Close Call for Berowra

This election delivered a big surprise nationally, but also in Berowra. Berowra has always been considered a safe liberal seat, but with the results of this election showing a swing of -6% against the Liberal party, the difference between Liberal and Labour in Berowra (after preference count) was only 3,634 votes. This followed the 2022 election results which also showed a swing against the Liberal Party of -5.88%. But that result showed a difference between Liberal and Labour (after preferences) of 18,236 votes.

Whilst first preference votes clearly showed Julian Leeser (Liberal) received the highest percentage of votes, once preferences were counted, the end result was quite a close call. So it was a combination of votes for Ben Koshinski (Labour), Martin Cousins (the Greens) and Tina Brown (Independent) which delivered such a close result. It's worth noting that the biggest swing towards any candidate was Tina Brown at 11.53%.



Here are the results from our local polling stations, they are quite a mixed bag with Wisemans Ferry recording a swing of 9% against the Liberal party and Glenorie Hillside showing a swing towards the Liberals party of 0.07%.



Overall a few areas in the Berowra electorate are worth mentioning. Rogans Hill recorded a swing of 11.84% towards the Liberals, Glenorie Hillside showed 0.07% towards the Liberals whereas Castle Hill North, Epping Area (several polling stations), Hornsby East, Hornsby West, Macquarie Park, Marsfield North, Mt Kuring-gai, Rogans Hill North and Waitara showed swings against the Liberals of over 10%. The Highest swing against the Liberals was Macquarie Park at 18.22%



Solar Battery Rebates -Virtual Power Plants

Data provided by the Australian PV Institute shows that NSW was producing 790,718 Mwh of solar power output each month. The attached graph shows the solar installations in postcodes 2157, 2158 and 2159 since 2007. Glenorie has installed 6MW, Dural just over 11MW and Galston/Arcadia around 7MW. If you compare our low residential dwelling numbers to the densely populated new release areas of 2765, they have installed over 110MW.



From the 1st July the Government has introduced a new Solar Battery Rebate Scheme, which will provide up to 30% rebate. These are the details which are known to date (source: https://www.solarquotes. com.au/battery-storage/federal-rebate)


WHICH BATTERIES WILL BE ELIGIBLE?

Batteries will need to meet some requirements:

- The batteries will need to have been approved by the Clean Energy Council and installers must have appropriate battery installation accreditation.
- The minimum amount of usable capacity covered under the scheme is expected to be 5 kWh.
- The maximum amount of usable capacity is expected to be 50 kWh – but you can install systems up to 100 kWh and still receive the rebate for a 50kWh system.
- Solar batteries must be capable of connecting to a Virtual Power Plant (VPP), but there's not expected to be any requirement to join a VPP.

SO WHAT IS A VPP?

A number of electricity retailers already provide VPP schemes. This permits them to draw the power stored in your home battery to power the grid in times of high demand. They will pay you a higher price for the power they draw during peak times. There should be safeguards in the scheme that leave enough power stored in your battery for you to use in your home during the evening/early morning. Households that can afford to install a larger battery than their own needs, can therefore take advantage of selling the power back to the grid during peak demand. The cost benefit of these options need to be calculated by the householder based on the VPP scheme being offered.



The choice of battery storage systems has increased more recently. Many are now easily expandable, can provide backup in outages and come EV ready. Look out for other options like V2H (Vehicle-to-Home) and V2G (Vehicle-to-Grid) capabilities, these will offer further possibilities of storing power and selling excess back to the grid when prices are high.

Most solar and battery systems now provide online monitoring via a smartphone app, which enables the household to plan the timing of power usage. As they say, knowledge is power and changing routines of power usage can also help you save more money.

Hills-Hornsby Rural Koala Project (HHRKP)

Hills-Hornsby Rural Koala Project (HHRKP) is a volunteer run group working with community to monitor and investigate koala presence in our area, particularly in the Glenorie, Maroota and Wisemans areas.

HHRKP was established in 2018, and is a sub group of Cattai Hills Environment Network. The group came thogether after some sightings indicated that koalas may be returning to the area after the 2002 fires. At the time it was not known whether koalas still existed in the Hills and Hornsby areas as they had done historically. HHRKP wanted to establish whether we have a breeding population as we did prior to the 2002 fires and to investigate population density and distribution.

Since 2018 HHRKP has worked with community, building a map of koala sightings, reported by community members. Today the map includes 32 verified sightings and calls heard from recent years, which includes at least 3 females - 2 by call recording in different areas and times and 1 with testing of scat which showed her to be disease free!! There are also more than 53 anecdotal (non verified) sighting reports

The group was lucky enough to have the opportunity to collaborate with Wildseek in 2024, to conduct some thermal drone work, searching for thermal heat signatures. Wildseek is a Wires, Landcare Australia and Queensland University of Technology partnership. Koalas were detected in 4 out of 5 sites flown over by Wildseek.

At this stage all evidence points towards a low density permanent population of koalas in the Hills-Hornsby rural areas, with more work being done to better understand distribution and population density of the population.

HHRKP believes that understanding more about distribution and population density can be used to help protect koalas from accidents, dog attacks, habitat loss and bush fire.

The group also hopes that the koala can be used as a flagship species to advocate for conservation of the bushland, which will protect all the other critically important flora and fauna in the region.

HHRKP wants to get our local koala population recognised by NSW Koala Strategy, which currently does not list Hills Hornsby or Hawkesbury as koala regions at all.

Koalas use various local trees for feeding including Grey gum (E.punctata) Swamp mahogany (E.robusta), Red ironbark (E.fibrosa), Blackbutt (E.pilularis), Mountain blue gum (E.deanei) and Yellow bloodwood (C.eximia) to name a few. They have also been known to use some types of Angophora & Melaleuca

In addition to koala work, HHRKP is collecting data on local wildlife using song meters, cameras and observations in the bush in order to upload this information onto Bionet. We are in such an ecologically important and biodiverse bushland which endangered and threatened species depend on, and that seems to be under recognised. Getting the data onto Bionet is an important step toward having this recognised.

Some examples of the incredible biodiversity of our area, particularly Maroota Forest, include greater gliders, yellow bellied gliders, healthy wombats, pygmy possums, gang gang cockatoos, powerful owls, extensive wetland bird life and much more.





OOD SERVICES

ROAD RAGE

A road rage incident occurred in Cherrybrook involving a dark grey BMW X5 and a white Volkswagen Golf. Both vehicles were going southward on County Drive, approaching the right turn lane onto Woodgrove Avenue.

A female driver claims that the 42-year-old male driver began yelling and displaying road rage. In response, she started recording him as he got out of his vehicle.

As she started to drive off, the man followed on foot, leaned into her car through the front passenger window, and asked for her phone. It is claimed that he then took her car keys, which the woman recorded.

The male driver got back to his car with the keys, and the female driver tried to take them, resulting in a fight. A witness saw what happened, filmed the incident, and called for emergency help.

The male driver drove to Castle Hill Police Station, where he handed over the woman's car keys, and was subsequently arrested and charged with assault and stealing.

The matter is now before Parramatta Local Court on the 18th June 2025.

WALK SAFELY

On Friday, May 16th, Kuring Gai Highway Patrol officers visited Asquith, Galston, and Brooklyn Public Schools for Walk Safely to School Day.

The officers chatted with students and parents on their way to school and held talks to answer questions from som

to answer questions from some lucky kids.

The event was a key part of National Road Safety Week, which focuses on raising awareness about road safety across the country.

DRINK DRIVING

A driver, a 52-year-old male, allegedly returned a positive roadside test during a random breath test by the Hills PAC on the early morning of 12th May.

The test was conducted at the intersection of Old Northern Road and Garemyn Road, Middle Dural. The driver of a white Maserati was arrested and transferred to Castle Hill Police Station. He returned a blood alcohol reading of 0.095.

The driver was supposed to have an alcohol interlock device fitted to the vehicle, but did not.

Thus, he was issued a Court Attendance Notice for mid-range PCA and no interlock to appear in Parramatta Local Court next month, and his licence was also suspended on the spot.

BREAK & ENTER

Police charged two men after an aggravated break and enter at a self-storage facility at Carrington Road, Castle Hill, on 16th May.

At around 2:24 am, the two men allegedly gained unauthorised access to the facility. They entered the area through a fire door and forced entry into a storage unit. The site manager saw suspicious activity on the CCTV and alerted the police, who then found and arrested the men nearby after several boxes were taken away.

Two men, aged 24 and 26, were caught with a broken padlock and face masks that matched the CCTV images. One was released under strict bail conditions, while the other is still in custody after being denied bail.

Police are still looking into the seized items, which include a significant number of vapes and tobacco products.

MARCH FOR CHANGE

Traffic and Highway Patrol Command and the Hills Police Area Command marched alongside community members at this year's Hills March for Change.

The march highlights the community's commitment towards ending domestic violence. Police and residents marched on the morning of May, starting at Castle Place, Castle Hill, and ending at the Castle Hill RSL Club.



Founder and Co-coordinator Bryan Mullans said the March for Change lets the victims of domestic or gender-based violence be aware the community is behind their backs.

"It encourages them to act in their own interests to break the cycle of violence knowing that they are not alone and that there are people who care and want to help." He said that according to the Hills Police Area Command, it can take up to 26 incidents before a victim makes a report.

Detective Inspector Chris Laird said the Hills PAC have received 379 reported cases of domestic violence in the past 12 months (an increase of 11.5% from last year). Still, The Hills has the lowest rate of repeat Domestic Violence victims.

FALLEN TREE

NSW SES responded to two calls in Castle Hill wherein tree limbs had fallen.

The first limb fell, blocking the road access, which was eventually restored. About two hours later, a second one fell in the direction of the house, which barely missed it, but blocked the drivenue and except



but blocked the driveway and access to the house.

As the first two limbs affected the tree structure, the remainder of the tree was declared dangerous and required an arborist on the scene. The road was cordoned off in case the tree fell before the arborist's arrival.

A bat was also found hanging in the fallen branches, and WIRES came to collect and care for the animal.

THE GLENORIE SHORE FAMILY STORY 1909-2025 PART 2

High School Education was another story. No Local High Schools. Brother Les appeared destined to take over the Carrying Business except for the intervention by the Principal of Westmead who convinced our parents Les's results (Dux of the School) entitled him to a higher education. Dad chose Sydney Tech High which made Les the first from this area to journey of some 3 hours each way to a full High School, depending on bus and train connections.

The rest of the family, chasing an education, rode bikes or walked two miles along a gravel road (Cattai Rd) in all weathers, with our suitcases strapped on our backs to the bus stop. Caught the bus to the train station, boarded, then changed trains as necessary and finally walked to the High School.

Sport was another high priority of the Shore Family. Dad put a concrete cricket pitch in the middle of our horse paddock. We played





whenever there was some spare time. He also built a Tennis Court, and we entered in the local Tennis Competition as "Coronation" (1953).

After WW 2 Dad rallied the locals to a meeting which reignited the Glenorie Cricket Club. As President and brother, Les, Assistant Secretary, many letters went to the BHSC requesting land for a Cricket/Sports Ground at Glenorie in their Shire. Eventually a block of land was allocated for a sports field.

Dad, with the Blacks, the Beards and other notable locals, using their trucks,

tractors, farm machinery, shovels, hoes and rakes, completed the heavy work. Council finished it. Glenorie Oval was born. (Now named the "Les Shore Oval" in honour of his years of commitment to its development.) The ground was officially opened in1958 by Neil Marks.

After High School Les entered Wagga Teachers College. After graduating he excelled in his profession and was appointed as the youngest 1st Class Primary School Principal in our state. After our father passed away in 1961, Les returned to Glenorie to care for Mum, turn his hand at farming and ran successfully for The Hills Shire Council where he spent much of his life committed to public service. Forty years on Local Council (3 of those years as Mayor) Les achieved many successes too numerous to mention here like tarring the sometimes dusty, sometimes muddy, but always rough, remaining kilometres of Cattai Ridge Road leading to Maraylya. He also was instrumental in having land at the end of Dilkera Av. set aside for the Glenorie Pony Club. Les was also involved in a myriad of committees throughout the area.

As a Public Servant, he retired as Principal of Castle Hill Primary School (coincidently the school he enrolled at as a kindy kid). In his honour the road to the school was named Les Shore Place.

When the boys asked me to talk today on behalf of us, I just didn't know where to start. How do you fit a lifetime of memories into a few short words? It seems like an impossible task.

When we went to sign the paperwork, I said "I think this is the wrong paperwork. This paperwork says that we're going to be married in the Reorganised Church of Latter-Day Saints". The celebrant said, "That's correct – did I not mention that I'm actually a Mormon minister?"

So... yes - our wedding certificate does say that we were married in the Reorganised Church of Latter Day Saints.

I thought I'd share some of the words that we wrote together for our wedding service as I think it will speak for both Rewi and I on some of the sentiments we feel today.


"Love unites, love lets us forgive, it eliminates our differences, our prejudices, our worries and our sorrow.

By far the greatest experience we've shared together has been raising our 3 beautiful boys – Maui, Tama and Kai. Sometimes it's crazy and loud – imagine a house where you have someone on an electric guitar, one or two on saxophones, another on drums, maybe someone singing – and they're all singing and playing different songs! Never a dull moment – and certainly never a quiet one in our home! But we've certainly shared lots of laughter and we wouldn't trade a second of our time together as a family for anything! Rewi was a wonderful Dad to the boys and would always show up for them in everything they would do. Maui was lucky enough to have had the opportunity to perform with Rewi over the last couple of years and I could see how very proud Rewi was of all of his sons. Rewi also shared his Maori culture with the boys and I – something he was very proud to do. The boys and I will continue to honour this connection and ensure this lives on through them.

There is no doubt that the lives of the boys and I have been changed for ever. He's left a big hole in our hearts but we will love him forever and ensure his memory lives on through us.

As this is Rewi's day, we're going to give Rewi the final word on behalf of our family. In January, we were writing notes about what we are grateful for so that we could look back on them at the end of the year. I'm going to share one of Rewi's notes with you:

"I am grateful that I was gifted a voice that allows me to sing. If it wasn't for this I wouldn't have met the most special woman in the world to me – my wife and the mother to our three beautiful boys Maui, Tama and Kai. I am grateful to be able to enjoy going to the beach with my family. I am grateful that we get to spend time together at the beach house at Elizabeth Beach and to create lifelong memories of happiness as a family. I am grateful for my health and my ability to be able to share this happy time with my family. I am grateful most of all that Jackie came into my life at The Marble Bar so many years ago and we have built a life and family together".

We may be saying goodbye to Rewi today, but we will never say goodbye to his memory.

The well-recognised art prize promotes and celebrates Australian contemporary art. Artists are invited to submit works in the categories of painting, drawing, printmaking, photography and sculpture. This year, the total prize money is \$23,000, with the major prize worth \$10,000.

Hornsby Shire Mayor Warren Waddell highlighted the significant role the art prize plays in enriching both Hornsby Shire's cultural landscape and the wider arts and cultural scene.

"The Hornsby Art Prize provides our residents with a fantastic opportunity to experience contemporary art of the highest calibre in our own local area," Mayor Waddell said. "It also offers our own local artists the chance to have their work thrust into the national spotlight. I encourage any artist who is considering entering to submit their artworks and be a part of this fantastic event."

Western Sydney's Dave Snook took out top honours at last year's Hornsby Art Prize, with his winning painting, *Labour Plein Air*, with local resident David Collins from Dangar Island taking home the Hornsby Shire Local Artist Award.

Entries to this year's Hornsby Art Prize are open until **Thursday 7th August** and are to be made online. Entry costs \$40. All artworks must have been produced in the past two years, and not exhibited before in an art prize.

The non-acquisitive prize, organised and sponsored by Hornsby Shire Council and delivered in partnership with Hornsby Art Society, is open to all Australian residents aged 18 years and over.

The Hornsby Art Prize Finalists' Exhibition will be held at Wallarobba Arts and Cultural Centre from 12th September until 28th September 2025, Tuesday – Sunday, 10am – 4pm. Entry is free. The exhibition is selected and adjudicated by an appointed panel of two judges.



MUSHROOMS IN THE LAWN - A GARDENER'S PERSPECTIVE

For many gardeners, the sudden appearance of mushrooms in the lawn can be puzzling or even frustrating. However, mushrooms are actually a sign that your soil is alive and functioning well. These fungi emerge from underground networks called mycelium, which feed on organic material such as old tree roots, decomposing mulch, or lawn thatch. Their presence often indicates rich, well-aerated soil with good microbial activity.

Mushrooms tend to appear after periods of rain or heavy watering, especially in shaded or damp areas. While they don't harm the grass directly, they may signal issues like poor drainage or excessive thatch. Understanding the conditions that favor mushroom growth can help

gardeners take a proactive approach. Compacted soil, dense shade, and overwatering are common contributors. Aeration helps loosen compacted soil, allowing air and water to reach grass roots more effectively. Trimming low-hanging branches to allow more sunlight onto the lawn can also discourage fungal growth.

It's important to note that while lawn mushrooms are mostly harmless, some species can be toxic if indested by pets or children. Gardeners should remove unfamiliar mushrooms promptly and teach children not to touch or eat them. If you're curious about the types of

fungi appearing in your garden, consider consulting a local extension service or fungal identification group for safe identification. Ultimately, mushrooms are a natural part of the lawn ecosystem. They break down organic material and return nutrients to the soil, which benefits your lawn in the long term. Rather than treating them as a problem, think of mushrooms as indicators of underlying soil health

and an opportunity to refine your lawn care practices.

Hidden in the Hills

BUSHLAND PHOTOGRAPHY

Whilst reading this magazine, it is almost certain that the reader has realised that there exists an extensive range of opportunities to capture memorable images of the local region's bushland environment using their camera. Whether a professional or part time photographer, there is often disappointment when something unusual is missed because of leaving the camera at home.

The type and style of camera is up to each individual. It can range from a simple "point and shoot" compact camera, through the many models of smart phones, all the way to the more complex DSLR (Digital Single Lens Reflex) cameras often associated with the more serious photographer.

Being aware of the capabilities of your camera can often govern the success of the result. With subjects such as tiny insects and small flowers, it is better not to get too close due to the focal length of the camera's lens. An out of focus image can be the result. It is better to stand back a little then zoom in until the subject fills the viewfinder window. Confidence in using the macro function to show the finer detail when in a close-up situation will be most rewarding.

Flowers, trees, rocks, watercourses, fungi, birds, reptiles, animals, and insects can all present the photographer with a noteworthy, even unusual opportunity to record something which is unique to that occasion.

Transferring images from the camera to a computer allows for an almost inexhaustible set of processing tools that permit many enhancements to be applied to the original image.

Spreading the Word of God ==

The stoning and death of Stephen (*Acts 8:1-8*) was only the beginning of persecution for the very early church. Many more members were thrown into jail (v.3). We are not told what happened to these Christians. Some of them may have died for Christ too.

Most of the church members were driven out of Jerusalem BUT everywhere they went, they preached about Jesus Christ. God used this 'scattering' to bring about his plan for men and women everywhere to hear his word. Sometimes we don't like what God allows to happen but he can use it for his glory if we will let him.


Verse 5 tells us where another of the deacons went. Phillip went down to Samaria and preached Christ to the Samaritans. Wasn't that wonderful? John 4:9 says that the Jews have no dealings with the Samaritans, but Phillip was more than just a Jew. He was a Christian Jew and that made the difference.

God could see that Philip had a heart of love for lost men and women and so he sent him down to the Samaritans. Philip may not have been the personality that Stephen was, but he simply presented Christ to them as the one who could meet their need and the people warmly responded.

Are there people around you who have special needs? Are there people for whom nobody else cares? Can you look at those people through the eyes of Jesus Christ and see them as souls who need a Saviour? Could you go to them with love and help them? Could you tell them of Jesus Christ and his power to save? God is waiting to use you just where you are or he may lead you to another place of service. But he will always want you to do the same thing Philip did. Go to people in need and tell them of Christ. Could you ask him to lead you to some soul today?

This month's big question... What Does "God Loves You" Really Mean?

What do WE mean when we use the word 'love'?

What does GOD really mean when He declares 'I love you', in John 3:16. "For I (God) so loved you (the world) that I gave My only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him will not perish but have eternal life."

Our English language doesn't really help because we have one word for love and use it in so many different contexts. We apply the word to our friends, our favourite restaurant or singer or writer, our dog and our family!!! We inherently know that each of these isn't the same kind of love and that each of them has different levels of importance but how can we clarify the word 'love' when it is expressed by God??

I'm very relieved that God isn't a god of confusion and thankfully, the Bible takes advantage of the Greek language with its four words for 'love.' Agape, Phileo, Storge, Eros!

** Let's start with the highest, greatest and most pure form of love which describes God's love for you and me = AGAPE. This love represents immeasurable, unconditional, selfless and sacrificial love, which is the very word God used to describe how much He loves you and me in John 3:16, my opening verse. He also explains in the same verse, the reason why we need His love - "that whoever BELIEVES IN HIM (Jesus Christ) will not perish but have eternal life." ** PHILEO love describes friendship or brotherly love, when we share common interests, experiences and values with others.

** STORGE love describes natural affection and loyalty in family relationships.

** EROS love describes romantic, passionate love.

*** It's worth noting that these four types of love aren't necessarily mutually exclusive. For example, Jesus expressed Phileo love when He walked with His disciples and Storge love with His earthly family.



In this world people fall in and out of love and change their minds like the wind changes direction, but God's agape love is not like that; it's not wavering or dependent upon our actions or circumstances.

God made the first move and He doesn't change His mind about us. His love never fails. His agape love for you and me and all humanity is unmerited, steadfast and enduring!

We don't deserve God's love but He gave it willingly for you and me.

I hope you can take some time to reflect on this and on the following three quotes:

** "Though our feelings come and go, God's love for us does not." C.S. Lewis

** "No matter what storm you face, you need to know that God loves you. He has not abandoned you." Franklin Graham.

** "God proved His love on the Cross. When Christ hung and bled and died, it was God saying I LOVE YOU." Billy Graham.

The Bible continues: After Jesus rose from the dead early on Sunday morning, the first person who saw Him was Mary Magdalene... afterward He appeared in a different form to two of His followers who were walking from Jerusalem into the country... still later He appeared to the eleven disciples as they were eating... When the Lord had finished talking with them, He was taken up into heaven and sat down at the place of honour at God's Right Hand." (Mark 16: 9-20).






