A Love Story for the Ages Platinum Anniversary for Rowland Village Couple

Within the space of one week in September 2023, local couple Ray and Evelyn Cunningham celebrated two exceptional milestones – Ray's 100th Birthday and the couple's 70th Wedding Anniversary.

Evelyn and Ray met in Evelyn's father's house in 1944 when Ray was home for further training based at Wagga after serving on the Kokoda track. Ray was with the 14th Field Co. Engineers of the Australian Army's 9th Division, while Evelyn was on holiday from university. The pair didn't marry until 9 years later, in September 1953.

'I was just so slow in asking her to marry me!' Ray says.

After they married, Ray and Evelyn served with the Borneo Evangelical Mission in the East Malaysian State of Sarawak amongst 4 different tribal groups, each in their own language and culture. In those early years, all travel was by river.

During their time in Borneo, Ray worked as an ordained Baptist minister, visiting the longhouses, teaching a new way of life and translating the Scriptures. Evelyn, who had some training in Linguistics, was able to work out a scientifically accurate orthography for two of the unwritten languages. With reading primers, the local children could then learn to read in 6 weeks.

Their two children, Gwen and Kathy, were born in Borneo. The birth of their first child was a particularly terrifying and ultimately memorable experience.

Evelyn recalls 'While I was waiting at our Mission base for the birth of our first child, Ray was visiting longhouses in the interior. He caught typhoid fever and nearly died.'

'He had to be airlifted to the Shell Co. Hospital in Brunei, the only hospital in our area. I was then also taken to this hospital for the birth of our child and, thankfully, all the family ultimately emerged from the ordeal healthy and well.'

Ray and Evelyn have lived in the local area since their return in 1991 and in Rowland Village in Galston for the last two decades.

When asked about the secret to their long marriage and lives (Evelyn is only a few years younger than Ray), both Evelyn and Ray credited their deep faith in God.

'For us, marriage isn't according to whim. We believe in the covenant "til death do us part." Ray says.

Evelyn adds 'Above all, we stick together, and we support each other.'

70 years on from their wedding, Ray and Evelyn remain very much in love.

Julian Leeser MP, the Federal Member for Berowra, recently visited Ray and Evelyn to congratulate them on these outstanding milestones.

'Their commitment to their marriage, faith, and family is an inspiration to us all.'





Australia Day Heroes

Graham Staggs (OAM) and his wife Adele Staggs (OAM) from Glenhaven have both been honoured for their work with the Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia for nearly 20

Now in their 80s the couple say the honours are "absoloutely amazing" Adele said her husband underwent surgery for prostate cancer in 2004 and the surgeon suggested he attend the Prostate Support organisation at The Sydney Adventist Hospital.

"It started from there," she said. "He was (then) asked by the Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia to join the Chapeer Council (representing NSW) and from there he was asked if he would lead a support group in Dural.

Graham founded the Dural and District Prostate Cancer Support Group in 2012 and has seen it grown to help hundreds of people.

"It does make a big difference to some people when they realise they are not alone in this and they realise there are many other men going through the same thing," he said.

"We never give medical advice but were are experts in the experience."

> Adele said she started the carers' support group because she could see that getting the support of other carers was important.

> > "We go to coffee shops and talk about how we are coping and people feel better."







Man charged after aged-care resident allegedly sexually assaulted - Galston

A man will appear in court today charged following an investigation into an alleged sexual assault at an aged care home in Sydney's northwest.

On Friday 12th January 2024, police were called to an aged-care home in Galston following reports an 87-year-old woman had been sexually assaulted.

Police were told a man, who is known to visit the facility, had allegedly entered the woman's room, on two occasions before sexually assaulting her.

NSW Ambulance paramedics treated the woman who was taken to Royal North Shore Hospital however did not suffer any serious physical injuries.

A crime scene was established as detectives attached to Kuring-Gai Police Area Command commenced an investigation.

Following inquiries, police executed a search warrant at a home in Asguith about 7.40pm Friday 12th January 2024 and arrested an 80-vear-old man.

He was taken to Hornsby Police Station where he was charged with aggravated sex assault – victim with cognitive impairment, aggravated – sexually touch another person and fail to comply with direction storage of firearm.

The man was refused bail to appear in Parramatta Local Court today (Saturday 13th January 2024).

Officers from The Hills Highway Patrol suspend a P1 licence holder travelling well above the sign posted speed limit running late to a party.

About 2.30pm on Monday 25th December 2023, officers detect a Holden Commodore along Old Northern Road, Glenorie travelling at 115km/hr in a sign posted 60 km/hr zone. Officers stopped the vehicle and spoke with a 17-year-old male driver from Maroota. The driver has only been a holder of an NSW C Class P1 licence for 2 months and stated to officers, "I didn't realise I was doing that speed! can you forget you stopped me". The driver returned negative results for alcohol and drugs.

The driver was issued an infringement notice for P1 driver Exceed Speed Limit - over 45 km/hr, his NSW driver's licence was suspended and confiscated on the spot for a period of 6 months. The vehicle was not owned by the driver and the number plates remained on the vehicle.

23 year old man arrested - High Range Drink Driving 0.168 after crash at Dural

It will be alleged in Parramatta Court next month that the 23 year old Glenwood man was driving a Ford Ranger on Wyoming Road Dural at 7.40am on Thursday the 28th December 2023 when he crashed the vehicle. It is also allged that he left the scene on foot. Police and Emergency Services arrived a short time later. Police Dog Unit - NSW Police Force conducted a search for the driver, and found him in Landford Road hiding. He was subjected to a road side alcohol test, which returned a positive reading. He was arrested and conveyed to Castle HIII Police Station, where he returned a Blood Alcohol reading of 0.168. His licence was immediately suspended, and he was given a Court Attendance Notice to attend Parramatta Local Court next month.

At 3am on Thursday 11th January 2024 a Porsche Macan was stolen during a break and enter at Cranstons Road, Middle Dural, At 12.05am on Friday the 12/1/24 five teenagers were arrested in the vehicle after it was involved in a police Pursuit at Whalan involving PolAir - NSW Police Force Aviation Command.

THE CHARLES RODIUS EXHIBITION

On a recent visit to the State Library of NSW, by pure chance I happened to come upon an exhibition of early colonial artworks. The exhibition is billed as the 'first ever retrospective of 19th Century Australia's best unknown artist, Charles Rodius'.

Born Joseph Myer in 1802 in Cologne, Germany, as a teenager he moved to Paris, France, where he studied art and worked as a teacher of "music, painting, drawing and languages in families of the first distinction".

Relocating to London in 1827, Myer changed his name to Charles Rodius. In early 1829 he was charged with stealing a perfume bottle, tickets, an opera glass and a handkerchief from a woman's purse. Rodius defended himself, arguing that the items were gifts from some of his female students. Whatever the truth, he was convicted and sentenced to seven years'

transportation to the Australian penal colony of New South Wales. Upon arrival in Australia, Rodius's skills as a draughtsman were utilised by the colonial authorities and he was assigned to the Department of Public Works in Sydney. He taught drawing to civil and military officers and helped to draft plans for proposed colonial buildings. Rodius was also commissioned as a portraitist by members of the colony's elite. With the support of his patronage, Rodius was

his own living as an artist-which was changed to a ticket of leave two years later in 1834. Finally in July 1841, Rodius was granted his certificate of freedom.

Rodius remained in Australia where he continued to create portraits of well-known colonial identities, as well as painting many images of indigenous Australians.

One of the colonial identities on display is an exquisite miniature portrait painted on ivory of our very own Solomon Wiseman's second wife, Sophia. This work was purchased by the State Library

> for over \$50,000 at a Melbourne Art Auction in October 2023. The painting was previously owned by the late Bruce Kerr, who had purchased it for \$850 on ebay in the US. It was very exciting to see, as there is a dearth of information regarding Sophia Wiseman, let alone pictorial representations.

> Another portrait that was hanging in the same vicinity was a dark and brooding painting of Sophia's husband, Solomon. Dressed in gentleman's finery, the ex convict cuts a dapper figure. His visage is stern, and he holds an open Bible in one

hand, and his ever present telescope in the other. This painting, donated in 1994, does not have an artist attributed to it, however it is not too much of a stretch to imagine that if Rodius was granted a sitting with Sophia, perhaps he was commissioned to paint Solomon as well.

Charles Rodius suffered a stroke in the late 1850s, leaving him paralysed on one side, and on 9th April 1860 he died "of infirmity" at Sydney's Liverpool Hospital. He outlived two wives and is believed to have had a son in 1834.

'Hello Hornsby': Caring, sharing and... lots of fun

It is great news that the Hornsby Shire Council 'Hello Hornsby' program, designed to provide and incorporate a range of activities for the benefit of our Hornsby Shire residents, aged 60+ years, is continuing in 2024. In 2023. buoyed by a NSW Government grant, this program also held events correlated with International, National and State event weeks, such as International Women's Day, NAIDOC Week, National Volunteer Week, Dementia Action Week and 'Wear it Purple Day'.

Nearly a quarter of the Hornsby Shire population is aged 60+ years. This age group often faces several changes due to retirement, becoming an 'empty nester' and/or a carer, 'downsizing', widowhood and/or changes in health. These changes can affect the ability of our 60+ residents to connect with and maintain friendship networks and their community, as well as access social support. In Hornsby Shire, such changes can intensify social isolation for our rural residents, due to poor transport options and limited access to services.

Council staff crafted the 'Hello Hornsby' program to bridge our Shire communities, by giving residents the opportunity to enjoy a range of events, free of charge, in a variety of urban and rural locations. The informal morning teas and the River Postman trip down the Hawkesbury were very special but I will highlight two events held in October that shone in their impact. The Carers Week Comedy Show, held at the Hornsby RSL, attracted 200 participants who were either carers for a person with a disability, long term illness or old age or were persons who are recipients of that care. The Comedy Show created much laughter but more poignant was the shared conversation and laughter I saw amongst the attendees whilst they enjoyed their buffet lunch. Several participants advised me, without complaint, that this event is the only outing they have had away from their carer responsibilities that year.

The Grandparents Day, held at Koala Park, attracted 400 grandparents and grandchildren and a waiting list. For many attendees, it was their first opportunity as a family to see a koala, kangaroo and different species of birds up close. It was wonderful to observe the relaxed interactions, laughter and 'shared moments' between grandparents, their grandchildren and other Hornsby Shire families, whilst they enjoyed the Park, fed the animals, and took photographs of each other.

The 'Hello Hornsby' program clearly provides attendees with a firm sense of belonging to their Hornsby Shire community. Such a



'belonging' opens the possibility for our older residents to reach out to others within their local community and take proactive steps to adapt to changes in their life. In January, the 2024 program began with a well-attended coffee morning for residents in the Hornsby Library. This event was an excellent entrée to another year of 'Hello Hornsby's' caring, sharing and fun experiences.

Hidden In The Hills

Scribbly Gum

The name "Scribbly Gum" can refer to a number of eucalypts. The main owner of the name Scribbly Gum (Eucalyptus haemastoma) is possibly the best known example in our Hills District bushland.

This tree generally is not very tall with a number of short trunks growing from a single root system similar to the group of eucalypts know as mallee. It is characterised by those wriggly lines that appear on the bark.








These wandering lines are where an insect has burrowed just under the surface of the bark, finding a source of food in or under this top layer of bark, leaving the characteristic wriggly trail on the surface.

The pale colour of the bark makes this tree stand out against the dull green colour of the adjacent heathland in which it often grows.

A closely related variety known as the Hard-leaved Scribbly Gum (Eucalyptus sclerophylla) exhibits similar bark colouration and typical scribbles. However it prefers a habitat with open woodland and forest, surviving on shallow to deep sandy soils. This more erect medium sized tree can grow up to 20 metres high.

Yet another similar variety found in the general region is the Narrow-leafed Scribbly Gum (Eucalyptus racemosa). It can grow to much larger proportions, is less mis-shapen and more erect when compared to the other two above. As its name implies, its leaves are much narrower than the others. This tree can survive quite well in poorer but moist sandstone soils.

This obvious infestation of insects does not appear to be detrimental to the welfare of the tree.

Galston District Garden Club

The Galston Garden Club will be resuming monthly meetings from Wednesday the 14th February 2024. Meetings are held on the 2nd Wednesday of each month and visitors and new members are warmly welcome. The meetings are held at the Galston Community Centre, 37 Arcadia Rd, Galston at 7.30pm.

We are an informal and friendly group, and no matter what your gardening knowledge, you can be sure that you can look forward to pleasant company. Your botanical knowledge will be entirely adequate. Members range from beginners to very experienced. We use our interest in gardening as a great excuse for social gatherings and garden rambles. There will be interesting talks and displays at each meeting, we have a large and extensive library of gardening books and DVDs that members can borrow.

Each year, we hold the Galston District Open Gardens Weekend on the third weekend in October, to fundraise for local community projects and charities. About eight gardens are opened to visitors.

It seems a common thread among the garden owners that have opened their gardens in past years that the "privet" plant/tree was a project to clear from their properties when establishing their gardens. In some cases a project over many years.

Native to Asia, Chinese privet is a large shrub that has been widely distributed in Australia as a garden hedge plant. Narrow-leaf and broad-leaf privet (Ligustrum sinenses and Ligustrum lucidum) can be legally sold in NSW plant nurseries while in 57 local government areas privet must be actively controlled on private property. Both species thrive in a wide range of climates and will tolerate droughts and cold and/or wet conditions. The leaves and berries of privet are considered poisonous to humans and most animals.




The pollen and scent of the flowers are often thought to increase the chance of respiratory problems such as asthma and hay fever. Birds can disperse seeds. The plant can displace native plants and can rapidly invade bush margins and waste areas, potentially inhibit native seed germination, and become the dominant species in an area.

To physically control privet, pull out young plants before they get too large, as they have a taproot, which makes it very hard to pull out as they age. Cut down trees/shrubs and immediately apply a poison. However, more care must be taken using this method.

The reason is I live on a bush block with bush right up to the house and I absolutely love it. I can't bear the thought of clearing it to make what they call an "asset protection zone" around my house and around other assets that I value. What will happen to the small birds, wallabies, possums, echidnas, goannas, water dragons etc. who provide us with much entertainment?

But lately other news has been intruding into my inactivity concerning bushfires. Things like:

- · 2023 was the world's hottest year on record
- in many places, temperatures reached over 50°
- people have died when they couldn't find a cool place
- the atmosphere has a lot more energy causing hotter more frequent heat waves, colder winters, stronger storms, worse floods, longer droughts
- many bushfires are not like we remember them 20 years ago.
 They are bigger, hotter, harder to control. I've been told I need to update my thinking.

All this information has finally convinced me that my little house may well burn down in the next bushfire unless I change my ways

and do something! So I read about asset protection zones and learnt that you don't need to remove all plants. Trees and shrubs can be left provided they are separated horizontally by several metres, and no branches overhang the roof. I also learnt that the speed the fire travels is dependent on the amount of leaf litter and fine sticks on the ground. Remove these, leaving just enough to provide protection from soil erosion. My house is on a slope and fire travels faster uphill, so the protection zone should be wider on the downhill side. There is a lot more information on the Rural Fire Service (RFS) and Council websites.

Working hard, I am about half way through my "Things to do" list. I have just prepared a Bush Fire Survival Plan which I found rather challenging. I am also aware that if we get a fire when the Fire Danger Rating is Catastrophic or Extreme, the fire will probably be a monster like we see on TV. Because I am so close to the bush, I will leave well before the fire arrives and find a safe place. I'll be surprised if my house survives. If the Fire Danger Rating is High or Moderate, my house might survive because of my good preparation. That thought keeps me going.

I wonder how many other local landowners have gone through the same change of attitude as me.
