For distinguished service as a member of an Australian fire service.

Mr Andrew Cameron joined the Elouera Brigade in 1980 and helped re-establish the Hornsby Brigade in 1989 as the senior deputy captain and captain for 12 years before his appointment as the group officer in 2002.

Mr Cameron has led strike teams across NSW and interstate, including the 2003 Canberra and 2019-20 Black Summer bush fires, where he demonstrated high-level leadership skills, directing strike teams in very dangerous and testing environments at the Gospers Mountain, Green Wattle Creek and Currowan fires.

Mr Cameron is a member of the Greater Sydney Command Leadership Group and has been chair of the District Bush Fire Management Committee for a decade, leading this cross-agency group in the planning of hazard reduction and mitigation works for the whole of the Hornsby Ku-ring-gai District. He has worked tirelessly over the past 15 years providing leadership, guidance and mentoring to brigades across the district in the preparation and conduct of hazard reduction and risk mitigation activities.

Mr Cameron is dedicated to training and developing crew leaders within the district, committing many years as part of the Crew Leader Training and Assessment Team. He is also engaged in developing future group leaders across the Greater Sydney area, where he provides training in ethics and accountability.

Assisting members who have suffered as the result of critical incidents has been an area in which Mr Cameron has demonstrated both compassion and skill. He has been instrumental in providing personal support as well as advocating for members impacted by critical incidents to receive appropriate ongoing support.

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Hawkesbury River Monster

There have been reports are far back as the ancient art of the Dharuk tribal Aborigines of New South Wales of a mysterious water monster. Legend calls them Mirreeulla ("giant water serpent"). The Hawkesbury River has produced reports of large reptilian or eel-like animals since at least as far back as 1924. There have also been sightings of this creature in the last decade. Sightings of the creatures have been reported from Wisemans Ferry at the western end of the river, eastward to the Broken Bay-Brisbane Waters expanse at the river's mouth.

SIGHTINGS

A popular story regarding this creature came to light in the 1980s. There was a report by a fisherman in a small aluminum boat that a sea creature surfaced below their boat. catapulting their vessel out of the water and through the air over 3 meters (9.8 feet). Other reports included boats found adrift with their occupants nowhere to be found and boats found smashed or overturned.



Tony Healy has among his files a 1912 story from the Evening News, Sydney, called "Was it the bunyip?" "That concerns an alligator-like creature seen in South Creek, a tributary of the Hawkesbury River in Windsor," he said. "[The creature] was seen by a boating party. A strange object swimming a short distance from them, about four-feet in length and resembled an alligator. There have been reports of them a hell of a lot bigger than that. I haven't been able to establish to my satisfaction that the reports of the bigger ones are genuine. But they may well be."

Another report that sparked Healy's interest was one published in the Windsor and Richmond Gazette in 1924. "People were talking about seeing a 'titanic seahorse', and there's a specific eyewitness report by a WJ Riley, who along with his brother, saw this thing while walking along The Terrace [Windsor] at midday. They saw something in the river beneath in a deep hole," Healy said. "He said, 'We saw a big ugly thing, 2 foot 6 inches to 3 foot in depth, with a length of about 5 to 6 feet, and of a yellowish or sandy color. Whether its skin was scale-covered or not, we could not see. We watched for 15 minutes. It had a squarelooking fish tail. It was not a pleasant looking animal. I should certainly not care to be in the water and have it after me."



DESCRIPTION

It is depicted in cave art as having a snake-like head, long neck, large body and two sets of flippers with an eel-like tail. There have been reports of strange slide marks, similar to that of a crocodile along the banks of the river.

EXPLANATIONS

Descriptions are very similar to the plesiosaur, a common theme among similar freshwater cryptids. There are reports of larger turtles, the occasional seal and dolphin, along with reports of sharks inhabiting the Hawkesbury River as well.

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
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Exploring the World of Hypnotherapy

Hypnotherapy has long intrigued people seeking alternative paths to self-improvement, healing, and personal growth. Rooted in the profound ability of the human mind to influence behaviour. thoughts, and emotions, it is a practice that combines relaxation techniques with focused attention to achieve remarkable cognitive and emotional outcomes which are otherwise unable to be achieved by self-will or self-control alone.

I recently attended my first ever session with local Clinical Hypnotherapist, James Ryan, at his home practice in Dural, in the hope of relinquishing a long held unhealthy habit.

To say I was anxious is an understatement, but I put my fears aside and decided to just go with the process – for better or worse. The experience was comfortable, and James put me at ease with his gentle and calm demeanour as he explained step by step what I could expect. The 'going under' part was not why I had anticipated as I was cognisant the entire time and it felt more like that half-awake/half asleep dreamy feeling you can get first thing on rousing from a deep slumber.

After our session I asked James whether he would agree to being interviewed at a later date, as I found the whole experience quite fascinating and could see how helpful this modality could be to the wider community. Luckily, he obliged!

HOW DID YOU GET INTO THE FIELD OF HYPNOTHERAPY?

I have always been interested in how our minds work and some people seem to go through life relaxed and happy, while others seem to struggle and are always anxious. I learned that, 'what you think about you become, so in 2006 I enrolled in a course of Hypnotherapy, and began treating friends and family for guit smoking, weight-loss and anxiety before joining a super clinic in Sydney's western suburbs.

WHAT SORT OF SKILL SETS DOES A CLINICAL HYPNOTHERAPIST NEED?

To be an effective hypnotherapist you need to be able to listen to your client and understand the story that they tell themselves. In this way you can create awareness in them of the underlying issue that causes them to smoke, worry or over-eat. Building rapport and having empathy for the client is also very important.

WHAT ARE THE BIGGEST CHALLENGES IN YOUR LINE OF WORK?

Fear. Past clients have told me they wish they had seen me sooner. but fear of what might happen kept them away. Once they have experienced the relaxed focused state of hypnosis called trance they usually book a second session to experience that same state again. The other challenge is that Medicare does not give rebates for hypnotherapy and not all private health funds recognise hypnotherapy, but that is slowly changing which is good news.

WHAT ARE THE BEST REWARDS?

The rewards of being a hypnotherapist are when a client walks into your clinic, stressed, upset and teary and leaving the session feeling relaxed, calm and uplifted, there is no greater feeling witnessing this kind of transformation, and it happens often. Also speaking to past clients that were smokers that have guit the habit and have reduced their medications because of their improved health. This is why I do what I do, I am inspired by the power of the mind to create lasting change.

ARE YOU FINDING THAT MAINSTREAM MEDICINE IS EMBRACING HYPNOTHERAPY AS AN ADDED OR ALTERNATIVE TREATMENT FOR PATIENTS WHO NEED HELP IN OVERCOMING MENTAL HEALTH ISSUES AND **ADDICTIONS?**

I currently work part-time at a clinic in the western suburbs of Sydney and the doctors of the clinic are very receptive to hypnotherapy for

treating mental health issues and addictions such as smoking / vaping, drugs and


alcohol. Most addictions are due to some sort of trauma that has happened in the past and created an emotional hole that the addiction is trying to fill. I have a process that I use that is called the De Trauma technique that removes the trauma or reduces it, and this assists with helping the addict guit for good, as the reason to continue is removed. I have had many referrals from doctors, and I work in

collaboration with them for the best outcomes for the client.

WHAT WOULD BE YOUR ADVICE TO ANYBODY OUT THERE WHO IS INTERESTED IN ENTERING THIS FIELD OF THERAPY?

Do your research, read about hypnotherapy and the amazing things that are happening right now. Join a training organisation and get qualifications. Join an association as this ensures you are properly supervised and receive regular training and are keeping up with current information. Watch YouTube clips as some are very educational. Book a session of hypnotherapy so you can experience it from the client's perspective and know what it feels like to go into a deep state of relaxed focus. Just go for it, the world needs more healers in mental health.


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Dural Cub-Scouts scouts

Netherby's Winter Garden

The stars of the winter garden in Netherby are all the wonderful old camellias. As the roses close down in the cold, the buds on camellias open. From the beginning of autumn and throughout winter many different varieties of camellias have their season to flower.

The camellia sasanquas, which enjoy sunshine as well as shade, are the first in bloom. These are the ones which cover the pavement below with fallen blossoms. However as winter begins, they are nearly finished, and shade loving camellia japonicas are taking over the display. The best way to see and enjoy their flowers is to take a walk across the lawn in front of the house, down to the woodland garden. Here a multitude of camellia japonicas grow, their blossoms glowing in deep pinks, reds and pristine white.

There are no camellias native to Australia, but they have been here for almost 200 years. In 1831 a shipment of camellias arrived in Sydney for William Macarthur. At Camden Park Macarthur began raising ornamental plants, fruit trees and vines, and established a nursery to distribute his plants throughout the colony. One of the camellias was particularly successful in providing seedlings — Camellia Anemoniflora. A specimen survives in Camden Park to this day.

At Netherby we are fortunate to have one of these very old types of camellias, known to us as the Waratah camellia, because the flowers look so similar to the native Waratah.

Our Waratah camellia is very easy to find. It grows on the eastern side of the house, a large well-established shrub, loving the morning sun, sheltered by the verandah.



Just nearby on the verandah there's a comfortable wooden bench seat, just the spot to rest for a moment or two, to enjoy the flowers, the peace, and a link with the past

THE GLENORIE SHORE FAMILY STORY 1909-2025 PART 3

Brother, Colin opened the path for me (Stan) to Homebush Boys High School and then Bathurst Teachers College from where we both graduated as Primary School Teachers. Here I met my wife of 65 years, Judy Robins.

Colin's first appointment was Barmedman. He married, had two lovely daughters, Genieve and Rowena, both teachers themselves today. Colin furthered his education graduating with a BA degree. After spending his later years as a High School Principal, he retired to The Entrance. Colin still has fond memories of his many years growing up in Glenorie. He especially enjoyed exploring the gullies and finding waratahs, etc.

My first appointment was to Batar in1958, a one-teacher school about 4 miles S W of Kendall. Some challenge! 13 students from Kindy to Y7. (A story for another day.) I married in1959 and my wife, Judy and I were transferred to Kendal District Rural School on the mid-North Coast where we spent 6 years.

After starting a family and playing cricket, we moved back to Glenorie where we built a house in Post Office Rd (1966). I continued teaching, playing cricket and helping Judy to raise our family: Andrew, Stephen and Rachel. The three children completed their Primary School education at Glenorie. Andrew, our eldest, was included among the first intake of Galston H. S., which was billeted at Baulkham Hills H.S. until the buildings at Galston were completed. At last, a Local High School!

Judy returned to teaching at Middle Dural P.S. and loved every minute of it. While there she continued with her hobbies, breeding Arabian Horses, Pony Club (Foundation Member), Endurance riding and playing cards. This rubbed off on our daughter, Rachel and they both successfully completed several Tom Quilty and Shahzada Endurance Rides. The boys followed me with their hand-eye co-ordination sports and represented Glenorie at the highest level in Cricket and Hockey. I was honoured to have Life Membership bestowed on me by the Glenorie C.C, and my most treasured memory is Captaining the very first Glenorie A Grade Side to win the Shield in the 1971-72 Season.

In 1978 we moved from PO Rd to Schwebel Lane, where, while still teaching I turned back to my roots and started farming summer fruits and raising show ducks, while Judy's Horse Stud blossomed.

Andrew qualified as an engineer. Worked for Hills SC. Left and started a Carrying Business like his grandfather but later requalified as a computer programmer, moved to Queensland where he lives and works today. Stephen started in the bank. Then tried the building game. Married Margot. Bought a property at S Maroota, built his own house and started farming. He later changed to Fencing and set up his own Property Maintenance Business.



My young brother, Harold, is an enigma. He did not follow the path set but made his own track as a qualified auto mechanic out of the Rocky Service Station and in 1960 set up a garage on the block of ground, Cr O.N. Road and Whites Rd. He married Lesley Best and together they built a house at the beginning of P. O. Rd, 1965.

Challenges came thick and fast and so with TOTALS help he opened a Service Station, Tractor Agency and major fuel outlet, delivering petrol, diesel and oils to local farmers. This encouraged the local fruit, vegetable and flower growers. With the petrol shortage and the rationing that followed, demand increased and as such the business grew with outlets at Windsor (Esso), St Marys (Golden Fleece) Waitara and Avalon. With this growth Harold required more office space, so he purchased Beard's place next door to accommodate his office staff.

During this period Harold and Lesley took their family to acreage in Halcrows Rd, where, while raising their family of four; Christine,



James, Sandra and Bryan, they took a fancy to raising cattle, starting with a few Herefords In 1995 the business had slowed so Harold and Leslev decided to leave it in the hands of Ampol and move from Glenorie to a property known as "The Elms" at West Gilmore just south of Tumut. Bryan went along with

them while the two girls, Christine and Sandra had married and James who married Charlene stayed behind in Cattai Ridge Road to build his family with Charlene and his company J. A. SHORE EARTHWORKS.

Finally, our surviving sister, Esme, among other things, loved dancing and still does. As a youngster she performed on stage much to the family's delight. She was also an A Grade tennis player winning several trophies. Es, as we call her, attended Business College and honed her skills at home before working out. In 1959) she married Richard Vale a wonderful gentleman and cricketer. They had two boys, Peter, a professor in heart analysis, based at the Mater Hospital Nth Sydney, and Paul a very successful Landscaper, based at Annangrove.

Esme lost her husband, Richard to cancer too early but has battled, raising the boys and growing stone fruit on a five acre block she inherited when the Shore Estate was sub-divided in the late seventies. The road to the subdivision is named after Mum's initials "ESS" and "GLEN" ORIE. Yes, GLENESS PLACE. Esme remarried recently to Robert (Bob) Saunders but still lives at Gleness Place, Glenorie.

Yes, the SHORES have witnessed Glenorie grow from a one General Store, with horse drawn vehicles on dirt tracks or gravel roads, no Doctor or Dentist, to today's thriving village, It still has an easy-going country atmosphere but for The Old Northern Rd traffic thundering through! Reminds one of Pitt St, Sydney!



SPEEDING

A man with a suspended licence is expected to appear in court after he was caught speeding in Glenorie on Thursday morning.

At approximately 9:20 am on 19th June, Hills Highway Patrol officers were conducting speed enforcement duties along Cattai Ridge Road when they detected a white Toyota Land Cruiser travelling at 83 in a 60 km/h zone.

Inquiries confirmed his NSW licence had been suspended following a separate offence on 19th April, in which he was allegedly clocked at more than 45 km/h over the limit on Old Northern Road in Dural.

Despite the suspension, the driver was again found behind the wheel and allegedly exceeding the speed limit. A roadside breath test returned a negative reading.

He will face court for driving while suspended and for speeding. Police said the incident highlighted a disregard for road safety and licence conditions.

The presentation acknowledged the ongoing work by local police to assist and protect vulnerable individuals through dedicated engagement and support initiatives.

ERRATIC DRIVING

An 18-year-old male has been charged with mid-range drink driving after being stopped for erratic driving in Kellyville during the early hours of 19th June.

At around 3:30am, Hills Police observed a vehicle swerving across lanes on Samantha Riley Drive. The driver turned onto Glenhaven Road and then Bannerman Road, where police activated their lights and stopped the vehicle.

The driver underwent a roadside breath test, which returned a positive result. He was arrested and taken to Castle Hill Police Station, where a breath analysis recorded a mid-range reading of 0.083.

Further checks revealed that the vehicle had previously been issued with a Major Defect Notice (Red Label) and was not permitted to be driven after 5:35pm on 18th June.

The driver's licence was immediately suspended. He has been issued a Court Attendance Notice and the matter is now before the court.

APPLE PAY PRANK

People are being warned about an "ApplePay pranks" following a violent confrontation in Castle Hill on Thursday, 5th June.

Police were called after a 17-year-old male approached an older man pretending to receive money via Apple Pay by holding his phone near the older man and playing a beeping sound. The teenager was detained by the older man and escorted to Castle Hill Police Station.

The trend misleadingly implies that money is being transferred between phones by playing a sound similar to a digital transaction.

Police say while the videos may seem like harmless fun, these pranks may escalate into dangerous situations as they can cause confusion and may even create fear and aggression among people, especially those who are unaware of what's happening.

"We remind everyone that filming strangers without consent and engaging in conduct that causes alarm or distress can have legal consequences," The Hills Police said.

If you witness or experience similar behaviour, please report it to your local police station or call Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000.

ROAD RAGE

The Hills Police is appealing for information about an alleged road rage incident involving a grey 2012 Toyota Camry in the Norwest and Castle Hill areas, that happened between 8 pm to 10.20 pm on Monday, 2nd June.

At around 8.05 pm, the Camry driver allegedly flashed a knife and threw a vape at another driver. The victim followed the vehicle and notified police.

The situation escalated when the victim and the Camry driver arrived at Spurway Drive, Norwest, where several persons armed with knives and machetes approached the victim.

After the incident, police engaged in two pursuits on Showground Road, Castle Hill.

Both attempts were stopped due to the Camry's manner of driving. Police say despite patrols, the vehicle was not located.

Anyone who witnessed or may have dashcam footage about the incident is urged to report the information to The Hills Police Area Command on 02 9680 5399 or Crime Stoppers.

DRINK DRIVING P-PLATER

An 18-year-old P1 driver will face court after allegedly crashing into two parked vehicles while over the legal alcohol limit in Castle Hill.

At approximately 1:09 am on Saturday, 21 June, Hills Police responded to a collision on Warwick Parade. The driver's silver Mitsubishi ASX had struck a parked Hyundai i30 before continuing forward and crashing into the rear of a Holden Colorado, causing significant damage.

The impact pushed the Holden several metres and onto the kerb. The Mitsubishi sustained major front-end damage and came to rest against the eastern kerb.

Nearby residents, woken by the crash, assisted the driver and contacted police. The driver told officers he had reached down to pick up his mobile phone moments before the collision.

He was subjected to a roadside breath test, which returned a positive result. A subsequent breath analysis at Castle Hill Police Station returned a mid-range reading of 0.117.

The driver allegedly admitted to consuming four alcoholic ciders earlier that evening. His licence was immediately suspended, and he was issued a Court Attendance Notice for mid-range drink driving.



On April 28,1789 Fletcher Christian and a group of discontented crew seized control of the ship. Bligh and

18 sailors who did not support the actions were released on a

small boat. The separate sailing by both groups was very interesting and is part of maritime history. Arthur looked at the question of whether Bligh was a hero or a villain which was a very thoughtful review of Bligh's life including the period as Governer of NSW and

the rum rebellion.

The Clubs monthly coffee group changed their venue this month to the Galston High School Waddell Café. The café is staffed by students and used to give them experience working in that environment. The students bake the cakes and biscuits and prepare



the coffee. Not only is the experience dealing with customers valuable but their self confidence grows. A great initiative by the school.

Shared Pedestrian Cycling Pathway Proposed for Old Northern Road

Hornsby Shire Council is progressing with a proposal from Councillor Nathan Tilbury for the delivery of an off-road Active Transport corridor adjacent to Old Northern Road, between Glenorie and Dural.

At their June meeting Council unanimously supported Councillor Tilbury's motion to work directly with The Hills Shire Council and seek the support of the relevant NSW government Ministers, local State and Federal MPs, as well as Transport for NSW, to develop a feasibility study to the proposal.

As a clear sign of support, it is understood The Hills Shire Council will consider a similar motion via Councillor Mitchell Blue at an upcoming meeting.

Councillor Tilbury explained, "At present there is no safe pedestrian or cycling pathway along Old Northern Road between Glenorie and Dural, which spans approximately 11.5 km. Tragically, pedestrians have been killed walking along Old Northern Road, with the most recent death in November 2024. For some time, Mid Dural Public School has also raised serious concerns about pedestrian safety along Old Northern Road due to lack of paths and road crossing facilities around the school.

In addition, I have been regularly contacted by many local residents about the lack of a footpath along Old Northern Road, including residents living with disabilities that affect their mobility."

Local community groups have already enthusiastically rallied behind the proposal including the Glenorie Progress Association (GPA) and Arcadia Galston Residents Association (AGRA).





GPA President, Di Coxon-Ellis said, "It is far too dangerous to move around as a pedestrian and we have limited public transport options between Glenorie and Dural. We commend this proposal that aligns with our vision of connectivity and safety of our residents."

> It is important to note that Old Northern Road is State Road controlled making it the responsibility of Transport for NSW. The Councils will be jointly requesting funding support, through opportunities such as NSW Government grants, to undertake the feasibility study for the project and for its eventual delivery that is likely to be split over several stages.

A major challenge that needs to be overcome

is that Old Northern Road is the boundary between Hornsby Shire and The Hills Shire, as well as the local State and Federal electorates boundaries. It is crucial that the two councils and all local MPs work collaboratively, to give the proposal every chance of success.

It is expected that the feasibility study will highlight the issues and complexities of this project to inform its design and the best way to apply for grants.

Hornsby Council has previously delivered similar, albeit shorter, shared pathway projects, including between Hornsby and Mt Colah, along Peats Ferry Road and the Pacific Highway. More recently one was completed along Brooklyn Road, between Hawkesbury River railway station and Kangaroo Point, that was delivered in stages and funded by NSW Government grants.

Hornsby Shire Council Supports Stronger Rules to Curb Illegal Tree Clearing

Hornsby Shire Council formally endorsed a submission to the NSW Government at its meeting on 11th June. supporting proposed reforms to strengthen rules around illegal tree and vegetation clearing in urban areas.

The submission responds to the NSW Government's Explanation of Intended Effect (EIE), which outlines changes designed to enhance environmental protections, improve enforcement, and promote urban resilience in the face of climate change.

Key elements of the proposed reforms include increased fines and penalties for illegal clearing; stronger enforcement of restrictions where illegal clearing has occurred; improving council's power to issue orders for vegetation clearing; closing loopholes around the removal of dead or dangerous vegetation; and mandatory replanting conditions for tree clearing permits.

Hornsby Shire Mayor Warren Waddell said the reforms are a welcome step forward in protecting Hornsby's valued urban forest.

"These proposed changes will give Hornsby Council stronger tools to investigate and act on these offences, helping us preserve the green character of our suburbs. Trees also play a critical role in keeping our Shire cool, healthy and liveable."

Council's submission highlights the need for a state-led public education campaign to raise awareness about the value of urban trees and vegetation and foster long-term change. The NSW Government has a target of 40% urban canopy cover for Greater Sydney by 2036.

The endorsed submission will now form part of Council's ongoing advocacy to ensure that environmental protections keep pace with urban development.

Also at last night's meeting, Council:

- Endorsed the Hornsby Shire 2035 Community Strategic Plan
- Noted that as a consequence of the 2025 Report and Determination of the Local Government Remuneration Tribunal, Council remains in the Metropolitan Medium Category of NSW councils
- Resolved to reestablish the Hornsby Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Consultative Committee and the Hornsby Shire Heritage **Advisory Committee**
- Adopted the 2025-2029 Delivery Program and 2025/26 Operational Plan, including the Budget and 2025/26 Fees and Charges
- Resolved to write off debts considered bad for the 2024/25 Financial Year
- Approved the Hornsby Development Control Plan 2024 amendments for dual occupancy development and the Heritage Development Control Plan amendments
- Following Notices of Motion from Councillor Tilbury, resolved to hold an informal Councillor Briefing and to write to state and federal MPs around improvements to local footbaths and shared paths.



News from History Cottage

If we don't learn from history we are doomed to repeat it. An often heard phrase and one that returned as a theme in the talk given to members at the meeting on the 14th June. An additional question also asked: Who will come forward to point out the history?

Rod Best used the story of his ancestor, George Best, making his submission to the Bigge Commission investigating the administration of the New South Wales colony under Governor Macquarie in 1819. Best was brave enough to stand against those who considered themselves better than he. To achieve this he presented himself in a way that, while partly true, rather overstated his achievements. He was against others who were in authority; from a different social strata and not against using these to their advantage.

George Best, in 1819, represented those who could not come forward; those who were



marginalised through a lack of education; those who were former convicts struggling to build a life and were too afraid of losing what they had achieved if they challenged those in authority.

And here the speaker drew attention to our modern society. Who, in 2025, is coming forward to speak for those in similar situations and take the risk? For the refugees; the homeless; those struggling to build a life for their families; the laws that govern society

and the allocation of finance. The audience was given much to consider after this most interesting talk.

At our next Society meeting on the 12th July, local Galston resident Carolyn Broadhead will tell of her discovery of two French Connections. One is the story of a First World War soldier, a local boy, falling in love and wanting to stay in France after the war. The other is Carolyn's family connection with lacemakers who migrated here in early colonial time. This Society meeting starts at 2.00pm in the Galston Uniting Church, School Road, Galston.

The test opening of History Cottage, beside the Galston Cenotaph, was most successful. It will now be a regular feature on the 4th Sunday of each month between 1.00pm and 4.00pm. The next opening will be on the Sunday 27th July. All are welcome.

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Remagine Art Prize 2025 Winner **Announced**

The winner of the Remagine Art Prize 2025 has been announced, with Glenn Barley taking out the first prize of \$5,000 for his sculpture, Digbabydig (2), made of reclaimed clay, ceramic, glass, lustre.

Glenn said the title is a reference to "to contemporary environmental politics and the source and nature of clay".

"This work is made from reclaimed clay originally part of an interactive public artwork. Embedded in the work are shards of pottery I find at Camperdown Oval the original waste dump for Fowlers Pottery located nearby. I have used a lustre that was given to me from a discarded workshop along with other materials that I will eventually bring into the cycle of making in the studio... It was made using tools I inherited from various makers including my mother-in-law and hold the magical resonance of those who have come before - in turn some of my equipment will become part of this cycle," said Glenn.

The annual Remagine Art Prize is hosted by Hornsby Shire Council in partnership with Hornsby Art Society. This art prize challenges artists to create works in response to the waste and overconsumption crises. The theme for this year was **RE:THINK TO RE:PURPOSE**, challenging artists to explore the impact of waste production and creatively reuse materials to help conserve our precious natural resources.

Chrystie Longworth was awarded Highly Commended, winning \$2,000 in prize money for her work, Detritus Sentinels.

"Detritus Sentinels reflects on our entanglement with the environment and the guiet transformations that occur over time. It asks us to look more closely, to rethink what we throw away, and to acknowledge the responsibility we share in shaping, and saving, the world around us," said Chrystie.



Michelle Trewin secured the Recycled/Reused Materials Award and \$1,500 in prize money for her piece Natural Lint crafted from lint and thread on paper.

Hornsby Shire Mayor Warren Waddell praised the finalists for their inspiring artworks.

"Congratulations to these worthy winners of the Remagine Art Prize. These artists have expressed their passion for sustainability and the environment through each of these unique, thought-provoking works. All the attention and care paid off when Avocado won first place in the category



attractive throughout different seasons. Varying leaf shapes, sizes, and colour create contrast and depth. Many foliage plants require minimal upkeep compared to high maintenance flowering varieties.

Hidden in the Hills

HAKEA GIBBOSA

This rather scraggly shrub can be located in many forest locations bordering walking tracks in local bushland. It flowers from late June to early September. The plant appears to survive on somewhat depleted sandstone soils but as a consequence may not produce an abundance of loosely clustered flowers. However, where the conditions are more favourable the opposite can be the case with light creamy-white flowers extending in greater numbers along its younger branchlets.

Over many years the plant will have a large number of easily identifiable, somewhat grotesque, seed pods visible over much of the plant. The oldest ones may open when stimulated by extremely hot conditions to reveal the yellow and orange colour, as well as the shallow depression that held two seeds.

These winged seeds will float on the wind settling on the ground,

possibly some distance from the parent plant to remain dormant in the leaf and bark litter until sufficient moisture stimulates germination. New growth is characterised by dense but loose white hairs.

Growing up to around 3m high and 1.5m wide the foliage of this plant is guite stiff and prickly with a small but sharp spur at the tip of each leaf.

When cultivated for home garden use, in more nutrient rich soils and given adequate attention the Hairy Needle Bush will flourish as a screening plant in addition to being a refuge for small birds wishing to avoid the attacks of larger birds. Due to its prickly nature it is advisable to not plant it near pathways where people may inadvertently brush up against it.

General distribution is restricted to central eastern NSW coast.

What is Sin & **Am I A Sinner?**

"SIN" - a very small word describing a very important concept!! It's a word we often avoid thinking about as we live our daily lives. It's a word that is often distasteful and even offensive to many people; a word that is even misunderstood.

At its root, the word 'sin' simply means "SEPARATION FROM GOD." A true understanding of the concept of sin is found in the Bible which describes our "state of sin" before our "sinful actions". Both are connected but it is vitally important to understand that ALL humans are born into a state of sin.

Let me go back a step, to God's perfect agape love for each person in this world of ours. How often do I quote "For God so LOVED the world (you& me) that He GAVE His only Son (perfect Jesus); that whoever believes in Him will not perish but have everlasting LIFE." (John 3:16)

It is God's plan for us be in relationship with Him, our Creator, both now and forever.

So, how can each of us have this relationship with God when, as human beings, nothing we could ever do can restore us or connect us to the God who first loved us?

Romans 3:23 confirms that "ALL have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." The Bible then becomes your manual, your love letter from your Father God to you so that you can grow in the grace & knowledge of who He is and walk in the good plans He has prepared for you. God bless

CLEAN YOUR CHIMNEY

Chimneys need to be cleaned regularly to avoid a build-up of flammable soot particles, and winter is the perfect time to do this. Soot build-up in chimneys can lead to chimney fires and mean that your fireplace will provide less heat for your home. Remember, clean, swept chimneys are safe chimneys so please make sure you get your flue or chimney cleaned by a professional.



CHECK YOUR SMOKE ALARMS

NSW law requires at least one working smoke alarm on every level of your home, including rentals, relocatable homes, caravans and campervans. It is also recommended installing smoke alarms in all bedrooms, hallways, living areas, stairways and even your garage. Hard wired and interconnected alarms are best, however, if not possible, use smoke alarms with in-built 10 year lithium batteries, but avoid older models that require annual battery replacement. Stay safe and check your smoke alarms today.

Have you discussed it with every member of your household, including the kids? Sadly, last winter saw 1,036 residential fires in NSW. Like a bushfire safety plan, you need to discuss your escape routes with every household member, what to do if there is a fire, and where to go. You need to check your smoke alarms and replace any that are not working. Smoke is the greatest cause of


injuries and fatalities. You also need to ensure that you keep looking while cooking, that everything is kept 1 metre from the heater, regularly check electric blankets for damage, ensure safe charging of batteries, and have your fireplace and flue cleaned annually. 

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
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
