Constancy and stability contribute significantly to fostering a cohesive community. Getting to know Business owners, local shopkeepers and staff helps build community ties, which is hard when there's frequent turnover. One such person is the lovely Heather Williams, whom many of you already know. Heather has been working for Woolworths Glenorie since it opened in the mid 2000's. This is her story.

#### **HEATHER WILLIAMS**

I was born in 1948 and grew up in Eastwood. There was a bus run from Eastwood to Glenorie. Mrs Deaman owned the bus company and Roy Bevan was the bus driver. The bus depot was on the site where Woolworths is now. My Aunt and Uncle, Dolly and Ralph Johnston owned a poultry farm and Orchard (35 acres) called Carinyah at Middle Dural where Geranium Cottage was and is now an Indian restaurant. As they had no children, during the school holidays my cousins and I all came to work on the farm, collecting and



packing the eggs in wooden cases and picking the fruit, apples, oranges, mandarins, nectarines and plums. Being the only girl, on Fridays I was kept at the house to help with the weekly baking which started my love of cooking. We earned 10 shillings for our work efforts.

At Easter, as a treat, Aunt Dolly and Uncle Ralph took us to the Easter Show and we would go to David Jones in the city for a meal which was very special. Everything was delivered in those days, the milk in a pail on a hook at the front gate straight from the cow with at least two inches of cream on the top.

If something was forgotten in the delivery, I would have to walk from the property to the grocery store at Glenorie which was where Woolworths is now. There also used to be a butcher, Post Office and Stock feed place and then later an Antique store.

During my school time I did classical ballet for 11 years and when I left school I went into hairdressing and did my apprenticeship in the city then had my own business in North Ryde and Castle Hill until I got married and had children. I have a boy and a girl. My daughter now lives in Vancouver, Canada, which is a beautiful country.

Now I have come full circle and work for Woolworths. In September I will have been here for 16 years. Woolworths have been very good to me caring for my welfare during Covid and I enjoy working with a great team of lovely and caring people including my Manager, Sadie and Store Manager, Richard. We have a wonderful customer base, and the locals are lovely friendly people. After being here for so long I know so many on a first name basis and I have met some wonderful and interesting people during this time.

In my spare time I enjoy crocheting and knitting. I may retire one day, but for now I continue to enjoy being at Glenorie.

# **Spanish Moss: From Ornamental Plant** to Out-of-Control Weed in Sydney

### The Unintended Consequences of an Air Plant's Popularity

Spanish Moss, known scientifically as Tillandsia usneoides, is a fascinating plant with an ethereal beauty that drapes from tree limbs like silvery veils. Originating in the southeastern **United States, Central and** South America, this epiphytic bromeliad is neither moss nor Spanish, but it has long been prized for its distinctive appearance. Although Spanish Moss is admired by gardeners, floral designers, and fans of exotic flora, its introduction into new environments has sometimes led to unintended consequences. In recent years, certain parts of Sydney have experienced a growing problem: Spanish Moss behaving as an invasive weed.

#### WHAT IS SPANISH MOSS?

Despite its common name, Spanish Moss is a member of the bromeliad family and is closely related to pineapples. It grows by absorbing water and nutrients from the air and rainfall through its scales, not by rooting in the soil. Its wiry, grey-green stems can grow to impressive lengths, forming dense, trailing curtains in humid environments. Spanish Moss is mostly harmless in its native habitats, where a balance is maintained with local fauna and flora

#### SPANISH MOSS IN SYDNEY: **AN UNLIKELY INVADER**

In Sydney, Spanish Moss was introduced as a decorative plant, popular in gardens and as a living ornament for patios and shade trees. However, Sydney's relatively mild winters, humid microclimates, and enthusiastic

gardeners have created ideal conditions for Spanish Moss to flourish. In some suburbs—particularly those with established gardens, abundant rainfall, and mature trees-Spanish Moss has spread far beyond its intended boundaries.

While the plant does not directly parasitise its host, its sheer density can block sunlight, impede air circulation, and increase humidity around the host tree's foliage. Over time, stressed trees may experience reduced leaf transpiration, making them more susceptible to pests and disease. In some cases, the weight of accumulated Spanish Moss may even cause branches to break.

#### THE OUT-OF-CONTROL WEED STATUS

Although not officially declared a noxious weed in New South Wales, Spanish Moss is now considered a problematic invasive in parts of Sydney. Residents and horticulturalists in affected areas report that the plant is extremely difficult to control once established. It can spread rapidly via wind-borne seeds and vegetative fragments, colonising powerlines, fences, and any structure or plant that offers support. Birds can also contribute to its dispersal, as they find it particularly attractive as nesting material. Its ability to thrive on almost any surface complicates eradication efforts.

Local councils and Bush Care groups have issued warnings about the risks of Spanish Moss, urging homeowners to regularly inspect and manage their gardens. Manual removal is often the only reliable control, as chemical treatments are largely ineffective and may damage host plants.

Spanish Moss, with its ghostly allure and unique biology, has proven to be a challenging



invader in some parts of Sydney. Its transition from a sought-after ornamental to an outof-control weed serves as a reminder of the unpredictable impacts of introducing exotic species into new environments. Responsible gardening practices and community awareness are essential to preserve Sydney's green spaces and prevent further spread.

# St Albans **Drowning** Tragedy

Our hearts go out to the community of picturesque St Albans following the recent and tragic drowning of a father and son in the Macdonald River. Their vehicle reportedly veered off the road and into the water during heavy weather.

A third passenger, who is the son and brother of the deceased, managed to escape the submerged vehicle and swim to the riverbank to call for help. Nearby homeowners heard his cries and promptly contacted emergency services. While emergency personnel arrived swiftly, they were initially unable to locate the vehicle or the missing individuals.

Around 11:20 AM on Thursday, August 21st, Police Divers located the vehicle. After a further search, two bodies were recovered from the water. Formal identification is pending.

# First Aid **Everyday** Course

To be held on Friday, 12th September, 8.30am to 3.30pm at Galston Adventist Community Hall, Arcadia Road, Galston.

The course HLTAIDO11 Provide First Aid provides instruction and practical training in line with legal, workplace and community considerations, Australian Resuscitation Council guidelines and other Australian National Peak Clinical Bodies, this auto injector for anaphylaxis, administering asthma medication, assisting someone choking, using appropriate immobilisation techniques for envenomation, fractures, dislocation, sprains and strains, managing casualties with non-life-threatening bleeding and shock.

You will learn basic anatomy, physiology and the difference between adults, children and infants relating to CPR, the importance of the chain of survival, written and verbal reporting of incident details, reviewing incidents to improve your own skills and response times, to recognise psychological impacts and seeking help required.

Pre Course Study: Students will be required to undertake online pre course work prior to attending the face to face session depending on the course delivery mode.

Online Study: Students must have access to a computer, smartphone, tablet or other electronic devices with access to the internet to complete the online pre-course studies.

Students will be assessed on the following: To perform 2 minutes of CPR on an adult (Incl. the use of an AED and placing a casualty into the recovery position.)

Complete a first aid incident report form based on the simulated first aid scenario, perform CPR on an infant, Manage a casualty with anaphylaxis, Manage a casualty with asthma, Manage a choking casualty, and manage a casualty with non-life-threatening bleeding and shock, requiring minor wound cleaning. Students will need to complete all their pre-course/theory online prior to the day to be assessed practically. This reduces the amount of time they spend onsite.

### The Ray Whiteman Heritage Fence is getting closer to completion!

As previously advised, Hornsby Shire Council team will be installing our pavers in the



precinct of the Memorial Hall – forecourt and path – hopefully soon. Design phase has commenced in keeping with the heritage of the Memorial Hall. Once the fence is completed, all the piers are in place, the infill fencing installed, we can celebrate the installation of the 331 orders of paver from Glenorie District families, and friends. Who have chosen to have their name etched in stone forever.

Families have sponsored piers on the Ray Whiteman Heritage Fence and one is the Deaman Family, founder of the Glenorie Bus Company.

Here is more on their story:

# Humble beginnings... George Deaman's Glenorie Bus Company

The Glenorie Bus Company story began in the early 1920's with George Deaman taking over the mail run from his brother Ray Deaman, when Ray started working for the council. George would deliver mail from Glenorie to Castle Hill on his horse and sulky. It was during this time that George met Phyllis Holland who would later become his wife. Carrying the mail bag from her mother's post office, Phyllis would walk from Evans Road in Glenhaven up to Old Northern Road to meet George en route to Castle Hill.

With requests increasing to transport people to Castle Hill along with the mail, George saw an opportunity, prompting him to apply for a bus license, purchase his first motorised bus and establish the first bus route from Glenorie to Castle Hill – Route No. 60.

George's buses ran on petrol, and to fuel them he had his own petrol tank and bowser installed on site with a manual pump to fuel the buses with Golden Fleece fuel, or benzine, as it was known in the day. Cold, frosty winter mornings required creative engine-starting techniques, using cotton wool and methylated spirits.

In the late 1920s to 1950s, George and Phyllis grew the business which was located next to the original Glenorie Post Office on Old Northern Road, the site now occupied by Glenorie Woolworths. In the early days George did all the driving himself. As the business grew, he was joined by drivers including Vic Bevan, Bill Roughley, Phillip Black, Mervyn Hughes, Alan Hitchcock (Harland), Mervyn Marsh and Dennis Webb and routes expanded to Eastwood and other locations in the district.



The buses became vital for connecting the Glenorie community to schools and other services outside their immediate area. They enabled local school children to access high schools in Hornsby, Carlingford, Northmead, and Parramatta. Some people may remember catching the 6.50am bus to Dural and connecting with another bus to take them across Galston Gorge's hairpin bends to Hornsby or catching a bus to Castle Hill to join a connecting bus to Parramatta.

Always looking for opportunities to deliver services to his local community, George would often have to travel to the Transport Department to discuss his ideas and seek approvals. This would involve a day long trip, with his wife,



Phyllis in tow, travelling by car, train and tram to reach Roseberry in southwest Sydney. Not the easiest trip from Glenorie in those days.

In 1952, after one of those visits, he fulfilled a long-held vision of helping commuters by starting daily busloads to Eastwood Station, with no pickups or set downs between Rogan's Hill and Eastwood to avoid overlapping other routes.

George was deeply religious and very generous—often supplying buses and drivers for community trips to raise money for St Jude's Dural Parish. Destinations took patrons to explore greater Sydney destinations such as Bobbin Head, Kiama, 'Gilbulla' conference centre, the 'Rotalactor', the first rotating milking parlour, at Camden Park, and Katoomba, often stopping for morning tea at the Blue Mountains Church of England Grammar School, where previous rector of St Jude's, Rev Pitt Owen was headmaster.

Buses were hired by the Methodist and Church of England churches for Sunday school picnics travelling to Bungool, now the location of Riverside Oaks Golf Club, and the Northern Beaches. He even added a service on Saturday evenings to



Castle Hill theatre and later to the Eastwood Odeon theatre.

The first patron of the Glenorie RSL and Cricket Club, he was also a man of many talents, delivering newspapers to homes along his route with remarkable accuracy—tossing them from the bus. He and Phyllis also regularly drove their black Chrysler cars for local district weddings.

George was known for his sayings. Aline Muscio remembers George often saying on alighting "Quick's the word and sharp's the motion." His daughter, Elizabeth remembers him saying, "Great day for the race." When asked "What race?" he'd reply, "The human race."

Not to be overlooked, Phyllis was also incredibly generous and kind. A fully qualified nurse, she trained from 1925–1929 at Marrickville District Hospital and was the only healthcare professional in the local district for some time, providing nursing services to locals at no cost, all whilst raising her children and supporting her husband. One of her daughter Elizabeth's early memories is of her mum preparing and serving fresh scones with jam and cream to her dad and his team of drivers every Monday morning when bus maintenance was scheduled.

George and Phyllis had three daughters, their eldest two daughters both pursued careers in education as primary school teachers. Helen attended Sydney Teachers College and Elizabeth Balmain Teachers College. Their youngest daughter Margaret studied at Business College. Whilst none of the family remains in Glenorie, it is a place close to their hearts. It holds fond memories and much pride for the humble beginnings and success of the Glenorie Bus Company and their father's vision and commitment to the community.

Sadly, George died suddenly in 1960 from acute leukemia, diagnosed just before his passing. The bus company was subsequently sold in 1962.


















#### **CAR PLUNGES INTO RIVER**

Emergency services located two bodies during a search after a car crashed into the Macdonald River.

About 11.20 am, Thursday, 21st August 2025, NSW Police Divers located a vehicle in the waters nearby.

A further search led police divers to find two bodies in the water. According to police, they are yet to be formally identified.

Police were called to Settlers Road, St Albans, about 20 kilometres north of Wisemans Ferry, just before midnight on Wednesday, 20th August. Officers attached to Hawkesbury Police Area Command arrived to find a car had entered the river.

One passenger, 24, managed to exit the car and reach the riverbank. He was assessed by NSW Ambulance paramedics but did not require hospital treatment.

Police were told two other men were inside the vehicle.

The State Emergency Service and NSW Rural Fire Service assisted police in the search of the river and the surrounding area.

Anyone with information is urged to contact Hawkesbury Police or Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000. Information is treated in confidence, and police remind the public not to report details through social media.

### **FRAUDULENT SLIPS**

Highway Patrol officers have charged three men following an investigation into fraudulent safety inspection reports issued at a Castle Hill car dealership.

On 13th May, officers from North-West Traffic and Highway Patrol, with assistance from Transport for NSW, began investigating reports that fraudulent "pink slips" were being supplied in northwest Sydney.

The investigation was sparked after two heavily modified cars, a Nissan 200SX and a Nissan 180SX, were found in Seven Hills during an unrelated matter.

Police allege both vehicles had been granted inspection certificates in April despite serious defects, including missing airbags, removed anti-lock braking systems, non-compliant suspension and dangerous frontal protrusions.

Following further inquiries, three men aged 39, 40 and 42 were charged with knowingly producing a false or misleading document and breaching the conditions of an examiner's authority.

The two older men were also charged with issuing false or misleading inspection reports.

Police will allege the men, all employees of the Castle Hill dealership, issued 22 fraudulent safety inspection reports between January and May this year.

All three were set to appear at Parramatta Local Court on 30th July.

Police say the events will offer an opportunity for former officers to be recognised for their service and to reconnect with the policing community.

#### **BURGLAR ARRESTED**

Hills Police are investigating a series of break and enter incidents that occurred in 1st July.

At around 2 am, a resident on Evans Road, Glenhaven, awoke to find three intruders inside the home. The offenders fled when confronted.

About 30 minutes later, another resident on Sandpiper Place, Kenthurst, reported seeing three individuals in their pool area, one allegedly raised a pole in a threatening manner before fleeing. No injuries were reported.

A white hatchback was seen near both locations and later identified at a service station in Dural.

Following inquiries, police arrested an 18-year-old male on 31st July. A search warrant was executed at his Glenorie home, where officers located clothing believed to have been worn during the incidents.

The teen was charged with aggravated break and enter dwelling with intent to steal and attempted aggravated break and enter dwelling with intent to steal.

He was refused bail and appeared in Parramatta Local Court the same day. Investigations continue to locate the other two individuals involved.

#### **DOG BREEDER CHARGED**

A man linked to a notorious dog breeding group has been charged following an alleged assault at a Castle Hill dog show.

Police allege that on Saturday 3 May, a banned dog breeder and his associates attempted to gain access to an American Bull Terrier event. The man reportedly pushed an employee in an effort to enter the show ring, where he displayed a dog breeding banner on the floor.

Following investigations, officers from the State Crime Command's Raptor Squad arrested a 33-year-old man in Greenfield Park around midday on Thursday, 24th July.

The man was granted strict conditional bail and was set to appear at Fairfield Local Court on Wednesday, 20th August.

Police say most incidents have occurred at night and are urging residents to report suspicious activity. This includes vehicles stopped on the roadside, particularly those that appear out of place, and light trucks, utes or cars with large trailers that are not marked with Telstra signage.

Members of the public are encouraged to note vehicle registration numbers, makes, models and locations, and to be aware that authorised Telstra workers should display appropriate signage when working.

### LETTER TO THE EDITOR

### Safety Concerns at the Heart of Johnson Road Rezoning

Safety should be one of, if not the first priority in any local planning. Yet Hornsby Council's proposal to rezone 1-3 Johnson Road in Galston to E4 **General Industrial does the opposite.** 

Transport for NSW (TfNSW) has already ruled out access via Middle Dural Road due to safety concerns. In a letter dated 2nd May 2024, obtained under the Government Information (Public Access) Act, the Department made it clear they would not permit industrial traffic to enter or exit there. Their reasons were stark: Middle Dural Road carries a high volume of traffic, has an 80 km/h speed limit that only drops to 60 just before Johnson Road, and slowing or turning heavy vehicles would present unacceptable risks.

That should have been the end of the matter. Instead, Council has shifted the problem onto Johnson Road itself, a quiet and narrow residential street, where residents and their children walk, cycle and play. An 8-metre industrial

driveway is proposed directly opposite their family homes, with no commitment to meaningful traffic controls. If an arterial road was deemed unsafe, how can a local street possibly be considered safer?




The Local Planning Panel (LPP), in its April 2025 advice, also flagged serious concerns. Chief among them was the absence of a site-specific Development Control Plan (DCP). Without one, developers would have near total freedom to pursue whatever uses are permitted under E4 zoning. And those uses go far beyond the "light industrial workshops" Council often refers to. Freight depots, hardware warehouses, distribution centres, sawmills and even used car lots would all be possible. TfNSW itself noted the site could accommodate up to 35 E4 units, not the 28 promoted by Council.


For residents, this is not just a planning technicality, it is about safety, amenity and the character of our community. Galston's semi-rural streets were never designed to handle heavy industrial traffic. To dismiss those risks, while brushing aside both TfNSW's advice and the LPP's recommendations, is reckless in the extreme.

Council owes its residents more

than rhetoric. It owes us a safe, transparent and responsible planning process. On every measure, their proposal fails that test.

# **Glenorie Probus Club Activities**

Glenorie Probus Club had a bus tour to Morpeth in July. This historic area was originally known as Illalaung. meaning 'green hills' by the Wannarua Aboriginal people.



The town of Morpeth, established in the 1830s, takes its name from Morpeth in Northumberland, near Newcastle-upon-Tyne in England. It was established by Edward Charles Close, a former British Army Officer, developing the river port and

laying out the town plan on the southern banks of the Hunter River.

It became a vital trade and agricultural hub following European settlement and was the second largest port in Australia, after Sydney, during its peak, facilitating trade and transport for the region. Arnott Biscuits and Soul Pattinson Pharmaceuticals originated there. (There is a magnificent display of Arnott biscuit tins and memorabilia in the Morpeth Museum.)

The Morpeth Bridge over the Hunter River is a timber truss structure 250 metres long. It is heritage listed and assessed as being Nationally Significant. It was built from 1896 to 1898 by Samual McGill, to the design of engineer Percy Allan. The arrival of the railway and the rise of Newcastle as a regional port led to Morpeth's



commercial decline in the late 1800s and early 1900s, it is popular today as a tourist destination with its well preserved buildings, a mixture of sandstone grandeur and weatherboard and slab houses.

Our speaker, Nathan Tilbury, local historian and



Hornsby Shire Councillor, presented a very interesting topic about 'The History of Fagan Park' located at Galston NSW.

Fagan Park has a rich history of 55 hectares as a citrus and dairy farming property first settled by the Fagan Family in the 1850s after emigrating from Ireland. In 1980 the last surviving of the family, Bruce Fagan and sister Ida in their later years, generously donated their property to the State government, Department of Lands for the use and recreation by the general public.

The park was then developed and financed by Hornsby Shire Council as their Bicentennial Project, officially opening in that year, 1988. This delightful park includes many attractions, such as picnic facilities, bushwalking trails, children's playgrounds, eco and gardens of the world. Also, a Rural Museum is located at Netherby Homestead the original Fagan Family home now run by volunteers, 'The Friends of Fagan Park.' We proudly read that the 55 hectares Fagan Park is now considered as a hidden gem of open public park spaces in Sydney.

The Clubs monthly coffee group met again this month at the Galston High School Café for a relaxing and enjoyable meeting continuing the monthly practice.

The Club meets on the at 11.00am on the 4th Wednesday of the month at Glenorie RSL and new members are welcome.







# Hornsby Art Prize exhibition opens this September with a stunning showcase of contemporary art








**NSW Government Piles More Homes and Pressure** on The Hills Shire

The Hills Shire Council has raised serious concerns with the State Government's secretive Housing Delivery Authority's (HDA) decisions to fast-track 5,936 additional homes in our major centres, which could reduce vital land for business and worsen the infrastructure crisis.

The HDA has drastically increased housing density in Castle Hill, Norwest, Rouse Hill, and Baulkham Hills, with some high-rise developments doubling to almost 40-storeys in height - all without any commitment from the NSW Government to fund the roads, schools, and sports facilities needed to support the extra people that will live in them.

It comes as 20,000 NSW residents signed a petition to the NSW Legislative Assembly to demand stronger investment in roads, parks and schools across The Hills Shire.

Mayor of The Hills Shire, Dr Michelle Byrne, said the NSW Government is blatantly disregarding the community's needs through the HDA which effectively sidelines the community, council and our planning controls.

"This fast-tracked approach will force another 12,000 residents into our already strained town centres, which are buckling under overburdened roads, schools and community facilities," Mayor Byrne said.

"We already have the highest housing targets in the state, and now the Government is using the housing crisis as a trojan horse to pile on thousands more dwellings without delivering the essential infrastructure to support them. These are largely unplanned and are on top of our already zoned supply."

Council highlighted one proposal at 34-46 Brookhollow Avenue, Norwest, as a stark example of the HDA's overreach.

The developer's original proposal to Council was for a commercial-focused development with 76 apartments. After applying through the HDA, this plan has ballooned into an 800-dwelling development, on top of the combined retail space.

The developer has since applied to withdraw their original application from Council, which sought a far more appropriate built form for the site, as the state-level process now supersedes local assessment.

"Brookhollow Avenue already faces heavy peak-time traffic. A multi-storey development here will worsen congestion and overshadow nearby homes," Mayor Byrne said.

"This is a perfect example of

the HDA's approach: ignoring local infrastructure needs and bypassing proper planning in the name of housing supply."

Since its establishment just seven months ago, the HDA has considered 21 expressions of interest in The Hills and fast-tracked 14 of them as State Significant Development.

"Significant local planning decisions are being made behind closed doors by a secret state panel, with no details provided to Council or the community until they choose to," Mayor Byrne said.

"The Minns Government has a track record of removing all strategic and town planning in the state. The community and Council have been sidelined, and developers are being allowed to bypass Council and local planning policies that were put in place for a reason. They're probably rubbing their hands with glee.

"While we acknowledge the need for more housing, this growth must be matched by infrastructure. Without a holistic approach, the result will be overdevelopment. Our community will suffer, and we are seeing our vital business land devoted to high-rise units."

The HDA is one of several reforms the NSW Government has introduced to increase housing across the state. To counter the NSW Government's one-size-fits-all approach to housing, Council launched the Fight for a Fairer Hills Future campaign. The campaign demands action on the region's significant infrastructure deficit and calls on the NSW and Australian Governments to commit to vital projects, including:

- Funding for 40 additional sports fields
- Upgrades to 45 key regional roads
- Delivery of 13 new public schools
- Addressing the \$207 million infrastructure deficit in Box Hill

The campaign's petition recently hit a significant milestone of 20,000 signatures, triggering a debate on the issue in NSW Parliament in the coming months.

# Council endorses Planning Proposal to boost employment opportunities across Hornsby Shire

**COUNCIL PRESS RELEASE** 

Hornsby Shire Council has endorsed a Planning Proposal aimed at strengthening the local economy and increasing employment opportunities across the Shire, following last night's General Meeting.

The Planning Proposal is expected to unlock new opportunities for local businesses and workers by increasing the range and diversity of employment options and services available across the Shire.

By enabling a broader mix of commercial and industrial activities in strategic locations, the Proposal supports the creation of job types ranging from retail and hospitality to advanced manufacturing and logistics. It also aims to attract investment, support small business growth, and ensure the Shire's industrial precincts are better equipped to accommodate modern facilities and meet future workforce needs.

#### Key amendments include:

- Active street frontages: New developments in local centres will be required to include active street frontages, promoting pedestrian activity and enhancing the vibrancy of town centres.
- Light industries in local centres:
   Light industries such as those that don't
   create noise and smells will be permitted
   in most larger local centres, increasing
   flexibility and employment diversity without
   impacting neighbourhood amenity.
- Serviced apartments floor space exclusion: Serviced apartments will no longer count toward non-residential floor space calculations, helping preserve commercial space for employment-generating uses.
- Food and drink premises size limit:
   Food and drink premises in industrial zones

will be capped at 150sqm to ensure industrial land remains available for core employment uses.

- Increased building heights:
   Parts of selected industrial precincts
   (Mount Kuring-Gai, Asquith, Thornleigh, and Dural) will see building height limits raised to 20 metres, enabling modern industrial facilities.
- Higher floor space ratio in Dural: The Dural Industrial Precinct will have its floor space ratio increased from 0.7:1 to 1:1, unlocking greater development potential.

The Employment Lands Planning Proposal will be submitted to the Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure for review. If approved, it will be publicly exhibited alongside the draft Hornsby Development Control Plan 2024 amendments.

Hornsby Shire Deputy Mayor Janelle McIntosh welcomed the Proposal, stating: "This is a proactive step toward ensuring Hornsby Shire remains a competitive and attractive place for local business and employment. The changes will help us ensure the vibrancy and vitality of our local centres while giving more flexibility in our industrial precincts. This will enable us to meet future demand while protecting the character and function of our employment lands."

#### Also at last night's meeting, Council:

- On receiving a Mayoral Minute, raised by Deputy Mayor McIntosh, resolved to recognise the recent significant anniversaries of community organisations with a simple event at Wallarobba Arts and Cultural Centre in September 2025
- Acknowledged through an additional Mayoral Minute raised by the Deputy Mayor, the resignation and significant achievements of Mr James Farrington, Director of Planning and Compliance, who leaves Council after 30 years of service to Hornsby Shire

- Re-appointed local members on the Sydney North Planning Panel and extended the term of appointment of expert members and community representatives on the Hornsby Local Planning Panel
- Adopted the new Enforcement Policy and the reviewed Community, Environment, and Planning and Compliance Division current policies and codes
- Resolved to write to the NSW Minister for the Environment and local State Members outlining Council's previously expressed view concerning the conservation significance of 79-87 Malton Road, Beecroft and requesting consideration of submissions by residents requesting the State Government seek to purchase the land, following a Notice of Motion from Councillor Tilbury
- Responded to a Question with Notice from Councillor Tilbury about the financial spend on the rehabilitation of Hornsby Quarry to Hornsby Park, noting large grants and some development contributions
- Received and noted the contents of the Director's Report on investments and borrowings for the period ending 30th June 2025
- Noted that Councillor expenses and facilities for the period 1st July 2024 to 30th June 2025 have been tabled.

#### **Greater investment needed in** our local mental health services

Every day in Australia, nine people lose their lives to suicide. For every death, there are approximately 20 attempts. These are not just numbers; they represent someone's parent, someone's son or daughter, someone's partner or mate.

Here in our own community, the need is real and growing. In 2021, 4,041 people presented at the North Shore public health network emergency departments with suicidal thoughts or other intentional self-harm. By 2023-24, that number had risen to 4,681. These numbers are devastating to see.

Over the past year, I've come to know a young man from our community who, based off his own experiences, has been a tireless advocate for improvements to our local mental health system, highlighting the enormous strain Hornsby Hospital and its mental health unit are under every single day. Doctors and nurses on the frontlines are doing their absolute best, but they are completely overwhelmed by the sheer volume of people needing urgent help. This situation not only affects those seeking support but also takes a heavy toll on the wellbeing of the very people providing care.

Adam's courage and openness are a reminder that we have much more to do to make our system work for everyone in our community. That is why I have called on both the New South Wales Government and the Federal Government to invest more in our local hospitals' mental health units and associated community programs. We need to ensure that mental health services in our community are properly resourced to meet the growing need.

It is also vital that we break the stigma around mental health and suicide. Adam's willingness to stand up is powerful because it encourages others to speak up too. We must make it normal to ask the hard questions - including directly asking a friend, "Are you contemplating suicide?" - and to walk with them towards the help they need.

Community deserves a system that works. And with the right investment, the right support, and the courage to keep speaking out, we can build it.

The guest speaker is a member of the BSA Mark Belot who specialises in the larger bromeliads such as the Alcantarea and

Mark grew up on a quarter acre block with an old garden, filled with camellias, azaleas and rhododendrons a passion of his late Father's.

However, Mark developed an interest in Bonsai and at one stage had a huge collection. His interest and passion for bromeliads increased when a neighbour shared some of her plants with him and he was hooked.

Currently, Mark doesn't have a shade house, so most of his bromeliads are out in the full sun. The more delicate and precious species are located on his deck. The sunny end is for the Neoregelias and the other shaded end is for Vrieseas.

Mark has a bit of everything in his garden including beautiful Neos, with the large hybrid variegated Alcantarea being his favourites.

Mark will bring along a variety coloured flowered and about to flower Alcantarea bromeliads.

He will demonstrate the removal of pups and grass pup from the mother Alcantarea bromeliads and how to assist with the survival of accidentally neglected bromeliads.

Mark will also have some of his crossed genus of Alcantarea and Vriesea that he has bred from seed.

Hidden in the Hills

# **CYMBIDIUM SUAVE**

This plant is not a rare orchid. It is just a bit hard to find out it there in the bush as it does not usually occur next to established walking tracks. To find specimens of this sometimes spectacular orchid it may be necessary to venture into the understorey, searching for old decaying logs and trees that have been subject to some uncharacteristic decay, either near the base or even up higher where a branch has broken away from the trunk.

These are situations in which Cymbidium Suave will flourish. As it is an epiphyte which gains its nourishment from rotting vegetable material, the locations suggested are the most likely sites to observe this rather unusual orchid. The roots of this plant are very aggressive and penetrate deeply into the decaying woody material on which it survives, usually old eucalvpt trees.

Found also in a variety of coastal and rainforest environments through Queensland and NSW, this plant has the unrelated name of "Snake Orchid", for which there does not appear to be any reliable reason for that name.

How the plant arrives in a space high up in an old tree is open to speculation. It is likely that a seed may have been consumed by a bird or animal and later deposited in droppings at that upper level, successfully germinating and subsequently flourishing to grow into a mature plant.

# **Caught in a Storm**

Have you ever been on a small boat and got caught in a storm? I can't say I have, but years ago I had the opportunity to sail a catamaran on the ocean. Even though it was windy, it looked easy, so I thought. I sailed about half a kilometre off shore and turned around. As I did so, the wind caught the sail and flipped me upside down. What a dilemma! Somehow I knew I had to create some sort of counterweight, so I grabbed the rope and lent out overboard. It worked. The sail came up, and for a brief moment, my fear subsided. Suddenly, the wind caught the sail again and the catamaran did a complete somersault, and I was underneath. After repeating the process, I made it back to shore.

God's word tells a story where Jesus and His disciples were in a small boat on the Sea of Galilee when suddenly, a windstorm arose and the waves started filling the boat. While the disciples feared for their lives, Jesus lay calmly asleep. In their fear they cried out, "Lord, save us! We are perishing!"

To this Jesus responded, "Peace be still!" Everything became calm (Mark 4:35-41).

Sometimes in life storms arise that seem to try our faith. In our desperation we often seek to sort it out ourselves, momentarily forgetting that Jesus is always with us. He's not sleep! Jesus promised, "I am with you always, even to end of the age" (Matthew 28;20). Some of the greatest blessings we have as Christians is believing and claiming the promises of God. All God's promises are "yes" to those who believe (2 Corinthians 1:20). For example:

# **Moores Road Training Event**

RFS crews from Glenorie, Middle Dural, and Galston Brigades recently took part in a village firefighting training exercise at the Bio Properties Pty Ltd site at Moores Road Glenorie.

The training exercise gave members valuable hands-on experience dealing with a complex industrial site, which has unique hazards including chemical storage, intricate building layouts, and various fuel supplies, all of which demand careful planning and precise teamwork. The training exercise focused on a coordinated response strategy, including arrival and set up drills, with hose deployment. Then crews had to deal with hazard management challenges that all industrial facilities present firefighters with. This type of training ensures our crews are ready for incidents in this or any other industrial setting in our community.

Exercises like this are vital for our brigades, as facilities like this are high risk, low frequency type of incident that our volunteer members would encounter, and present unusual risks. To be able to train in environments like this allows our firefighters to hone skills as well as work side by side with other brigades, to strengthen operational capability.

We extend our sincere thanks to David Beech from Bio Properties Pty Ltd for his invaluable help in making the event possible. His support



and detailed knowledge of the site greatly enhanced the realism and effectiveness of the training.


This exercise highlights the strong collaboration between local brigades, local industry, and the wider community, and reinforces the importance of ongoing training to keep our community safe.

We're hosting the annual Get Ready Weekend on the 20th of September infront of Aldi at the






