Nati Roses celebrates 80 years of business

The term 'iconic' is thrown around so much these days, however, in the case of Nati Roses, it truly is a fitting description of the Dural business which marks its 80th anniversary this year.

Throughout the eight decades of operation, there have been so many highlights for this beloved family concern that it would take an entire edition to talk about them all! Suffice to say that supplying flowers for both Elton John's wedding in 1984 and the Victor Chang Cardiac Research Institute Dinner Dance in 1996. where Princess Diana was the special guest, were two standout moments. Not only did they supply the fabulous roses for the latter occasion but were also in attendance. Breaking protocol, a cheeky Pat Nati even chatted with Diana, a moment that mortified his brother Joe!

The inception of Nati Bros started as a humble farm in North Ryde in 1944, Patriarch, Giuseppe (Joe) Nati (1921-1999) also known by friends and family as 'Peppino', grew Dahlias, Chrysanthemums and Asters for the Sydney Flower Markets.

Giuseppe was one of three surviving children born to Salvatore and Grazia Maria in San Giovanni di Gerace, a Municipality of Calabria, Italy. Seeking a better and more prosperous life for the family, his father sailed from Italy to Sydney arriving in 1928. In 1933 he returned home to spend time with his wife and children, then left again - this time accompanied by his eldest son, Cosimo. The pair arrived back in Australia in March 1934. In 1936 Grazia Maria, Giuseppe and his sister, Carmela, arrived here aboard the SS Viminale and the family was together once more.



Much-loved local identity Frank Ifield died on Saturday, May 18th aged 86.

The man who was patron of the Galston Country Music Festival for a decade and was a champion of young, up and coming country singers was a major star in the UK in the 60s when he gave a young, up-coming band called The Beatles a chance to perform.

Rock Historian Glen A Baker said: "There is so much to be said about this remarkable man, who had four number ones in Britain, three of them before



the Beatles (who had briefly supported him in concert). *I Remember You* became an indelible hit all around the world and a perfect signature song. It topped the UK charts for 7 weeks.'

Frank became a household name in Britain before fellow Australians, the Seekers, the Bee Gees and the Easybeats headed to the UK.

Frank's parents (Richard and Hannah) were Australians who were living in the UK when Frank was born on 30th November 1937.

His father was an inventor and engineer who created the Ifield fuel pump used in jet aircraft. The family returned to Australia when Frank was 11 and moved to Dural to live on a farm.

Frank, who was the third of seven boys, listened to country music while milking the family cow Betsy. He said he used to yodel to stop her kicking the milking bucket over. At junior school, he led the singing. Music was in his genes as his grandfather was a former performer with touring minstrel shows.

Frank taught himself to play the ukulele before his grandmother bought him his first guitar as an 11th birthday present. After coming second in a talent competition held by a local radio station, Frank made his first broadcasts at the age of 13.

Two years later he was hired to dress as a cowboy and entertain audiences for Big Chief Little Wolf, a wrestling booth showman in a touring fair.

He made his first record at the age of 16 for the Australian branch of EMI. His career was interrupted by national service but by the age of 21 Ifield was one of Australia's leading country and pop singers, with his own television show, *Campfire Favourites*.

He returned to the UK at the age of 21 in 1959 where he secured a recording deal with Norrie Paramor of EMI's Columbia label.

While his first few records were not hits he topped the charts with a cover version of *I Remember You*, a song written for the 1942 film Follow



the Fleet. It reached a million sales in the UK and stayed at Number 1 for seven weeks. It remained in the UK charts for 28 weeks and made number 1 in Australia and number 5 in the US.

It was around this time that he met The Beatles' manager Brian Epstein. Ifield included the band as a support act at his show at the Embassy Cinema in Peterborough in December



1962 after he heard Love Me Do. They appeared free of charge. Ifield also entered the race to represent the UK at Eurovision on two

occasions - in 1962 and 1976 - but was unsuccessful at the national selection stage. In 1986 he contracted pneumonia and required surgery to remove part of

a lung. As a result, his vocal cords were damaged, which mean he could not sing or yodel for years. He returned to Australia in the 1980s moving to Dural.


In 1991, Ifield made a surprise return to the UK charts with The Yodelling Song - a dance remake of his 1962 track She Taught Me How To Yodel, which the Queen Mother once requested at a Royal Command Performance.

In 2016 his singing voice had recovered enough for him to return to the stage with a show that revisited his career.

He joined the Rotary Club of Galston and was Patron of the Galston Country Music Festival (1997 to 2007).

In a career spanning seven decades, he recorded 25 albums. In 2003, Ifield was inducted into the Australian Roll of Renown and was inducted into the ARIA Hall of Fame at the ARIA Music Awards of 2007. He was presented with the Medal of the Order of Australia in 2009 for services to the music industry.

He is survived by his second wife, Carole Wood, whom he married in 1992, and by two children from his first marriage, to Gillian Bowden.

Giuseppe was soon working alongside his father, brother, uncle and cousins on the family farm which grew celery and lettuce. In 1941 he obtained his driver's license which was a huge help for the two families, as no other members could drive. Giuseppe drove to Sydney Markets in his father's truck which had S.Nati & Son painted above the windscreen. The Nati's business secured a contract with the Department of Supply and Development to provide their vegetables to the army and civilians during the 2nd World War and they worked tirelessly to ensure the quota was met and delivered

on time. A hiccup occurred in 1942 when Giuseppe was interred in Liverpool and then sent out to Cowra in October of the same year. Eventually Giuseppe was released back to the family farm in March 1943, after his father petitioned that he was needed there to meet the demands of the Government Contract.

It was also 1943 that Giuseppe met the young Antonietta Marando (1928-2023) who was the daughter of a fellow market gardener. They were married in 1944 and the following year, with the assistance of both sets of parents, were able to purchase their own property of 5acres on which is now known as Lane Cove Road, North Ryde. They also welcomed their first child, Grazia Maria (Mary Grace). Giuseppe and Antonietta grew flowers, lettuce, beans and rhubarb until Giuseppe was approached by Young's Dahlias to specialise in growing only these. He agreed and was supplied by them with the tubers. Giuseppe sold his flowers for 5 shillings a bunch, at the Markets and continued to take Salvatore's produce along with him.

The years 1946-1957 saw five more children arrive for Giuseppe and Antonietta. Salvatore (Sam), Pasqualena (Lena), Pasquale (Pat), Giuseppe (Joe) and Elizabeth (Liz) joined little Mary Grace. Once the children were old enough, they all helped with the market garden during their spare time. Giuseppe and Antonietta instilled a fabulous work ethic in their family which has obviously shaped the success and longevity of the business today.



In 1964 when the land at North Ryde was released for light industrial development (today the Marriot Hotel is situated on the site of the original farm), Giuseppe purchased a 20acre site on Old Northern Road at Middle Dural. Along with sons, Sam and Pat, the Natis decided to concentrate solely on growing roses for the booming market in high quality flowers for weddings and special occasions. In 1966 they purchased 500 rose bushes from Catts Nursery for 50c each and began planting.

Giuseppe Jnr (Joe) joined the family business in 1972 and took on the role of Marketing. Nati Bros Roses Pty Ltd was formed and the farm underwent an expansion program to ensure a consistent supply of roses for yearly production. This included erecting greenhouses which provided a controlled environment through heating to allow yearlong production of quality blooms.

Anthony Booth, a qualified horticulturist, was employed in 1990 as farm manager and with his innovative ideas and new methods introduced new rose colours and varieties to the farm. These new additions combined with the consistent availability of flowers meant that Joe had the flexibility to offer florists an annual supply and the Nati's market share continued to grow. By the peak of their growing success in 2000, they had 300,000 rose bushes and were renowned for both their perfumed field roses and glasshouse blooms.

Nati Roses is one of those rare businesses with a community conscience. Pat Nati was awarded an OAM in 2009 for his service to charity, in particular for his work with the Special Olympics of Australia and his role as chairman of the fund-raising committee. They have also supported numerous other charitable causes including Starlight Children's Foundation, Day of Difference, Westmead Medical Research Institute as well as dozens and dozens of local community groups, schools and causes. Looking at photos on the walls of the packing shed, you can see Pat with anyone from Pavarotti to the Four Tops and there are hundreds of laminated 'thank you' letters everywhere.

Today Nati Roses is busier than ever. With Nephew, Mark Gallo, operating as Farm Manager, six Florists working at any time, Sam, Joe and Pat and many other family members working on site, it is always a hive of activity – and open seven days a week! Let's hope Nati Roses continue to flourish so we can all celebrate their Centenary!

NEWS FROM **NETHERBY**

The Friends Of Fagan Park are going to dismantle and scrap a old seed drill. The seed/fertilizer drill was manufactured by H.V.McKay P/L in Victoria. Hugh Victor McKay (1865 – 1926) he was a farmer and engineer in Victoria in the late 1800's, he developed horse drawn farming equipment with factories



at Sunshine and Ballarat in Victoria. The company grew in size over the years and at its peak employed 3,000 personnel, and formed a partnership with Canadian Company Massey–Harris, the range of machinery expanded to headers, chaff cutters, cane cutters, hay making, balers, field mowers, and much more and also equipment for the war effort in WW1.

The exact age of this seeder drill is not known but is most likely 1920's to 1930's. The model is a "Sunshine" but no casting name marks are visible. It is a 14 row seeder used for the sowing of wheat, oats and barley. Bagged seed grain would be poured into the wooden hoppers along the length of the machine, where simple adjustments would be made to regulate the feed rate of the seed to the speed of the motive power, be it horse or tractor. 14 rows approximately one foot apart would be sown in a shallow furrow and covered over in one pass of the paddock. A distributor disc would rotate around and around under the seed pushing a constant regulated amount of seed down a tube into the furrow in the ground. This seeder in the image will be dismantled by the Friends Of Fagan Park and scrapped.


The Village Glenorie is the community hub of this picturesque pocket. A meeting point for everyone.



Council updates

The GPA appreciates the support of our local council representatives who regularly attend our meetings reporting on local impacting developments and allowing questions and discussion.

The Hills Shire Mayor Dr Peter Gangemi announced funding committed to the much-needed upgrade of Halcrows and Cattai Ridge

Roads intersection. We look forward to seeing work commence soon as well as approvals for additional flood gates at Cattai Creek and the Ted Schwebel Park upgrade.

The Hills Deputy Mayor, North Ward Councillor, Mitchell Blue discussed the very real concerns many of the northern residents have with the condition of Old Northern and Wisemans Ferry Roads. Both are State Roads and there is a very real concern with the lack of maintenance of roadside vegetation and with flooding, particularly with the Little Cattai Creek crossing of Wisemans Ferry Road which still has no flood gates.

Hornsby Mayor Philip Ruddock AO addressed the meeting congratulating the GPA on the excellent job we are doing representing the residents of Glenorie and on the initiative to build the Ray Whiteman Heritage Fence. The fence not only pays tribute to Ray, but to the heritage of Glenorie. Philip, along with Councillor Warren Waddell, discussed the concerns with the New Line Road upgrade being shelved when funding allocated under the previous state government for stage 1 works was reallocated elsewhere.

Both council's representatives expressed their concerns with the state requirements for additional residential development without any strategic plans for infrastructure improvements. Press release last month outlined these serious concerns and the impact that a lack of planning for infrastructure has on a vast feeder network of people who struggle with traffic on New Line Road.

The Ray Whiteman Heritage Fence update

The good news is the first three piers have been carved and the fund raising is going well with many thanks to; Robyn Preston who organised state government grants, the Whiteman Family Trust, Bendigo Bank and to the many locals who have sponsored a pier and or bought pavers. We still have a little way to go. It's not too late to sponsor a pier and have your name on that pier or, on a smaller scale, have your family name included in the Glenorie heritage pathway.

Upgrade to energy-efficient appliances.


Autumn has well and truly arrived this year with a very soggy start to what at times can be a colourful and soft time of year.

Remagine Art Prize 2024 winner announced

The winner of the Remagine Art Prize 2024 has been announced, with Lane Cove based artist Phoebe Stone taking out the first prize of \$5,000 for her oil and pastel painting, Serene Sea. Inspiration for Phoebe's work came when she was walking the Gadyan track around Sydney's Berry Island Reserve and her eye was taken through the native scrub and over to a large oil tanker.

"Its hull was faded black and rusty red in hue. The irony of the name of the tanker 'Serene Sea' really struck me. An oil tanker, serenity? A 'Serene Sea'? As I walked on, I couldn't help but muse that this might be a plea from the workers of the ship; a serene sea, a safe passage home," said Stone.

"Yet as thoughts about excessive consumption, endless industries devouring fossil fuels, rising temperatures and sea levels swam around my head, I realised, this isn't just their plea, it's ours too. If we aren't careful and if we do not keep our seas serene, in a relatively short space of time, no one will be able to walk this track."

The annual Remagine Art Prize is hosted by Hornsby Shire Council in partnership with Hornsby Art Society. This art prize challenges artists to create works in response to the crisis we are all facing with waste and over-consumption. The theme for this year was 'Crossroads of Consumption', referring to how our everyday consumption can be reduced to limit the impacts of waste and climate change.

Mascot based artist Chris Gleisner was awarded Highly Commended, winning \$2,500 in prize money for her work, *The Sixth Extinction: a Short-List.*

"This short-list represents an ongoing existential crisis: an estimated 1 million species of flora and fauna are threatened with extinction in the upcoming decades. The primary human causal factors in descending order are habitat destruction, over exploitation, invasive species, pollution, and now climate change. As humans continue to consume the natural world at unsustainable rates, the looming question arises: when will humanity join the list of extinctions?" said Gleisner.



Talented Mount Kuring-gai artist James Birch collected the Local Artist Award and a \$1,000 prize for his work, *SCRAPS*, and Waitara resident, Coco X Huang won the Youth Award (18-25 years) and \$1,000 in prize money for her mixed media work, *In a Drop of Water...*


Fleur Brett from Victoria secured the Recycled/Reused Materials Award and \$1,000 in prize money for her sculpture using recycled

cardboard and clothing, Yellow Torso (The Muse).

Dural Public School



On Thursday 2nd May, Stage 2 had an Aboriginal Experiences incursion. The day was absolutely sensational and contained lots of interesting information presented by our three Gumaraa rangers who travelled from Dharawal country.

Stage 2 started the day with an ochre and smoking ceremony which was intended to cleanse the area of any bad spirits. The variety of symbols drawn in ochre on students' faces represent different things, such as those who were knowledgeable, those who were warriors and the locations of where people came from (such as waterways). The students then split into groups to rotate through three fantastic activities.

In the hall, they learned about bush tucker and the different uses of Australian native plants with Ranger Tallara. Did you know that coastal wattle can be used as soap and when crushed and put into water it can stun fish to make them easy to capture? Did you know that the dianella plant can be used as a whistle to mimic an injured bird in order to capture snakes? Or that the she-oak tree can deter snakes from the area and be used as a weaving needle once it's been dried? We learned about plants that can be used as medicine, energy boosters, paintbrushes and food. Did you know the seeds from the lomandra bush can be crushed to make flour?

On the green playground, the students learned the correct technique to throw a boomerang. We had a few that even managed to throw theirs and have it return in nearly a full circle! This activity was a favourite for many students. Ranger Jake even showed us how he could throw 4 boomerangs at once. These skills were commonly used with this style of boomerang to hunt birds.



On the courts, we hunted emus and kangaroos by developing our spear throwing skills with Ranger Drew. She taught them the words buru (kangaroo) and biraban (emu).

Stage 2 came together towards the end of the incursion to learn 4 different types of traditional dances which told stories of native Australian animals travelling through the bush. They learned about traditional tools such as hunting boomerangs, coolamons, woomeras and shields and listened as Ranger Jake used a didgeridoo to mimic animal sounds.

The beginning of 2024 has witnessed numerous GHS students excel in various sporting endeavours, embodying their commitment to personal growth and aiming to achieve their personal best.







Together we were presented with a list of concerns facing the local rural community. These issues included:


- Speed and road user conduct on main roads

Wellbeing in Hornsby Shire: It is more than just 'feeling good'

Hornsby Shire ranks as the fifth highest in Australia and a top performer for wellbeing. In May this year, the public policy advisor SGS Economics and Planning published its annual National Wellbeing Index, an analysis of 518 local government areas (LGAs) in Australia. With a 'Headline' Index score of 6.9, our Hornsby Shire has a higher Index score than the Greater Sydney region at 6.0.

So how is this Wellbeing Index determined? Across Australia, each LGA was assessed on seven wellbeing indicators: economy; income and wealth; employment; knowledge and skills; housing, health, equality, community and work-life balance and the environment. This assessment was also based on 24 factors that impact general wellbeing, including gender pay gap, home prices, environmentally protected land and community volunteer rate (SGS Cities & Regions Wellbeing Index, 2024; see diagram).

So what is achieved by the Wellbeing Index assessments? The National Wellbeing Index provides clear evidence and understanding of the social, economic and environmental trends across Australia. The Index indicates improvements in overall wellbeing can be achieved by focussing on place as well as the community within that place. My previous research has found that 'resilient' communities in Australia have high levels of community social integration, lower mortality rates and higher rates of life expectancy. A sense of being part of or belonging to a community is an important aspect of overall community wellbeing and resilience.

So should we just enjoy the prestige of our high ranking? Well, there is more. Our Hornsby Shire was also ranked 7th on the Income and Wealth rank. This ranking suggests our Hornsby Shire is doing well however wealth does not always mirror health. Income capability certainly bolsters capacity of individuals in a community to make choices promoting their health interests, independence and support in place. Yet there are those in our Hornsby community that suffer through distance from services and transport, emotional health, poor health resources, lack of support and carer responsibilities and commitments which can restrict their everyday lives, affect mobility and continue to place their health at risk. There is still socio-economic inequality in our community, in particular housing affordability, homelessness, and wage disparity. Knowing our Hornsby Shire shone as a top performer in the Wellbeing Index does not mean we should 'rest on our laurels.' Instead, it should be a driver to ensure every decision we make in relation to our Shire community considers every aspect of our economic, social, cultural and environmental future.



Galston District Garden Club

Don't let the cooler weather deter you from getting stuck into the garden. There is a lot you can do during winter. While it might be cold outside, working in the garden will give you a warm glow in both body and mind.

If your soil has been dry for a extended period it can become water-repellent (hydrophobic) even after heavy rains. Look for water pooling on the surface, which can be fixed with a good soil wetting agent and or seaweed-based additives. Remove heavy layers of autumn leaves that can stop the rain getting to the soil. Use these excess leaves to make nutrient-rich compost.



Get stuck into week control. With rain comes weeds. Make sure you remove weeds before they mature and set seed. Be careful to remove roots and all. I have even laid layers of newspaper over large areas and covered it with leaf mulch to kill weeds.

Winter is the time to prune your existing fruit trees or buy new ones to put in the ground. It's also a great time for planting brussels sprouts and cauliflower, lettuce and Chinese vegetables. Take the time to tidy up your veggie garden, enrich the soil with compost and start thinking about what you're going to plant next season.

Winter is a good time to prune for structure on young deciduous trees. Because these trees are without leaves, the form of the tree can be seen easily, so crossing wood, double leaders and a plethora of other problems can be picked up early.

Hydrangeas pruning can also be done now the flower buds have set. The old wood can be pruned out and the shrubs pruned back to those healthy fat flower buds for a good display next year. Rose pruning is a winter must. Any time from July onwards is fine. When you've finished, apply a seaweed - based product to condition the soil, which will help the plant with drought tolerance, resistance to frost and attack from pets and disease.

Murray Park Road Track

Bush tracks can take the bushwalker through a variety of landscapes and vegetation. One such track, which is in reality a fire trail, starts and ends at the end of Murray Park Rd Kenthurst. This track is hardly hidden but the diversity of native flora that can be "discovered", certainly in many cases, is hidden from the view of the casual walker.

fidden In The Hills

At most times of the year the walker can be rewarded in finding a wide variety of wildflowers both large and small, along the fringes of the track. The track passes through ridge top landscapes of open forest and heathland scrub, to a spot where there are views over adjacent forested valleys and slopes.

There is a relatively steep descent into one of these valleys which supports an extensive regrowth forest of towering Blue Gums.

The track then follows Blue Gum Creek upstream a short distance before ascending a reasonably steep hillside to the ridge top plateau.

When walking slowly and quietly through this area it is possible to sight many birds, some that are not usually visible in built up areas, as this is their preferred habitat.

Depending on the pace chosen to walk, it may take up to two hours to complete. Remember to take your camera as there is always the opportunity to capture something memorable.

If you are not a frequent bushwalker accustomed to being out in this environment there are some points of advice to consider when you venture out into bushland. Adequate strong footwear is essential, so too is a hat. If going out for an extended time always take some water and maybe a snack bar or two.

Through the Community Environment Centre at Annangrove there is a program of free guided bushwalks organised throughout the year. For further details go to the Hills Shire Council website at http://www.thehills.nsw.gov.au and enter "bushwalks" into the search box at the top of the page.



Do we see sin abounding on every hand? The Bible replies: 'When you see these things come to pass, lift up your heads for your redemption is drawing near.'


