

GIVE TICKS THE FLICK!!!

This would have to be the worst tick season I have experienced in over a decade. With two trips to the Vets, and a close brush with death for one of my beloved cats, I am doing everything possible to prevent any further infestations.

All my cats have Seresto collars, which usually do the trick, however this year the ticks seem to be resistant to them and I have had to also use Bravecto spot on, which one cat had a reaction to. This week I removed five ticks off both myself and my cats, luckily before they had time to fully inject their poison.

Here is a list of symptoms to watch out for, and please make sure if you have a long haired cat or dog to thoroughly examine your animal every day, from top to toe, and even in the nostrils and ears. Those ticks are mighty sneaky!

CATS	DOGS
Change in sound of meow	Change in sound of bark
Loss of co-ordination in back legs	Loss of co-ordination in back/front legs
Difficulty standing	Difficulty standing/sitting
Difficulty breathing	Laboured or rapid breathing, grunting
Coughing	Coughing
Gagging/vomiting	Unable to rise from lying position
Loss of appetite	Loss of appetite

If your pet shows any of these signs, then you MUST take them immediately to your closest Vets and cross your fingers that it doesn't happen after hours (like me) when you will have to go to an Emergency clinic. Prevention is the best medicine, so please talk to

your Vet, your friends and family about which products they use (that WORK) and do your research re possible side effects.

Having a pet on Anti Tick serum, ventilator, etc can be a very costly exercise for what should be a preventable thing.

Nev was sent on his biggest challenge yet, to interview working horse, Lorien, of Lorien's Circle Arcadia and he had a big surprise waiting for him...

Nev: I was all ready to start this interview with "Why the long face?" but you are TINY! What kind of a horse are you?

Lorien: A miniature horse! Some of my friends are shetland ponies.

Nev: What is the difference between a Horse and a Pony?

Lorien: Officially it's height! A pony is under 14.2hh (hands high) or 144cm. Just to confuse everyone, some of us are miniature horses: under 102cm and we're both horses and ponies at the same time, but really that's just splitting mane hairs ;-)

Nev: What do you do here at Lorien's Circle?

Lorien: My friends and I guide guests on walking tours in Galston. We explore the bridleway around Fagan Park (even small ponies like us aren't allowed inside Fagan Park anymore). We show people how to live in the moment and connect with our beautiful countryside and animals. We also do online classes about ponies and horse care and we make the learning more fun.

Nev: Tell me a little about your fellow workers.

Lorien: There's 5 of us and we're all rescue ponies: Tiny Timmie, Tin Tin, Loki, Lunar and me - Lorien! We are between 6.3-10.2hh





(64-103cm) and 7 to 27 years old. Most of us are grey, so sometimes people can't tell us apart!

Nev: What is the best part of your working day?

Lorien: All the cuddles and carrots! We are trained using positive reinforcement and a clicker, so we love working and going out on adventures.

Nev: And the worst?

Lorien: When cars or bicycles don't slow down to safely pass us :-(

That can be scary for us.

Nev: What do you like to do when you are not working?

Lorien: For fun and exercise we compete in carriage driving and horse agility - my brother Tin Tin was the Australiasian Champion! Most days we just get to be horses in our pasture with our friends, where we enjoy lots of love and care from our people.

LUKE KELLY THE MURAL GURU

Wisemans Ferry

Originally from the UK, Luke Kelly came to Australia in 2002 and has lived in the Hawkesbury area since 2011.

As a self taught painter, Luke is inspired by Australia's natural beauty and has an ongoing obsession with capturing our unique birds and wildlife through his art. His passion for teaching and creating public art in and around his community led to him being invited to paint a water tank mural at the tiny Macdonald Valley Public School depicting images of Rainbow Lorikeets, gum flowers and the Macdonald River. Following completion of this, he was asked to paint a series of murals at other schools including Colo Heights, Wisemans Ferry, Windsor, Maroota, Middle Dural and Annangrove, and is currently creating a design at Ebenezer.

The genesis behind each mural creation is in collaboration with Luke, the teachers, students and parents of each of the schools. Taking inspiration from the local wildlife, native plants and surrounding landscape, each of the designs are unique and special to their location.

Some of these mural projects have been grant funded through the resilience program following the flooding events of 2021 and 2022. For these projects, Luke visited the schools with a small team of artists and painted with the students for the day to get them creating; thinking about their natural environment and area in which they live. The grants were awarded in order for the students to contribute to the creation of a piece of public artwork resulting in an opportunity to celebrate the positives about the area they live in, including reconnecting with the natural beauty and local wildlife. CARPE DIEM!

After a three year hiatus due to natural disasters like fire, floods and the Covid pandemic, the St Alban's Common Annual Carp Fishing Comp was back bigger and better than ever on the weekend of November 3-5.

The Lake within the St Albans Common has been the setting for the Fishing Competition since 2007, with attendees able to camp out for the weekend to immerse themselves in the full experience of the event. The competition is

a win/win situation, with recreational fishers able to enjoy their hobby, whilst at the same time clearing the lake of these destructive fish.

Carp are an introduced species which have a devastating impact on native fish and the biodiversity of our waterways, and so the fishing competition is an opportunity to try and cull the numbers of these pests, who have had free reign to grow in both size and numbers over the past several years.

There were prizes on offer for the three biggest fish caught, and this year the 1st prize of \$300 went to Tomasz Pawlus with his catch of an 11.3kg monster, which was only .5kg below the record set in 2008.

The Carp that are caught are placed in barrels of water and are collected at the end of the weekend by Michael from Turtle Rescue NSW in Valley Heights, who provides a donation to the Common Trust, and takes them back to feed the reptiles in his care. This year a total of 335kg of Carp were removed from the waterway, enough to feed the turtles for the next twelve months.


THOMAS JAMES BRIDGE UPDATE

Work is well and truly underway to repair the historic 1830's Thomas James Bridge, and surrounding landscape on Settlers Road, Wisemans Ferry.

The area around the site of the bridge, which is the oldest 'in use' bridge on mainland Australia, was badly compromised by the recent flooding, resulting in major landslip of the hillside, and complete blockage of the thoroughfare for residents and travelers for an extended period of time.

Joint funding from the State & Federal Government's recovery program has allowed Hawkesbury City Council to appoint Contractor Delaney Civil to undertake the remedial works to stabilize the adjacent rock face and reconstruct the bridge. The road is open to single lane traffic, but wait times at either end of the work site are fairly minimal.

The engineering involved to rectify this area is quite outstanding and it is a sight to behold how many vehicles and large machinery can fit on this narrow part of the road.


The Salon will continue to be open from Tuesday to Saturday, with late night trading on Tuesdays.



Glenorie Progress Association

WOW! OUR ASSOCIATIONS ARE BOTH 130 YEARS OLD!

The Glenorie Progress Association and the Galston Glenorie District Cricket Club have been around in recorded history since 1893. Glenorie was originally part of Dural and later known as North Dural.

At a meeting of the North Dural Progress Association, after an "animated discussion" and for the stated reason that "we are getting quite a little township up here, the place should be properly named", the majority of members decided on two names.

An article appeared in the *Cumberland Mercury* Page 4 December 1893 with both the GPA and GDCC in the News...

PROGRESS ASSOCIATION

The monthly meeting was held on Monday evening, Mr. Douglas (president) in the chair. An animated discussion took place on the question of changing the name of the district, and several members handed in a list of names to the chairman, the majority deciding on two names from Mr. W. Black's list, Hazledean and Glenorie.

CRICKET

Our local club met Galston last Saturday on our own ground,
North Dural being the victors by two runs. Both clubs were represented
by a strong team and good play was observable on both sides,
Sippe was in good form with the ball. North Dural are improving greatly.
W. Dettman bowled splendidly, getting most of the wickets, with an
average of seven runs per wicket. This promising young bowler will,
if he improves at the same rate, cause trouble to our opponents
in future matches. A large number of ladies again favoured the



cricketers with their presence. And the fair ones were delighted at their champions winning the match. Our boys play Galston all-day match on Boxing Day, and on New Years Day an all-day match will be played at North Dural in return.

They were later recorded to have had a "spiffing time"

North Dural was renamed Glenorie on 1 October 1894. The name Glenorie was accepted because it had the support of the local progress association.

The two associations, now the Glenorie Progress Association and the Glenorie Cricket Club both have a rich history which is deeply entwined in the community of the Hills District.

WORDS FROM RESIDENT STAN SHORE:

"James Shore (Stan's father) restarted the Glenorie Cricket Club as its President after World War II with brother Les as Secretary. Together they badgered the Baulkham Hills council to provide a recreation area on the Hill's side of the Old Northern Rd. Council eventually responded with a piece of ground. Dad then organised the locals, with their earthmoving equipment, trucks, shovels, etc., and set about building a cricket ground, with help from Council, which ended up being named the LES SHORE OVAL because of his efforts in Council to upgrade and maintain its facilities.

The whole family participated for many years. Mum became the Official Scorer for the A Grade side, winning several Association trophies for "The Neatest Scorebook". I started with the Club in 1950 as a 12yo in Glenorie's Very First Junior Team (Under 15's) progressing through the senior ranks, Captaining GCC's Very first A Grade Team to win the 1972-73 HKCA Shield. My sons, Andrew and Stephen played for the GCC. Andrew distinguished himself by representing the NSW Junior Cricket Association playing a match on the SCG.

I retired in 1993, aged 56, privileged to be playing my last game on the then Glenorie Oval, with my son, Stephen and my granddaughter, Elizabeth."

Currently the Glenorie District Cricket Club, GDCC has teams competing in Junior and senior competitions within the Hornsby Ku-ring-gai District Cricket Association. Club values are Spirit, Sportsmanship, Positivity, Integrity, Respect, Inclusivity & Tenacity.

For more than 130 years, the Glenorie Progress Association (GPA) has lobbied on behalf of the residents in two Council areas & State Government areas, for improved community services and infrastructure for Glenorie.

GPA and GDCC - we have been having a "spiffing time" for 130 years!

A DECADE OF RAINBOWS—RAINBOW LORIKEET **TOPS THE 10TH ANNUAL AUSSIE BIRD COUNT**



In early November BirdLife Australia, leaders for bird conversation in Australia, revealed the preliminary results for the Aussie Bird Count.

With more than 420,000 counted, the colourful Rainbow Lorikeet once again comes out on top, beating the Noisy Miner with nearly 220,000 and the iconic Australian Magpie with around 154,000 counted.

In total, over 80,000 Aussies counted more than 3.6 million birds during the week submitting over 100,000 checklists and observing 658 bird species.

"The enthusiasm with which Australians have taken to the Aussie Bird Count has been outstanding," said BirdLife Australia's National Public Affairs Manager, Sean Dooley.

Over the past 10 years, the Aussie Bird Count has helped raise the profile of Australia's bird life and encouraged thousands of people around the country to connect with nature.

"In addition to being good for our mental health, bird watching is often the first step towards nature conservation. We can't protect something if we don't know how it is faring in the first place."

With nearly 1 in 6 bird species in Australia at risk of extinction from threats such as climate change, habitat loss, fires, and invasive species,

BirdLife Australia relies on data to inform priorities and insights from monitoring projects such as the count to help shape our broader Bird Conservation Strategy, aiming to halt bird extinctions by 2032 and overall bird declines by 2050.

PLEASE DON'T FEED THE HORSES

Feeding horses over the fence might seem like a harmless and friendly gesture, there are several reasons why it's best to avoid doing so:

- 1. It Can Be Deadly: Some foods can be toxic for horses, and have serious consequences. The horse may not become sick for some hours after you have fed it, and the owner will not know what has happened to inform the vet. Some horses have food intolerances and allergies too, and the owner will not why their management is not working.
- 2. Diets: Many horse owners carefully manage their horses' diets. They might have restricted or special feeds for specific health conditions, be monitoring calorie intake to increase or reduce weight, or be on a strict diet to resolve a vitamin or mineral imbalance. Unplanned treats can disrupt this careful balance.
- 3. Sudden Dietary Changes: Any dietary changes for horses should be made very gradually over a week or more to prevent serious, and sometimes sudden health issues. Horses have a symbiotic relationship with the good bacteria in their digestive system to help them digest starchy foods, and it's the bacteria that cannot handle sudden changes. Things like fresh lawn clippings ferment in the horse's stomach, killing the helpful microbiome that the horse depends on. Without healthy bacteria, horses can suffer painful colic. As horses are unable to vomit, colic can be fatal, even with the best veterinary treatment.
- 4. It's not safe for the Horse: Horse owners try to minimize their horse's contact with perimeter fencing. This is especially true if its barbed wire or another structure that could injure the horse. So it is not

helpful to encourage horses to approach, touch, lean on or against fences, as those fences will eventually give way. The fences are there to keep the horse safely contained and off roads and out of other properties. This could result in unnecessary injury to the horse, along with a big vet bill. Damage to fencing because horses are trying to reach snacks they shouldn't be having is very costly to the owner too.

5. It's not safe for you: Horses can react unpredictably, especially if they're startled, protective or fighting their friend to get the treats you are offering. It can also teach them to nip, bite or snatch at fingers putting the owner or their children at risk too.

While the idea of feeding horses is heartwarming for you, and might make the horse happy in the short term, try to appreciate the owners' care and responsibility for the horse and do not feed them over the fence. If you really can't help yourself, ask the horse owner first to ensure you are not causing any harm. It's not enough to know what's safe for most horses, each horse is an individual. Don't be upset if the owner says no to snacks over the fence. They are just being a responsible horse owner!

You can be a good friend to horses by admiring them from a respectful distance.







REMEMBERING A LOCAL FLOOD HERO



WILLIE PORTER, BRONZE MEDAL.

HE RESCUED A FRIEND FROM DROWNING IN THE FLOOD WATERS BETWEEN GALSTON AND MIDDLE DURAL, THEIR BUGGY HAVING BEEN CARRIED AWAY.

The recent floods brought back the story of Willie Porter from Old Northern Road, Middle Dural who was awarded a medal for bravery in 1927.

After a period of heavy rain Willie and his neighbour Thomas McKeown were travelling from Hornsby back across the Colah Creek causeway on the part of Mid Dural Road that's now known as Sallaway Road. The current was so strong that Willie, Thomas and their horse and sulky were washed into the creek.

Willie Porter managed to save himself and his friend but the poor pony was carried away and its body was later found in Foster's Waterhole further down the creek. It's said that someone carved the pony's name, Dandy, onto a rock at the causeway where it could be seen for many years.

Willie was subsequently awarded a NSW Humane Society Bronze Medal for his courage in saving his friend. The newspaper extract (right) is taken from the Sydney Mail Wed 14 September 1927 (Source:Trove)





FROM CLASSROOM TO **CROWNING CHAMPIONS**



YEAR 10 NATIONAL STEM CHALLENGE CHAMPIONS SHINE BRIGHT

The Science and Engineering Challenge is a nationwide STEM program presented by the University of Newcastle every year providing Year 9 and 10 students with unique science and engineering experiences beyond the classroom setting.

The National Championship assembles the best of the best, with the top eight schools from across Australia, each sending 32 students (256 in total). These eight teams have earned their place in this prestigious one-day National Final.

This year, the Pacific Hills Christian School Year 10 students were crowned the 2023 Science and Engineering Challenge champions. A team of 31 Year 10 Pacific Hills students participated. They were divided into eight teams. It was game on as our students competed in the eight exhilarating challenges, going head-to-head against the other seven schools. Some of their challenges included building a bridge that could withstand eight kilograms of weight, constructing an eco-friendly house to collect maximum water supply and capable of withstanding an earthquake and typhoon, providing electricity to a city, communications through coding and other challenges. Across the day, students undertook eight STEM challenges.

Adapting to the unexpected, each of the eight Pacific Hills Christian School teams were formed randomly requiring our students to work as entirely new teams whilst undertaking the challenges that were also randomly assigned. This tested their capacity to adapt to



unpredictable circumstances, persevere and work as unified teams to cross the line as number one. "The teamwork of our students was excellent, and their innovative ideas to solve problems was inspirational. They showed resilience, perseverance and they fought hard in every challenge", said Dr Quee, Science Research Coordinator at Pacific Hills. "Students were determined to positively spur each other on to claim first place."

We celebrate the bright minds and God-given talent of our Year 10 STEM team. This accomplishment was remarkable and demonstrates their dedication, resilience, and commitment to excellence.

EV CHARGING TOWARDS ZERO EMISSIONS AND ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY

Reducing carbon emissions is a difficult challenge in the Hornsby Shire, particularly in outer urban and rural areas where residents are dependent on private vehicles for daily commutes, due to limited public transport options. Dependence on fuel engine vehicles means increased carbon emissions thereby hindering targets for environmental sustainability.

Since implementation of the Hornsby Shire Council Climate Wise Hornsby Plan 2020, which identifies transport as the second largest contributor to greenhouse gas emissions in the Shire, the Council has undertaken strong initiatives to reduce corporate greenhouse gas emissions and meet its adopted 2050 Net Zero target.

We have actively prioritised collaborative opportunities to integrate renewable energy sources, such as electric vehicle (EV) charging infrastructure, into road transport networks and community spaces. EV uptake in the Shire has been strong, with well over 1,000 EV vehicles now owned by our Hornsby residents. This quick uptake is also reflected nationally. The annual State of Electric Vehicles report (Electric Vehicle Council, June, 2023) notes the surge of EV sales in Australia has resulted in more EV's being sold in the first half of 2023 than in all of 2022. The report also states EV's have made up 8.4% of all new car sales for 2023 and public charging locations have increased by around 57%

Availability of public high-power EV charging and private EV charging at home is a strong concern for us at Hornsby Council. Recent media images show desperate EV owners outside the Shire taking unusual steps to charge their cars on a public street. Methods used include stretching extension cords across public streets, footpaths, over fences and dangling cords from trees down to the car's charging port. Such behaviour is risky, dangerous and a fire hazard.

At Hornsby Council, we have taken action to enhance accessibility of EV chargers within the Shire. In 2022, we adopted an Electric Vehicle Charging Stations on Public Land Policy to provide criteria to install, manage, maintain and remove EV charging infrastructure on public land for Shire residents who do not have EV charging off-street parking options. This policy should alleviate concerns regarding access to EV charging infrastructure and support reduction in carbon emissions.

Our Council worked with Ausgrid and JOLT Charge to install the 25th JOLT EV charger station in June, 2023, at Council's Beecroft carpark off Wongala Crescent. All of JOLT's chargers are powered by 100% Greenpower certified wind and solar energy. JOLT was founded in 2018 by Doug McNamee, who grew up in the Hornsby area. JOLT's business model provides DC fast electric vehicle public charging infrastructure, which is installed and operated at zero cost to landholders, with all costs covered by JOLT. JOLT provides free daily charging of



up to 7kWh (40-50km of range) to consumers. 88.9% of residents and tenants within a 50-metre radius of the Beecroft site supported the JOLT proposal prior to its installation. The Beecroft JOLT EV Charger has provided over 750 hours of charging which has delivered over 90,000km worth of range to drivers (as at October 2023) The JOLT EV charger at Beecroft also attracts visitors from outside the region. (In the attached photograph: The red Tesla EV car is being charged at the Beecroft JOLT charger. The Tesla had travelled from Wagga Wagga and its owners were charging their vehicle, then driving back to Wagga (534 kms) via the Sydney CBD). There are presently five other EV charging stations available in retail locations across the Hornsby Shire. Council staff are now examining submissions made by residents following our resolution and public exhibition in October 2023, of draft amendments to the Hornsby Development Control Plan. These amendments are designed to identify and require minimum EV charging connection points for new residential and commercial developments and to reinforce and promote future EV uptake in these developments. This will avoid the need for expensive retrofitting in the future. Established residential and commercial development will be unaffected.

STILL CREEK LANDCARE **INSECT POLLINATORS IN THE GARDEN**

Insect pollination is the most efficient and reliable mechanism for plants to set seed and reproduce. Sadly, pollinator populations, particularly bee populations are decreasing as we are clearing land for urban development, remove vegetation and use pesticides.

The Australian Pollinator Count is a citizen science project that is conducted once a year, in spring, and aims to measure the abundance and diversity of insect pollinators. It categorises insects into broad groupings of various native bees and European honey bees, native and exotic flies, beetles, butterflies, moths and skippers, native and European wasps and other insects.

The Australian Pollinator Count supports participating citizen scientists through a

range of online information. I also used the opportunity to attend a short workshop hosted by Hornsby Shire Council.

After that, simply count the insect pollinators that are visiting your flowers in any 10 minutes and submit the count sheet.

The real fun started after that, when I relaxed with a cup of tea in the garden. I became so acutely aware of the large number of pollinators in my garden. Various native bees and flies were feeding on native plants. herbs gone to flower and my salvias. Various butterfly species were showing off and looking for mates, and some of the untidy areas of the garden with bamboo sticks and dead wood had turned already into pollinator nurseries.

By conserving existing pollinator habitat, having large patches of a variety of different flower species available during the year and not using pesticides, we can help our pollinators to maintain required numbers.

After all, we need pollinators to help us to grow our food and flowers and to maintain our natural environment.

At our recent meeting, we had an interesting talk about Bromeliads. Alan bought along some of his collection and the members were able to purchase some of his interesting plants. In fact, he had nothing to take home.

For a feature plant in a shady or sheltered area in the garden or even for indoors, you cannot look past the Bromeliad. All arising from the same family (Bromeliaceous) there are a wide range of bromeliads to choose from. They provide great foliage colour and form to the garden, can grow in trees and even produce fruit! Easy to grow and propagate they are a must have for the avid or beginner gardener... They like full sun, regular watering, well drained/sandy soil, and are suitable for all climatic zones.

Choose a spot in the garden that receives filtered sun and has well-drained soil. In poorly drained areas, create an elevated mound for free-draining soil or chunky orchid mix. Dig a hole in the prepared mounds the same size as the root ball. Holding the main body of the plant with one hand, gently backfill the hole, pushing the soil under and around the roots so that the plant is sitting high on the mound. If the plant is unstable, you can use some supports such as stones or pots to hold it upright while its roots settle in.

Water in well. Ensure that you also place some water into the central part of the plant, as this is where they draw in further moisture as well. Food each spring and autumn with Dynamic lifter soil improver and plant fertiliser by applying around the root zone and water in well.


WATERCOURSES AND WATERFALLS



Due to the somewhat rugged terrain in some of our local bushland reserves it can be expected that numerous creeks course through the narrow floors of steep gullies. In many places water tumbles over rock ledges as it makes its way downstream.

At times its progress is slowed where pools and ponds have formed due to a rock shelf holding back the flow. This in turn can create picturesque scenes, many of which are accessible from walking tracks which generally follow these watercourses.

It is where the water flows slower that bushwalkers are more likely to encounter water birds and water dragons. Where there is suitable vegetation in which these creatures can hide the bushwalker may need





to wait quietly for a time to make these creatures think that it is safe to come out of hiding.

In times of heavy rainfall however it is advisable to NOT be in the vicinity of these creeks as waters may rise guickly. This is due mainly to the more rapid run-off from built up areas accessing natural watercourses more quickly. At times a "wall" of water may flow with considerable force along the creek lines, joining forces with other tributary watercourses, forming a dangerous current that can sweep away anything in its path that is not firmly attached to the ground.

Mostly though, watercourses and waterfalls in our bushland reserves present a much more peaceful, enjoyable and pleasant environment to stop and spend some time. It is along these creeks that can be found a wide variety of flowering plants, delicate ferns and colourful fungi, that thrive on the moist conditions provided by the flowing water. There is also an increased presence of birds where water is accessible to them, along with more insects for them upon which to feed.

As I sit down to write this final magazine article for 2023, I'm shaking my head because the months have flown by so quickly with so much happening in each of our lives.


