Official reopening of Galston Aquatic and Leisure Centre celebrates refurbishments and enhanced accessibilty

Excitement was in the air at the official grand reopening of the newly upgraded Galston Aquatic and Leisure Centre (GALC) last Saturday, 3rd February.

Representing The Hon Stephen Kamper MP, Minister for Sport, Hornsby Shire Councillor Janelle McIntosh was joined by Hornsby Shire Mayor The Hon Philip Ruddock AO and Member for Hornsby Matt Kean MP at GALC for a ribbon-cutting and an official unveiling of the Centre's new features and accessibility improvements, designed to enhance the facility and extend its life for many more years of use by local swimmers.

Delivered with support from the NSW Government through a Greater Cities Sport Facility Fund grant, the refurbishments to GALC included the installation of a new roof and the addition of a large, family changing room as well as a multi-purpose changing area equipped with hoists and adult changing tables – greatly improving accessibility for people with disability or undergoing rehabilitation.

In addition to functional improvements, a modernisation of the Centre's aesthetics makes for a more comfortable, family-friendly environment suitable for the diverse needs of the surrounding community, from the learn-to-swim families, attendees of the popular aqua fitness classes as well as squad training and events for local swimming groups.

"It was an honour to cut this ribbon today and reopen the doors to such a treasured community asset in Galston. The Galston Aquatic and





Leisure Centre is an important amenity of the area and crucial for our local children to learn to swim and be pool-safe," said Hornsby Shire Mayor The Hon Philip Ruddock AO.

"The improvements to change rooms and enhanced accessibility are simply essential to ensuring that everyone feels welcomed and safe at our pools, whether they're learning to swim or swimming for fitness or leisure. Who knows, they could be Hornsby Shire's next swimming Olympian!"

Minister for Sport, Steve Kamper, said projects like these show the Government's commitment to delivering quality infrastructure that meets the current and future needs of the community.

"Projects such as these show the vital role that sporting infrastructure plays in keeping communities healthy, active and connected by providing a place for people of all ages and abilities to swim for fun, fitness or their Olympic aspirations."

Councillor Janelle McIntosh was buoyed by the accessibility improvements she experienced at the centre.

"As a Councillor, I am passionate about representing and supporting our residents living with disability along with seniors in our community. The upgrades ensure that the facility is accessible for all. I am delighted and proud that their needs, and those of their families and carers, have been considered and addressed through these upgrades so they too can enjoy the health benefits of swimming."

It is incredible to believe that The Miss Universe Competition has been running for over 70 years. Officially recognised as starting in 1952, throughout this period, the rules for selection of entrants have remained fairly static, however the times they are a changin'! In the past several years boundary lines have shifted, and now married women and mothers can compete, and the upper age limit (previously 18-28years) has been extended.

For the first time in its history, two transgender women competed in the 2023 event as well as an entrant (Miss Nepal) who was considered to be a 'plus size' competitor.

Further breaking down the draconian barriers, is 33 year old Philippine born Model, and Dural resident, Christine Balaguer, who not only is married, but is also profoundly deaf. Christine has been selected as a State Finalist for Miss Universe, Australia 2024. I met with her last month for a photo shoot at the new Galston Aquatic Centre, and I must admit I was slightly concerned as to how I and the Photographic team would communicate – as I do not know Auslan, and Christine does not lip read extensively. I should not have worried - with the help of lots of gesturing, paper, pen, notes on phones and an App called AVA, we managed to complete a fantastic shoot. Christine's professionalism and determination not to let her deafness get in the way of living her best life, as well as her obvious natural beauty – external and internal was inspirational to see.

On being selected as a finalist, Christine says,

"This milestone is not just a personal achievement, but a testament to the power of dreams transcending borders. From my pageant beginnings in the Philippines to this moment in Australia, the path has been rich with challenges and triumphs. As a deaf contestant, I've faced hurdles, but each step has been a testament to the strength of perseverance and the beauty of diversity. This opportunity to represent in the prestigious Miss Universe Australia pageant is more than a chance for personal glory; it's a platform to amplify the voices of those who've been told their dreams are limited. Breaking barriers is not just a goal; it's a commitment to paving the way for inclusivity and showcasing that beauty knows no bounds. I extend my deepest gratitude to everyone who has been a part of my journey and believed in the power of dreams. This isn't just about me; it's about opening doors for others and proving that with passion, determination, and unwavering belief, one can conquer any obstacle. Here's to chasing dreams, shattering stereotypes, and embracing the limitless potential within us all."

The last Australian to take home the Miss Universe crown was Jennifer Hawkins in 2004, so we wish Christine all the luck in the world.

Swimming pools or muddy puddles

At the recent opening of Galston Pool, Mayor Ruddock told a story about when he and I were kids, we swam in a waterhole in the bush at Pennant Hills. The story brought back a lot of memories.

I lived on 5 acres of bush at Laurence Street Pennant Hills. There were 5 of us kids and 4 boys next door. We were a bit wild. Philip Ruddock lived just up the road and occasionally joined us. Sometimes my Mum couldn't stand the noise and yelled at us to "get down the bush and don't come back till tea time". Our place was next to Elouera Reserve (now part of Berowra Valley National Park), so there was bush for miles. We spent much of our lives down there racing around, climbing trees, playing in caves, chasing snakes, catching frogs.

The Waterfall was our favorite place. It was a pond about 15m round and 1.5m deep, with leaves and sticks on the bottom. There was a huge rock overhanging the pond, and the creek flowed over the edge and fell into the water. Those who were brave enough used to jump off the rock and land in the water about 7m below, our feet sinking into leaves, sticks and mud. With a howl of excitement, we'd climb up a vertical rock ledge using small holes someone had chiselled into the sandstone and do it all again. We also found soft rocks and rubbed them on a damp rock near a puddle to make orange or red war paint. We painted our faces and arms to look extra fierce. That night, we had to go last in the bath because the water went orange. As I write this, I realise again how much things have changed. We had no computers, mobile phones, social media or supermarkets but we did have a cow, 2 horses, a big vegie patch, lots of chooks, a "bury your own" toilet and the bush to enjoy.



We thought our waterfall was the best place to swim. We felt sorry for kids who had to swim in a proper chlorinated swimming pool with all those other people and no rocks to climb. But being realistic, we can't all have muddy ponds to splash around in. Given that, a proper swimming pool would be good place to go. I hope that the upgraded Galston pool becomes a favorite place for the whole community. I wonder if the kids of today, when they turn eighty and swimming pools are buried under high-rise buildings, will tell stories of the good times they had splashing about in those old-fashioned things called swimming pools.

At the recent opening of the Galston Aquatic Centre, Hornsby Mayor, Philip Ruddock recounted a lovely anecdote regarding the days before Community pools were readily accessible, of when he was a young boy and used to swim in a 'pond' close to his home with a mate called Barry Lees.

As Barry is a regular contributor to the *GCN*, I approached him to ask if he could expand on this reminiscence, and write a small article. Within a week of receiving his story, I also heard from long term resident and eminent Horticulturist Mrs Judy Horton, who was very pleased to tell me about an issue she has been fighting for some time – the correction of the name of the reserve that contains the Fosters Waterhole from Forsters Reserve to the correct spelling (without the 'r') - a big win for common sense, but a lot of red tape involved!

Foster's Waterhole, located off Mid Dural Road, is considered to be the "original" community pool for the area and has a long history dating back to the 1890's. It was the site for many a carnival and the home base of the Pioner Swimming Club.

Important notice re Soft Plastics **Recyling**

Attention Hornsby Shire Residents! If you are thinking about taking your soft plastics for recycling to any of the Recycling Depots, please read the following information.

I sat in the line of cars for 10mins waiting to recycle my bootload of plastics, only to be turned away after they were scanned and deemed to be 'contaminated' meaning that I was forced to take them all home again to sort through and weed out the pesky items. Even if you have a postage bag with a paper address label still attached this will be rejected and you must cut out the offending bit and then re-present. Please note, that this mandate is coming from the company that takes the soft plastics and not the Council itself. As an avid recycler, I fear that as much as we all want to reduce landfill, many people who are trying to do the right thing will just give up if it becomes too complicated and time consuming.



The Hills Shire Council Releases Planning Proposal

THSC has released a draft Planning Proposal and Draft DCP for Agritourism in Rural Areas for public exhibition until **22nd March 2024**.

The Planning Proposal is aiming to support agritourism and small-scale agricultural development in the rural areas of the Hills Shire. Some of the key initiatives of the proposal area:

- 1. Permit 'farm gate premises' in the RU6 Transition zone this means buildings or places whereby commercial farm operators can sell their products on a retail basis on their property and can also include areas where food and drink can be consumed & entertainment can be provided. Cellar door premises will also be permissible as a far gate premises within the RU6 zone;
- 2. Introduce new conditions for 'farm stay accommodation' this is currently permissible in the RU6 zone. The Planning Proposal is seeking to expand the definition to allow for accommodation in moveable dwellings (such as tents and caravans) in addition to accommodation in buildings; &
- 3. Introduce new conditions for farm gate premises seeking to incorporate new development criteria for the development of farm gate premises. These criteria do not include numeric standards for gross floor area and number of guests as these standards may have been too restrictive. Rather, they have not included numeric controls and used development standards.

THSC are recommending not to permit 'farm experience premises' which would include function centres on RU6 lands in order to mitigate impacts such as noise, traffic, parking and visual impacts.

The Planning Proposal and Draft DCP are available for public comment on THSC website **www.thehills.nsw.gov.au** up until the **22nd March, 2024**.

Progress on the Brewery for Glenorie

As you may be aware, the GPA has been playing an active role in engaging with community, local government and the applicant in relation to the proposed 'Artisan Food and Drink Premises'. The GPA hosted a community forum and consultative discussions with the applicant to ensure local community concerns surrounding the proposal are respectfully and appropriately articulated. The Hills Shire Council shared their feedback, echoing much of what has been said of the local community including: Inconsistencies between the plans/documentation; Reduced production capacity, Reduced height to comply with the LEP. Reduced site coverage to comply with the DCP, plus amend Parking and vehicular movement, Stormwater & Wastewater treatment & Acoustics.

After considerable dialogue, the amended plans have been resubmitted to Council. Thanks to the applicant for their ongoing open dialogue with the community and its members. The GPA looks forward to reviewing the revised plans.

New State Government Planning proposals

Changes to create low and mid-rise housing

The proposed reforms seek to:

- Allow dual occupancies (two dwellings on the same lot) in all R2 low density residential zones across NSW.
- Allow terraces, townhouses and 2 storey apartment blocks near transport hubs and town centres in R2 low density residential zones across the Six Cities Region.
- Allow mid-rise apartment blocks near transport hubs and town centres in R3 medium density zones across the six cities region.

This will mean more housing within walking distance from transport hubs, shops, and amenities. It will encourage better uptake of low and mid-rise housing where it is already permitted under the current rules by introducing new planning controls.

The proposed changes were on exhibition for public comment until Friday 23rd February 2024.



from the **Mayor's Desk**

There has been much coverage in the media recently about the NSW Government's housing reforms, in particular around low and mid-rise housing, and I wanted to share with you Council's response to these and how we are advocating for our community.

Following the December 2023 announcement by the Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure (DPHI) to exhibit its *Explanation of Intended Effect:* Changes to create low and mid-rise housing, we resolved to make a submission on the proposal, outlining our concerns and recommendations. We will encourage the NSW Government to set clear housing targets and allow councils to develop and implement their own responses having regard to the character of their local area and community expectations.

Our submission will highlight our concerns that the density of development proposed under the state-wide approach to deliver housing will impact the character of the Shire's suburbs, heritage, environment and tree canopy, infrastructure and overdevelopment in hazard areas (prone to risks such as bush fires and flooding) and parts of the Shire without adequate supply of wastewater as well as sewerage infrastructure.

It will also underscore our commitment to deliver a diverse range of housing under our adopted Local Housing Strategy which has been prepared following extensive consultation with our community. We will request an exemption from the proposed changes to progress our own local medium density housing strategy.

We are committed to continuing to deliver housing to meet the needs of our community. But we're concerned by the 'one size fits all' approach that is outlined in the proposal. The density of development that would be permitted would simply be far too great and would be devastating to other objectives of environmental and heritage conservation in Hornsby Shire. As your Mayor, I am committed to ensuring that we achieve our housing targets appropriately, and I hope the state government works with us to ensure this is achieved.

DURAL AND DISTRICT HISTORICAL SOCIETY INC. News from History Cottage

What a wonderful start to the Society's 2024 year with 90 members and friends in attendance at the February meeting. Using an event in Pennant Hills in 1906 lawyer Rod Best presented an outstanding talk that contrasted past and present social attitudes to sections of our population, in that case to the Chinese. In the light of present tensions between different groups within our population, his talk was a timely reminder of the benefits of our multicultural country.



The Society archives are the custodian of a great deal of family and local history. It was therefore a privilege to be given a collection containing photos, certificates and a small diary. This last mentioned opens with the words: "Left Northern Ireland Tuesday 13th November 1894". After recounting the day's events for the journey, it ends with the lines: "December 31st 1894 entered Sydney Harbour at 7.00 o'clock in the morning and cast anchor at half past 7. Charlie came on board at eight. Commenced work in Galston on 1st January 1895".

What a priceless record this little book is of the voyage of a young man starting a new life in a strange country. His family name is now quite familiar in our community.

A collection of deeds, for land that forms part of the original George Hall 600 acres grant of 1819, has been kindly lent by the current owners. When copied these will be added to the large collection of maps and land records that is available for approved research. Enquiries to **9653 1365**.

It is through the interest, generosity and concern for local history that members of our community can assist in understanding and preserving the unique community in which we live.

Our guest speaker for March will be local identity and published researcher, Trevor Knight. He will tell of his visit to Germany and Switzerland and the solving of a long unanswered family mystery.



Recycle and Repurpose your Coffee: a Win-Win for our Environment

Congratulations to Witham's Coffee Hornsby, who have been recently recognised as Local Waste Champions. Apart from having fabulous coffee, Witham's has stepped up by recycling and repurposing its roastery and café byproducts, to ensure minimal waste and less recycling contamination. In acting local, using sustainable practices, they contribute to global environmental sustainability.

Australians love of coffee means an estimated 90% (around 2.7 million) of all disposable coffee cups thrown away daily end up in landfill. Most paper coffee cups are lined with waterproof plastic lining that do not break down and they contribute around 60,000 kilograms of plastic waste each year. Even when their paper breaks down, soft plastic will remain and become a pollution hazard.

How can we dispose of our coffee products in a way that results in minimal waste and sustains our environment? Withams Coffee donates used coffee grounds to Edgeworth David Community Garden and recycles coffee chaff with Herfo's Woodshed, to create coffee compost. Galston cafes have done that too. Over a five-year period, my husband collected coffee grounds from two Galston cafes weekly and used it in our compost. Coffee grounds have a high nitrogen content and assist in creating organic matter, improving the ability of soil to hold water. Now we just use our own coffee grounds, adding them directly to our soil.

There are advances in production of recyclable coffee cups, but the process is costly. However, there are opportunities in our Hornsby Shire that assist in coffee cup recycling. Simply Cups has three drop off locations in the Shire for separate disposal of cups and lids. Simply Cups recycles cups to make various items, including furniture and car park bumpers. RecycleMe has a collection point for 100% recyclable coffee cups at Thornleigh, which Shred-Xm collects and processes into new paper products, such as 100% recycled copy paper. You can also choose to buy coffee from Responsible Cafes whose ratings are based on their positive environmental actions.

How can we work with our Hornsby Council to reduce waste and safeguard our environment? The present recycling contamination rate in Hornsby is 10%. There is some resident misunderstanding as to what part of the coffee cup can be recycled. The plastic coffee lid goes into the yellow recycling bin to be recycled with other hard plastics, but the



cup must go into the general red bin. Our Hornsby Shire Council Single-Use Plastics Policy, which was adopted in 2020, requires community-run and supported events on Council land to phase-out use, sale or other provision of food, drinks, and packaging items made from single-use disposable plastics. This includes coffee cups. Hornsby Council also highlights sustainable business practices like Witham's Hornsby and promotes sustainable coffee cup swap programs, such as Green Caffeen, Huskee cups, Returnr and Claycups.

People often ask me what my favourite part of this job is. Without trying to sound like a cliché, it is undoubtedly the opportunity to help our community. While part of that role is representing you in Canberra, another important part is helping members of our community to access and navigate Federal Government services.

I am hearing more and more about people suffering because the wheels of bureaucracy are turning far too slowly. When that happens, we are here to help. One of the main areas where we assist is with Centrelink. Medicare and the NDIS. For instance, Jess from Mount Colah applied for paid parental leave but, 3 months later, it still had not been approved. My office raised the issue with Centrelink and, four days later, she started getting those muchneeded payments.

I've long advocated for better telecommunications for our electorate. If you have telecommunications problems, we may be able to help. Recently, Lee from Cherrybrook contacted our office about issues with his phone and internet connection which had continued ever since he moved into his home 6 months before. My office raised the problem with Telstra, who fixed the problem within a week.

Additionally, while we can't influence the migration process, we can draw the Department's attention to applications and seek updates on your behalf. For example, last year, Taylor from Thornleigh's niece applied for a visa to come to Australia for her wedding. When it still was not approved 3 months later, despite her family's visas being granted, our office escalated it with the Department. A few days later it was approved – making for a much happier wedding!




Still Creek Landcare Tree Hollows and Wildlife Boxes

I've heard a bit of chatter in our community asking for help on how to remove creatures from our roofs.

I've heard the pleas from others, after hearing and seeing chainsaws and dozers clearing the scrub, asking that we leave some room or have consideration for the creatures that inhabit our backyards and bushland.

I'll not buy into any arguments or make any judgments but would like to propose a couple of humble solutions.

Offer the critters a place to live that's not in your roof.

Leave your old trees up, especially if they have hollows forming.

If you think the trees are in poor health or dangerous condition, get an arborist in to help keep the trees useful and beautiful and it won't cost as much as removing the trees.

And if you have the desire, hang some wildlife boxes.

Still Creek Landcare have a number of used boxes available in various states of decay but

The Galston District Garden Club met for the first time this year on the 14th February. Our guest speaker for the night was Judy Horton, Horticulturist, OAM, MAIH, RH, HMAA. Judy made a presentation about the significance of the "Fosters Waterhole" in the district of Middle Dural. Our guest speaker for March will be James Carrick and the topic will be "Tree".

Visitors and new members are warmly invited to attend the meetings. Come and enjoy the company of people with an interest in gardening. The next meeting will be on the **13th March** at 7pm for a 7.30 start. There will be a trading table with a variety of plants for sale and very reasonable prices and a cuttings table to help yourself to take home and propagate. Members enjoy a supper at the end of the meeting and time to catch up with the other members.

* If you are looking for plants that flower all year round with minimum of care then the **Salvia family** is for you, and all of them are sensational in the sun. They are rugged plants which grow equally well in rubbly clay or friable loam, providing they are well drained. There is over 500 species of Salvias from edible sages and small to large shrubs up to 3m high. There is a Salvia to suit any climate, season and garden style. Most Salvias show off their flowers best in spring through to autumn. Salvias can easily be propagated by either sowing seeds or by taking cuttings or dividing old clumps.

Plant salvia en masse for a stunning display of colour in garden beds or use the smaller more compact varieties for pot displays around patios and entertainment areas. Most love a full sun position and well drained soil. Mix into soil before planting 5in1 Organic Fertiliser for strong healthy foliage and flower display. An occasional application of soluble fertiliser will keep the plants flowering optimally, although too much nitrogenous food will result in excess foliage at the expense of flowers. They are tolerant of moderate droughts although in poor soils it is a good idea to protect their roots with well-rotted compost or mulch during prolonged periods of hot and dry weather.

Annual and perennial varieties can be pruned after flowering to remove spent flowers and reproportion top heavy plants, while the longer shrubby types should be cut to approximately 45cm from the ground in autumn, after which they will produce fresh new growth almost immediately.

Barks

By Lachlan Turner

Everybody knows that trees have bark. There are almost as many variations in bark as there are trees and shrubs. Often a tree gains its name from the description given to its bark.

Examples would be:

- Scribbly Gum (Eucalyptus Haemastoma), (see February's column), where an insect burrows just under the surface, finding a source of food in or under this top layer of bark. leaving a wriggly trail on the surface;
- Black Butt (Eucalyptus Pilularis), where the dark fibrous bark at the base of the trunk appears to have been subject to a bushfire and the burnt colour is retained for quite a distance up the trunk;
- Stringy Bark (Eucalyptus Agglomerata), which refers to the stringy fibrous nature of the bark which if pulled from the tree reveals a reddish colour beneath the grey exterior.

Some trees visibly shed their bark completely every year, usually during spring when the new growth commences. The manner in which the old season's bark is shed can produce interesting colours and patterns depending on the type of tree. In some cases, last season's bark, if it is quite thin,

will dry out and flake off the tree and fall in long sheets revealing the new coloured bark underneath. One such species is a variety of Angophora where the new bark is a bright orange.

> In some trees, lightly scraping away the old flakey bark reveals a totally new coloured bark underneath. This is the case with Geebungs (Persoonia species) and Paperbarks (Mellaleuca quinquenervia) in particular.

The bark of a mature Old Man Banksia (Banksia serrata) is distinctively globular in formation and relatively cork like.

There are occasions when a tree will emit a sappy gum-like liquid in its attempt to counteract an insect infestation. This may give the appearance that the tree is bleeding.

Recently I've been having a chuckle about typical Australian sayings - our Aussie lingo!!

- + "Gonna throw a snag on the barbie" (an invitation)
- + "Tell him he's dreaming'." (it's not a fair deal)
- + "Put a sock in it!" (be quiet!)

...and many more including all our abbreviations:

- + brolly (umbrella)
- mozzie (mosquito)
- + sunnies (sunglasses)

Another one of our frequently used expressions is "God bless you" when someone sneezes!!

The difference Christ makes

When men and women do not know Jesus Christ, death is the end of everything. They do not know what is on the other side of the doorway we call death. I have often had folk say to me, 'Well I'll just take my chance with whatever comes after I die. I'm not going to worry about it now.'

But the Christian looks at death differently. Like Paul we can say, 'To me to live is Christ and to die, means just to have more of Him'. It didn't really matter whether he lived here on earth or died and went to heaven. Christ was with him and in him in either place. (vv 21-23).

When a Christian dies, his soul goes immediately into heaven to be with Christ for ever. The body which is left we put into the ground because the person is finished with it.

But the body isn't going to stay in the ground for ever. When Jesus Christ comes back once again, He will bring with Him all those

thousands of souls who have gone to heaven. As He comes through the clouds, He will call and out of the ground a new resurrection body will rise for each of those saved souls. It will happen so quickly that we will hardly be able to see it—the Bible calls it 'in the twinkling of an eye'.

This is the hope of every Christian. Can you see the difference Christ makes as we, as Christians, look at death as well as at life? This is part of the gospel and part of all that Christ gives to us when we accept Him. A Christian need never fear death!

It is only a doorway that leads into the very presence of Christ.






