Power Outages and Loss of **Mobile Services**

When the high winds occurred on Wednesday 15th January a high number of residents experienced power outages, some of which lasted several days.

A large number of residents also reported mobile phone outages, with smartphones only showing 1 bar or SOS only. Even smartphones showing 1 bar were unable to call or text. Incoming calls were being diverted directly to voicemail. Apps like Hazards near me, were unable to be used.

It creates a feeling of incredible isolation when you are faced with no power and no mobile reception. Families were unable to contact elderly relatives, and people using medical devices had no way of contacting help.

We have had power outages before, but never lost mobile coverage to the extent we experienced this time. Imagine if it were bushfires which knocked out the power to the mobile towers. It's a concerning situation.

Personally for me, I didn't find this response particularly helpful as we were without mobile coverage from Wednesday afternoon to late on Friday. I work from home and so do other members of my family. We are in a bushfire prone area, so I'm looking for something more reliable. So from my investigations these are the options (if you know of others let me know):

1) Fibre to the Premises (FTTP). If you have this plus a back up power option (battery/generator) to the modem, then you should retain access to the NBN, and can use Wifi Calling to keep in touch with the world.



- 2) Starlink. Again with a back up power option (battery/generator) to your equipment you will retain internet access and can utilise Wifi calling.
- Skymuster/Skymesh. Again with a back up power option (battery/generator) you should retain access to the NBN and can utilise Wifi calling.

We tried to get FTTP to our premises this time last year, but were unsuccessful, so we are now looking at Starlink.

We raised the issue with Telstra. This was their statement

Telstra Regional General Manager Michael Marom:

Widespread power outages following last week's severe weather affected parts of our network in the area. Our network sites have back up power systems, which kept services running for as long as they could. We had teams on the ground accessing affected sites as soon as it was safe to do so and managed to restore the majority of sites by the weekend. We worked closely with authorities and the power companies to get everything back online as quickly as possible and we thank everyone for their patience.



Woolworths reintroduces soft plastic recycling trial

I was ecstatic to see that both Dural and Glenorie Woolies have reintroduced a soft plastics recycling bin in their stores.

At this stage it is being trialled at selected locations across NSW and Victoria. Along with the collection point, the company is making great efforts to reduce the use of single use plastics (including straws and picnic cutlery) as well as plastic wrap and packaging on many of its products.

With extremely limited avenues for recycling soft plastics in our area this is a great win for the community and I must admit that I almost filled it up with the soft plastics I had been storing for the past several months, as I just couldn't bear to throw them in the red bin!

Let's hope that the trial becomes a permanent operation and to ensure that it does, please read the table below and DO NOT use it as a rubbish bin.

Leeches are Lurking!

The day after "The Big Storm' hit, I woke up and decided to walk around my house to survey any potential damage. I grabbed my dressing gown and a pair of thongs and walked the perimeter of my hone. After gratefully noting no major carnage was evident, I went back inside to make myself a coffee (gas cooktop -YAY!) and sat down to check the Ausgrid update. To my horror I saw something black and squishy on the side of my ankle and realised it was a Leech! Ugh! I had been outside for literally less than 5 minutes and this little bloodsucker had somehow hitchhiked its way onto my foot! Without thinking I grabbed a nearby tissue, placed it on the leech and pulled it off. A tiny spot of blood was beginning to show so I put some disinfectant and a bandaid over the bite site.

Next stop - the shower, where lo and behold I found another TWO on the back of my thighs! After guickly removing them, I flushed down the loo. For the rest of the day I was completely paranoid that I still had some lurking around

on my person and so made sure I had a shaker of salt at the ready. I also worried that my cats might pick up some, but luckily, as it was still raining, they decided to stay put indoors.

Australia has over 70 species of leeches and is one of only two places in the world where they live on land, usually in wet or moist environments, bush or rainforests. I encountered my fair share of leeches during my time living at Spencer by the Hawkesbury River, but since moving to Arcadia this has been a rare occurrence.

Leeches contain a component (hirudin) in their saliva which prevents blood from clotting and allows them to have their fill before dropping off. This anticoagulant can cause a wound to bleed slightly after the leech has been detached.

PREVENTION

When walking in leech- loving conditions, it's best to wear long pants & shirts and closed foot wear. Tropical strength insect repellents can be applied to both clothing and bare patches of skin.

REMOVAL

Leeches, unlike ticks, do not burrow into the skin nor will they leave a poisonous

head in the wound. Despite this, many myths and old wives' tales abound about removing leeches. The simplest way is with salt: sprinkle onto the leech and most will quickly drop off. Tea tree oil, vinegar or alcohol dabbed onto the body are also effective alternatives. If however, you do not immediately find the little sucker, it will eventually drop off of its own accord when fully engorged (around 30-40mins). After removal, it might be prudent to clean the wound with some antiseptic and place a band aid or covering to help stop with bleeding. Some people may have no further ongoing symptoms, but some (myself included) could have a residual itching and swelling of the bite site for a few days afterwards. If you suffer infection or any other issues, it's best to consult with your GP.



Who is Keith Lees and ???? Why Was He Arrested

Police Officers attached to Kuring-Gai Police Area Command arrested 72-yearold Keith Lees at a property on Kenthurst Road, Dural at about 8am on Thursday 2nd January 2025. He was wanted on an arrest warrant for an alleged murder in Queensland 27 years ago.

The warrant was issued in July 2023 in relation to an alleged murder of Meaghan Rose in 1997 on the Sunshine Coast.

Much of the back story to this arrest was covered by the Australia True Crime Podcast which you can listen to here https://shows.acast.com/australiantruecrime, then look for Episodes 573 to 577 (577 includes details of the latest update). The podcast first aired on 23rd December 2024.

It was a podcast listener who provided the breakthrough to Police enabling them to find and arrest Keith Lees. Police first visited a unit block in Hornsby. A neighbour knew the man police were looking for as David Japaljarri.



Readers may wonder what happened between 1997 and today. This is covered in the podcast.

Beautiful Bugs

Who can remember the Summers of past, when the hot days were serenaded by the sounds of Cicadas echoing around your backyard and the balmy nights meant your sceen door was adorned with dozens of small brown 'Christmas' beetles? If you were really lucky you might have had one or two colourful and shiny larger beetles making an appearance and hanging out with their drab cousins.

Where have they all gone? According to the Australian Museum, numbers have indeed fallen over the past 30-40 years. This is mainly due to the decline in their habitat - namely the Cumberland Plain woodland, of which only around 10% remains.

The Christmas Beetle larvae eat native grass roots, and the adult beetles eat

eucalypt leaves, so as the woodland makes way for more and more housing, the beetle population has declined. I was very excited to see this little beauty over the Christmas break. It brought back many happy childhood memories.

Speaking of Cicadas, I thought I had seen most species and colours over the years, until I found this little guy recently, and it truly stumped me. It turns out that Australia

has more than 300 species of Cicadas and after some diligent research, trawling through photo after photo, I think I have identified him as a Razor grinder, (Henicopsaltria eydouxii).

Apparently, the Razor grinder has one of the loudest calls, which has been likened to the sound of a metal grinder. It is one of the larger varieties of cicadas and has zig-zag markings on its front wings. Razor grinders occur all along the east coast from Gladstone Qld, to Narooma, NSW.

And finally in this trio of interesting insects, may I present to you the Fiddler Beetle. He was deep in a log when I was gardening, and the colour was just spectacular to see.



Once again, I had no clue what it was (etymology is not my strong suit) so after some hit and miss search terms in Google, I finally found it: *Eupoecila australasiae* more commonly known as the Fiddler Beetle - So named because of the markings on its shell which supposedly look like a Fiddle or violin.

It has been a mammoth job! Every single part has been rebuilt by our volunteers with no new parts available. The wheels were the major challenge and expense using nearly forgotten crafts. All the timber was milled



locally and fashioned into the beautiful body you now see. An absolute credit to all the volunteers and local tradesmen who have donated goods and services. It was proclaimed "complete" in December 2024.

The truck drives well but is challenging with its "crash" gearbox. Its maximum speed is about 25km/h but is unlikely to ever be driven so fast!







Vale Margaret McKinley

Margaret McKinley died on 30th December 2024 in Mark Donaldson VC House Galston at the age of 93. Throughout her long busy life she wore many hats: a teacher and catechist; a nature lover, gardener, farmer and environmentalist; a dressmaker and home maker; an artist and music connoisseur; a genealogist and historian; a community activist, and an irrepressible volunteer. But the role that had the most profound impact on those who were closest to her was as the disarmingly modest, but hugely inspiring, matriarch of the McKinley family.

Margaret Ann Cape was born on 18th December 1931 in Cooma. Her early years were spent on a sheep property in Merriwa.

Margaret attended high school at Sacred Heart Rose Bay and went on to Sydney Kindergarten Training College, where she graduated as a pre-school teacher. She met her future husband, Edward McKinley, at her 21st birthday party. In 1955, Margaret married Ted and they bought a 13 acre property in Dural. The property cost 100 pounds per acre, and they scrimped, saved and toiled away to build a three bedroom home stick by stick, with most of the work done personally by the pair of them. The power was only connected after the house was finished, so everything had to be done without the aid of mains electricity. Over the years the couple had eight children.

Margaret was an intrepid volunteer. Much of her work was connected to the local parish. She was on hand when the Benedictine Monks bought a property in Arcadia in 1961, and helped the priests with transport, meals and shopping while the monastery was being built. She also served as a catechist, or scripture teacher, for 36 years, starting at Middle Dural public school in 1965.

Margaret earned extra income for her family by making school uniforms, netball uniforms and bespoke aprons for people in the local community. So it was only natural that she should apply these skills to her volunteer work, and over the years she made many robes for lay ministers and habits for the Benedictine Monks. She also loved cooking, and regularly made cakes for school fetes and Arcadia monastery fetes.

In 1971, Margaret joined a group of like-minded locals to form Dural Neighbour Aid. Over the years they did housework and cleaning for sick and elderly people, cooked hot meals, and provided transport to medical appointments and other engagements. She retired from her Neighbour Aid duties in 2019, after 47 years of service.

Margaret had a very strong sense of history, and the importance of understanding the back story to the way people lived their lives and how communities evolved over time. She joined the Dural Historical Society in 1999 and worked there until 2019. During this time she researched and wrote up the histories of many buildings, institutions and families in the region.

In her spare time, Margaret loved listening to fine music. Although she wasn't a stage performer herself, she couldn't bear just being a spectator, so in 2002 she helped to organise a concert series for Arcadian Musical Recitals. Margaret continued in the role of administration and publicity manager for the next 13 years, right up until she entered Rowland Village.

After Ted died in 2014, Margaret sold her Dural home and moved into a self-contained unit in Rowland Village. Some of the other residents in the village were already friends and acquaintances, and she guickly made new friends with her neighbours, helping them with their gardening, letter writing and meals.



The day before Margaret died, Father Michael came and spoke to her, and administered the last rites. She was very weak, but at peace and ready to bring to a close her amazing life. Margaret passed away on Monday 30th December 2024. She was farewelled by her family, friends and the local community at a requiem Mass at St Benedicts Parish Church, Arcadia on 9th January. Her humble, unassuming but immensely giving and productive life continues to be an inspiration to everyone who was touched by it.

Jemma Juckes (née Hibbert) 25th June 1990 – 18th December 2024

The Glenorie community mourns the loss of one of its brightest lights, Jemma Juckes, who passed away peacefully on 18th December 2024. A devoted wife to Lang, beloved stepmother to Riley, and adored fur-mum to George, Jemma will be remembered for her warmth, resilience, and extraordinary capacity to inspire those around her.

Jemma's impact on Glenorie was profound and far-reaching. As the owner of Glenorie Pizzeria for nine years, she turned a local eatery into the heart of the community. Jemma created a space where connections flourished, and her mentorship of young staff helped many discover their potential and build confidence. Her kindness and encouragement helped shape lives and left a lasting impression on everyone who walked through her doors.

Diagnosed with cancer in April 2023, Jemma faced her battle with unwavering



courage and determination, using her journey to bring people together and inspire action. Her advocacy efforts achieved a remarkable milestone just two days after her passing, when the life-saving drug she fought to make accessible was approved for inclusion on the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS). Pete not only was a fire fighter he was a mentor, leader, someone that our brigade looked up to. Pete not only helped the needy with goods but he also looked after the mental health of many of his flock. Pete's passion for helping people made him a well known and loved member of the community. His legend was known in the Hills, Hawkesbury, Hornsby and Central Coast areas surrounding the Hawkesbury River. He married people, christened children, buried people and most of all, helped people. If someone needed help, he would supply them with food, clothes, toys, washing machines, dryers, fridges and if he didn't have what they needed, he would do his best to get it for them.

He raised money to support what people had already donated to him by doing the Carols in the Park at Wisemans Ferry and for a couple of years after the floods, at Maroota School. With the donations and the money received from the carols, he would put together what Pete and Jessie would call their "Love Hampers". The Love Hampers were distributed by Pete and Jesse to the needy families of the four main districts that Pete and Jesse supported. The hampers ensured that these families had a wonderful Christmas.

This is the Peter Goldstien we all know and love. This is the man everybody knew. Pastor Peter Goldstien is one of a kind and I doubt we'll see anyone like him in the near future. If we do, they will have very big boots to fill!

Peter you will never be forgotten... how can you forget someone that has given all of us so much to remember.

Pete loved and adored Jesse, his kids and grandkids but there was only one person that Pete loved as much as his family, and he is with Him now.

Hornsby Shire Council Mayor Warren Waddell said this year's theme was chosen to reflect the importance on reuse and repurposing materials before they become waste that enters our environment, renewing the art prize's track record of poignant commentary on the waste crisis – the effects of which are seen most clearly at the level of Local Government.

"Rethinking our approach to managing household waste is essential to reducing the amount of waste we send to landfills, which are quickly

reaching capacity," said Mayor Waddell. "Finding creative ways to repurpose old items, whether in art or life, is a crucial behaviour towards building a more sustainable community."

2025 property outlook: What's in store for the property market



However, we have an equal obligation to ensure the safety of our residents and their property.

Fortunately, our scheduled mulching programme took place at the Galston Council Depot on Sunday 19th January. This provided at least one outlet for the increase in tree debris experienced throughout the rural area. While on the topic of Bushcare, Council has launched an initiative aimed at connecting new parents with nature. Sessions are held on the third Monday of every month between 10am and 12 noon at Mt Colah community centre. Child minding has been made available while parents get to enjoy some introductory training to bush management.

Looking forward to activating many more strategies this year as we move from planning to implementation.

In response to the recent electrical storms and powerful winds, Hornsby SES received over 400 requests for assistance. Supported by local RFS brigades, SES teams were operational day and night, in difficult conditions, as they worked through tasks as quickly as possible.



Their main priorities were to ensure the safety of the public, restore power and essential services, and provide support to vulnerable community members, especially the elderly.

FOUR COMMON PLANTS THAT REPEL APHIDS FROM YOUR GARDEN

Aphids are a very common garden pest and can affect the health of many plants in the garden when an infestation occurs. Their sap-sucking tendencies can cause damage in various ways including distorting or destroying leaves, transferring disease from sucking, encourages the growth of mould and attracts ants from their excretion of honeydew.

While removing and killing aphids is an effective way to treat infected plants you could avoil this situation by using an aphid repellent. There are plants you can put in your garden to repel aphids naturally.

These plants either have repulsive aromas and scents, or they release chemicals that actively repel aphids and encourage them to relocate. So not only will they stay our of your garden beds, they're also likely to move their breeding and egg-laying to an alternative spot. The **Allium** family of plants are known for being active repeller's for many pests and unwanted animals, including snakes. Whether you choose garlic, leek,



chives, onions or even agapanthus, aphids will not enjoy any of their strong scents. If you choose quick growing chives, you can have the benefit of eating them. **Marigolds** and **Fragrant Herbs** are also a repellent. Plant the around veggies, flowers and shrubs prone to an aphid attach or are very sensitive to pest damage. Good Gardening.

Hidden in the Hills

TREE FERNS

The (Lacy) Tree Fern (Cyathea cooperi) is the more spectacular of these two related species - the other being (Rough) Tree Fern (Cyathea australis). Both prefer a moist, high humidity, well drained habitat with adequate protection from sunlight. which will ensure the fern's longevity as a spectacular feature plant.

The Lacy Tree Fern has a more slender trunk that displays distinctive raised "branch" ends where former fronds have died and broken away from the trunk. The Rough Tree Fern displays masses of hair-like



material around the entire trunk. Evidence of previous frond ends remain following the frond stem breaking away.

Propagation, although desirable, is not an easy task as these ferns do not produce any new plants from the roots or trunk. They can only be

reproduced by the function of germinating spore material, usually from different specimens. Both have a fairly extensive shallow, fibrous rhizome type of root system. These ferns can suffer under drought conditions and require a daily drink in these circumstances.

Both varieties share a similar distribution from the Central Queensland Coast to Southern Victoria. Cyathea australis is more prolific as it tolerates cooler climates better and is more likely to be found in mountain areas as well as in Tasmania. Both varieties can quickly reach a height in excess of 6m where habitat conditions are most favourable.

When walking along tracks that follow watercourses and passing by large ponds of still water, these majestic ferns growing along the water's edge are conspicuous as they create a somewhat impressive rainforestlike vista, particularly when the fronds are reflected on the still waters of the pond.


...and Happy New Year to everyone! Our regular activities have recommenced and church services continue at 10am on Sundays.

Bubsie comes to Galston Church

Have you ever wanted to pack your bags and travel around Australia? It's been a dream of mine for many years. And although Rhonda and I have visited every Australian city, and have lived in Perth, Melbourne, and now Sydney, there are many amazing places we still haven't seen. So it's on our bucket list. Maybe it's on yours too?

100 years ago when most outback roads were bull dust or loose gravel at best, a 22-year-old man by the name Nevill Westwood had such a dream. After discovering the undeniable accuracy of Bible prophecy, Nevill became an Adventist in 1921 at the age of 18. Later he enrolled in a Bible study course where he met Greg Davies who had the same aspirations.

In 1925 these two young men made the decision to visit the outback regions of Australia in a second-hand car that Nevill had bought; a trusty 1923 Citroen 5CV, known for its exceptional features and reliability. After naming the little car *Bubsie*,



Westwood and Davies left Perth on 4th August 1925 sharing their faith in God and the Bible throughout some of the most remote and hottest regions of Australia; places like Marble Bar which recorded 160 days over 37 degrees the year before.

In celebration of their exceptional feat, 'The Incredible Journey' team from NSW are retracing the steps of these two pioneering men who travelled almost 18,000Kms in 148 days. And while the original Bubsie, driven by Westwood and Davies, can be seen in the National Museum in Canberra, on **Tuesday 11th March**, a beautifully restored replica of Nevill's car will be on display at 'The Persimmon Place' (Waddell's Orchard) 375 Galston Road, Galston from 10am – 12pm; and then at Galston Adventist Church from 2pm – 5pm.

Please join us for this memorable event and discover what inspired Westwood and Davies to make such a dangerous, incredible journey.
