The club was started by Barbara Cummins on private land. As the club began to grow Barbara asked Local Council member, Les Shore, if there might be a suitable site for the Pony club to relocate to within the electorate. Thirty acres of Crown land in Schwebel Lane, Glenorie was suggested and is now known as 'Dilkera Reserve'.

Over the ensuing years, membership of the club has grown considerably. Still, the founding spirit of Glenorie Pony Club has been retained, fostering an atmosphere of fun and enjoyment, while encouraging the more ambitious riders to strive for success. In 2020, the club boasts a staggering eight second generation families as well as an abundance of new and long standing family members.

In December 2003, bush fires swept through the area, destroying the cross country course and trails, as well as the sheds and all the club equipment. Shortly after the fires, in true club spirit, the members rallied together and raised funds to rebuild the facilities that were lost in the fire, restoring them to the high standard they are today.

In 2016 the club, along with support from the Hills Shire Council, built a new clubhouse to replace the initial dwelling. The grand opening was celebrated by members past and present, including many former committee members and presidents.

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July Rent Review: When you don't see eye to eye...

As I get older, I realise that not everyone will judge the perfect sunrise as perfect and sometimes, no matter how hard we try, there are times when landlords and tenants won't see eye to eye. Sometimes the issues that are only minor to one person can have a major impact on the other. For instance, I'm not a great cook, therefore it wouldn't really worry me if my oven didn't maintain heat at the perfect temperature required to bake a great cake, but to a tenant who loves to spend the time baking, having a perfectly functioning oven is an absolute imperative to them.

I spent a great part of my early real estate career focused on sales, because I enjoyed helping people sell their home and move on in their life, as well as a great deal of pleasure from the negotiations around sale price, settlement dates and inclusions in the sale. But, as I started to take a greater interest in the property management side of business, I realised that there was an equal amount of negotiation skill required when it came to resolving issues between landlords and tenants.

Because we all have a different levels of expectation and we can all look at the same thing very differently. This business can be more about people management than property management and, no matter how hard we try to get two sides to agree on a mutually beneficial outcome, sometimes the only alternative can be a hearing at the tribunal.

In years gone by, the word tribunal (NSW Civil & Administrative Tribunal or NCAT for short) would send shivers down the spine of any experienced property manager and that wasn't only because it meant hours of file preparation, email compilation and double checking that the T's are crossed and dotting the I's, it was because in days gone by it appeared that the tribunal often made decisions that seemed to favour the tenant over the landlord, regardless of the application of common sense.

Thankfully (from experience) I can report those days are gone and, although we will still try our best to negotiate a satisfactory outcome for all parties in a dispute, tribunal is no longer the domain of victorious tenants. In our experience, sitting members at NCAT now look at each case on its merits, and use an enormous amount of common sense when interpreting the relevant legislation, and how their orders will impact both landlord and tenant.

A wise saying worth remembering -"The court makes an amazing amount of decisions that ought to be made by people"

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
















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LOCAL RESIDENTS RECOGNISED IN THE RECENT **QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY HONOURS**

Professor Simon Finfer -Galston - OFFICER (AO) of the ORDER of AUSTRALIA



Professor Simon Finfer's career has prepared him for a front line role in Australia's fight against the coronavirus pandemic.

Professor Finfer's research focuses on sepsis - a condition in which the body's immune response to infection starts to damage tissues and organs. Without fast treatment, it can lead to death or ongoing health issues.

"People who are dying of coronavirus disease in intensive care units are dying of sepsis," he said. "The coronavirus infects the lungs, and in severe cases, leads to sepsis resulting in kidney, liver and other organs failing."

Professor Finfer is a Critical care physician who has been working with The George Institute for 20 years and during that time has led transformational studies in critically ill patients to reduce mortality and shed light on one of the world's most serious silent killers - sepsis. His 2003 study of the epidemiology of sepsis in Australia and New Zealand showed that this life-threatening condition was one of the major issues that needed to be tackled if ICU mortality rates were to be reduced. So began his special interest in not only reducing mortality from sepsis but also raising awareness of the condition both in our region and on the global stage.

His work has been instrumental in demonstrating that really robust, highquality randomised controlled trials could be done in the critical care population and lead to improved mortality.

Morgan became a firefighter with Fire and Rescue NSW in 1990 and since that time has served in a range of operational and specialist positions.

He is an active firefighter having been involved in strike teams during numerous bushfire seasons as well as many large scale industrial and structural fire incidents.

Since 2012 he has been the Team

Fire Investigation and Research Unit (FIRU), a position which has state-wide responsibility for the organisation's critical efforts in fire safety and prevention research through the investigation of fires and emerging risks.

As well as initiating significant improvements in FRNSW's capability, policy and procedures, he represented FRNSW with distinction on numerous multi-agency committees and work groups nationally.

He has been responsible for numerous initiatives that have enhanced public safety, often in close collaboration with other emergency services, peak industry bodies, universities and other tertiary institutions.

These initiatives have included the change of the National Construction Code for apartment building fire sprinklers, and to legislative change to fit sprinklers in all residential aged care facilities. He has also contributed to the development of the FIRU Research Facility for undertaking live fire burns/fire scenario reconstructions/fire investigation training and gas monitoring systems.

Morgan is one of FRNSW's pre-eminent experts in fire investigation and research and his commitment to the organisation, and to the improved safety of the NSW community, for over 30 years has been exemplary.

Thank you Simon and Morgan for your outstanding service and commitment to your work. We as a community are proud of everything you have accomplished and achieved and congratulations on this well deserved honour.

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



GLENORIE PROGRESS ASSOCIATION

The GPA continues to operate as usual through this period. Our meetings continue to be conducted via Zoom, very successfully. That means it is even easier for you to join us at our next meeting from the comfort of your home.

The Hills Shire Council continues to push for an increase in allowance for Secondary **Dwellings**

We reported last year that The Hills Shire Council was pushing the state government to increase the allowed size of secondary dwellings on rural land. This increase would be great news for so many families in the area as they would be able to accommodate their own family adequately, or derive a small income from their property. Robyn Preston, in particular, has been pushing for this improvement, and I enclose her update to the GPA on this matter: "As Councillor - Secondary Dwellings in Rural Zones - I received a phone call from the Premier's office this evening advising that The Hills Shire Council's Gateway Determination Review Request in relation to Secondary Dwellings on Rural Lands has been upheld. The details will come to Council shortly but in essence, this will change the rules for secondary dwellings on rural lands. The new rules mean that those with acreage in rural zones can build a second dwelling on their land to a maximum of 110 square metres of living space plus another 20 square metres of garage; a total maximum of 130 square metres for a secondary dwelling. Subdivision is NOT permissible and was never a desired feature of this change." Please note, this does require legislative change and is not effective immediately.

Ray Whiteman Heritage Fence

The Ray Whiteman Heritage Fence in the Wal Buckingham Gardens next to the Memorial is progressing. The GPA Fence Committee have met with the Hornsby Shire Council to work on the plan, the meeting facilitated by Councillor Warren Waddell. Elizabeth Whiteman (leading the committee) reports that the meetings have been extremely positive working closely with Zoe Cook and David De-Fina, Landscape Coordinator at Hornsby Shire Council, to develop a cohesive plan to link the cenotaph to the Glenorie Memorial Hall via the new heritage fence and one flowing design. The fact that the project has experts doing the design and will address the entire space is very encouraging. As a community, being able to better utilise the space would be fantastic. More parking spaces for the hall so it can be better utilised, addressing the void behind the hall, respecting the sacred area for ANZAC, beautifying the landscape and, of course, paying tribute to Ray and the heritage of our area through the fence, will all be of benefit to our community.

Again, Robyn Preston, in her capacity as our State MP, has gone above and beyond and

secured a further \$10,000 to contribute to the project, directly from the Premier in the form of a discretionary grant. This is on top of the \$20,000 provided in the Community Building Partnership Grant towards the fence

Whites Road, Post Office **Road Walking Loop**


The walking loop from the Glenorie Village of Old Northern Road, Whites Road and Post Office Road has always been a popular walk for residents and visitors alike. It is a comfortable 2.5 ~ 3 km loop accessible from the village with minimal road crossings. It is possible to complete the loop without crossing a road which makes it a safer option than many roads in our area. The

Old Northern Road portion of the walk is entirely paved. During COVID19 lock down the numbers of walkers has easily doubled. It is envisaged that the number of people taking advantage of the loop would increase even more if the dangers of the current walk were addressed. Currently it is not possible to complete the walk without being forced onto the road, particularly along Whites and Post Office Roads which happen to be at summits in the road, further adding to the danger. The GPA intends to work with The Hills Shire Council to incrementally address the dangerous spots, as well as the overall usability of the walk. We have already has a very positive engagement with the Council's General Manager, Michael Edgar and the North Ward Councillors.

Our proposal does not require a footpath, but rather use of recycled road base or recycled concrete aggregate to stabilise boggy areas, a light dressing of the path and, in the areas where pedestrians are forced onto the road, some levelling of the nature strip. These improvements will bring a lot of benefit to the existing walkers, as well as broaden the age range that would be able to safely traverse the path.

Expansion of Glenorie Village possible

At the GPA meeting Councillor Brooke Collins OAM provided an excerpt from the Local Strategic Planning Statement 2019 for The Hills that: "As the population grows and changes, we will protect the role and function of rural villages and provide opportunities for limited expansion to meet the needs of the rural community. Any investigations will consider existing



constraints and balanced growth, in line with criteria detailed in the Rural Strategy 2019." (p56 LSPS)

Glenorie Village is identified in the Rural Strategy as a preliminary investigation area, which would benefit from a modest amount of residential and commercial growth. This is inline with the feedback from the community in the sessions that were held with the Hills SC Planners at the Glenorie RSL.

The Rural Strategy also mentions that a local character statement will be developed for the RU6 Transition Zone, in consultation with the community. This consultation will also inform the place-based planning that will be carried out for the growth of Glenorie and other rural villages. The timeline identified for this work is June 2023.

The GPA would remind planners and all concerned that one of the key mandates for endorsement of expansion of the village from the community was: through development, the ability to open up connected green spaces that allow the village population to traverse in a safe and natural environment, not simply more urbanisation.

We are thankful to the planners for incorporating the community feedback.

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HISTORY OF GLENORIE DISTRICT MEDICAL CENTRE

In 1984 the original Glenorie Medical Centre was opened by Dr Molly Hyslop and Dr Pip Gibian at 6 Post Office Road, Glenorie. For the two of us, this was a big challenge. We both had families with our youngest both six years old. After failing to find suitable rental premises in the area, we bought this house. Money was tight. We repainted it ourselves

and renewed the garden. We retained the previous owner's carpet and curtains for quite some years. The office furniture was mostly second-hand, as was some of the medical equipment. At that time Glenorie was very rural, surrounded by working farms and everyone knew each other. Many farms were owned by Italian migrants from the 1960s who grew vegetables and fruit but, above all, flowers. Their chrysanthemums and roses were legendary. Mostly it was young married couples who populated the two quarteracre residential areas. Housing in Glenorie was a little cheaper than other local suburban areas, allowing them to invest in their own homes.

We had investigated the area and thought there was some need for more medical services in Glenorie. This was an underestimation. The practice grew rapidly, along with the local birth rate. In those days, it seemed a very long way to the nearest hospital and dedicated after hours medical services did not exist. We shared night and weekend calls with Galston Medical Centre, with the doctor-on-call looking after both practices. The home visit area ranged from Dural and Galston to Maroota. We ran Saturday and Sunday morning surgeries. Farm accidents and emergency medicine were not rare. Fortunately, we were able to employ some part-time assistants. Over the years, we acquired great receptionists, some outstanding nurses, and above all, many wonderful patients. The practice continued to grow. It started as a little ladies practice as one observer dubbed it, and became a thriving family practice known for high quality, caring medical care.

In 2007 we sold the practice to Dr Clare Donnelly, who had worked with us for quite some years. She changed the business name to Glenorie District Medical



Centre and built an excellent, purpose-built surgery at 920B Old Northern Road. We both continued to work at the practice for many more years. Glenorie has changed a great deal since 1984, and the practice has modernised in tune with the times.

Drs Belinda and Sheila Lorenzo now own the business. Now the practice is much larger, has more doctors, more nurses, pathology services and other medical services, but continues to be a real family general practice, as it always was. The Glenorie Medical Centre of old lives on in good hands.

THE ULTIMATE WINTER COMFORT FOOD - CHICKEN & LEEK PIE

Is it just me or is everyone baking pies at the moment? Puff pastry is hard to come by these

But here is a recipe you'll definitely want to make if you've managed to bag some puff or are clever enough to make your own. Makes for pretty amazing winter comfort food.

I've been making my aunt's Chicken & Leek pie since I was a teenager and whilst the splattered and crumpled photocopy of the original recipe is long gone, hopefully I've managed to do it justice here.

INGREDIENTS

1 tablespoon olive oil 40g butter 2 carrots, thinly sliced 1 leek, thinly sliced 200 grams button mushrooms, sliced 2 tablespoons cornflour diluted in a little cold water 1/3 cup (80ml) double cream 1 poached or roast whole chicken, skin removed & shredded 2 cups (250ml) poaching liquid or chicken stock 4 sheets ready-rolled puff pastry 1 egg, lightly beaten

METHOD

Preheat oven to 200°C/180°C fan-forced.

Heat oil and butter in a large pan; sauté leek, carrot, and mushroom stirring until leek softens. Add shredded chicken. Gradually stir in reserved poaching liquid or stock, followed by the diluted cornflour, cook, stirring, until mixture boils and thickens. Reduce heat, stir in cream, and season to taste. Cool 10 minutes. Line base and side of a large pie dish with pastry, trim to fit; prick well all over with a fork. Bake 10 minutes or until lightly golden. Cool 5 minutes. Spoon chicken mixture into pastry case; place puff pastry over filling, trim to fit dish. Brush pastry with egg wash and cut two small slits in the top of the pastry. Bake 25 minutes or until golden brown.

Serve with mushy peas and mashed potatoes or a green salad.



Tip

While the original recipe called for poaching the whole bird and using the poaching liquid, leftover roast chicken and storebought chicken stock works just as well! Just halve all the other ingredients if using half a roast.

We hope to resume our monthly meetings very soon. You may be lucky enough to sample some of this pie should you come along next time.

We have now returned to our Tuesday volunteering duties, restarting on **2nd June**, when the restrictions were eased, allowing 10 persons. It has taken quite an effort to pick up where we left off. We also opened the museums to the public on Sunday afternoon, 14th June, when there were large numbers of visitors making the most of recent relaxation in activities.

On Tuesday 9th June, I realised a conspiracy was evolving when a number of our ex-members and friends appeared at morning tea time, when a cake was unveiled in honour of the three recent significant birthdays amongst us. The cake decoration read "The Three Zeros" with a single candle, "0". Reaching the milestones 80, 90 and 80 respectively, were Ian Browning, Allan Foy, and Rob Dewey, Allan also reaching his

25th year of volunteering with the Friends of Fagan Park. It was a very enjoyable occasion, and special mention is made of Max Smith, 94, who was brought out for the occasion.

I know that many readers follow our 1918 International truck restoration with interest, and I can report that good progress is being made with rebuilding of the engine. It uses 'splash' lubrication, meaning that the rotation of the engine simply splashes oil around inside, and hopefully enough reaches where it is needed. This is one reason engines of the era were quite short-lived, generally speaking. From the 1930's, virtually all car engines used pressure fed lubrication, and combined with better oils and the use of filters, leads to the long life that can be expected of modern-day



engines. We are working on many aspects of the project at the one time, and will report any significant milestones.

As you can see, once hooked as a volunteer at Fagan Park, you are likely to stay committed. We are the custodians of a wonderful collection and its history. So why don't you contact us and come and see what we are about. We are a convivial and caring bunch.

Pinus Ave was named after the proliferation of Pinus Radiata trees which once dominated the streetscape. According to Wikipedia Pinus Radiata is a species of pine native to the Central Coast of



and is the leading introduced tree in Australia. Sadly, only a few trees still remain in our street. Although our street was recently given a much needed resurface, nothing much has changed over the period I have been here. Even the residents have bunkered in, with only a handful of houses

selling over the 28 years. There have been a few new builds, but they are hidden from the street view.

A giant gum tree at the top of our street was a local landmark; however, it was posing a hazard. Its recent removal caused a major traffic hold up while massive cranes were engaged to cut it down.

The street is so hidden and narrow that first time and infrequent visitors often miss the street. Although Pinus Ave is a no through road, large trucks are frequently directed by their GPS down our street as there is a ghost road

connecting it to Cattai Ridge Road. This is extremely problematic as the drivers have to reverse their vehicles up almost 3/4 of a kilometre hilly incline and then get back onto Old Northern Road. The exit from Pinus Ave is difficult enough for cars trying to exit so these drivers will not make that mistake again. Because of the skill needed, learner drivers, ready to take their test, will often practice hill starts at the entrance to the street.

Now that you are aware of the challenges exiting our street, it would be appreciated if those travelling past Pinus Ave show consideration and stay alert to cars exiting the street.

Because of its gradient, scenic view of the mountains and low traffic, our street is a popular walking route for locals.

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

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
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DIVISIVE OR INCLUSIVE?

The Hills Shire Council made national news recently after North Ward Councillor Brooke Collins suggested that the Acknowledgement of Country (which is common practice at many different meeting settings, including in Federal and State Governments) "divides us more" as a nation. The comments were made in response to a local resident's communication with Councillors during this year's National Reconciliation Week, asking why an Acknowledgement of Country, which is a mention of respect to the local Aboriginal group, in this case the Darug people, isn't included at the start of each Council meeting. The Hills is now reportedly the only Council in Sydney which fails to acknowledge and show their respect to the Traditional Owners and Custodians of the local area.

The claim that an Acknowledgement of Country is divisive crops up periodically across Australia. Gamilaroi man Luke Pearson, the founder and CEO of the IndigenousX media company wrote in a blog article

back in 2016 that "Divisive is one of those words that some politician used once to justify their racism, sexism, and/or homophobia and everyone else has just kinda jumped on the bandwagon". He added that "never mind that you are using the word 'divisive' to describe being inclusive of Aboriginal people" or other minority groups, "acknowledging that any of those groups exist makes you feel threatened and challenges the status-quo, and is therefore 'divisive'".

Acknowledging the simple fact that Aboriginal people have been on this land before Europeans arrived should not be turned into a zero-sum game. Rather, together we all have much to gain from learning about the Indigenous connections to Country, in understanding the land that we all now call home. The heritage of the Hills is a rich, diverse tapestry of many cultures contributing to the character of the area: from Indigenous, European, to many others from all over the world.

There is already precedent at Council level to celebrate diversity of cultures, which allows plenty of room for Indigenous acknowledgement too.

In February 2014, the Hills Shire Council held its first ever Lunar New Year celebrations. In Council's own media release on its website (dated 24 January 2014), Mayor Dr Michelle Byrne said that "We're lucky to live in such a multicultural country where we're exposed to all these different cultures, forms of art, cuisine and films. I'm really looking forward to celebrating Lunar New Year for the first time." She added that "This is an event that will celebrate Asian culture but I really think this is an event the entire community should share in." The same logic can be readily applied to the inclusion of an Acknowledgement of Country.

Therefore, the ongoing refusal by a majority of the Hills Councillors to make a short statement that acknowledges the presence of the local Aboriginal people may well amount to a conscious act of denialism. To be so selective of the facts teaches people that it is OK to be ignorant of the full history of this country and to not acknowledge members of our community. Who would dare make a similar case for refusing to respect the playing of "The Last Post", for instance?

The "divisive" argument could also technically be applied to other practices, such as the Christian prayer said at the start of each meeting, since Australia doesn't actually have an established official religion, and according to the 2016 National Census, 39% of the population in the Hills do not list Christianity as their religion (and there is a sizeable segment who are not religious at all).

The Acknowledgement of Country issue is not a recent one for the Hills Shire Council. Councillor Ryan Tracey says that he and other Labor Councillors have moved motions to include an Acknowledgement of Country six times in recent years. As recently as early June 2020, an attempt was made to amend the Mayoral Minute to include an Acknowledgement of Country at the start of each Council meeting. The amendment was supported by the two current Labor Councillors but rejected by the Liberal Councillors who currently hold the majority. Councillor Tracey has again expressed his disappointment, saying that he thought the broad community support for the inclusion of an acknowledgement would have swayed some of the Councillors. Councillor Tracey said an online petition attracted over 25,000 signatures in the past week.

There is an opportunity to now embrace change, in a new spirit of inclusiveness. North Queensland Aboriginal man Noel Pearson perhaps articulates most clearly how Australia could complete itself as a unique commonwealth in three parts: "There is our ancient heritage, written on the continent and the original culture painted on its land and seascapes. There is its British inheritance, the structures of government and society transported from the UK fixing its foundations in the ancient soil. There is its multicultural achievement: a triumph of immigration that brought together the gifts of people and cultures from all over the globe - forming one indissoluble commonwealth".



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Cats are not harmed physically or behaviourally by keeping them inside.

If you have an outdoor cat, the best thing you can do for her is to bring her inside, and make her an indoor cat.

Seven steps to having a happy house cat.

- 1. Super dooper pooper trays -The rule is one box for each cat. plus one extra. The tray must be kept clean and placed in a quiet, accessible, feel safe place for the cat. The best location is where the cat uses it.
- 2. Bring joy with toys There is a myriad of cat toys available from cheap paper bags and rolled up balls of paper to

motorized "mice", pole toys and laser pointers. Cats like short bursts of intense physical play alternating with long periods of sleep. A lack of staying power is not a sign of boredom.

- 3. Scratch that itch Cats love to scratch. Provide lots of "approved" places to scratch such as cat "trees", posts and cardboard scratching boxes.
- 4. Provide a room with a view - Windows are cat TV—a birdbath or feeder placed near a window can provide hours of entertainment. (Tuck the cords of blinds up and out of the way so that legs and other body parts don't get entangled in them.)
- 5. Porches bring purrs A screened-in porch or an enclosure accessible through a window is a great way for your cat to experience the outdoors safely. Cats love sunny spots to lie in. There

is a great variety available online.



7. Pots of health and happiness - Pick a sunny spot in your house or cat enclosure and place a few pots of your cat's favourite and safe plants. They look good, smell good and are good for both you and your cat's health. Plant them in pots shallow enough for your cat to reach the foliage. Try catnip, mint, wheat or oat grass.

So if your cat wants to go outside, make inside just that much more appealing.

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LE TOUR DE GLENORIE

Introducing a mini Le Tour De Glenorie, of only 11km (or 8km) If you are just getting into cycling, it's the perfect route to get a feel for your new bicycle and the local built environment along some quiet, rural back roads.

It's important to consistently practise your bike-handling skills, learn bicycle road safety awareness and gradually build up your cycling fitness level if you are new to road cycling. Because this is a loop, as you get fitter and more confident you might enjoy riding it so much you'll want to repeat it twice ... or thrice ... and you can pull the plug at several points if you've had enough or hear a coffee calling. Change it up to suit yourself.

To add extra distance and a tiny warm up hill, ride along Old Northern through Glenorie Village past Glenorie Public school, turning right down

Timaru Street then right again onto Tecoma Drive; a lovely wide suburban street behind the primary school. Leave suburbia behind by turning left into Cairnes Road, where wide turns to country road narrow and scenic acreages stretch out on either side in a visual feast.

At the fork in the road you'll bear right onto Moores Road, then right again to enjoy a fast roller coaster ride framed by magnificent big trees.* All too soon it's time to turn right again onto Munros Lane which is a gentle, but long ascent back up to the Old Northern Road Ridgeline. On the corner you will find a bountifully-stocked example of our area's beloved roadside farm stalls. Take some time to browse our fresh, local produce and why not purchase some on your way home?

Here you'll turn left and ride

along Old Northern road s houlder for 1km. It's a busy road, with fast-moving traffic so beware,* particularly when you are merging traffic lanes to turn right into Cattai Ridge Road. This is a fast descent with an S bend to get through the creek. Cattai Ridge Road has intermittent road shoulders, and there are none here so you have to descend in the actual traffic lane. Keep your bicycle under control, because it will take off like a rocket down here and you could be riding in excess of 55km/h unawares- and then you have those S-bends to navigate safely too. As you exit from the creek, there is some road shoulder to ride on until turning right into Post Office Road. There is virtually no traffic here, but the road surface is quite rough. You'll soon forget this rolling resistance inconvenience when you are faced with the wicked pinch climb into Glenorie Village to complete the loop... or ride it again!

FACTBOX:

**Alternative 8km loop:

Avoid the traffic stress of busy ONR and Cattai Ridge Roads by instead riding Harrison's Lane from Munroe Road, turning left (at the Veterinary Clinic) into ONR, then immediately right into Whites Road which has lovely views of the distant hills of the Hawkesbury, delivering you quickly and safely to Post Office Road.

Coffee & Camellias:

Avoid the traffic and coffee ques at Glenorie Village, and consider starting and finishing this loop ride amongst the flowers at tranquil Camellia Grove Nursery, 8 Cattai Ridge Road. 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HELPING SMALL BUSINESS INTO THE RECOVERY PHASE By Julian Leeser

Our local businesses have experienced a really difficult couple of months. They have been asked to adapt quickly to restrictions, many have faced significant losses of income and now they are working out what

The Government's economic support package has provided timely support for so many of our businesses and their employees, keeping businesses open and Australians in work.

the future looks like.

This package has set the foundation for the recovery. The support available to our local businesses throughout the recovery includes:

JobKeeper: helping businesses significantly impacted by the Coronavirus cover the costs of their employees' wages, to keep Australians in jobs. A fortnightly payment of \$1,500 per eligible employee has been paid to businesses since 4 May 2020. This payment is keeping 3.5 million Australians in work.

Supporting apprentices and trainees: a wage subsidy of 50 per cent of the apprentice or trainee wages is available to employers until 30 September 2020. This measure is supporting around 70,000 small businesses and 117,000 apprentices.

Cash flow boost: available to small and medium businesses and not for profit organisations that employ staff. Tax-free amounts of between \$20,000 and \$100,000, are being provided to eligible businesses through credits in the activity statement system.

SME guaranteed loan: a guarantee of 50 per cent is being provided by the Government to small and medium business lenders to support new shortterm unsecured loans to SMEs. This is helping small businesses get access to credit quickly and efficiently to meet existing obligations.

Instant asset write-off: the threshold was increased from \$30,000 to \$150,000 and the timeframe has been extended from 30 June 2020 until 31 December 2020. This allows businesses to invest in assets they need and bring forward tax deductions for eligible expenditure. Businesses can immediately write-off multiple assets provided each costs less than \$150,000.

Accelerated depreciation: enabling businesses to deduct 50 per cent of the cost of an eligible asset on installation. This measure will further support business investment and cash flow, lowering taxes paid so they can continue to provide jobs to workers.



Accelerated depreciation will remain in place through to 30 June 2021.

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RURAL ROUND UP

One of the few upsides resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic is that councils have turned their attention to how best they can promote economic recovery. With NSW Government assistance and the early release of developer contributions, projects in the long-term plan may be brought forward to help stimulate the local economy. I will certainly push for the inclusion of A-ward projects already in the pipeline if it means an earlier completion date.

In the meantime, we can look forward to a new roof being completed on Galston Park picnic shed. A couple more weeks should see this project completed. The RMS upgrade to the Mid Dural Rd roundabout should also come to completion by the end of the month. The final footpath link

to this project won't come to fruition until the Marston Aged Care development on Galston Rd is completed, but it is a step closer to a safer network of paved walkways. The Marston development is expected to resume within the next two months as a consequence of an agreed site rehabilitation plan. Draft plans for continued staged improvements along Arcadia Rd to Thomas Rd have been exhibited, along with the first draft of the Galston Village public domain improvement plan. Residents would have seen

Residents would have seen an increase in tree planting throughout the village areas, as homeowners choose to be part of the tree planting initiative. While we welcome new trees into our local community, we must also balance this with the assessment and removal

of unsafe vegetation. I have highlighted a number of unsafe trees requiring attention throughout the rural area when residents have brought them to my attention. Don't forget that it is also now possible to secure pile burn permits online

through the Council website. I am also pleased to highlight a return to some scheduled rural maintenance. I have long advocated for road verges and drainage in particular to receive scheduled attention, as opposed to reactive arrangements where it is often



too late. Verge slashing in a range of rural locations will now be scheduled, while there will be a revised approach to stormwater drain construction and maintenance.

DURAL AND DISTRICT HISTORICAL SOCIETY INC.

NEWS FROM HISTORY COTTAGE By Michael Bell

During his survey of the district in 1817, James Meehan made the comment that the forests of Dural were so thick that one could hear the men working long before they were seen and the trees would never be cleared. Unfortunately, for the areas on the good soil along the ridges and in the alluvial valleys, time has shown his comments to be wrong. Fortunately, in isolated pockets the once great indigenous trees of the Wianamatta and Hawkesbury soils can still be seen.

It is a fraught debate between loss and gain. From a positive aspect clearing of the forests did give Sydney and our community much of its history and that which we now value. From our forests came the huge Iron Bark beams essential in buildings

such as the Hyde Park Barracks and the wool stores, while the Turpentine trees gave the wharf piers of the Harbour. The Casuarina shingles roofed the cottages. The orchards and their later removal gave us income and later the rural character we enjoy.

Some of those trees became part of our own local history. Who can forget the huge Angophora at Bus Stables Corner at the junction of Middle Dural and Galston Roads? It was the community notice board for every event, sale or election. The number of nails in its trunk made it difficult to find a spot for the next person to install their effort. The tall stump on Old Northern Road that still showed the way in which the timber cutter had climbed to a better height to cut down the log he wanted. Less

well known was the Apple Gum just past the last bend of the Gorge on the Hornsby side. A lower branch had been cut off to provide a handy throw-over for the reins of the carts. While the drivers gave the horses a spell they had time for a smoke and a chat before the last long climb up the often slippery Red Hill. "Meet you at the Apple Gum "was a common call for the slow moving trip into Hornsby. And so it is with sadness that we report on the loss of one of the great survivors. In the last heavy storms the top was taken out of an enormous Turpentine in Arcadia. It must be at least four or five hundred years old. A large section of bark had been removed to provide shelter or transport by much earlier residents. Over the centuries it had developed into the habitat for every conceivable animal, no matter what size. There was no part of even the smallest of hollow branch that was not lived in. It was a the animal Australia Square of Arcadia. It must have survived the harvesting of wharf piers because its trunk, at quite a height, was already too far gone

The remnants of those forests still play an important role. As living trees they are the seed source for regeneration and our own good health. The dead ones have an even greater function and they are the most at risk. In

our attempt to make things safe and tidy or to provide fire wood they are cut down. Their removal means that, like the tree in Arcadia, the habitat of countless animals is further reduced.

It takes a long time for old trees to reach that special stage in their life. They become part of the history of a family, a community and even a nation. As their beneficiaries we should protect and respect them. They are our local history too. Do readers have one they remember?

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GALSTON DISTRICT **GARDEN CLUB**

With the shorter days and chilly mornings there is no denying that winter is with us. With the long, hot days of summer now in distant memory, you might be surprised how some of those gardening jobs that seem like a chore in summer can be actually enjoyable in winter.

We assume that our gardens lie dormant during the cooler months, it is important to remember there are a number of jobs that need to be done in winter to help our garden rest and rejuvenate.

Think winter is not the right time for planting? Think again! At this time of year there are many plants available that you won't see at other times of year, e.g. an enormous number of rose varieties, deciduous fruit trees, nut and ornamental trees not to mention the gorgeous spring flowering trees. The plants are sold soil-less or in special bags and are often cheaper than regular potted plants too so you can get planting without busting the budget. Much of the seasonal rose activity, especially pruning and planting, should take place in winter.

Many weeds are annuals and just like the lovely bloomers you plant in your garden or pots they make merry for a short time. As your lawn is near dormant these fast growing weeds can leave you with dead spots come spring through cutting off sunlight that is already in short supply in winter. As the weeds will be obvious chances are they will be looking lush and green and be standing taller than your lawn, the manual removal with a weeding tool is actually an easy and effective option. If you decide to take a chemical approach, the first trick is to identify the weeds so you can decide on the best treatment. Just bear in mind that even quality selective herbicides appropriately applied can cause your lawn a lot of stress in winter so use herbicides as a last resort. While your lawn will not need mowing as often in winter, it still needs weeding and feeding!

If you did the right thing and fed your lawn in early autumn then it should be tolerating the cold conditions well right now. Whether you fed or not you can still help it, not by feeding your lawn, but your soil. Keeping soil micro-organisms nourished can improve your lawns resilience so apply a product such as a hose-on seaweed or organically fortified product.

Across the cooler months, it is best to mow with your catcher on, rather than mulch mowing. This is because the mulched material can be too slow to break down in the cold weather and can give rise to fungal problems. It is important to mow occasionally in winter. This is not just to trim the grass but also to pick up all the bits and pieces such as twigs and leaves that can be reducing the all-important sunlight.

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You do not need proof of a green thumb, or some kind of external validation to be a gardener. Gardening is a lifelong learning process - you never know everything it's so complex and detailed. However, if you love it, and care for your plants, if you are engaged, then you are a gardener. Gardening is really just about showing care. We all kill things, we all have disasters and successes. That is part of the process. Come and visit our club as Hornsby Council has given permission for the meetings to resume under strict COVID19 restrictions and the size of the gathering. HIDDEN IN THE HILLS **CLIMBERS AND SCRAMBLERS**

There are a number of scramblers or climbers that twine and climb their way up and over other shrubs and bushes.

One such climbing plant is Apple Berry Dumpling (Billardiera scandens). Not uncommon, but not easily identified as it twines its way around its supporting plant which grows in the understorey. Its branches have been recorded at almost 3 metres in length.

The small bell shaped flowers mature into small elongated cylindrical fruits which hang unobtrusively from the ends of branchlets. Flowering occurs between September and December, the fruits being edible when ripened.

Because this plant is able to grow in almost any environment and soil type in the local bushland, its habitat is quite extensive.

Another climbing plant that can easily go un-noticed is one named Love Creeper (Comesperma volubile). It is a delicate plant with smooth shiny stems that usually grow to about 1 metre in length. Its name is derived from its ability to tie itself in knots around its supporting plant.

The Love Creeper favours moist open forest but can survive in protected locations in heathland. Flowering period is from July to December.

Yet another, but one that is more obvious when in flower, is the Dusky Coral Pea (Kennedia rubicunda). Its bright red flowers and large green leaves are most visible from July to November.

It is a much more vigorous plant which will climb its way over its supporting host to the point that it may weigh that plant down.

Also there is the vigorous climber Hardenbergia violacacea (Purple twining pea), that was the subject of the December 2019 edition of this column. It can be found in flower from late July to early October.

At other times Elizabeth may be found doing battle with the computer; making up rosters, doing Orders of Service for Elders to distribute, typing minutes, sending emails or compiling and printing the church's monthly newspaper, "Out of School Road". Elizabeth is responsible for keeping the Church Calendar, which is essential for planning events. She is also on the Galston **Concerts Committee for** which she does much of the administrative work.

In the purple room is Kathleen our Treasurer. This is a voluntary position, which Kathleen has performed for six years, for which we are extremely grateful. During this Covid-19 time, there have been considerable



changes in the role to keep on top of changing requirements from the government such as "Jobkeeper", the Tax Office and Uniting Church Financial Services. This comes on top of banking receipts, reconciling bank statements, and preparing budgets.

All in all, there are many mountains to climb. Kathleen is also on the Galston Concerts Committee and is responsible for issuing tickets, taking money and staying on top of Trybooking.com, the online ticketing service.

Although Elizabeth and Kathleen have their own roles, they often share tasks and so work closely together.

There is no doubt that the church could not function



properly without them, especially during this Covid-19 time when the church still (mid-June) cannot open.



WHO'S BUILDING YOUR HOME?

Have you ever raced homing pigeons? Recently my husband and I were reflecting on our childhood and he began to explain about the years he spent racing 'homing'pigeons. As I listened, many parallels about our life here on earth came to mind.

A pigeon's place of security is its loft. When I understood that race distances in Australia can be in excess of 800 kms, I immediately wondered how many pigeons returned to their owners and to their loft? Also, how do they know their way home? My husband assured me that most of his pigeons came home again after long flights.

Some say that pigeons have a retentive memory about their loft (home).

God says to those who love Him and believe in His Son Jesus Christ- "You will feel secure because there is hope; you will look around and take your rest in security." (Job 11:18).

What I now also understand about pigeons is that they

are trained to "home" to a loft through recognising their particular owner or caller. Techniques such as a voice call, bell or whistle are used and pigeons know that sound.

God's children know and understand His voice through reading and meditating on His words in the bible, as well as through times of prayer. He says, "Call to Me and I will answer you and will tell you great and hidden things that you have not known." (Jeremiah 33:3) and Romans 10:27 reminds us that "faith comes from hearing and hearing through the Word of God."

The calling techniques I've mentioned and the feeding of pigeons go together. Every time the pigeon hears the caller, whether the bird is in the loft or in the air, it knows that it is feed time

Likewise, God's children "feed" on His Word in the Bible. Hebrews 5:14 explains, "Solid food is for the mature, who by constant use have trained



themselves to distinguish good from evil."

Finally I have learnt that pigeons are very loyal to their lofts and can often find their way home many weeks after their race flight commenced.

A well- known adage says that "home is where the heart is."

Having a heart relationship with Jesus Christ always keeps us at home with Him.

BELIEVING **GOD'S WORD**

(a message by the late Rev Ed. Long)

How can we have continuing assurance? By believing God's word. When you came to Christ you believed that Christ could save you. Now you believe He has saved you. The danger is in thinking 'I did my part, but God hasn't done His.' What does Romans 10:3 say? 'Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved'. Did you in all sincerity call on Christ to save you? Then what does this verse say? If you called, Christ saved you. That one verse can be like a spiritual birth certificate for you.

Put another way. If you were presented with an account which you knew you had already paid, what would you do? You would look for the receipt, the written proof that you had paid the account. Remember the Bible is God's written proof to you that you have been saved.

Then there is God's witness within our hearts by the Holy Spirit. The Bible is God's witness to us. The Holy Spirit is God's witness within us Romans 8:16 says, 'The Spirit Himself testifies with our Spirit that we are God's children'. He authenticates our new life. He does this in various ways. He helps us understand God's word. He applies it to our lives. For example, a believer is often troubled about something they have done or been tempted to do. If they stopped to think, that before they were saved, this problem never bothered them. Now that the Spirit is living within, He has spoken to them about it.

This leads on to the evidence of their life being changed 2 Corinthians 5:17 is well known. 'If anyone is in Christ he/she is a new person.' For some people it is a dramatic change, for others it is progressive, but others notice the change. Wheat Bag Safety

Wheat bags are great for soothing aches and pains but should never be used in bedding materials. Wheat bags can ignite and shouldn't be used to warm beds while you're sleeping. Firefighters have responded to numerous residential fires that have occurred due to wheat bags overheating in the microwave oven or wheat bags being used to warm beds.

Tips for using wheat bags

- · Regularly check your wheat bag for signs of wear and tear or scorching. With age the fillings dry out and become combustible.
- Don't overheat the wheat bag by placing it in the microwave longer than specified by the manufacturer.
- Don't leave the wheat bag unsupervised in the microwave.
- Don't let anyone, particularly children or the elderly sleep with a wheat bag.

- Don't use the wheat bag to warm your bed up, as it may spontaneously ignite.
- Don't reheat the wheat bag before it has properly cooled.
- A wheat bag should be cooled down on a non-combustible surface before storing.
- Only use wheat bags for direct application to body aches and pains.

If your wheat bag begins to smoulder or catches fire ring Triple Zero Immediately.

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GLENORIE RURAL FIRE BRIGADE

The crisp starry nights have been good weather for a fire pit in the back yard. Some good friends, good food and a warm fire can make for an entertaining evening outdoors, however it remains important to be aware of your council regulations regarding outdoor burns.

Hornsby council does not permit any bonfires for recreational purposes, but recreational fires for the purpose of cooking are allowed and should be contained within an appropriate structure such as a bar-be-que. More information is available on the Hornsby Council website, always be sure to check before you light anything.

The Hills council area, recreational and cooking fires are permitted outside Total Fire Ban periods. A campfire or barbecue may be lit for cooking or warmth providing the fire is in a permanently constructed fire place with at least two metres

cleared of any combustible material, or it is at a site with at least three metres cleared of any combustible material, an adult is in attendance at all times, and the fire is completely extinguished before leaving. Again, checking your council website is important to be sure you comply with the regulations for your area.

If you wish to pile burn in The Hills area, read the council requirements, complete an Application for Approval to Burn Dead and Dry Vegetation online, and be sure to provide your contact phone number and email address for return notification. It is as simple as
