So far this year, 12 division one winning entries in the Western and Blue Mountains region have collectively taken home more than \$82.45 million in prize money.

The winning numbers in Oz Lotto draw 1587 on Tuesday 16th July 2024 were 18, 1, 42, 33, 15, 36 and 10, while the supplementary numbers were 9, 12 and 27.

Last financial year, Australia's official lotteries contributed more than \$1.6 billion via state lottery taxes and donations to help community initiatives, such as hospitals, health research, disaster relief and education.

Camellia Experts Visit Netherby Garden

The garden around Netherby Homestead has many large, well-established old camellias. Earlier this year Bill Parker and Craig Carol from Camellias R Us nursery, met Karlene Brummer, who is one of The Friends of Fagan Park garden volunteers, at a camellia propagation workshop. The discussion turned to the many camellias without names in the Netherby garden.





Bill and Craig offered to come when the camellias were flowering, to identify as many of these lovely old trees as possible. May was the perfect time, with many of the camellia sasanguas in full flower. Camellia sasanguas are the ones that like sunshine and flower in early autumn, camellia japonicas prefer the shade, are more formal in flower shape, and flower later, right into winter.

Bill and Craig were met by the enthusiastic volunteer gardening team,

camera and notebooks at the ready. To our delight Bill and Craig

were able to identify almost every camellia in the garden, including the ones not yet in flower. By bud, foliage and growth pattern they knew them.

Bill and Craig were great in action - so often absolutely positive, occasionally pausing to confer, once or twice not quite in agreement! A few japonicas are 'wait for the flowers'.

There are seventy camellias in the garden, six immediately around the house, many more in the larger garden across the lawn, where deep shade creates perfect conditions for camellia japonicas to flourish.

The clipped camellias at the front of the house are pale pink Momozono, two bushes of Setsugekka on either side of the doorway, with wavy white petals and golden stamens, and deep pink Bonanza. Further around on the east side of the house is one of the oldest camellias in the garden, an unusual form of camellia japonica (Speciosissima) with a waratah type flower. It was just beginning to flower in May and is still full of blossoms now in July. Puzzled visitors occasionally remark - this flower looks like a waratah ...? Our heartfelt thanks to Bill and Craig for so kindly sharing their

time and expertise.

Last month, you may have read in the news that the NSW Government has launched the exhibition of its Transport Orientation Development (TOD) Program. Whilst we are pleased that the proposal endorses our existing Hornsby Town Centre Masterplan, which identifies opportunities for over 4,900 new dwellings supported by open spaces, a new multi-purpose community facility, pedestrian, cycling networks and enhanced public transport and road access, what is not clear is how the government intends to support the delivery of these necessary upgrades.

I encourage you to have your voice heard on this important issue to ensure that these plans are delivered appropriately and with the necessary support by reading the exhibition materials and making a submission by Friday 9 August.

Celebrations were very festive with 11 members of his extended family, for lunch at the Galston Club!

Bill attended various schools including Sydney Grammar. At 17 he began working for the Sydney Commonwealth Bank following his father.

In 1938 Bill joined the Infantry Scottish Battalion based in Willoughby. In 1939 when war broke out, he was called up and joined the Air Force, he was only 18.

Bill trained in various places with Tiger Moths (single engine planes) and Ansons (twin engine planes). He became proficient as a wireless operator and was promoted to Sergeant. He sailed to England and was assigned to the Permanent English Airforce Bomber Command, 7th Squadron. They flew raids over Germany in Lancaster Bombers.

Bill returned home in 1945 where he returned to the Commonwealth Bank and met his future wife, Elaine. They married in 1955 and had 2 daughters Jennie and Sue. Bill worked as a Bank Manager retiring at age 60 in 1981.

In 1992, 32 years ago, Bill and Elaine came to live in RSL LifeCare Rowland Village. All the residents were ex-service personnel and their spouses. Bill has reminisced about the wonderful spirit of





camaraderie and the welcome and help given to each new resident. Elaine a gardener, and others have added to the wonderful natural beauty of our village.

Bill enjoyed playing golf on the 3-hole course (now 9 holes) and playing billiards with his old friend and fellow World War 11 veteran, the late Alan Buxton.

Bill often mentions a couple who were knowledgeable about birds and did a bird count which in earlier times numbered up to 70 species. Bill and others in the Village regret the significant reduction in bird numbers and species. A long line of Kookaburras greeting the morning and evening from their gumtree limb or rearing young in a nearby nesting hollow was a joy to Bill and others.

Bill, your longevity must be credited to your constitution and your spirit and in no small part to the loving care of your two daughters who on the death of their mother 17 years ago, began and have continued bringing home cooked main meals that you simply have to heat and eat!

We salute you, Bill and your 103 years!






Glenorie Progress Association

Glenorie Progress Association has a close working relationship with the local environment centre and we are always interested in promoting local history. Pat Shwartz has been researching the following, we are proud to support the project.

Tench's Prospect Mount

We all know now that the Hawkesbury and Nepean River systems are all part of the same river. However in the days of first settlement by Europeans, exploring parties came across the different sections of the River separately. This led to confusion as to whether there were two rivers or just one.



In order to solve this problem Governor Phillip, Collins, Tench and Dawes with aboriginal volunteers Colbee and Boladeree explored the Hawkesbury and Cattai area in 1791. They reached a spot which was named Tench's Prospect Mount.

Historically there has been confusion as to where Tench's Mount was situated until Vic Jurskis found the location in 2013. He was researching changes in ecology and vegetation over the last 200 hundred years and decided to research Tench's Mount because of Tench's detailed description of that area. However, Jurskis couldn't find it on any maps and set out to discover where it was.

The exciting news is that Tench's Prospect Mount is in Glenorie approximately 800 metres west south west of the intersection of Cattai Ridge and Halcrows Roads.

There is little European history in Australia that dates to the 1700's so it would be wonderful to have a memorial sited somewhere in the vicinity of Tench's Prospect Mount as a permanent record of this exploration party. (*Thank you to Diana Kincaid for her research in bringing this story light*)

The giant eucalyptus deanei shown in the photo would probably have been a youngster when Tench was on his exploration journey and is also located in Glenorie and serves as a monument to the great forests that would have once existed throughout the area in the 1700's.

During the July meeting, (2nd last for this term), Council resolved to progress a number of initiatives in the rural area:

- To proceed to the next stage of the Fagan Park off leash dog facility, with further consideration to suggestions flagged by the community.
- Progress to the next stage of the Galston Village Public Domain plan.
- To continue to put pressure on the State Government to prioritise the completion of New Line Rd and associated infrastructure.

In other news,

- The Wiseman's Ferry Community Resilience Plan has been developed. The working group which includes community members, RFS, SES, Peppercorn, NSW Police, NSW Construction Authority and four Councils, has identified priority actions that will help in being better prepared for disasters. These include First Aid courses, education material, emergency kits with the possibility of a solar radio being included.
- At a joint meeting I attended with Hills Council representatives and State MP Robyn Preston, several issues concerning our shared boundary were highlighted. From Glenorie to Wiseman's Ferry, residents raised concerns over driver conduct, State Rd maintenance, illegal dumping, wildlife awareness and the impacts of overgrown verges. I will continue to work collaboratively to address and hopefully improve on the present situation.
- In July I was also privileged to be invited to the Hornsby Gang Show. The Scouts and Guides that participated in the musical variety production, "Tumble Through Time", excelled in demonstrating their wide range of talent and skills. I am now looking forward



to seeing the students at Galston High School perform in their latest production, "The Addams Family".

For a while now my wife Joanna has been telling me that I'm on my phone too much and that it's a bad influence on our kids. I've recently done some reflection and I think that Joanna might be right.

From the outset, I think most people would agree that advances in technologies like the internet, smart phones and social media have been a good thing. Being able to connect with distant friends and family on FaceTime or Facebook has been revolutionary, as has being able to access news from right across the world 24/7. It's shaping the way more and more young people communicate too.

As your local Member of Parliament, I've had to maintain a focus on new tech and ways of staying connected, to let people know about things happening in our area. A smart phone is another tool I use to understand the issues that people want me to focus on, get the most up to date local and national news and to connect with constituents. Revitalization of Galston Village




The Galston village centre will undergo significant enhancements to transform the area into a vibrant space whilst retaining its unique rural ambience.

At Council's most recent General Meeting I was pleased to lead the Galston Village Public Domain Plan item and have it unanimously endorsed. The next stage is to undertake detailed designs that will be guided by community feedback.

Tourism is increasing in the Shire's Rural and semi-Rural areas and as part of the Galston Public Domain plans, walking and cycling networks will be enhanced, as well as improvements to the currently disjointed parking facilities in the area.

Other features included landscaping improvements with additional street tree planting, outdoor seating and informal gathering spaces to provide convenient amenities for locals and visitors to enjoy.





By far the most mentioned issue that was raised during the consultation period was the lack of conveniently located public toilets in the Galston village area. Whilst not part of the original plans, I negotiated an amendment for Council to work on options and solutions for access to public toilets prior to the public domain works commencing. The community should not have to wait for this basic issue to be resolved and I appreciated the support of my fellow councillors to have Galston village public toilets accessibility prioritized.

Throughout the process council will work closely with commercial landowners and operators as well as Transport for NSW.

These improvements to the Galston village will support the local economy and encourage visitation to the rural area. Construction is scheduled to commenced in the first half of 2025.

Push and Pull of the Housing Supply Crisis: The case for staying in your community guilt free!

NSW is experiencing a shortage in housing properties, and this is overshadowed by the Federal Government's target for 1.2 million new homes to be built by 2029. The NSW Government's Hornsby Transport Oriented Development (TOD) project is now on public exhibition. Fortunately, the Hornsby Town Centre area to be rezoned aligns with the area of the Hornsby Town Centre Masterplan, already adopted by Hornsby Council in November 2023. The TOD project will not impact on the rural areas of our Shire. On the 1st July, 2024, the NSW State Government released its Medium Density Strategy (Strategy), which allows medium density housing (dual occupancies and semi-detached homes) in all R2 low-density residential zones across NSW.

Should we now be fearful the new Strategy will encroach on our rural and semi-rural areas in our Hornsby Shire? The western area of our Hornsby Shire retains a strong rural character, with early European led settlement from the late 1700's providing the foundation for the growth of well-established, tight-knit communities organised around individual farms and orchards. The modern Hornsby rural/semi-rural landscape has adapted well to change and includes commercial development in varying degrees, market stalls and housing subdivisions which vary in size and scope. There is no doubt there will be further development in our rural townships, particularly where there is a supermarket, transport options and community facilities. Our recently endorsed draft Galston Village Public Domain Plan is an example of development which retains a rural village character whilst supporting small business and the community itself. The Strategy will not apply to land with a high risk from natural hazards like bushfire and floods, hazardous and sensitive lands and un-serviced areas. Unfortunately, heritage conservation areas are not excluded. It is hoped the poor transport options and lack of accessible and essential services that exist in some rural/semi-rural areas will be a strong deterrent to over-development.

Should we feel guilty about wanting to retain the rural character of our community? Some residents are feeling the pressure and even guilt for wanting to stay in their home, not subdivide their property or move out of the area and community they know and love. This is understandable and there should be no guilt. Bonding with



a community does not happen overnight. The way individuals and groups connect to have trust and mutual exchanges within friendship networks, neighbourhoods and communities can be important for our health and wellbeing. Confidence in our local service providers is also important and we tend to stay with providers we know and trust. What really matters is a community's sense of well-being and the opportunity for social interaction, which can be enhanced when that community is content with the provision of adequate required services.

Membership and networking with different community interest groups is also an important factor. For example, I enjoy my membership with the Galston Garden Club, where members share their interest in gardening and social outings (see photo). Time spent with others with similar interests can cast away the trials of everyday life, open the doorway to various experiences and provide the platform for growth of friendships and, for some, a personal and group identity is created and recreated. No matter that fellow members of the different community groups come originally from other social and cultural spaces, they find their community in the community group spaces and in friendship with others who share their interests.

Hornsby Shire Council Update

Galston Village will undergo significant enhancements to its main street and surrounding areas, transforming it into a vibrant place to relax, dine and play, while preserving its unique character. At its General Meeting last night, Council endorsed the draft Galston Village Public Domain Plan and will now undertake detailed design development, guided by the feedback from the community.

With anticipated increases in visitors to the semi-rural and regional attraction, plans include improved walking and cycling networks, a new centrally located sheltered bus stop and enhanced safety with traffic calming measures, angled parking and a new pedestrian crossing.

Additional features, including more street trees, outdoor seating, informal gathering areas, and bike facilities, will enhance the village's ambiance and provide convenient amenities for locals and visitors to enjoy.

"I am very pleased to see the Galston Village enhancements moving forward," said Hornsby Shire Mayor, the Hon Philip Ruddock AO. "The community support highlights how important these improvements are, ensuring Galston Village remains an inviting destination for years to come.

"The planned tree planting and other new features will enhance the village's charm, reflecting the green environment that Hornsby Shire is known and loved for."

The draft Plan received 68 online submissions from the community during Council's five-week exhibition period, with the majority expressing strong support for the proposed enhancements. Council will maintain liaison with commercial landowners in the shopping precinct, continue to review options for public toilets and pursue approval for roadway works with Transport for New South Wales.

The Galston Village Public Domain Plan is specified in Council's Delivery Program 2024-2027, which identifies a need for the creation of vibrant town centres in Hornsby Shire. The improvements to



Galston Village will support the local economy and encourage visitation to Hornsby Shire. Construction is due to commence in 2025.

The project was also identified in Council's Long Term Financial Plan and will receive funding to see it through to completion over the next two financial years.

Also at last night's meeting, Council:

- Adopted the draft Social Plan 2024-2034
- Adopted the draft Arts and Cultural Plan 2024-2029
- Resolved to proceed with construction of an off-leash dog park at Fagan Park
- Approved the draft Hornsby Development Control Plan 2024
- Received and noted the contents of the Director's Report on investments and borrowings for the period ending 31st May 2024
- Resolved to write to the Premier of NSW and relevant minsters and MPs requesting they honour the previous government's commitment to funding for improvements to New Line Road and a further commitment be made to pedestrian access and safety.

Hidden In The Hills



Dotted Sun Orchid

In a bushland environment where you see all shades of green and brown it can be quite surprising to sight small blue flowers close to the ground, standing out in the understorey. Very often this blue colour belongs to the Dotted Sun Orchid (Thelmytra ixiodes), or one of its relatives.

This terrestrial orchid, growing up to 500 mm tall, has a solitary leaf which wraps itself around the stem. The flowers may number up to ten and can range from a pale blue to almost a blueish mauve in colour.

Several of the individual flowers may present with a number of darker blue dots on the upper three petals - hence its name. These flowers consist of 6 petals and are from 30 mm to 50 mm across.

Flowering generally occurs between August and October. The plant prefers to grow in open forest as well as heath, preferring damp sandy soils. When growing conditions are more favourable and the orchid is in a sunnier situation, the depth of colour in the flowers can be quite brilliant, particularly in the middle of the day.

With all terrestrial plants there are several related but less common varieties. The dots on the petals of the Dotted Sun Orchid, distinguish this plant from its close relatives. There is a smaller pinkish variety as well as a taller blue variety with veined petals.

A similar characteristic of each variety is the distinctive formation in the centre of the flower as seen in the adjacent images.

Our guest speaker for July was Helen McGregor giving a presentation about gardens around the world. Some she had been to during her travels and some she would love to see in the future. Recently I planted a group of "Miss Muffet" plants (pittosporum tobira) This is a dwarf variety, with strong dark glossy green oval leaves. In spring I can expect to be greeted with blooms of small cream flowers, providing a beautiful fragrance to my garden. From the information I have read, Miss Muffet is great planted in borders, pots, used as a hedge and mass groundcover. It is often used in clumps with other plants to provide texture and interest in the garden.

Plant in full sun or part shade and rich, will-drained soil. It will thrive best in a sheltered position but will be able to withstand light coastal breezes and frosts. It can suffer from leaf burn during hot summer days, so a spot in light dappled shade will provide the best results. It has a low and wide growth habit, so you can expect Pittosporum tobira to grow to approx. 1.5m wide and 1m high.

Pittosporum tobira "miss Muffet" requires minimal maintenance. You should lightly prune it regularly in the warmer months to maintain its shape and size. Ensure that you allow the soil to dry out between waterings. The shrub will benefit from a slow release fertilizer in autumn and spring. Once established, Miss Muffet is drought and light frost tolerant.

Our guest speaker will be Anna Ernst whose passion for bromeliads commenced 25 years ago when she realised these plants were low maintenance and added vibrant colour in a variety of stripes, spots and dots to her garden throughout all the Seasons.



Anna's collection expanded further when she joined the BSA six years ago.

Once all the ground space in her garden was completely filled she started experimenting with mounting bromeliads on cut off branches and old fence palings.

"Putting together lovely contrasting colours and complementary forms of bromeliads is so satisfying and lots of fun. For me, it is relaxing to create a piece of art that I can enjoy and watch while it changes and grows over the seasons." Anna will demonstrate the methods she and her husband Peter have used to attach

Anna will demonstrate the methods she and her husband Peter have used to attach logs onto sturdy bases for free standing pieces, making wall mounted timber pieces, and the different techniques she has experimented with for attaching bromeliads onto round, flat and weirdly shaped wood.

There will be our usual 'Show, Tell and Ask' session and the very popular plant raffle.




