


DON'T BE UNDER PREPARED

I moved to Glenorie in 1996. Previously I had lived in a residential area. I had absolutely no idea of how bad bushfires can be in rural areas like Glenorie... until 2002. I thought we would be OK. We had prepared and cleared around our house, we had hoses ready and we sort of had a plan. I also assumed that if things got bad, the local RFS trucks would be around to help me.

Summer 2002 had been hot and we had been in drought for a while. A grass fire started in South Maroota. It was a hot and windy day. The small fire VERY quickly raced away and became bigger and infinitely more dangerous, engulfing properties and sheds so fast.





The fire emergency lasted several days. The winds changed and it moved in different directions. Glenorie was headline news all over the world. I had relatives call me from London to check I was OK. Glenorie/Forest Glen lost 33 houses, hundreds of animals both domestic and native and 1 life. The devastation was mind blowing.

So now we have a fire pump, a swimming pool (static water supply), sprinklers on my roof and roller shutters on a number of windows that face the bushland. Never again will I underestimate how fast fires can travel and how bad an ember attack can be. I'm lucky I live on Cattai Ridge Road, I have several escape routes. If you live in a road with only one way out, plan for the scenario of that road being blocked. A fire can start at any time, and anywhere!

Given what is happening overseas, they are predicting this could be another catastrophic fire season. Please don't be under prepared - plan your strategy. Houses can be replaced, lives can't. If you leave early, tell your neighbours. If you intend to stay, buy your equipment now. Once a fire comes, everything sells out super fast!

GOATS. Yes, you read that correctly. Goats. Lots of them. All happily munching away and clearing your property of overgrown vegetation at the same time.


Central Coast Goats Fire Hazard Reduction is the brainchild of Denny Woods and was created after he witnessed some devastating fires in his area several years ago. He was certain that his property would be protected, as his cattle and especially his goats, maintained his paddocks by constantly grazing on undergrowth. Other neighbours were not so fortunate, so in a "light bulb" moment he decided to start hiring out his goats to locals to ensure their properties were more fire safe for future incidents.



Denny's goats travel all over NSW, and are particularly useful for landholders with steep or rocky terrain, as they are natural climbers and vociferous eaters.

"The price varies between jobs," Denny explains, "contributing factors to costs include distance travelled, amount of goats hired, and length of time required".



Each year Helen painstakingly decorated her bus for Christmas enjoying the smiles her creative work brought to both passengers and other drivers alike.



FOR ANIMALS KEPT IN PADDOCKS WITHOUT SHADE; SUMMER ISN'T JUST HOT, IT'S HELL

According to the livestock industry and RSPCA, sheep, horses, dairy cows and cattle experience heat stress at 25°C. As the temperature and humidity rises, so does their suffering. Around 30°C the heat stress is severe. By 40°C, animals can succumb to organ failure and die.

These reported temperatures however, are measured in a shaded box. In direct sun, the apparent temperature is much hotter; a 35°C day, can be more like 50°C.

Heat stress not only causes farm animals to suffer, it affects weight gain, milk yield, fertility. In a free-roaming environment, an animal's natural behaviour is to seek shade – this isn't possible when they are fenced in, so it is up to us to ensure they have some respite from extreme weather. Offering animals shade and shelter will also prevent expensive vet bills.

The most effective way of minimising suffering on a hot day is to provide farm

animals with tree shade. Besides protection from direct sun, water vapour released from leaves can cool the air temperature.

I'm so grateful to the many residents in Hornsby Shire who treat their horses, sheep, goats, chickens and cows so well – most have access to tree shade, or shelter belts of vegetation around fence lines and some have a purpose-built shelter offering protection from the elements.

The majority of our residents lead by example in providing shade for farm animals, not because they have to, but because it's the right thing to do. Sadly, in other areas, farm animals are not so lucky. Locked in fenced paddocks with no shade or shelter, they can't escape the scorching sun.

That's because a loophole in legislation and welfare standards says that shade and shelter 'should' be provided, not 'must'. This one word makes it impossible to enforce the provision of shade.

I've asked our council to advocate for mandatory tree shade and shelter for farm



animals at our Local Government NSW Conference in November; where councillors from across NSW come together to vote on policy positions for the whole of the state. The conference is an opportunity to look outside our shire border and ask, what can we do to make our state and country a better place.

Shade and shelter are essential for our survival - we even seek shade for our cars. It is only fair that animals who feel pain from extreme weather, have shade and shelter too.

GUNDERMAN IS FINALLY ON THE MAP

Gunderman is finally on the map now that it has a new sign to let travellers know Gunderman is not part of Spencer. This tiny community is nestled between Spencer and Wisemans Ferry as you meander alongside the banks of the mighty Hawkesbury River.

Gunderman has so much to offer and caters to all age groups. You can go bush walking, rock climbing, mountain biking, swimming, fishing, canoeing, boating or water skiing on the mighty Hawkesbury River, enjoy a family picnic, or dine at the local **Wombat Café**.

The **Wombat Café** is located 10 km from Wisemans Ferry on Wisemans Ferry Road or 14.6 km from Spencer and has an amazing country vista with the backdrop of the Hawkesbury River and the distinct sandstone cliffs. The Wombat Café offers friendly country hospitality and delicious home style cooked meals made fresh daily and are famous for their delicious homemade pies, sausage rolls, cakes and pizzas.

There are a plethora of Airbnbs in Gunderman as well as the Rosevale Caravan Park which is a 50-acre property situated on the beautiful Hawkesbury River about 75 km from Sydney and Gosford, offering camping and cabin sites and makes a great escape to unwind from the hustle and bustle of busy life.

The historic and cultural significance of this area includes the Lower Hawkesbury Wesleyan Chapel site (6445 Wisemans Ferry Road) for its association with the development and practice of Wesleyan Methodism and with early European settlement along the Lower Hawkesbury.





The stone chapel built in 1855 and is the oldest intact usable stone chapel of this era in the Lower Hawkesbury.

The Chapel is now home to the Lower Hawkesbury Historical Society (DLHHS) formed in 1983. The DLHHS holds meetings with guest speakers such as Kate Grenville and Dr Grace Karksens on the last Saturday of every second month and excursions are arranged on alternate months including the now world heritage-listed Convict Trail, Finch's Line, the original crossing location of Wisemans Ferry, Half Moon Farm, and visits to the sites of local aboriginal rock art and engravings.

Gunderman adjoins the Dharug National Park and boasts the historic significance of the national heritage listed Convict Trail/ the Great North Road built between 1826 and 1836 on its doorstep. This is a great walk starting at Devines Hill with a mixture of historic remnants of the Old Great North Road such as stone walling, culverts, quarries, buttresses, chiselled and blasted rock faces and hand hewn drains.

Popular trails for hiking, mountain biking, and running includes the Finch's Line via Settlers Road (10.8 km loop) or the Mill Creek Circuit 8.2.km starting and the challenging Western Commission Track 23.8km for mountain biking and running.

This region is renowned for its extensive Aboriginal engravings and rock art where you will find an array of Aboriginal sites with a diverse display of archaeological evidence which attests to the long occupation of the region by Aboriginal people and the complex indigenous society with cultural connections to land that continues today.

HORNSBY SHIRE COUNCIL SECURES FUNDING TO PREPARE THE COMMUNITY FOR BUSH FIRES

What would you and your family do if the bushland near your home caught fire? Would you leave early, or stay and defend? These are just some of the questions being addressed by Hornsby Shire Council's new bush fire education program launching this spring.

In Hornsby Shire, two-thirds of all properties are situated within 350m of bushland reserves and National Parks, meaning a large proportion of homes are at risk.

With funding from the Australian and New South Wales governments, the Building Bush Fire Resilient Communities Education Program will ensure residents are better prepared, helping to mitigate the impacts of bush fires.

Residents now have access to a raft of resources and information specifically useful for the Hornsby Shire area on a new Bush Fire Aware Hub on Council's website at hornsby.nsw.gov.au/bushfireaware

This one-stop-shop contains relevant advice from the NSW Rural Fire Service and other authorities on how to prepare for bush fires, including:

· Questions to consider in your bush fire survival plans

- · Important items to pack in your emergency kits
- Tips on how to prepare your pets (including livestock)
- Advice on how to prepare your suburban and rural properties
- Bush fire insurance tips
- Links to local Rural Fire brigades and Fire & Rescue stations and much more!

As part of this program, Hornsby Shire Council will also be able to upgrade its education trailer (with funding support from Reconstruction Authority and in cooperation with Ku-ring-gai Council) to continue taking the message to residents living in bush fire prone areas through targeted street meetings. The funding will also support development and distribution of a range of informative educational resources across the Shire.

Hornsby Shire Mayor Philip Ruddock AO said this initiative will make sure local residents are empowered with knowledge to make informed choices when facing bush fire hazards.

"We have all seen the devastating impacts of bush fires over the years. And with the current outlook on the upcoming bush fire




season being high risk, it is essential that as a community we are best prepared for bush fire events," Mayor Ruddock said.

"We thank the state and federal governments for their support. The community engagement, preparedness and prevention strategies, and risk mitigation initiatives in this program, will keep our residents safer and stronger in the future."

Hornsby Shire Council secured more than \$80,000 under the Disaster Risk Reduction Fund grant program, which is jointly funded by the Australian and New South Wales governments.

SPECIAL FIRE PRESENTATION NIGHT

The residents of the Glenorie District were invited to attend a special presentation on Preparing for the upcoming Fire Season at our monthly meeting at the Glenorie RSL, Thursday 14 September.

We were honoured to have fabulous speakers - two officers of The Hills Rural Fire Service Fire Control Centre - Nathan Barnden FC02 and Scott Callan Operations Officer. Plus Mitchell Blue, The Hills Shire Councillor and Chair of the Bush Fire Risk Management Committee presented.

Nathan and Scott presented comprehensive facts and figures and videos to support the necessity for all residents to Prepare Your Property for a bushfire in Glenorie. History of fires and the RFS was clearly outlined, the focus on our area. The horrific 2002 fires starting on December 4 that impacted Glenorie District and beyond resulted in the tragic loss of two lives and the loss of 9 houses in Glenorie. The 2002 fire was right here in the village and even the RSL Club was surrounded by fire. The guestion was answered that - it is not IF it will happen again - but WHEN.

The current seasonal outlook was given that The Hills and Hornsby areas are likely to experience an extremely high fire danger this summer as we were not directly affected in the disastrous 2019/20 fires preferable. Many of lives lost in 2019-20 fires were because unprepared residents stayed to defend. He reminded everyone present that a house can be rebuilt but family members lost can't be returned to us.

Mitchell presented information on the Bush Fire Risk Management Committee with details of the various agencies coming together to plan mitigation/hazard reduction (HR) works and fire trail maintenance. Questions were answered re HRs and the difficulties of accessing the window of opportunity between wet weather and when it becomes too hot to burn. Mitchell also discussed the responsibility of residents in cluster divisions to comply with the bush fire management plan developed for their area including keeping a level of water available in tanks for fire protection.

Nathan went on to explain the ways to PLAN whether to Leave Early OR Stay and Defend, the first option being preferable, noting again that life is more important than property. Neighbourhood Safer Places as Places of Last Resort were mentioned.

Important also to note that there are limited resources in comparison with the number of properties to defend - the message being -DO NOT expect a fire truck at your property when the fire is coming.

Know the Fire Alerts when a fire is coming and the Fire Danger Levels showing the risk of a fire in the area.

Message delivered – It is Your responsibility to Prepare

Your Property and to Plan for a fire emergency. Making a Plan is a discussion and decision for all the family as too often a spouse or teenage child is home alone when fire comes.

TOP AUCTION TIPS FOR BUYERS

As one of the most popular methods of selling property in Australia, an auction can often achieve a higher sales price for a vendor while being a highly transparent way for a buyer to purchase property.

Whether it's your first time bidding, or it's been a while since you last attended an auction, it is normal to feel stressed, anxious and excited during the lead-up and on the day.

In this blog our Chief Auctioneer, Andrew Robinson, shares his top auction tips for buyers-including how to prepare beforehand and handle things on the day.

GET YOUR FINANCES IN ORDER

Before you register to bid at an auction, ensure your finances are in order. Having pre-approval from the bank means you know what you can afford. What price you're willing to pay, and what your absolute stretch price is. This will shape your strategy come auction day.

"If you're successful at auction, you will need to have a 10 percent deposit ready to go on the day. To avoid any embarrassing hold-ups, make sure your maximum bank transfer limits have been lifted, and your bank is aware that a large sum may be transferred from your account," advises Andrew.

UNDERSTAND THE AUCTION PROCESS

As a rule, the first auction you attend shouldn't be the one you intend to bid at. Instead, become familiar with the style of different auctioneers and sales agents by attending as many auctions as you can in the area you're looking to purchase in. You will also get a strong idea of who the competition is and the demand for similar properties.

"Buyers should always attend several auctions in the area they're looking to buy into before they bid themselves," says Andrew. "Watch how people bid, the different strategies they use, what increments people increase by, the pace of the auction and how the auctioneer manages the auction. Being armed with all this information gives you an advantage when it comes time for you to bid."

DO YOUR DUE DILIGENCE


Buyers need to do their due diligence before the auction because once you place a winning bid, it's too late to then put the brakes on the sale. Before auction day, make sure you have your building and pest inspection reports done, and the contract of sale has been reviewed by your lawyer, especially the terms of sale and settlement period.

Get a good understanding of what the property is worth by asking the selling agent for comparable sales, or jump online and research recent sales in the area.

Finally, register to bid. Familiarise yourself with the rules of your state – do you have to register before you can bid? What happens when the property passes in? How do you know once it has hit reserve?

PLAN YOUR AUCTION STRATEGY

It's imperative to have an auction day strategy. This means you should know how you will bid, at what stage you're going to start bidding, and how much you are prepared to bid. Be clear about how much you



want to spend and your stretch limit - what you can reasonably afford without impeding your quality of life. Set a firm limit and stick to it.

"It's really common for buyers who are not comfortable with bidding at auctions to engage someone to bid on their behalf. This is a fantastic strategy as having a neutral person who is not financially invested means the bidding will not be emotionally driven," explains Carolyn.

Tips for auction day:

- Only bid if you intend to buy. If you win at auction, it's yours to keep.
- Introduce yourself to the auctioneer. They will remember you and look for you when seeking any higher bids. If you're not successful this time around, they will look out for you at other auctions.
- Auctions are highly unpredictable and emotionally charged. Stay calm and master your poker face to avoid giving too much away.
- · Auctions always have an open home inspection just before the auction begins. This is your opportunity to take a final look at the property, the contract and auction rules.
- Keep your eyes on the competition, especially when the bidding slows down. You can tell a lot by someone's body language and who they're talking to nearby.
- Never start bidding with your maximum amount if you get caught up in the excitement and bid more than you can afford and win, that property is yours to keep.
- Just because an auctioneer requests bidding in certain increments, that doesn't mean you have to comply. You can control the auction by bidding in odd increments – it forces the auctioneer to do more challenging arithmetic and naturally slows the pace.
- The sales agent and auctioneer are under a lot of pressure and may try to rush you, but you can take a moment to think. If they believe you have more to bid, they will wait for you.

HORNSBY ART PRIZE RETURNS WITH EXCEPTIONAL CONTEMPORARY ARTWORKS

The judging panel have made their selections, with 85 artworks being shortlisted for Hornsby Shire Council's 2023 Hornsby Art Prize. The finalist works of Painting, Drawing, Printmaking, Digital Art Stills and Sculpture will be on exhibition at Wallarobba Arts and Cultural Centre from 20 October until 5 November 2023.

Hosted in partnership with the Hornsby Art Society, the Hornsby Art Prize is a national art competition and exhibition celebrating Australian artists. This year, the competition has a total prize pool of \$23,000, with the major prize \$10,000.



HORNSBY COUNCILLOR WARREN WADDELL

It is very disappointing that the State Government has elected to defer the upgrade works to New Line Rd identified in the previous budget. This decision puts in doubt any timeline that may have provided any form of commuter relief. Residents and businesses in the rural area that have little choice but to rely on this dysfunctional piece of State infrastructure, will continue to experience anxiety, frustration, and loss of productivity for many years to come.

We do, however, have capacity to make the most of the resources we do control. In August, the Arcadia Galston Residents Association, (AGRA,) hosted an information session on projects that seek community input.

- The first is a proposal to replan and make better use of the Council operational land in Johnston Rd Galston. An opportunity exists to improve the onsite RFS facilities, improve the presentation and safety of Johnston Rd, protect and enhance on site vegetation, provide for potential recreation and to accommodate the future service needs of the Council and the community. I encourage residents to go to the Council website and click on "Have Your Say", Johnston Rd. Or use the following link: https://yoursay.hornsby.nsw.gov.au/ planning-proposal-1-3-johnson-road-galston
- In addition, residents were introduced to the Galston Village Public Domain project that seeks to enhance the presentation and functionality of Galston Village. The plan is not on exhibition just yet, but Council will be seeking community input into issues such as,

safety, parking, way signage, curb and guttering, bus stops, street furniture and landscaping.

On that note, I have also been advised that the recent change in management of the Aldi complex has resulted in toilets becoming available during the day at the eastern end of Galston village.

As we approach the official start of the fire season, I want to acknowledge our remarkable Rural Fire Service volunteers. Across Berowra there are over 1,500 local volunteers across 27 brigades who do a remarkable job. They're an extraordinary group of men and women.

They volunteer all year round. In autumn and winter they undertake drills and hazard reductions and prepare. Over the past year brigades across the two local districts have responded to over 700 incident calls. Floods, storms, multiple-vehicle accidents—no matter what the disaster, they're always there to lend a hand.

But, of course, the role the RFS volunteers play in our fire safety is their most significant contribution. Berowra is a beautiful bushland electorate. But it means we're also a bushfire prone electorate. Every year, our RFS volunteers stand ready to defend properties and lives during the fire season.

Many residents will not have lived through the terrible bushfires that ripped through our area in 2002. Those who did will remember how ferocious and devastating they were.

That is why it is so important to start getting your property ready now, in case we face similar conditions this fire season.

Make sure your bushfire survival plan is up to date and that you undertake important preventative work, like clearing out gutters or keeping your yard free of combustible material. As part of that bushfire survival plan, you should think about which valuables you need to pack up - so if you need to go, you can before it's too late.

If you've got a pool, I would also encourage you to get a static water supply (SWS) sign at your property entrance. That water might save your own home, or your neighbour's.

Thanks again to the wonderful RFS for all the work they do for our community and for all Australians.

AN EREMOPHILA **FOR EVERY GARDEN**



The speaker on 25 November at the meeting of the Parramatta and Hills Group of the Australian Plants Society will be Lyndal Thorburn, and she will be speaking about "An Eremophila for every garden".

Although Eremophilas (Umu Bushes) grow naturally in the dryer parts of Australia, they can make stunning additions to your garden. Lyndal will provide tips on growing and caring for Eremophilas, particularly in the wetter Sydney region.

While writing this, I see out the window some small birds flitting around in the shrubs, including three pairs of blue wrens (Superb Fairy Wrens). Yesterday there were 6 yellow-tail black cockatoos near the house,

making a mess of the Hakea sericeas. They usually come in threes - mum, dad and the kid who is as big as the adults but makes an endless raspy noise.

Bushfires, I understand, will be bigger better brighter in future. At the recent HotSpots bushfire workshop, we were reminded that it is the landowner's responsibility to control the fire fuel load on their properties, by hand clearing or burning of leaf litter, bark and small sticks. With the help of a few neighbours, I intend to burn multiple small areas on my place when the conditions are right (low temperatures, no wind, good firebreaks etc.). I will help others in return. This was a common practice many years ago but it died out because of over regulation, too many forms to fill out and too many people telling us we couldn't do it. We are now being encouraged to do it to slow down wildfires and better protect assets like houses. In most cases, a single approval called a Bush Fire Hazard Reduction Certificate is all you need. Look at the NSW Rural Fire Service website to learn more. If lots of bush block owners did this, life would be safer in summer, except perhaps for days with a 'Catastrophic' fire danger rating.





There are many new people in the district who may not have experienced fire in the bush. We would like to invite these people to come, watch and learn when we do these small burns. Landcare members are keen to see a renewed interest in landowners doing small cool burns throughout the area, after suitable training.

Hidden In The Hills

BIRD IDENTIFICATION

BY LACHLAN TURNER

One of the most engaging activities that can be undertaken in bushland or wetland environments is to observe those birds which frequent that immediate locality. Experienced bushwalkers keep a particular eye out for any birds they may encounter along the way.

However, there are dedicated people whose main focus when out in bushland is to concentrate solely on the birdlife around them.

For these enthusiastic people, "discovering" a new bird that they have not seen before can be a very satisfying experience.

There are a number of strategies that can be adopted for others who may find bird watching an interesting past time.

In order to "get up close and personal" with small birds who occupy the undergrowth as well as the canopy, a powerful pair of binoculars would be essential. A comprehensive field guide is also very useful when helping to identifying most birds. Appropriate clothing and footwear for the bird watcher is also advisable.

Aspects to consider when attempting to determine the type of any bird being observed, is to consider its size and colour, the shape of its head and beak, the colour and length of its legs, as well as any call that can be heard.

Being as inconspicuous as possible is advantageous, as birds, especially small ones, are very wary of unusual movement nearby. Being quiet and patient lessens any disturbance that may interrupt the process of observing the interesting habits of the bird being watched.


TRUE LIFE IS FOUND IN JESUS CHRIST


shared story and expressed emotion, a safe way to share if you will. Hans Christian Anderson put it this way, "Where words fail, music speaks."

NEIGHBOURHOOD SAFER PLACES: YOUR LAST RESORT

Glenorie is no stranger to the threat of bushfires, and it is crucial to be well-prepared for emergencies, and that includes knowing your nearest Neighbourhood Safer Place. A Neighbourhood Safer Place is an area identified as a last refuge during a bushfire emergency.

It is essential that you are aware of your closest Neighbourhood Safer Places and include these areas in your bushfire survival plan. While it is important to know the location of these safer place, it is also essential that you take the time understand the routes leading to these places, considering alternatives in case the primary route becomes impassable due to fire or other hazards.

However, not every area has an official Neighbourhood Safer Place. If that's the case for your location, identify other safe spots nearby, like well-prepared homes, distant shopping centres, or open spaces away from the bush.

In Glenorie, the Les Shore Oval Clubhouse is our designated Neighbourhood Safer Place. Let's make sure we know it well and incorporate this knowledge into our bushfire survival plans. Being prepared is our best defence!
