The Future Of Glenorie

Hornsby Council is exhibiting a Draft Opportunity and Constraints Working Paper to guide planning for the future of Glenorie. It follows Council's resolution to implement the recommendations of the Hornsby Rural Lands Study 2022 (Hornsby RLS).

The Hornsby RLS recommends investigating the possibility for housing diversity around Glenorie Village in the form of 5,000-10,000m² environmental living allotments.

All residents who live in the 400m buffer zone and those living outside this area are encouraged to read the Working Paper to understand what is proposed and how it will affect Glenorie. Non residents are also welcome to comment. The Working Papers can be found on our website (see home page) or on Hornsby councils website https://yoursay.hornsby.nsw.gov.au/glenorie-village. 

Incident in South Maroota

On the evening of November 9th, 2024, police responded to an incident in South Maroota involving a 74-year-old male resident. The individual was alleged to have fired a shotgun in his backvard, causing distress to nearby residents.

Upon arrival, police secured the area and conducted a thorough investigation. The 74yo (who is not a firearms licence holder) was allegedly found in possession of multiple unregistered firearms and ammunition. Additionally, prohibited drugs were discovered on the premises.

The 74-year-old male was arrested and taken to Castle Hill police station. He faces multiple charges, including unauthorized possession and use of firearms, possession of unregistered firearms, failure to safely store firearms, possession of ammunition without a license, and possession and supply of prohibited drugs. He was given strict bail to attend Parramatta Local Court next month.

The police would like to assure the community that the situation was handled promptly and safely.

We thank the community for their cooperation and encourage anyone with additional information particularly about unregistered firearms to come forward, as per the previous post about the NSW Firearms Amnesty, please surrender all unregistered firearms.

Driver charged after woman dies when hit by ute at Dural Tuesday, 19th November 2024 06:06:48 AM

A woman has died after being hit by ute while walking in Dural yesterday afternoon. Emergency services were called to Old Northern Road about 4.30pm (Monday 18th November 2024), and found the woman, believed to be aged in her 70s, had suffered critical injuries after being struck by the southbound ute.

The driver of the ute, a 28-year-old man from Zetland, stopped to render assistance but the woman died at the scene. She is yet to be formally identified.

Officers attached to Kuring Gai Police Area Command established a crime scene. arresting the driver and taking him to Hornsby Hospital for mandatory testing.

On release, the man was taken to Hornsby Police Station where specialist police attached to the Crash Investigation Unit (CIU) charged him with negligent driving occasioning death. He has been granted conditional bail to appear in Hornsby Local Court on 19th December 2024.

Suspicious Activity

At 4am on 20/11/24 Hills Police responded to a report of suspicious activity at a residence on Davey Rd, Dural. Officers arrived to find two vehicles with engines running and headlights on. As police attempted to block the vehicles, one accelerated towards the police cars, narrowly avoiding a collision, and then sped away, followed by the second vehicle. A pursuit ensued, during which one vehicle reversed into a police car before speeding off at high speed. The chase continued onto Derriwong Rd and then onto Old Northern Rd. For safety reasons, the pursuit was terminated on New Line Rd.



Local Community Intergeneration Program -Looking for 65+ people to join

Many of us would have seen the ABC TV show 'Old Peoples Home for 4 Year Olds' - a social experiment to highlight the importance of taking active measures to prevent frailty and reduce the risk of dementia.

A staggering number of older adults in Australia experience social isolation, leading to a decline in health, and intergenerational programs have the potential to reduce loneliness and build stronger community bonds.

Intergenerational programs can bridge the gap between generations, fostering mutual understanding and respect. For children, interacting with older adults can enhance social skills, empathy, and language development.

It's believed that bringing older adults ages 65+ and preschoolers together in an enjoyable, structured playgroup has the potential to target risk factors, all in one fun two hour a week program, and shows promise in reducing the risk of frailty and dementia.

While intergenerational practice is not a new phenomenon, there is yet to be any large-scale clinical trials that collects quantitative data and measures the specific health outcomes.

In September, Galston Bendigo Bank joined in the end of the season celebrations and presentations for the Kenthurst Football Club.



Glenorie Progress Association

Another active year under our belt for the Glenorie Progress Association - our 131st year. We have conducted monthly hybrid meetings i.e. face to face plus ZOOM/Teams.

By necessity, the GPA needs to work with two Councils, Hornsby (HSC) and The Hills (THSC). We invite councillors from both Shires to our meetings so they can provide meaningful representation for our community. We hope to be a conduit for the Glenorie and surrounding residents with our Local, State and Federal representatives. Both Councils have given us quick responses to the questions from the Glenorie Community and comprehensive reports on Council activities in Glenorie District.

We all as individuals can "Have Your Say" directly to Council but if you wish the GPA to make any submission, you need to outline your reasons for discussion. Our aim is to make members and residents aware of issues that we think will matter to residents, facilitate discussion and direct to Councils and other government bodies. Note that the GPA is an apolitical association and does not align with any party.

The Planning Subcommittee focussed on specific issues while keeping to the aims of retaining the rural amenity, green space and connectivity. We try to survey community opinions to produce a balanced view resolved to disband this group and set up Task Forces on an as-needs basis. This will allow greater focus and attention on the important development matters in the area and ensure those involved and the GPA can communicate effectively with the community on these changes.

Environment Centre – Noting the tireless efforts of volunteers researching environmental issues and protection of the local history and wildlife. The Hills Hornsby Rural Koala project searches for koalas through sound monitoring, motion cameras; vegetation mapping; long walks in the bushland, letterbox drops, notices at shops, street signs. HHRKP is part of a fantastic network of groups and people with expertise resulting in exciting news from the drone searches of the Wildseek Project with Landcare Australia, QUT and Wires. Koalas and other wildlife in our area are noted on BioNet.

Appreciation goes to Hills Accounting Solutions who continued to audit our books on an honorary basis and to Glenorie RSL Club for the many years of support, allowing us to use this great venue at no cost.

Once again we look to the future of Glenorie together with the support of the whole community so spread the word to friends and neighbours to join for continued successes in 2025. Please send feedback on our website, by email, text, post or verbally.



Finally – our major project the Ray Whiteman Heritage fence is coming closer to the build. Our paver drive has gone well and, so you don't miss out, we are holding displays at Woolworths to show you what pavers you can purchase and will provide you with a certificate of purchase that you can give to family members for Christmas.



Issues covered to date:

Artisan Brewery - Many meetings with the developer and strong opinions noted and considered responses submitted for the toning down of the DA to be submitted to Council to determine. Members and residents will attend and can speak at a Local Planning Panel (LPP) teleconference in November.

Service Station DA - Approved but not happened as yet.

The Smallwood Road Quarry - Approved with limitations.

Maroota Friable Sandstone - DA needs serious scrutiny considering the huge scale of this proposal.

Glenorie Oval Parking - Better parking facility beside Glenorie preschool and improved safety fencing in the Glenorie Park to better serve the School and community.

Wishlist - A loop footpath along Post Office Road and Whites Road as a community project. Off leash dog park in Glenorie.



Il cows are raised on grass for the first 6-12 months of their life, but many producers switch them to grains to fatten up before slaughter. This is called finishing. This unfortunately un-does the health benefits of grass-fed beef, so you should look for labels that state

"100% grass-fed beef", "grass-finished beef" or "pastured beef".

Also, "organic beef" does not mean the cows ate grass, rather that they were fed organic grain (and maybe some grass). That's a step up from GMO feed that most cattle get but does not confer the benefits of a 100% grass diet.

Ideally source your meat from grass-fed animals raised on pasture their entire lives, not given antibiotics or hormones, and sourced from family farms.



from the **Mayor's Desk**

As a longtime resident of the area, I am incredibly proud of Hornsby Shire's unique mixture of urban towns and rural villages. While serving as a Councillor I maintained a commitment to ensuring our public spaces are safe, functional and attractive. So, I'm incredibly disappointed when I see our public spaces defaced by graffiti, a sentiment that I know is shared by much of our community.

I am keen to tackle this growing problem, so I have asked Council to prepare a report outlining options for a Shire wide strategy, with a strong focus on community involvement in preventing unwanted graffiti and its removal from private property.

I have been impressed at just how efficient Council's own team are at dealing with graffiti on Council owned assets. The problem however is much greater than this and will require collaboration with the community, private property owners, and the NSW Government. I look forward to sharing more information about this important issue in the coming months.

The revitalisation project at Galston Village is another example of how Council is upgrading our village centres to make them places people want to meet and gather. Following the exhibition of the Galston Village Public Domain Plan, refinements have been made based on community feedback. The next steps are to develop a detailed design and tender for construction. The proposed improvements are expected to commence in mid-2025, subject to final design approval by TfNSW, (former RMS).

As the year draws to a close, we look forward to some down time in order to celebrate and eniov time spent in our beautiful Bushland Shire. From paddling in our waterways, to enjoying our parks and playgrounds, there is so much to experience right here on our doorstep.

I hope you, like me, will enjoy spending time with family and friends. I wish you all a cheerful and joyful holiday season and a prosperous new year.





I recently visited a fantastic organisation in our area, and I'd like to share a little bit about them.

Warrah Disability Services is located in Dural, and it is a fantastic not-for-profit service which is dedicated to performing particular services for people with disability. Importantly, Warrah is providing opportunities for people where they may not previously have had the chance to participate fully as a member of our community.

Their work began back in the sixties, with Warrah operating as a special school by day and a group home by night, but times have changed.

Nowadays, Warrah offers supported independent living for adults across 13 homes with 24/7 care, community support services and in-home support. Along with that, Warrah is the only Steiner specialist school operating in Australia, providing K to12 education with 31 students currently enrolled. Warrah also operates a biodynamic farm and operates an organic farm shop which I had the chance to learn more about on my visit. More recently, Warrah has assisted with the creation of microenterprises, including candles made by Rohan, who is a regular participator at the Dural Men's Shed. Ben and Jim have also started mowing lawns with the assistance of the team at Warrah.

When I visited Warrah recently, I caught up with the CEO Delia Gray, school principal Anna Wetzel, farm manager Steve Tennikoff and property manager David Sharkie and I really learned a lot so I'm grateful for the time they spent talking with me. I also met students, Talara, Harry, Max and Jasmin and saw the positive impact that Warrah's programs are having.

Along with the staff, we talked about the organisation's history, the fantastic work that Warrah is doing right now and about their plans for the future which will provide even more opportunities for people living with a disability, but also involve more members of our broader community outside of Warrah's participants and students. The way they want to achieve this is by developing a small farm animal management practice which would be open to the public while teaching participants about animal husbandry and have a positive impact on our environment - I think it sounds great and already know my children would love the chance to visit.

I'm excited about Warrah's plans to expand, open new learning opportunities and bring our community along the journey. Right now, I'm working on a plan to support them as they grow and continue to support people in our community to lead an engaging and fulfilling life and I know our community will be backing them too.

Hornsby Shire Mayor wages war on graffiti

Hornsby Shire Council's newly elected Mayor, Warren Waddell, has issued a call to arms to Council and the community to tackle the problem of graffiti in the Shire's town centres, villages and transport routes.



In a special Mayoral Minute brought to his first Council meeting as Mayor, Mayor Waddell requested Council prepare a report outlining options for a Shire wide strategy with a strong focus on community involvement in preventing unwanted graffiti and its removal from private property.

"Graffiti is becoming an increasingly pressing issue in almost every area of Hornsby, particularly along major roads, town centres, public spaces, and community facilities. This surge not only mars the visual appeal of our neighbourhoods but also contributes to a broader perception of neglect and disorder detracting from Hornsby's character, diminishing its natural beauty and the well-maintained public spaces that the community cherishes," said Mayor Waddell.

"I have been impressed at just how efficient our own teams are at dealing with the presence of graffiti on Council owned assets. The problem however is much larger than this and needs addressing."

The requested report will include recommendations that are well proven across the world for how Council can work with the community and private owners to tackle this issue. It will also explore how greater collaboration with the State government can be fostered to prevent and better manage the removal of graffiti on state owned assets.

Actions to be investigated include rapid removal; facilitating quick and simple reporting; community engagement, education and participation; integrated public art and graffiti; and alternative funding.

"I have been buoyed by the interest of the whole community to support this war on graffiti which will contribute to a more vibrant, safe, attractive, and culturally rich community for all residents of Hornsby Shire," Mayor Waddell said.

"I thank my colleague Councillors for supporting my Mayoral Minute," he added.

Annual Report highlights Council's commitment to residents:

Maximising resources and delivering outstanding outcomes

Hornsby Shire Council will this week publish its 2023-2024 Annual Report which outlines its accomplishments, from completing 66 infrastructure projects to repairing 605 metres of local roads, after it was endorsed at its General Meeting on Wednesday, 13th November.

The report highlights Council's commitment to addressing the immediate needs of the community through various projects and initiatives, alongside taking tangible steps toward delivering long-term plans housing solutions through the Hornsby Town Centre Masterplan and long-term recreation needs with a destination parkland, Hornsby Park.

Across the Shire, projects included refurbishing Galston Aquatic and Leisure Centre, upgrades to the Great North Walk in the Berowra to Cowan area, The Lakes of Cherrybrook Park, Glenorie Community Centre Playground, access to Brooklyn Baths, a new Children's Forest at Fagan Park, Beecroft Village Green and Wollundry Park Playground in Pennant Hills.





A number of vibrant community-building events and programs were delivered, from Taste of the World Multicultural Festival and Reconciliation Week concert to Council's libraries' summer reading programs and the 2023 Hornsby Art Prize. Council partnered with Lifeline Harbour to Hawkesbury Sydney to provide mental health support through drop-in sessions at Hornsby Library, continued to deliver the popular Hello Hornsby program for seniors, and for the first time held markets in Berowra and Hornsby to promote the local reuse economy.

Hornsby Shire Council Mayor Warren Waddell said the 2023-2024 Annual Report demonstrates Council's commitment to transparency and efficiency, showcasing the hard work of Council and staff to make Hornsby Shire a better place to live.

"We operate with a remarkably lean team, with each staff member servicing 314 community members – about 30% more than our peer councils, where staff service 238 residents each on average," said Mayor Waddell.

"We are committed to being frugal with every dollar we spend, ensuring we make the most of the community's hard-earned money. We understand the pressures of the high cost of living, and we're focussed on providing services and improvements that benefit residents."

Some of the key operational and capital achievements for 2023/24 include:

- Repairing 2,650 potholes
- Constructing 1.89 kilometres of new footpaths
- Planting 1,930 trees
- Distributing 25,030 native plants for planting in the Shire
- Removing 696 tonnes of pollutants from waterways
- Collecting 190 tonnes of e-waste at the Community Recycling Centre

Protect our community: Dispose of batteries safely

Household batteries are some of the most useful and common items in our homes, but they have serious and harmful impacts if we dispose of them incorrectly, according to Hornsby Shire Council. This includes AA or AAA batteries, button batteries, and lithium batteries, which are particularly dangerous.

Fires caused by batteries placed in household bins are unfortunately becoming more common with the increase of rechargeable devices, placing people and the environment at risk. Last year, discarded batteries sparked over 10,000 fires in Australia.

Batteries should never be placed in any of your household bins, as they can overheat and catch fire inside collection trucks or at waste facilities. When they are exposed to the mechanical compaction in the back of collection trucks, combined with friction, heat, and other flammable material such as cardboard, this creates the perfect environment for fires.

Thankfully, it's easy to store and recycle batteries safely. When your battery is used up, place some clear tape over the terminals and store them in a cardboard box or container with air flow until you can drop them off at your nearest battery recycling point. Most household batteries can be recycled at the Thornleigh Community Recycling Centre and other accredited B-cycle drop off points, which include major supermarkets and retailers.

Spider Flower

Throughout the latter part of the year it is possible to come across what is commonly described as a Grevillea or Spider Flower Plant.

There are four Spider Plants having a similar structured flower, each presenting with a different contrasting colour.

The most noticeable one in natural bushland could well be the Red Spider Plant (Grevillea speciosa), flowering mostly from June to September on a spreading shrub up to 2 meters tall.

Maybe the most prolific one would be the Grey Spider Plant (Grevillea buxifolia). An erect shrub also up to 2 meters in height. The flowering period is mainly between July and October. Buds may have a pinkish tinge in the early stages.

Undoubtedly the most attractive one would be the Pink Spider Plant (Grevillea sericea). Its flowers are generally a bright pink colour but the centres can tend toward a deeper pinky mauve while the ends may tend towards paler pink when the flower matures. It flowers between July to December.

Probably the least common is the Narrow-leaf Spider Plant (Grevillea linearfolia), which has a small white flower with pink tips when in its early stages. It can grow up to 4 meters in height but can be somewhat straggly in appearance. Flowering mostly occurs from July through to October.



have similar shaped leaves with some individual variations in shape. All four can be found within the same general areas of open forest, adjacent heathlands and sandy slopes.

It Is Finished

Have you ever had a special project that you wanted to finish? Maybe it was something around the home, or maybe it was your home? I remember some years ago my brother in-law had a home built. They waited well over a year for it to be completed, but when it was finally finished, they were disappointed. Structural problems began to appear, followed by many meetings with the builder.

The book of Genesis tells us that God too set out to build a special project called, Planet Earth. As a Master Builder it only took Him a few days to organise the materials and arrange everything according to His design. But unlike my brother in-law's house, "God saw everything that He had made, and indeed it was very good..." (Genesis 1:31). Those two words 'Very good' in Hebrew means - Exceedingly beautiful or perfect. Then we read in chapter two verse one that the "heavens and the earth, and all the host of them, were finished." The word 'finished' in Hebrew means - Complete. Thus, we see that God's creation was perfect and complete. Then it says that God took a day off (Genesis 2:2,3). God didn't rest because He was tired. God never gets tired (Isaiah 40:28). The reason He rested was to signify that His work of creation was 'perfect' and 'complete.'

Just like God finished His work of creation in six days; Jesus finished His work of salvation in six days. We call it Passion Week. The day before He was crucified Jesus prayed to His Father these words, "I have glorified You on the earth. I have finished the work which You have given Me to do" (John 17:4). The next day as He hung upon the cross Jesus cried out, "It is finished" (John 19:30); then He too took a day off and rested in the tomb. When Jesus cried out, "It is finished" He was signifying that His work of salvation was also 'perfect' and 'complete.'



As Christians we have great assurance and peace knowing that Jesus completed for us a perfect work. What a wonderful Saviour we have! Every week we are reminded of Christ's power to create and His power to save. Therefore, we too can rest in him. As it says in Hebrews, "There remains therefore a rest for the people of God. For he who has entered His rest, has himself also ceased from his works as God did from His" (Hebrews 4:9,10).


Then, when we reflect back on 2024 and look ahead to the New Year, 2025, we can celebrate with hope because:

Over the past few weeks since being elected, I have been spending a lot of time getting around to the many different local organizations across the Hornsby electorate, as I get acquainted with the community and gain a better understanding for the issues and challenges facing our residents.



Glenorie Rural Fire B<mark>rigade</mark> is bringing Santa to town on Christmas Eve! Santa will be making a visit around Glenorie before he sets off around the world to deliver presents. Please have a look at the map to see where he'll be. When you hear the siren and the music, Santa's on his way!! Note: Santa will not stop on Old Northern Road

Recently I had a meeting with Superintendent Dan Meijer, the Acting District Manager for Hornsby Ku-ring-gai Rural Fire Service, at their recently upgraded Headquarters at Cowan.

With 19 brigades, 65 vehicles (including 6 boats) and a total of 1,318 volunteers, the Hornsby Ku-ring-gai RFS District is the Hornsby Electorate's largest volunteer organization. The District volunteers are supported by 12 professional staff.

This calendar year, the organisation has responded to 557 fire calls, trained an additional 498 volunteers and held 56 training courses for the existing members. They have also undertaken 14 hazard reduction burns of around 225 hectares.

I was very impressed to go through the details of what Dan and his team have done to prepare for the 2024/25 bushfire season.

However, please do not solely rely on the RFS to save you and your property in the event of a nearby dangerous bushfire. Every resident should be "bushfire ready" and every property should be prepared for the bushfire season.

Arcadia Rural Fire Brigade

Arcadia RFS was delighted to host the **NSW State Emergency Services** (SES) Minister, Jihad Dib along with the NSW Treasurer, Daniel Mookhey and the NSW RFS Commissioner Rob Rogers at the media event to announce the beginning of the bushfire season (1st October to 31st March). The event included related agency members of National Parks and Wildlife, the State Emergency Services and NSW Forestry.

During the media briefing the minister for the SES highlighted how important it is for all residents, not just those in rural areas, to have a Bushfire Survival Plan and have the Hazards Near Me app downloaded on their mobile phone.

The ministers and RFS Commissioner took to the air in the SES helicopter to view the recent hazard reduction burns in the Arcadia area. The ministers commented on the size of the area covered by bushland, the rugged terrain and the extent of housing on ridgelines adjacent to bushland. All enjoyed the beauty of the area from the air and from the ground. So very different from their surroundings at Macquarie Street and Olympic Park.


