



Following approval from Hornsby Council, a committee was formed on October 5th, 2010 to construct a fitting memorial in honour of the men and women who departed the district for service in times of war. The memorial was designed by Wayne Moore & Neil Marsh and completed one week before Anzac Day 2015. It was unveiled by local resident, Mrs Dyrus Thompson, a descendant of one of the Anzacs.

The sandstone memorial comprises an obelisk, standing on top of a centre column and plinth. The column is in the 'Sentry Box' style and was designed to accommodate the 1-metretall bronze sculpture of a First World War Australian Digger. The sculpture is the work

of Hungarian-born Alex Kolozsy.

Black granite from the Grandee Granite Quarry in the Mulyandry district was used to form the Sentry Box archway, which has the inscription 'Valour/Honour' engraved on either side of the entrance. The plinth, or base, of the Sentry Box bears the unveiling plaque. The plinth received a 'Convict picked and margined' makeover from local stonemason Paul McKinley to complement the district's colonial convict heritage. (Sadly, Paul passed away in February this year. His sister, Kath Ware's touching tribute can be read on Page 19).

Information for Rescuing Native Animals

Looking through recent Social Media posts from the local area I have noticed a lot of posts questioning where people can find help for the removal and/or rescue of a variety of creatures found on their property.

If you find an injured native animal or bird, your first point of call should either be WIRES, or your local Vet - if you are able to transport the animal to them in a safe manner. Most Vets have affiliations with native animal care groups and organisations so they can hold the animal for a check over and pass on to a carer for rehabilitation and release.


Don't try and catch a snake – leave this to the licensed experts. Most will charge a fee for this, but weigh this up with the alternative of being bitten, and you will see that it is well worth the cost!

Possums can be pesky but they are a Protected Species in NSW. Under certain circumstances, if Possums are causing destruction to residential properties, they may be caught and released by licensed catchers, and fees are also applied.

If you are unlucky enough to see a Funnel Web on your property follow these guidelines:

- Find a glass jar with a wide mouth
- Remove the lid and pierce it with air holes
- Invert the jar over the spider but take care as funnel webs are highly defensive and may strike (they cannot jump or climb glass)
- When the spider is in the jar, slide a piece of heavy cardboard or solid plastic under the opening to completely cover it
- Invert the jar, keeping the top covered
- Check the spider is in the bottom, carefully drop a moist cotton bud into the jar with the spider, then put on the lid
- Keep it away from direct sun and heat

Drop off points for Funnel Webs are listed in the table.




Nev: What do you guys do at Woolpaca Farm, and how many of you are there?





NEWS FROM **NETHERBY**

A Moo-vn' Story Fagan Park Jersey Cows

A visit to Fagan Park and the old Dairy in the heritage precinct will take you back to an era of days gone by. Samuel Fagan was a successful orchardist in the early 1900's in Arcadia and Galston.

With the 1930's Depression impacting the family, the once viable orchard was reaching the end of its economic production. When Samuel Fagan died at the age of 86 in 1948, his youngest son, Bruce took on the family responsibilities. He was extremely interested in cattle, particularly the Jersey, and as the orchard closed, his interest

grew in developing a top quality Jersey stud farm, adding a dairy building to the property.



Bruce became an expert in cattle breeding and it became an important part of farm operations. He demonstrated his expertise in judging cattle and was approached by various agricultural shows to serve as a steward, ring master and judge. These



shows included Parramatta, Castle Hill and the Royal Sydney Show. He assisted the fledgling Hornsby Show Society when it started.

Records of registrations and sales going back to around 1940, detail some of

the names of Bruce Fagan's jersey cows. There was Netherby Promise, Netherby Sybil, Netherby Heiress, Melody, Bloom, Jean, Kahoka's Favourite, Leda's Dame, Anemone's Lady, Oxford Queen and Fairy Lady.

It is interesting to note that the Jersey cattle breed originally came from the Isle of Jersey (in the English Channel between England and France) and were

brought to Australia in 1829. They are a small breed, low in body weight, have superior grazing ability and are produce delicious rich, creamy milk. Is it any wonder that Bruce Fagan loved his cows?




Glenorie Probus Club Activities

Honour your Family Veteran this Anzac Day

Purchase a Paver to value our veteran's service

We have told you about the Glenorie Progress Association (GPA) offer for all resident to have names engraved in Pavers and permanently laid in a path in the precinct of the Glenorie Memorial Hall.

The Glenorie Hall was built in 1932 after the original sandstone Hall began eroding. It was then constructed from brick with a metal roof. It was built by the Community, for the Community, with funds from the sale of the sandstone from the original School of Arts that stood on that site, along with the original Glenorie Public School started in 1888. The Memorial Hall has been used for concerts, movies (called The Pictures then), dances, public meetings plus many other varied activities.

The Hall was built to commemorate the local men who died in WWI. As the Hall is located on the eastern side of Old Northern Road, the veterans listed on the original Honour Board and on the present-day cenotaph plinths were either born, lived or attended schools in either Shire. So now that it is in Hornsby Council hands, the planned upgrade will include a path built from pavers from the community so...

You can show the veteran's name, rank, Battalions years of service under the emblem of their defence force on a single or double paver. 

The Hills Wildlife Sanctuary does exceptional work caring for injured wildlife across Sydney.

Julian Leeser MP spent time with sanctuary manager Ben Dessen and some of the feathery – and furry! – residents of the Sanctuary in early March.


While the sanctuary is located in Dural, it responds to calls from across northern Sydney. Those calls come from individuals and organisations including WIRES, Sydney Wildlife Rescue, RSPCA, and others.

Their priority is to treat and release the animals who come to them for care. Where that isn't possible, the sanctuary will continue to look

The Hills Wildlife Sanctuary is currently seeking funding to upgrade its fences and expand their sanctuary facilities to an appropriately-sized, purpose-built wildlife hospital.

If that wildlife hospital was built, it would be the second in Sydney, after the Taronga Zoo Wildlife Hospital.





While the Taronga Zoo Wildlife Hospital already cares for 5,000-6,000 native wildlife each year, that is just a fraction of the 90,000 native Australian animals who need care annually.

Julian Leeser MP voiced his strong support for the Hills Wildlife Sanctuary.

'One of the best things about our area is the incredible environment in which we live. The Hills Wildlife Sanctuary does exceptional work rehabilitating our native wildlife."

'Hundreds more native animals would die without their dedicated care.'

'I support the sanctuary's efforts to expand their facilities so that they care for and rehabilitate even more animals in the future."

The manager of the sanctuary, Ben Dessen, grew up in the area and has been running the sanctuary for 10 years. He reflected on the importance of the sanctuary and its vision for the future.

'Our native wildlife urgently need our help and we hope to further develop the sanctuary facilities to create a world-class conservation hub on the outskirts of Sydney.'

There is a desperate need for a state-of-the-art wildlife hospital in the area along with specialised rehabilitation facilities and we hope to realise this bold vision, working closely with the Government as well as corporate and philanthropic partners.'

Vale Paul McKinley

Life and times of a local stonemasor

It's sometimes said that everyone dies twice – first when they breathe their last breath, and finally when someone mentions their name for the very last time. In the case of a stonemason, their craftsmanship often lives on for centuries and becomes an established part of the community, enjoyed and admired by successive generations.

Paul McKinley, well-known local identity and Wiseman's Ferry stonemason, died last month aged 63. The funeral service was held at his home in River Rd, on the banks of the Hawkesbury River, attended by more than 200 family members and friends.

The hearse was his beloved 1961 VW Kombi. At the end of the service, the Kombi was driven by his brother, Hughie, out of the driveway and slowly down the road, flanked on both sides by attendees in a guard of honour. Walking at the front of the Kombi were his wife, Lynette and daughters Karli and Belle. At the rear were his other brothers and sisters.

Some of the attendees commented that he would obviously have carved his own headstone, as any stonemason would in preparation for their own passing. In fact, he didn't. Paul's wish was to be cremated and for his ashes to be scattered at two of his favourite bush retreats. Tuross River and Colo River.

Paul Martin McKinley was born in 1960 at Darlinghurst, the fourth of eight children to Edward and Margaret. When he was a year old the family moved to Dural, which at the time mostly comprised rural properties and bushland. He loved riding motorbikes and exploring the bush with his brothers. One of his earliest household chores was to help his mother milk the family cow.

After graduating from Galston High School, Paul first job was at Robin's shoe factory. But in 1983 he helped to build a large stone barn and two gate houses on a local property and fell in love with the rustic strength and timelessness of stonework.

He also met and fell in love with a young woman who was getting around in a 1963 blue Beetle. Lynette now claims that it was actually her doing to introduce Paul to the world of Volkswagens - but whether or not that bit's true, no-one disputes the fact that he became so besotted with her and her crazy VW, he developed a lifelong commitment and fascination for both.

Paul became a licensed stonemason in 1986, after graduating from Granville TAFE. Over the next 37 years he built everything from beautiful stone houses to retaining walls and sea walls. He also engineered a machine that made stone spheres for water features.



Like all master craftsmen, Paul wasn't just a builder, he was an artist. He brought his appreciation for traditional architectural design to all of his jobs and gave his clients not just a solid stone structure but also the enduring qualities of classic elegance and style.

On father's day in 1992, Karli was born. Paul was bursting with pride, and at the end of the day he was told to 'go home and rest his smile'. His second daughter, Belle, was born in 1994 while Paul was fighting a catastrophic bushfire in the area that was threatening many homes, including his own.

They bought the family home in Wiseman's Ferry in 1993. If the local community hadn't known much about them before they moved in, this was quickly rectified on the day they arrived with their possessions in a convoy of 10 Kombis and hoisted a VW flag in the front yard to announce that they were now 'in residence'.

Paul was an eccentric, stubborn, sometimes-infuriating man with iron-clad principles and a strong sense of right and wrong. He was generous to a fault, and there were times when he would bring complete strangers back home to meet his long-suffering wife and be given dinner and a place to stay for the night. He wasn't so much a glass-half-full as more of a glass-always-overflowing person. He tended to see the best in everyone, including those who were doing it tough or were at the lower end of the social scale.

One of his favourite pastimes was fly fishing, particularly on the Tuross River. He was originally taught the art by his great aunt in Tuross, using a traditional split cane rod. Aunty Bid was a formidable woman who lived to the grand age of 98 and was known to shoot snakes in the backyard from her bedroom window. Despite the huge age difference, Paul and Aunty Bid were peas in a pod, and shared the same values and outlook on life.

But Paul's over-riding passions were his family and stonemasonry and VWs. Every car he owned was a VW - work vehicles, family cars and vintage cars. He regularly went to VW car shows and swap meets, and would spend his weekends tinkering with cars in the back shed. He even made his daughters buy VWs as their first car.

In mid 2023 Paul was diagnosed with lung cancer. Although he tried chemotherapy and visited several specialists for advice, it soon became clear that the condition was inoperable and untreatable. In typical style, he made his mind up that the hospital circuit was not for him, and decided to stay home and see out his days on the front verandah.

Over the following months, many family members and friends came to see him. Right to the end, he was gracious and cheerful with visitors and always interested in their activities. Paul died on 18th February 2024, lying in bed holding Lynette's hand. His last words to her were 'I love you'.

At the memorial service held two weeks later, some of the attendees commented that he was one of the most honest, principled and idiosyncratic people they had ever met. He will be remembered as an expert craftsman and devoted family man, with values and standards just as enduring as the centuries-old trade that he practiced.

Approval for 'Off-Leash Dog Park' at Fagan Park is ill-considered

Hornsby Council have just approved a Dog Park in the middle of Fagan Park, directly above the dam where a multitude of waterbirds feed and breed. It's a tranquil area of the park and the significance of these dams was detailed in a survey of Hornsby Waterbirds in 2012, and is noted in Hornsby council's own 'Conservation Management Report' for Fagan Park (2003).

As a dog owner in Galston, I welcome an area for my dogs to run around nearby but this location is NOT the right one.

It's not near either car park so it's a considerable walk for anyone with mobility issues; it's a distance for anyone hoping to give their dog a guick run before or after work; the park is closed morning and evening; parking is not free; run-off will end up in the dam polluting this natural area and the placement of a dog park in the Natural and/or Heritage area of Fagan Park is not compliant with the Deed of Gift by Bruce Fagan who left his home to be used by ALL of the local community.

Dog owners don't care where the park is and if residents knew the impact on the birdlife of

this specific location, they might agree that other sites would work better and have less environmental impacts. Even the field next to the top car park would be better from an environmental perspective.

Since the announcement of a possible dog park in Fagan Park, there has already been a considerable increase in people walking their dogs off-leash in all areas of Fagan Park which is going unregulated. Can you imagine what will happen in Spring when all the nests are in the reed beds, or the baby birds are fledging? It doesn't bear thinking about and just goes to show that very little thought of the repercussions of this dog park has been given.

The grassy slope above the dam is critical habitat for the birds just as much as the water itself - Fagan Park users will see that the birds graze all over this slope especially morning and evening when its quieter. The presence and impact of dogs here will deter these birds.

Migratory birds such as the endangered Latham's Snipe have been recorded here. Have Hornsby Council carried out any up-to-date bird surveys prior to giving this approval? If not, why not? This species is protected under International Treaties with China and Japan.





Dural and District Historical Society Inc. News from History Cottag

Once again our monthly meeting was well attended, demonstrating how enthusiastic we are to hear more about our local community. Our guest speaker, local resident and member, Trevor Knight, told the story of his German/Swiss family. A shortage of land, religious wars and the promise of a better life, forced many to leave. Those left behind only found out where they had settled when Trevor made contact, 150 years later.



For our meeting on the 13th April we will again call on the knowledge of our member, Kenneth Bradley. His topic describes the Second World War railway connecting Thailand with Burma built by the Japanese using some 200,000 Asian labourers and captured Allied Soldiers. We begin at the bridge on the River Kwai and move towards Burma revealing several bridges up to the site of the Australian Government's Memorial at the cutting named Hellfire Pass and identify several of the extraordinary men who survived the ordeal working in appalling conditions as prisoners of war. Men from our own community were among those who served. Ken's knowledge comes from his time working in Thailand and a 1988 Bicentennial project.

It was traditional for our community, on the Sunday before the 25th April, to gather around the Cenotaph. It had been built from stone guarried from the end of School Road Galston, and It seems, unbeknown to authority. An organ to play and a speaker, on the back of a truck and ANZAC was remembered.

Age, the weather and the attraction of a secure and predictable location, means we now go to the Galston Club on the Sunday before, as usual.

The wonderful thing that has happened is the very large crowd that now comes to the Dawn Service on ANZAC Day at the same old Cenotaph. To see the faces of families and friends, gradually come into view as the sun rises, is a true demonstration of the real significance of the day and a community's commitment to it.

The next Society meeting is on Saturday the 13th April, in the Galston Uniting Church, School Road Galston at 2.00pm. All are welcome. It is free with a gold coin for afternoon tea. Enquiries: Michael on 9653 1365.

Erzsi's piano talents are balanced by multi-skills as a choir director of European and Australian choirs and as a past President of the Australian National Choral Association in NSW.



Robyn Scoble Honoured



Dementia Alliance Committee: Becoming a Dementia Friendly Community

Imagine you are in a shopping centre and the music, noise and people makes you so confused you do not know where you are. Imagine you cannot remember where you put your car or even that you have a car. Finally, imagine you find yourself in a strange street at night in your pyjamas, you do not know how you got there and do not know how to get home, perhaps you cannot remember you have a home. These are just some of the symptoms of dementia and are situations those living with dementia may be confronted with in everyday life.

Dementia has a health and quality of life impact on those living with dementia which also impacts their carers, family and friends. Age, genetics and family medical history are strong factors for developing dementia, but other factors, such as obesity, smoking, high blood pressure and hearing loss can contribute to developing dementia or hasten its symptoms. In 2022, an Australian Institute of Health and Wellbeing (AIHW) report estimated 401,300 Australians were living with dementia (AIHW, 2022). Our Hornsby Shire is an ageing community, with 25% of our residents aged 40-59 years and 23% of our residents aged over 60 years. Having nearly 50% of our population over the age of 40 years means Hornsby Shire Council must consider the needs required for aged services and support, with a considerable focus being on those living with dementia.

In 2022, Hornsby Council Disability and Inclusion Action Plan and Age Friendly Strategy Consultation Findings Report (DIAP) found Dementia Friendly Communities was a high priority for the community ageing strategy (57%), for people with a disability (54%) and for family members and carers (65%). These findings were the result of surveys, online and face-to-face consultation forums in Berowra, Galston, Thornleigh, Cherrybrook and Asquith. In 2022, Council also adopted its Healthy Ageing Strategy, with a focus on improved accessibility, activities to support physical and mental health and nurtured age-friendly environments. Council resolved to become a Dementia Friendly Community, with a focus on improving community inclusion and quality of life for people living with dementia.

It is a privilege to be a Councillor representative on the Dementia Alliance Committee alongside Councillor Janelle McIntosh, who initially proposed and is a strong advocate for the Dementia Alliance. Following the 2023 Hornsby Dementia Forum, the Dementia Alliance was officially adopted as an initiative by our Hornsby Council. Co-chaired by two community members with lived experience

of dementia, the volunteer group has begun meeting periodically to advise and direct recommendations to Council to create a more physical and social dementia-friendly community and to assist in helping people living with dementia to be understood, included and accepted without stigma. The Alliance has already discussed initiatives with Dementia Australia representatives and a prominent Hornsby business and plans to work with businesses, community groups, service organisations and agencies to find solutions to challenges and concerns raised in the 2022 DIAP.



I am receiving a lot of correspondence from local residents concerned about the current government's proposed radical planning changes.

After years of promises, Labor have spent their first year in power achieving nothing in housing. Now they are proposing a series of desperate zoning changes across every Liberal seat. Communities should not be punished based on where the live.

More concerning is the government's position on New Line Road. The previous government approved a funded upgrade to New Line Road between Hastings Road and Purchase Road, taking the road from single lanes to dual

carriageway. \$70 million dollars was allocated across several budgets however, the new NSW government reallocated these funds.

Indefinitely postponing the issue of addressing New Line Road is unacceptable. This road is constantly choked with traffic snarls now and with the government's proposal to significantly increase residential numbers in and around the area this will simply bring New Line Road to a complete stand still.

Labor cannot pump more housing into an area where they are cancelling major infrastructure projects required now, for the existing population. That equation simply does not work.

As part of Council's recent community engagement process and Special Rate Variation, our Shire will now be better prepared for disaster management. We have been fortunate in recruiting RFS veteran Rolf Pool, as our **Emergency Management** Coordinator. Rolf's role is a diverse one, responsible for being the primary point of contact during disaster events, preparing disaster management plans and guiding future planning to be better prepared.

Council welcome's Rolf to our team.

- ➤ I am pleased to announce that the off-leash dog walking facility for Fagan Park will progress. I thank the community for their feedback and positive contributions to the discussion. This was a request brought to me in my first term as Councillor. These enquiries resulted in a Shire wide assessment which led to four more off leash parks and two more upgraded facilities.
- > A motion put by Councillor Greenwood at the last council meeting will result in an assessment of locker requirements at the Galston Aquatic Centre. I have been overwhelmed by the positive feedback relating to the recently refurbished pool complex, however, lockers and accessibility have



been raised as further potential improvements.

- > Finally, our operations team will be once again pitch to Transport NSW a plan to upgrade the bus terminus located at the gateway to Glenorie Village. An upgrade to this facility would result in an improvement to the water stand area and bus stop. A more attractive gateway would be an extension of improvements being undertaken throughout the Memorial Hall and Cenotaph precinct.
- > In addition, recent collaboration with Hills Councillors has resulted in a plan to escalate the urgent need to complete New Line Rd. Only by a coordinated approach, highlighting the frustration of the rural community will this key piece of infrastructure ever be prioritised.

Not exactly hidden, but at least somewhat concealed on the top of a hill near the southern boundary of Ted Horwood Reserve, is The Hills Shire Council's Bidjiwong Nursery off Renown Road, Baulkham Hills. It is here that Council Horticulturists and Volunteers propagate thousands of Australian Native Plants every year.

Care is taken to ensure genetic integrity as all seed is collected from local flora. Much of the seedlings produced and, in some cases more advanced plants, are used to revegetate local reserves and parks. There are times when seedlings are replanted in bushland fringes to replace exotic species that have been removed by dedicated bushcare volunteers.

To encourage the use of indigenous varieties, Ratepayers and Residents within the Shire are able to collect a small number of free native species for planting in their home garden.





It is not recommended that any native plants be removed from their natural environment as there is around a 95% mortality rate in such cases.

For those interested in the propagation and cultivation of native species, the Community Environment Centre conducts Workshops on these subjects, at the Nursery.

Participants are introduced to the various techniques employed in the propagation process. Growing from seed and hardwood cuttings are effective ways to perpetuate the native vegetation of the region.

Other related Workshops are conducted on a regular basis at the Community Environment Centre at Annangrove. A free native plant in tubestock is often available to those attending many of the sustainability workshops. These plants have been propagated and nurtured by the Staff at the nursery and are guaranteed to thrive in the local area given proper attention once being planted in the home garden.





Galston District Garden Club

The Garden Club is more than just coming to listen to speakers and purchasing a bargain plant. You will be rewarded by making new friends and sharing plant tips and ideas.

The Galston District Garden Club meet regularly on the 2nd Wednesday of each month in the Galston Community Hall, 37 Arcadia Road, Galston at 7.30pm. We welcome new members and visitors. We are an informal and friendly group, and no matter what your gardening ability or gardening knowledge, you can be sure that you can look forward to pleasant company. Your botanical knowledge will be entirely adequate. Members range from beginners to very experienced. We use our interest in gardening as a great excuse for social gatherings and garden rambles. There will be interesting talks and displays at each meeting. We have a large and extensive library of gardening books and DVD's that members can borrow.

Each year we hold the GALSTON DISTRICT OPEN GARDENS WEEKEND in October to fundraise for local community projects and charities. This year will be from the 18th to 20th October. About eight gardens will be opened to visitors with plant and produce stalls. We are always looking for new gardens to open for this event and if you would like to generously open your garden or know of a garden owner who could be approached, please contact the Secretary at the Club.

AUTUMN is a great time for garden chores. This is the time to clean up before winter, protect vulnerable plants, and wind down the growing season. Raking up fallen leaves is probably the most common autumn gardening chore. Leaving a layer of dead leaves on grass can harm turf grass by blocking sunlight and trapping moisture. On the other hand, leaves can benefit garden beds and the compost bin. Instead of bagging and disposing of leaves, mulch them with the mower and let them decompose.



Plant your spring bulbs so you can enjoy flowers next spring: daffodils, hyacinths, tulips, crocuses and more. These are the hardy bulbs that need a cold period to bloom.

NOW is the best time to plant SWEET PEAS in all Australian climates, or just follow the Australian tradition and sow your seeds on St. Patric's Day (17th March) Did you forget? It's not too late. Sweet Peas are delightful and very popular annual climbing plants. They combine delicate and very pretty flowers with a beautiful fragrance. Sweet Peas can cover a fence or tepee in gorgeous flowers or dwarf varieties are perfect for garden beds, pots and hanging baskets. They require full sun, regular watering, well-drained fertile soil. Well fed Sweet Pea plants will be healthier and produce more flowers, so regular feeding is important. Once they start flowering, pick bunches of flowers as often as you like. Frequent picking will help promote a longer flowering season.

Still Creek Landcare

Can our kids still paddle safely in our local Creeks?

Most of the time yes, but not after heavy rain, when pollutants and rubbish get washed in.

This conclusion is based on our routine water testing over a decade at three creek sites in the Still Creek Catchment that runs from around Fagan Park to Crosslands.


The pollutants we find come from poor waste water management, livestock and other animal waste, detergents with phosphates, over-use of fertilizers all compounded by land clearing or mowing to the creek lines. This clearing and mowing stops the filtering that naturally cleans waters before they enter creeks. Much of the pollution would be removed or lowered drastically if we left 10-20 meters of natural scrub along waterways.

Still Creek Landcare's water testing is part of the Greater Sydney Landcare Streamwatch program who bring together volunteers from the local communities across Greater Sydney, Blue Mountains, Central Coast, Illawarra and beyond who test their local waterways on a regular basis. Streamwatch is also associated with the national Waterwatch program.

Recently Still Creek Landcare has assisted Hornsby Council with eDNA sampling for the presence of platypus in our creeks, a process that will be repeated in Autumn and hopefully regularly in the future. This eDNA testing goes beyond looking for Platypus, capturing a catalog of the creatures that live in and around our waterways and forming a vital baseline of the health of the waterways.

Our water testing of dissolved oxygen, phosphates, salts, turbidity and E. coli levels have shown that these waterways are capable of sustaining life and are normally relatively clear of pollutants. But as most long term residents have seen, the fish and fresh water Crays, that used to be there are there no longer or at much reduced levels.

In addition to our water testing, we periodically search for and identify insect populations, macro-invertebrates, the small creatures that fish, yabbies and platypus feed on. These creatures are also a vital barometer of the health of the waterways.

This happening (John 4:43-54) took place in Galilee and concerns two towns and two people. The two towns were Cana and Capernaum, about 25 miles apart. The two people were the father of the sick boy and Jesus.

The father had a real need. He felt Christ could help him. He went to Jesus with nothing to offer except his need and his faith. He may have had money but he didn't offer it. He simply said, 'My son is dying, will you help me?'

Now Christ wanted to help, but He also wanted to see this man's faith grow. So He gave him two tests. First, He said, 'All you people want is to see miracles. You're not interested in believing in me.' That test would soon show what the man really wanted.

The father answered by stating his need again, and in doing so showed his faith in Christ's power.

Then Christ said, 'All right, if you believe in me, do this – go home now without me. When you get there your child will be well again.'

Was the father prepared to step out on Christ's word alone? Yes, he was. He turned and started home and even stayed overnight somewhere on the way. (see vs 51-53.) Then the assurance came to him that healing had come (vs 51-53)

Faith grows as we read God's word, the Bible, and dare to believe what it says. Try it now. Your faith will be tested, but then that is how faith grows.

"Amazing Grace" is a very well-known hymn that is now 250 years old!

An article written by Simon Barker from 'Premier Christianity' explains about the life of this hymn writer, John Newton:

"John Newton's story is a powerful tale of redemption and God's grace. As a young man, his life was spent at sea. He became part of the slave trade, rising to the rank of captain and transporting slaves from Sierra Leone to the West Indies.

But in 1748, on board 'The Greyhound', a fierce storm arose off Ireland. Newton, fearing for his life, cried out to a God he barely knew. He promised that, if his life was spared, he would devote the remainder of it to God's service. The ship survived - barely - and Newton miraculously made land.

In his gratitude he never forgot his promise to God and committed his life to serving Him. Due to his previous life experience and lack of education, it took more than seven years for him to be accepted into ministry in the Church of England."

Newton wrote:

"Amazing grace, how sweet the sound That saved a wretch like me. I once was lost but now I'm found Was blind but now I see."

John Newton recognised that he had lived his life full of pride. In our world today, pride is often celebrated. Proud people seek then boast of their accomplishments, their possessions or their qualities and can even set themselves up to be in control over others leading to a mindset that says there is no God!



However, the Bible tells us the opposite: "God opposes the proud but gives grace to the humble." (James 4:6)

People like John Newton, who realise that pride is a stumbling block in their lives and that they can't really control anything, are able to accept God's love, forgiveness and grace in their lives - through a relationship with God's Son Jesus Christ.

God shows His favour to those who choose to trust in Him rather than relying only on themselves. Life can be really tough but those who know their God can live with an inner peace and hope because of God's favour upon them- both now and in eternity after their earthly death.

My name is Mitch, I am one of the pastors at The Centre Dural. Recently we have been exploring Jesus words on the Sermon on the Mount and not worrying about money, food, or clothing but to store our treasure in heaven.

According to research, one-third of us have or are currently suffering from anxiety. There is much to be anxious about, such as mortgage stress, the cost of living, job security, international relations, or another global pandemic.

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus offers the cure to fear and anxiety, "But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well." Jesus argues that our anxiety is built upon pursuing earthly treasure. Our earthly treasure can be stolen or destroyed. But heavenly treasure lasts forever.

June Smith has been a long time resident of Rowland Village and member of our congregation. June was 101. In a service led by former minister Rev Geoff Smith,


we said our farewells to June on 4th March. The service was well attended by family and friends.
