ride! The road ascends gently but persistently up a verdant riverine ridgeline at first, transitioning to drier bushland on both sides of the road as you ascend. Bushland becomes acreage and soon we are regrouping with the faster climbers at the intersection of Wisemans Ferry and Sackville Roads. (25km)

It is along this lovely, silky smooth ribbon of road (Sackville Road to River Oaks Estate entrance) that you can seriously mix it up if you are bunch riding, averaging 35-40km/h if you have the legs to maintain speed. Unleash the adrenaline junkies off the front as the road twists and turns sharply down past the golf course, and regroup at Halcrows Road after the swampy S-bends of Little Cattai Creek. (36km) Enjoy cycling along more excellent, undulating road with immaculate shoulders, crossing Cattai Creek bridge, past Longneck Lagoon and the acreage outskirts of Pittown until the dovetail intersection of Cattai Road with Old Pittown Road on the left. (just before the final straight along Eldon Street into the village: 42km).

Although Old Pittown Road is a narrow, sometimes poorly maintained road, it is quiet and

you can enjoy chatting to your fellow riders or just appreciate your surroundings. Old Pittown Road does ascend up to the centre of Schevville National Park however, but you will be crossing Scheyville Road before you know it and enjoying more untouched National Parks bushland following the ridgeline along Old Pittown Road. Turn right off the ridge and head down Saunders Road, taking the first left into Oakville Road. (48km) Ride straight past Oakville Public School to the traffic circle, continuing along Oakville Road, then ride up the little rise on Wolseley Road past Arndell Anglican College on the left. Continue straight through the dip to Havelock Street on the left. (51km) I like to ride back via the wide, leafy suburban streets of Mcgrath's Hill, crossing the very busy A2 via pedestrian traffic lights opposite Mulgrave Road intersection. Ride the last kilometer in peace along the A2 bike path back into Windsor central and have a well-earned coffee at any of the many cafes along George Street!

FACTBOX

THE SECRET LIFE OF POWERFUL OWLS

Byles Creek Valley environmentalists Michael Bianchino and Georgia Cameron revealed the Secret Life of Powerful Owls to a captive audience including Mayor Ruddock and three Councillors at Hornsby Library on **Saturday 7 March.**

The fully-booked interactive event included original music, photos and videos designed to entertain and educate participants on Australia's largest owl, Ninox strenua, which resides in parliaments across the Bushland Shire.

Despite its impressive wingspan of up to 140cm and daily diet of a Ringtail Possum or Flying Fox, this nocturnal apex predator is a threatened species with a vulnerable conservation status in NSW.

A highlight of the presentation was a remarkable rescue, rehabilitation and release story of prematurely fledged Powerful Owlet 'Bethany' with special guests Dr Beth Mott of Birdlife Australia's Powerful Owl Project and Deb Fleet a local Sydney Wildlife volunteer carer.

Photographer and musician Mr Bianchino said it was a real hoot to see Mayor Ruddock and Councillors Browne, Heyde and Waddell attend the talk.

"But sadly recent mapping by BirdLife Australia estimated that a third of Powerful Owl habitat has been lost in the recent bushfires," Mr Bianchino said. Author of the 'Mikey the Powerful Owlet' books Ms Cameron said we've also suffered an unprecedented loss of Powerful Owls locally this summer – an adult male through roadkill and three juvenile Owlets, one as a result of electrocution on power lines.

"We urge Council to support the local Powerful Owl Project and Sydney Wildlife through a small grant to enable community education and encourage more citizen scientists to get involved," Ms Cameron said.

"Even a symbolic gesture such as adopting the Powerful Owl as the faunal emblem of Hornby Shire could go a long way to recognising the significant role this majestic raptor plays in our local environment," she said.

Councillor Heyde said it's incredibly exciting that these huge owls make Hornsby Shire their home – they bring joy and wonder into our lives.

"Council should do everything it can to protect them," Cr Heyde said.

The event raised another \$155 through gold coin donations for Sydney Wildlife, bringing the duos fundraising total for wildlife charities including Birdlife Australia, Currumbin Wildlife Hospital Foundation and Higher Ground Raptors to over \$6,000 with the support of the local community.

HEALTH ADVICE ON CORONAVIRUS

Our Government is taking all possible steps to protect the health of Australians and the economy. Our actions have first been to initiate travel restrictions on the basis of expert medical advice. This has helped to first contain and now slow the spread of the virus in Australia.

Australia's Coronavirus Emergency Response Plan was initiated on the 27 February 2020 two weeks ahead of the World Health Organisation declaring a pandemic. We will continue to stay ahead of this and get through as a country.

Each of us can help minimise the spread of the virus by doing three key things:

- Wash your hands frequently with soap and water
- Cover your cough/sneeze and dispose of tissues
- Avoid contact with others if you are unwell

You only needed to get tested for

COVID-19 if you have developed symptoms and have returned from overseas in the previous 14 days or if you have been in contact with someone with COVID-19 and develop symptoms.

If you are in either of these categories, self-isolate and call ahead before visiting your doctor, hospital or a clinic to be tested.

If you have returned from overseas or have been diagnosed with COVID-19, you must remain in self-isolation for the full 14 days.

Visit health.gov.au or call 1800 020 080 for the Australian Government's latest information and advice about the national response to COVID-19 and health.nsw.gov.au for the NSW Government's latest health advice and the situation in our state.

SEEDS OF HOPE FOR NSW KOALAS

To celebrate World Wildlife Day, the NSW Government has announced six new koala habitat restoration projects, which include planting 50,000 koala feed tree seedlings, in the Northern Rivers and Far South Coast regions.

Environment Minister Matt Kean said he was pleased to provide up to \$150,000 in funding to a wide range of organisations, including Lismore City Council, Friends of the Koala, Far South Coast Landcare Association, Border Ranges-Richmond Valley Landcare Network and Bangalow Koalas to restore koala habitat.

"While we're still determining the full impact of this season's bushfires on koalas and other wildlife, we know that more than 25 per cent of koala habitat in eastern NSW was affected by fires," Mr Kean said.

"By planting more trees and restoring habitats, we can help our koalas and other native animals recover from these devastating bushfires.

"These projects also acknowledge the passion of our regional communities and local organisations, who spend their time and money caring for their local koala populations and getting involved in tree planting, weed control and site preparation activities.

The NSW Koala Strategy, which provides \$44.7 million




in funding, is the biggest commitment by any State government to secure koalas in the wild. It sets out the NSW Government's long-term goal to stabilise then increase koala populations across NSW.



WISEMANS FERRY MENS (& WOMENS) SHED 'THE DON'T WORRY TOUR' TO WINDSOR

On a steamy Wednesday morning in late February the intrepid travellers from the Wisemans Ferry Men (& Womens) Shed set off in the Community bus to explore the past in Windsor the third-oldest place of British settlement on the Australian continent. Settlement was first established circa 1791; this area was known as the 'Green Hills'. The town was proclaimed in 15th December 1815, and Governor Lachlan Macquarie renamed the town nostalgically Windsor due to it's resemblance to 'Windsor-onthe-Thames'

So what could possibly go wrong? For starters the airconditioning refused to kick start, then the bus came perilously close to running out of petrol just before Pitt Town. None of us could stop laughing. It was hilarious. We all felt like we were in the scene from 'One Flew Out Of the Cuckoo Nest' when McMurphy (Jack Nicholson) steals the hospital bus from the mental institution, escaping with several other patients to go on a fishing trip. During all this frivolity we

explored cemeteries, stopped at the "commodious inn" Macquarie Arms Hotel built in 1815 with convict labour in Thompson Square (the oldest public square in Australia dating back to 1795) located at the top end of Windsor and during colonial times visitors and locals witnessed convict floggings, hangings and even the sale of a wife!

We toured the historic township looking at the Georgian buildings such as John Tebbutt's Observatory famous for discovering the 'Great Comet of 1861', the Windsor Court House, St. Matthews Anglican Church (Francis Greenway's most outstanding building), and opposite this church was a beautiful park which we thought was called McOuade Park but on further inspection saw the sign 'Don't Worry Oval'. From that moment on, that became our theme for the rest of the day.

There were several attempts that morning to visit the Hawkesbury Central Library to see a couple of exhibitions, but we couldn't work out the correct entrance or where to park. Suddenly we



came across the underground car park and as we were about to enter a voice shouted from the back of the bus to stop! We narrowly missed decapitating the bus. So consequently, the visit to the library was aborted. Lunch at the local Chinese restaurant beckoned instead. The 'Don't Worry Tour' continued in the afternoon to beautiful Ebenezer to visit the historic Tizzana Winery established in 1887 by Florence-born surgeon Dr Thomas Fiaschi who imported French and Italian vine cuttings and began the early stages of what we now call boutique wines. We listened to the history of the winery before learning about and then tasting the Tizzana wines.

It was a tough way to spend the afternoon, but we somehow managed to continue the 'Don't Worry' theme. To complete the day we had a quick stop on our way back to Wisemans Ferry at Hawkins Lookout. A photo with the undaunted travellers looking out at the mighty Hawkesbury River.

The budding sportsman trains weekly at the Tennis Australia National Academy at Olympic Park and when he's not on the court, you might see him playing viola in the School's concert band.

Ryan's biggest accomplishment to date was being one of only four kids selected by Tennis NSW to attend the Australian Open in Melbourne for the Super 10's National Camp. There, he played other top juniors from other states around the nation.

Ryan continued his momentum by making it into Christian Schools Sports Association and had to play to get into the NSW Combined Independent Schools Sports Council trials. He was undefeatable and won all seven of his matches on the day! This achievement was made even more special when parents Lawson and Loris were told that Ryan was the first ever one handed backhand player to make it into the CIS team. Not only that, Ryan was the number one ranked player in NSW for his age group last year!

Despite his massive achievements, Ryan is determined to keep his feet on the ground.

"Even though I'm number one, it's just a ranking point. My parents say to be humble so I just say being number one is a number next to my name".

As for his future goals, Ryan has his sight set on going to the Nationals and provided on how well he goes in the CIS, will get to train in Perth.

"I'd like to be one of those well-known players like Roger Federer and get world grand slams".

STILL CREEK LANDCARE MAKE SURE YOUR PLANTS DON'T ESCAPE!

In gardens, some people plant non-natives (exotic plants) only. Some have natives only, and some have an interesting mix. Whatever your preference, most gardens are beautiful and provide a source of endless enjoyment. But consider this.....

Since 1770, when James Cook arrived and announced he had discovered Australia, wide areas of our native bushland have been invaded by exotic plants. Examples are privet, lantana, blackberry, wandering jew (Trad), seaside daisy, passionfruit, honeysuckle, agapanthus, pampas grass, cotoneaster, ochna, bamboo, Formosan lily, mother of millions, bridal creeper. Each year bushcare volunteers, property owners, farmers, National Parks staff, Councils and Landcare members spend countless hours and millions of dollars trying to get rid of these weeds.

Surprisingly, 90% of all weeds were once grown only in people's gardens and have escaped into the bush. So how did they do that?

Nature is very cunning and has given plants many ways of spreading:

- Roots can grow underground into nearby bushland
- Some plants such as grasses, fireweed, fleabane have windblown seeds
- Seed is washed into bush by water after heavy rain
- Seeds remain fertile in bird and animal poo and is spread far and wide
- Seeds stick to clothing and animal fur
- Then there are those awful people who dump stuff in the

bush. I recently removed a pile of cotoneaster branches covered in red berries from the bush near the end of Crosslands Road.

So how can we prevent garden escapes?

- Don't grow exotic plants that are known to be hard to control e.g. fishbone fern, seaside daisy, common couch, honeysuckle, jasmine, any plant with windblown seed.
- Cut spent flowers off before they go to seed, especially agapanthus, cassia, Formosan lily.
- Cut seed heads off plants with windblown seed like pampas grass.
- Help the community by removing weeds from bushland near your place, with the owner's permission.

• Never dump garden waste in the bush or on roadsides.

David with the help of other brave firefighters were instrumental in putting the containment lines in around Narooma, which as we know were very successful. Asked had he seen injured animals to which he replied not many, but in Narooma they had to contend with Funnel Web spiders and the occasional snake. Not only did the Galston Fire Brigade fight fires this summer but also attended to the many fallen trees due to the wild weather in February. The Brigade was also deployed to search for a reported car that had been washed into Sallaway Creek, Galston

Our President Sue Montgomery thanked David for a wonderful presentation, then David, his crew and the club members enjoyed supper and an informal chat. It was a wonderful night enjoyed by many.

So, now I'm looking at my quietest Easter in... forever! But, we're all in this together.


At Galston Uniting we're now busily thinking of ways we

Arcadia 1 Alpha is one of two trucks at Arcadia station and has been part of the local community for nearly 20 years. It is well known as being the workhorse of the brigade. It has been a reliable truck, mainly known for its off-road driving capabilities, and has been on numerous strike team deployments. The 2019/2020 fire season called upon Alpha many times, and the truck was deployed all over the state. However, the time has now come for the brigade to farewell the truck and prepare it for its journey to a new brigade.

The brigade received Arcadia 1 Alpha in 2001. Since then it has attended 1500+ operational activities, from motor vehicle accidents, bush fires, structure fires, to multiple day deployments in and out of our local area. Hundreds of people that have been able to experience sitting in a real fire engine at community events and we like to think that we have inspired the next generation of brigade members. Despite the trucks mature age on paper, it has been well looked after and will be sent to another brigade to carry on its working life.

On the **4th of March**, Arcadia picked up our new category 1 tanker. This new truck is only 1 of 3 new generation vehicles in service in the state. It will further extend the brigades firefighting capabilities across a variety of incidents with improved technology, increased storage while providing additional safety improvements for the members. The new truck is out in our local area and if you see us feel free to come and say hello and have a look through it.

In other news, you may have seen a number of trucks in the Berrilee area over the past few weekends. Crews from Arcadia and other brigades in the Hornsby district have started hazard reduction preparations. Hazard reduction burns are one of the many useful tools the service employs to assist in minimising fuel loads. Residents can also minimise the fuel loads around their homes and other assets through mechanical means. This includes garden maintenance, general home maintenance, mowing lawns, and removing hazardous objects away from the home. 
